Academic Boosters Club formed to recognize L.H.S. achievers

Roger Wills, president of the Academic Boosters Club (ABC), sought official school board recognition and endorsement at the Monday, Nov. 12 school board meeting.

Information, such as the minutes of past meetings, informed the board that the group's main purpose is to recognize academic achievement and improvement in students as well as staff.

The group was formed in the spring of 1990 under the direction of Donn Start. Officers elected were Carol Schuster, secretary; Sue Burt, treasurer; Sue Beute, vice president and Roger Wills, president. Two fundraisers and one very healthy donation put their treasury at about \$1,600.

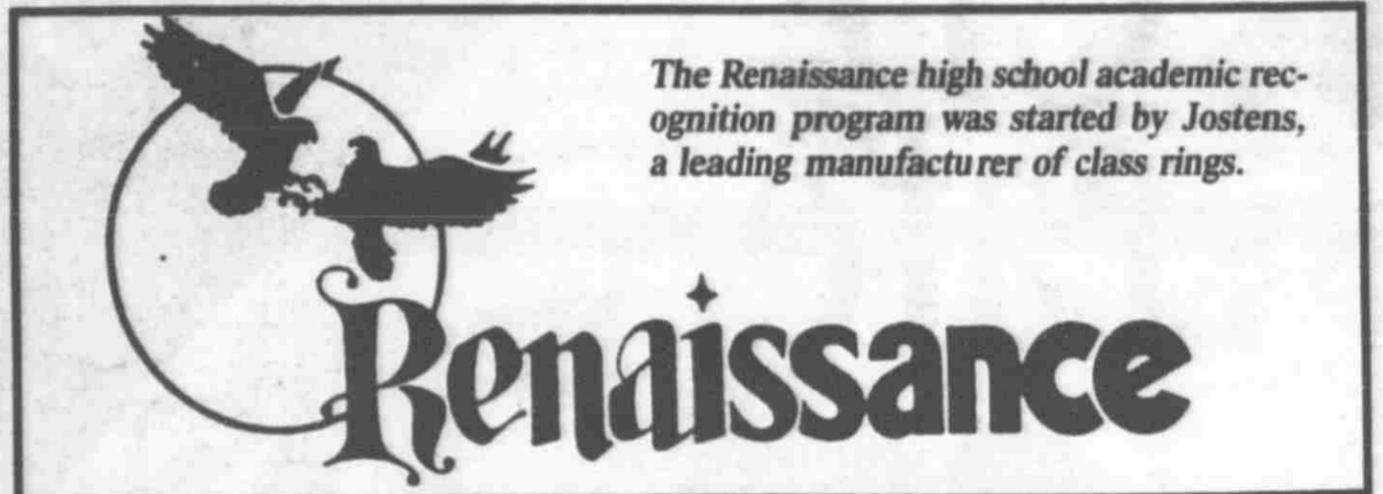
The group's method of implementing a recognition program will be through the Renaissance program. This program started by Jostens is really a concept and an attitude. The term Renaissance itself is in reference to a "re-birth" or pursuit of learning the group fees is needed today in the school.

Wills said, "There are many high schools throughout the United States which have proved that kids will respond positively when given an imminent tangible reward. These rewards are yet to be determined for Lowell High School. There could be rewards inside the school such as free reserved parking, discounts in the spirit store, free school lunch, student designed T-shirt with special school logo, reimbursement for ACT test costs. Out-of-school rewards have not been offered as of yet."

On December 5, Wills will be making a presentation to the Rotary Club about the academic boosters and the basic concepts of the Renaissance program. He hopes to show them how the community will benefit from this type of closer relationship of student, staff, parents and business.

There are many details to work out, but the club is confident that they can put some incentives in place for the second semester and move forward.

One idea they are presently working on will be a surprise pizza party for all high school students who have received A's and B's only for the first marking period. This will likely be between Thanksgiving

and Christmas.

Willow Run High School in Willow Run, MI, has had great success with this program, increasing attendance, improving test scores, and increasing scholarships earned, to name just a few examples. Perhaps the most interesting "carrot" put in front of those students is a standing offer from Eastern Michigan University of four years of free tuition to any Willow Run student who can maintain a Gold Card (high level card) for four years.

They have an interesting arrangement with Burger King

called the Frequent Flyer program. This is an attendance incentive program whereby students earn points just for attendance. At the end of the semester, the points can be used for a food voucher at the restaurant.

Jostens provides the only 800 telephone number in the United States where people can call for educationally proven ideas that can help kids in education succeed.

One of the short term goals students are presently working on with Robin White is to develop their own academic logo. She will be

offering cash rewards to the top three finalists.

A great long term goal would be the establishment of an educational foundation whereby annual scholarships could be given to students and even staff.

"As we move toward the brick and mortar of a new high school, we would like to show kids, staff and the community that learning is fun, exciting and rewarding," Wills said. "I hope this is the start of the 'building' up of people at LHS," he adds.

Lowell CATV reviews public access

With the controversy of the tape being pulled for review from the public access station airwaves, behind Lowell Cable, other questions have arisen concerning the access station's use and purpose.

An immediate concern for both the cable and the city is to come up with public access use guidelines. Lowell City Manager Dave Pasquale said it would be up to the Lowell Cable Board as to whether it would write up the guidelines or if it would delegate the authority to an advisory committee. Haines said he did not know when guidelines would be set up.

The end resolve of the Linda Taber/Bayside tape controversy after Dick Wendt, the City Attorney, spent 10 days to two weeks reviewing the tape, Wendt said in his opinion there was nothing obscene or inappropriate on the tape. "The tape is not legally objectionable," Wendt said. "Therefore Lowell Cable cannot refuse to air it based on the content."

Taber was extremely happy with the verdict, but disappointed it took so long. "I really thought the City Attorney knew they were wrong for pulling the tape and it would only take a couple of days to get it back on the air, after all the first amendment supported me," she said.

Taber's tape is currently being aired three days a week at different times of the day. "This is one of roughly 58 tapes in a series," said Frank Taber, Lowell Cable.

Air time on the public access station is available 24 hours a day seven days a week according Haines. Frank Taber added that only three hours a week are being filled. "I don't mind, it's less work for me," laughs Taber. "Honestly though, I think it is something the at the community should pick up on. It's not the responsibility of the cable company to see that community events are aired. The access station is what the public makes it."

Taber said he is an advocate of getting the school involved and members of the community involved in taping community events and meetings. "Lowell Cable has the technology to broadcast live from the school and then send the signal back to the head end to redistribute it back to the channel," he said.

Such involvement would raise the need for VCR's edit machines, cameras and modulating equipment, all of which would require money, and all of which would better help serve the community and especially the students and elderly. Shu ins would be given an opportunity to

view parades, plays and meetings they might not otherwise be able to attend.

A way to subsidize this cost according to Bernard's True Value Hardware owner, Charlie Bernard, would be through airing advertisements on the public access station. Neighboring communities, Greenville and Caledonia, both practice this. In both towns classifieds from the local newspapers are run over the public access station.

Former Lowell Light and Power Board member Ray Quada said the late Ken Ayres, former Buyers Guide owner/publisher, at one time looked into the possibility of running classifieds on the public access station.

Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch said instructional capabilities in telecommunications are there for the school in the future. Esch used a fifth-year french class as an example. "With the right technology we could link up through Wyoming with a teacher and that would allow us to offer the class," he said.

The possibilities for Lowell's cable access station are plenty-fold, currently they are are waiting to be implemented.

The couple took a wedding trip to Amelia Island, Florida and now reside in Chappaqua.

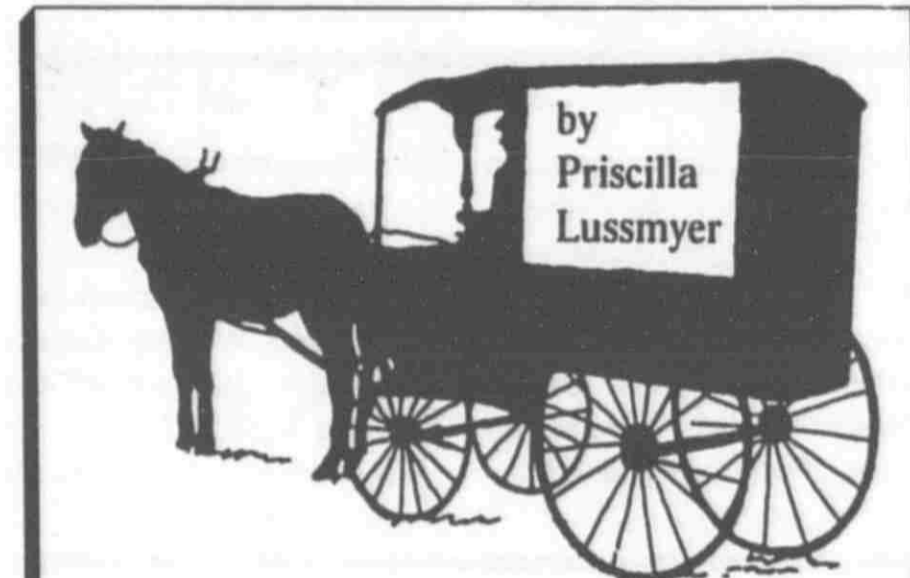

Local champion pistol target shooter Trudy Schlernitzauer rates an article in the Sunday New York Times.

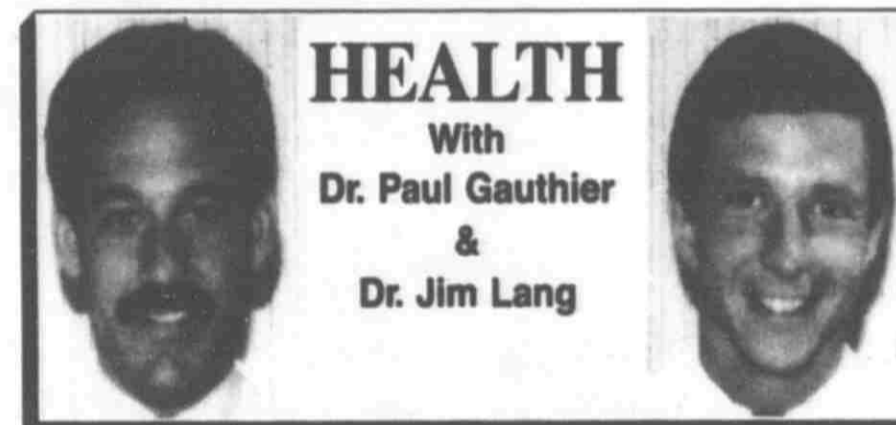

WILL CEREAL HELP YOUR BABY SLEEP?

There seems to be an age-old contention that early introduction of cereal and/or other solid foods into an infant's diet will enhance the child's duration of uninterrupted sleep. The American Academy of Pediatrics Committee on Nutrition has concluded otherwise. Until recently, much of the evidence that suggested a relationship between solid food and infant sleep patterns has been the product of uncontrolled studies. But now, a well controlled study conducted at the

Cleveland Clinic showed that feeding infants rice cereal from a bottle before bedtime does not appear to make much difference in sleep habits.

It may be that the observations that gave rise to bedtime cereal's reputation for increasing sleep time may simply coincide with the child's natural developmental process. A quote from a physician involved in the Cleveland Clinic Study states this: "About the time parents first feed their baby cereal is about the time infants, regardless of what you feed them, will start sleeping uninterrupted through the night." This study also concluded that the introduction of cereal has not related to total hours of sleep, number of sleepy periods, duration, or time intervals in which sleeping occurred. Sleeping patterns also seem unaffected by feeding method (bottle or breast).

Our conclusion from all this? While there is no proof that early feeding of cereal for your baby is harmful, there is also evidence to support its ability to induce better sleep patterns in your infant. What works best? Time.

LEGISLATION WOULD PROVIDE GREATER PROTECTION TO CRIME VICTIMS

The recent slaying of a Lansing child despite a court order issued for her protection underscores the need for two bills currently before the House Judiciary Committee.

House Bills 5403 and 5404, which I support, would make it a misdemeanor to violate a court order that was issued to protect crime victims, and allow police to arrest offenders immediately if they had cause to believe the order was violated.

Six-year-old Alisa Marie Gavin was shot to death allegedly by her estranged father, Richard Gavin Jr. Her mother, who was wounded, had initiated proceedings to have her husband punished for violating a no-contact order. The hearing was scheduled for the day following the shooting.

Had these bills been law, the prosecutor would have

been able to initiate criminal charges as a means to protect Alisa and her mother as potential crime victims. The police would have been able to apprehend the offender immediately if a criminal case were in process, even though the violation was not committed in their presence.

Too often victims are forced to live in fear because the process of enforcing a no-contact order is lengthy. Under current procedure, they must return to court to enforce the order, which requires assistance from the prosecuting attorney or a private lawyer.

After the documents are served, a hearing is conducted and the defendant has the opportunity to contest the victim's petition. If the judge rules against the defendant, the defendant is jailed until a new bond is posted.

Under the best conditions, this process can take two weeks, and in reality, obstacles such as crowded court dockets and the inability to

serve papers on the defendant can prolong the process for several months. During this time, the defendant can continue to terrorize the victim.

Tragically, it is too late for Alisa Marie Gavin, but passage of these bills could save future lives. I hope the House Judiciary Committee will report them to the full House for passage this year.

TOUGHER MARIJUANA MEASURES TO BE INTRODUCED IN STATE HOUSE.

Legislation to stiffen penalties for those who manufacture and deal in large amounts of marijuana will be introduced in the House of November.

Michigan law does not currently differentiate between possession of an ounce of marijuana or several pounds. Possession of under one pound of marijuana is a misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in jail and a maximum \$1,000 fine, while delivery is punishable by up to four years in prison and a \$2,000 fine.

This measure would establish levels of guilt and vary the severity of punishment to correspond with the degree of crime. It would make manufacturing or delivering:

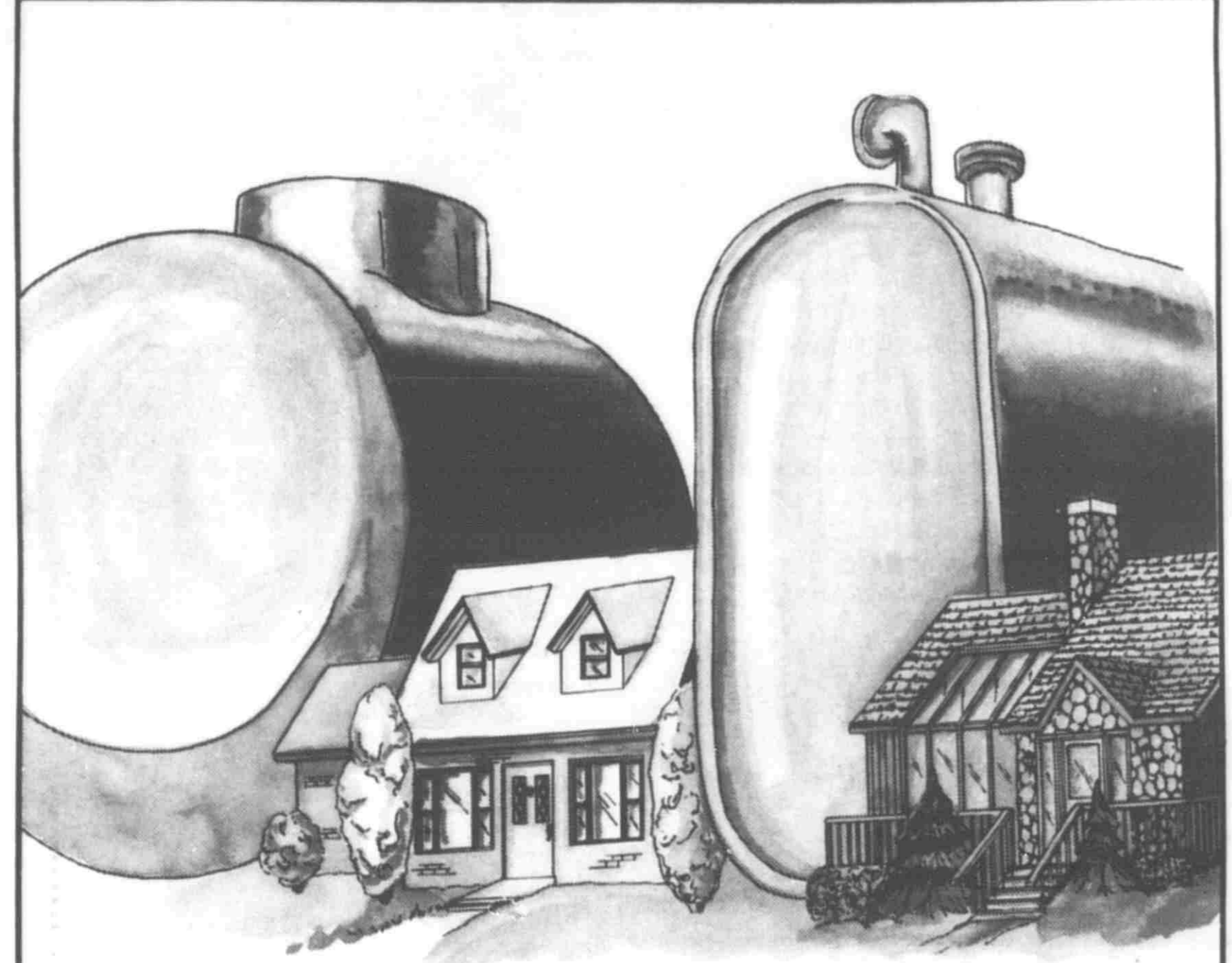

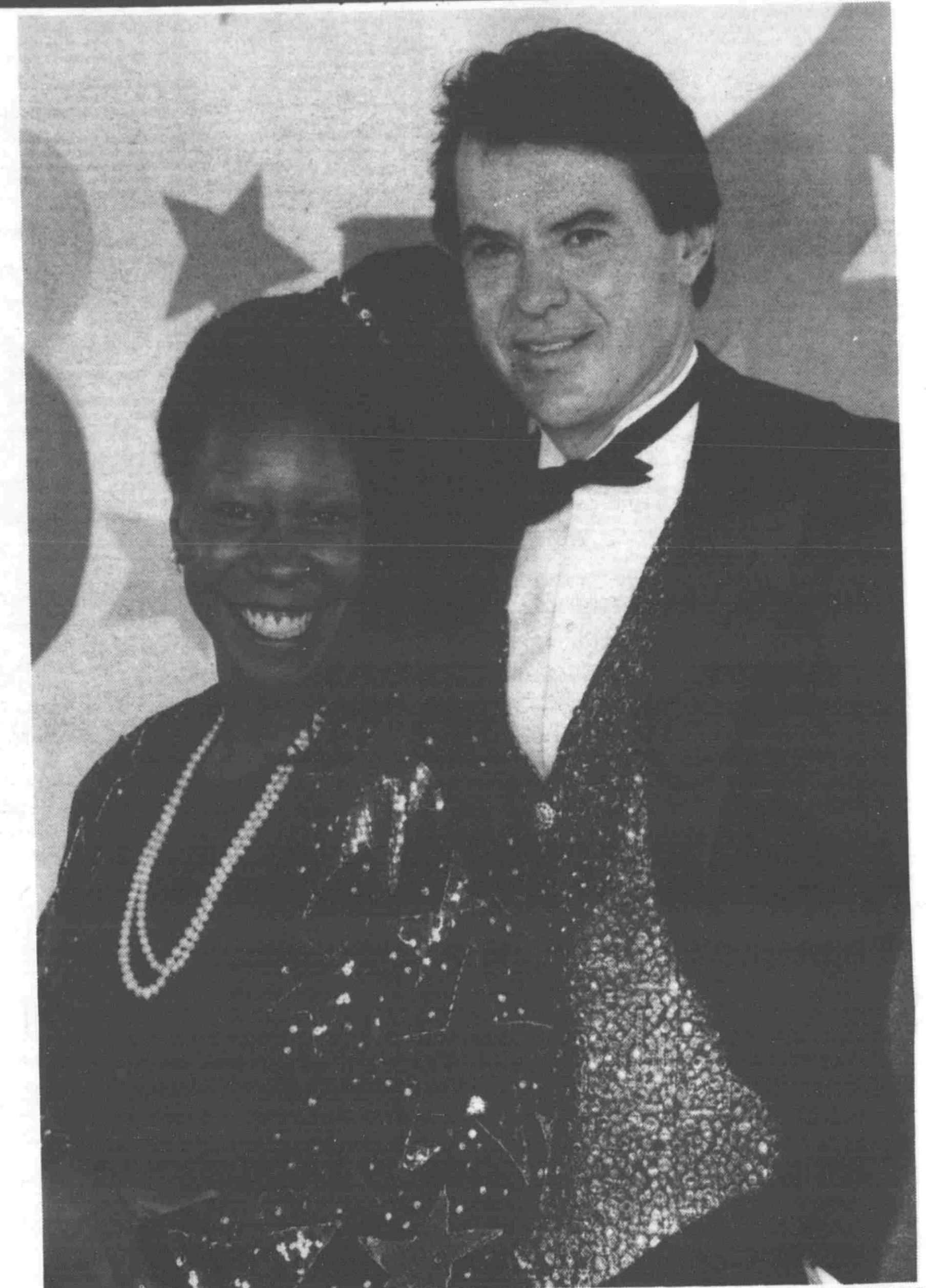

WWII ATC veteran is back in the sky

Gould Rivette rediscovers flying after 40 years

Many pilots are ready to give up flying as they reach their retirement years. Lowell's Gould Rivette is just getting started again at age 72 after more than forty years on the ground.

Rivette began flying in 1938. A ride in a 30's vintage Waco biplane captured his interest and it wasn't long before he was taking lessons at a field near Lansing while going to school at Michigan State University. Now, more than fifty years later, Rivette is back in the skies at the controls of an ultralight aircraft he purchased recently in Florida.

When the United States entered World War Two, Rivette had a hatful of ratings and was working as a flight instructor in the Flint area. It wasn't long and he was in the Army's Air Transport Command. Flying with the 3rd Ferry Group Rivette shuttled P-40, P-39 and P-47 fighter planes from factories on the east coast to ports on the west coast where they were shipped to the war effort in the South Pacific. For the return trip Rivette flew P-51 Mustangs back to the east coast for shipment to the war in Europe. "Isn't that just like the government?" quipped Rivette, "Build planes in the east that they want out west and build planes in the west that they want back east!"

Besides the fighters, Rivette also logged a little time ferrying B-25 twin engine bombers. In 1945 Rivette was sent overseas to the European theater for the final days of WWII. There he flew passengers out of a base in Scotland. When the war ended Rivette hadn't accumulated enough points to come home, so he remained in Europe into 1946.

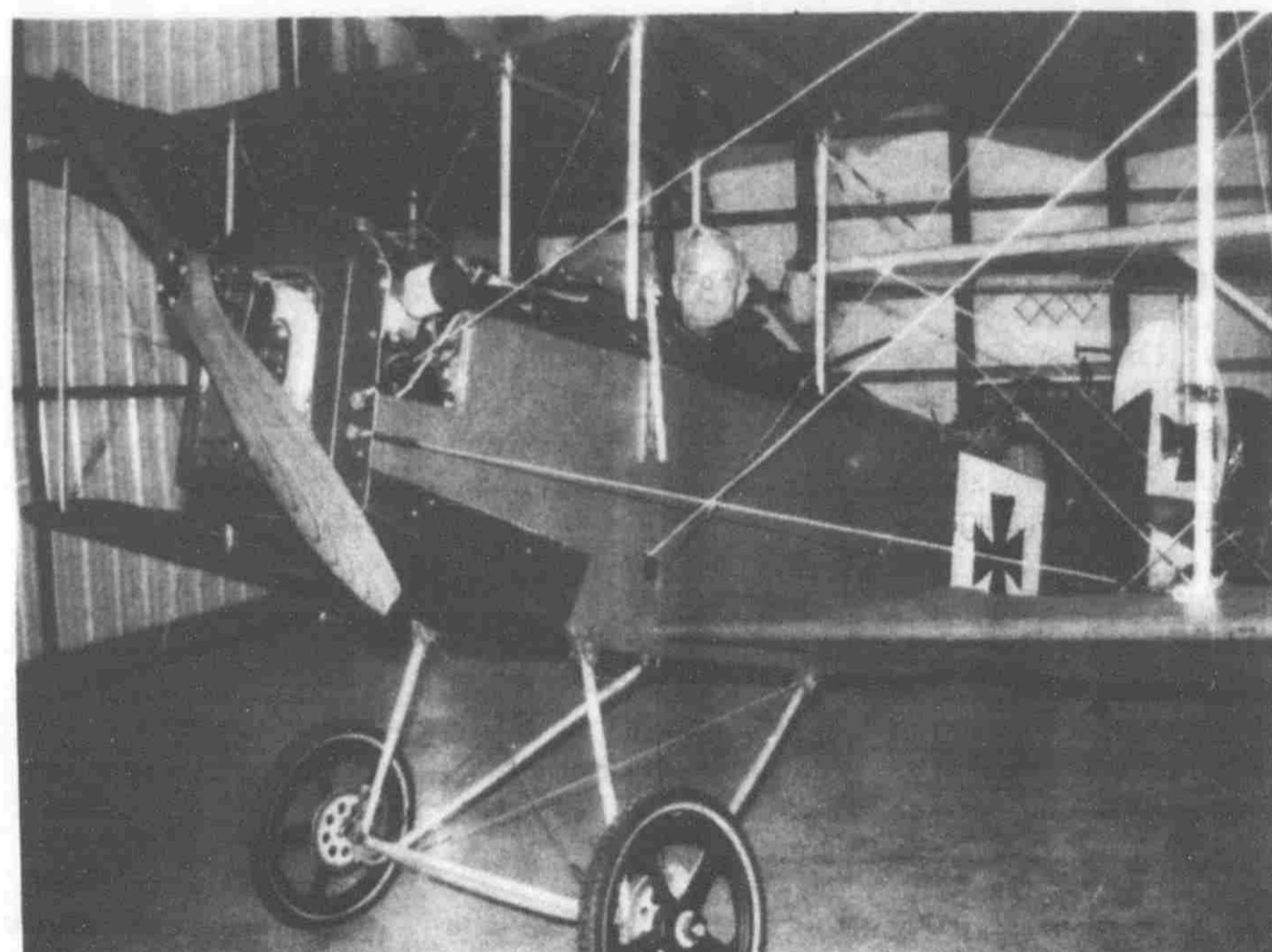
Once back home, Rivette bought an interest in a Waco INF biplane similar to the plane he had gone up in for his first ride back in 1938. Some time later the license expired on the old Waco and the partners decided to sell it. That was over forty years ago and the end of Rivette's flying until just a few weeks ago.

Rivette apparently never got aviation out of his blood, and began to think of getting back into flying as a hobby

in his retirement years. He investigated and discovered his pilot's license is still in effect.



Gould Rivette is not a big man, and it's a darned good thing because a big man wouldn't fit in his scaled down replica of a WWI German Fokker D7 fighter.

He then began to explore the world of ultralight aircraft and found that no pilot's license is required by the FAA.

Ultralight aircraft are simply defined as single seat aircraft weighing less than 300 pounds and not able to exceed 55 miles per hour. There are a myriad of ultralight designs available. Most are powered by two-cycle engines and are constructed of aluminum tubing covered with cloth. The designs vary from hang gliders to rather sophisticated craft that look pretty much like their bigger brothers.

While attending the huge airshow at Oshkosh, Wisconsin two years ago Rivette saw an ultralight that caught his eye. When he finally made up his mind to take the leap he ran an ad in "Trade A Plane" looking for an ultralight like the one that he had seen at Oshkosh. A doctor in Appalachicola, Florida answered the ad saying he had just what Rivette was looking for.

The ultralight is a scaled down replica of a Fokker D7, a WWI German fighter plane. It is powered by a 45 horsepower Cuyuna engine, a

far cry from the 2,000 horsepower P-47 Rivette flew in WWII, but enough to get him back in the air. The aircraft is painted red with a little white trim and bears black Iron Crosses on the fuselage, tail and wings. With a little imagination you can almost visualize Baron VonRichtofen at the controls.

After a few phone calls and receiving pictures of the plane, Rivette talked local pilot Greg VanStrien into flying him to Florida. Rivette and VanStrien made the trip in a Piper Tri-Pacer recently restored by VanStrien.

VanStrien was a little less than thrilled with the condition of the little biplane, but Rivette fell in love. After more than forty years Rivette was back at the controls of an airplane when he took it for a spin around the Florida skies. Even a little mishap after his landing couldn't sway his decision. A problem with the ultralight's brakes caused Rivette to taxi into the

wingtip of VanStrien's newly restored airplane.

Undaunted, Rivette closed the deal and packed the craft into a rental truck and headed for Michigan. VanStrien taped up his wingtip and headed home too.

Once home, VanStrien helped Rivette reassemble the little Fokker and tweak up some mechanical problems that were of concern. It's likely that particular attention was given to the brakes.

Rivette was able to log a half dozen flights in the little open cockpit craft before the weather turned cold and nasty. He says he's looking forward to giving his little biplane a lot of tender loving care during the winter months and taking back to the skies in the spring. But, if the air should happen to warm just a little, don't be surprised if you hear the whine of a two-cycle engine overhead and look up to see Lowell's very own "Red Baron".

Heather Nauta, a 1989 graduate of Lowell High School, daughter of Gay and Vern Nauta of Ada, is a member of the Western Michigan University Sky Bronco Precision Flight Team. The team took second place in the 1990 Region III competition of the National Intercollegiate Flying Association. The team also took first place for safety in the competition, which was held Oct. 24-27.

The Sky Bronco's second-place finish qualifies them for

the national competition in Louisiana in May.

WMU hosted the regional competition, in which teams from six schools competed. The team from Ohio State University took first place. Also competing were teams from Ohio University, Bowling Green State, Kent State and Northwestern Michigan College.

The competition included both flight and ground events.

Flight events include precision landings, navigation

exercises and a target drop in which each pilot makes two attempts to hit a ground target from the plane with a balsa wood container.

Ground events include "preflighting" (finding within 15 minutes abnormalities rigged by certified mechanics) and aircraft simulator runs.

Competitors also take a computer accuracy test, an electronic flight computer test, and a test on regulations.

The WMU team has placed first or second in regional competitions for the last 20

years and won the national event in 1983.

This year's team has 14 members, chosen from 35 hopefuls. The selection process involved ground and air tests similar to the ones held during the regional event. Team members have practiced every Saturday and Sunday since the beginning of the semester, and each pilot has spent about 100 flying hours preparing for the competition.

Nauta will receive a bachelor's degree in aviation technology in April 1993.

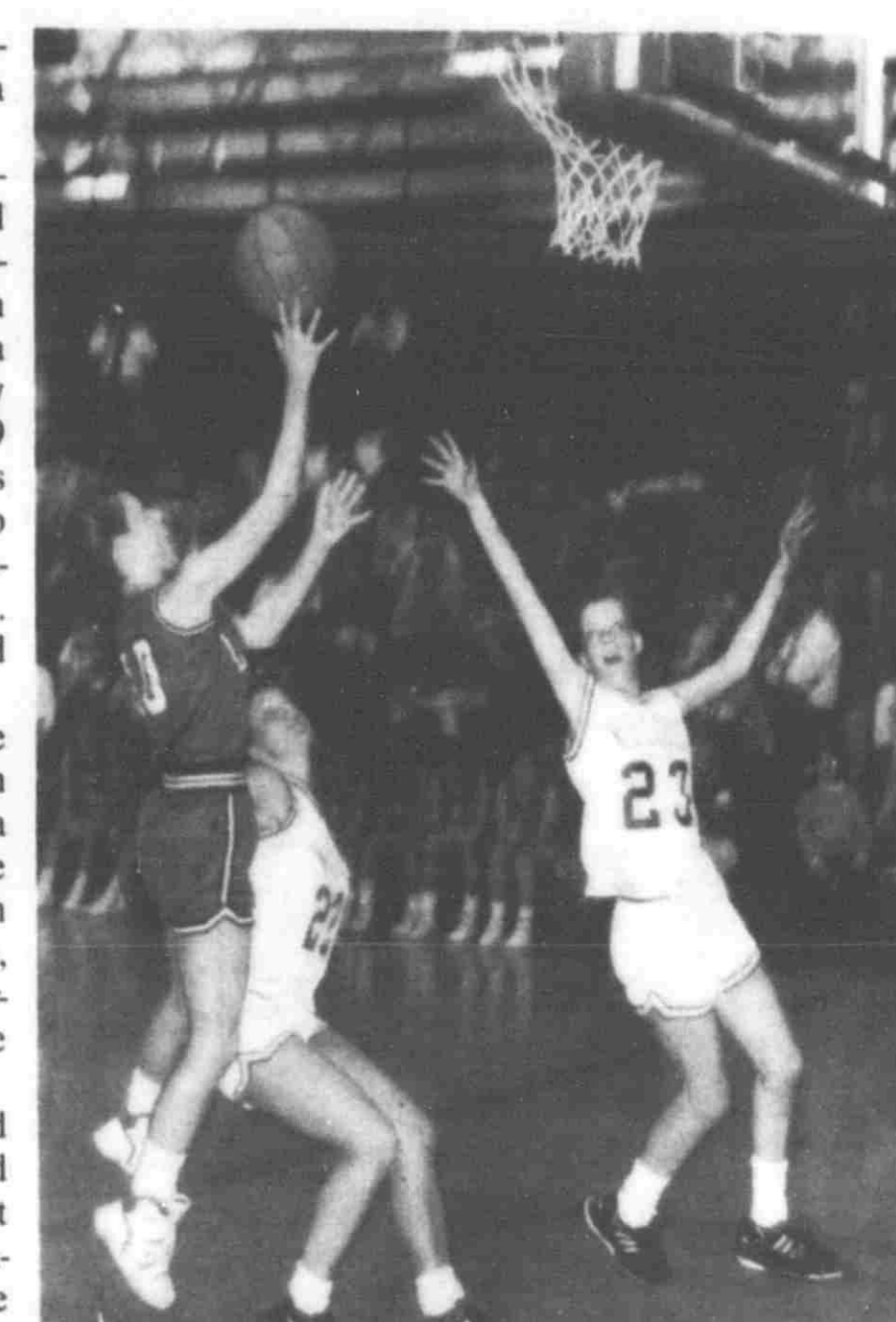

senior on their eleven girl roster. Look for them to go a long way.

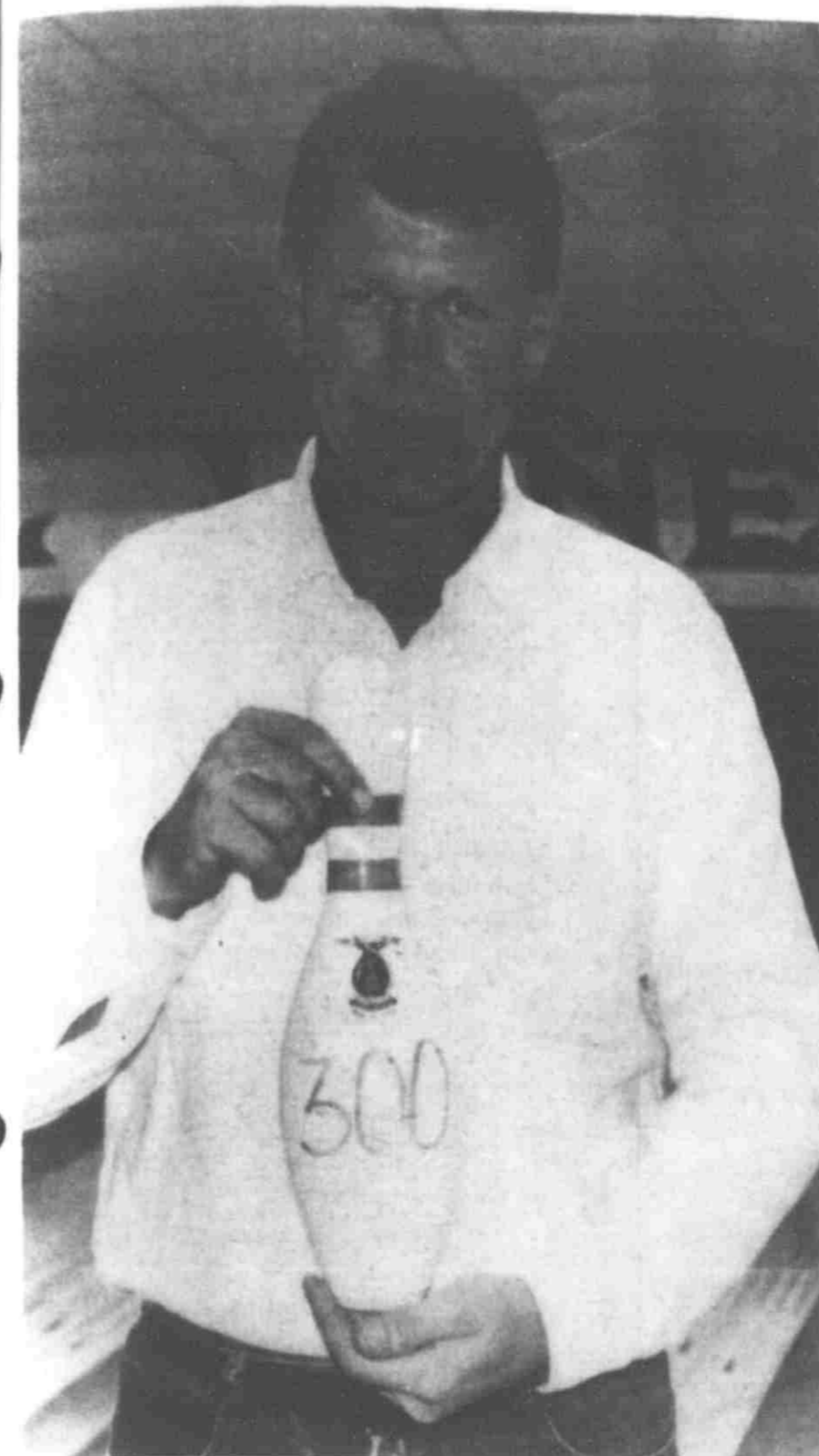

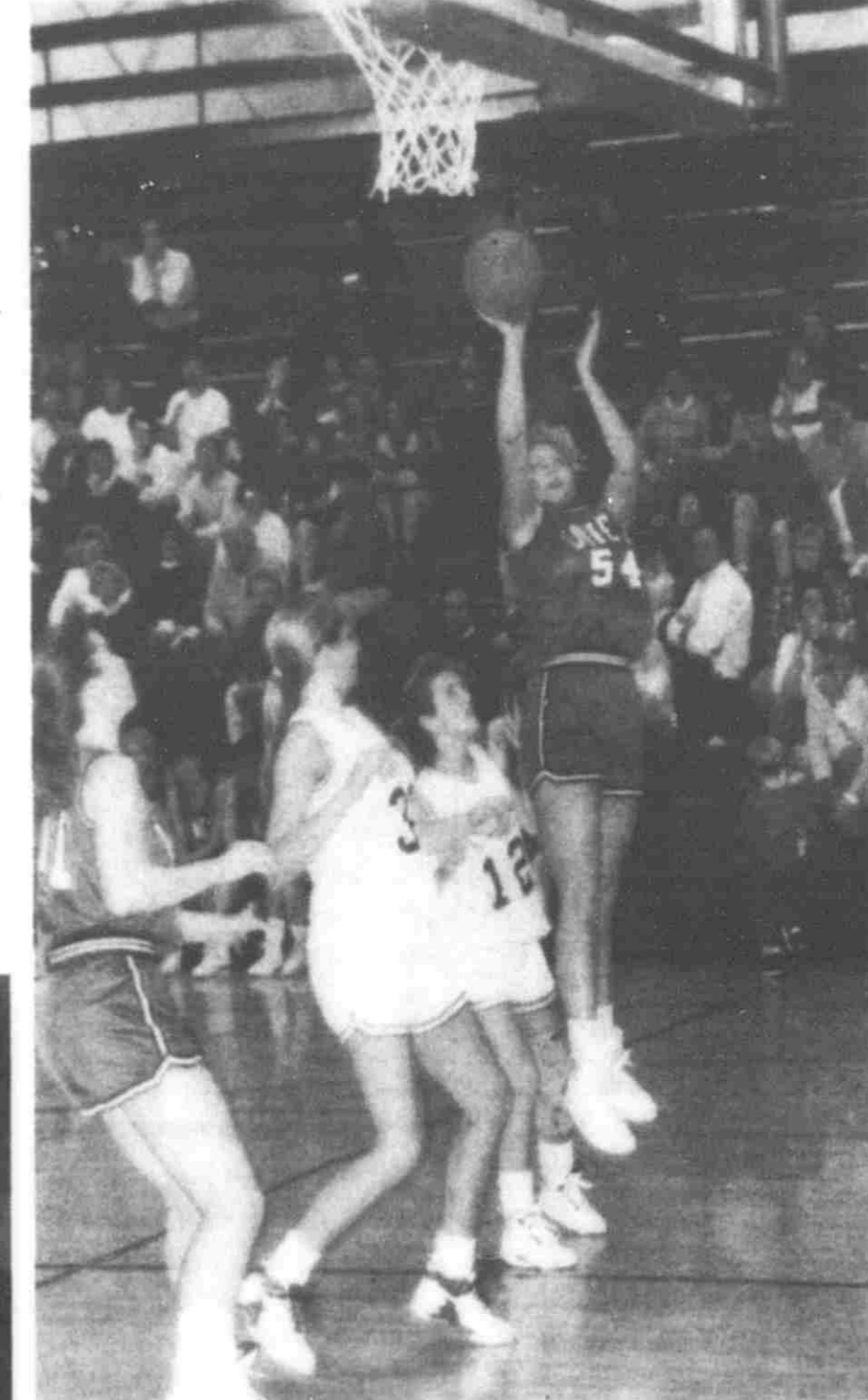
McIver rolls a "300"; Groenwegs win cash in Moonlight Madness

Lowell City Council will wait to move Main St. trees
