City ordinance has "cats by the tail" City Council says "Yes" to feline control

"With the ordinance, the City of Lowell is saying that owners of cats have a responsibility to make sure their cats don't stray," Lowell City Manager Dave Pasquale said.

As a means of addressing the cat control problem in Lowell, the City Council approved a cat-control ordinance. It will provide for violations to owners having cats running at large. Under the ordinance seizure and impounding authority is given. Also, no person can have no more than three cats under care other than those cats under six months of age.

The City's effort at a means of cat control, particularly where there is cat complaints, raised some concern by city residents. Some residents at the meeting said a leash is impractical and fencing does not work.

The proposed ordinance calls for cats to be retained by a leash of eight feet or less when off the premises of the owner. Female cats in heat are to be restricted to a building of fenced enclosure. The ordinance also disallows cats from creating a nuisance by noise, odor or any other manner.

"This is not an anti-cat ordinance. It's a means of addressing the cat problems some residents are experiencing," Pasquale said. The ordinance goes into effect 10 days after publication.

The Lowell City Council and YMCA agreed to proposals that will formalize an agreement eliminating the current documents in force.

Council members Bill Thompson, Jim Hodges and City Manager, Pasquale along with YMCA representatives David Hagens and Jim Reagan formed a committee, which provided the following recommendations:

* Provide that the YMCA operate the pool on a year-to-year basis due to the questions on the pool's longevity and the planned improvements at Stoney-Lakeside Park.

* Have the City give a flat \$6,000 contribution to the pool operation, eliminating the matching of YMCA memberships. The \$25 gift certificates to City residents would remain.

* In an effort to balance the Y budget, no electrical, water and YMCA administrative charges would be addressed. The Lowell Light and Power agreed to the proposed elimination of electrical billings at its Nov. 13 meeting on a year-to-year basis.

* Any surpluses derived would be given to a maintenance reserve fund. Deficits would be split between the YMCA and the city.

These proposals were passed by the City Council 4-1. The only council member not in favor was Jack Fonger.

In other council news a public hearing was set for Dec. 4 for a setback variance at 961 Lincoln Lake.

Chris Childs has requested a variance so that he can construct a detached garage closer than 60 feet to the road right-of-way. As drawn, the garage would be 44 feet from Lincoln Lake and 23 feet five inches from Hunt Street.

A current part-time office position held by Debbie Crawford was upgraded to full-time. The increased volume of work in the Deputy City Clerk, City Treasurer and Account Clerk have necessitated this request. The full-time position would commence Jan. 1, 1990.

The Council gave its approval to have bids taken on the police department renovation project. The adopted 1989-90 City Budget has included the renovation of the old fire bay area in City Hall to accommodate additional space for the Police Department. The work is scheduled to start when the fire department moves to the new station. An amount of \$32,000 has been set aside in the budget for the project.

The East Jordan Iron Works bid of \$8,541 was okayed by the council for the work on the Hudson-Riverside water main materials.

HANDLE WITH CARE

Replace with a bulb of the correct type and wattage. (If you do not know the correct wattage, use a bulb no larger than 60 watts.) A bulb of too high wattage or the wrong type may lead to fire through overheating. Ceiling fixtures, recessed lights, and "hooded" lamps will trap heat.

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Four-year college enrollment prices expected to soar

If your child is still in diapers, you probably think you have all the time in the world to start building college funds. Think again. The Department of Education expects the average cost for attending a four-year private college to soar to almost \$200,000 in the next 18 years. The cost at a public college may be nearly \$60,000.

To afford such exorbitant expenses, the Michigan Association of CPAs suggests parents begin saving for their child's college education as soon as possible.

By starting early, following sound tax strategies and choosing smart investments, you should be able to build an adequate college fund.

Time's On Your Side.
The more years you have to save, the less you need to save each year. For example, you can build a \$100,000 nest egg in 15 years by investing \$289 a month in an account earning 8-percent interest. But if you reduce your saving period by just five years, you will have to invest \$547 a month at the same rate to yield

the same \$100,000.

Another advantage of early planning is that you can afford to take greater investment risks - which traditionally pay off in substantially higher interest rates.

Choose Less Taxing Ways To Save
To make the most of what you save, try to minimize the amount of tax you must pay on unearned income, such as interest or dividends. In the past, the easiest way to accomplish this goal was for parents to shift income to a child. While this strategy still has merit, tax reform has reduced the benefits of income shifting. Today, if a child under 14 has any unearned income in excess of \$1,000, the excess amount is taxed at the parents' top marginal rate. However, children age 14 or older pay tax on unearned income at their own lower rate. Keep these rules in mind when making any investment decisions.

Buy Series EE Bonds
You can purchase Series EE bonds for as little as \$25 or as much as \$10,000. Buy them in your own name and you can defer taxes on the interest earned for up to 12 years. As an alternative, you can buy the bonds in your child's name with a maturity date that defers taxes until after your child reaches age 14. Then, when he or she redeems the bonds, the interest will be taxed at his or her lower rate. In either case, you receive an acceptable rate of interest and a guaranteed minimum return.

For EE bonds purchased after December 31, 1989, the tax benefits will be even greater. Under a law passed last fall, the accumulated interest on Series EE

bonds will be totally tax-free if you redeem the bonds to pay for your own or your dependents' education expenses. To qualify for the interest exclusion, the bonds must be issued after December 31, 1989 and you must be at least 24 years old at the time of the purchase. Be aware the exemption is available only if the bondholder pays qualified higher education expenses in the same year the bonds are redeemed. If the amount redeemed exceeds the year's qualified educational costs, the amount of tax-free interest will be reduced proportionately. One last point: the break is phased out for joint filers with an adjusted gross income (AGI) of \$60,000 to \$90,000 and for single filers with AGI of \$40,000 to \$55,000.

Zeros Can Add Up
Another type of bond to consider is the "zero coupon" bond, which is offered at a price substantially lower than its face value. What makes these bonds a good investment is their high rate of return when they mature. Note that while these bonds pay no interest to the holder, the investor is nevertheless taxed as if interest were paid out annually. For this reason, you may prefer zero coupon municipal bonds. The interest is exempt from federal taxes, as well as state and local taxes if you buy bonds issued by the state in which you live. Certain municipal bond funds can also offer triple tax-free returns.

Take A Stake in Growth Stocks
If you are an adventuresome investor with a child under age 14, consider purchasing non-dividend-paying growth stocks in your child's name. Remember, as long as the stocks are sold after your child turns 14, the gain will be taxed at your child's lower rate rather than yours.

Growth mutual funds typically provide larger gains over a long period of time. But, beware that any stock market investment involves risk. You could lose all or a portion of your money with stocks. And the sooner you need to use the funds, the greater the risk is that you may have to sell them at a loss.

Consider New Financing Options
Finally, you should carefully consider some of the new techniques for financing a college education. For instance, Michigan now offers a tuition prepayment plan called the

Michigan Education Trust (MET). The plan, available to parents with children up to age 17, allows you to prepay up to four years of tuition for your child at a substantial discount. The money will be invested during the years the child is not attending. You won't have to deal with inflation or the investment risk.

CPAs point out one serious drawback to the prepaid tuition plan. The IRS has ruled that the prepayment represents a gift to a trust, but does not qualify for the \$10,000 annual gift exclusion. In addition, while you won't pay tax on the fund as it accumulates, the trust will. As a result, the fund will grow at a slower rate. What's worse, when your child begins attending college, he or she will have to pay tax on the difference between the actual cost of tuition and the amount you paid to the trust.

For additional advice on financing your child's college education, consult your CPA.

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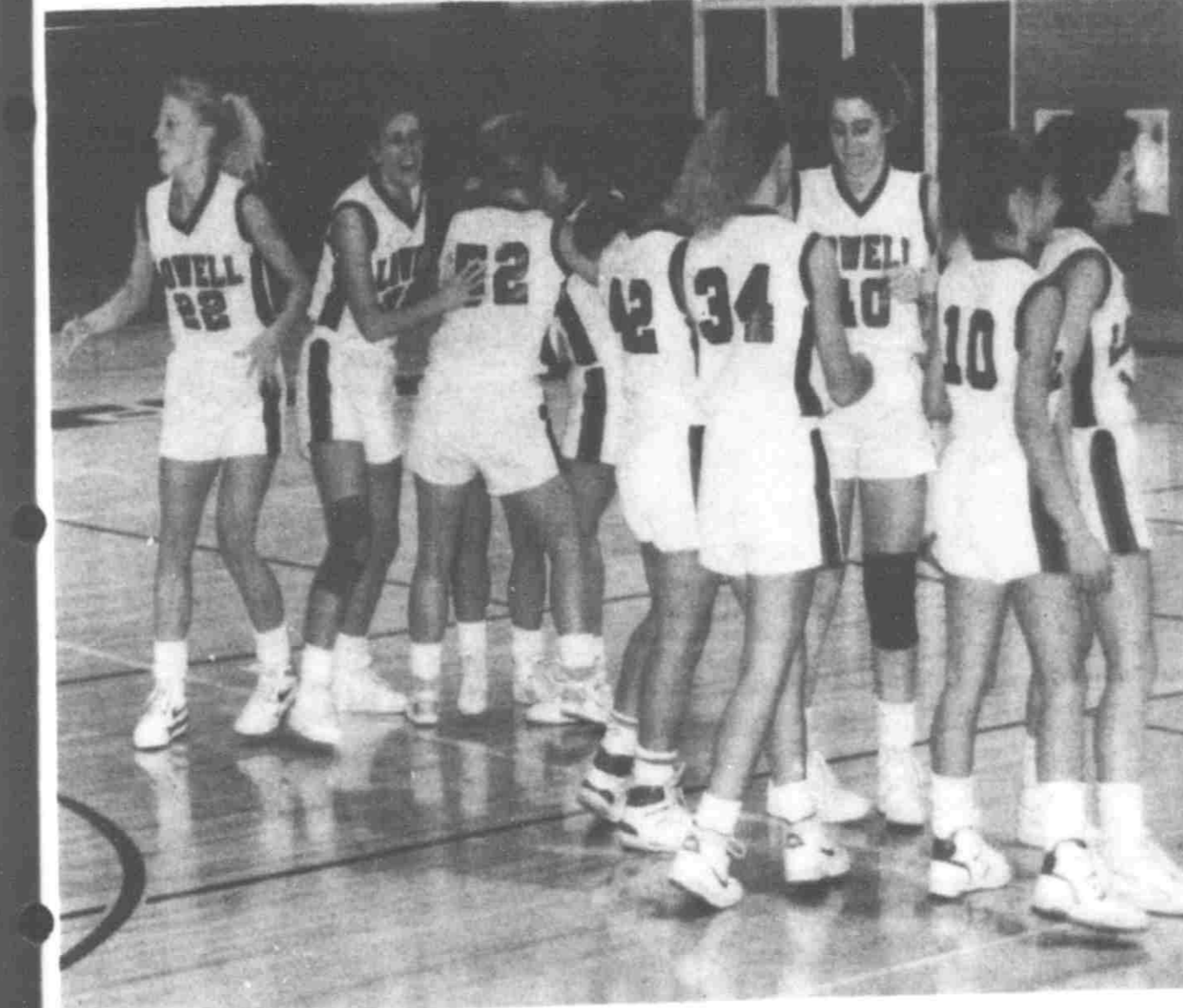
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Lowell's District Champions!

Reedy Realty sells to Greenridge; name changes but not faces

Don and Connie Reedy, of Reedy Realty, have announced the sale of their real estate firm's assets to Greenridge Realty, Inc.

The sale became effective Tuesday, Nov. 13th and Reedy Realty opened its doors as Greenridge Realty, Inc. on Wednesday, Nov. 14.

The finality of Reedy's decision came after six months of negotiations. "I've known for a while that I wanted to unload the responsibilities of owning and running the real estate firm," Donald Reedy said. "This will allow me to direct my personal energies toward fee-appraising,

working with investors and serving clients."

There was no mulling over the decision as to who to sell the real estate branch to. "Greenridge was the only one I ever considered," Reedy said.

Reedy listed Greenridge's excellent reputation, and having Rick Seese on board as being major factors. "We have a great deal of respect for Rick Seese. He's a credit to the real estate business," he said. Reedy added that he offered the business to Seese first, but Seese insisted on Greenridge.

Both Reedy and Greenridge President, Tom Paarberg agreed the sale will be excellent for Lowell. The branch will be able to offer things that it previously couldn't.

"The main advantage is, the depth of service Greenridge will be able to provide," Paarberg said. "We plan on doubling the sales staff. This should help generate more sales."

Paarberg said the sale will allow the firm to enhance services offered. That would include recruiting more agents, a training program that Greenridge already has in place, active involvement in relocation, and sales person benefits.

"Don and Connie Reedy have been running a successful realty business in Lowell for quite some time. Greenridge is happy to be associated with them," Paarberg said. "If Greenridge was not comfortable with Reedy's, we would not be sitting here today."

Through a similar experience (the buying out of Ranch Realty), Paarberg said he expects that the best of both firms will be molded together.

"I like the fact that both Don and Connie will be staying on board. It's a positive having them work with us," Paarberg said. He added that Reedy's staff will also stay in place. "The strength of Reedy Realty was its staff. I have no intentions of parting with it."

While Don and Connie Reedy will be stepping away from management responsibilities, Seese will be inheriting more. He will also continue to list and sell.

Both Seese and Paarberg firmly believe that while there will be a shift in responsibility, there will not be any conflict. "Rick and Don knowing and

respecting one another enables a shift like this to happen," Paarberg said.

Greenridge will look to widen the market areas, stressing Ada and Cascade. It will also go over into Belding and Saranac. Paarberg said it will also add 10 more people to the staff.

Greenridge came to the area in 1975, known then as Woodland Realty. In 1980 its name changed to Greenridge Realty Inc. Its affiliate mortgage company is Oakridge, based in Grand Rapids. It currently has 115 sales people on staff at its six Greenridge offices.

Don Reedy came to the Lowell area 30 years ago. "There wasn't a real estate office in town," he recalls. So, in 1970 he bought the Dick & Owens barber shop and remodeled it for a real estate office. "At the time he was working for R.J. Ide," Connie Reedy explains. "He continued there for about six months and then went out on his own, using the name Reedy Real Estate Company. In 1977 he moved his office to 210 W. Main St. and later to 1160 W. Main (formerly a restaurant) changing the firm's name to Century 21 Reedy Realty. The name stayed that way until January of 1988, when Reedy dropped Century 21 and continued as Reedy Realty."

"We have made a great living here in Lowell. Connie and I are extremely grateful to the people," Don Reedy said. "We have no plans on leaving Lowell. We just purchased a house here in town."

Don and Connie Reedy will experience a change, one that they're comfortable with. "We will be taking direction from someone else instead of providing the direction. It will definitely be different. Nobody has ever controlled where I went and what I did, but I'm sure I can adjust," Connie Reedy said.
