Township Recreation Committee prepared for Jan. 17 public hearing

A five-year plan to give direction in developing recreational facilities in Lowell Township will be the topic of conversation at a Jan. 17 presentation to the Lowell Township public by the Lowell Township Recreation Committee.

The plan presents an evaluation of Lowell Township's recreation opportunities and needs. It considers the existing facilities in and around the township, the anticipated demand for additional or improved facilities, and the means for providing those facilities during the course of the planning period.

The plan would call for the development of two new parks over the next five years. The proposed sites would be the Eastgate sub-division and along the Grand River. The Eastgate facility would be a neighborhood park, encompassing a playground for children and picnic areas. The proposed park site along the Grand River would provide nature trails, boat access and a fishing dock.

Donald Dubbink, Chairman of the Lowell Township Recreation Committee, said once the parks are developed then there could also be additional growth. "The type of growth would be dependent upon what the people wanted," he said. "There has been much talk about a bike path along Grand River Drive. There may also be a need for soccer and softball diamonds."

A major component of this planning process was the distribution of a citizen's survey that encouraged public input and gathered public perceptions of recreation needs in the Township. Based upon the information gathered for this document, a plan for future recreational improvements was established, including goals and objectives, priorities for development, and methods for plan implementation. "In order to participate

in federal grant money the Township is required to put together a recreational plan," Lowell Township Supervisor John Timpson said.

While the draft of the recreational plan was started prior to September, the final draft was finalized two weeks ago.

Dubbink said the Township has experienced substantial growth in recent years and is expected to experience continued growth pressures. "The attraction of Lowell Township's rural living and its direct highway link with the Grand Rapids Metropolitan Area will continue to encourage rapid residential growth and a demand for recreation opportunities," he said.

Timpson added that the recreational land sought, is not land that could be used for agricultural or business. "I don't expect adverse comment. The development of parks in the Lowell Township area will cut down on the travel distances people have to go currently to find a recreational area," he said.

The recreational plan states that Lowell Township has an unique environmental character created by a combination of water resources, steep and rolling terrain, woodlands, and scenic countryside. The planning process assesses community characteristics; to determine and describe existing and future recreational opportunities; and to serve as a recreational resource for Lowell Township and Kent County.

"While the rural setting in itself offers a form of passive recreation, there are other needs to be met," Dubbink said. "Active, as well as passive, recreation opportunities must be made available within the Township in relative proximity to the people being served."

Abby Vos visits "Another World" No, not the fictitious soap opera

It was a different world than what six-year-old Abby Vos is used to.

It was a world, quite frankly, that her youthfulness did not know existed.

It was a world that created memories she will not soon forget.

Vos traveled with her grandparents, Manuel and Alice Campos, and cousin, Lenna Tompkins to the unsettled world of El Salvador. From there, they flew to the serene world of Costa Rica.

The trip commenced on Nov. 28 and concluded on Dec. 13. In between, Vos experienced the vastness of the Pacific Ocean, the harshness of a country's inner conflict, political unrest, and the immense difference in cultures.

"We did not realize or even imagine just how unsettled things were in El Salvador," said Vos' mother, Emily.

Abby saw young children walking around with guns. She heard bombs explode in close proximity to where she was staying (her great Grandmother's).

Her Grandmother Alice Campos explains, "Rebels are trying to overthrow the government. They claim to be fighting for the people, but they don't have the support of the majority of the

people." Campos adds that United States' labor unions send money to the churches in El Salvador to help the people, but the rebels take the money from the churches. "This has been going on for the past 10-12 years. It is the rebels that are killing people

not the government."

Abby and Lenna spent much of their time playing in their great grandmother's house. Abby's fondest memory of El Salvador was her visit to the Pacific Ocean. "I collected sea shells," Vos explains as she holds up a jar

of shells.

Manuel and Alice Campos visit their families in El Salvador and Costa Rica twice a year. "It's nice to be able to visit family, but we would not want to move back,"

Bardwell asks City for Grove St. vacation - City's decision due Feb. 4

A decision as to whether or not half of Grove Street between Main and Avery Street should be vacated was held off until the Lowell City Council receives a report from the City Auditor.

At a public hearing last

Monday night, Harry and Carol Bardwell, owners of Roll Away, Ltd. at 805 E. Main, requested that the west half (33') of Grove between Main and Avery be vacated.

Bardwells noted that this portion of Grove is not within the paved roadway and lies within a grassy area that they have maintained.

City wants to straighten out the right-of-way issue on Grove. "We want to make sure we have the proper recordings of right-of-way, and we're working with the county for clarification," he said.

Lowell's City Manager said there is currently 33 feet

of right-of-way. The City would like 50 feet.

Bardwell said since he is maintaining it, he would like to have ownership.

The council deferred all action until the Feb. 4 meeting, giving the City time to do some research.

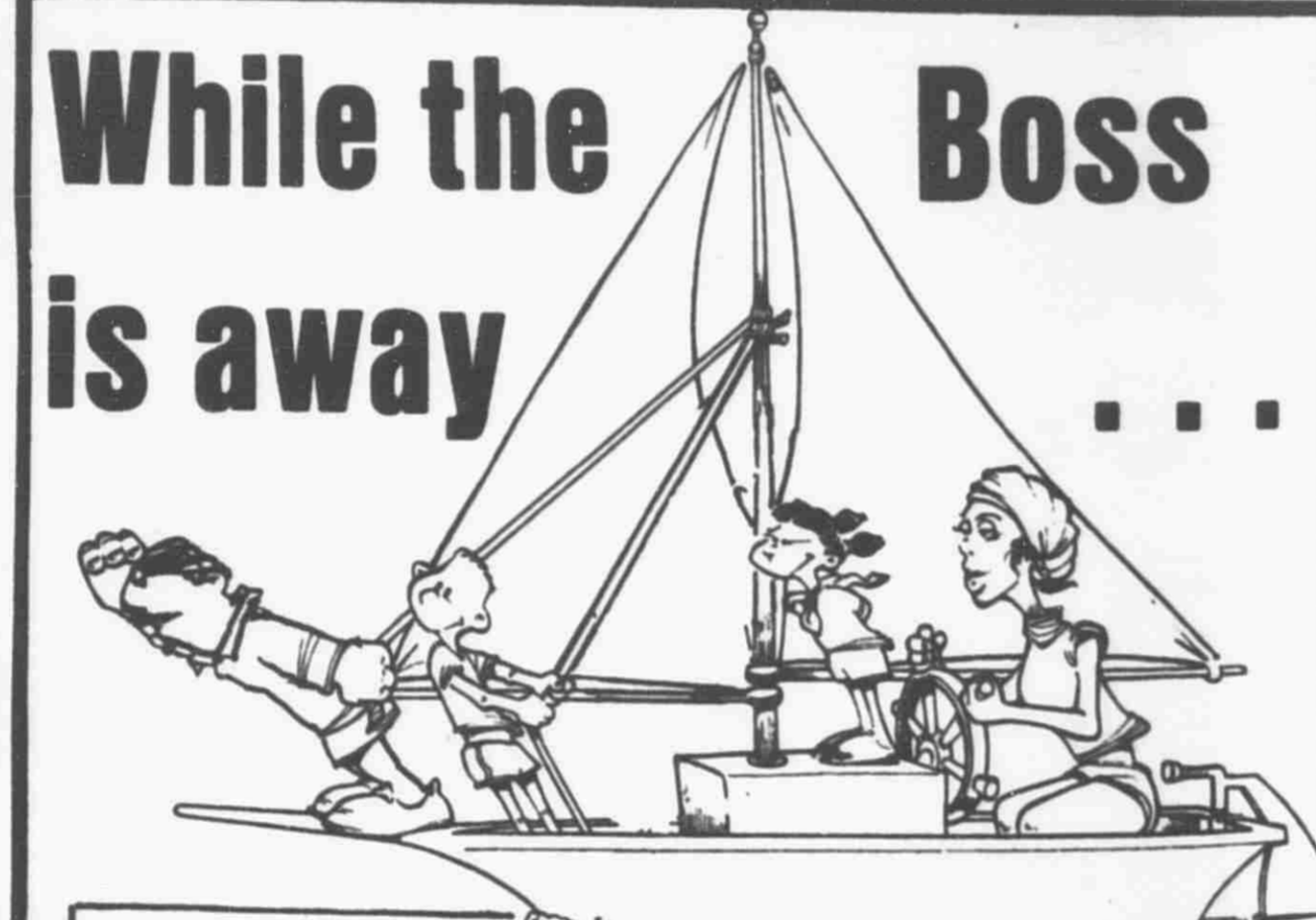

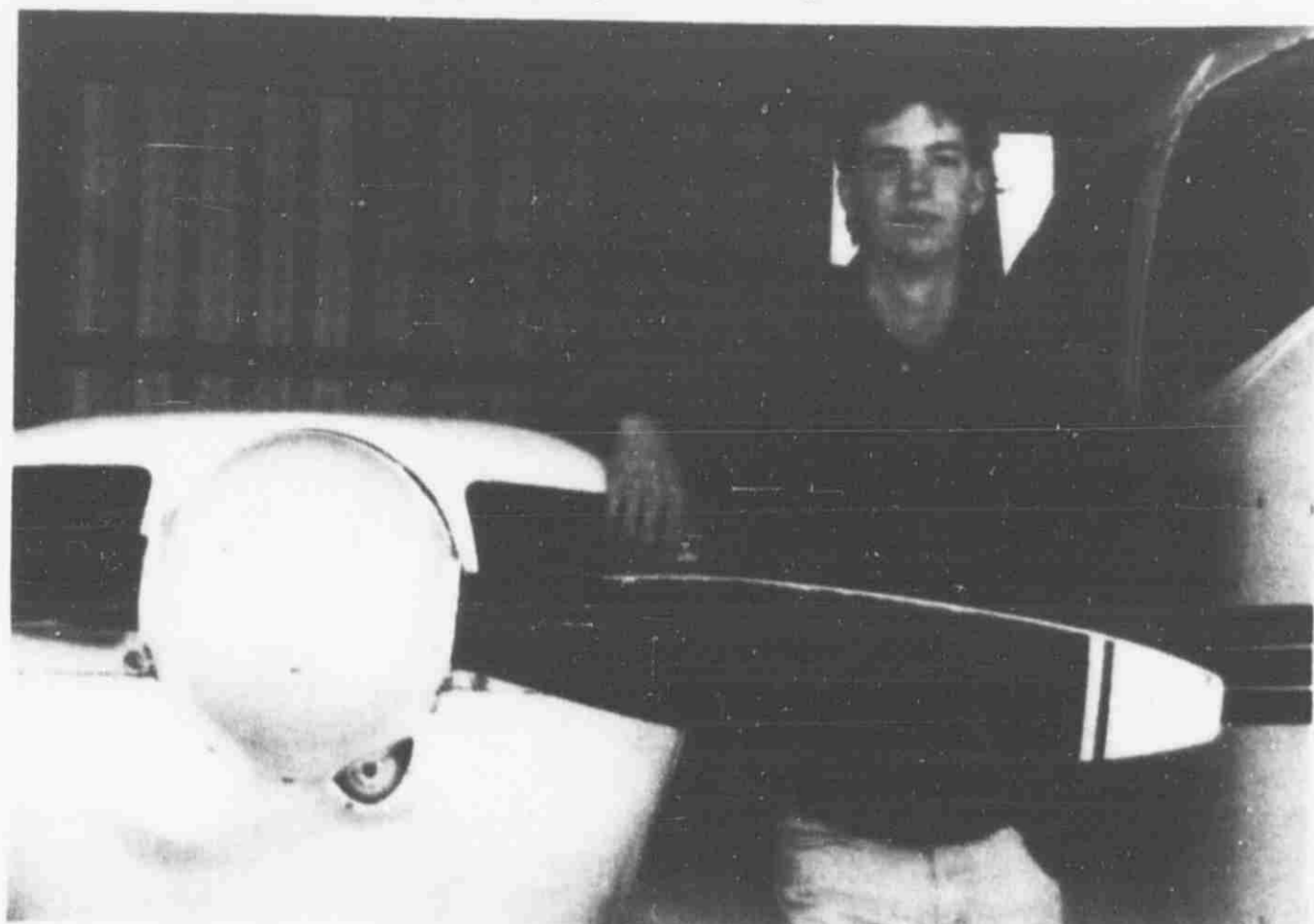

Lowell aviation youth works for commercial pilot's license

The Florida Keys today, San Diego Friday, and Chicago on Monday. It sounds great, but for many, sounds great would stop with the price of plane fare.

Jason Spoor, an 18-year-old Lowell High School student, is looking to correct all of that. His plans don't include being flown to the Keys, instead he wants to fly himself to the Keys.

"There's nothing more appealing than having the United States at your fingertips," Spoor said.

The Lowell senior, first started training for pilot duty at the age of 15. That was easy. His father, Michael, was a full-time flight instructor. He now freelances. Jason earned his private license at the age of 17.

"Yes, it was difficult. For a 17-year old it was something else," Spoor laughs. "The practical part of the test was harder than the written. With the written part of the test, no one is talking to you or asking you questions."

Spoor is currently working

on his commercial license, his multi instrument rating and his instrument rating. He expects to have all three by sometime in February. The commercial and instrumental require both practical and written tests. The multi-instrumental requires just a practical test. The tests are given by a designated flight examiner.

Along with passing the tests, Spoor also needs 250 hours of flying time. He has logged 176 hours of flying thus far in a Cessna 152. Of those 250 hours, Spoor must put in 50 hours of cross country time and 100 hours of pilot-command time.

In June of this year, Jason started working for the flight department at Federal Armory. He works the line in pre-flight, examining the systems, and making sure everything works.

This summer, Spoor has aspirations of working for Central Aviation out of Pontiac. "The company flies freight all over the Eastern

United States," the Lowell senior said. "Working for Central Aviation will allow me build up flight hours which I'll need to move on."

In the fall Spoor has plans to attend Gran Rapids Junior College. He hopes to transfer to Southern Illinois University where he will be able to earn a degree in aviation administration.

"That should allow me to find a job in corporate aviation," Spoor said. "That's the place to be."

What was it about flying with his father at the age of 15 that grabbed hold of Spoor and made him decide aviation was his future? "Believe at first it was a thrill none of my friends could do," Spoor said. "Now, the speed of flying has intrigued me."

Spoor's dream is to some day run a fixed base operation which would include chartering flights and repairing airplanes. "That would be the ideal job for me," Spoor said.

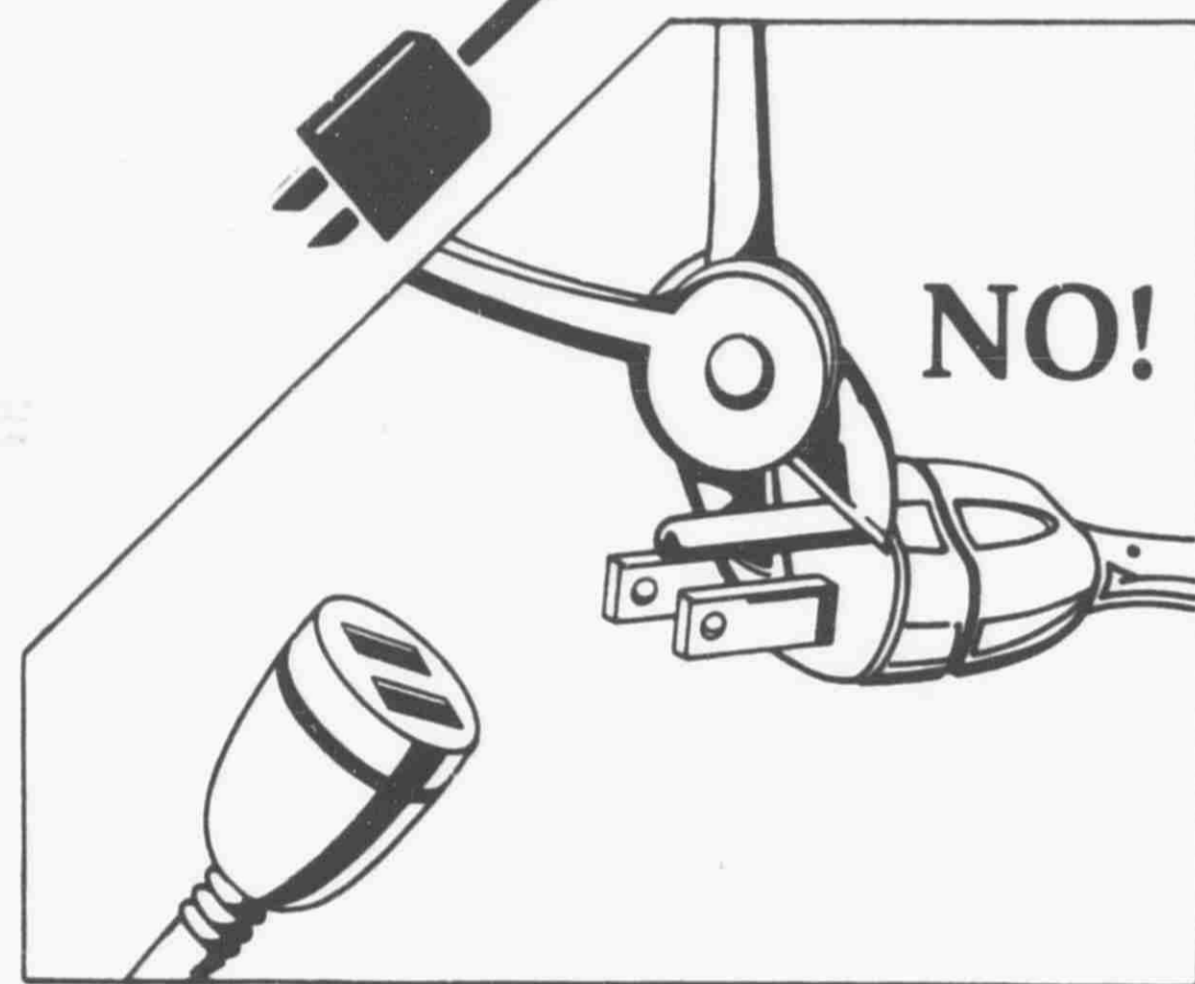

City approves change orders

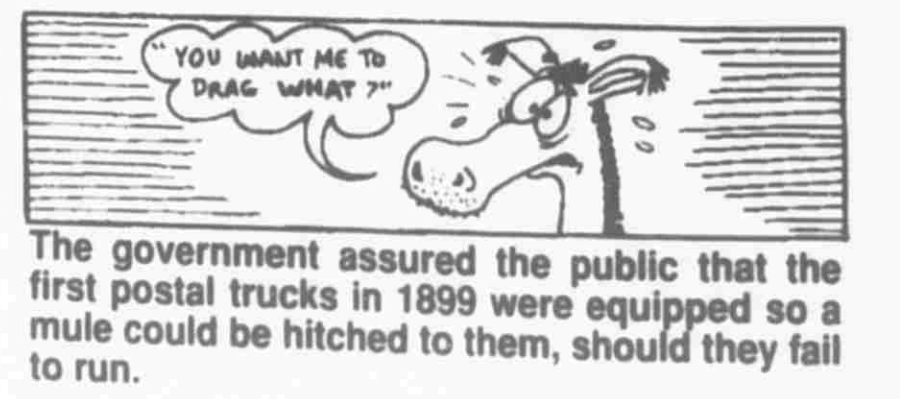
Change orders for the Lowell Police Department renovation project and for the Valley Vista Drive Extension and Bowes Road improvements were all approved by Lowell's City Council Monday night.
Dan Durkee of Robert Lee Wolf and Associates provided the third and final change order for the police department renovations project as well as the final payment to Rapid Construction.

The change order amounted to \$522 (covering receptacles for air conditioning, skirts below the outside deck, gate lock and a line thermostat for existing heater).
There was a credit allowance for finished hardware totaling \$1,253. The net overall change order was for \$410. The final cost of the police department renovation was \$29,597.
"Both myself and Police Chief Barry Emmons are very pleased with the quality work of Rapid Construction," Lowell City Manager Dave Pasquale said.
The Valley Vista Drive extension and Bowes Road improvement change order requested by Ken Shaler and Son netted \$6,925.
The figure adjustment represented quantity adjustments in line items e.g. lineal feet of sidewalk, water and sewer mains, and asphalt.
"We needed more lineal feet in these areas," Pasquale said.
The total cost, after the three change orders, was \$25,953.12. The total contract amount with these change orders is \$304,132.37 for both streets.

Amundsen's 26 points, 20 rebounds not enough in Lowell's 65-50 loss

The tall and short of it in Lowell's Friday night basketball game at Greenville was Red Arrow center, Jon Amundsen, who did all he could to make up for the absence of two Lowell starters, but it wasn't enough as the Red Arrows fell short in a 65-50 non-conference defeat to the Yellowjackets.

Lowell's junior center netted 26 points and cleared the glass for 20 rebounds in an

effort to pick up the slack for missing starters, John Borg and Ryan Brinks. Borg, out with a twisted ankle, and Brinks was on a holiday trip in Florida.

"I thought the boys did exactly what we asked of them," Lowell coach Phil Beachler said. "We got the ball into Amundsen early and got their big guy, Engles, out of the game with foul trouble, but Greenville's backup

center did a nice job, and we did not execute as well offensively once Engles was out." Greenville led 16-7 at the end of one period and built its biggest lead of the first half at 31-17. Behind 11 second-quarter points from Amundsen, Lowell battled back to within eight at halftime, 32-24.

"We played well early, but then lost it," Greenville coach Kent Ingles said. "We have a history of playing poorly in non-school games."

Lowell cut the Greenville lead to as little as four points in the third quarter, but were never able to get over the hump. In a large part, that was due to the big-bucket performance by Yellowjacket senior Jeremy Gough. He led all Greenville scorers with 22 points. Senior teammate Todd Truesdell followed with 15 points.

"If we're going to be suc-

cessful, Gough has to be in there playing for us," Ingles said.

The Greenville coach was impressed with the play of Amundsen on the inside. "I saw him earlier in the year play at Lakewood, he did not look as good then as he played tonight. He controlled the inside at both ends, especially on our defensive end. He must have had eight blocked shots," Ingles said.

Lowell trailed 48-41 with the fourth quarter to play, but could never get closer than five points in the final eight minutes. A three-point play by Amundsen with 3:28 to play cut the Arrow deficit to 55-50. Greenville outscored Lowell 10-0 in the final three minutes of play, with eight of the 10 points coming at the foul line.

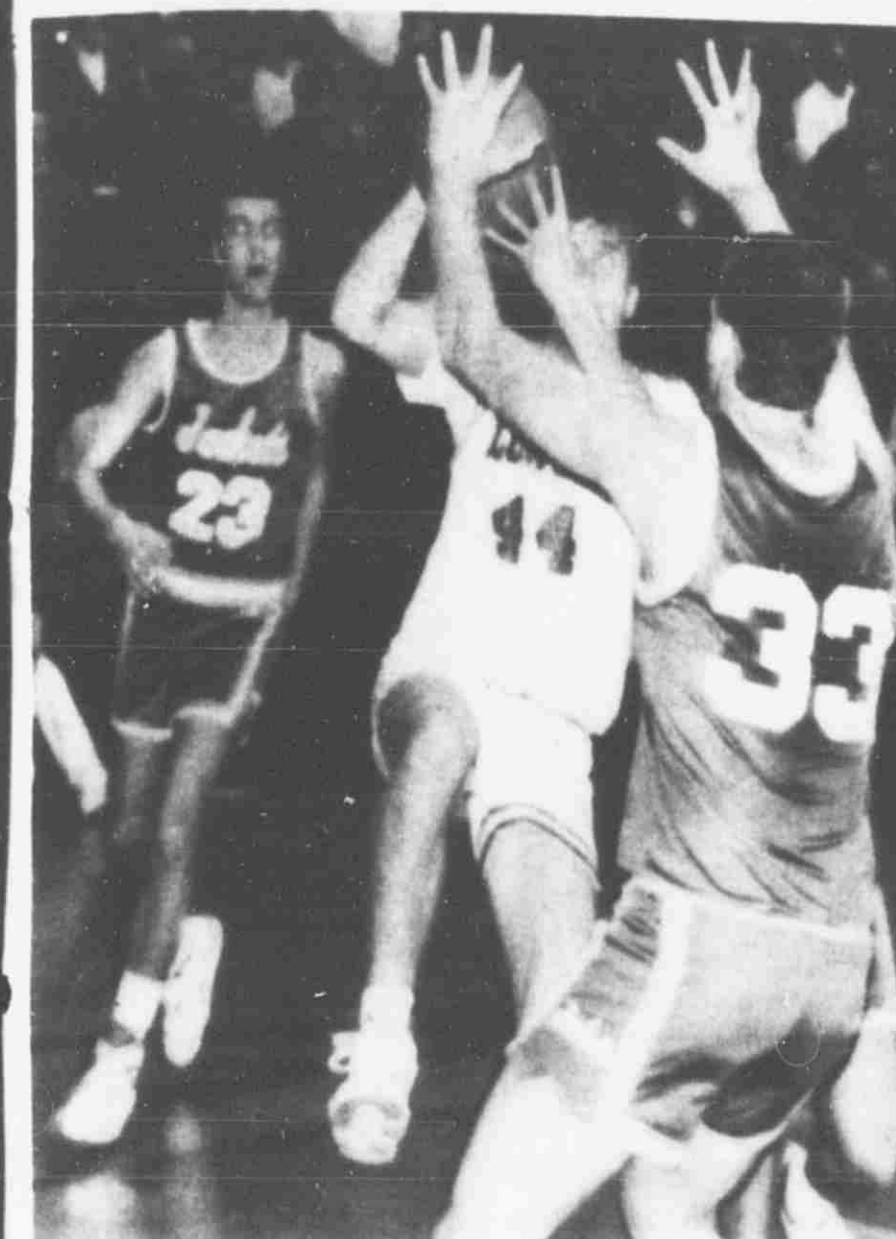

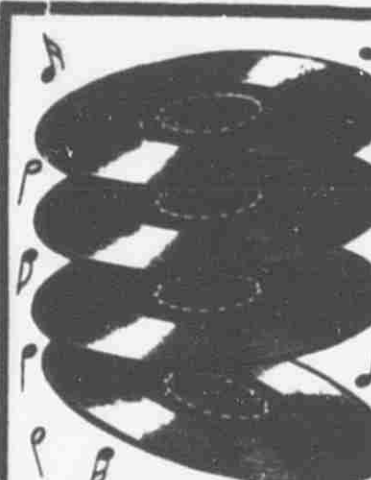

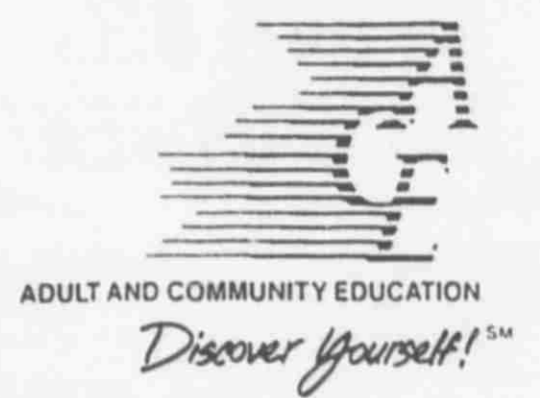
