Three injured in Bennett/Parnell accident

Nine-year old girl removed from critical list

Two Lowell drivers and a nine-year old girl were seriously injured in a two-car collision at the intersection of Parnell Road and Bennett Street on Wednesday, Dec. 6.

Joyce Venneman, 37 Lowell and her daughter, Julie were eastbound on Bennett following dinner at their mother-in-law's when Venneman failed to yield the right-of-way to a northbound pickup truck driven by Daryl Anderson, Lowell. Anderson hit the Venneman car broadside on the passenger side.

Kent County Sheriff Department Deputy Vic Weeks said neither driver could remember if Venneman had stopped at the corner.

According to Weeks, Julie Venneman was pinned in. The nine-year old suffered a closed skull injury and was transported to Butterworth Hospital by Aero Med. Venneman was removed from the critical list to serious early Thursday morning.

Both Joyce Venneman and Anderson incurred multiple contusions and were listed in serious condition at Butterworth Hospital.

Answering the call were Lowell Rescue and Fire, the Kent County Sheriff's Department, LIFE Ambulance and Aero Med.

On Thursday, Dec. 7 serious injury was avoided in a three-car accident when a Grand Rapids man lost control of his car as a result of a medical problem.

According to a Kent County Sheriff's Department Deputy, it was probable that the man, on medication for temporal lobe seizures, experienced a problem with blackout and/or seizures.

It appears that a pickup truck driven by Chris Kommer, 42, Grand Rapids struck the rear of

a westbound vehicle driven by Susan Schaffer, 25, of Saranac and then continued westbound in the eastbound lane and struck a third vehicle driven by Joan Carless of Lowell, according to the report.

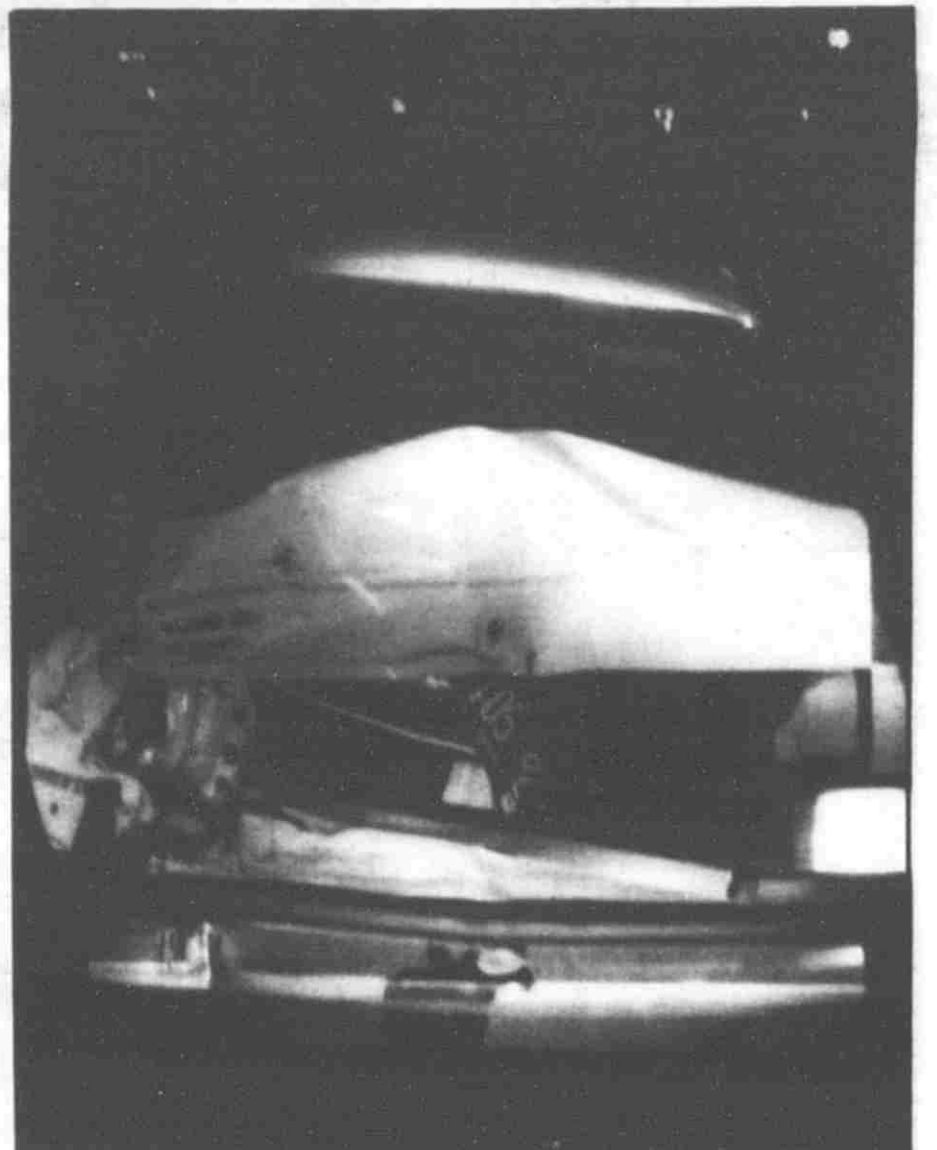
Kommer's vehicle continued westbound at a rate of speed perceived faster than the normal, according to a male witness, forcing vehicles off the roadway.

According to the witness, Kommer passed him and then swung back into the westbound lane before losing control, off the roadway and into an embankment, striking a tree and rolling over.

Kommer was taken to St. Mary's Hospital by private conveyance where he was treated and released.

Schaffer complained of back pain and was transported to Blodgett Hospital by Lowell Ambulance. Carless incurred no injury.

According to the Kent County Sheriff's Department report, drinking was not involved in the accident.



A three-car accident was the result of an apparent seizure and/or blackout on Thursday evening near Settlewood and M-21, according to the Kent County Sheriff's Department.

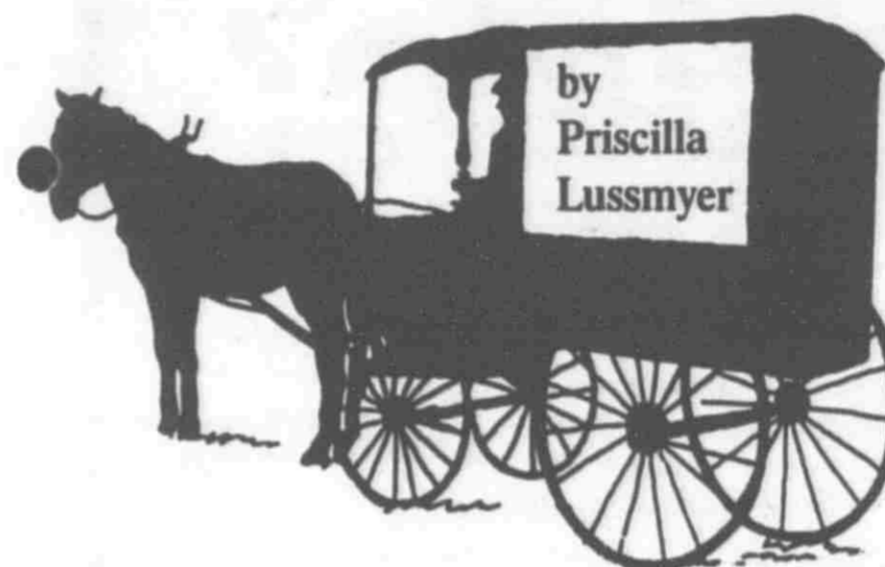
Next came the tree. We have nine foot ceilings in that big old

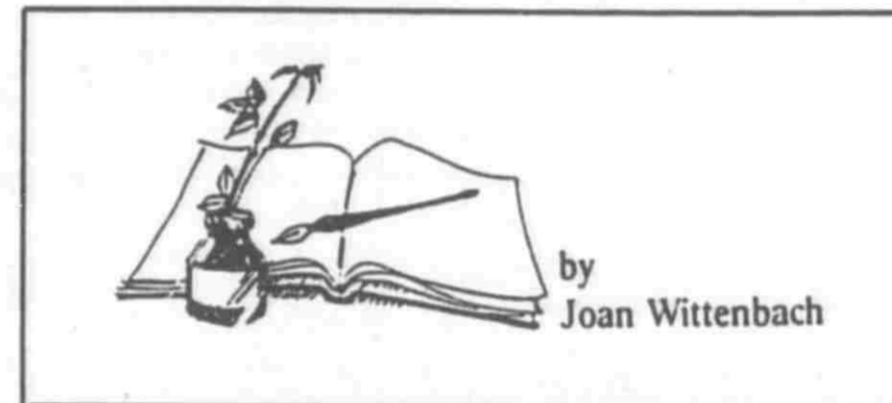

It came unexpectedly. Some call it, "surprised by joy" and I clapped my hands with delight.

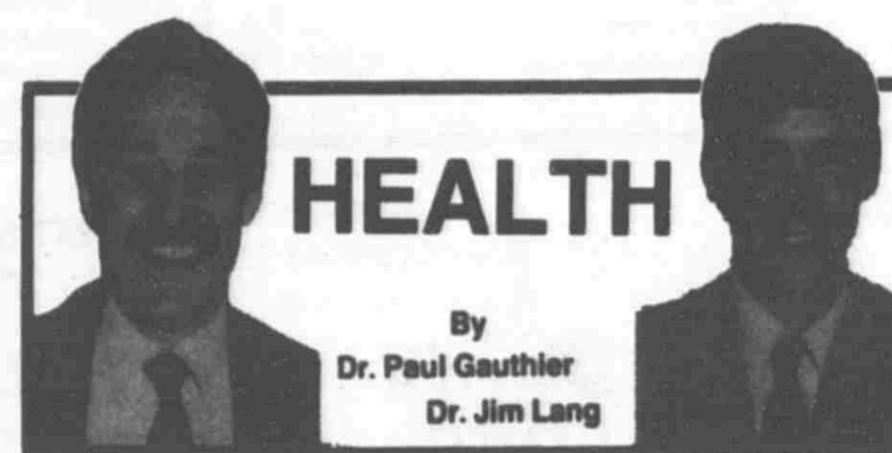
"You write--poems? How wonderful. Can I see them sometime?" I asked the lady sitting next to me.

CAT SCRATCH DISEASE

Cat scratch disease is a benign self limiting form of infected lymph glands (lymphadenitis). Most patients will report an incident of a cat scratch or contact with a kitten or cat. Many other sources of "scratches" have been implicated in causing this disease also: dogs, monkeys, thorns, codfish bones, and wooden splinters. Invariably, the animal responsible for the scratch is healthy. The disease occurs worldwide and is more common in the fall and winter. No one is exactly sure what causes these scratches to infect regional lymph nodes, but it is assumed to be a small bacterium.

A few days after the scratch, about 50 percent of patients develop a small red raised sore at the site of the scratch. Approximately ten to thirty days later, swelling and discomfort of regional lymph nodes usually develops. This may be accompanied by malaise, headache and low grade fever. The affected individual usually seeks medical attention secondary to the red regional swelling and discomfort of lymph glands. This may occur in the armpit, neck, groin or extremity.

Your doctor will distinguish cat scratch disease from some of the more common causes of enlarged or tender lymph nodes, i.e. lymphoma, Hodgkin's disease, tuberculosis, infectious mononucleosis, etc. Once the diagnosis is made, the best therapy is reassurance that the lymph node enlargement is benign and self-limiting. Most cases subside spontaneously in four to eight weeks. There is no medical therapy available to hasten recovery. Again, the best avenue of treatment is early identification and reassurance.

MICHIGAN HOUSE TO CONSIDER SCHOOLS OF CHOICE LEGISLATION

State school boards would be allowed to decide whether to let families in their districts pick the schools their children attend under a bill being considered by the Michigan House.

House Bill 4615 would not require any district to enact the "schools of choice" system, but it would obligate all school boards to explore the idea and give their decisions to the state Board of Education by January 1993.

In most Michigan districts, students are assigned to schools based on geographic boundaries. However, a few districts currently allow parents to choose the

Lowell's Fire Department held its third Grand Valley Blood Drive on Thursday (Dec. 7). Roughly 75 people attended, 60 were able to donate a pint of blood. The Lowell Fire Department blood drives in February, May and December are a part of the five Lowell Community Blood Drives held during the year. Other blood drives held include the Lowell Jaycees in July

and the Lowell Rotary holds one in September.

"The number of persons who have donated over the last five years has averaged roughly 60 people per drive," said Lowell Assistant Fire Chief Frank Leasure.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 3/1989

An Ordinance To Amend The Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance

THE TOWNSHIP OF VERGENNES HEREBY ORDAINS:

Section 1.
Section 2.02 V and FF. are amended to read in full as follows:

"V. LOT AREA:

The total horizontal area included within lot lines. However, Lot Area shall not include land lying below the ordinary high water mark of a lake, river or pond which is not totally enclosed within the boundary lines of the lot."

FF. ORDINARY HIGH WATERMARK

The line between upland and bottomland which persists through successive changes in water levels, below which the presence and action of water is so common or recurrent that the character of the land is marked distinctly from the upland and is apparent in the soil itself, the configuration of the surface of the soil and the vegetation. On an upland lake which has a level established by law, it means the high established level. Where water returns to its natural level as the result of the permanent removal or abandonment of an ordinary water mark, it means the natural high water mark.

Section 2.02 is amended by the addition of the following provision:

"MM. SITE DEVELOPMENT PLAN

A site development plan shall have the meaning ascribed to it at section 5.02D of this Ordinance."

Section 2.

Section 4.08 and 4.14a are amended to read in full as follows and Section 4.25 is added and reads as follows:

"4.08 DRIVEWAYS

All driveways must abut the road at right angles, with clear traffic vision, and the first twenty-five (25) feet of the driveway from the road shall not be at a grade greater than five (5) percent. Before a building permit will be issued for any homesite, or other structure to which driveway access is to be provided, a driveway permit must be obtained from the Kent County Road Commission, and a site development plan must be submitted to the Zoning Inspector in the form provided by Section 5.02D of this Ordinance."

"4.14a PRIVATE ROADS AND STREETS

A. The layout of private streets in respect to their location, intersections, cul-de-sacs, vertical street alignment, street grades, horizontal curves, curb openings at intersection streets, etc., shall conform to the Kent County Road Commission standards for platted streets. In addition, curb openings intersecting public streets or roads shall have the curbing, guttering and surfacing to the property line as required under Kent County Road Commission standards completed within one year from completing of the private road.

B. The construction of the roadway shall conform to the Kent County Road Commission standard for a local road - 22' wide with 6" gravel base (MDSH 22A), 6' wide grass shoulders, side ditches with 1 on 3 front slope and one 1 on 2 back slope at 0.5% grade minimum. Ditches shall outlet into a cross culvert or drainage course. In impervious soils (clay or other unsuitable materials), a 12" inch sand sub-base, graded parallel to the road surface (extending into the front ditch slope), shall be constructed. Bituminous surfacing and storm sewer will not be required.

C. Culverts shall be placed at all natural drainage courses or other waterways. Culvert sizes and grades shall be determined using the Kent County Road Commission storm runoff calculations formula. Materials for culverts shall also conform to their requirements.

D. Maintenance and repair of private streets shall not be the responsibility of the Township.

E. Prior to the construction of private roads and streets, a site development plan shall be provided to the Zoning Inspector in the form provided by Section 5.02D of this Ordinance."

"4.25 SUBDIVISION OF PROPERTY

Prior to the subdivision of any property, irrespective of the form of ownership and other provisions of Michigan law affecting the subdivision of property, a site development plan shall be submitted to the Zoning Inspector if such subdivision involves or will involve the establishment of private roads

and streets, driveways or an easement which will provide access to the property."

Section 3.

The title of Article V is amended to read as follows:

"NONCONFORMING USES, SPECIAL EXCEPTIONS, SITE DEVELOPMENT PLANS, AND VARIANCES"

Section 4.

Section 502D is amended to read in full as follows: "D. SITE DEVELOPMENT PLAN REVIEW PROCEDURES.

1. A site development plan drawn and submitted in accordance with this section shall be required in connection with any application for a Special Exception Use Permit and as otherwise required by this Ordinance.

2. No action by the Township Board or the Planning Commission on an application for a Special Exception Use Permit shall be taken until a suitable plan shall be submitted. The applicant shall be responsible for proper preparation and submission of a suitable plan.

3. Optional Sketch Plan Review. Preliminary sketches of a proposed site development plan may be submitted for review in connection with any application for Special Exception Use Permit or where a site development plan is otherwise required by this Ordinance. The purpose of such procedure is to allow discussion between an applicant, the Township Board, the Planning Commission or the Zoning Inspector to better inform the applicant of the acceptability of his proposed plans prior to incurring extensive engineering and other costs which might be necessary for final site development plan approval. Such sketch plans shall include as a minimum the following:

- The name and address of the applicant or developer, including the names and addresses of any officers of a corporation or partners of a partnership.
- A legal description of the property.
- Sketch plans showing tentative site and development plans.

The Township Board, the Planning Commission, and the Zoning Inspector shall not be bound by any tentative approval given in connection with the review of an optional sketch plan.

4. Filing Requirements. When a final site development plan is required hereunder and unless such requirements are modified by the Township Board, the Planning Commission or the Zoning Inspector, the applicant shall file the following:

- A review fee as determined by resolution of the Township Board based upon the cost of processing the review.
- Three (3) copies of the completed application form for site plan review which shall contain as a minimum the following:
 - the name and address of applicant;
 - the legal description of the subject parcel of land;
 - the area of the subject parcel of land stated in acres or, if less than an acre, in square feet;
 - the present zoning classification of the subject parcel; and
 - a general description of the proposed development.

Three (3) copies of the proposed site development plan which shall include as a minimum the following:

- a scale drawing of the site and proposed development thereon, including the date, name and address of the preparer, showing the topography of the site and its relationship to adjoining land;
- existing man-made features;
- dimensions of setbacks, locations, heights and size of structures and other important features;
- percentage of land covered by buildings and that reserved for open space;
- dwellling unit density where pertinent;
- location of public and private rights-of-way, driveways and easements contiguous to and within the proposed development which are planned to be continued, created, re-located, or abandoned, including grades and types of construction of those upon the site;
- curb-cuts, driving lanes, parking and loading areas;
- location and type of drainage, sanitary sewers, storm sewers, and other facilities;
- fences;
- landscaping;
- screening;
- proposed earth changes;
- environmental impact of the project;
- signs and on-site illumination; and

(xv) such additional material information necessary to consider the impact of the project upon adjacent or nearby properties and the general public as may be requested by the Township Board or by the Planning Commission.

5. Action on Site Development Plan

a. (i) With respect to an application for Special Exception Use Permit, the Township Board shall have the authority to approve, disapprove or modify the proposed site development plan in light of the standards for Special Exception Uses set forth in this Ordinance together with such other general or special regulations as may apply to the proposed Special Exception Use. Any required modification shall be stated in writing, together with the reasons therefor, and delivered to the applicant. The Township Board may either approve the final site development plan contingent upon the making of required modifications, or may require a further review of the plan after the modifications have been incorporated in the proposed plan.

(ii) In other instances in which a site development plan must be filed as required by this Ordinance, the Zoning Inspector shall have the authority to approve, disapprove or modify the proposed site development plan in light of the standards set forth in this Ordinance. Any required modification shall be stated in writing, together with the reasons therefor, and delivered to the applicant. The Zoning Inspector may either approve the final site development plan contingent upon the making of required modifications, or may require a further review of the plan after the modifications have been incorporated in the proposed plan.

b. One (1) copy of each approved final site development plan shall be maintained as part of the Township records for review and enforcement. One (1) copy shall be returned to the applicant. Each copy shall be signed and dated with the date of approval by the chairman of the Township Board, if approved by the Township Board, or the Zoning Inspector, if approved by the Zoning Inspector, so as to facilitate identification of the finally approved plan.

E. Criteria for Review of Site Development Plan.

1. In reviewing a site development plan submitted in connection with an application for a Special Exception Use Permit, and in approving, disapproving or modifying the plan, the Township Board (and in making its recommendation the Planning Commission) shall consider the Standards for Approval of Special Exception Uses set forth at paragraph 5.02 B above, shall consult and be bound by other pertinent provisions of this Ordinance, and in addition, shall be governed by the following criteria:

a. That there is a proper relationship between the existing streets and highways and proposed deceleration lanes in the vicinity of the proposed site development so as to service drives, entrance and exit driveways and parking areas to assure the safety and convenience of existing and anticipated pedestrian and vehicular traffic.

b. That the buildings, structures and entryways thereto proposed for the site development are so situated and designed as to minimize adverse effects upon owners and occupants of adjacent and nearby properties.

c. That as many natural landscape features as possible in the site development area shall be retained where they furnish a barrier or buffer between the proposed site development and adjoining properties used for dissimilar purposes and where they assist in preserving the general appearance of the vicinity or help control erosion or discharge of storm waters.

d. That any adverse effects of the proposed site development and any noise, light or activities expected to emanate therefrom upon adjoining residents or owners shall be minimized by appropriate screening, fencing or landscaping.

e. That all provisions of this Ordinance are complied with unless an appropriate variance therefrom has been granted by the Township Board.

f. That all buildings and structures are accessible to emergency vehicles.

g. That sanitary facilities have been provided for which meet the requirements and specifications prescribed by the Kent County Health Department, as evidenced by a permit issued by said department.

h. That the plan as approved is consistent with the intent and purpose of zoning to promote public health, safety, morals and general welfare; to encourage the use of lands in accordance with their character and adaptability; to avoid the overcrowding of population; to lessen congestion on the public roads and streets, to reduce hazards to life and property; to facilitate adequate provisions for a system of transportation, sewage disposal, safe and adequate water supply, education, recreation and other public requirements; to conserve the expenditure of funds for public improvements and services to conform with the most advantageous uses of land, resources and properties; to conserve property values and natural resources; and to give reasonable consideration to the character of a particular area in light of its peculiar suitability for the particular use proposed.

2. Apart from an application for a Special Exception Use Permit, the Zoning Inspector shall approve the plan if all provisions of the Ordinance are complied with unless an appropriate variance therefrom has been granted by the Township Board. Ordinance. cont'd., pg. 8

Ordinance, continued

F. Conformity to Approved Site Development Plan.

1. Property which is the subject of an approved site development plan must be developed in strict compliance with the approved plan. The Township Board or the Zoning Inspector may require a Performance Bond in connection with the approval of a site plan.

2. If construction and development does not conform with the approved plan, all work, construction or development under which the plan is based shall be forthwith terminated by the Zoning Inspector by written stop order posted upon the premises involved and mailed to the applicant at his last known address. Upon such termination all further construction activities shall cease upon the site, other than for the purpose of correcting the violation. However, the Township Board may, upon proper written application by the applicant and after a hearing, approve a modification in the site plan to coincide with the developer's construction provided such construction complies with the criteria contained in the site plan approval provisions and with the spirit, purpose and intent of this Ordinance.

3. Approval of a site development plan shall be valid for a period of one (1) year after the date of approval. With respect to special uses, if a Special Exception Use Permit has not been obtained and on-site development actually commenced within such one (1) year period, the Special Exception Use Permit embodying the plan shall become void and a new application for Special Use Permit shall be required before any construction or development is commenced.

G. Amendment to Site Plan. A proposed amendment, modification or alteration to a previously approved site development plan shall be submitted to the Township Board or the Zoning Inspector for review in the same manner as the original application was submitted and reviewed."

Section 5.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its publication.

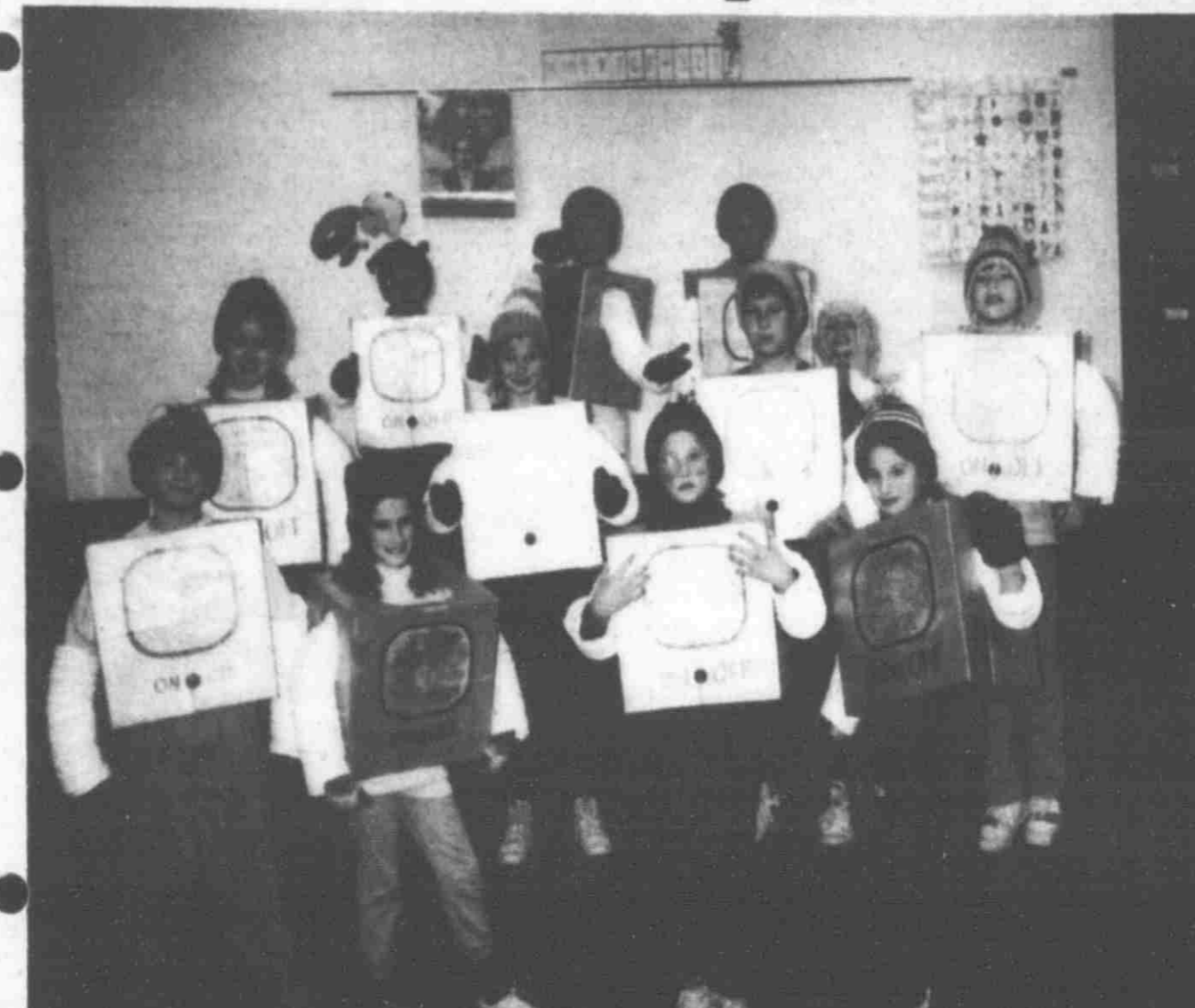

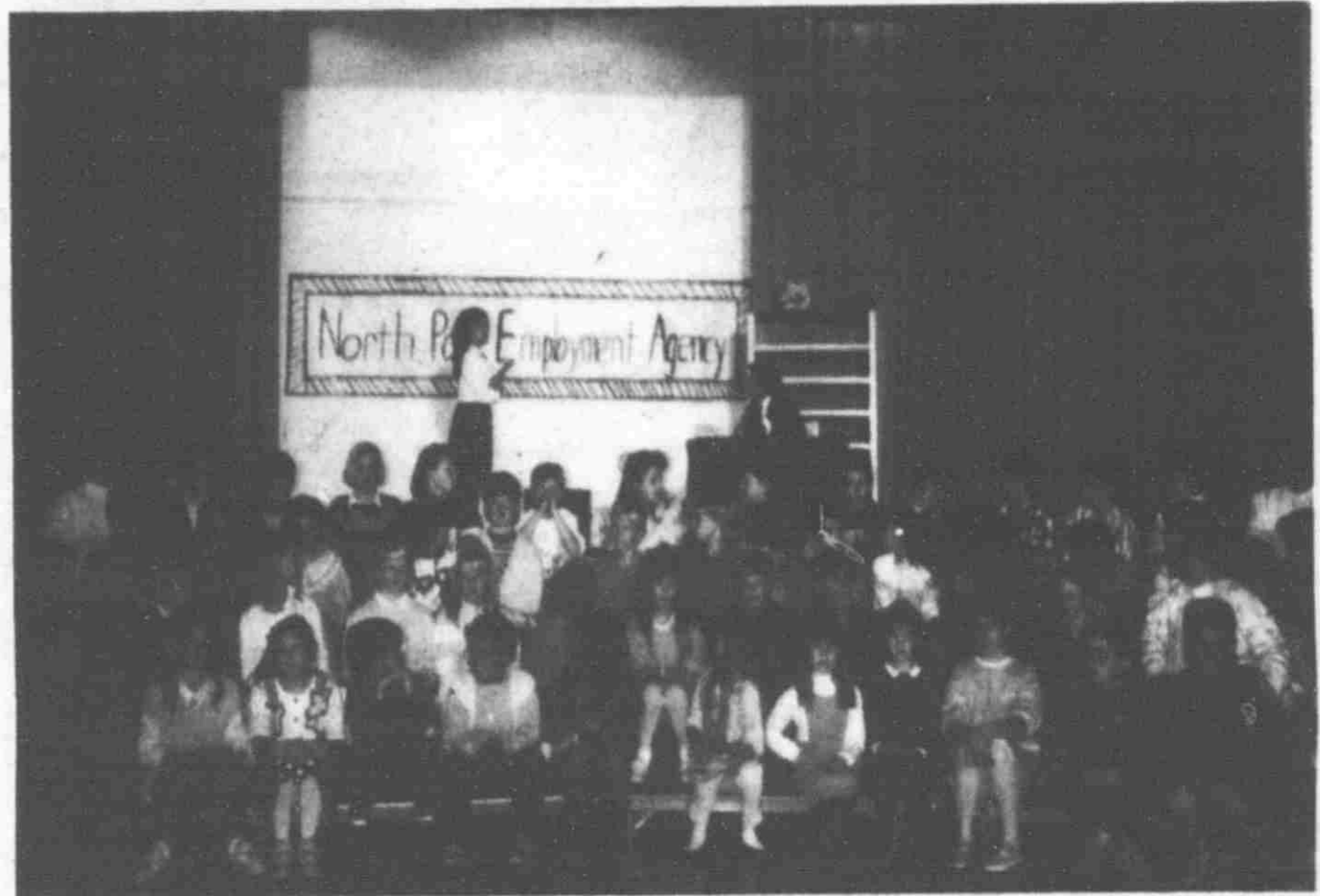

Tips to get car going when it's snowing

Getting stuck in the snow often means "no go" for many motorists, but there are ways to get rolling this winter, AAA Michigan reports.

To get started, clear a path several feet in front of the wheels by driving forward and backward. If snow is too deep, use a shovel to create a path.

With the wheels pointed straight to minimize resistance, shift into gear, gently press the accelerator and ease forward without spinning the wheels. Spinning wheels dig deeper ruts.

Stop and let tires cool if wheels spin. For additional traction, place carpet strips, cat litter or other

abrasive material in front and behind the drive wheels. Don't let anyone stand directly in line with the tires because objects thrown by spinning wheels may cause injury.

Emergency road service may be required if the car remains stuck.

Carrie Lipkea and Laura Kropf will help bolster an experienced Red Arrow gymnastic club

Lowell Gymnastic's Coach Tammy Fitzpatrick enters her fifth year as the Red Arrow mentor with her sights set on a third regional appearance.

To reach the regionals the Red Arrows must score 115 points or more in four of their seasonal meets. Lowell missed that goal a year ago by one meet. Fitzpatrick is confident that in 1989 that extra step will be taken.

Helping bolster Fitzpatrick's confidence is two-time state qualifier Laura Kropf. Barring injury, the junior should make it three-for-three in 1989-90. As a freshman and sophomore, Kropf qualified for state competition in both the floor and uneven bars competition. The Red Arrow placed eighth on the bars at the state level.

"The uneven bars is definitely Kropf's strength," Fitzpatrick said. "She will be an all-around performer (all four events) for us."

The 1988-89 season was an odd one for Lowell, in that it was seldom at full strength due to injuries. Senior Carrie Lipkea can relate to that. In her three years as a gymnast, Lipkea has suffered an injury every year. Her freshman year she suffered a stress fracture in her arm. Lipkea's sophomore year, she broke her hand. Last year, the senior tore ligaments in her ankle while performing on the balancing beam.

For some, gymnastics would not be a memory. Not Lipkea, she will return in 1989-90 on the floor and uneven bars. "Lipkea will return and should be very strong on uneven bars. Her floor routine should also be good," Fitzpatrick said. "Depending on how Carrie feels, she may even get back up on the balance beam later in the year."

While last year was clouded with injuries, it also produced a silver lining. Many Red Arrow gymnasts gained invaluable experience which should help to make Lowell a deeper, stronger squad.

Included in that group are sophomore Angie Fox and juniors Kimberly Pullen and Rebecca Hovey.

Fox will be used in the vault. Pullen, will join Kropf as an all-around and Hovey should add strength in the floor exercise, vault and beam exercises, with the floor exercise being her strength.

Senior Katie Hawk returns with a strong bars routine and a solid floor exercise.

Fitzpatrick will also get good millage out of senior, Jody Smith, who should show her mettle on the beam. Smith will also provide stability in the floor exercise.

Returning gymnasts from a year ago, but who did not letter, include sophomores Allison Hess, Stacie Stickney, Mindy Beers and Jennifer Shuster. Hess and Stickney should provide assistance in the areas of vault and beam. Beers and Shuster will aid in the vault and uneven bar events. "Shuster has been really strong on the bars. She's probably our third or fourth strongest gymnast in that event," Fitzpatrick said.

New and unproven Red Arrows completing the 16-person roster include freshmen Anna Lietzke and Alicia Benson; sophomore Heather Burrows and juniors April Rogers and Tammy Jeske.

If Fitzpatrick and the Arrows have an "ace in the hole," it's Jeske. She has quite a bit of previous club gymnastic experience. "She can be very good, it's

She spent four years on the Lowell High School gymnastic squad as did assistant coaches Annette Pearson and Terry Nagy. Lowell opens its season January 10 at home against Kenosha Hills.

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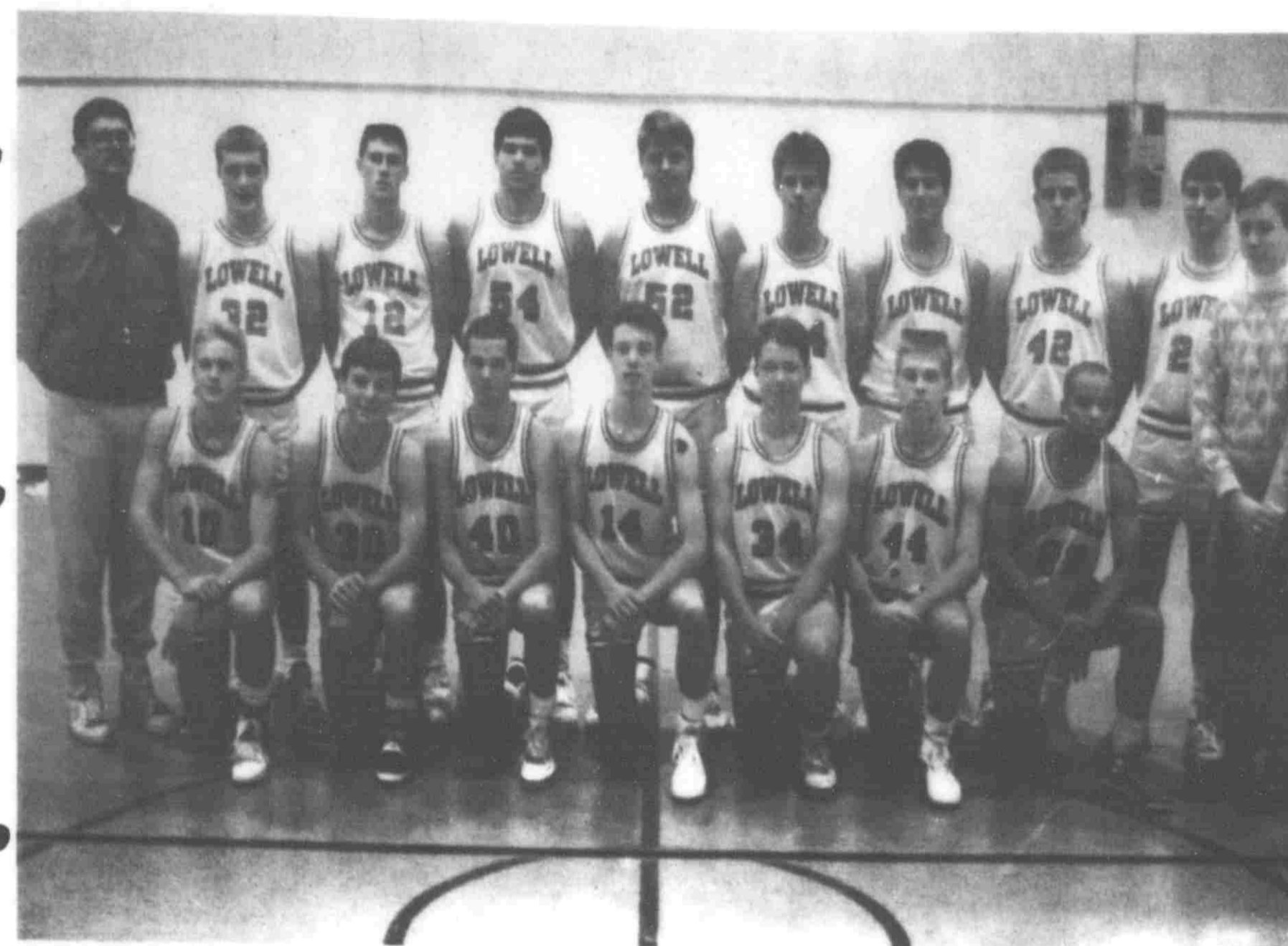

Is Bigger Better?

Lowell's Mark Thomas hopes so, as he blends newly found size with an established perimeter game

In 1988-89, Lowell's basketball team did not have an inside game. Its biggest player measured 6-foot-2.

In 1989-90, nine of the 15-player roster stand at 6-feet-2 or taller. In this, his second year at the varsity helm, Lowell's Mark Thomas is confident that the Red Arrows will compete much better with an abundance of bigger bodies.

"There's no doubt that rebounding again will be the key," Thomas remarks. "I think our size will help make us much more competitive this season."

A year ago the smaller sized Red Arrows were beat-up inside. "Due to our lack of size last year, we depended a lot on gadgets. Now we have the size to set up an inside game to go with our perimeter game."

Lowell's second-year coach promised that the aggressive man-to-man defense will remain. "With zone defenses, players become stagnant and then the offense dictates. We have good team speed and quickness, thus we will stick to our man-to-man."

Along with developing a much stronger and wiser club, Thomas is also interested in seeing more of a basketball program developed at Lowell. Unlike last year, the same offensive and defensive programs will be run at all levels.

Thomas has divided his 15 players into two groups - perimeter players and post players.

Playing on the perimeter will be seniors Dave Organeck, Bob Adams and Ryan Holtz.

Holtz will shed his '89 QB role on the gridiron and fill a swingman role for Thomas on the hardwood. The senior is at his best going to

the basket and posting up smaller guards. "He draws a lot of fouls," Thomas adds.

Adams brings to the floor excellent speed and plenty of strength. "He's a hard worker and a year wiser," Thomas said.

Organeck who did not see a lot of playing time a year ago, is one of Lowell's better athletes. Although, staying healthy during the long season was a problem last year, Thomas says Organeck can run the floor, shows a solid shot and can post people up.

Juniors who will play on the perimeter are John Borg, Jerud Mierkalns and Ryan Brinks.

Borg and Mierkalns can both shoot the outside jumper. Borg is also an excellent passer. The juniors should provide Lowell with a consistent outside threat.

Brinks will see action at the guard-forward positions. Thomas likes his hard work and "nose-for-the-ball" style of play.

The Red Arrows post people will include forward swingman Tom Moore, who provides strength as well as some foot speed underneath.

Senior Dennis Wissman, 6-5, 218, shows continual improvement. His strength is rebounding and on defense.

If Thomas is looking for an offensive threat inside, then Jim Bowen will anchor the paint area.

Senior Chris Carrick offers a nice outside shot for a big man while junior Steve Malone runs the court well and gives Lowell another offensive threat inside.

Other players that should blend in and contribute are senior Jeff Rutherford; juniors, Vince Videan and Ed Nausieda; and sophomore Todd Phillips.

"It's important that we be competitive every night out, and prove to ourselves we can play," Thomas said.

Lowell's Coach adds that the Red Arrows will need leadership and will have to work together as a cohesive unit if "Pride and Respect" are to be put back into Lowell basketball.

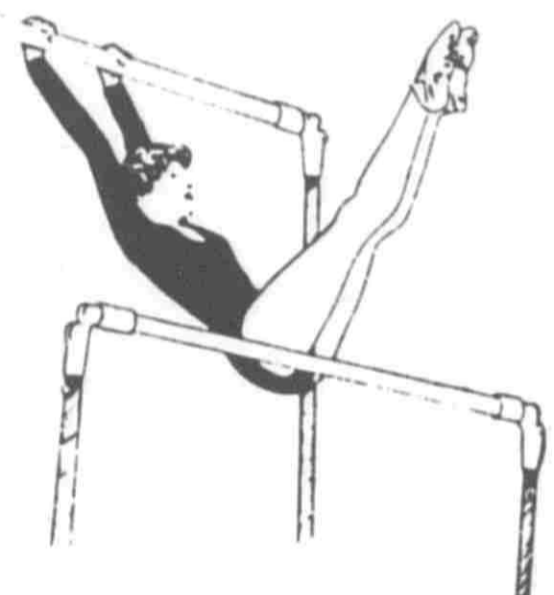

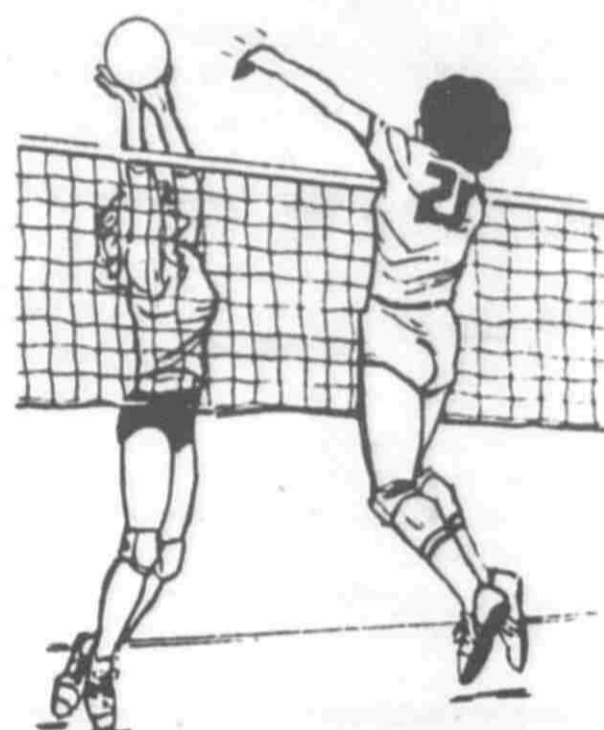

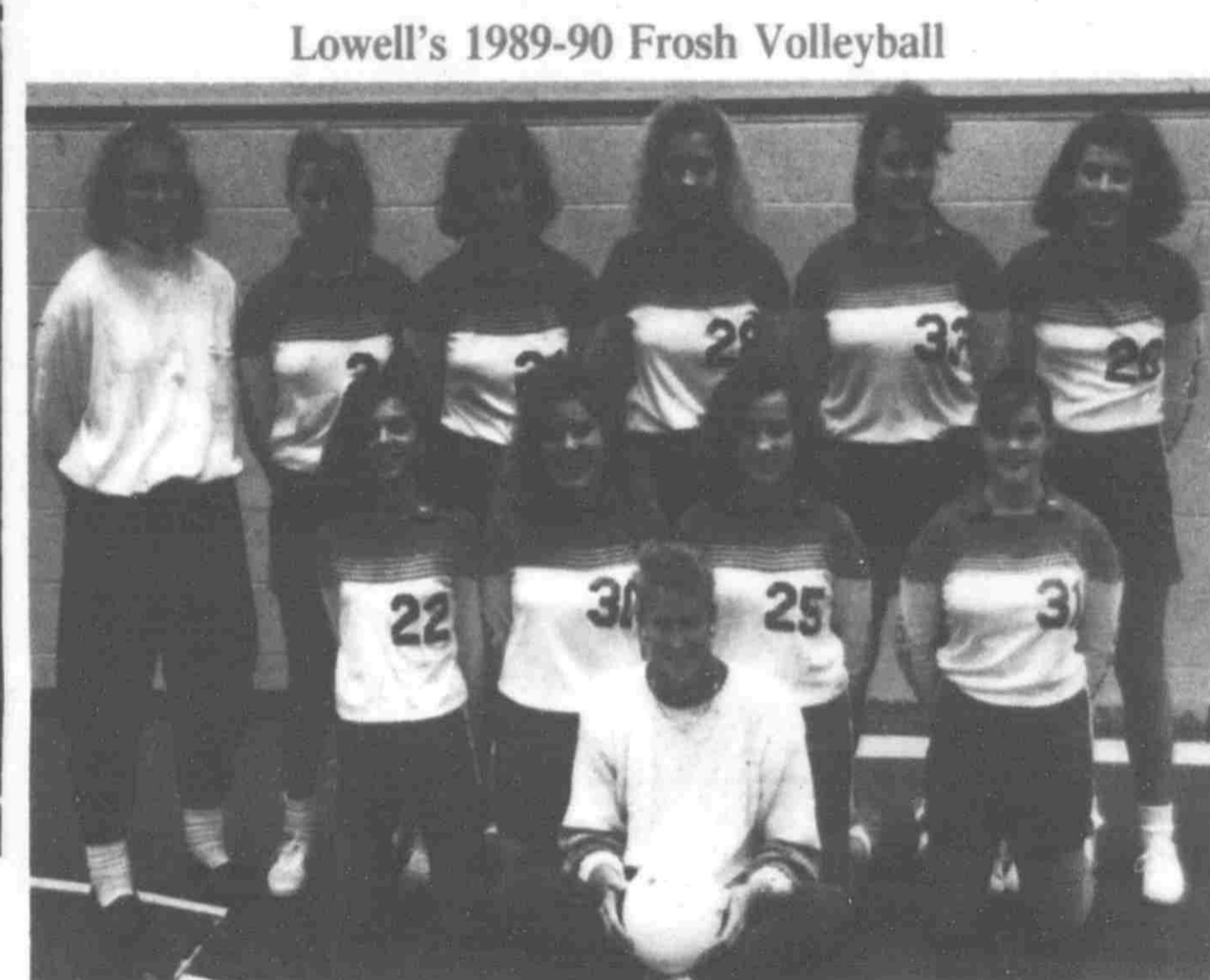

Kuna has set a goal of finishing in the top three of the O-K White Conference. "I believe it's attainable with hard work," Kuna said.

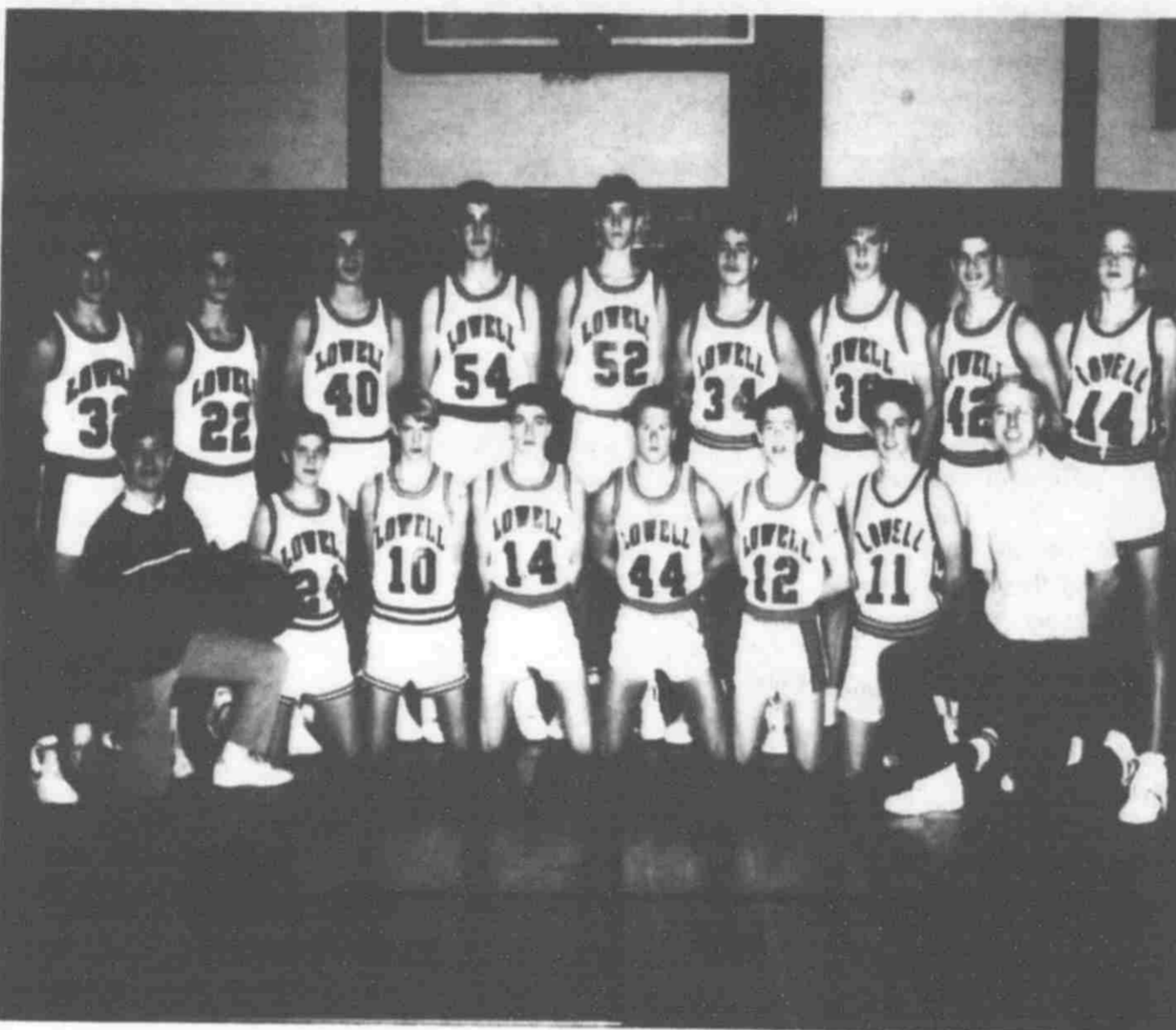

"I'm thinking we'll finish third or fourth in the O-K White Conference in 1989-90," says Gary Rivers Lowell's wrestling coach of 30 years.

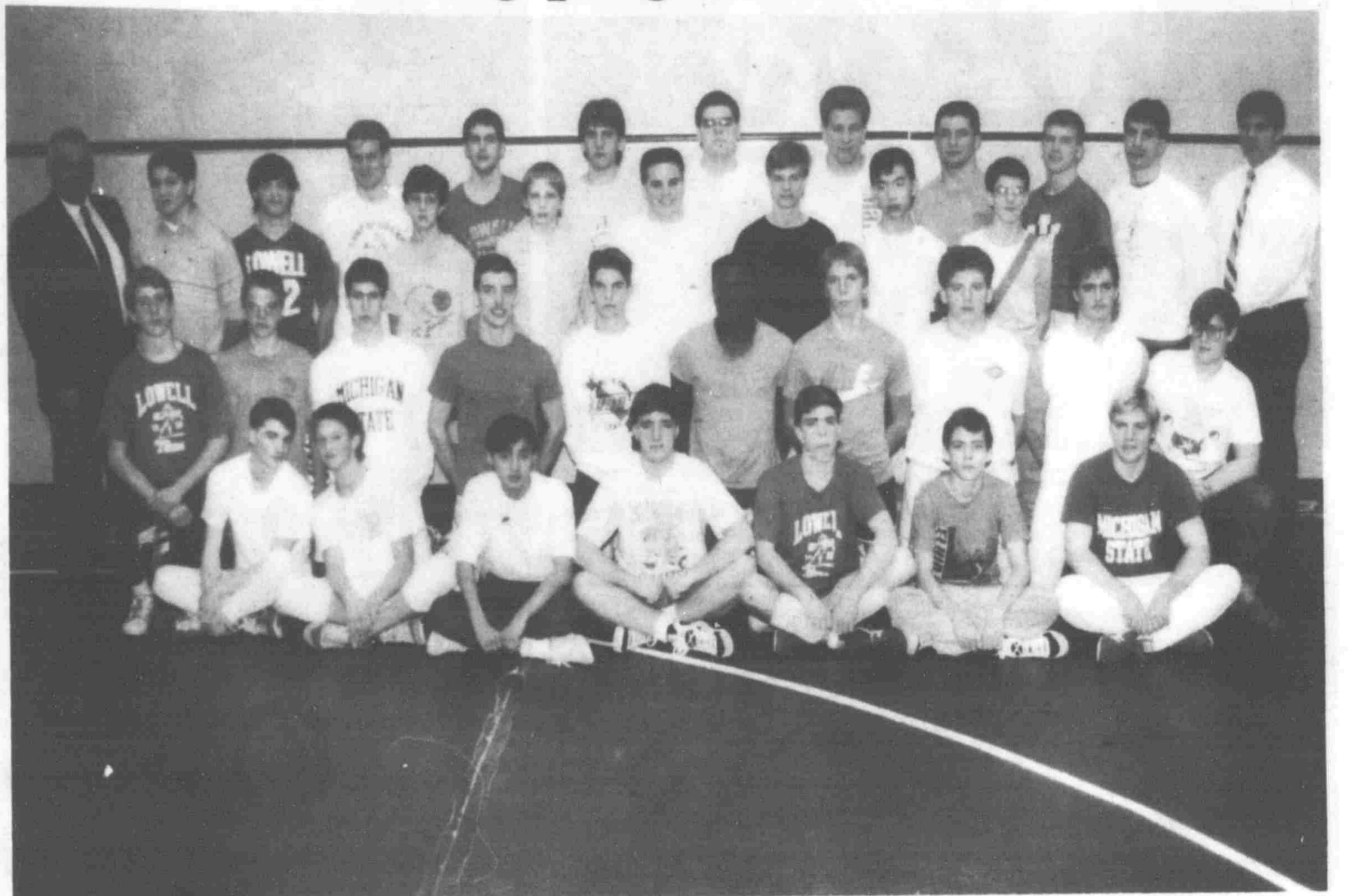

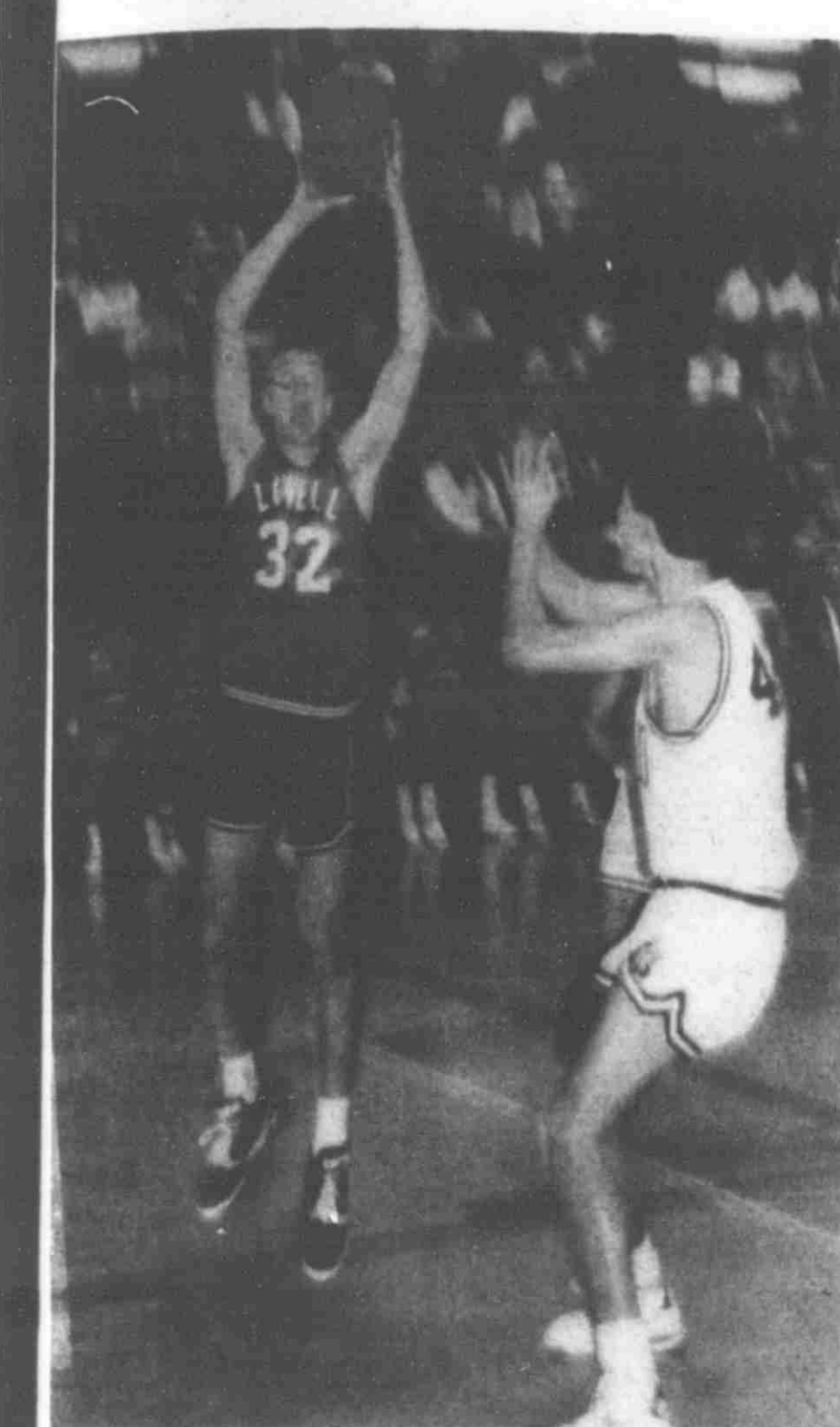

Holtz tallies 40 in home openers, but Arrows drop to 0-2

The 1989-90 Lowell High School Basketball season brought bigger bodies with it - so, now the Red Arrows could hold their own on the boards, and have an inside game to go with the perimeter game that returned from a year ago. The Vikings from Lakewood drilled that theory full of holes in the first quarter with a splendid shooting display. They then fell back on a well executed man-to-man offense that found holes in the Lowell defense for easy buckets inside five feet, leading to a 75-63 win over the Red Arrows. "Lakewood was surprisingly patient on offense for its first game," said Lowell's second year coach Mark Thomas. "The Vikings hurt us on the boards. Our big guys were not as mobile as we would have liked." Lowell was outbounded 31-20. "We did a good job on the boards," Lakewood Coach Mark Macias said. "It doesn't take any great talent to rebound. It takes determination, desire and the ability to block out." Some good, early shooting by Ryan Holtz netted six of his game-high 20 points in a second quarter that saw Lowell outscore Lakewood 14-11, cutting the lead to six at halftime, 35-29. Red Arrow junior sharp-shooter John Borg netted 12 of his 16 points in the second half (four three point shots) as Lowell crept to within three points a couple of times. Trailing by as many as nine

Red Arrow grapplers place third at the BC-Lakeview Invitational

Lowell's varsity wrestling team rolled out the mats to the 1989-90 season Saturday at the Battle Creek - Lakeview invitational. The Red Arrows placed third among the eight schools that participated. Lowell matted three seniors, four juniors, three sophomores and a freshman. Rivers' squad earned four firsts, a second, a third and two fourth-place finishes. Charlotte won the invitational with 1571-2 followed by Muskegon Mona Shores 137, LOWELL 1321-2, Battle Creek Lakeview 123, Delton 931-2, Coloma 911-2, Lansing Waverly 54 and Holland Christian 8. Earning firsts for Lowell was Scott Nagy, the senior, at 112 pounds went 2-0 and drew a bye. "It was a tough weight class but Nagy did a good job," Rivers said. Junior Nate Nauta, 125, finished at 2-0, taking a first and in doing so beat a ranked opponent to earn the championship, according to Rivers. Sophomore David Stouffer earned a first at 140. He ended the day at 3-0 and claimed a first. "Stouffer and Rich DePew did not have varsity experience but wrestled well, both earned a first at 3-0," Rivers said. "These are two weight classes I wasn't sure about, but these two sophomores have helped to answer some of my questions." Junior John Rupp was placed second at 2-1 in the 171-pound weight class. Fellow junior, Rob McGee was third at 3-1 in the 189 division. Fourth place finishes were awarded to Brad Whalen, 119, 2-2; Jon Pratt, 130, 2-2. Wrestling but not placing were freshmen Chad Chertors, 103, 0-2; Matt Mondo, 145, 0-2; Joe DePew, 160, 1-2; and Chad Hull, heavyweight, 0-2. Lowell forfeited its matches in the 135-pound weight class. Rivers assures there will be a body there in time for the dual meets. "I think we will probably have to bump a few people up, but we will fill the weight," he says.

Junior Varsity basketball team drops two at home

Lowell's junior varsity basketball team committed 39 turnovers in its season opening loss to Lakewood, 64-48. The Red Arrows were outbounded 37-32. Jason Dykehouse led Lowell in scoring with 10 points. He was followed by Adam catlin and Brett Knopp with seven and six points respectively. Lakewood got a game-high 16 points from John Haight and Brent Barker added 14 for the Vikings. Dykehouse led the Arrows in rebounding with nine caroms and he tallied 14 points. Chad Lyons also cleared the glass with eight rebounds. Lowell trailed by 18 points at halftime, 44-26.

The Red Arrows outscored Rogers 21-10 in the third quarter cutting their deficit to six, but couldn't hang on to the momentum as they lost to the Golden Hawks. The loss dropped the Phil Beachler coached team to 0-2 on the year. Jason Hutzliff led Lowell in scoring with 16 points. Jason

Sabrina Matzen shares a special Thanksgiving with a friend

Sabrina Matzen, of Lowell shared her Thanksgiving with her best friend, Tracy Braudhurst of Grand Rapids. Both children had something very special to be thankful for this past Thanksgiving - their freedom.

Both children were born in El Salvador - a country where over 60,000 people have died for their freedom over the past 10 years. Sabrina, who is now four, came into this country during Christmas of 1985. Her mother, Mary Ann, flew down to that country on Christmas Day and said she would never forget the joy she felt when she had seen her daughter.

There were a lot of obstacles to overcome because that country was going through so many changes and at one point, just three days before Sabrina was to fly to the U.S., Mary Ann was told that she would never get her little girl because San Salvador was investigating all adoptions. It wasn't until three months later, a day before Christmas, she was told to come and get her in New Orleans. Trying to find a flight down there was a challenge in itself.

Finally U.S. Air had one seat left and it was on a special. Matzen flew down to New Orleans only to find that her daughter did not come in on Taca Airlines. "I never felt so lonely in my whole life. I remember standing in the middle of the airport and just cry-

ing - because I couldn't get hold of anyone in Michigan - the lines were all busy being Christmas Day. I was supposed to be back on U.S. Air the next day," stated Matzen. "Finally after some security men started talking to me and, telling them my problem, they directed me to another ticket clerk who spoke Spanish. We called the people in El Salvador who took care of Sabrina - and found out they just decided not to come."

Matzen added, "Well, I'm a go-getter and knowing that I had my passport with me, I decided to go and get my daughter. I booked a flight to El Salvador the next morning. I finally got ahold of my parents and they tried to convince me not to go with all the fighting down there. But I was determined. I flew down and the first time I saw Sabrina she was in the arms of her foster mother. She was so beautiful and all I could do was cry. The trip to San Salvador was about 40 minutes from the airport and we got stopped every so often by soldiers with guns. They pointed the guns at us like they were looking for something. Well, I stuck out like a sore thumb. Yes, I was scared, but I wanted by daughter. I stayed overnight in a hotel room and got back on the plane the next morning. U.S. Air made an exception and rearranged my flight back through Houston a day later and wished me a "very

Merry Christmas," she continues.

"Just as she thought her troubles were over, Matzen noticed that Sabrina had a sore on her forehead - she thought maybe it was scabies or something - a few hours later she landed in Houston and went through customs. A few hours after that they landed in Detroit and were greeted by Matzen's parents. Sabrina was breaking out even more and Matzen later found out she had chicken pox. "My case worker told me how lucky I was to get by customs - otherwise, they would have quarantined her," Matzen said. "A few months ago, I took Sabrina to her first court meeting for her Naturalization and they reviewed her legal papers. The next step is just waiting for a call to have her ceremony in a few months," Matzen explains.

Matzen said that children from a foreign country can usually apply for citizenship right after their adoption becomes finalized. "My mother became sick with cancer just after the finalization and I went to Jackson to take care of her for several months. Finally I applied a few years ago," Matzen says. "It does take awhile for the paperwork to come through. I am so thankful for both of my children. I also have a boy, Jason, who is 15 now and going to Catholic Central.

Even though there is eleven

years difference, her children are close. They even fight like cats and dogs at times. "I think it's in Sabrina's bloodline (ha-ha). It has been wonderful having her

around. The only challenge that I have is like most working mothers, babysitters. You have some good ones out there and you have some bad ones. You have to be careful. I have had a wonderful babysitter for the last few years," Matzen concludes.

Small grant project proposal deadline December 15

Director David Hales of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced that December 15 is the deadline for 1990 small grant proposals for projects benefiting Michigan's nongame wildlife.

"These grants are an excellent opportunity for Michigan residents to become directly involved with nongame wildlife management," Hales said.

Grants up to \$4,000 will be awarded under Michigan's Nongame Wildlife Fund, which is composed of voluntary contributions designated as a check-off on the state income tax form. The fund has sponsored the small grants program since 1985.

All proposals will be con-

sidered, but specific projects that will most benefit nonhunted wildlife and endangered species are sought.

Suggested projects include development of management guidelines for reptiles and amphibians, guidelines for interior forest bird species management and the use of native plants in landscaping. Population surveys are sought for black terns, king rails and spotted turtles in the Lower Peninsula.

Proposals are also needed to improve the understanding and enjoyment of nongame wildlife and endangered species. These could include, for example, brochures on Michigan bats, gardening for hummingbirds and

butterflies or pamphlets on watchable wildlife opportunities in southeastern Michigan.

The Nongame Wildlife Fund has produced popular posters on landscaping for wildlife, backyard bird feeding, wetlands, and coastal dunes. Proposals are sought to develop teaching guidelines and classroom activities using the themes of these posters.

speaker overall. Sharing the Varsity trophy with Jefferson are Jay VanAntwerp, Katie Wills and Lucien Stoepler.

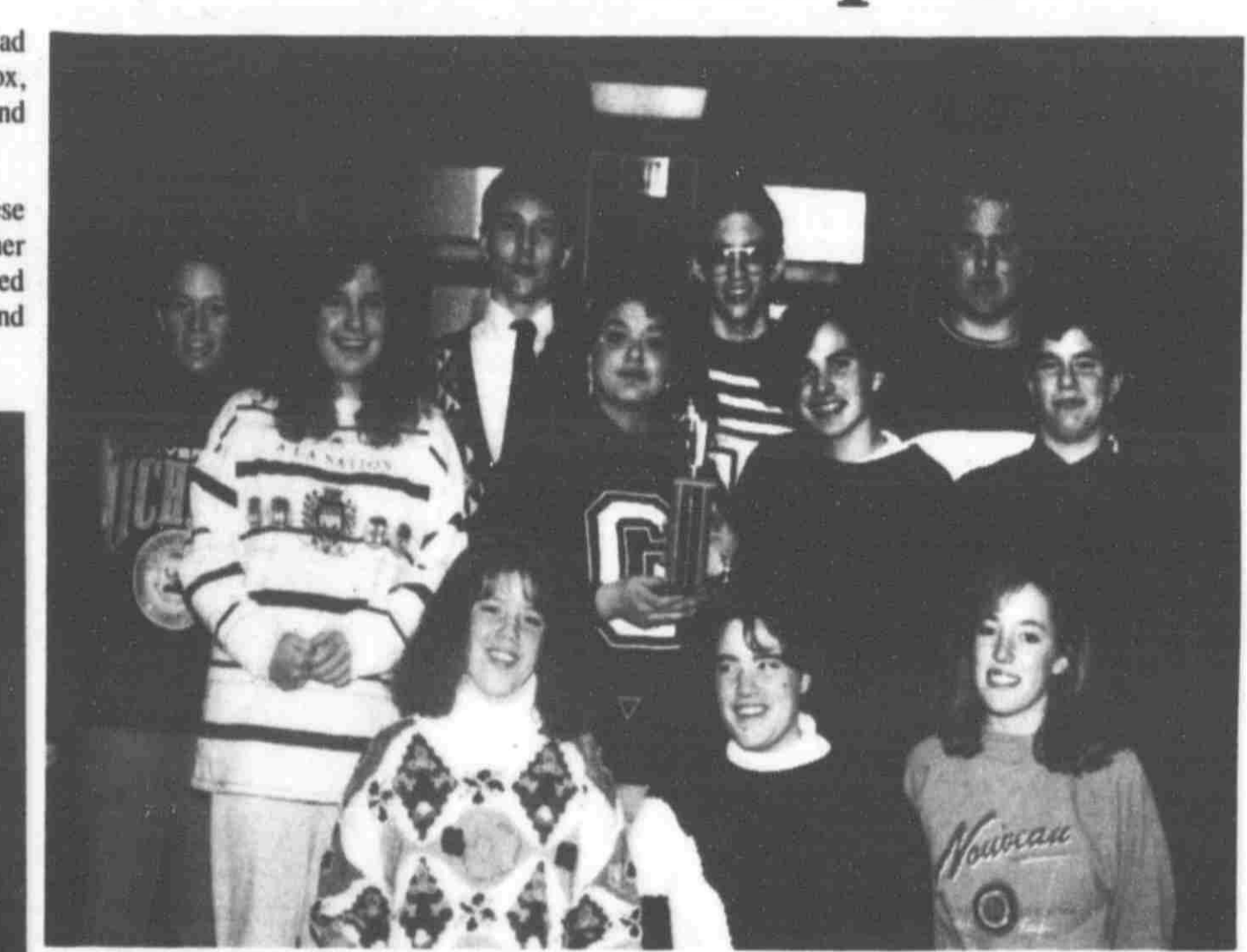

The apple storage building at Klahn's 60-plus acre Orchard Hill Farms was lost to an electrical fire on Friday, Dec. 8.

The fire started in an electrical box on an inside wall according to Alto Fire Chief Jerry Posthumus.

"The fire destroyed most everything," said Orchard owner Clarence Klahn. "We won't be able to use the building any more because there is too much smoke damage. We'll have to rebuild."

Alto's Fire Department was dispatched to the scene of the fire at 8:58 a.m. Upon arriving,

Posthumus called for help from the Lowell and Cascade Fire Departments. No injuries were incurred. Firefighters cleared at 11:45.

Klahn's Orchard was started in 1905 by Klahn's father. Clarence helped his dad out of high school in 1930. Following his father's death in 1937 he began to run the orchard. Since 1935 Clarence Klahn has set out 40 acres. In the last couple of years his daughter, Pam has set out 20 acres and according to Klahn she does most of the spraying.

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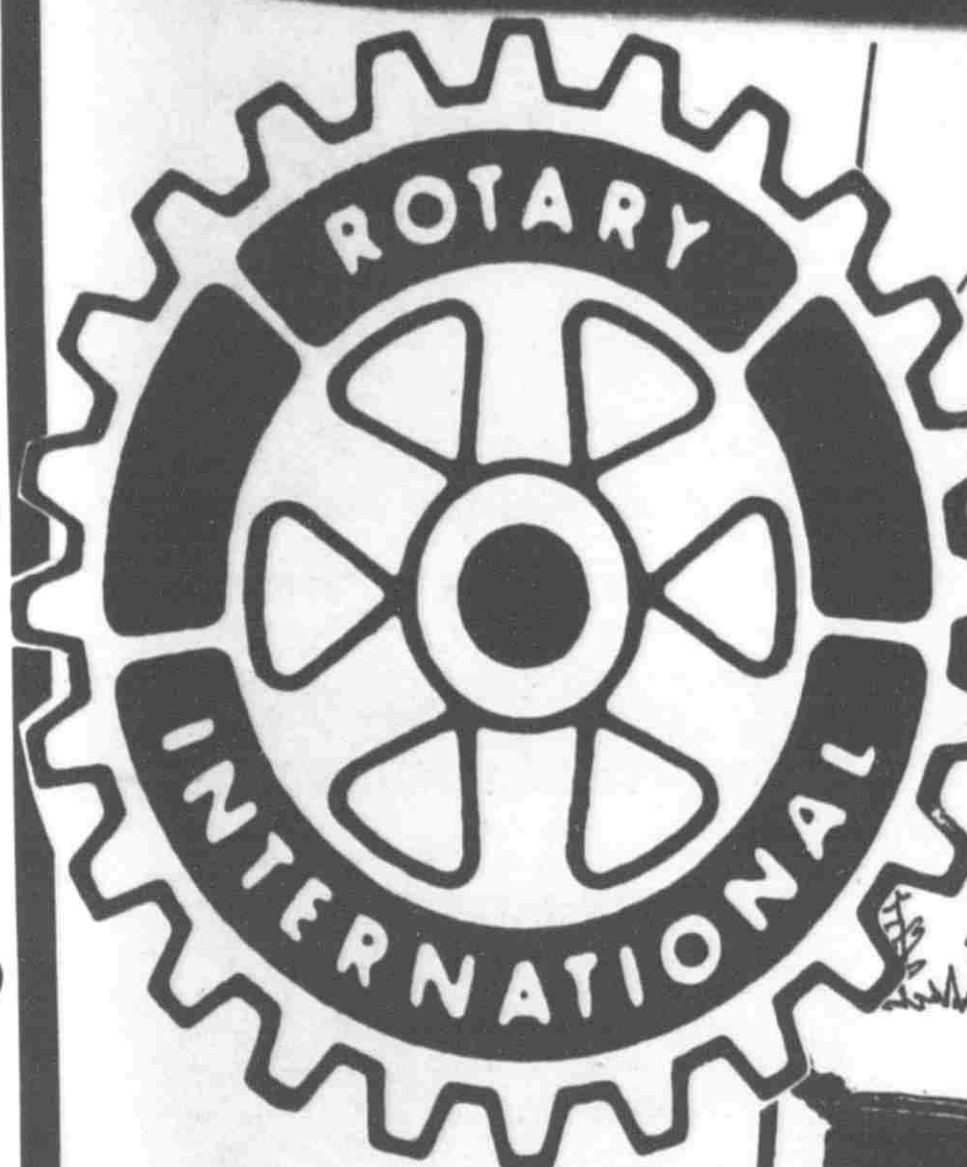

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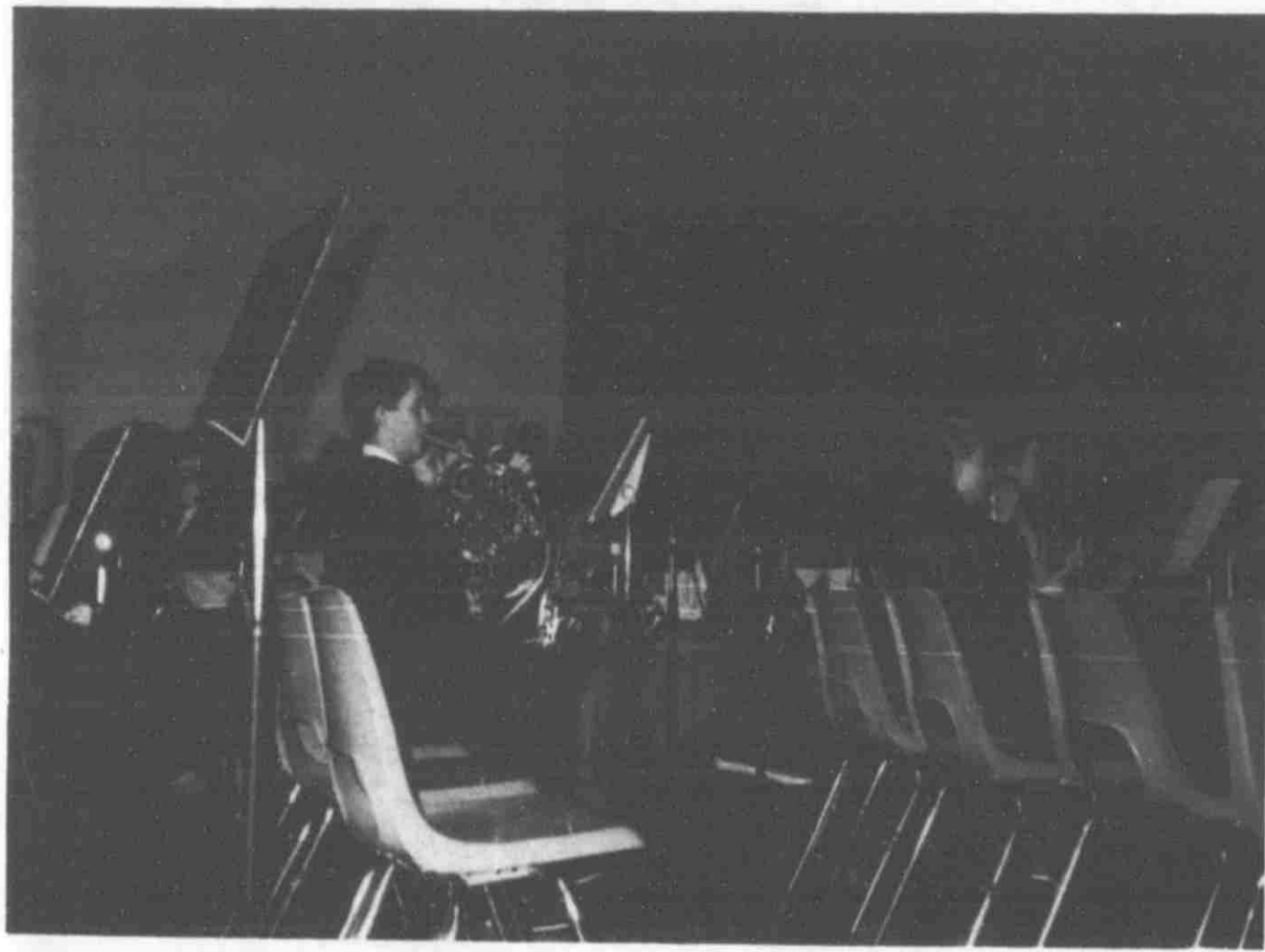

More than 10,000 inland lakes and 23 festivals will lure adventurous anglers outdoors this winter, AAA Michigan reports. But winter enthusiasts should be aware that Michigan records an average of seven ice-related deaths annually, so precautions are advised when fishing, skating or walking on ice. Remember:

- Ice is strongest when it's hard and blue.
 - Be extra cautious near gray, dark or porous spots.
 - Ice deteriorates first around stream mouths, lake inlets and outlets, shorelines and docks.
 - Continually test ice with a steel spud or heavy bar.
 - Rescue gear—including a ladder and at least 50 feet of rope or hose—should be handy.
- If you do fall through ice, turn on your back, kick and work your way out. Roll away in the direction that you walked in on until you can safely stand. Move quickly to shelter and warmth.
- To get in a wintry mood, travelers may visit any of the 23 events listed on AAA Michigan's Ice Fishing Festival Guide. Fishing contests, parades, fireworks, snowmobile races, ice sculptures and "polar bear" plunges are among the highlights.
- Winter fishing novices need a spud for testing ice thickness and making holes; a sled to haul equipment; skimmer to keep the hole clear; a pail; hook and line. A portable shelter and heater also are considered necessary by many experienced anglers.

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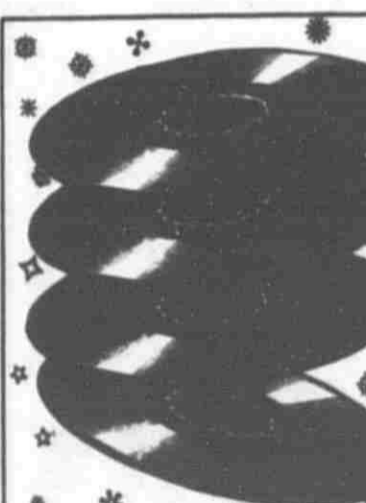

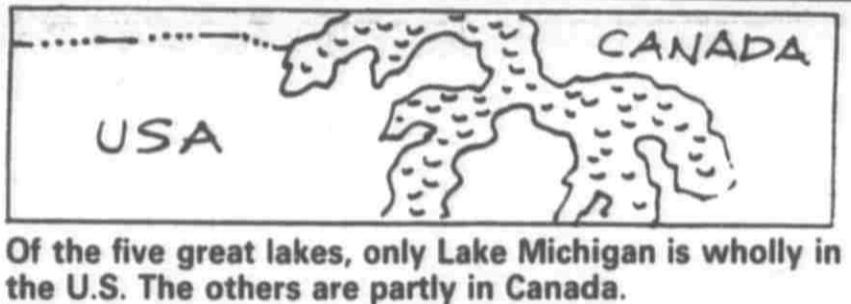
