## Lowell and Allegan exchange Mayors

More than 200 Michigan mayors and other municipal officials crisscrossed the state this past week for Mayors Exchange Day.

The unique exchange program began in 1954 as part of Michigan Week, an annual celebration that this year ran May 18-26.

On Thursday of last week Allegan Mayor, Craig van Melle and other Allegan officials spent the day in Lowell. Lowell Mayor, James Maatman and Lowell officials then traveled to Allegan on Monday.

"Mayor Exchange Day is a wonderful opportunity for Michigan mayors to get to know each other better and share frustrations and suc-

cesses about their demanding role in their cities," said George Goodman, secretary/treasurer of the Michigan Association of Mayors and former mayor of Ypsilanti.

The town of Allegan is bordered by rich farmland. This historic community is the gateway to the 45,000-acre Allegan State Game Area. A wrought-iron truss bridge, built in 1886, is referred to as the "Bridge to the Future." It spans the Kalamazoo River, which shapes the City of Allegan. A boardwalk along the river and a stroll through town offer views of six-floating fountains, plus nineteenth-century homes, churches, and other buildings.

"Mayors Exchange Day allows mayors to go back to their cities with something," van Melle said. "It gives me an opportunity to see what Lowell is doing in all aspects of the community. It also allows me to apply some of the techniques used by the City of Lowell to Allegan, if so desired."

van Melle said growth is currently causing some problems in Allegan. "People are balking at trees being cut down in order to widen a highway. There are many people who still don't want to change from the old to the new," he said.

One area, in which van Melle feels Allegan needs some work is its parks and recreation program. "I'm hopeful of taking back some information on Lowell's park and recreation program," van Melle said.

Major industry in Allegan includes Haworth Inc., a chair-making company; and the Perrigo Company, the largest private label pharmaceutical company.

van Melle pointed to continued growth, work on the riverfront, developing the downtown area, and further development of Allegan's industrial park future needs for

the City of Allegan.

The first of its kind anywhere in the country, the exchange program began as a way to promote the flow of ideas between cities. Once li-

mitted to a single day and to mayors only, the program has expanded to include other city officials and often involves two exchange days - one in each city.

## Lowell Board of Education uses special meeting to decide on option

Reacting with care and prompt attention to the results from the Project Outreach Phone Survey conducted by Ned Hubbell, Lowell's School Board, at a special meeting last Monday night, decided on a date, consultant and which one of three options to put on the fall bond issue.

According to Lowell Superintendent, Fritz Esch, the Lowell Board of Education decided on Tuesday, Sept. 25 as the date to vote, Option III, and to employ Clark Construction Company out of Lansing as a consultant to the Board.

"As a consultant Clark will check the figures presented to us by the architect (W.B.D.C.)," Esch said.

Option III calls for converting the high school building into a middle school (grades two through five), building a new high school with new athletic facilities, and converting the Middle School to an elementary school. This option would also include renovating Runciman/Riverside schools for use as Community Education and Board offices. This plan would cost between an estimated \$30

and \$35 million. Esch said he believes the figure is pretty accurate.

Esch said the price tag is an estimated cost and that a definite figure would be put on the bond issue. Actually, voters will have two separate issues to vote on. The first will be the aforementioned option and the other issue will be in regards to a pool. Esch emphasized they will be voted on separately.

In the survey, Option III states that the plan would require a tax increase of between four and five mills over 30 years. The survey also states that the community said (70-75 percent of those polled) it knows something needs to be done, and that it wanted the school to find and use the cheapest tax rates possible so that the cost is shared between parents with students in school now and parents who will have children in school over the next 30 years.

"The good news is that by using Capital Appreciation Bonds this plan can be financed at a millage rate of 2.8 - 2.9 mills over 30 years," Esch said. "The 4-5 mills suggested on Option III were

figured through the School Bond Loan Fund."

In the first year of the plan, the hike in the millage rate would only be 1.7 - 1.75 mills. In year two, the mills would go up an additional 1.1 or 1.15. Esch said the total amount of the additional mills would never exceed 2.8 - 2.9 mills, but could be reduced dependent on the S.E.V. (property value) growth.

In regards to the pool issue if passed, it would cost taxpayers four-tenths of one mill, or as Esch said, \$14 a year for a \$70,000 home owner and \$20 a year for a \$50,000 home owner. It should be noted that a new pool cannot be approved and installed unless option three is.

If option three is passed it

# College News

Ferris State University's spring quarter academic honors list includes 1,253 students. University officials have announced.

To be eligible, a Ferris student must have compiled a 3.50 grade point average in at least 12 quarter hours of work. The list includes 222 who earned 4.00 grade point average, or all A grades.

Included on that list were Diane G. Stencil from Lowell and Robin K. Held, Tracy Lynn SeEVERS, and Harry J. Theodore, all of Ada.

Kevin Dudeck, a student at Michigan Technological University, has been awarded a two-year Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps (AF-ROTC) scholarship worth more than \$5,500. A 1989 graduate of Lowell High School, Dudeck is a first-year student majoring in electro-mechanical engineering technology at MTU.

As an AFROTC cadet, he takes one Air Force Aerospace Studies course each term in addition to his regular college curriculum. The course teaches Air Force history, leadership and manage-

ment, and national defense policy.

After receiving his degree from MTU, Dudeck will be commissioned as a Second Lieutenant and will enter active duty as an Air Force officer. He is the son of Louis and Mary Dudeck of Lowell.

In all, 1,054 CMU students were named to the honors list, and 143 earned straight A's. About 17,000 students attend CMU in Mount Pleasant.

For the spring semester, 247 freshmen, 234 sophomores, 265 juniors and 308 seniors were named to the honors list.

Named to the honors list from Lowell was Gregg E. Peters, a senior at CMU. Karen E. McGurney, a senior from Ada, was also on the list as was Precia L. Emmons, a senior from Saranac.

Central Michigan University's spring semester honors list includes students from the Ada, Lowell and Saranac areas who placed in the top 10 percent of their class.

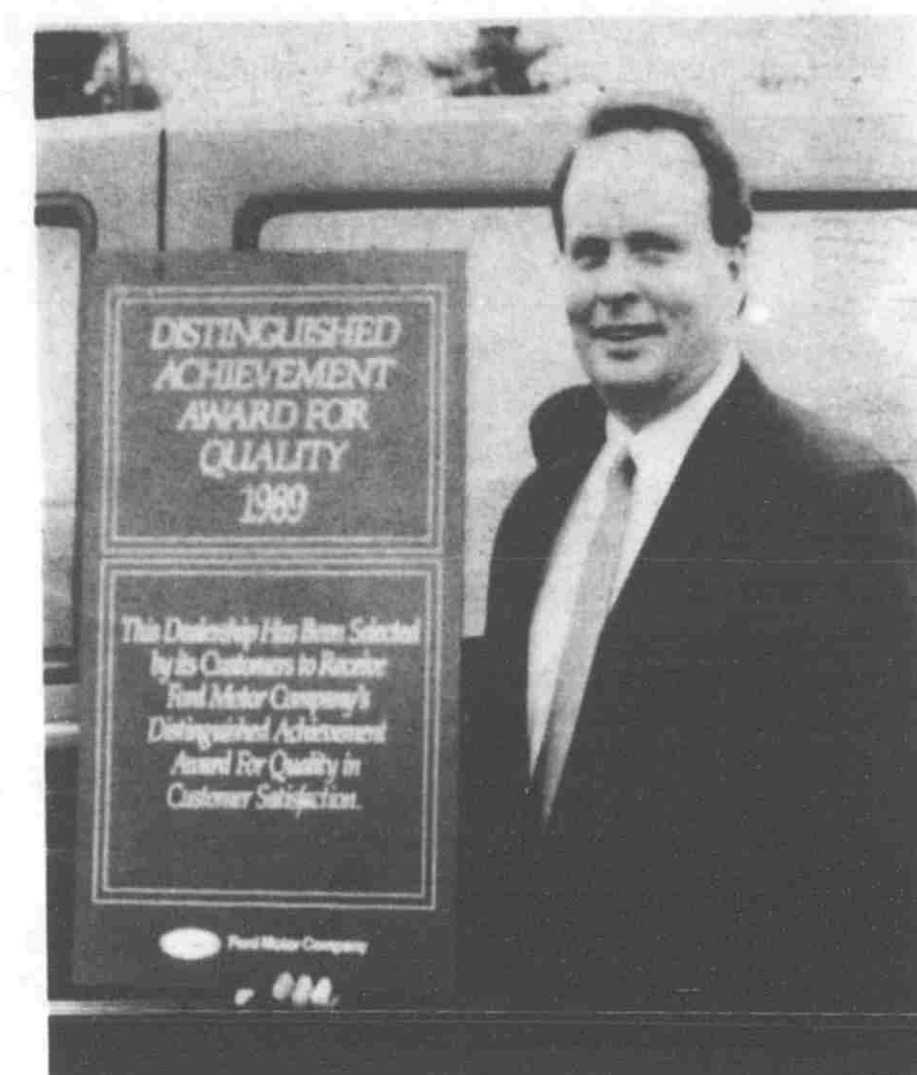

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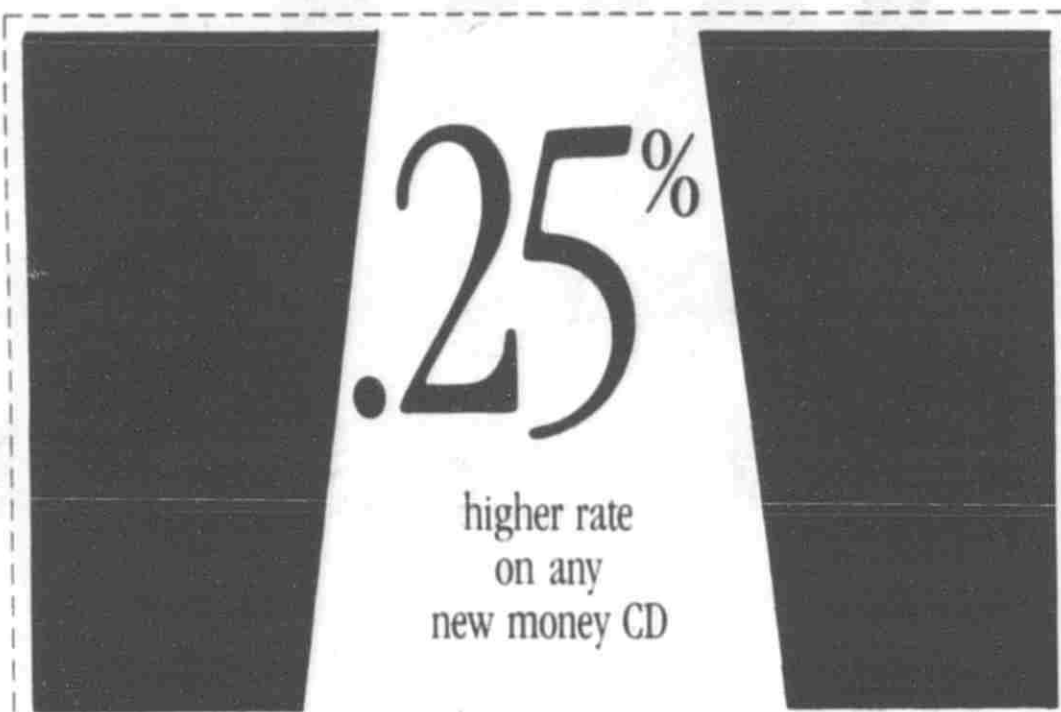
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# Rose Roberts named Women's Club "Woman of the Year"

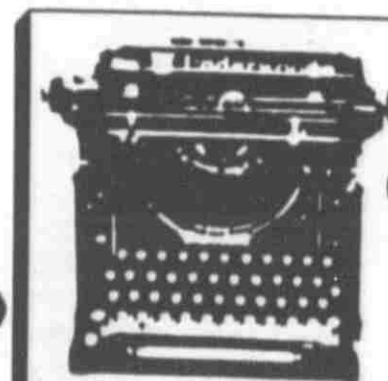

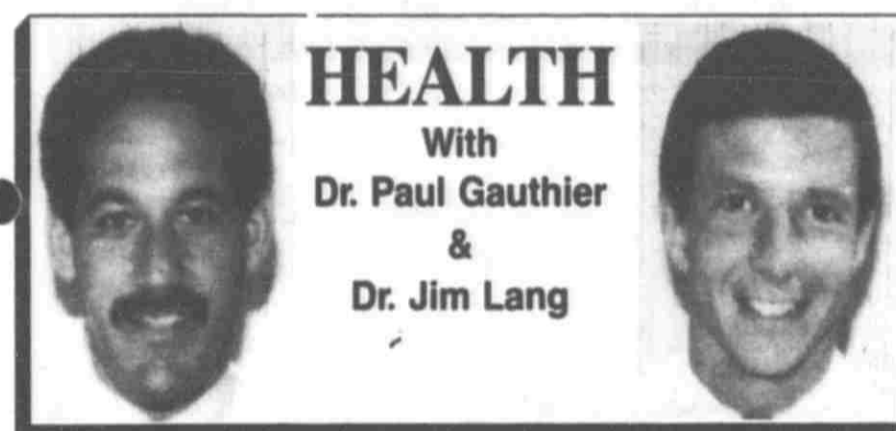

### A NEW DRUG FOR BED WETTING

The Food and Drug Administration has recently approved a new drug for the treatment of bedwetting (primary nocturnal enuresis) in adults and children. This drug is being marketed as a nasal spray and called DDAVP.

Bed wetting is fairly common and usually ceases as a child matures. It most commonly affects young children and is related to an immature bladder control reflex. At about age 4, children can urinate on command, but it is not until age 5 or 6 that they can hold urine with any degree of pressure on the bladder. Control over urination is achieved earlier by girls than boys.

In light of the above, the diagnosis of enuresis is usually reserved for bed-wetting after age 5 for girls and after age 6 for boys. Current estimates are that at age 3, 40 percent of all children suffer from enuresis, although the number drops with age.

DDAVP can be used for any child or adult who has never achieved urinary continence. Any person who suddenly develops bed-wetting may have an underlying disease process or may have suffered a traumatic experience. Your doctor will rule these possible causes out before attempting treatment with DDAVP.

DDAVP is given as a nasal spray; a single puff into each nostril at bedtime is the recommended dosage. As dryness is achieved, the spray may be given on alternating nights to wean the child from the medicine. Occasionally, a cold or upper respiratory tract infection which affects the nose may interfere with the drug's effectiveness.

This new drug can substantially reduce the embarrassing and uncomfortable circumstances of bed-wetting, for example when the child goes to camp or sleeps at someone else's house. While this product works, it should not totally replace the other means of dealing with enuresis: positive feedback, motivational therapy, behavior modification, withholding fluids at night, etc. DDAVP is apparently very effective, but we stress that appropriate management of bed-wetting is manifold and should be accomplished with good communication between physician, parents and patient.

Having disappointed the crowd with an early exit two weeks ago, Perry chose the latter.

"The first 300 meters his form was unflappable as he set the pace for the rest of the pack," Lowell boys' track coach Keith Bovee said.

While many were impressed, Lowell Assistant Athletic Director, Tom Stahr, worried for Perry's health, the show of concern however didn't come until after he had gotten his pictures. His actions raised the age-old journalism question, when does a person forget about the story and picture and help?

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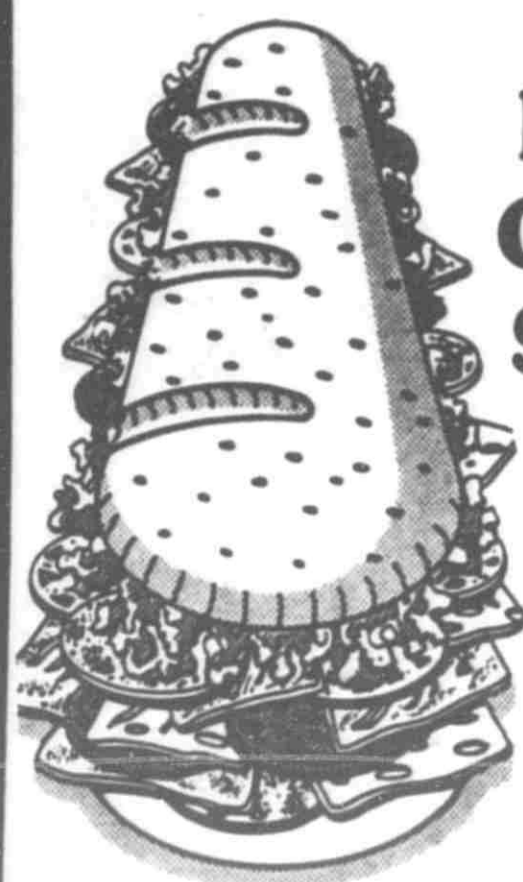
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# Lowell honors 88 students for academic excellence

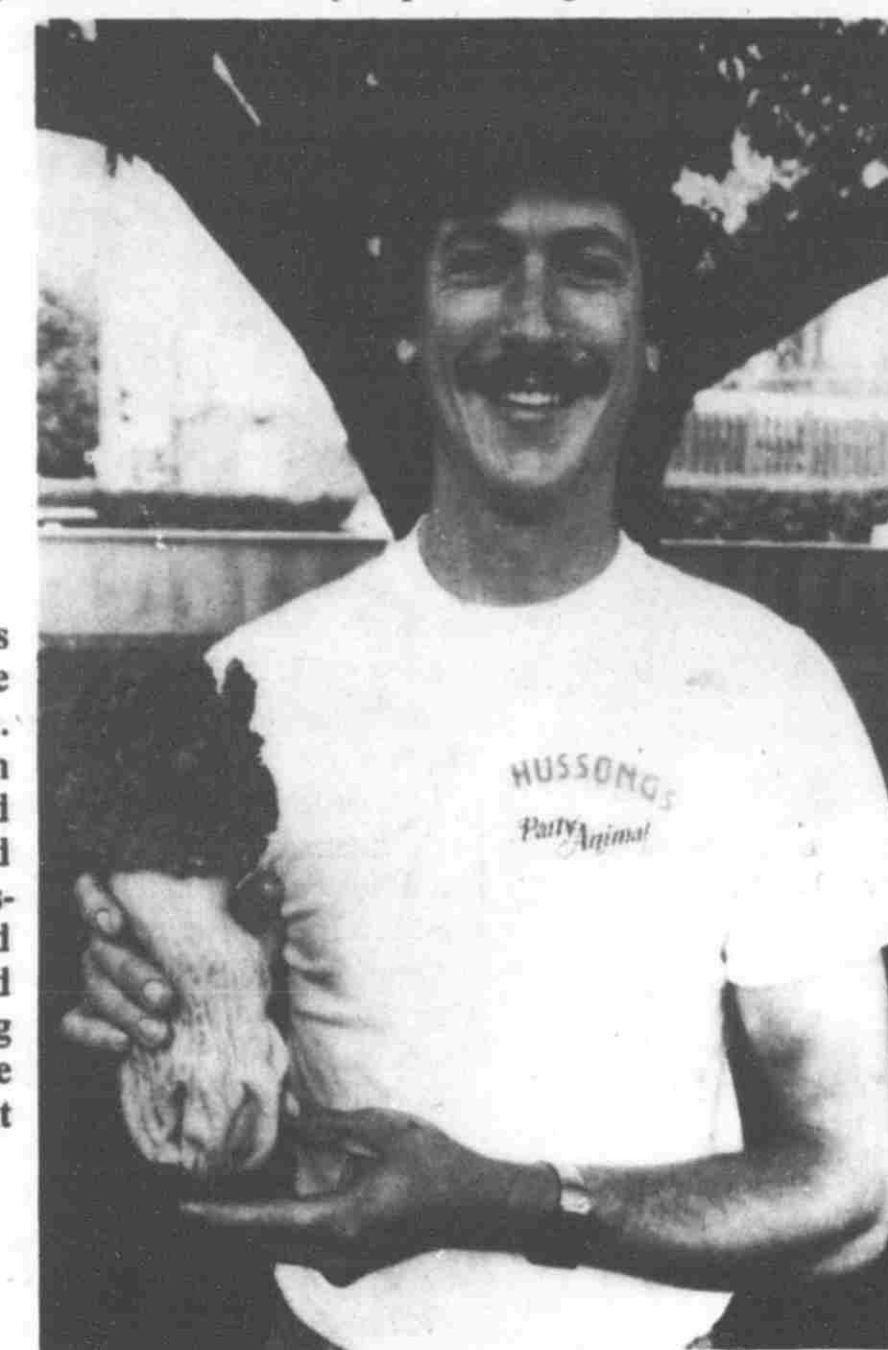

## TNT and A&E are added to LCTV service

At last, TNT and the Arts and Entertainment Channels have arrived and are on line for the entertainment pleasure of Lowell Cable subscribers.

According to the Lowell Cable office, Arts and Entertainment was put on line on April 28 and TNT was hooked up on May 11. The Ledger was first notified of the hookups on Monday, May 21.

Arts and Entertainment may now be found on Channel 30 while TNT may now be found on channel 37.

Along with the new hookups, basic cable subscribers will also incur a \$1 a month increase in their

cable rates. The increase will push rates from \$13 to \$14 a month. If a recent "Town Talk" survey is any indication, most cable subscribers believe the price is still a fair one.

Back in January, Lowell Cable Superintendent, Herb Haines, asked local cable subscribers to send in suggestions as to what channels they would like to see added to the basic cable list. TNT and Arts and Entertainment were chosen. This inquiry came about after an FCC ruling provided local stations with exclusive rights over distant stations. For Haines, it meant either dropping channels 6 and 10 or blocking the channels' signals out for most of the day. The latter was chosen and alternative programming was sought.

To the delight of many, the alternative programming has been sought, found and put on line.

Heather Peckham.

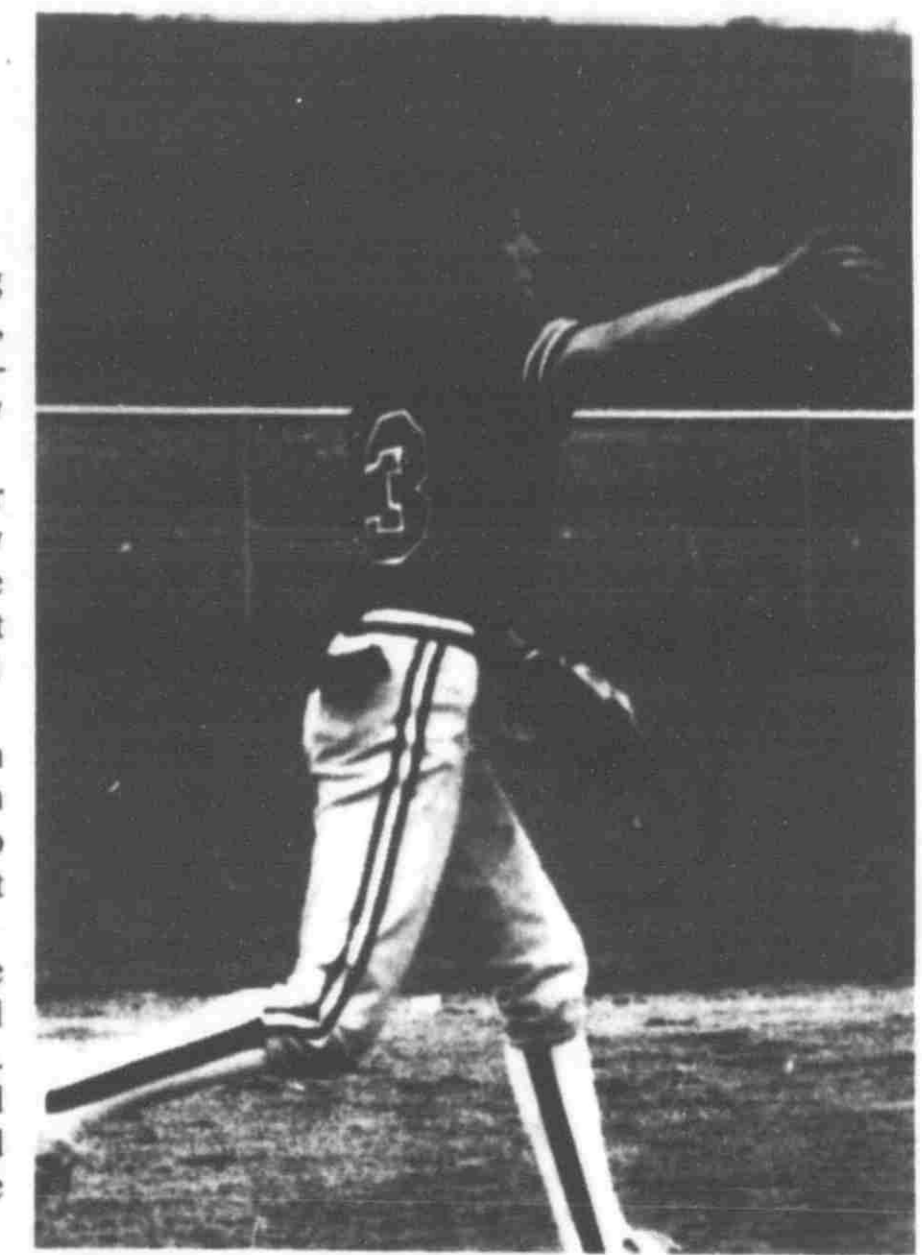
In the sixth, after getting on base on a sacrifice bunt, Peckham scored Lowell's second run on an RBI triple by Kathy VanBelkum.

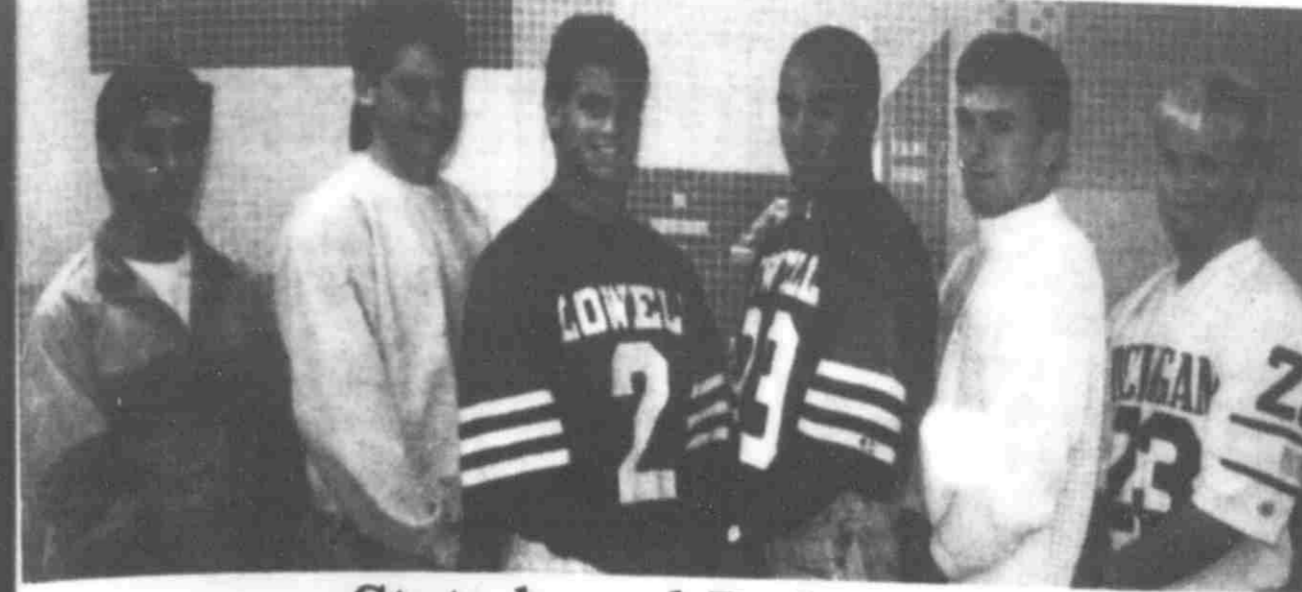

# Lowell boys' track teams sparkle at John Bos relay

Lowell's Red Arrow Boys' track team gave a strong accounting of itself in the fourth annual John Bos High School Invitational at Houseman Field last Thursday.

"The boys were disappointed they didn't win any of the events," Lowell coach Keith Boeve said. "I told them they have nothing to feel bad about, they broke two school records and tied a third."

In the 440 relay, Lowell's Bob Adams, Kevin Goggins, Shawn Smith and Brett Knoop finished fourth with a time of 44.3 seconds, breaking the school record. Union and Creston tied for first with a time of 43.8.

Smith finished third in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.4. It should be noted that during the year his times were for the 100 meter dash. The time of 10.4 in the 100 yard dash converts to 11.3 in the 100 meters. Union's Eric Johnson won the event in a time of 9.80.

Adams placed fourth in the 400 meters, coming home in 50.3. Dan Dennis of Unity Christian won the event in a time of 50 seconds flat.

Goggins tied Lowell's school record in the 200 meter dash with a time of 22.6. Brad Field, East Kentwood, won the

race, breaking the ribbon at 22.5.

All the attention though was diverted from Field and Goggins as Eric Johnson, a highly touted Michigan High School track star pulled out of the race, clutching his right hamstring. Union coach Ernie Johnson said he is hopeful Johnson will be able to compete in the state meet at Jackson this weekend.

The mile relay team of Adams, Goggins, Saboo and Antcliff broke Lowell's school record in the mile relay with a time of 3:27.3. Ottawa Hills won the event at 3:25.5.

"We competed against mainly Class A schools," Boeve said. "I think Unity Christian and we were two of the better Class B schools that participated."

Lowell's girls did not have one of its better days, but still performed admirably.

Heather Gowen placed third in the 100 yard dash and fourth in the 200 yard dash. Gowen ran the 100 in 12.1. Rockford won the event at 11.6.

Gwen raced home in 27 flat in the 200. Creston's Carter

won the event with a time of 25.5.

Lowell's Tonya Stepek, Gowen, Thomet and Bussler were third in the 400 relay at 51.9. Creston won the relay with a mark of 50.9.

Lowell's 440 relay team handed in its best time of the year with a time of 50.7. Yvette Ferguson also placed sixth in the shot put.

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# Do parents make the grade at report card time?

"Report card time can be a time of increased physical and emotional abuse", according to Anne Cohn, Director of the National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse. Locally, the Kent County Council for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect is

addressing the issue through the distribution of "Stop the Report Card Reflex" materials. The fliers, developed by the Houston (Texas) Child Abuse Prevention Council, are being distributed to all Kent County school principals in an effort to reach parents at report card time.

Report cards... are sometimes the only communication between teachers and parents generally focus on academic progress, but are mechanisms for reporting school behavior (usually problems) as well can provoke a range of responses from parents, depending on numerous variables are sometimes viewed by parents as being a direct reflection on them or a personal affront.

The Report Card Reflex describes the negative reaction of a parent stimulated by a child's report card from school. The reflex may take the form of physical action, such as spanking or hitting a child, or it may take the form of psychological punishment, such as isolating a child from his friends or brutally verbalizing him. The "reflex" is usually spontaneous, often harsh, and varies in duration; for some kids confrontation lasts only hours, while for others it may continue for days, weeks or even months. The "Stop the Report Card Reflex" campaign can help create awareness of one more

opportunity for improving parent-child relationships and gives parents alternatives to lashing out at their children. The materials encourage parents to:

- \* SIT DOWN with your child and look over the report card.
- \* PRAISE YOUR CHILD.
- Find at least one good thing: attendance, no tardies, etc.
- \* BE CALM! Let your child tell you about his poor grades.
- \* ASK how you can help your child do better.
- \* ASK what your child can do to make better grades.
- \* MAKE A PLAN with your child's teacher and your child to do better.

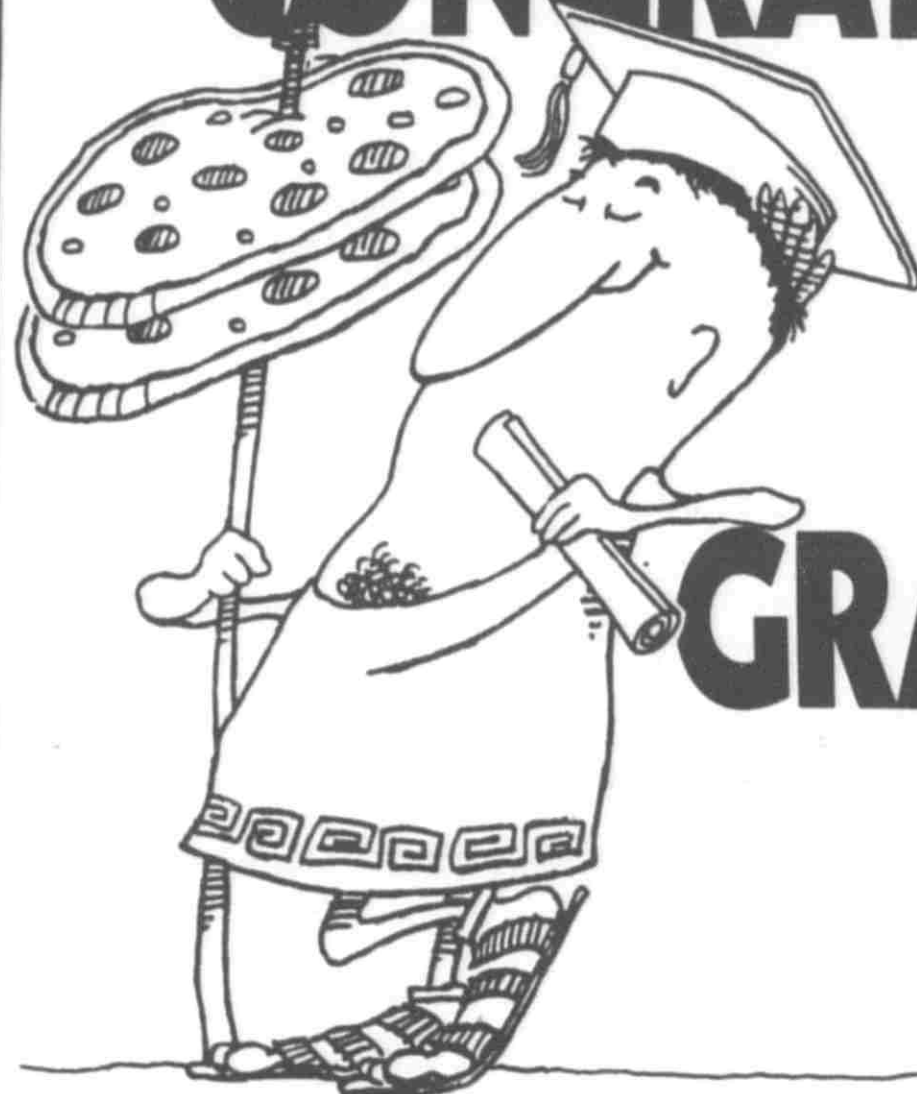

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## May 26 - June 1 is "Mailbox Improvement Week"

Each year the Postal Service designates a week during May to encourage customers on rural, city-motorized, and contract delivery routes to examine and improve, where necessary, the appearance of their mailboxes. Mailbox Improvement Week calls attention to the need for providing mail receptacles that are:

1. designed to protect the mail from weather;
2. neat in appearance;
3. conveniently located;
4. safe to use.

Neat, attractive mailboxes make a significant contribution to the appearance of the countryside and to streets in suburban areas.

Mailboxes that meet these four important requirements contribute to a more efficient delivery operation and improved service to the entire route.

Customers should newly install or replace an unsuitable receptacle only with approved traditional or contemporary mailboxes. However, they may use custom-built rural mailboxes if the postmaster gives prior approval and the box generally conforms to approved manufactured boxes, requirement in flag, size, strength, and quality of construction.

If the post office authorizes the use of street names and house numbers, the box should display that number on the side or on the door if the box is in a group.

would mean an extra \$61.25 in property tax the first year for owners of a \$70,000 home. In the second year that would increase by an additional 1.115 mills or \$40.25, bringing the total additional mills to 2.9 or \$101.50 per year.

Option three in the survey

said the property tax increase would be \$175 a year for \$70,000 home owners.

For a \$50,000 home owner it would mean a mill increase of 1.75 over the first year or a property tax increase of \$87.50. In the second year the mills would increase by an additional 1.15 or \$57.50

for a total of \$145 per year.

School Community Services Director, Dick Korb, said the school will be conducting informational meetings, open forums and community group sessions between now and Sept. 25.

Work ahead for school officials includes a detailed draw-

ing of the plan; a design; the development of a detailed budget; setting of an election; and finding land for the construction of a new high school.

Esch said if the bond issue did not pass, the school district would have no choice, but to come back before the

community a second time. Esch and Korb are comforted by the fact that 70-75 percent of the registered voters polled said they know something has to be done.

Korb added that beginning

next year, two classrooms will be set up in the administration building. "The school will also purchase one portable classroom which will be used as an administrative office," Esch said.
