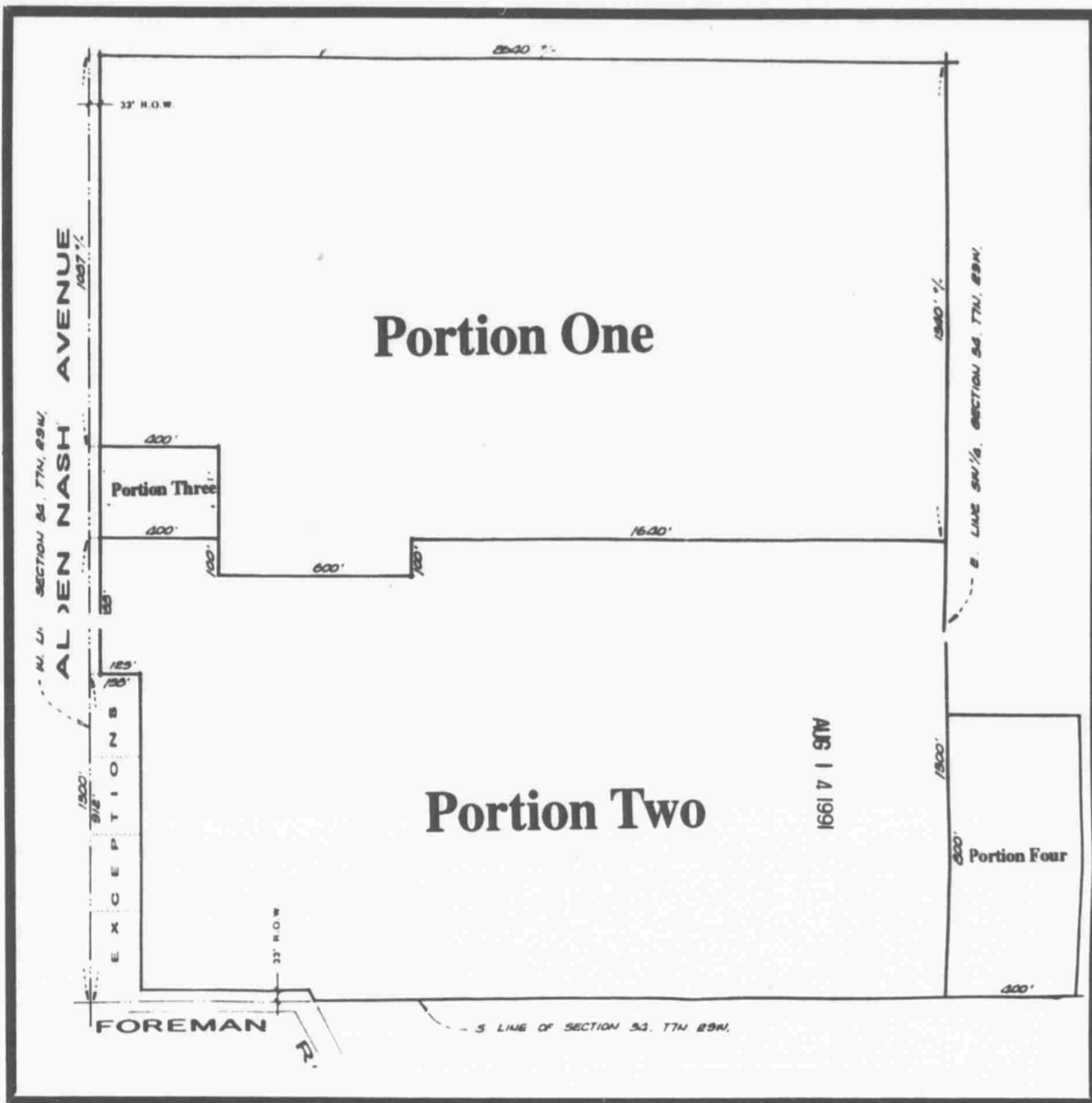

Cooper and Cook present proposals of sale to School

Board expected to keep appeal option open

Lowell's School Board is expected to keep all its options open in a closed session special meeting Wednesday night (Aug. 21) in its quest to capture a land site for the new high school.

Currently the board's options are two-fold. Acquiring a substantial northern portion of land from Richard and Shirley Cooper, and 108 acres adjacent to the Cooper property owned by Dora J. Cook.

The second option is appealing Judge Dennis Kolenda's ruling on the Qua-Ke-Zik condemnation hearing.

Since negotiations are still on-going and no water/sewer agreement between the City of Lowell and Vergennes Township is expected on or before Wednesday night's meeting, the Lowell School Board is expected to start up the appeal process in the Qua-Ke-Zik land disturbance.

Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch said the last day the school could do that would be Aug. 22.

"If negotiations fall into place with Cooper and Cook the school can stop the appeal

process at any time," Esch said. "I feel pretty confident that this will come together, but there are no guarantees. If it doesn't, I want our only other option open to us (appealing the Qua-Ke-Zik decision).

If the appeal process is exercised, three judges in Lansing would re-evaluate the evidence brought out in the condemnation hearing and would then either uphold the decision handed down by Judge Kolenda or reverse it.

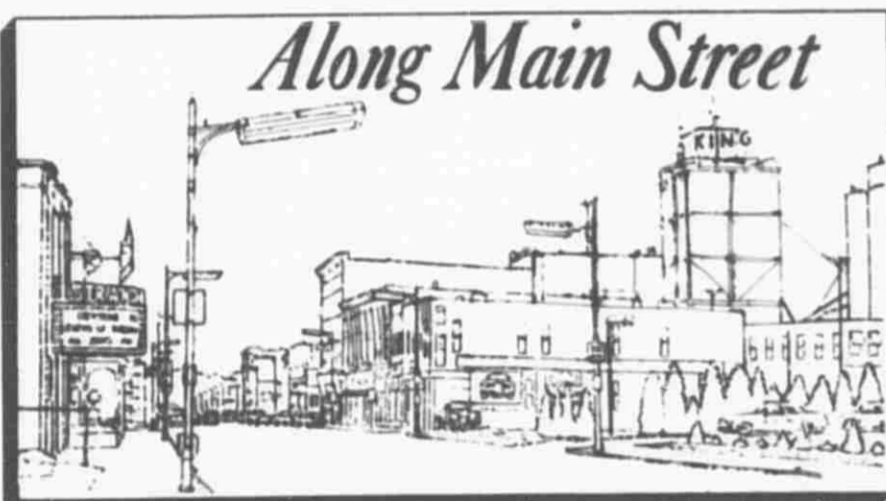
In a related item, the school has received two proposals of sale, one by the Coopers and one by Jim and Dora Cook. Both proposals were not acceptable to the school.

Coopers asked that the school pay \$384,000 for approximately 80 acres. The terms of the payment were that the school make an initial payment of \$100,000 with a balance due on a land contract with an interest rate of 11 percent, paid quarterly.

Coopers are also asking that no school building or athletic field be constructed within 200

- Portion One is the approximate 80 acres the school would purchase from Cooper.
- Portion Two is the approximate 74 acres Cooper would keep for development.
- Portion Three is 2.3 acres which currently holds a house and a storage building.
- Portion Four, 7.3 acres the school would have an option of purchasing up until Jan. 1 of 1995.



Lowell's American Cancer Society Lock-Up raises \$6,500 toward research and education

Its goal was to lockup cancer forever, without giving it a chance for parole.

Lowell hosted its second Great American Lock-Up on Aug. 13-15. This year the event raised \$6,500 toward the services available for those suffering from the disease, and toward cancer research and education.

"I was very happy with the final results," said Lowell's Cancer Society lockup chairman, Terri Robinson.

The American Cancer Society's Great American LockUp allowed for anyone to be arrested. All a person had to do was give the Cancer Society the name and location of the person they wished to have "locked-up" and the Cancer Society came and arrested that individual and took that person before a judge. The "judge," a local resident, then set bail for the person. The person was then asked to so-

licit help from friends and family to raise bail.

All proceeds went to the American Cancer Society. The money is used for research

and education to help patients suffering from this disease advance.

"For every dollar donated, 40 cents goes to the national

office for research," said Tami Ellenbaas, Director of the Kent County Great American Lock-Up.

feet of the boundary lines of Cooper's 74 acres and of property portion three.

It is also asked that the school install, at its expense, a chain link fence, or an equivalent fence meeting the ap-

proval of the Coopers, between the new school site and Cooper's property and be-

tween the new school site and property portion three, no later than the date of completion of

construction of any school buildings.

Furthermore, it is requested of the school that no storm water retention pond shall be constructed within 300 feet of the boundary lines of

Cooper or (property portion three) without the consent of the seller.

The proposal calls for the school to be solely responsible for any and all efforts,

expenses, costs, penalties, legal procedures, tax reimbursements, and pay back responsibilities necessary to remove and/or relieve the property of requirements and/or limitations imposed by such agreement.

Cook is asking the school for \$295,000 for the 80 acres and the 28.75 acres on the east and north sides of the Cooper property. Cook asks that the acceptance of this proposal be

in place by midnight Tuesday evening, Aug. 20. The monetary figure would be paid in cash, by a certified check, or by bank money order.

It is also stated in the Cook buy/sell agreement that if an annexation agreement with the City of Lowell and Vergennes Township is established, the seller shall be obligated to sell this property and the buyer is obligated to buy in accordance with the provisions stated.

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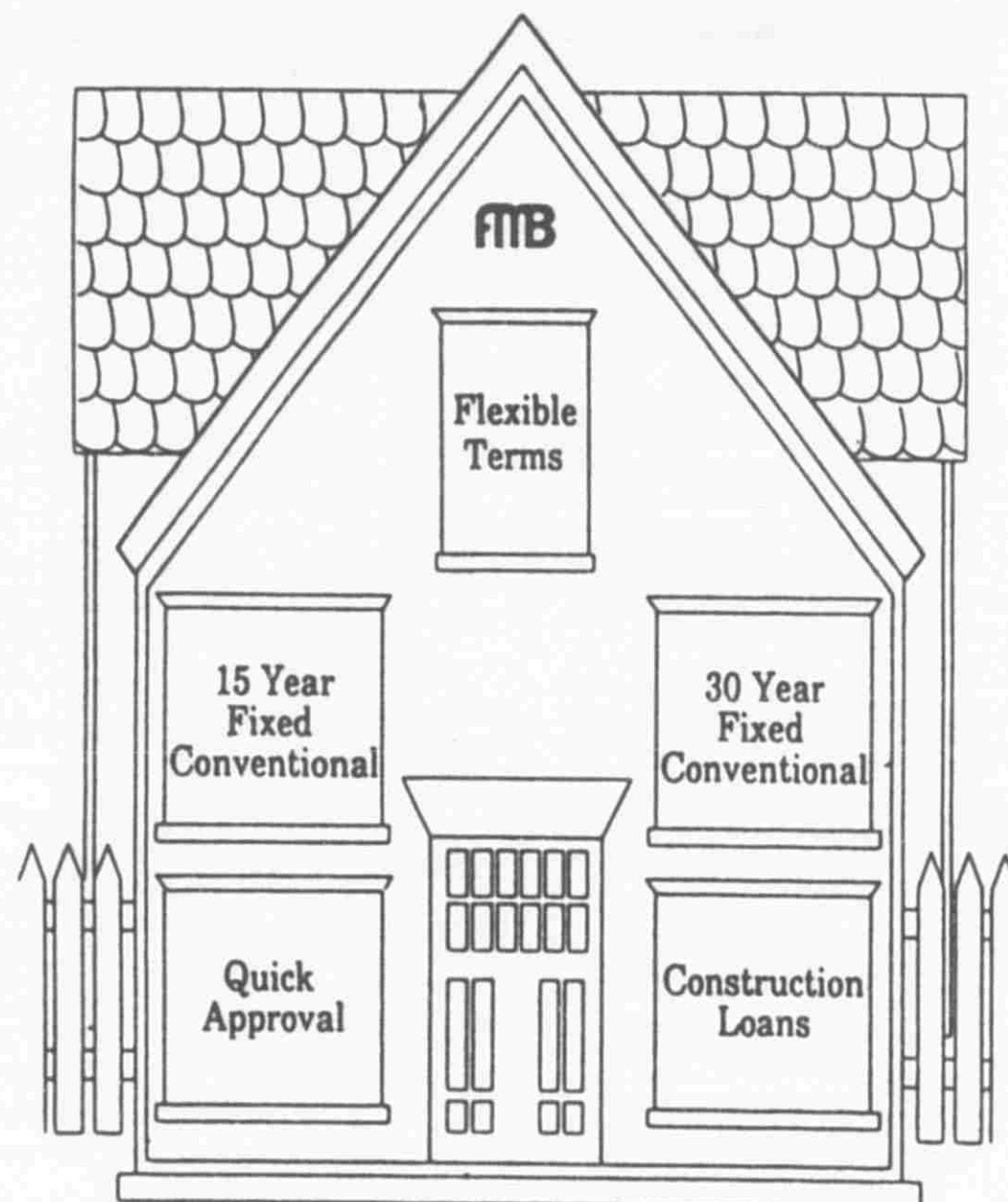

It seems that a 13-year old St. Paul, Minn boy not only enjoyed the movie but learned from it.

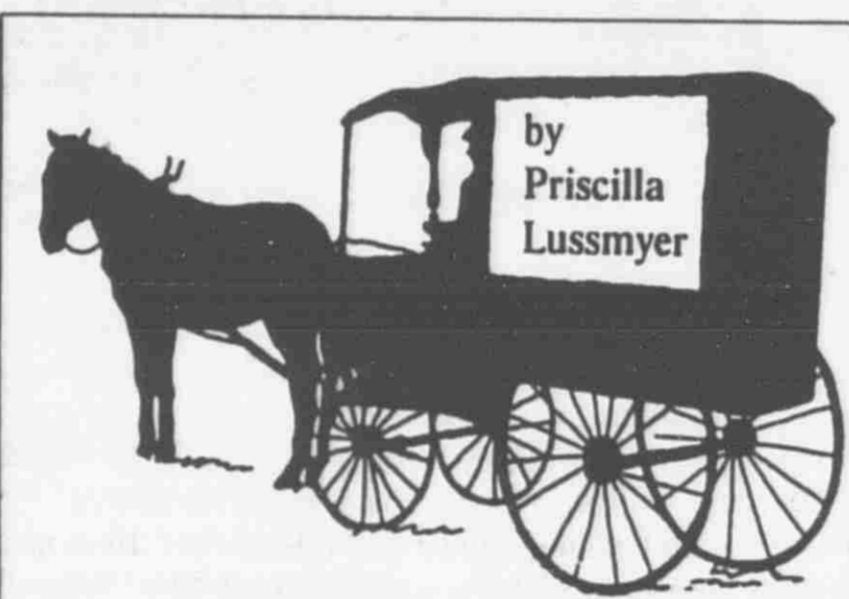

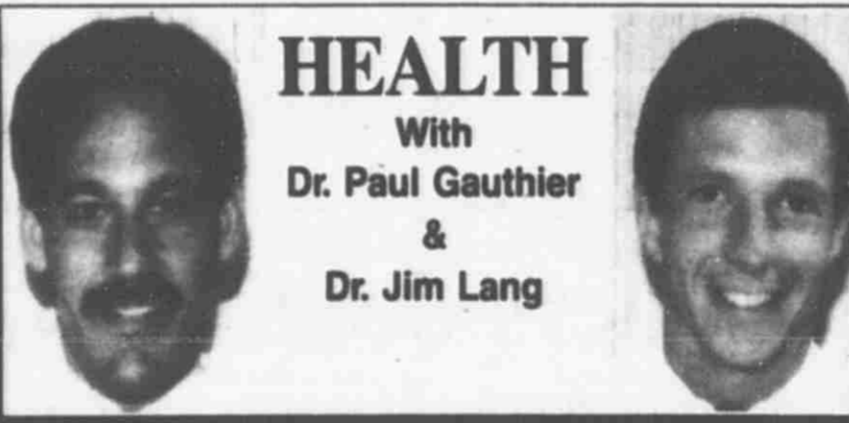

CONGESTIVE HEART FAILURE

Congestive heart failure is a medical condition that occurs when the heart is unable to pump a sufficient amount of blood to the rest of the body. Patients often confuse "heart failure" with heart attack or cardiac arrest. While a heart attack may lead to congestive heart failure the two entities are entirely different heart conditions.

Congestive heart failure means that the heart is not efficiently performing its duties as a pump. Over a period of time the heart muscle becomes weak and stretches, resulting in an enlarged heart. Fluid tends to accumulate in the cardiovascular system, often backing up to the lungs. The kidneys don't excrete as much fluid as they should because the weakened heart is not able to deliver enough blood to the kidneys for filtering and excretion. Congestive heart failure is usually due to damage to the heart muscle from a heart attack. Other causes include prolonged hypertension, damaged heart valves, serious infections from a virus, heavy alcohol use, severe lung disease, and birth defects.

Shortness of breath upon exertion is one of the earliest symptoms of congestive heart failure. This may progress to shortness of breath during rest especially when lying down. Another symptom is fluid retention and swelling of the ankles. Fatigue is another common complaint. Weight gain is seen

because of accumulation of fluid that is not excreted by the kidneys.

Diagnosis of congestive heart failure is usually made on clinical examination after a cardiac history has been obtained. Frequently a chest x-ray will reveal an enlarged heart. The EKG is often done to determine if a previous heart attack has damaged the heart. One of the most useful diagnostic tools is the echocardiogram. This gives us an ultrasonic picture of the heart valves, heart chambers and overall thickness of the heart walls. It is a simple, non-invasive test that provides a lot of important information that is useful in determining the cause and subsequent treatment of CHF.

Your doctor has many tools to treat CHF. The underlying cause should be treated, if possible. The mainstays of treatment, for years, have been diuretics and digitalis. The diuretics work to rid the body of excess fluid while digitalis makes the heart pump stronger. Newer medications have been developed which have proven effective when added to the standard regimen.

With proper treatment, heart failure can usually be stabilized so that you can maintain an active life-style. Left untreated, heart failure usually progresses leading to further difficulty breathing, fluid retention and further damage to the heart.

CONGESTIVE HEART FAILURE

Chronic congestive heart failure occurs when the heart does not pump enough blood to meet normal body needs.

Pets with congestive heart failure tire easily, are short of breath, and cough deeply, due to poor circulation through the lungs. They may actually lose weight, but the abdomen becomes enlarged due to fluid accumulation. The legs may also be swollen and puffy. Often these patients faint or collapse after excitement or exertion, and the tongue appears bluish-grey.

Congestive heart failure can result from heart-valve disease, heartworm infection, or heart defects present at birth.

Though congestive heart failure cannot be cured, many patients can live a comfortable life with proper medical management.

Treatment is aimed at removing accumulated fluids, improving the heart's pumping efficiency, and decreasing the heart's workload. Radiographs (x-rays) and electrocardiograms (ekg) are used to diagnose the condition and monitor the response to treatment. Treatment may also include feeding a low sodium diet and restricted activity.

Apparently our almost perfect system isn't so perfect after all.

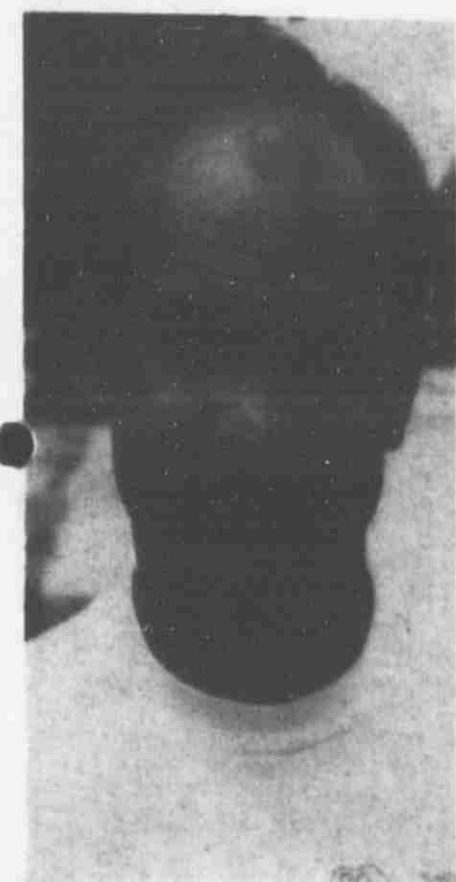

In the other division, Cuervo bested Chances Are.

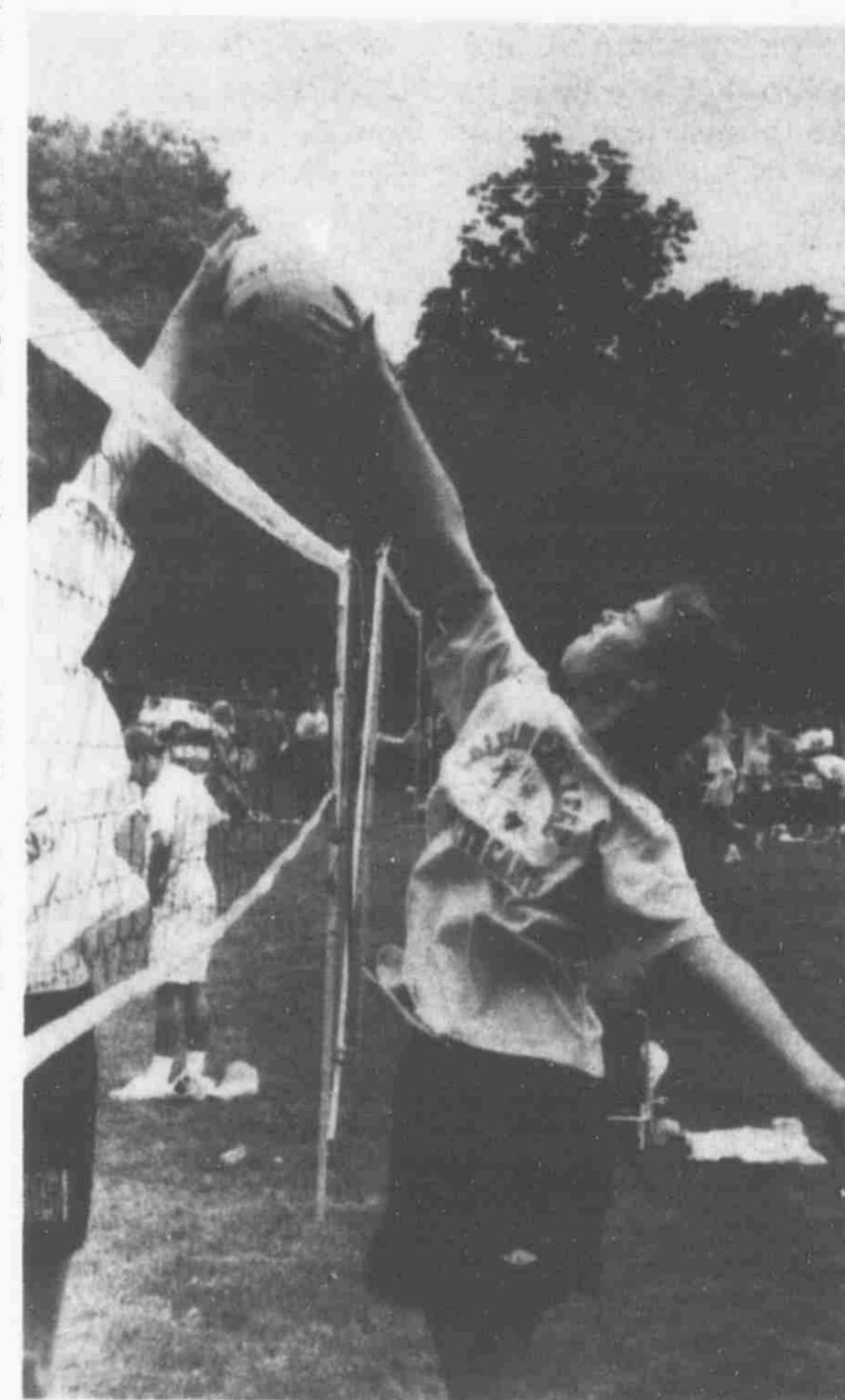
In men's recreational play, team Bellah defeated team Blough in the championship 15-13.

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City Council says it's open to annexation, provided...

By the slimmest of margins, 3-2, the Lowell City Council said it would be open to annexation of the Richard and Shirley Cooper property.

It would be open, provided the school agreed to run water and sewer lines to the point of City property; provided it is willing to cover the increased police protection cost; provided any housing development falls under City tax; and provided terms can be agreed to on price with the Coopers and with Jim Cook.

Voting "yes" on this motion were Councilmen Jim

Hodges, Bill Thompson and Mayor James Maatman.

Councilmen Charlie Doyle and Jack Fonger each voted "no" on the motion.

"I don't believe in spot annexation," Doyle said. "I believe if you're going to annex there should be a good balance of land for industrial, commercial and residential and not just for one."

Maatman suggested that he thought in this case annexation was the best way to handle the situation. "It's going to help education and I

think the Council needs to be supportive of that," Maatman said.

Along with the Cooper property, the school asked the City to make decisions on acquisition of the City Airport for a possible high school site and on land east of the Flat River.

"I think both points are moot," Doyle said. "The school doesn't know where it's going to build. It's crazy for the City to spend money for the school until the school has a concrete idea where the school is going to be."

Thompson agreed. "The school is asking us to answer questions without all the information. It should decide what property it wants and work it out. The City's answer could change, depending on what the school decides. The City will do what it has to do to help."

Maatman said he thought the City needed to give the school an answer. "It's important that the school have some opinions before it pursues a piece of land," the Mayor said.

Thompson added he thought the City has been jumping all over the place and has gone overboard in trying to establish a water/sewer agreement.

The Council agreed that upgrading streets from Division to Fun (\$162,000) would be too costly to consider property east of the river. The Council also said no to using the airport as a possible location for the new high school at this time because of the negative approach forwarded by the airport board. "The Board wants to keep its airport and rightfully so," Doyle said.

The Council went on record as saying that at the present time neither the airport land nor land east of the river are valid locations at this time.

Thompson said that the motion left room for change in the future, if necessary.

Fun Street upgrading work to start in the Fall

After years of politicking, the monies are finally in place to widen, grade and pave over all the concerns and bumps of Fun Street.

The governmental units, while agreeing with residents that something needed to be done with Fun Street, differed as to how the work should be paid for.

Last week, the final chap-

ter in this never-ending saga was written, when the Kent County Road Commission managing director, Jim Porritt, agreed to the City's demand that the County pay for 72.5 percent of the pavement cost. In actuality, to pay for the 27.5 percent it relieved Lowell Township from.

"No! I'm not surprised by the County's decision. In the long run it saves the County money to pave Fun Street. It would have been much more expensive to upkeep a gravel road," Lowell City Manager Dave Pasquale said. He added that work on Fun Street should start in the fall.

After relieving Lowell Township of any further financial responsibility after it agreed to pay 27.5 percent for

Fun Street's widening and graveling, the County asked the City to split the cost of asphalt with the Road Commission. The City said "no" it would not pay the Township's share, it wasn't the one who relieved the Township of its responsibility.

The estimated cost for paving the road was \$10,800. The City will only pay 27.5 percent of that. The estimated cost to widen and gravel Fun Street was \$41,802. The City and Lowell Township will each pay \$11,495.55, leaving the Road Commission with \$18,810 to pay.

Fun Street serves residents in the City of Lowell, Lowell Township and one home in Vergennes Township.

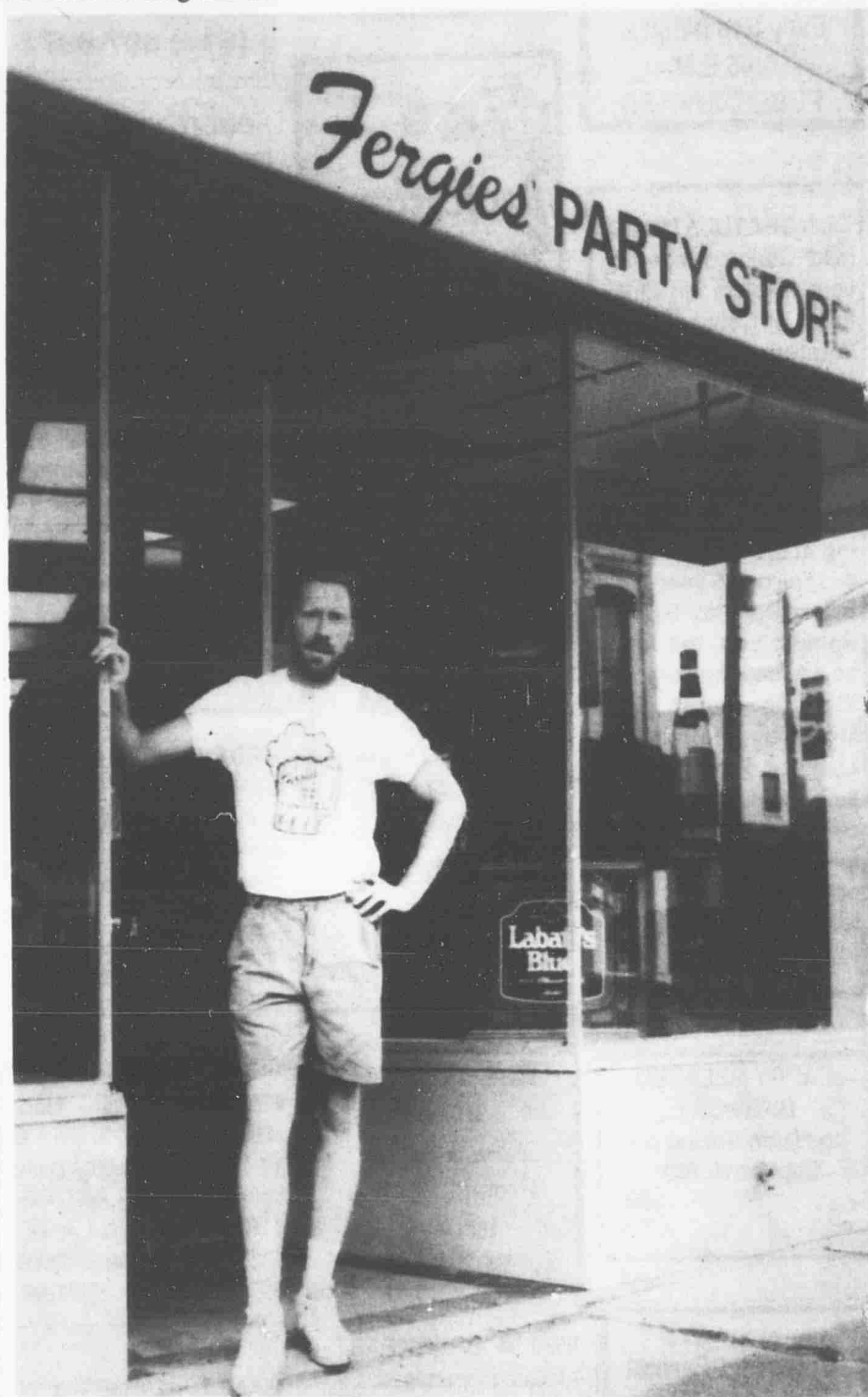
