Two seriously injured; Matherton woman killed in M-21 crash

A 29-year old Matherton woman was killed in a 5:35 a.m. head-on collision Friday on M-21 1 1/2 miles west of Hawley Highway in Boston Township.

According to the Ionia County Sheriff Department's news release Tracy Ann Sil-

vehicle struck an eastbound vehicle head-on, driven by Sandra Kay McBride, 27, of Grand Rapids.

Silvernail was pronounced dead at the scene by Sergeant Robert Schutt, Deputy M.E.I. of the Ionia County Sheriff's Department.

McBride was taken to Butterworth Hospital by ambulance. The passenger in her car, Daniel Warren Gay, 29, Grand Rapids, was taken to Ionia County Medical Hospital by ambulance.

ICSD's preliminary reports indicate that it is believed Silvernail's car rolled a couple of times before landing upright in the yard of Doris Scott.

"I heard the crash about 5:30," Scott said. "There was no squealing just a crunching sound." Scott added that her neighbor said she thought a bolt of lightning hit a tree and knocked it down.

"I got up and looked out the window and then called the ambulance. I went out and checked the blue car (Sil-

vernails') and then I went up to the car on M-21 and the driver and passenger were sitting in their seats with their seatbelts on and their eyes wide open. They didn't talk but their eyes were wide open. I could tell they understood what I was saying," Scott said. "The whole thing was terrible."

Scott added that in that area, people pass on the double yellow line all the time.

The preliminary investigation showed that Silvernail was not wearing a seatbelt. The occupants in the eastbound vehicle were wearing seatbelts.

Assisting on the call were E.T.T. Ambulance, Saranac Fire, Lowell Rescue, Kent County Sheriff Department's Emergency Unit, Lowell Police, M.S.P. Reconstructionist, and Bussell Wrecker out of Ionia.

Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch breathed a much needed sigh of relief after hearing that Lowell voters approved a waiver of the Headlee Amendment so the district can maintain its authorized operational millage at 37.6 mills for the 1990-91 school year.

The passing of the Headlee Amendment helped ease the financial burden of having to order two re-locatable offices for many of the Lowell Administrators.

Headlee passed 433-320. Breaking those numbers down into precincts, in the Bowne Precinct, Headlee was defeated 44-32. In the Vergennes Precinct, Headlee

was approved 153-126. In the Runciman (Lowell) Precinct, Headlee passed 241-146.

"Knowing that, I feel a lot better asking the board if they want to pay cash or go through a finance program to order two re-locatable offices for the Administration in 1990-91.

The building currently used by the administration will be filled by fifth-graders next school year.

The copy center and Assistant Superintendent, Gary Kemp's office all that will remain. Everyone else will be relocated.

City Council adopts budget

On Monday, June 11 the Lowell City Council adopted a budget for 1990/91 which calls for levying 13 mills. The millage rate is .617 mills higher than the previous year and 1.317 mills higher than the rate would have been if the a Truth-in-Taxation roll-back had been instituted.

The budget calls for expenditures of \$1,502,895 in the general fund, \$197,695 in the major street fund, \$196,565 in the local street fund, \$797,280 in the sewer fund, \$397,410 in the water fund and \$102,200 in the debt service fund for the storm sewer.

A request from the Lowell Area Arts Council for a \$2,000 donation from the city has created a stir at past meetings concerning the budget. Councilman Jim Hodges has been in favor of the grant, or

at least a \$1,500 contribution equal to that given the Chamber of Commerce and Senior Neighbors over the past few years. However with cuts being made throughout the budget meetings, the rest of the councilmen did not agree with Hodges and failed to second his motion.

Councilman Charlie Doyle has led the argument against a donation to the Arts Council and confronted several citizens who attended Monday's meeting in support of such a donation. Doyle made refer-

ence to a letter mailed to Arts Council members which he said treated him unfairly regarding this issue.

The budget was adopted without a contribution to the Arts Council. Also, a request for a monetary donation to the "Right Place" program was denied. Grants of \$1,500 each were allotted to the Senior Neighbors and the Chamber of Commerce, but it was the consensus of the council that all such requests will be considered individually in the future.

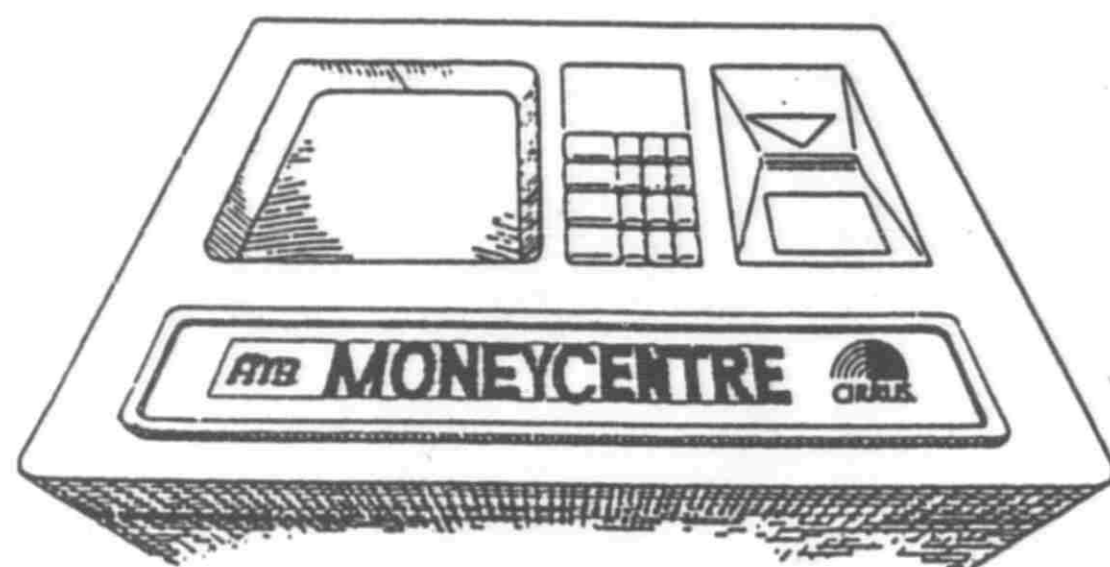

Students received instruction in helicopter flying techniques, including tactical instrument flying maintenance, navigation and radio procedures.

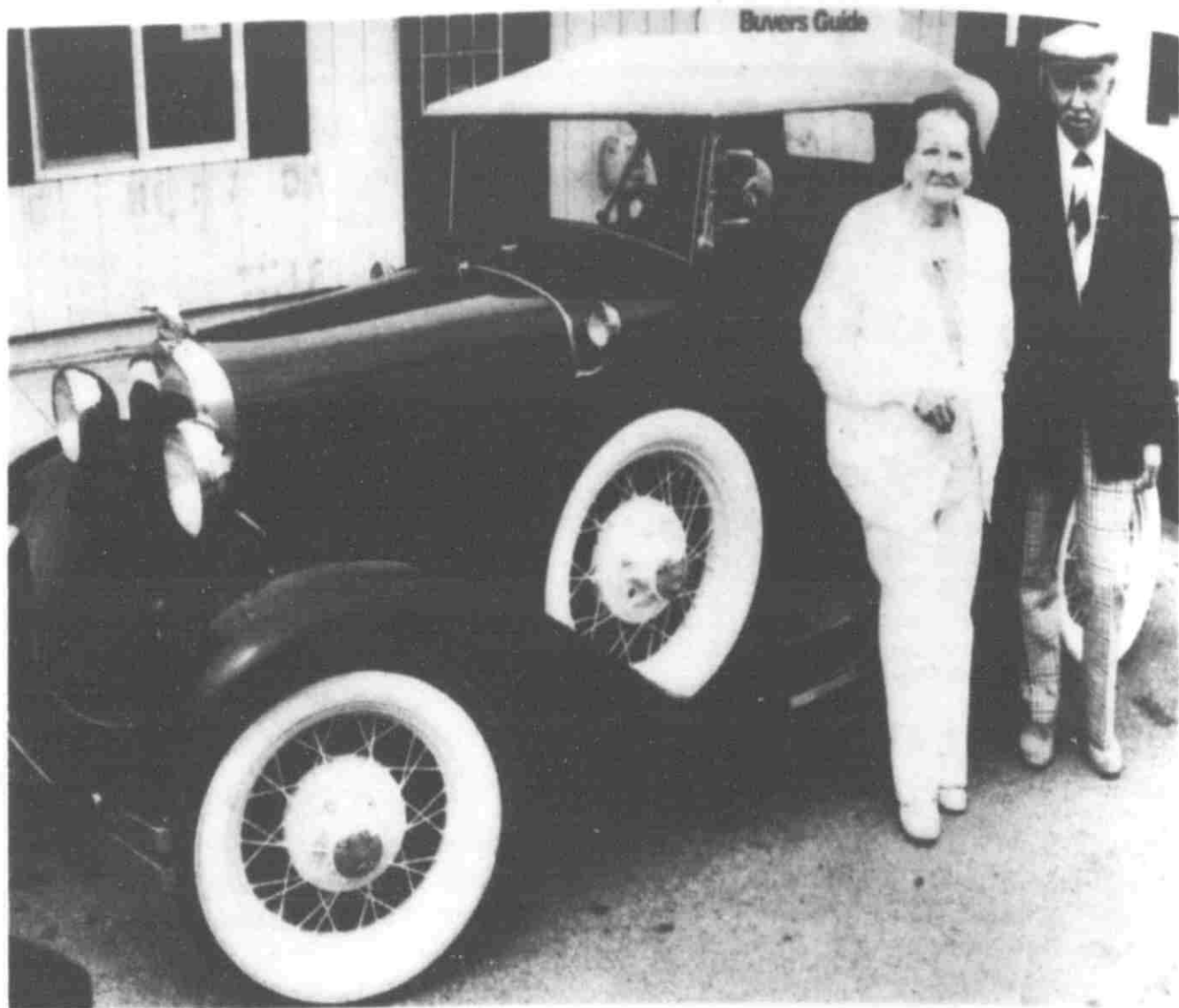

"Lonesome...feeling sort of blue, Here's the very thing to do... Call that loved one far away. Presto! Everything's O.K."

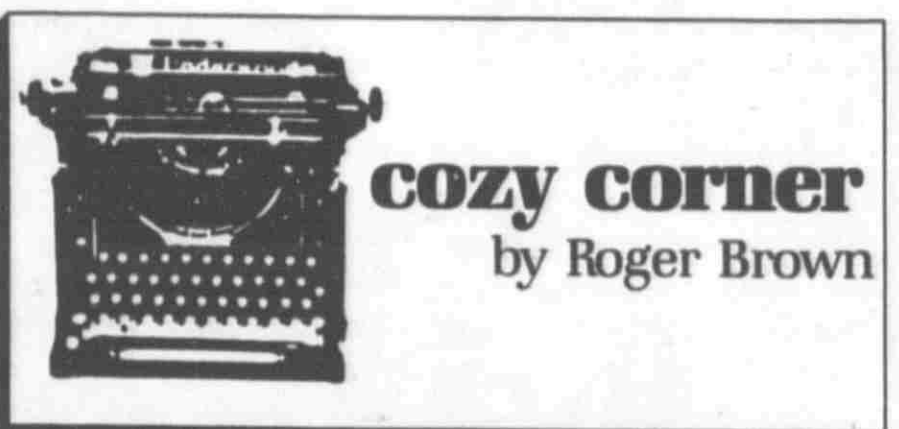

I spent the day on a boat in Pentwater a couple of Saturdays ago. It was downright cool for June, and a fierce wind was howling to about 30 miles per hour. We spent the day securely moored in the marina and pattered around the boat. Which brings to mind a T-shirt I spotted some years back that bore a quote from the poem "Wind in the Willows". The T-shirt had one of those cute cartoon mole characters sailing around in a little boat with an inscription that read, "There is nothing, no nothing, half so much worth doing, as simply messing around in boats". There have been times when I'd agree with that wholeheartedly, but on this cold and blustery day I know I could have listed three or four other things that would have been at least half as much worth doing.

Sometime during the afternoon I noticed some of the marina staff scurrying around in serious looking orange life vests. They were toting long boat hooks and big coils of rope. My brain snapped like a steel trap and told me, "Hey Brown, there's something going on here". Boy, am I quick, or what?

I fished a Budweiser long neck out of the cooler and took up an eye-balling seat on deck. What was about to happen was nothing short of dramatic, and I had a ringside seat. It wasn't long and I heard sirens approaching. Again my brain showed its incredible power of deductive thinking and told me the sirens were coming to the marina. Sho "nuff, the place started filling up with police cars, an ambulance and a host of curiosity seekers.

The next thing you know a monstrous U.S. Coast Guard helicopter rumbled up the channel from Lake Michigan and began circling overhead just 100 to 200 feet in the air. This thing was huge, and it was loud. It was as big as a house and sounded like a freight train. Throw in the sirens and the howling wind and it could have been a scene from a big time action movie. I just sat there in the middle of it all, mostly admiring the chopper pilot's ability to handle that thing in the wind.

The helicopter made no attempt to land, but continued to circle. pretty soon the big power boat that had gone out on

the rescue mission came churning back through the no wake zone. He was heading straight for us! Again my brain fired off a message, "Hey Brown, get ready to lend a hand, or at least get out of the way".

I didn't know it at the time, but the rescuers had wrapped a throwline up in a propeller, and they were coming in on one engine. Consequently, the big boat was less maneuverable, and the skipper made a decision to take a wide slip next to us rather than the narrower slip he'd left from. Holy cow! The only thing between us was a two foot wide section of floating dock. At first I'd kinda' liked my ringside seat, but now things were getting out of hand in a hurry.

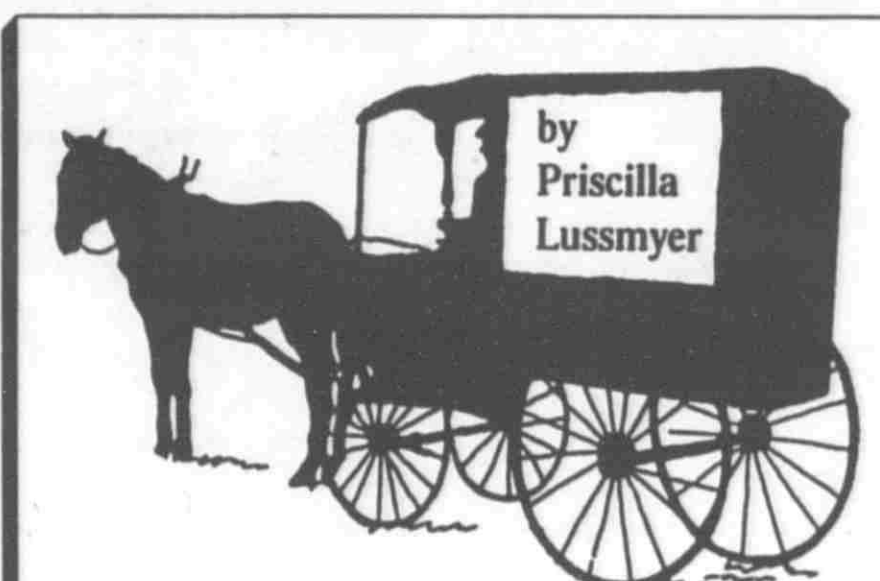
I grabbed a line and tied off the stern while someone else took the bow. The next thing you know police, rescue personnel, relatives of the victim and who knows who all else came charging down the two foot by thirty foot dock, straight toward me. In the meantime, the rescuers were jumping off the boat at the other end of the dock. I dove for cover aboard our boat.

Somehow my dogs had gotten loose, and were caught up in the melee on the dock. They were being trampled and

kicked by the scurrying rescuers until I was able to manhandle (or should that be doghandle?) them aboard. Their eyes were as big as saucers as they made for neutral space and sat with tails between their legs.

Now it was time to see the victim. I didn't know quite what to expect, but what I got was a bit of a disappointment. A young man in his mid thirties cautiously strolled out on deck of the rescue boat looking around with very wide eyes at all the commotion. He was dressed in a wet suit, and wasn't even shivering. I found out later that he had capsized his 18 foot Hobie Cat on Lake Michigan, and couldn't get it righted again. He was taken to the ambulance, examined and soon released to the care and custody of his wife, who more than likely gave him a huge earful of, "See, I told you it was too windy to go out there by yourself, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah". Poor guy.

Now here's the moral of this story. If you are into boating, think twice before venturing out into conditions that may be too extreme for you or your craft to handle. It's not that you may lose your boat. And it's not that you may drown. The big thing to consider is how embarrassing the rescue is.

CM Railway proposed pull-out would impact Lowell

The decisions made within the next 30 days on the proposed abandonment of Central Michigan Railway between Ionia and Owosso may have a strong impact on the City of Lowell, its farmers and more specifically a few of its major employers.

On Tuesday, May 31, Central Michigan Railroad announced it was planning to file abandonment papers on the portion of its line that runs east from Ionia to just west of Owosso.

The King Milling Company and Attwood, two of Lowell's major employers, stand to incur the biggest inconveniences - as both are dependent upon rail service for their successful operation.

If the proposed abandonment were approved, King Milling would lose one of its two rail services, and Attwood would be deprived of a significant rail option now available to it.

"It will lessen competition on rates and raise our transporting costs to certain destinations," said King Milling Vice President, Jim Doyle. "It would also affect our service. It would cause more switches and thus take longer to get to its destination."

Attwood currently uses Central Michigan Railway as an alternate. The abandonment would however make Attwood a captive customer to CSX.

Shippers located west of town on the rail line, such as Amway, would have a greater problem.

Central Michigan Railway is Amway's major carrier. CSX serves as its alternative. "The abandonment would also force us into a captive customer situation," said Amway's Supervisor of Corporate Traffic and Transportation, Bob Ghareeb. "This would not be a comfortable position since CSX in the past has also threatened to abandon Michigan lines."

Amway is currently filing a protest with ICC and contacting representatives to let them know of the severity of the situation. "We're also

looking for the ICC to grant us a hearing which would allow us to have some input on the abandonment hearing," Ghareeb said.

Amway currently uses 500 rail cars per year. Ghareeb says it would take five trucks to replace one rail car. Amway receives its shipments by rail, and ships by truck.

The elimination of the rail transportation would also have an impact on Lowell's citizens.

According to Lowell City Manager Dave Pasquale, the traffic traversing on M-21 through Lowell efficiently crosses the two-lane bridge over the Flat River.

"However, if Central Michigan Railway is permitted to abandon its rail line, significant amounts of traffic now being carried in rail service may be diverted to motor carriers," he says. "I would then be concerned about the impact of the truck traffic on Lowell's streets and especially on M-21 and its two-lane bridge. Not only would traffic result in congestion and inconvenience for Lowell residents, it would represent significant safety concerns."

Included in the concerns, was the effect on the roads that such a large increase in the number of trucks would have, and the adverse effect it would have on such environmental factors such as air quality and noise levels.

"I would also expect that the condition of our roads would decline rapidly. I do not believe that funding is readily available for local governments to assume the additional burden of repairing and maintaining those roads to deal with added truck traffic," Pasquale said. "Nor do I believe that local government should be asked to assume financial burden when adequate rail alternatives exist."

Lowell Township Supervisor John Timpson said it will also effect farmers who receive fertilizer and lime by rail. "This is an important option for farmers to have," Timpson said.

Letters protesting the abandonment must be filed within 30 days. They must contain specific information which is necessary for a successful petition of a public hearing on the abandonment process.

Central Michigan Railway brought forward a systems diagram map a year ago. It stated plans of abandonment from Grand Rapids to Owosso.

Under the ICC Act, the law gives preference to interested divisions participating in the ICC proceedings interested in purchasing portions of the line, according to lawyer, Jan Barber.

"I've been working part-time at WOOD for 14 months, and have been in radio on a part-time basis most of my life."

Gould says while there will always be reservations there is no room for second guessing his decision. "Second guessing would mean I hold a degree of doubt. I don't have any doubt. If WOOD didn't feel I was qualified and capable - with knowing what's at stake, I would not have been offered the job," he explains.

The 1963 Western Michigan graduate says he will miss the most his association with the Lowell High School staff and students. "Over the years I have developed some good friendships," Gould says. "Working within a school setting enables a person to become close to people and to build friendships."

He added that radio doesn't lend itself to such an opportunity. However, for Gould, it will enable him to use and formulate writing creativity. He looks forward to the opportunity.

Gould earned his Bachelor's Degree in social science from Western Michigan University and his masters in counseling and personnel.

"There is no hidden agenda or reasons for my leaving other than feeling a need for something different. I've enjoyed my job here at Lowell High School and have looked forward to coming to work," he said.

Gould may not be working in the Lowell community anymore, but he will continue his association and involvement with the Lowell Methodist Church and the Lowell Showboat.

"I've always said the ideal retirement job for me would be a full-time announcer's job," Gould said. He will get that opportunity beginning June 18. Gould will replace Bill Stevens, who left WOOD for a radio position in Jacksonville, Fla.

"I'm most proud of the hand I had in developing Lowell's local scholarship program," Gould said. "I feel good about that."

However, he is not so sure how good he feels about his new wake-up time - 4 a.m. "It's going to take a few weeks to adjust," he laughs.

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Kevin Vezino to fly in Battle Creek's International Balloon Championship

When the expected field of over 150 balloons fill the sky over Battle Creek during the International Balloon Championship to be held June 16-23, a Lowell pilot will be at the controls of his craft. Kevin Vezino will be flying his balloon in the Fiesta (exhibition) class.

Vezino, who is a printer at Amway, has been a balloon pilot for nine years. During those years "The Vez", as Vezino is known, has traveled to many balloon events in Michigan. Among his wins is a first place in the 1983 Jackson Hot Air Jubilee.

Vezino, who pilots a red and blue paneled balloon named "Big Mouth", finished third in the 1985 Battle Creek fiesta division.

Vezino's crew includes his wife and crew chief, Mary, son K.J., sister Sherri, brother Bob and Bob's wife Bonnie, and any of his other five brothers as they are needed from time to time.

As of this date, balloonists representing seven countries are registered for the seven day event.

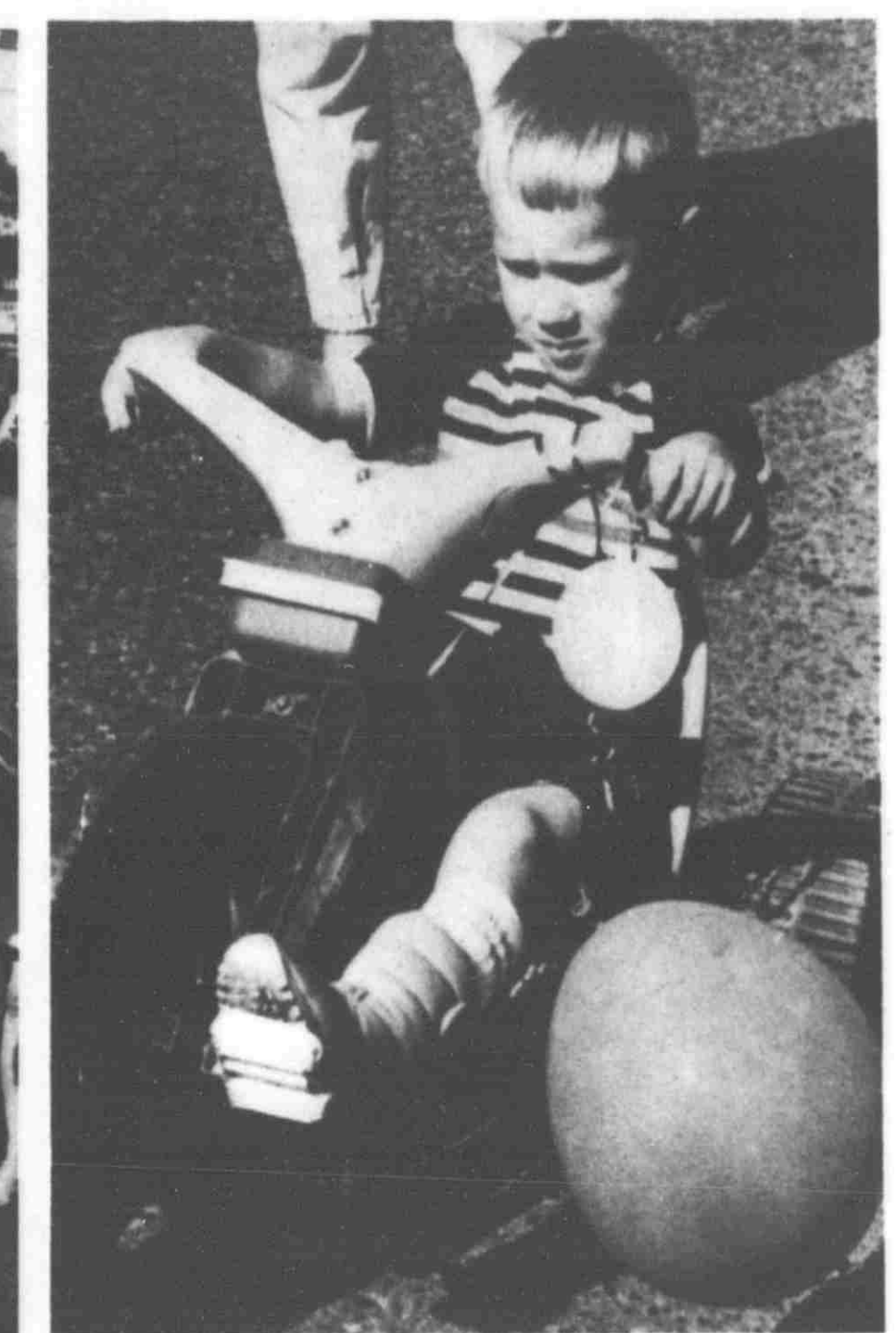
Shortly after the parade, spectators enjoyed the baby marathon, the toddler walk and the running race.

Bicycles, tricycles and Big Wheels were all a part of the parade on Saturday.



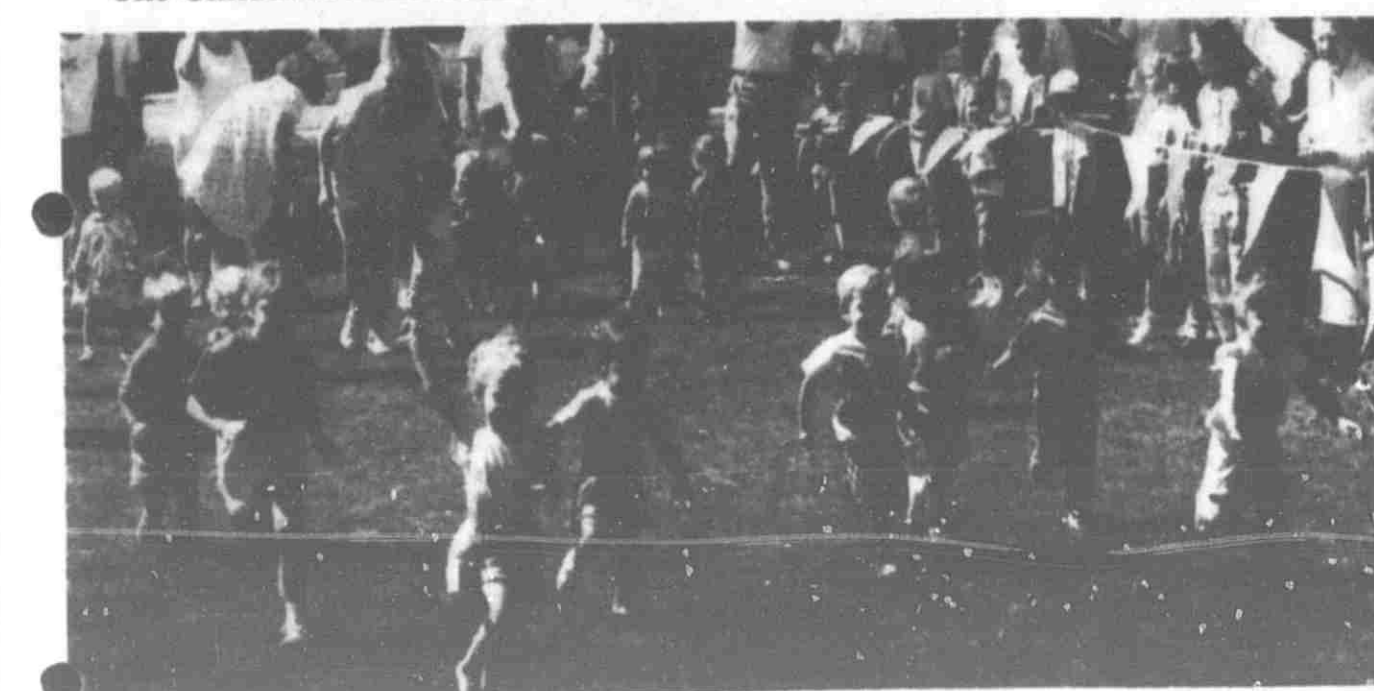

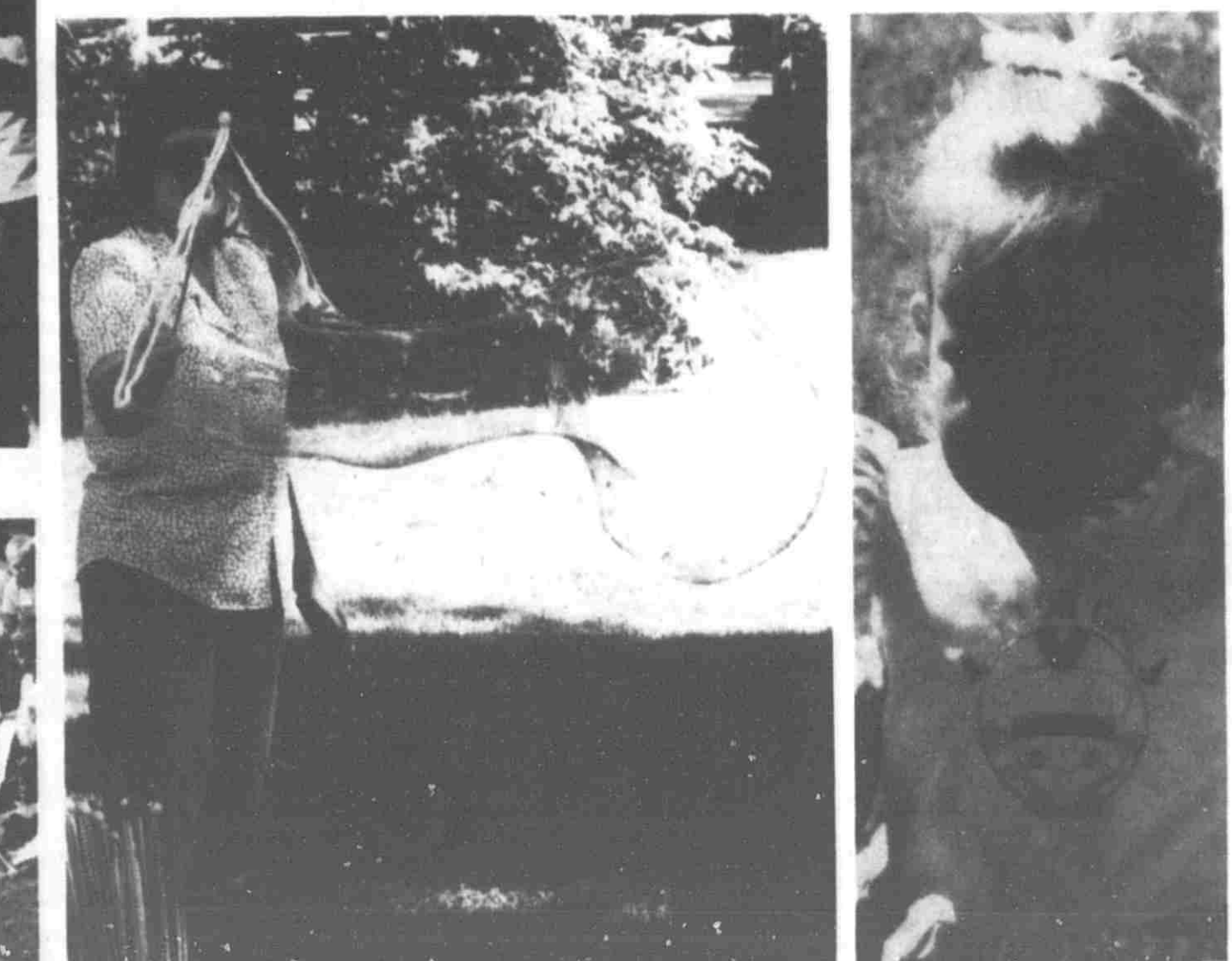

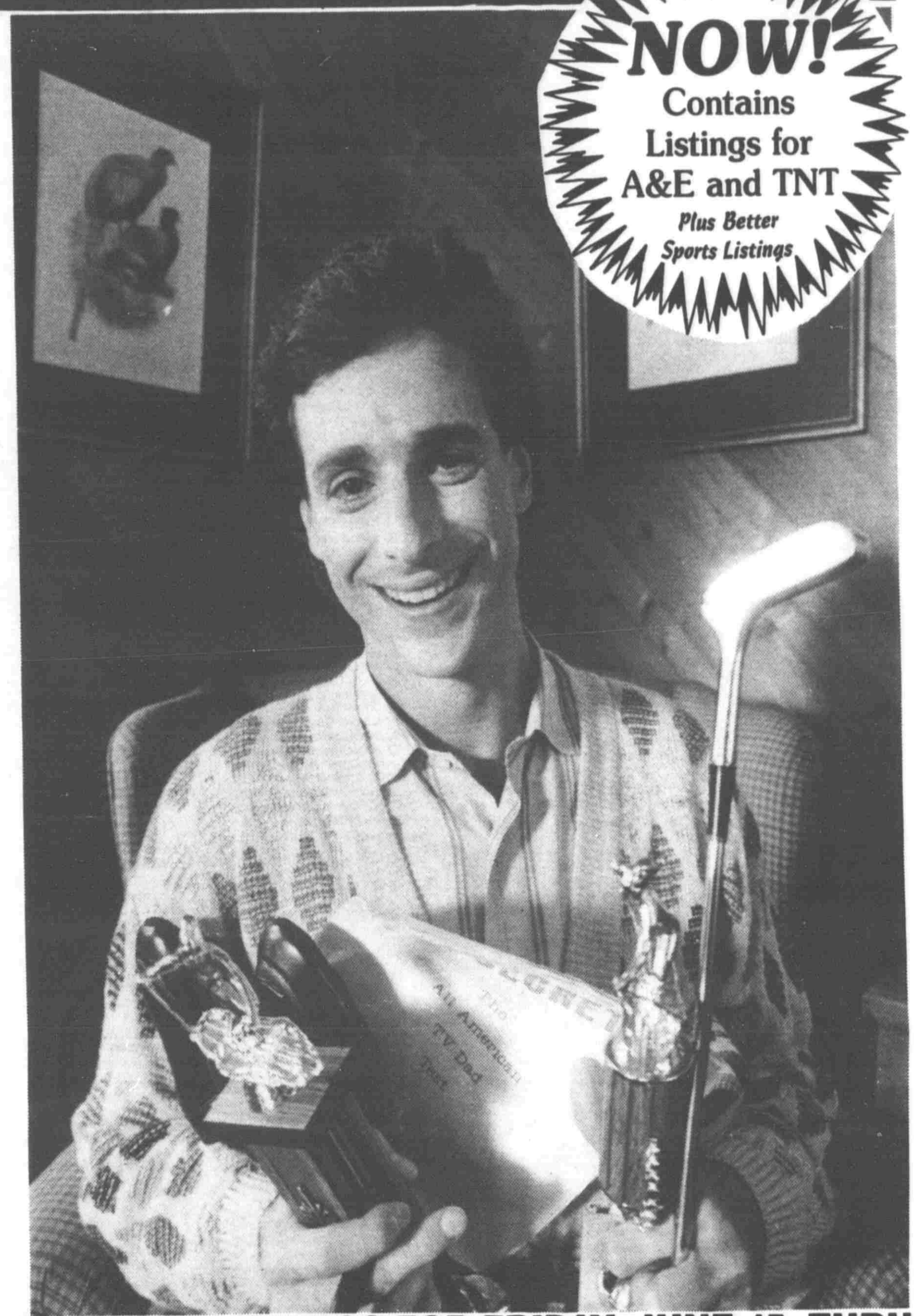

Lowell Area Schools... Board Notes

When the two-year pilot AllDay/Alternate Day Kindergarten program was first introduced to Lowell teachers and parents, it had its share of doubters.

As has been the case with most of the schools that have gone to the program, the doubters became believers and the program strengthened on its own merit as did the number of supporters.

At Monday's Board of Education meeting, Runciman/Riverside Principal Louie Dudeck presented a copy of the ADAD Spring Survey to Board of Education members and those people in attendance. The survey compared to the one taken in the fall, showed that support and approval of the ADAD program has grown.

An example of this is the 99 percent approval rate parents of children in the program gave when responding to the statement "My child's adjustment to kindergarten is..."

The response was so good in fact that some parents hinted that they would like to see an all day everyday kindergarten program.

Lowell kindergarten teachers at the Board meeting asked that Board member give this idea some consideration.

Concerns were raised about the two snow days that the Group B children had this past winter. Some parents wanted to know if the time missed will be evened out eventually. Twice the group B children went six days with no school. Parents were concerned about the gap between classes and what their child missed.

There was also concern about special activities celebrated at school that are missed by some children because it's their day off.

The kindergarten teachers on hand said they are constantly evaluating the program and looking to make it better.

Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch and the Board of Education recognized several employees for their dedicated, long and outstanding service to the Lowell Area Schools.

Recognition was given to George Dey for his 25 years as a Lowell bus driver. "Anyone who can drive a bus for 25 years deserves a plaque," Esch said.

Business education teacher Jeanne Christenson also retired at the end of this past school year after serving Lowell Schools for 28 years.

Runciman librarian Eileen McLaughlin will also step down after 27 years of service.

Dode Collins and Marilyn Bovee were also honored for their 23 and 27 years of service respectively. Collins served Lowell schools as Director of Transportation (bus garage). Bovee was the Food Service Director.

Lowell's Board of Education also adopted the 1990-91 general fund budget and the debt service fund budget.

The total revenues and the projected unappropriated fund balance estimated to be available for appropriations for the fiscal 1990-91 is \$13,021,511. Of that, \$8,248,051 is property taxes and \$3,987,560 state aid.

The projected fund balance for July 1, is \$832,196 bringing total funds available to appropriate \$13,853,707.

Expenditures are projected to total \$13,227,593. Of that, \$2,598,668 will be paid out in elementary instruction; \$1,344,487 will be paid out for Middle School instruction; \$1,622,381 will go toward high school instruction; and \$885,133 will be spent for special education instruction.

Operation and maintenance will cost the school system a projected \$1,027,688.

You will be able to count the changes on one hand, as there will be five new Red Arrow faces in some familiar athletic programs.

The two most notable changes will be in boys' varsity basketball and girls' varsity volleyball.

Mark Thomas, after spending two years at the varsity helm, will vacate his varsity basketball head coaching position in order to serve as the assistant basketball coach at Aquinas College. Thomas will be working with friend, and former East Grand Rapids coach, Rick Albro.

Albro left his Pioneer coaching spot earlier in the year in order to become the head basketball coach at Aquinas.

"It's an opportunity for me to be around basketball more, to experience more basketball and learn more," Thomas said.

Perry may also look to fill the track assistant position vacated by Laurie McMahon after the 1989-90 season.

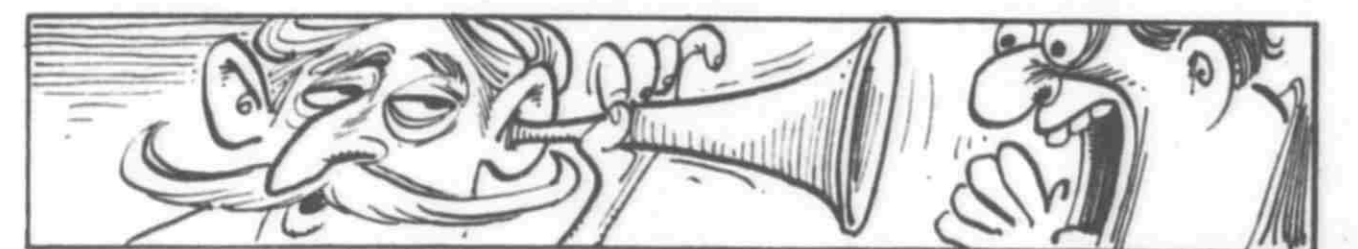

School recycling program saves some trees and some energy

In the average Lowell High School classroom during the 1989-90 school year, about two pounds of recyclable paper was discarded every day. That's more than a quarter ton per year.

Thanks to the efforts of Gary Butts and Maureen Dorough, the key word in that statement is "was."

With "Earth Day" serving as the catalyst, Butts and Dorough rallied students and teachers in an effort to make a difference. Instead of crumpling up old and used paper and discarding it into the trash can, the use of fresh paper was reduced. Paper already written on was reused, and then it was placed into a box, not crumpled and thrown in.

"We started the program in March, and the students and faculty have really joined in and cooperated," Butts said. "In those few months the high school has filled two dumpsters with paper. That is at least 1,000 pounds of paper. We've saved a few trees and some energy."

Butts said Alto Elementary and Lowell Middle School had already started the program and the other elementary schools will start in the fall.

By recycling a quarter ton of paper material, the schools will have saved 116 gallons of oil and four trees. The paper industry is the third largest user of energy in the United States and the largest single industry user of fuel oil. By recycling their paper, the schools help to keep down the cost of future paper supplies, cut the costs of current disposable needs and contribute to the health of the environment, which decreases the demand on your taxable dollars.

What the schools have started is something many more people could do, but don't.

Butts adds that the best way to fight the growing solid waste problem is to prevent it. Household recycling requires that each household take a few extra minutes and sort out recyclable cans, glass, plastic and paper. Then, take them to a nearby recycling center.

Newspapers and brown paper bags should be stacked in brown paper bags or banded. No magazines, telephone books or other paper.

Glass bottles and jars (brown, green and clear) should be rinsed and the caps and metal rings should be removed.

Plastic food and detergent bottles (clear and colored) should be rinsed and flattened.

Metal food cans should be rinsed clean, labels removed and flattened.
