Law experience is at a premium in the race for Kent County's 63rd District Court seat

Only the top two 63rd District Court vote-getters in the Aug. 7 primary election will have their names placed on the Nov. 6 general election ballot.

As the time prior to the election grows shorter, all five candidates work harder to staple a positive identification with the voters that will help put them over the edge on Aug. 7, hoping to find that key quality, unique to them, that will help lead two of the five candidates, four men and one woman, to primary victories.

The election for a 63rd District Judge takes place for the first time in two decades. Judge Joseph White announced

in April that he would step down after 21 years on the bench. White was never challenged for his seat during that time. The district over which the 63rd District Judge presides over includes Lowell, Ada, Bowne, and Vergennes Townships.

A six-year term goes with the 63rd District Court seat, along with an annual salary of \$93,812.

Candidates seeking the position are Craig Avery, David Neff, Keary Sawyer, Sara Smolenski and Gary Wallin.

Avery, a father of three, is a 1963 graduate of Kentwood High School with degrees from Yale University (1967) and Georgetown University Law Center (1972).

He has been a partner in the private law practice of Vandenberg and Avery out of Comstock Park for the past 14 years. Avery has experience in district and circuit court civil and criminal matters, probate and juvenile court cases, employer/employee disputes and negotiations, real estate matters, partnerships and corporations.

"I have experience in every type of case that has come before the district court," Avery said. "I'm equal to or better than any other candidate in education, knowing the system and in having a well rounded experience."

He added that more people are in touch with the District Court today than any other court. "The District Court requires many difficult decisions in sending people to jail. It is important in the process that people be treated in a civil manner and not rudely."

Avery said it is also important that as a judge he provides consistent, quick and fair decisions.

Neff, a lawyer for the past 20 years, began his career in Kent County, first as an assistant prosecutor, then as a research clerk for the Court of Appeals.

He currently works as a commissioner on the Worker's Compensation Appellate Commission as appointed by the Governor. Neff reviews workers' compensation cases on appeal from the trial courts.

"I believe I have the best and richest law experience of the field," Neff said. "I've been a party to and have done almost every type of work."

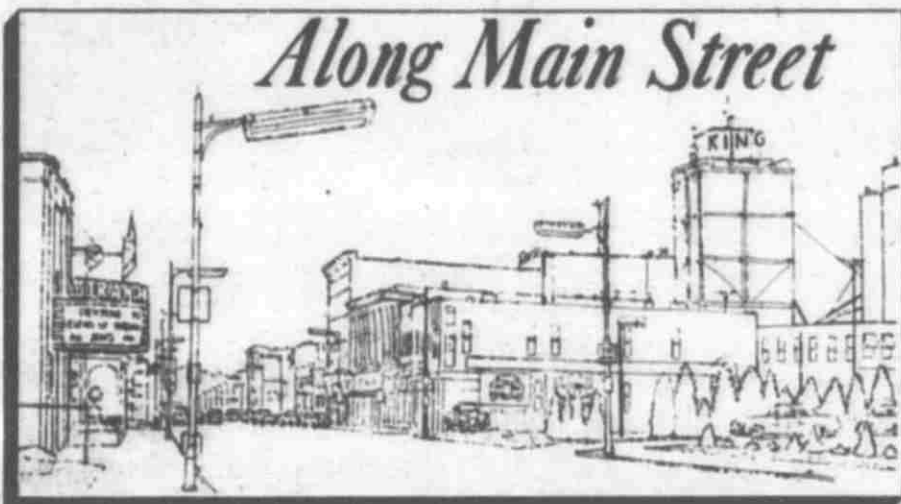
Neff said his good temperament, internal discipline and patience have spilled over into his work.

While there are glaring differences in the qualities needed to be an attorney and a judge, Neff said his current job has helped to prepare him for such a transition. "The qualities of an attorney don't necessarily prepare you to be a judge. As a Commissioner with the Worker's Compensation Appellate Commission I have had to review cases and then make a decision. I think this will help make my transition smoother."

The East Grand Rapids man said he will work hard as Judge to make sure the delivery of service is done at an efficient cost. "People are tired of the high cost because of lack of efficiency," he said. "I also believe we need to consolidate our county courts into one. Outlying areas such as Lowell shouldn't have to travel all the way to Grand Rapids. We need to decentralize. Courts need to become modern."

Keary Sawyer has 12 years of both legal and trial experience, both civil and criminal, in all areas handled by the

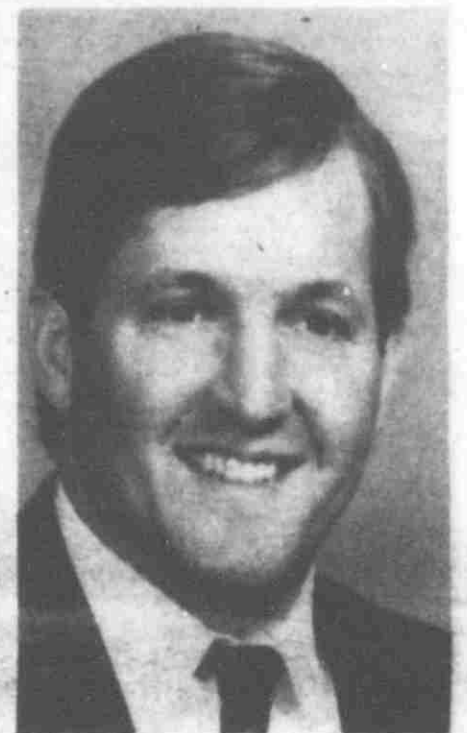

Young Lowell woman drowns in Friday morning swim with friends

A young Lowell woman was killed early Friday morning while swimming on the backside of the island behind the Pebble Beach Apartments in the man-made lake at Stoney Lakeside Park.

According to Lowell Police Chief Barry Emmons, Angela Kathleen Roll, 17, of 224 S. Jefferson was swimming with friends (3) shortly before 5:15 a.m. when Roll

swam across to the island and began swimming on the back side.

According to the report given by Kent County Medical Examiner, Paul Davidson and Lowell Police Chief, Barry Emmons, an excessive consumption of alcohol was a factor to consider in why the drowning occurred.

According to the medical examiner's report, Roll's

blood/alcohol content was .210. Lowell Police Officer Al Eckman said officials hope to learn where the youths got the alcohol they consumed prior to the drowning.

"I do not think a current or undertow played a factor," Emmons said. "Roll's mother did say that her daughter, as a youth, took swimming lessons."

Emmons added there is designated swimming in front of the island where the water is calm. "Roll was on the backside of the island, and that is where she got into trouble," he said.

Lowell Fire and Rescue were dispatched to the scene at 5:15 a.m. and launched a boat into the lake at 5:35 a.m. Lowell fireman and rescue

diver, Bob Adrianse, recovered Roll's body in eight feet of water approximately 60 feet from shore at 6:15 a.m. The Lowell teenager struggled in the water and according to officials called for help, but her friends thought she was joking.

Emmons said the one-time gravel pit now an "undeveloped park" is a popular swimming hole. "Once the park is developed, safety lines are scheduled to be put up, marking the safe swimming area." Roll lived with her mother, Josephine Florence Morris at

the their Jefferson St. residence. Her father, Bruce Franklin Roll resides at 41481 Stafford Court in Canton Township near the Detroit area.

Emmons urged young swimmers to be careful and if they are not good swimmers, to stay out of deep water. "It's not a good idea to swim at night and people should swim in groups if they do," Emmons said. "If your not a good swimmer and are out in deep water, wearing a life preserver is a good safety precaution."

The swimming tragedy is still under investigation. Roll is survived by her father, her mother, and her grandparents who live in the Detroit area.

Services were handled by Roth-Gerst Funeral Home. The funeral service was Monday at the funeral home chapel. Burial was at St. Mary's Cemetery in Lowell.

District Court. He has been successful in major litigation - both civil and criminal with over 50 trials to verdict in the U.S. District, State Circuit, and District Courts.

"I am the only candidate thus far that has put forth specific proposals to improve the District Court. I am committed to the goal of making our 63rd District Court the best District Court in the State. We should be the leader in meeting the presented challenges by jail overcrowding, drug abuse and other crimes," Sawyer said.

Sawyer says he has experience in listening and developing approaches to clients with different problems. "I think this will be beneficial in my transition from attorney to judge," he says. Sawyer's plan for excellence includes extended court hours to make the court more accessible to the people it serves; a consistently tough view of repeat offenders; implementation of an intensive supervision probation program; a fight to keep the courthouse located within the district; and settlement pretrial conferences in certain civil cases.

A former Grand Rapids Assistant City attorney, Sara Smolenski is currently an attorney with the firm of Smith, Haughey, Rice, and Roegge. She is no stranger to the legal community. Smolenski's father, J. Robert Smolenski was a District Court Judge for 17 years and her brother, Michael currently sits on the Grand Rapids District Court Bench.

"I was raised in a family where the principles of justice were important. My desire to serve the community as a judicial officer stems from my belief that I could contribute to the principles of justice. I am honest, fair, firm, competent and qualified to be an effective judge," Smolenski says.

Smolenski has received an endorsement from the Women

Lawyers Association of Michigan - western region. "I bring a blend of experience only a woman can give people."

I don't believe it is a disadvantage to be the only woman candidate. Women can be fine representatives in any role."

She says the major hurdle facing the 63rd District Court is jail overcrowding. "When jail is needed, we may not have it. How will this affect judges in their decisions? Jail is an important deterrent that is needed."

Gary Wallin has been the chief assistant prosecutor for the past four years. With his 17 years' experience as a trial attorney, and as an administrator in the criminal justice system managing attorneys and a criminal case load of 7,000, this gives Wallin more courtroom experience than the other four candidates combined. "My courtroom experience is more, or equal to, all of theirs combined," he said.

The Criminal Justice and Bar Association has given Wallin the highest rating of the candidates.

Wallin says he has worked with people, and seen the human side as an administrator. "I've dealt, lead and bared through hard times with people. I have gotten involved in family planning in stressful situations," he says.

Wallin says he will bring effectiveness and efficiency to the 63rd District Court. "In order to be effective with jurisdiction, you must use resources that can provide the best effective results."

He continues, "A judge must maximize the positive effect on the criminal and minimize the negative effect on the victim and witnesses while also being mindful of economics."

Other seats being vied for include the 12th District County Commission seat. On the Republican side Judy Harrison, and Kenneth D. Parrish, will vie for the seat along with Democrat Pater A. Nelson.

Running for State Representative in the 90th district will be Richard Hendler and Carl J. Redding on the Democratic side.

Republicans hoping to gain the seat will be Marsha Wilcox (incumbent), Larry F. Combs, David J. Baerwalde, Susan L. Morrow, Jack J. Schwab and Jack Horton.

The Grattan Township ballot will have two propositions for voters to decide on.

The first proposition will be whether to levy an ad valorem tax of one mill on all real property and tangible personal property located in Grattan Township for a period of five years from 1990 to 1994. The tax would be used for road improvements. The second proposition asks if there should be a one mill tax levied on all real property located in Grattan Township for a period of five years from 1990 through 1994 inclusive for the purpose of maintaining and operating the Grattan Township Fire Department.

Voters will also be asked to vote on a millage increase for Kent County Correction and Detention Facilities. The increase would be by 0.84 mills (\$0.84 per \$1,000) on the assessed valuation for such property, as finally equalized for a period of 20 years. The purpose would be to expand, remodel, equip, operate, maintain and defray debt service for Kent County correction and detention facilities.

Schwab making strong bid for State House seat

Republican County Commissioner Jack Schwab is one of eight candidates running in the GOP primary election for the 90th state House seat being vacated by Victor Krause.

"We're going to need experience and proven leadership in Lansing", said Schwab, 60, a veteran of

Rockford and county politics who is now serving his third term on the county board.

Schwab, elected to the county board in 1984, is a member of the county Finance Committee, Board of Public Works, Aeronautics Board, the Deferred Compensation Committee, and the Remonumentation Commit-

tee. He is former chairman of the BPW, and was chairman of the Personnel Committee for four years.

Schwab served on the Rockford Board of Education and was its president for two years. He served on the Rockford City Council for six years and served as mayor for two years.

A life long Kent County resident, Schwab graduated from Rockford High School and Michigan State University. He served as a pilot in the U.S. Air Force during the Korean War. He is a member of the Rockford Lions Club, the American Legion, and the United Methodist Church. He is Executive Secretary of the

West Michigan Oil Men's Club, and formerly served on the Board of Directors of the Michigan Petroleum Association.

Schwab and his wife, Jeanne, have two married children and four grandchildren.

The primary election is scheduled for Aug. 7.

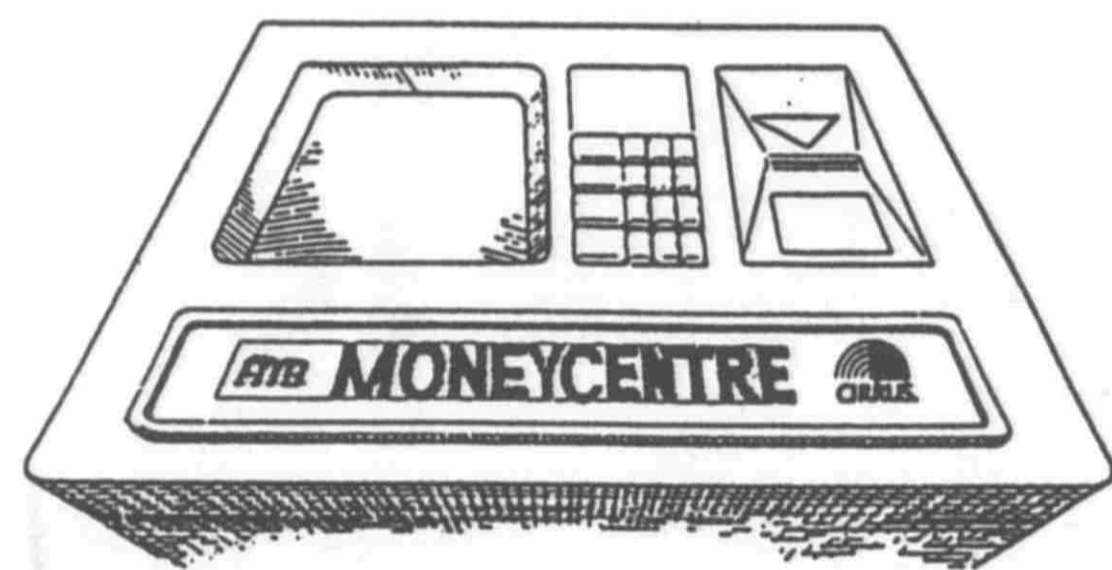

Driving by the Middle School parking lot Saturday morning one may have been inclined to believe that an accident had occurred.

There, with two crunched up cars were Lowell Fire Department (the new name for both Lowell Fire and Rescue) Lowell Ambulance, and a little while later in flew Butterworth Aero Med.

Three pretty good reasons to think an accident had occurred. But, on this day the local Fire Department was training, honing its skills - hoping practice will make them more organized, more efficient, quicker and more accurate.

Lowell Rescue Captain Bryan Kimble adds, "It's like any other skill, if you don't practice it you lose it. If you do practice, you eventually become good."

Kimble was one of 15 volunteers that showed up this Saturday morning. This training session was organized by training officers, Polly French and Tony McCaul.

"I was happy with the way things turned out," French said. "I'd like to thank Roth Towing for donating the wrecked vehicles, the people that volunteered to be victims and Butterworth Aero Med - they were on duty, but took time to help us out."

French continued, "With people volunteering as accident victims it allowed us to also practice extrication."

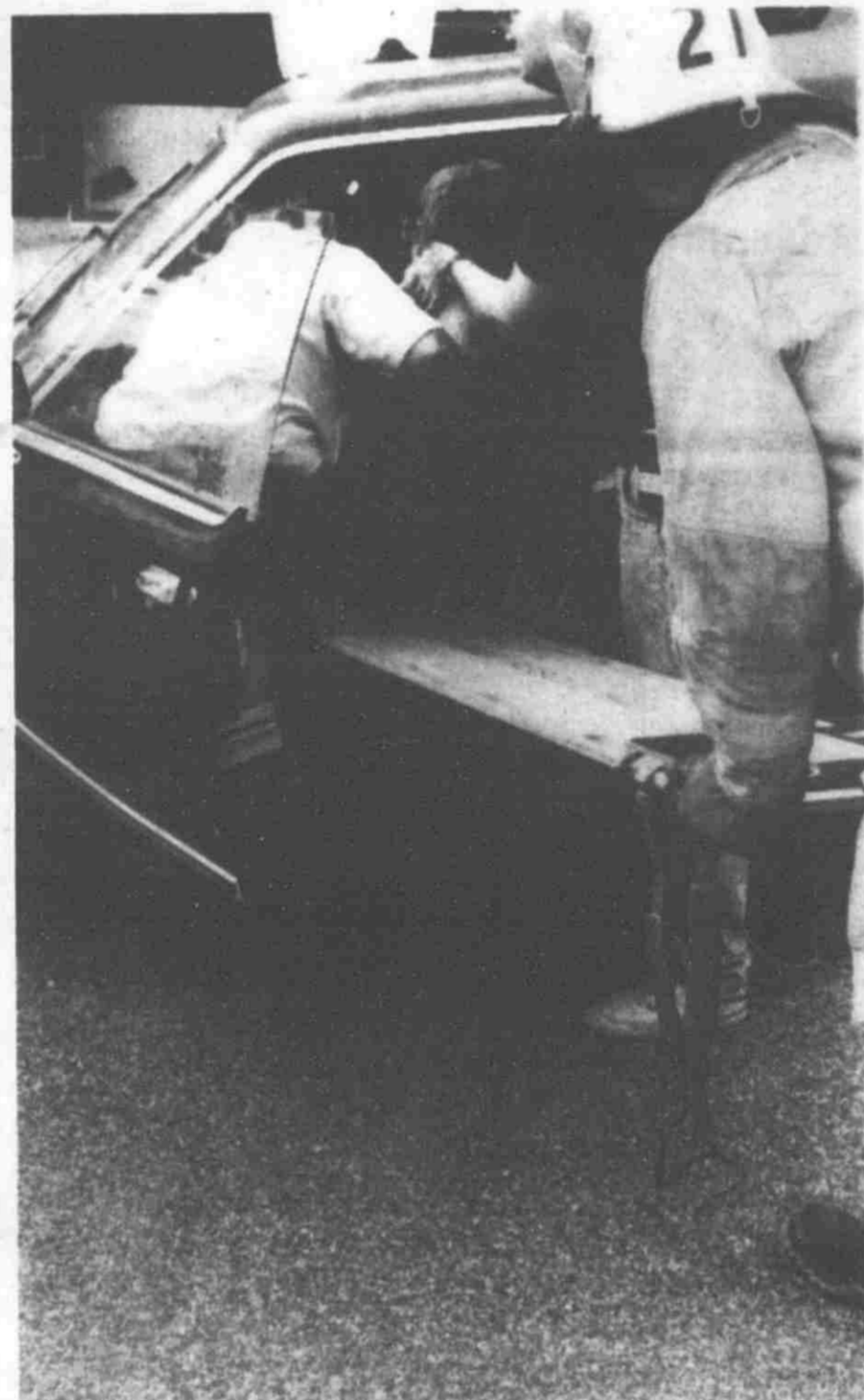
Kimble said there are no set number of practice sessions scheduled each year. "We fit them in when we can," he said.

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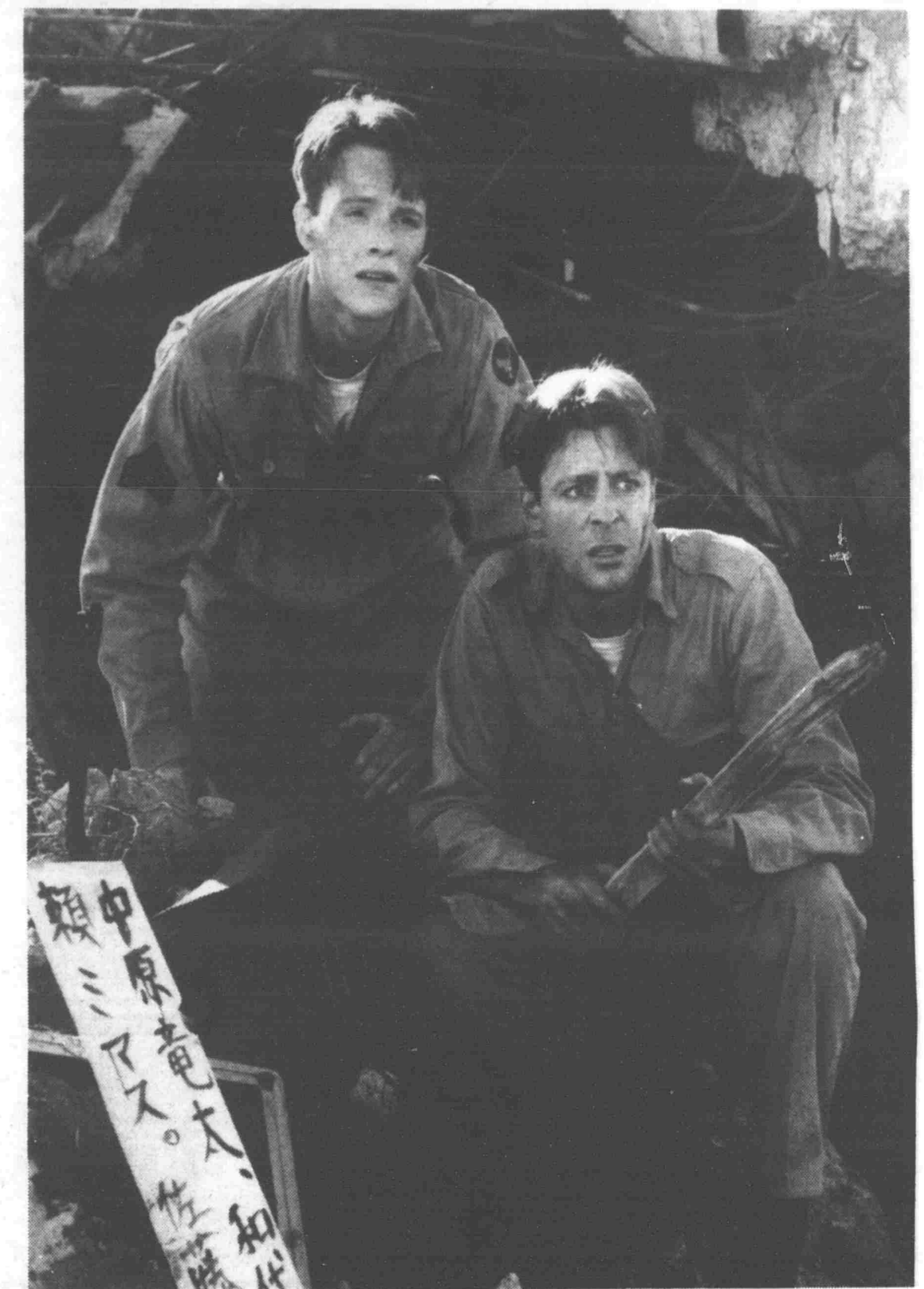

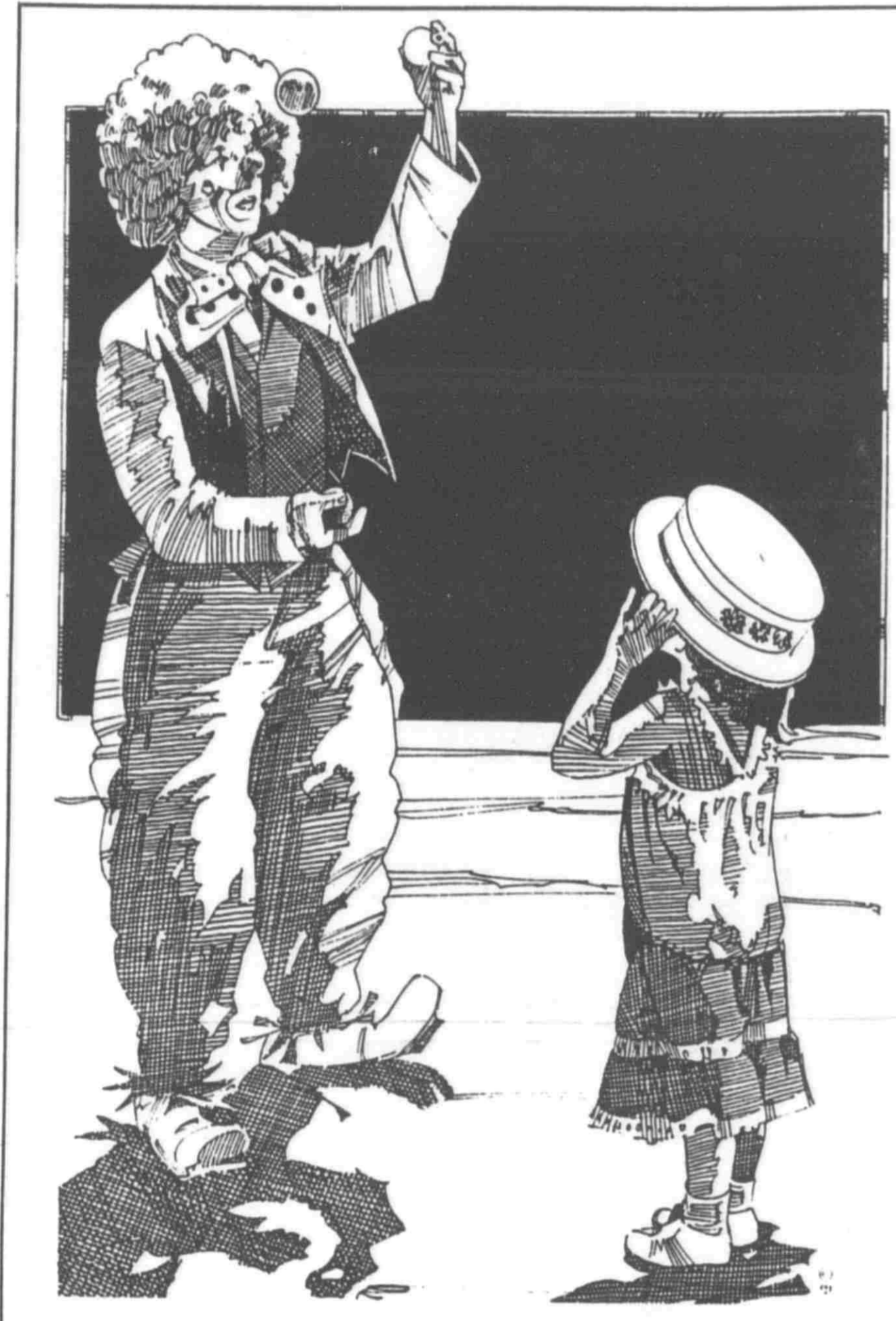

Youth Fair, Friday, Aug. 10 at 7 p.m. Barrel Bending, Two-Horse Relay Races, Speed and Action Races and many

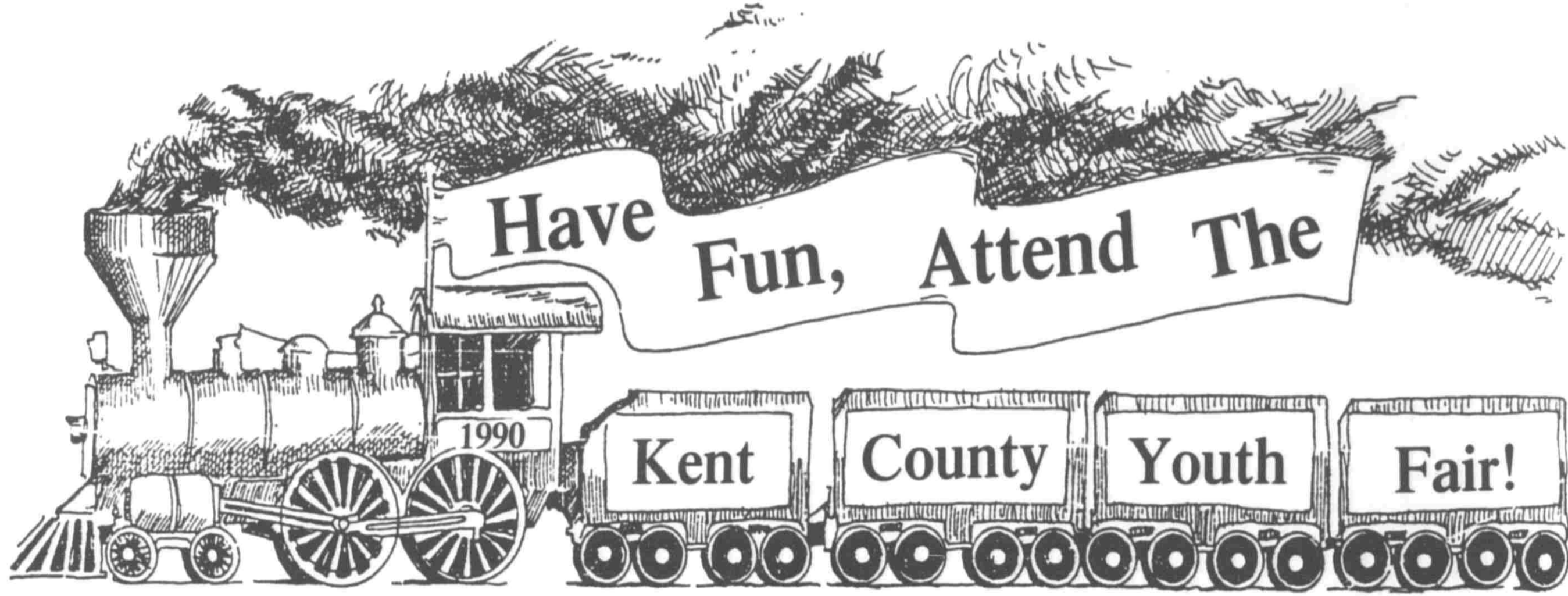
more events are featured in the Horse Arena.

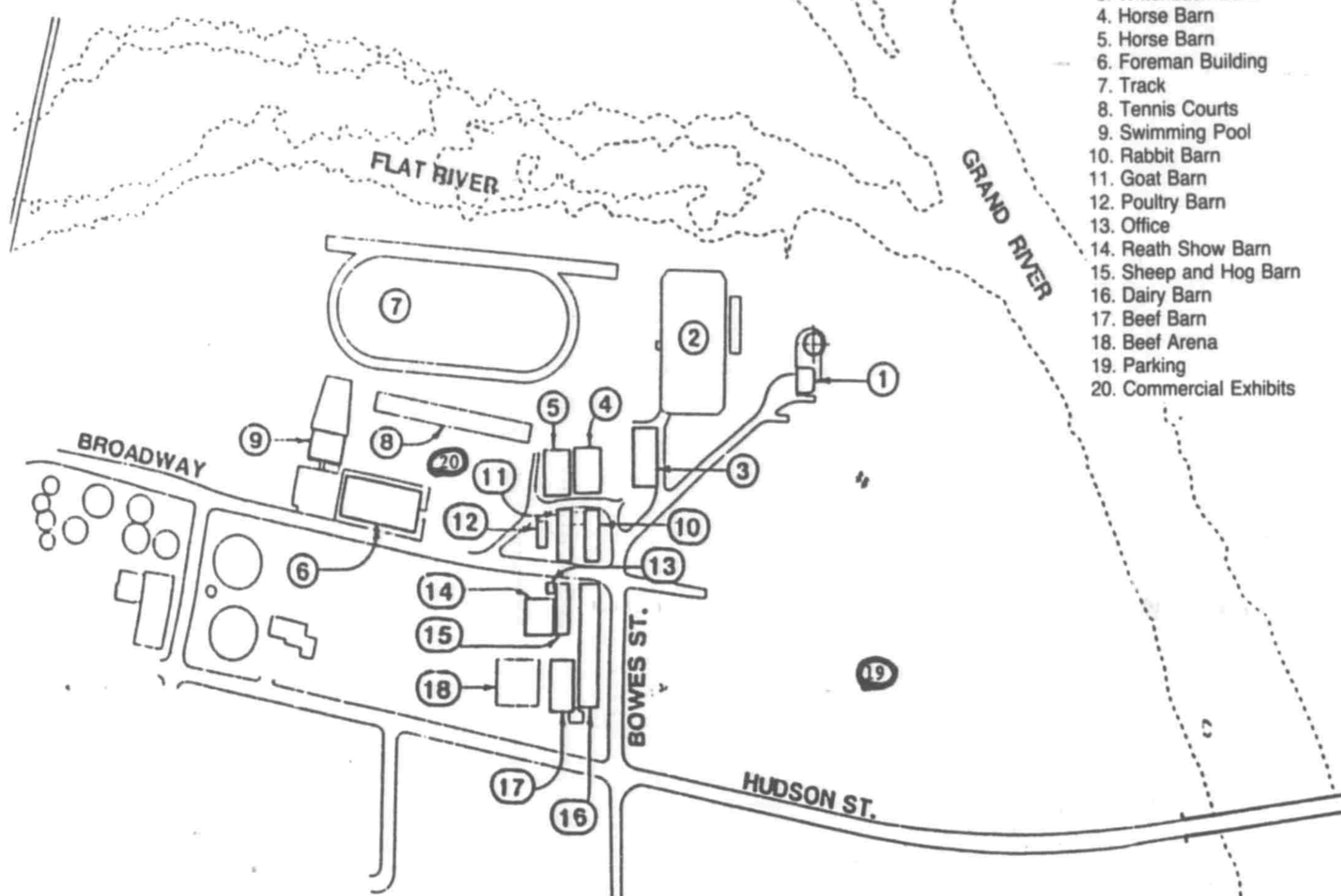

in strengthening the Franciscan Sisters' evaluation of their efforts to discover the real difference they can make in the lives of their young clients. The grant was increased by \$23,000.

The Franciscan Sisters with the help of many supportive individuals in the West Michigan area have raised

\$1.35 million of the \$1.8 million needed for the development center. There is still \$450,000 left to be raised. Sister Nagle said it is expected that sum will be raised by the first of the year. Construction of the new Child Development Center is expected to begin in 4-6 weeks.

"The support the people in

the West Michigan area have shown has been unbelievable," Sister Nagle said. "We have taken this step by step - through the township, the legal formalities, officials and to the community."

The Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist have offered educational and therapeutic services for the past 15 years

to the people of Western Michigan. These services have been located on their 212 acre farm north of Lowell as well as in Ada.

Programs have been developed to meet the needs of children, youth, families, parents, single adults and the aging individual. This unique approach by the Franciscan Sisters uses a combination of counseling, education and the humanities and incorporates the use of the land and animal care experiences on the farm into an integrated program designed to meet the individual needs of those served.

Once the new 18,800 square foot Child Development Center is completed it will be able to meet the needs of those on the Center's waiting list. In addition, the center will develop a number of new intergenerational programs combining adult day care and other collaborative programs for the elderly.

Also planned are programs to work with youth from Juvenile Court, children and families who are at risk for future difficulties, and single parent families who may need added support.

"My professional belief has always been that it is pos-

sible and necessary to integrate professional resources from many diverse areas for future development of programs for people," Sister Nagle said.

The goal of the center will be to help each person develop that "child within" each of us - regardless of age - which will help people live life more fully.

Last year, more than 1,000 people of all ages were served by the Center's programs, while others could not be accommodated due to space restraints.

"With the new Child Development Center," stated

Wege, "we will develop many new programs to meet the needs of a greater number of West Michigan residents. It is estimated that with additional space and the expansion of new programs the current number of persons served will soon double. We are grateful for the trust and support shown by the Kellogg Foundation and are excited about prospects for the new building coming together in the near future," he concluded.

The nearer we come to realizing our dream the more frightening it becomes," Sister Nagle said.

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City of Lowell purchases new dump truck

After giving consideration to four bids, Lowell's City Council followed its recommendation and awarded the new dump truck contract to Woodland International.

The City's current truck, a 1976 International dump truck, is rusting out and presently uses two quarts of oil

in fifty miles and needs major brake work.

Bids were received from Thomet Chevrolet and Buick, Woodland International, Duthler Ford, and Good GMC.

Thomet and Woodland International both gave two bids. Thomet's first bid was

a 1991 Chevy, priced at \$28,500. Its alternate bid was a 1990 Chevy (5-speed manual), priced at \$25,193.50.

Woodland presented a bid of \$30,800 on a 1991 International (air brake) and its alternate bid was \$29,265 for a 1991 International (hydraulic).

Duthler Ford's only bid was for a 1991 Ford F800 priced at \$32,78.50. Good GMC gave a bid of \$34,455.90 for a 1991 GMC.

In reviewing bids, each was analyzed by comparing city specifications to responses from each firm.

After a review, the con-

tract purchase was awarded to Woodland International's alternate bid of \$29,265. Pasquale said this most closely met specifications, in particular, in comparing the transmission, gear ratio and delivery. The transmis-

sion on the International product is as requested, 653, 5-speed (heavy duty). The gear ratio was also as requested, 7.17 (more pulling power), and the delivery would take 60-90 days.
