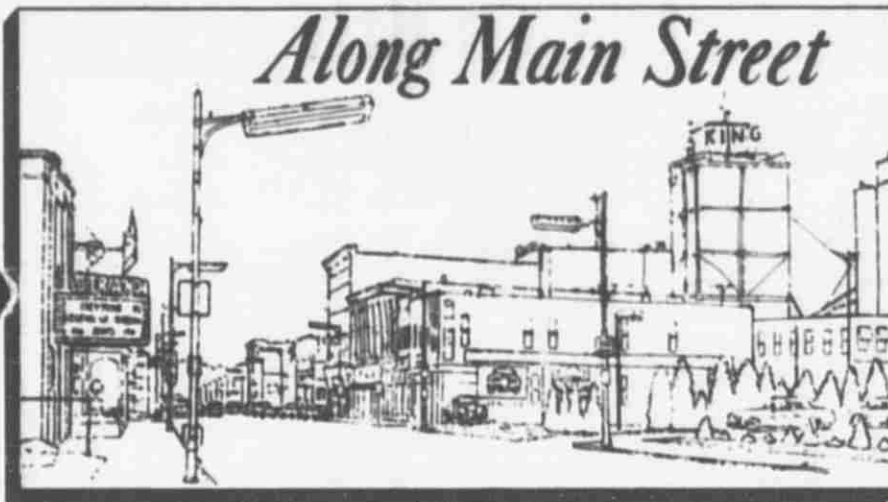

City's \$2,600 water assessment may prove costly to Lowell homeowner

To say a water main assessment on a home at 1044 Riverside Dr. is a complicated issue is a gross understatement. The home was owned by Kevin and Kathleen Hurt prior to selling it to a relocation company when Kevin was transferred to the Detroit area. The relocation company is withholding \$2,634.62 from the Hurts' equity in the home because of a lien placed on the property by the City of Lowell for the installation of water and sewer. Kevin Hurt appeared before the Lowell City Council Monday evening to dispute his responsibility for the assessment.

The story begins back in the fall of 1989 when contractor Gary Redner owned the property. Redner requested that city water be made available to the site. The city agreed to run a 280 foot water main from Hudson St. to ser-

vice three parcels on Riverside Dr. Redner began construction of a home on the site but soon sold it to Benjamin Pools and Construction who in turn completed the house on a pre-sold basis for the Hurts. The transactions from Redner to Benjamin Pools and from Benjamin Pools to the Hurts were both handled by realtor Rick Seese.

Benjamin Pools and Construction was bound by contract to provide the Hurts with a home complete with all utilities, to include water. So, when the Hurts received their first water and sewer bill from the city in June of 1990 and found a \$2,634.62 special assessment on it they were justifiably surprised. They in turn passed the statement along to the contractor, Doug Benjamin.

Benjamin has refused to

pay the special assessment claiming that he was told by city staff in December of 1989 that there would be no special assessment on the property and subsequently did not figure on one in either the price he paid for the home from Redner or the price he charged the Hurts. Seese also claims that he was told there would be no special assessment. Both men admit they should have requested a statement in writing regarding assessments on their property, but neglected to do so.

City Treasurer Judy Noonon says she may have told Seese and Benjamin that there were no assessments due when they contacted the city, but the water main project wasn't completed until May of 1990 and the assessment was added then. Seese blames the entire problem on a lack of communication, and

may very well be right. However, that does not solve the problem for the Hurts as they have been left liable for the assessment because they owned the house when the water main project was completed.

At Monday's meeting Hurt asked the council to assign the lien to a piece of property owned by Benjamin Pools and Construction. Councilman Charlie Doyle told Hurt that he doubted if it would be legal for the city to transfer a lien, and City Manager David Pasquale agreed. Doyle questioned whether the issue belonged before the council at all, stating, "The way I see it this is a problem between the Hurts and Benjamin Pools. I think this is a problem for the lawyers to settle".

After considerable discussion the subject was dropped

Lowell's Dumas has football and life in proper perspective

Much like the way he used to shoot by would-be tacklers on a fall Friday night at Burch Field, Michael Dumas' four years at Indiana University have shot by as fast.

Dumas, a soft but well-spoken Indiana senior, will graduate with a degree in sports marketing and management. He will remember his football days in Hoosierland as fun and as a place where he grew up and matured.

"I faced some of my most difficult times being down there and away from home," he explained. "My experience down in Indiana made me aware of just what good values and morals my parents instilled in me." Because of his beliefs and values, Dumas was able to handle situations where right and wrong decisions had to be made.

"Football was a lot of fun. It was very competitive and also a learning process for me," he said. "It makes you realize how much talent is out there and it puts in perspective where you are and where you need to improve."

Dumas was able to do that in his four years under Bill Mallory. He was also able to prepare himself for life after football. "Everybody would like a shot at playing pro football, but if I can't, I'm definitely coming back to school

and am going to pursue, and hopefully earn, a law degree," he said. "It's a lofty goal, but if it's something a person can attain easily then it wouldn't be a goal. It wouldn't be challenging."

Dumas believes that over 50 percent of high school players coming into college have the perception that they will play both college and pro football. He says their perception and reality are quite contrasting. "Most of them just have not been educated in that area. I'm not talking about classroom education. I'm talking about players being made aware of how slim their chances are of play-

ing both college and pro football," Dumas explains. "Coaches' concerns are what players can give them athletically, and not if a player is aware of how slim his chances are of making football a career."

The Lowell graduate said he was made aware of this in a class where speakers were brought in, and in a seminar he attended where Indiana basketball coach, Bob Knight spoke.

"I was never a Bob Knight fan. After four years though, I have gained a lot of respect for him. Here in Michigan people don't see both sides of the man. I have a better understanding of his teaching tactics and rapport with kids, now that I've spent some time down in Indiana," Dumas said.

On his four years of football at Indiana, Dumas said he will remember most the friendships he made with coaches and players and the recognition of being a team captain in his senior year.

"My parents and I are thankful I never had a serious injury. I saw a lot of players with broken bones. I count my blessings," he said. "I think my parents are also

happy that God looked over me these past four years."

His parents must also be extremely proud of his accomplishments as a player in his final season. The Lowell graduate was named the Peach Bowl defensive MVP; he was selected to play in the Japan Hula East-West All-Star football game; he was named to the first team all Big 10; he was voted team captain and team MVP; and he was selected to the Football News second team All America.

"I don't think headlines and awards are hard to deal with, but I think it depends a lot on your character and the person you are," Dumas said.

The Lowell graduate has received questionnaires from professional teams. He has also allowed himself to drift off into football dreamland about the ideal team he would like to play for if he is fortunate enough to get drafted.

"I won't tell you which team, because that will jinx me, but I will tell you the club is located out west," Dumas smiles.

Qua-Ke-Zik Sportsman's Club: Our club is not for sale - A judge will have to decide fair market value

Back in the mid 1960's, a small Sportsman's Club located near Dean Lake, was told it would have to vacate its premises due to increased housing in the area.

Today, the early 1990's, that same club, the Qua-Ke-Zik Sportsman's Club, located at 11461 Foreman Street SE, may again have to vacate its premises due to the Lowell School District's need for a site to build a new high school. This need surfaced because of the increased number of students in the Lowell School area.

If the Foreman Street property is the school's final choice after the land is completely appraised and the soil boring study is completed, the school would then have to tender an offer to the club. That's where trouble looks like it will begin.

John Black, a 13-year member of the club, said in a telephone interview that the Sportsman's Club is not for sale.

Qua-Ke-Zik's legal representative, Carol Bambery adds, "The club absolutely does not want to sell the property to the school or for the school to take the property in condemnation proceedings," she said. "The club is hopeful the school will find other property that would not impose such a burden on the private property owner."

The Michigan Case Law states "the landowner must yield to public necessity, but is entitled to just compensation." This is defined as "putting the party damaged in as good condition as it would have had the damage not occurred."

That's the catch. When the

ranges were initially installed 23 years ago the physical design and maintenance required by the State and local bodies of governments for design and construction of shooting ranges were not as regulated and not nearly as costly. This point puts a considerable distance between what the School and the Club consider a fair market value.

Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch said the school would not make an offer until the land is completely appraised and the soil boring study is completed. It may

not make a difference. If Black and Bambery are true to their word, and the land is not for sale, a judge will then have to decide the fair market value.

The soil boring study will determine if there is any toxic waste dump on the land; what the soil conditions are; and if the land will support the footprint of the building, to name a few.

Esch expects to have answers to all of these questions by the end of this week. Due to equipment failure the soil

boring study was not completed until Thursday, Jan. 3. "It's at this time, I'd then like to meet with members of the club and make an offer," he said.

Bambery said that figures from the Department of Natural Resources for the Island Range proposal show that a range built and operated by the DNR will consist of a multi-use range, a six-point shotgun range and an archery range. The total cost of this proposal is \$1.2 million. This is a down scaled range prop-

osal with the full-blown range proposal costing \$1.6 million. The DNR has designed the range to meet or exceed the safety standards previously established at other supervised ranges.

Bambery explained this is only a comparison and was not intended to suggest the Qua-Ke-Zik Sportsman's Club would be asking that price.

Black added that the club has had other purchases offered to it over the

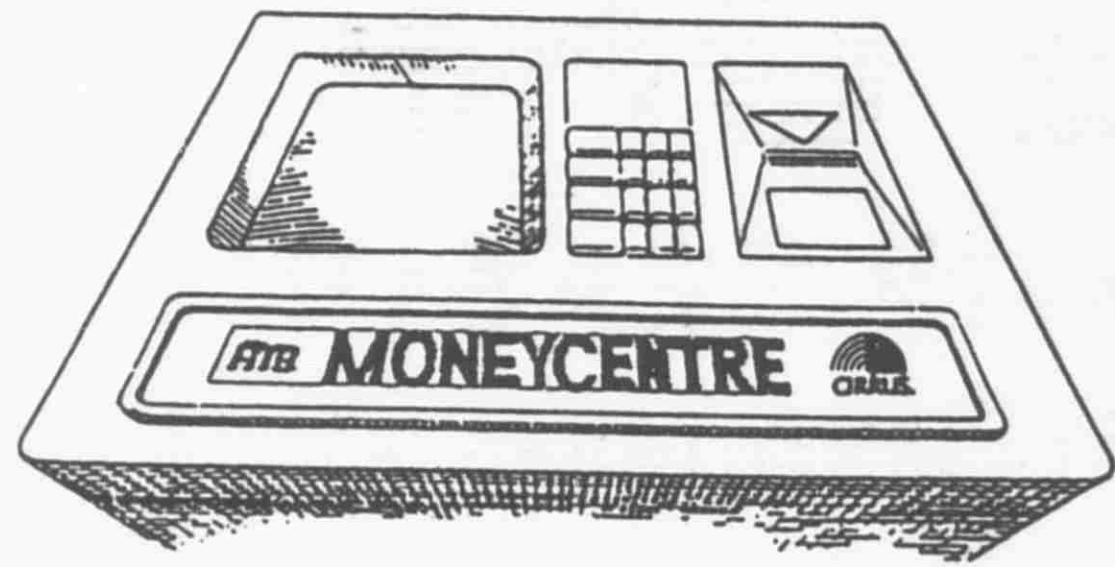

cozy corner by Roger Brown

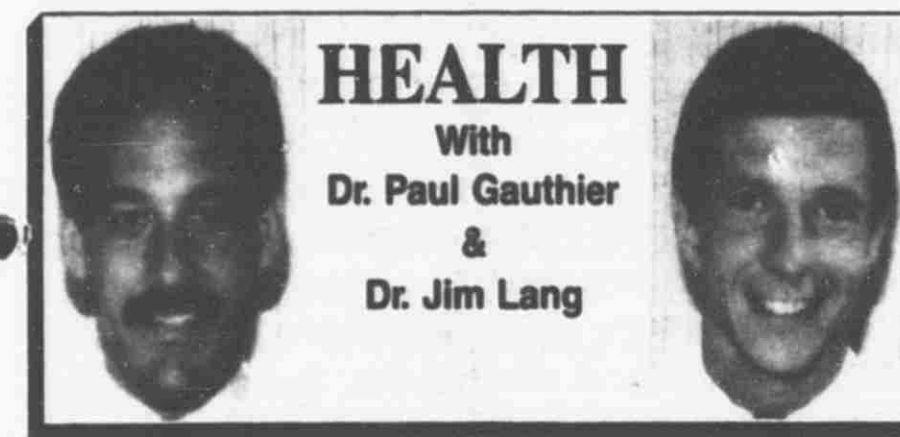

BREAST CANCER RISK AND AGE

We have known for many years that a woman's risk of breast cancer is increased if she has a close relation who has also developed this disease. Some recent research is now suggesting that the age at which a woman's relative developed cancer can help to predict when she might be at greatest risk.

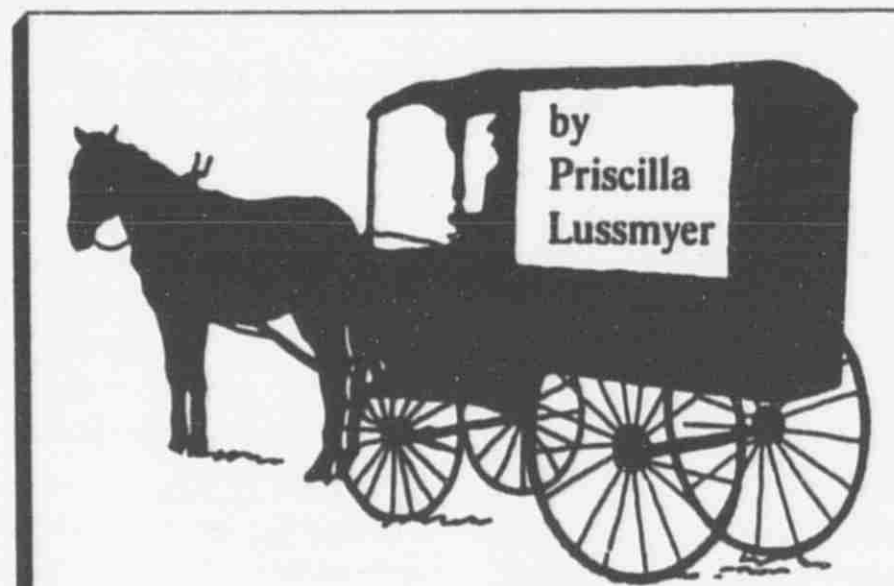
This research, out of Roswell Park Cancer Institute in Buffalo, NY, is one of the first efforts to examine the age at which most patients and their first degree relatives - mother, sisters, and daughters, develop cancer. Initial findings seem to indicate that early onset cancer in a woman's family increases her risk of developing cancer at a young age herself, and that late onset brings on increased risk later in life.

Of particular note, this study found that women whose relatives got breast cancer at a young age - before 40 - had more than double the average risk of developing cancer before the age 55 themselves.

Similarly, women whose relatives contracted cancer after age 50 had twice the average risk of getting cancer after 55. As a means of early detection of breast cancer at any age, we still concur with the most recent guidelines of the American Cancer Society: self breast examination every month; a breast exam by a physician at least every 3 years from ages 20 to 39, and annually from age 40 on; a baseline mammogram between the ages of 35 and 39, and follow up mammography every 2 to 3 years through age 49 and annually thereafter.

Siler committed to Lowell's FFA & agriscience program

As president of the Michigan Association of Agriscience Educators, last summer Pete Siler was given an opportunity to give back to a

teacher who made a lasting impact on the former Merrill High School youth. "Dick Barnes instilled in me, encouragement,

and influenced me in my decision to become a teacher," Siler said. "I was a senior in his agriculture class when he told me I'd make a good

teacher. I had never even given teaching a thought up until that point."

Siler said "thank you" to Barnes at an MAAE Banquet last summer as he presented his former teacher with a 35-year service award.

For Barnes, the Merrill High School graduate's 23 years of commitment and dedication to agriculture education was "thank you" enough.

It's that same faith, encouragement and influence that Siler received from Barnes which he has shared with Lowell students for the past 17 years. Over the past five years, the Lowell agriscience and FFA programs have been two of the most respected in the State of Michigan.

"We realized as time went along that the school had no mode of future agriculture promotion," said Lowell Board of Education President, Roger Kropf. "We saw a need for agronomics and agri-business. Agriculture was no longer just growing corn and raising cattle. The rural community needed a strong agriculture program. The school needed to keep

the initiative alive. Pete Siler has overwhelmingly provided the school with that."

The first and most important step taken by Siler, since his arrival in 1974, was to develop an agricultural interest in the students. With Lowell's recent FFA success, Siler says that task has become easier.

"Because of our FFA success, students are now taking up the banner and pushing agriculture," Siler says. "It's fun to watch the growth of students, from the time they walk in as freshmen to the time they leave as seniors. That's the reason we teach people stay in teaching because you see growth and development. It gives you a tremendous amount of pride."

A most recent example of the growth Siler talks about is Jamie Cook. Siler says she came in as a shy, quiet freshman. Prior to leaving she had the Star State Agriculture Business Person award bestowed upon her. "That makes all of the time spent, nights and sacrifices, worthwhile," Siler said. Cook was also appreciative of Siler's sacrifice, and

time. After accepting the award, Cook whispered to Siler "I couldn't have done it without you."

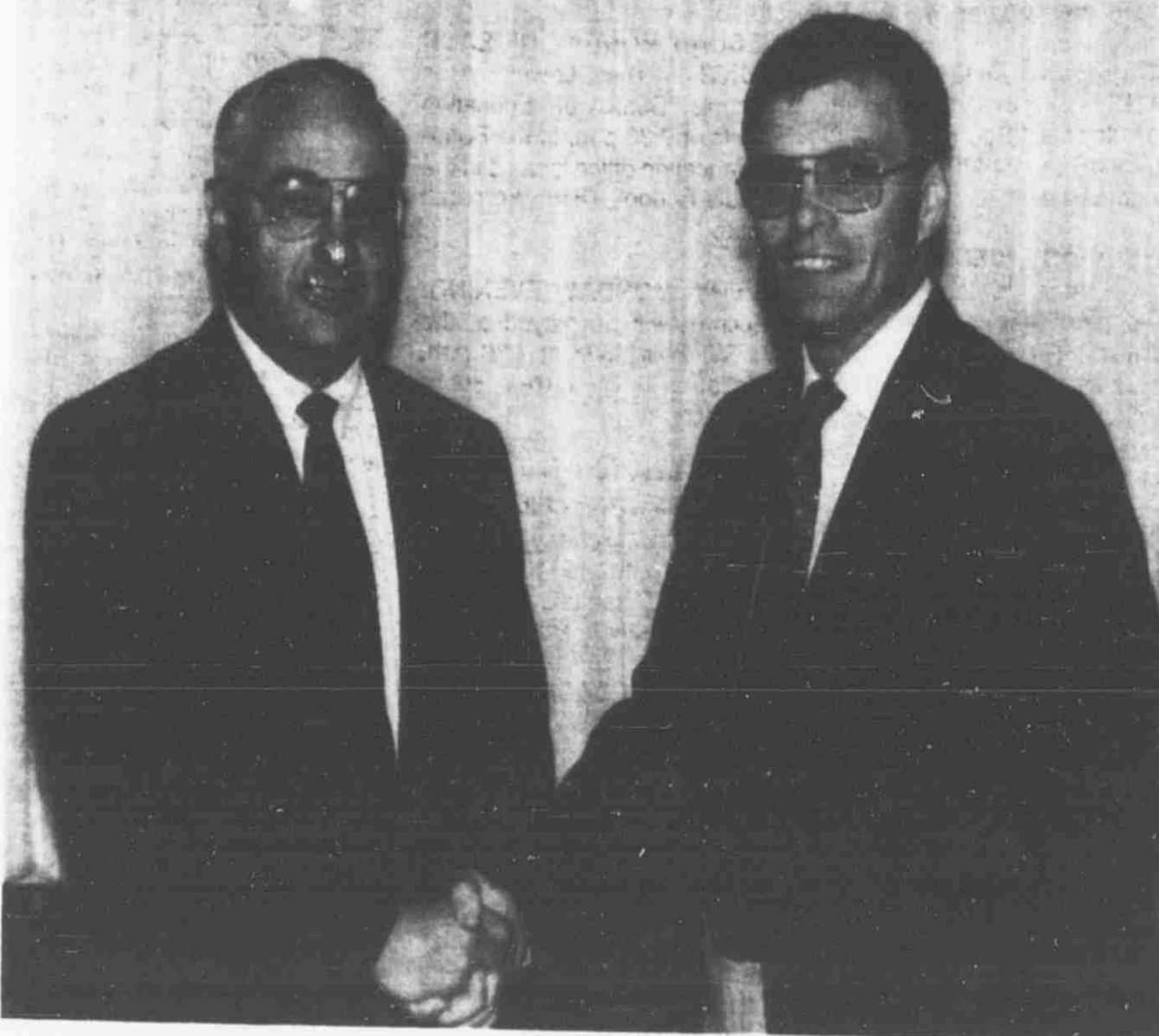
The agriscience and agriculture challenge for the future, according to Siler, is to better inform students about agriculture at the elementary level. "Society is agriculturally illiterate, because we are two and three generations removed from our food supply," he says. "Education will help to eliminate the agricultural image if it is developed at the elementary levels. While farming is a key element of agriculture, it is not all of it."

Siler and the other 5,300 FFA members were challenged by the National FFA Advisor to be risk takers in

Item No. 3. AGREEMENT WITH SHOWBOAT CORPORATION REGARDING PORTABLE BLEACHERS. As requested from the last meeting, a proposed agreement was drawn with the Showboat Corporation regarding the portable bleachers at the amphitheater. City Man-

ager Pasquale met with Gordon Gould, Laura McCollum and Judy Tummino of the Showboat Board on December 10 to discuss the issues of the document. The agreement covered the following: (1) the City purchased the bleachers, (2) an acknowledgment that the Showboat Corporation owes nothing further, (3) the Corporation has the right to use and maintain the bleachers (4) liability insurance on the bleachers from the Corporation (5) the City's right to use the bleachers and the availability of these to the Corporation during Showboat week (6) the Corporation's right to purchase.

The one unresolved issue was the question of which sections of bleachers were involved. Councilmember Doyle had stated that Sections BB and FF were the portable bleachers. In contacting former Councilmember Jim Hall and former City Manager Ray Quada, each thought that the portable bleachers encompassed the entire upper deck. This issue was discussed at the meeting between the City Council and Laura McCollum and Judy Tummino of the Showboat Board. It was agreed that designating Sections AA and BB would be the most convenient for both parties.

Item No. 4. CHANGE ORDER NO. 3 AND FINAL PAYMENT FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT RENOVATION PROJECT. Dan Durkee of Robert Lee Wold and Associates provided the third and final change order for the Police Department renovation project as well as a final payment to Rapid Construction. The change order amounted to \$522, covering receptacles for air conditioners, skirt below the outside deck, gate lock and a line thermostat for the existing heater. A credit allowance for finish hardware totalled \$1,253. Therefore, the overall net change order was \$410 with the final amount of \$29,597.

City Manager Pasquale and Chief Emmons stated that they are pleased with the work completed by Rapid Construction and recommended that Council approve the change order and final payment.

The total contract amount with these change orders is \$304,132.37 for both streets. The City has withheld \$4000 to finish seeding and an additional \$4000 retainage until Spring of 1991.

Item No. 10. COUNCIL COMMENTS. Councilmember Fonger had requested that the Streets Department observe the black top that is cracking throughout the City. He stated that plans should be made to seal these cracks. Councilmember Doyle mentioned that he is interested in attending the Michigan Municipal League 25th Annual Legislative Conference scheduled in February. He recommended it to anyone else who might want to attend. Councilmember Hodges mentioned that the Lowell Little League, Lowell Parks Commission, YMCA and Lowell Area Schools met to discuss the need of fields for the Little League program. The School Board approved the Little League proposal to develop two new fields on school property. Also, the Parks Commission, YMCA and Little League agreed that the Little League would have the use of the East field at Creekside Park.

Item No. 11. MANAGER'S REPORT. City Manager Pasquale reported on the following:

1. He gave congratulations to Chief Emmons on the graduation of Police Command School. Sponsored through the Northwestern University Traffic Institute, ten months of intensive training (one week of schooling each month in Grand Rapids) was completed. Northwestern has one of the best training programs for police administration. City Manager Pasquale attended the graduation ceremony and met a number of police chiefs and officers of West Michigan that spoke very highly

of Chief Emmons.

Betty Morlock had also completed a third one week training session for City Clerks. Betty is currently seeking certification as a Municipal Clerk.

2. The Library Board has submitted a letter to the Council concerning library building needs. The Board has foreseen the need for a new library building, which City Manager Pasquale totally agrees with. This has been mentioned in the Capital Improvements Budget.

City Manager Pasquale has encouraged the Board to initiate a "Friends of the Library" group. The new building could be received a basis of financial support from this group. There are also other sources, both public and private, to solicit.

3. A copy of the Look Memorial Committee minutes of October 17, 1990 was attached to the Council agenda.

4. George Watson's three year term on the Parks Commission will end January 1, 1991 and he is not seeking another term as is Leonard Jackson on the Airport Board. Advertisements for these vacancies will be published.

5. There will be some tree trimming done on trees which limbs are hanging in the City right of way located within the Valley Vista subdivision. When the City is snowplowing, these low limbs are damaging the vehicles. The City will be notifying residents by letter of the trimming. This will be at no cost to the resident.

6. Doug Ybema of the YMCA and the City Manager have been contacting swimming pool consultants regarding the King Memorial Pool. The study that is required by the Health Department will cost approximately \$500 to \$600. The City and the YMCA are discussing splitting the cost.

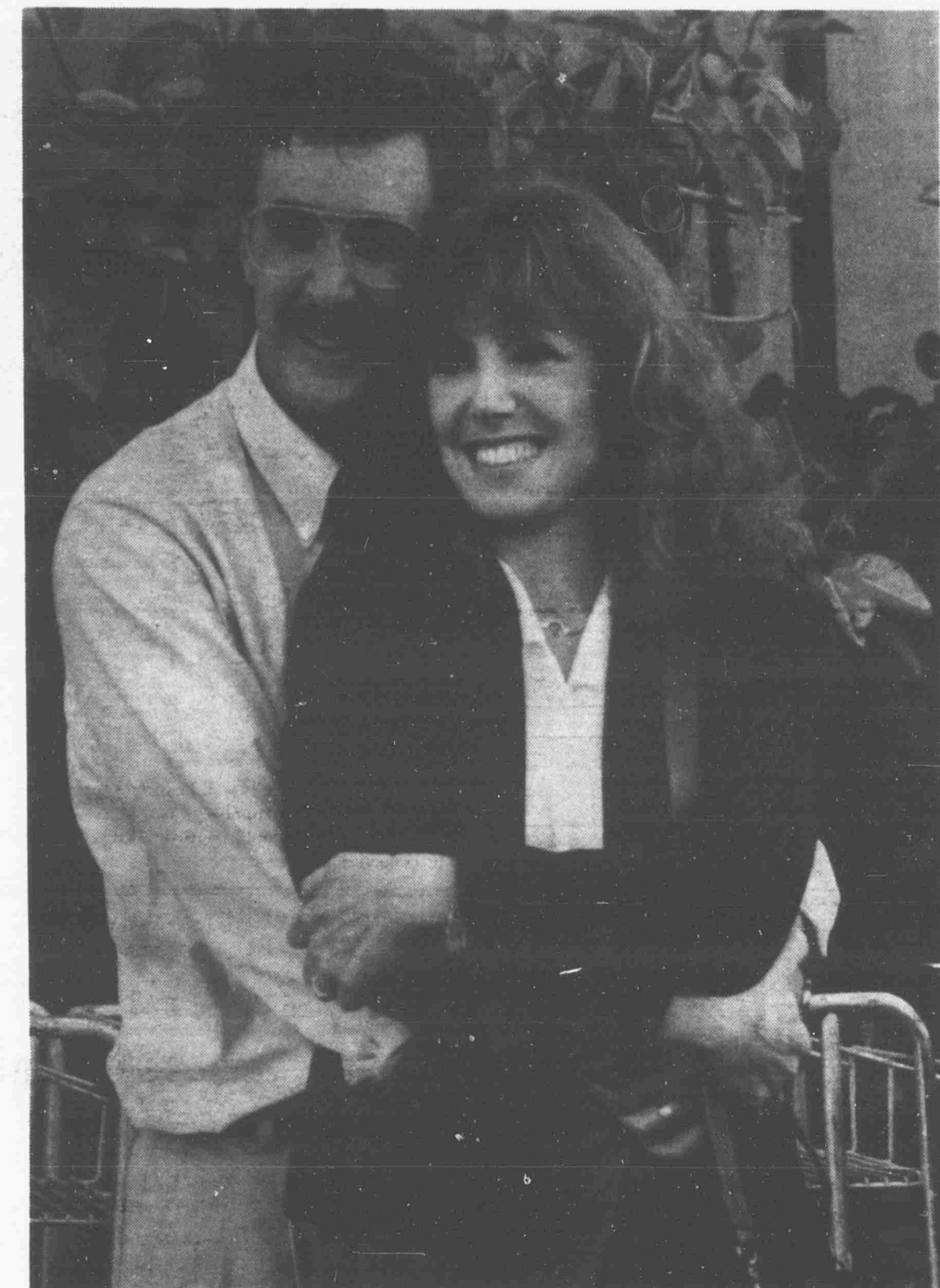

In the assists department, Angie Nauta and Beth Stouffer led the way with nine apiece. Stouffer also had a team-leading two aces.

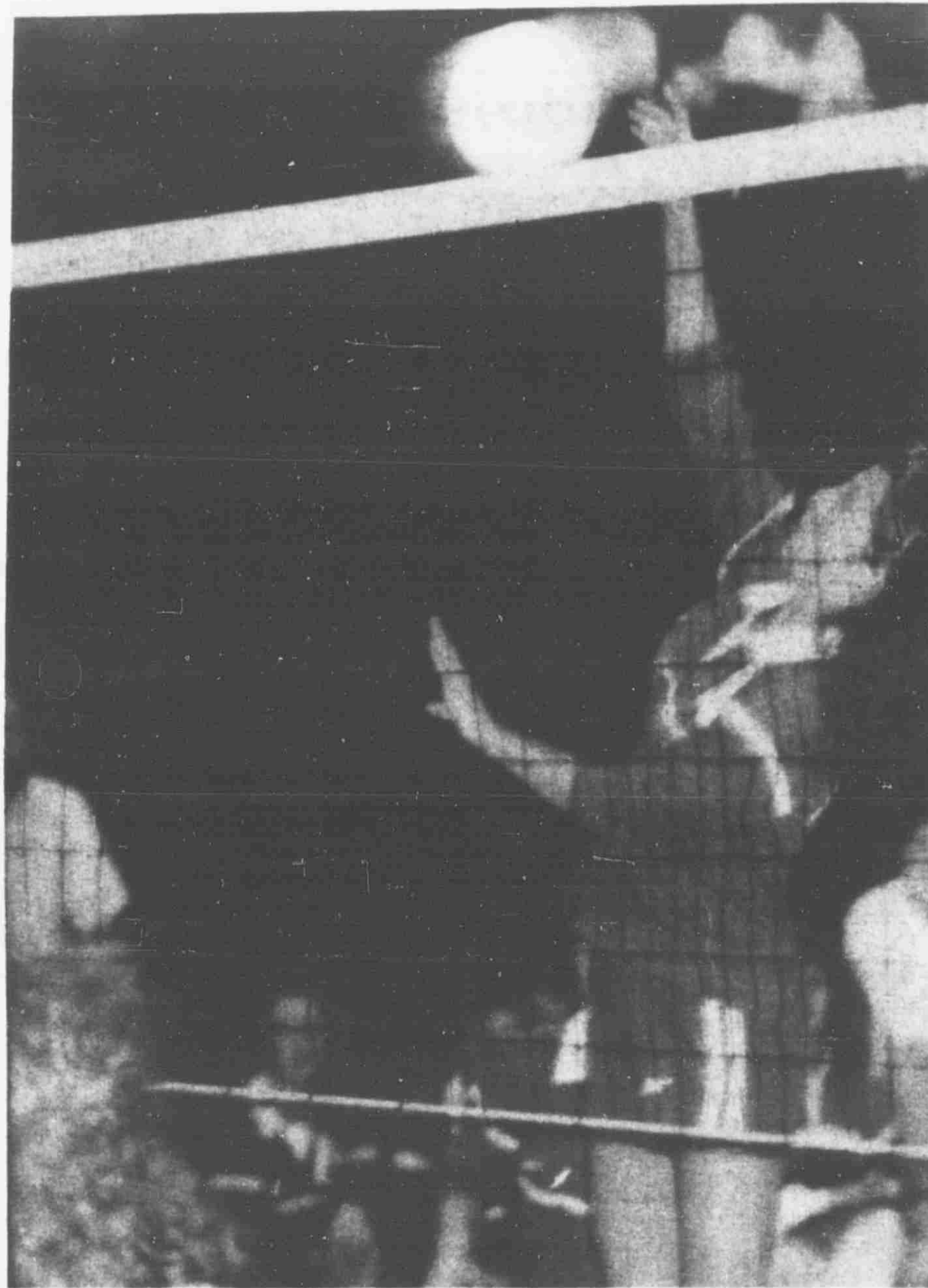

Lowell's record stands at 1-3.

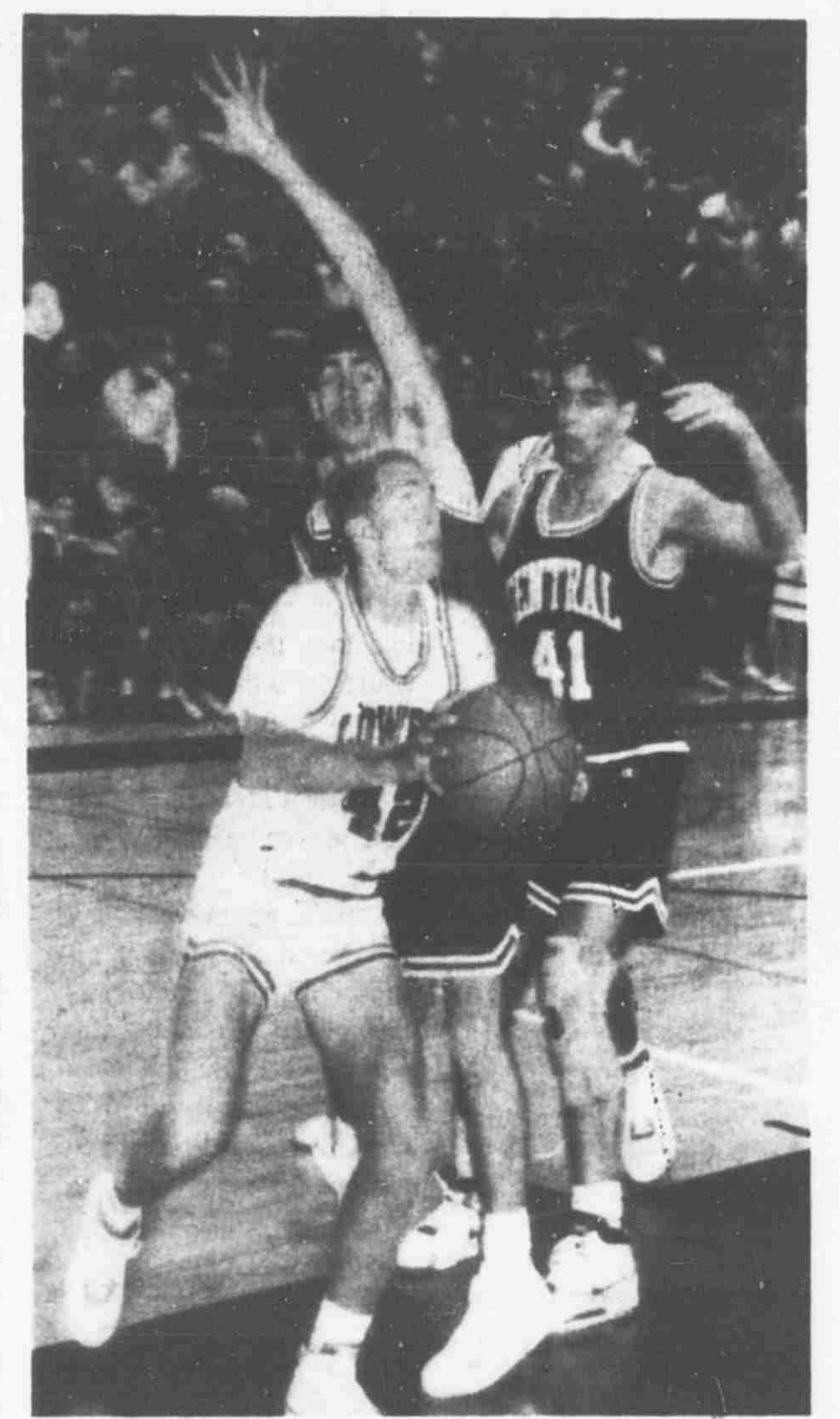
In junior varsity action, Lowell's girls defeated Grand Haven 15-12, 15-11. Top scorers were Erin

Light & Power announces new tree trimming program for '91

Lowell Light & Power announced today that Poortenga Tree Service will be doing their annual tree trimming for their distribution lines starting the first part of January. Poortenga Tree Service is owned by Jim Poortenga who Feb. 5 will have forty years in tree work making him the "dean" of arborists in the West Michigan area.

To properly prepare his people for line clearance work means study and training for Poortenga and his people. Completion of an electrical hazards awareness program through National Arborist Assoc., yearly training in CPR, and aerial rescue work are all tasks that must be done. But this is nothing new for Poortenga, who believes safety is a number one priority. He has worked with Metropolitan Hospital wellness program on three part "care for your back" program, and has yearly audiometric testing done for his workers.

Poortenga also exhibits care and concern for his clients' tree. A lifelong love for trees is evident when you talk with him. He is currently serving on a tree preservation committee and a research committee for Michigan Nursery and Landscape Association. He has for the past six years been chairman of or on the Arbor Day committee for Grand Rapids Nursery and Landscape Association and is proud of that organization's efforts to help children be-

come interested in trees and to plant them. Through that committee, approximately eight thousand seedlings and one large tree are planted by third through sixth graders in Kent and Ottawa counties each year. Poortenga Tree Service also received National recognition in 1990 for their work in disease and insect control, a recognition for which he is particularly proud.

"Line clearing is different though," says Poortenga. "Conductors and trees both want to occupy the same place. We need electricity and we need trees so the practical thing to do is trim the trees." Poortenga is especially pleased with Lowell Light & Power's attitude towards trees. "They are keenly aware of their value and so have embarked on a three year pruning cycle which is much better for the trees," according to Poortenga. "Heavy pruning can cause undue stress and a three year cycle reduces the need for this."

Also, the board has resolved to plant a tree for every one they would remove, which according to Poortenga is a wonderful idea unheard of in the utility industry. So, in order to have an uninterrupted flow of electricity we will once again hear the sounds of a chipper in our town, but we can be confident that people who care about trees are doing the trimming.

The trimming started the first week of January, 1991.

Food allergies know no season

When most of us think of allergies, visions of ragweed, pollen and molds - culprits of fall and spring - prevail. But for some sufferers, relief comes not from the "first frost" or the oppressive summer heat.

For the unfortunate victims of food allergies, it's a year-round struggle. And to further complicate matters, there isn't widespread agreement on what exactly constitutes a food al-

lergy, or, once diagnosed, what to do about one. In some surveys, nearly half the adult participants indicate they experience adverse reactions to food.

Yet, according to Dr. Alan Xenakis, a nationally respected leader in health care communications and executive producer of a new consumer video, "Coping With Allergies," most traditional allergists estimate that fewer than one in 100 adults is actu-

ally allergic. Clinical ecologists - doctors who contend that the chemicals and pollutants found virtually everywhere, in food, the air, soil, and water, cause allergic reactions - claim this figure is much higher.

Just what is a food allergy? Xenakis says there's a distinction to be made between "irritants," "sensitivities," "intolerances," and "allergens". Irritants, such as cigarette smoke or certain chemicals, can cause unpleasant reactions in anyone. Coffee, chocolate, and many other foods often spur sensitivity reactions, such as nervousness or stomach upset. The absence of an enzyme to break down lactose leads to milk and dairy product intolerance.

Allergic reactions, in contrast, occur when white blood cells attack an allergen as if it were a disease or infection. The ensuing discomfort, whether it's sneezing, "hives," or digestive problems, is actually caused by the person's overzealous immune system.

It is suggested that a food allergy is a common cause of such distressing symptoms as headaches, insomnia, palpitations, breathlessness, ankle swelling, abdominal bleeding and fatigue; and in children, bedwetting, poor

school performance, and hyperactivity.

"Few foods cause such reactions," says Xenakis. "The fact is, a true food allergy characteristically occurs before the age of five." Although fruits, eggs, fish, milk, nuts, shrimp, tomatoes and wheat can cause true allergic reactions, says Xenakis, the occurrence is rather infrequent. On the other hand, the list of foods that can cause sensitivity reactions is much longer, including almost anything from chicken, cheese and chocolate to plums, prunes and potatoes.

A recent article in the New England Journal of Medicine deals with the issue of food allergies and self-deception. Clinical ecologists, who don't always agree with traditional allergists, often use extracts from potentially symptom-provoking foods to either diagnose or neutralize an allergy. To date, however, little evidence supports the effectiveness of these procedures.

What's a body to do? If you feel poorly after eating a particular food, Xenakis recommends you explain the symptoms to your doctor. Only after a careful history check are tests for food allergies appropriate. Three tests are generally

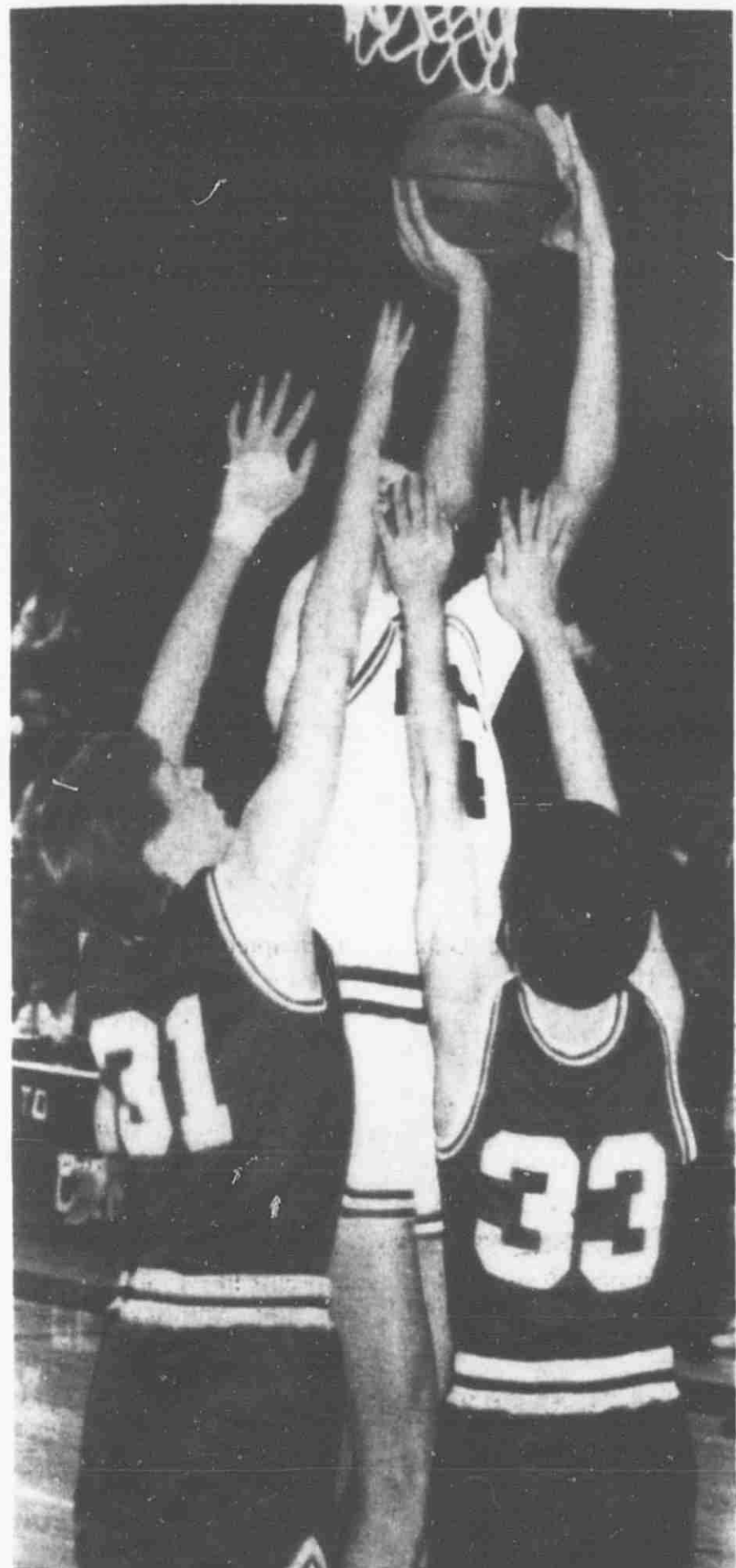
given: a skin-patch test, which is most common and used by most specialists; an "interdermal" test, which involves injections; and/or a blood test (called RAST), used almost exclusively by clinical ecologists. One thing you should know: While testing for allergies is hardly an exact science, the RAST tests are controversial, especially

among traditional allergists. **Coping with food allergies** If you test positive, your doctor will probably suggest either partial or complete avoidance of the food in question. Then, symptoms should go away. However, getting to this point can be frustrating, and separating an actual food al-

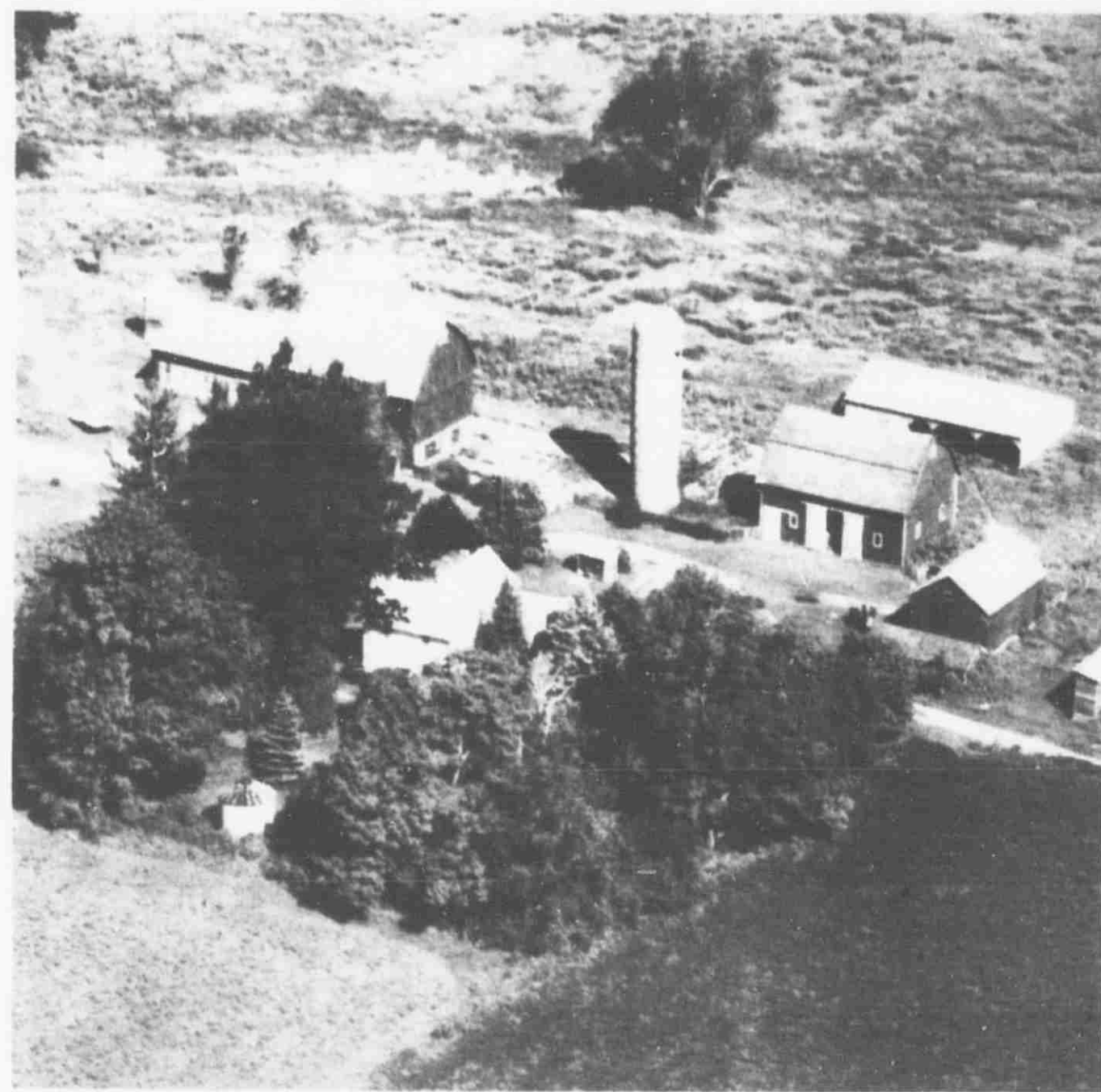

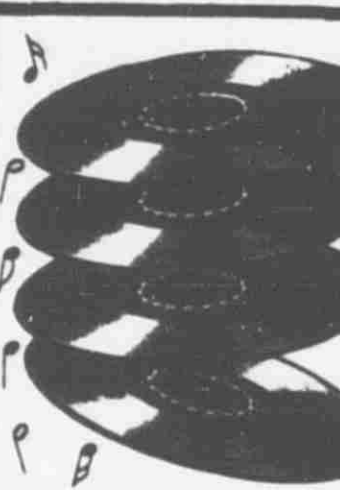

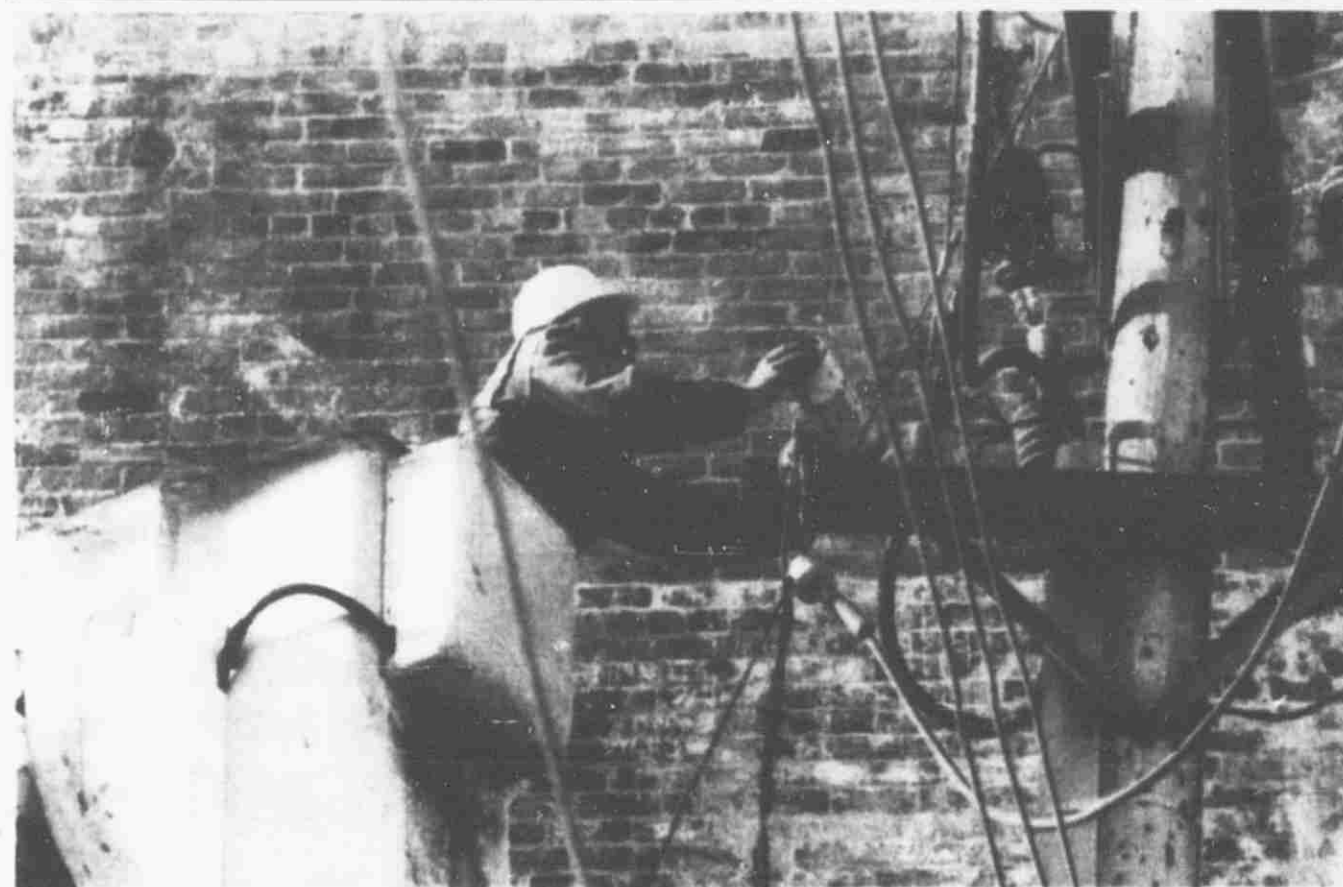

Reading further in the book I found just the "ticket" for the time when I can once again fix some little treat for a tired and hungry friend---"Poetical Egg Salad Sandwiches." Good ol' Anne---creative in simple, loving ways.

These sandwiches are the standard egg salad mixture, except that she added mint or parsley to the butter. The "poetical" part I am sure is that each slice of bread (she used eight slices) is cut out with a large cookie cutter. The bread scraps are saved in a plastic bag for bread crumbs for another recipe. One side is buttered, the other is spread with the egg mixture and then they are put together.

A cup of tea and poetical sandwiches sound good to me, even now.

That brown cocoon of an idea might just turn into a magnificent moth of fulfillment for me. I am anxious to try it.

I think I will buy several large cookie cutters, type out Anne's recipe and send them to several of those wonderful people who helped feed us during those long "get well" days. Just a "poetical" gift of gratefulness.

Perhaps it would be a good gift for Valentine's Day or for our grandchildren with a cup of hot cocoa when they come to visit.

Little gifts of love seem to be quite appropriate for a snowy day in January---"moths of fulfillment." Thank you Anne, your charm is still working after all these years.
