

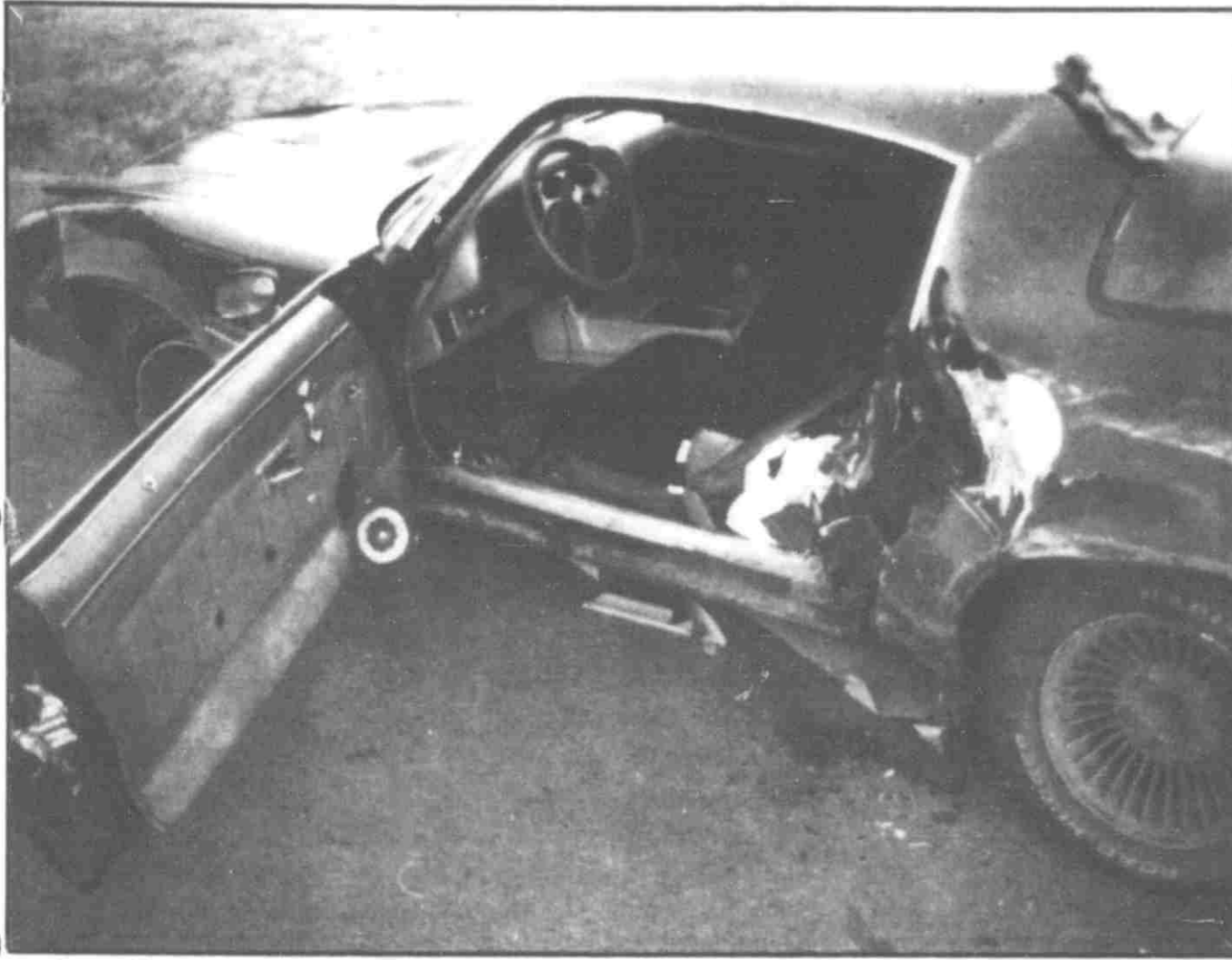

Electric goes down with pole in M-21/Alden Nash accident



An epileptic seizure suffered by Daniel Barrett was the cause of his vehicle leaving the road.

The electrical pole was broken in three different places.

Roughly 200 homes and businesses were without electricity for 1½ hours (5-7:30 p.m.) on Thursday (Feb. 8) following a one-car accident at the corner of M-21 and Alden Nash.

The Kent County Sheriff Department's report stated that Daniel Joseph Barrett, 19, of Lowell, was eastbound on M-21 when he suffered an epileptic seizure, causing his vehicle to cross the road and enter a small dip in the boulevard. Upon leaving the low area, the car became airborne, striking the Harold

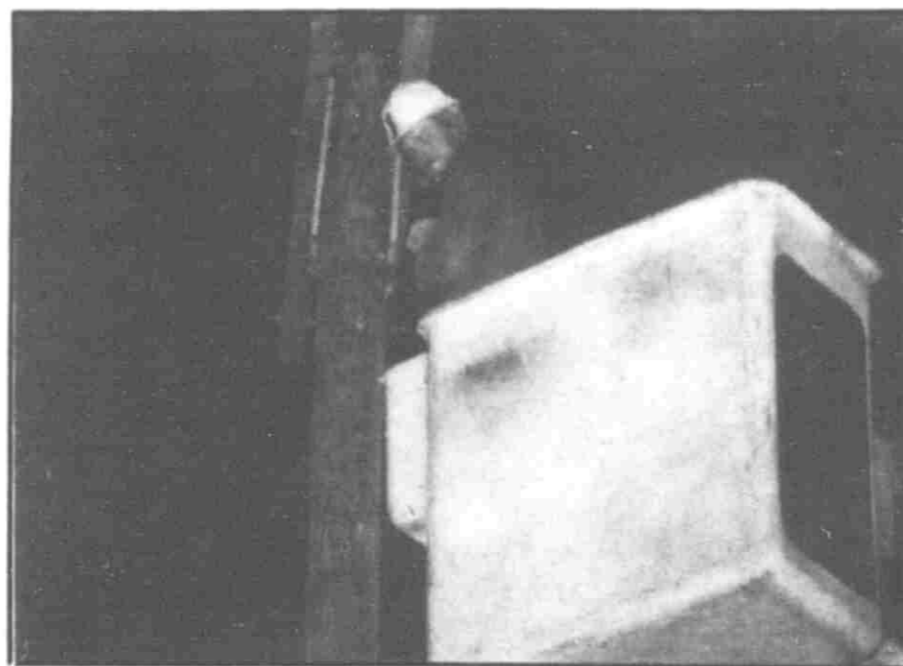
Zeigler Ford sign and the power pole about 10-feet above ground before the vehicle came to a rest on Alden Nash.

According to Kent County Deputy Greg Parolini a witness reported that the vehicle accelerated as it left the roadway.

Barrett incurred B-injuries (visible injuries) and was transported to Blodgett Hospital by Lowell Ambulance.

Barrett's collision caused the electrical pole to break in three different places. A Low-

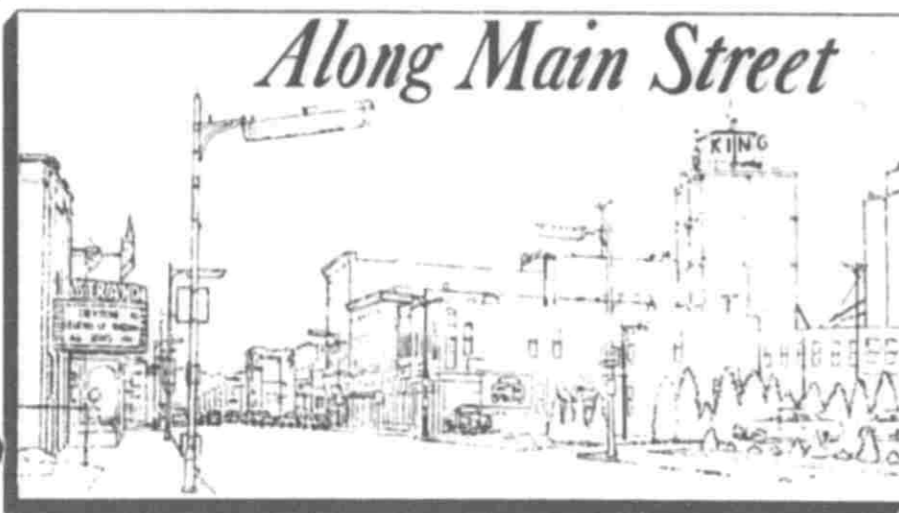

YMCA & City sign one year agreement

The current 30-year lease expires in June

With the heated summer of 1989 behind them, the City of Lowell and the YMCA came together on a one-year agreement on the usage of the parks, and the management and leasing of King Memorial Pool.

The current lease on the pool expires in June. The City and the YMCA held meetings prior to the agreement so that discussions could make for a smoother transition.

The two sides agreed that the lease on the pool would run from year-to-year due to the pool's age and not knowing its future condition. City Manager Dave Pasquale added that the development of Stoney/Lakeside Park's beach area for public swimming was also a contributing reason for the year-to-year lease.

"I don't believe the beach

will be a detriment to the pool this year. The YMCA is not obligated to operate the pool and then have the city go into direct competition with it," former YMCA Director Jim Hodges said. "Although at some point I think it is possible the beach will replace the pool."

Routine maintenance and repair of the swimming pool will be handled by the YMCA. The new agreement states that the YMCA will not be responsible for major repairs. If such repairs are determined by the YMCA to be necessary, the YMCA will notify the City in writing. Thereafter, the YMCA and the City shall meet to determine the extent of such repairs, the cost, how such cost should be shared and whether the repairs should be made or if the pool should be closed.

Who decides what the definition of major is? "It will have to be a mutual agreement on both sides," Pasquale said. "We want the pool to be monitored so we know

ahead of time if something is going bad."

Hodges adds, "The agreement is written more clearly and is easier to understand so I don't think this will be a problem."

The YMCA's rent for the leased property will be \$1 a year. The City of Lowell will contribute \$6,000 to the YMCA yearly. The monies will be used by the YMCA for the operation and maintenance of the leased property.

"The City has also agreed to share on an equal basis all actual costs of the operation

and maintenance of the leased property in excess of the City contribution and the fees collected by the YMCA for activities at the pool," Pasquale said.

The YMCA also agreed to provide the City with an estimate of income and expenses at the commencement of this agreement. It will also provide a quarterly report of actual income and expenses at the end of each calendar quarter.

Plaska earns utility lineman certificate

Mike Plaska, an electric utility lineman employed by Lowell Light & Power, recently received his graduation certificate as a utility lineman. Plaska completed the 42-month, 7,200 hour

training program conducted by Wolverine Power Supply Cooperative's Joint Apprenticeship and Training Committee.

This apprenticeship training program, which is fully

accredited by the U.S. Department of Labor and jointly sponsored by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local 876, utilizes a combination of classroom and fieldwork instruction by Wolverine and supervised on-the-job training by Lowell Light and Power. Presently 22 utility companies are participating in the program.

"Mike was an outstanding student of the utility lineman trade," said Arthur Bingham, Wolverine's Director, Job Training and Safety and the course instructor. "His skills and abilities will be a definite asset to the City of Lowell, and ultimately to the consum-

ers served by Lowell," Bingham said. Plaska's classroom scores averaged 92 percent during his tenure in the program. The graduation certificate which Plaska received for successful completion of the program is recognized throughout the country as a sign of proficiency in the electric utility lineman trade.

Plaska, who has been with Lowell Light & Power for 7-1/2 years, attained the 7,200 hours of training with Lowell Light and Power in 3-1/2 years.

"Mike is a dedicated employee who has a desire to learn," Lowell Light & Power Supervisor Herb Haines said.

a pool or of the requirements," Hodges said. If at the end of a term the income exceeds the expenses, the remaining balance shall be held by the YMCA in a reserve fund for future maintenance and repairs of the leased property.

"Our goal is avoid having the operation of the pool running in a deficit," Pasquale said. Steps taken to help assure this include in the event there is a year-end deficit. The two parties will share the difference.

The City of Lowell will not place electrical or water/sewer charges against the pool. "We want to make this as good a situation as possible and contain the costs," Pasquale said.

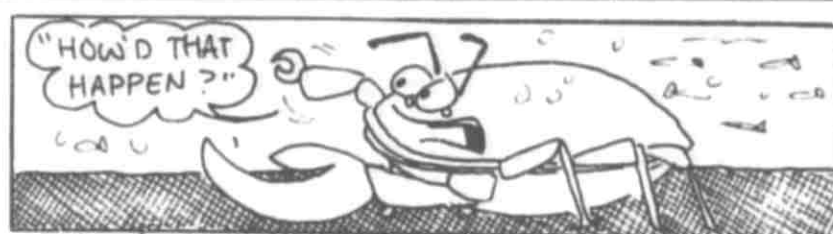

GVSU enrollment nears 10 percent

Winter semester enrollment at Grand Valley State University (GVSU) totaled 10,129 students, an increase of 9.5 percent over last January's figures and an all-time high for winter semester enrollment.

Credit hours taken during the current semester at GVSU total 107,342, a 10.5 percent increase over the 1989 winter semester.

"The continued increase in enrollment is attributable in part to the availability of classes in Holland and Muskegon, and in other West Michigan communities via satellite," said Matthew E. McLogan, vice president for University Relations for GVSU. "The Grand Rapids campus at the L.V. Eberhard Center also has contributed to our expanded student enrollment."

Enrollment at Grand Valley reached a record high of 10,914 for the Fall 1989 semester, including a 31-percent increase in minority enrollment from Fall 1988.

"Grand Valley is growing with West Michigan, as our enrollment figures attest," McLogan said. "Demand for the availability of higher education in West Michigan continues to exceed state and national demand for such services, and Grand Valley continues to work toward meeting the education needs of the region and the state."

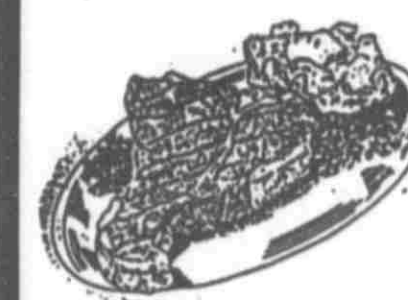
GVSU offers 75 undergraduate and graduate degree programs at the main campus in Allendale and at the Grand Rapids campus.

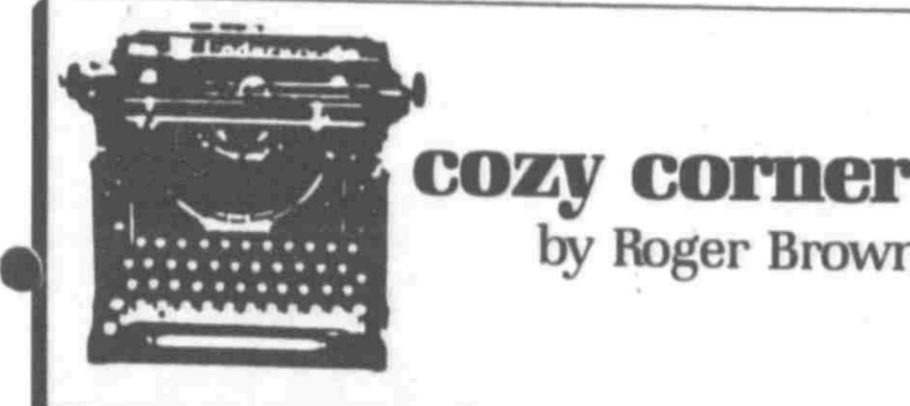

Lowell Manufacturing is turning out lots of sprayers in its best year since 1929.

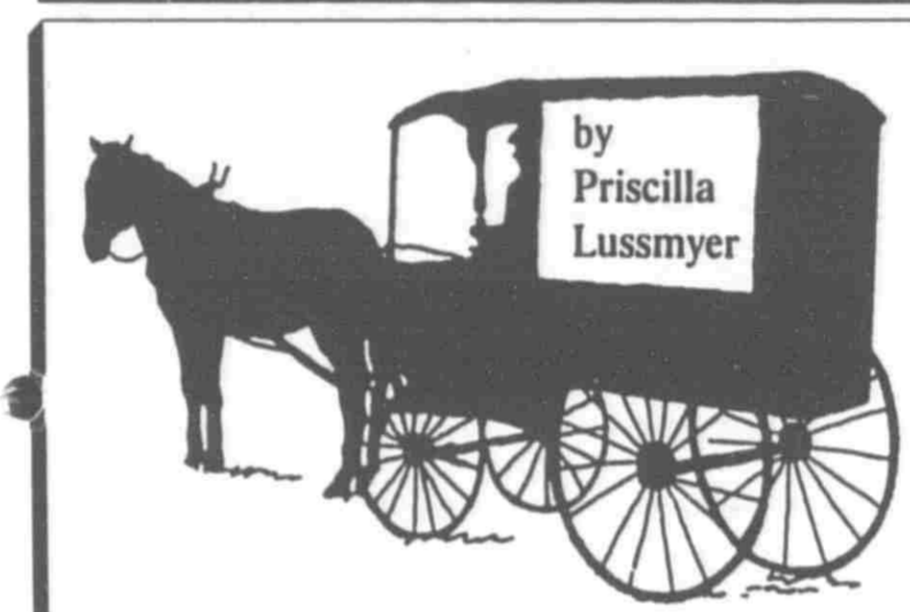

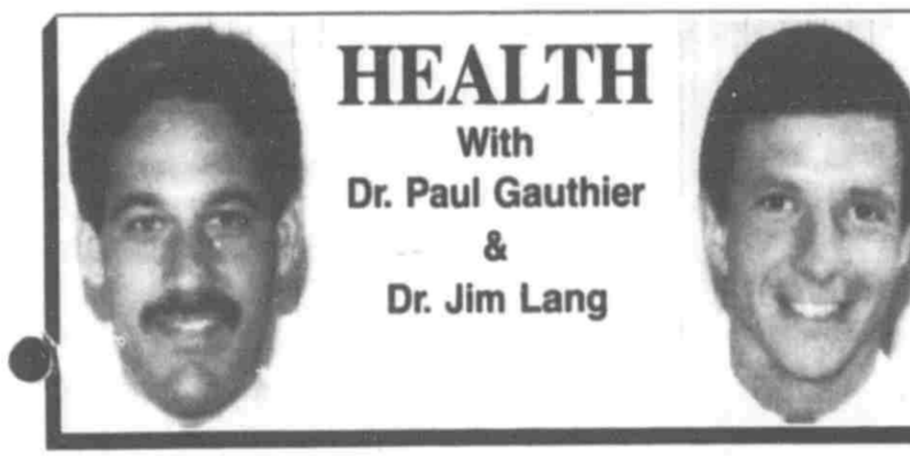

Anemia, often termed "low blood" is a disorder of the red blood cell due to a variety of causes. Mild anemia is usually asymptomatic and is often found by accident while performing routine lab tests. As anemia worsens, symptoms such as tiredness, fatigue or paleness may occur. Many patients with anemia will complain of being run down. In severe cases of anemia, shortness of breath, dizziness, palpitations and headaches may occur.

Anemia is actually a decrease in the number of red blood cells in our circulatory systems. Red blood cells function by transporting oxygen and carbon dioxide between our lungs and tissues. It's easy to see how a shortage of red blood cells can lead to the above symptoms.

The most common cause of anemia is that due to iron deficiency. Iron deficiency occurs if we do not include enough iron rich food in our diets. Women are very susceptible to iron deficiency anemia because of their monthly loss of blood during menses, which must be replaced. Iron is a necessary building block incorporated into the red blood cell and enough must be present in the diet to continually replace old or lost red blood cells. Vitamin B-12 and folate deficiency can also lead to anemia.

Another common form of anemia is that due to continual slow blood loss as in internal bleeding. The GI tract is always a potential source for hidden blood loss to ulcers, hemorrhoids or certain cancers.

Anemia is easily diagnosed by performing a complete blood count to check the red blood count. Once anemia is diagnosed, a cause must be searched for so that the proper treatment can be offered. Your doctor will often check your stool for hidden blood and order tests to examine the GI tract to rule out hidden blood loss. Iron deficiency anemia in healthy menstruating women can be avoided by maintaining a balanced diet and taking a daily vitamin with iron.

Scott Nagy, Brad Whalen, Nata Nauta, David Stouffer, Jeff Hoffman & Rich Depew advance to individual regionals



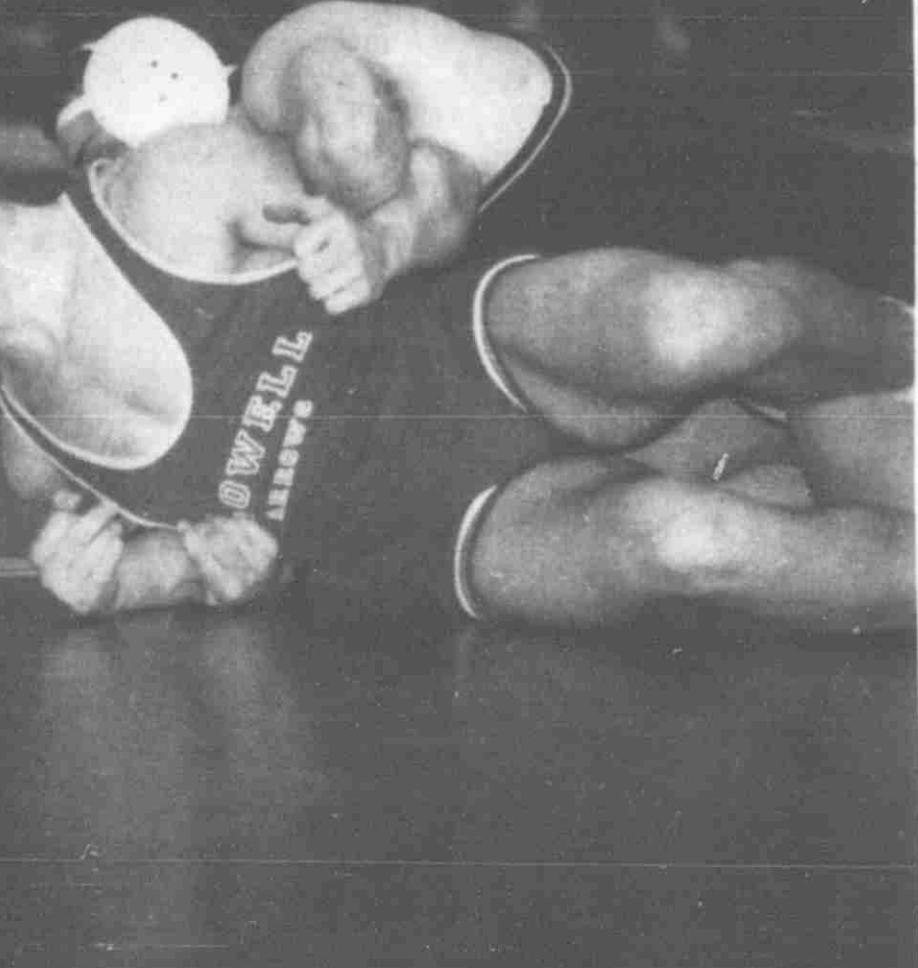
David Stouffer was one of six Lowell wrestlers to advance to the individual regionals at Otsego on Saturday.

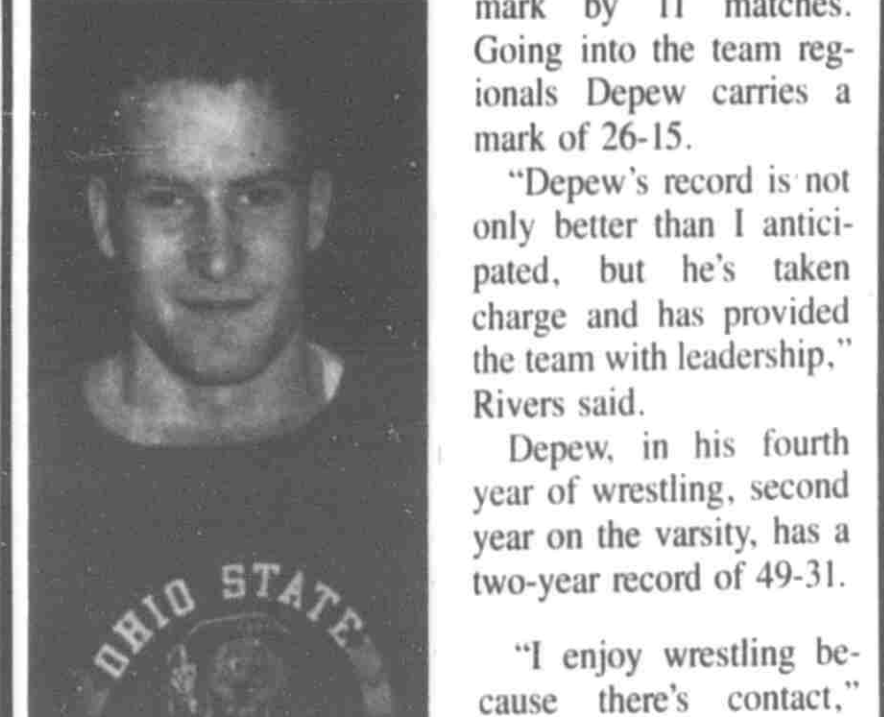

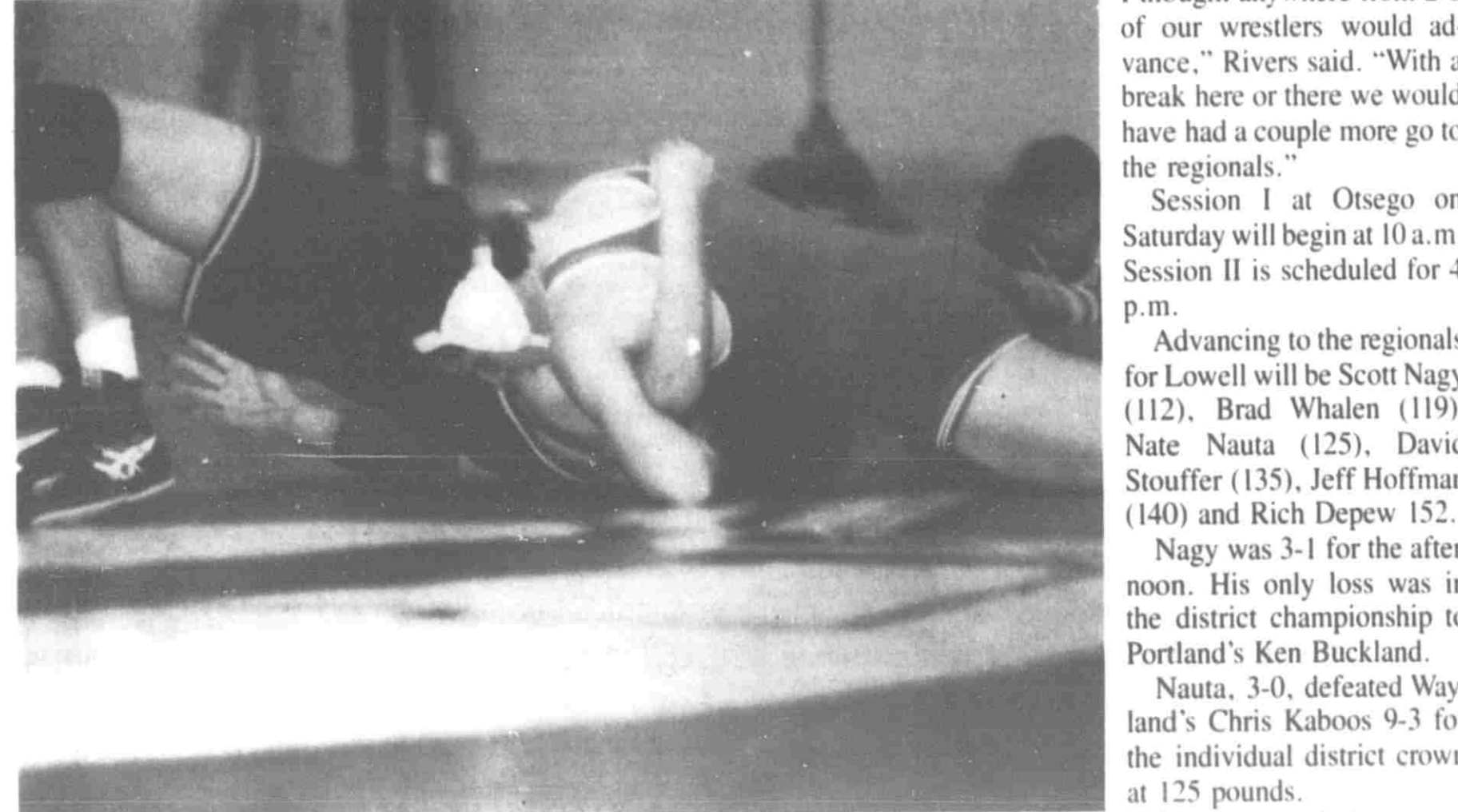


Joe Depew

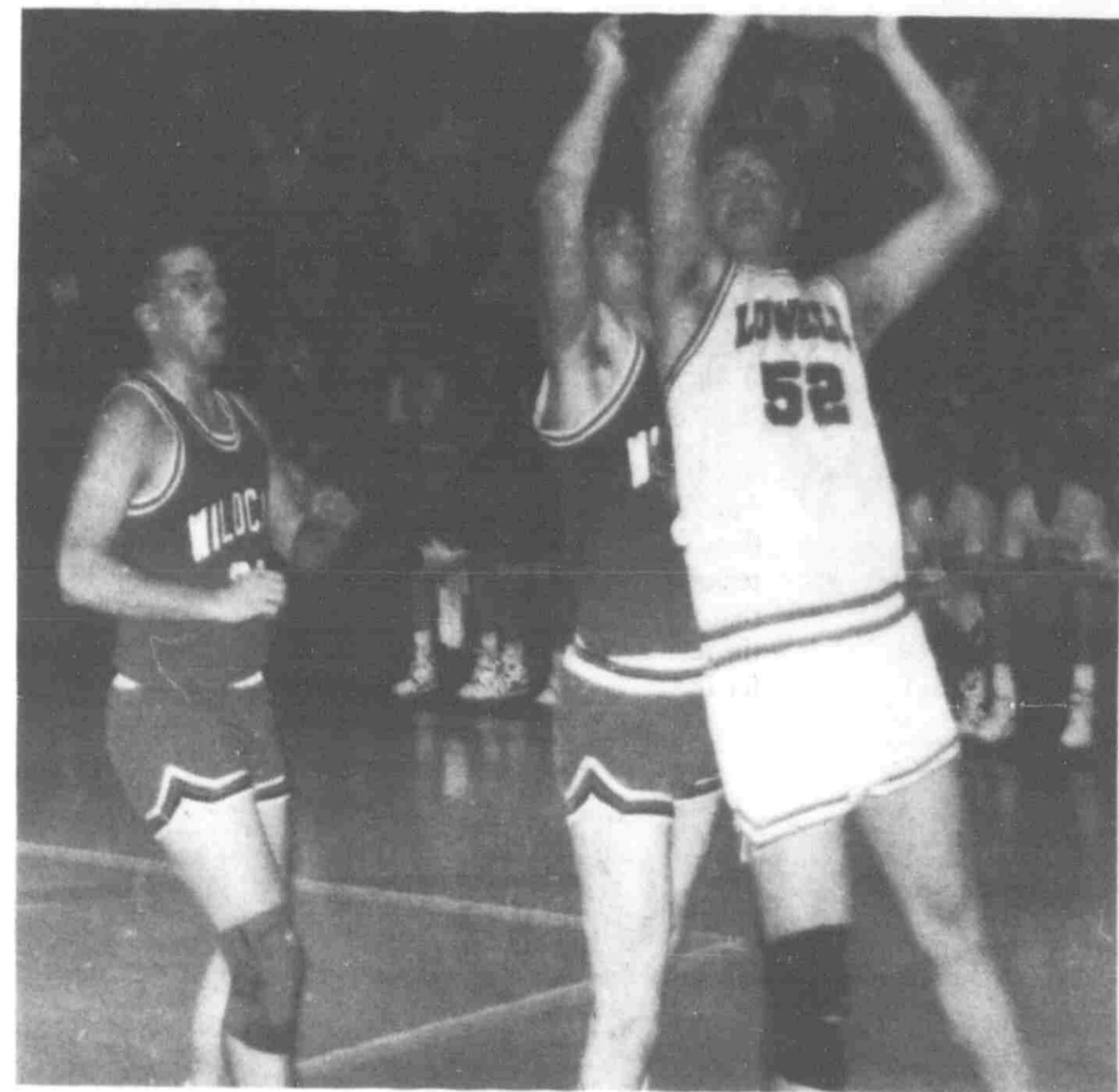
The Wildcats took little time to discern who the better basketball team was, as it outscored Lowell 20-7 in the first

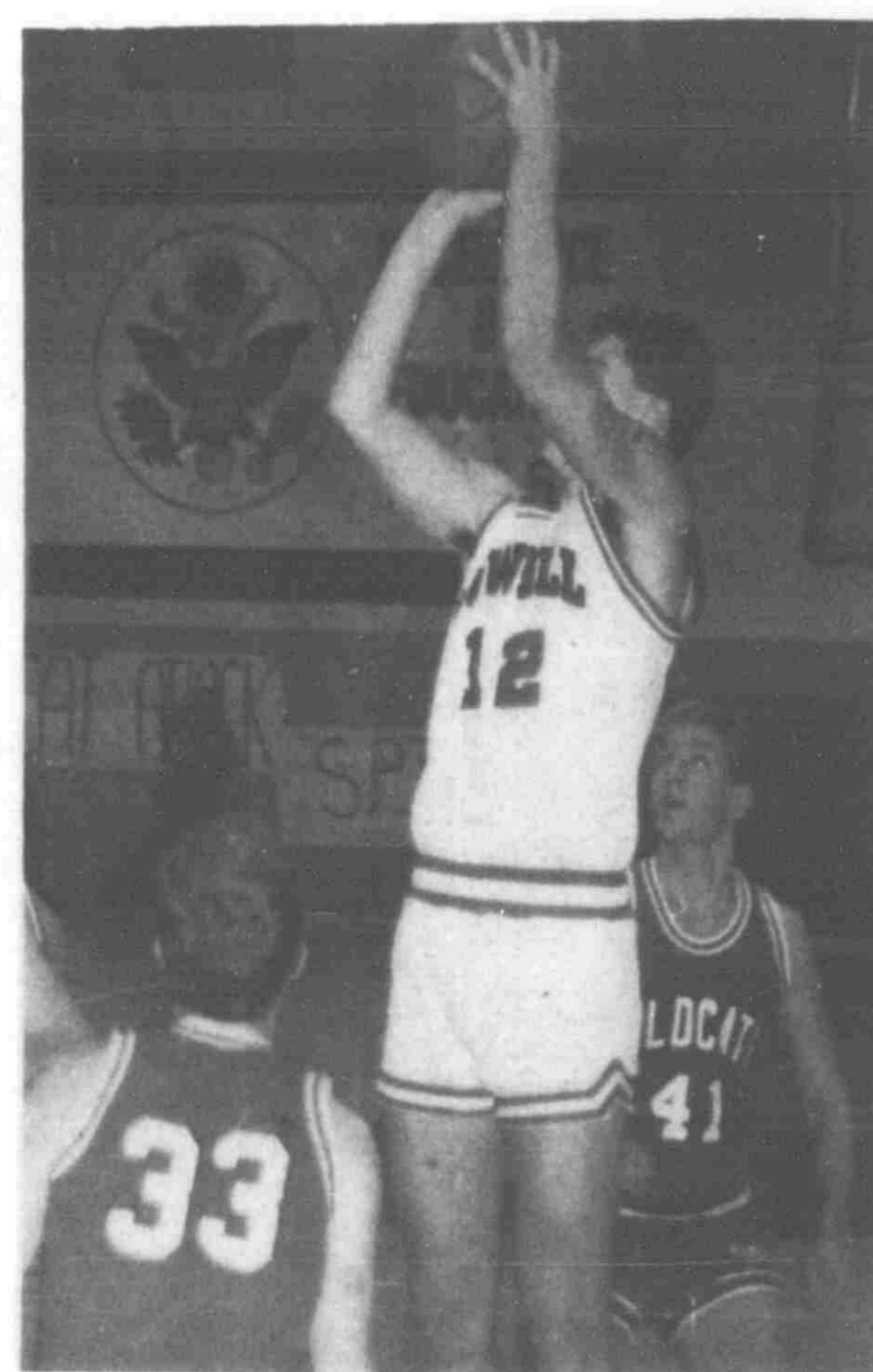

Lowell's invitational performance qualifies Arrows for regionals

Lowell's Red Arrow gymnastic team guaranteed itself a place at the 1990 high school gymnastic regionals with its fifth-place finish at the Kenowa Hills Invitational Saturday.

The Red Arrows accumulated 117.25 points, marking the fourth time this year the club has scored 115 points or more and thus qualifying them for regional play.

"We're very happy with achieving that goal and will now look to fine tune as we get ready for the conference and regional tournaments," Lowell coach Tammie Fitzpatrick said.

Holland's Teresa Blauwkamp took the all-around honors with 36.60 points. She

Lowell's Laura Kropf was seventh in the all-around and placed seventh in the floor exercise. Editor's Note: In the Feb. 7 edition of the Lowell Ledger the Lowell gymnastic's article incorrectly stated that a team must reach the 115-point total three times to qualify for the regionals. A club must reach that total four times during the regular season to qualify for the regionals.

Lowell lost to the always well coached Mona Shores' gymnastic squad in a home meet Wednesday night, 125.25 to 115.30.

The news wasn't all bad though, as the Red Arrows attained the 115-point total for

the third time this year. Lowell needs to reach that total just once more to qualify for the regionals.

"Mona Shores is always good. Its Coach, Cheryl DeWeerd, owns her own club in Muskegon, which serves a feeder for the Sailors' gymnastic program," Lowell Coach Tammie Fitzpatrick said.

Fitzpatrick was pleased with the Arrows' performance. However, she was disappointed with the low scores her girls received in the floor exercise. "I thought the judging was inconsistent," Lowell's Coach said.

Mona Shores' Aimee Goff took top honors in the floor exercise with an 8.7. Lowell's Laura Kropf was third, scoring an 8.1. Carrie Lipkea placed fourth at 7.5 and Rebecca Hovey was sixth at 7.0.

"Kropf isn't quite a 100 percent yet, but she's had injuries before and is capable of bouncing back," Fitzpatrick said. "Most gymnasts usually have an ache or a pain when performing."

Projected classroom shortage sparks bond issue

With classrooms already crowded and with an additional enrollment of 100 students anticipated in our district's schools each year, it should come as no surprise that additional classrooms will be needed to accommodate the growth.

The classroom shortage problem will be addressed in an upcoming school bond issue. The bond should come before the district no earlier than June and no later than October.

Facility development was earmarked as an immediate concern following a facilities study and enrollment report given to the Lowell Board of Education in December of 1988 by Stan Heckar and Fred Ignatovich.

The enrollment projections brought forward by the report helped determine the adequacy of existing facilities and provided insight into the demographic growth of Lowell Schools.

The report addressed the development of enrollment projections, the review of existing facilities, the evaluation of the adequacy of existing facilities and the formulation of recommendations.

Following up this report, was an on-going evaluation of pertinent data related to enrollment and its impact on district facility needs.

The findings of the on-going report stated that the school enrollment would fall somewhere between the most likely to the high projection. Other observations made in the report included that there would be a continued increase in the percent of immigration between the eighth and ninth-grade and the continued steady overall growth of the entire district. The school exceeded Stanfred's most likely projections of last year by 25 students.

The maximum classroom capacity is 1,525 without cutting current programs at the elementary school level K-5. The 1989-90 level is at 1,516. The projected total for 1990-91 by the Stanfred Consultants' report is 1,557, with that total increasing on a yearly basis through 1994-95, when the enrollment is projected to reach 1,668.

Based on these numbers, an additional nine elementary rooms will be needed during this five-year span. Four of those additional rooms will be needed in 1990-91.

Where will this space be found? "The first option being looked into will be the local churches," Lowell Community Education and Consortium Director, Dick Korb said. "However, no decision has been made."

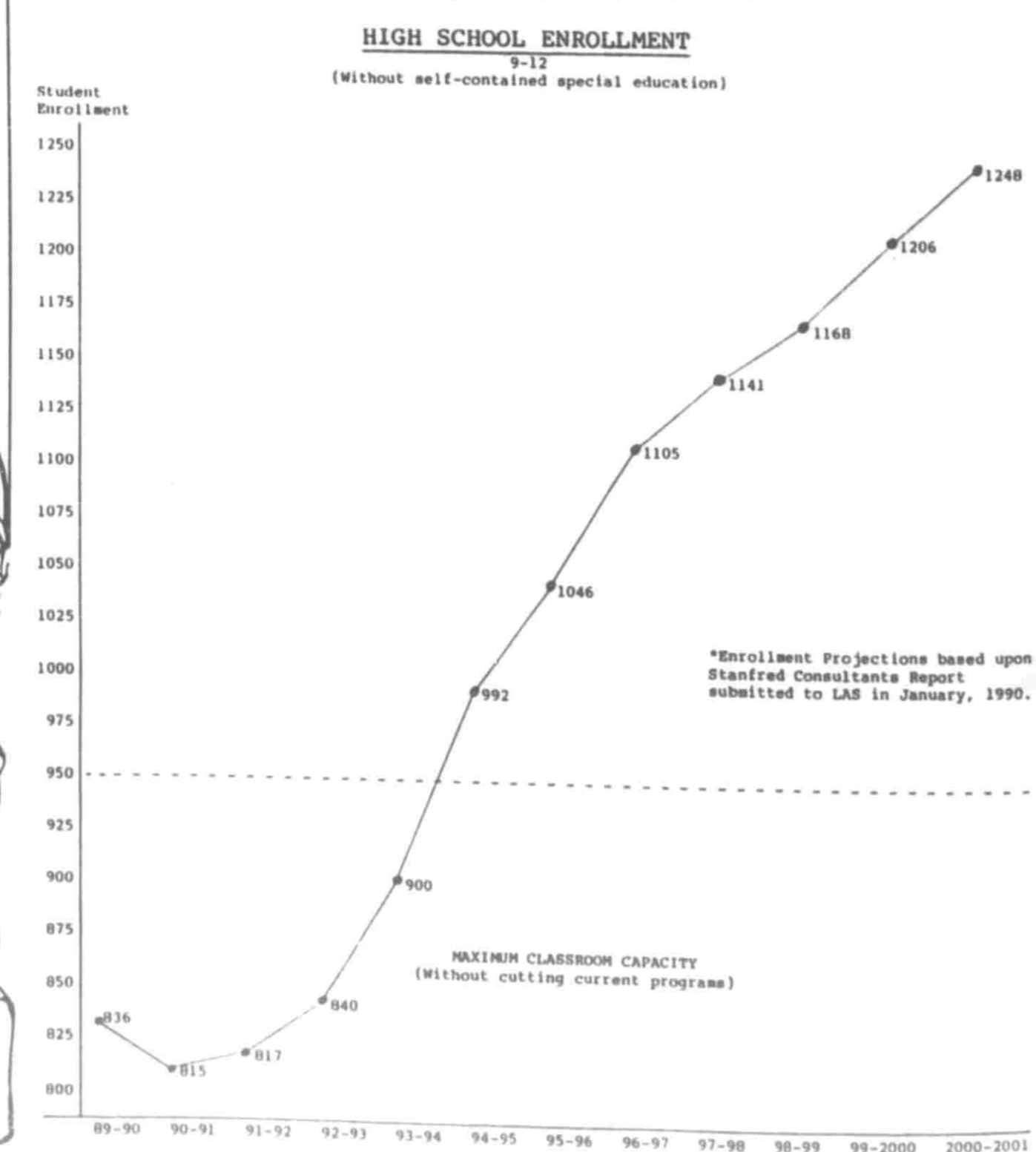
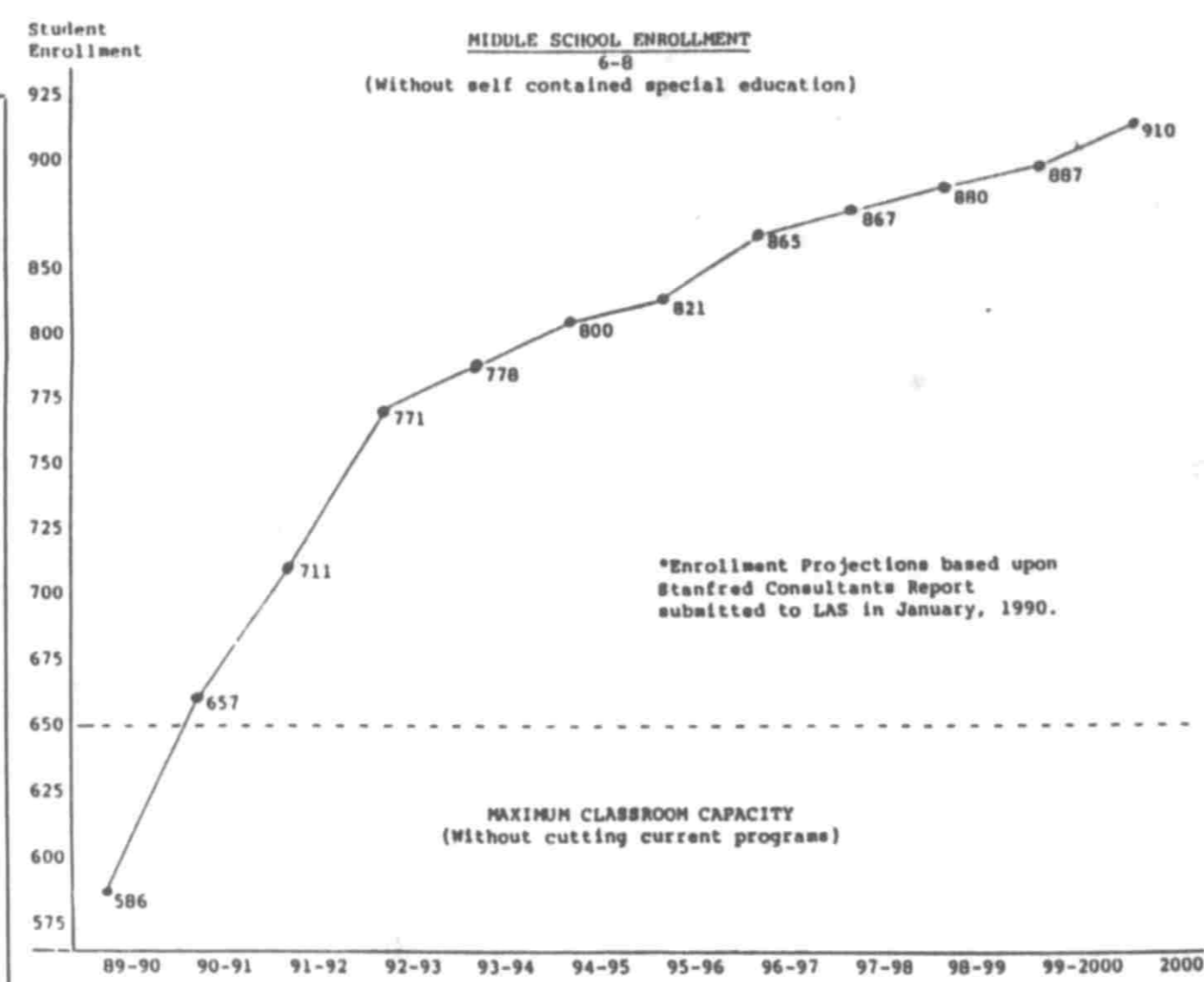
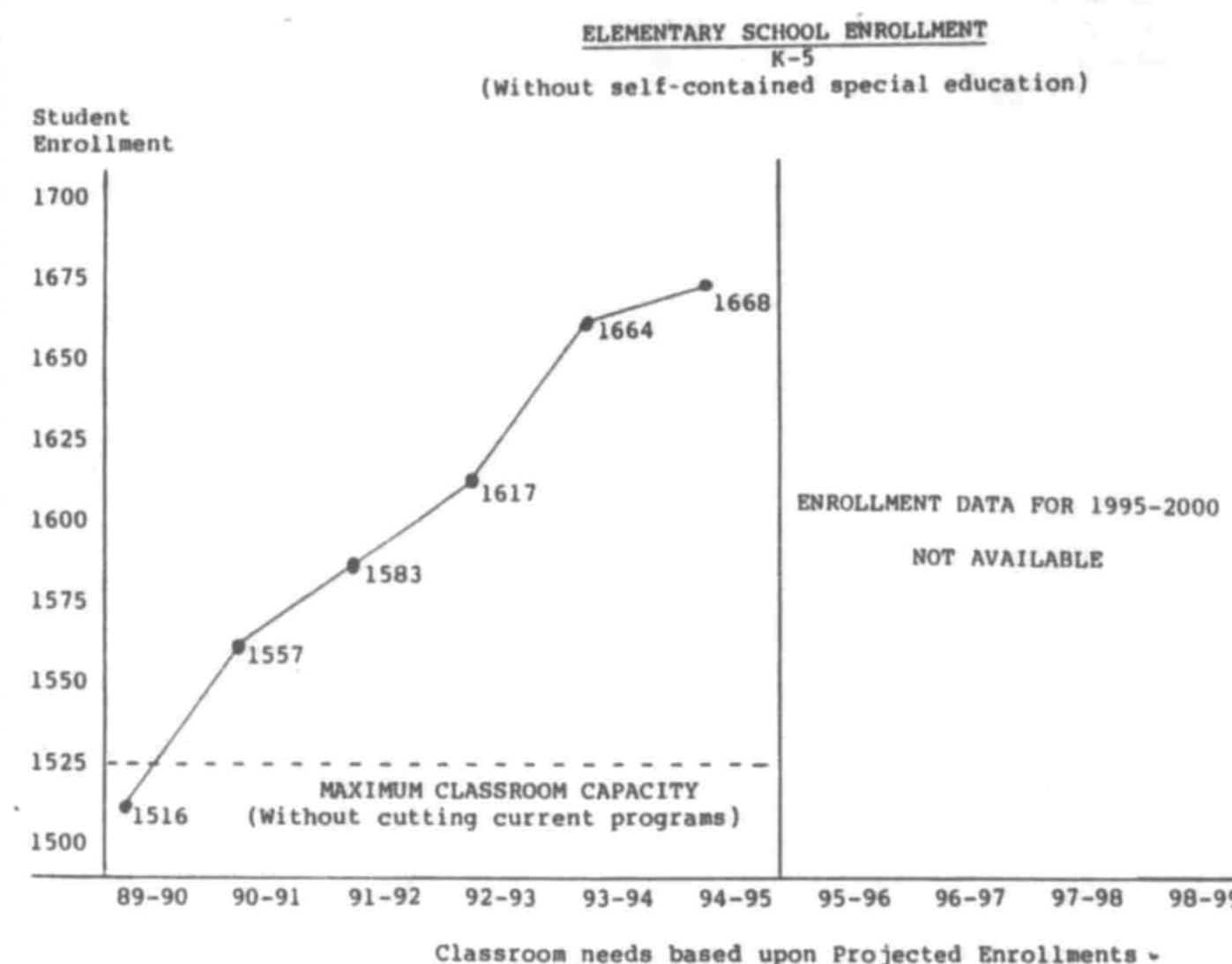
Churches are considered a logical place to look since many have religious and catechism classrooms. Korb said the rooms meet the 900-1,200 square foot requirements. The maximum number of students allowed in kindergarten through second grade classrooms are 24; 26 students are the maximum allowed for grades three through five; 28 is the maximum for grades six through eight; and 30 is the maximum number of students allowed in a nine through 12th-grade classroom.

The current enrollment at the Lowell Middle School is 586. Its maximum classroom capacity without cutting current programs is 650. The enrollment at the Middle School is projected to jump to 657 in 1990-91. Lowell expects to be able to absorb that increase. However, there is a

concern about the projected increase to 711 students for the 1991-92 school year. The increase will continue through 1994-95 when enrollment at the Middle School is expected to reach 800. The school currently has two rooms at the Middle School that are not being used to their peak potential, which will help absorb the 1990-91 increase.

Lowell High School's enrollment stands at 836 for the 1989-90 school year. The enrollment crunch is not projected to affect the high school until 1994-95 when the enrollment is expected to reach 992 students. The maximum classroom capacity without cutting current programs is 950.

Informational meetings will be held by the Citizens' Strategic Planning Committee, reviewing the enrollment, facility and additional needs of each of the elementary schools and middle school (For times and dates, check the Strategic Planning Review Committee story in this week's Ledger and/or Along Main Street).

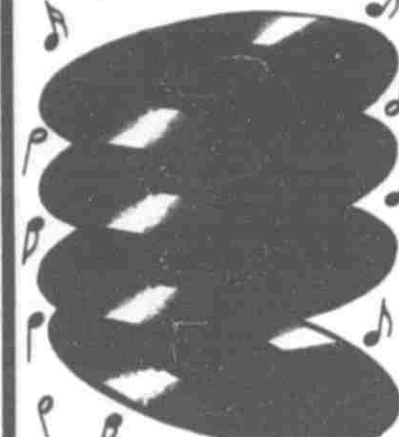

A fire that was started by an overheated exhaust pipe in the new addition of the Stephanie Hilton house was apparently the cause of a Wednesday night house fire that gutted the new addition.

All members of the Hilton family, who were asleep at the time were able to escape without injury thanks to an alert neighbor.

Lee Venneman, of 2590 Lowell View Dr. was watching the evening news when he looked out of his window

and saw flames coming from Stephanie Hilton's roof.

Venneman dialed 911, and then ran over to the Hilton house where he pounded on the windows to awake Hilton, her husband and her two daughters, Shannon, 12, and Joey Marie, nine.

Lowell Fire Chief Frank Martin said it appeared that the cause of the fire was an overheated exhaust pipe in the new addition of the home at 2580 Lowell View Dr.

Martin added that the estimate of the fire damage was \$10-\$12,000. "Some of the stuff was saved. Clothing, some furniture, a stereo and other items were removed from the house," Martin said. He added the fire had engulfed much of the home before Lowell firefighters arrived on the scene.

The Hilton family started to build the addition onto their home two months ago, but had yet to purchase insurance.

Lowell firefighters were called to the scene at 11:35 p.m. and Alto Firefighters assisted. Fire personell did not clear the scene until roughly 2:30 a.m. Lowell Rescue and Ambulance were on standby.

Hilton and her family will stay with her mother, a Lowell resident.

Michigan homeowners and renters would receive \$349 million of property tax relief under a homestead property tax credit revision bill introduced by State Representative Susan Grimes Munsell (R-Howell).

House Bill 5422 is part of a 4-bill package to amend the homestead credit calculation and expand eligibility for seniors and disabled people.

This legislation will bring substantial property tax relief to our homeowners and renters in times of increasing assessments.

The Munsell bill would: --increase the percent of the property taxes that exceed 3.5 percent of household income that are eligible as the credit from 60 percent to 75 percent.

--increase the maximum amount of the credit from \$1,200 to \$2,600 per year.

--index the maximum amount of the credit to the All Urban Detroit Consumer Price Index

--increase the portion of rent used in the credit calculation from 17 percent to 20 percent

--increase the household income categories in which senior citizens, paraplegics and quadriplegics are entitled to returns of their property taxes greater than the amounts that exceed 3.5 percent of household income.

Other bills in the package include House Bill 5423, which I sponsored, to expand the circuit breaker by approximately \$4 million to include totally and permanently disabled persons as entitled to a 100 percent credit or refunds of their property taxes above a certain percentage of their household income.

House Bill 5424, sponsored by Rep. William Runco (R-Dearborn), would exclude any Social Security benefits received by seniors from the calculation of household income used for homestead credit purposes. House Bill 5425, introduced by Rep. Roman Kulchitsky (R-Warren), would entirely remove the homestead property tax credit cap for all senior citizens.

These bills will allow us to start the process of property tax reduction via the homestead property tax credit. It is an important issue that needs to be at the forefront of legislative attention.
