Pool closed: City adopts motion to cover transportation costs for Lowell kids' Ionia swimming lessons

Following the recommendation of the Lowell Area Parks and Recreation Board and the YMCA Board, the City agreed to close the King Memorial Pool this year. sions."

The Parks and Recreation Board reviewed the condition of the pool with YMCA Director Andy Johnson and determined that the cost to repair the pool would run between \$6-\$10,000.

"This would not guarantee the YMCA approval of the health department," said Parks and Recreation member and Councilman Don Green.

Instead, it was recommended that the City pay half of the transportation costs for swimming lessons to the Ionia pool not to exceed \$2,500.

"Bussing costs should total as much as \$6,540," Johnson said. "This is based on a four day, eight week program with day and evening ses-

Lowell City Councilman Bill Thompson asked how many Lowell City kids were involved with the program last year. Johnson did not have a number, but said 33 percent of the kids involved were from the City last year.

"I think the City should cover the costs to bus City kids and if the Townships pick up their share well then we will bus kids outside the City also.

It was questioned as to why the new Stoney Lakeside Park could not be used for swimming. Green said it could be used for swimming but cannot be used for swimming lessons. "It would take away children's opportunity to learn how to swim."

Thompson said the City cannot continue to patch the Y swimming program for ev-

Thompson then made a cause of availability. motion for the City to cover the transportation costs of all City children who want to take swimming lessons. The Council supported the motion.

Johnson said the Ionia YMCA was chosen over the Forest Hills SE YMCA be-

The Council recognized it still has the pool to deal with. "An empty pool sitting is a liability," Thompson said.

Green said he would provide the Council with possible solutions and figures to take care of the pool. This

could include bulldozing it in and filling in the hole with back dirt. What to do with the pool will be discussed at the May 4 meeting.

erybody. Lowell businessman of 41 years, Gurney Hahn, dies at age 65

The Lowell community lost an unique character, friend and its dean of businessmen last Wednesday, when Hahn Hardware owner, Gurney Peckham Hahn, died at the age of 65.

The Lowell businessman of 41 years battled pulmonary fibrosis before succumbing to the lung condition at 3 p.m. on April 15. A condition for which there is no known cause or cure.

Hahn's Hardware has been located at 207 E. Main St. since 1951. It's the same block in which Gurney's father ran Hahn's Grocery Store from 1923 to 1943.

Hahn was a veteran of World War II and went into the U.S. Navy, where he was a seaman for 16 months and then returned home after the war.

The inside layout of Hahn's Hardware did not change much over the years, which led the businessman to joke that he'd swept the floor once in 41 years and may have washed the windows a couple of times.

After returning home from the war and finding work, Gurney married his wife, Donna Vandenhout Gurney. The couple was married 42-1/ 2 years.

Gurney was active with the Lions Club, the Boy Scouts, Board of Trade, First Congregational Church of Lowell and with the Masons.

He was preceded in death by his mother, Thelma Hahn. He is survived his wife, Donna, father, Robert Hahn; children, Robert and Josina Hahn of Walnut Creek, CA. Council votes to remove fuel tanks at the DPW

The City of Lowell moved to remove the fuel tanks at the Department of Public Works and purchase its fuel through Fairchild Oil by a card sys-

Currently, the City of Lowell has three 1,000 gallon underground fuel tanks behind the Public Works building.

In order to comply with the federal EPA requirements as

enforced by the State Fire Marshal's office, upgrading of the tanks must be accomplished for leak detection and spill/overflow.

It was felt by the City that cost savings could be achieved by removing the tanks and purchasing fuel through Fairchild's card system. This would also avoid future liability of gas leaks.

The Council agreed to accept the low bid of North Garfield to remove and dismantle the tanks, clean site assessment, remove asphalt or concrete and back fill to grade with sand and top soil. The work would be performed in accordance to EPA and State Fire Marshal regulations.

North Garfield Excavating's bid came in at \$3,900.

Council formally agrees to join district library

At Monday night's meeting the Council took the next step and approved an agreement to formally join the District Library Agreement.

Bruce Robinson, District Library manager, stated that 18 of the 26 eligible communities have either passed reso-

lutions of interest or signed agreements.

With the process nearly completed, an election will be scheduled (tentatively for August) where a millage will be requested.

Plan exists for **Schools of Choice**

The Lowell Area Schools has adopted a Schools of Choice Plan to comply with the School State Aid Act of 1992. This plan is published in its entirety in the box below. The purpose of this article is to inform the public that the

Anyone interested in exercising the School of Choice option may call the building principal of the chosen school for an explanation of the program so that an informed decision may be made.

The District Open Enrollment form may be obtained from the Superintendent's office or any of the three elementary school offices, and must be completed and submitted to the Superintendent's office by May 15. Parents will be notified of a decision regarding their request by July 1

SCHOOLS OF CHOICE PLAN

This plan is developed in compliance with the School State Aid Act of 1992 by the Lowell Schools "Schools of Choice Committee." All elementary school students of the Lowell Schools will be eligible for this program. The district will assume responsibility for transportation of students exercising open enroll-

A. In general, students shall attend the school serving the attendance area in which they live. Parents may request a transfer from one attendance area to another in order to exercise some freedom of educational choice. Such transfers may be granted only when:

1. The parents are not requesting a change to avoid meeting legitimate academic or conduct requirements for their students.

2. Staff and facilities of the receiving building can accommodate additional student assignments.

B. Transfers will be considered on a space available basis using the optimum number in the Teacher Master Agreement for elementary students.

C. If there are more requests made than there are available slots, the selection will be made by lottery.

D. Students/parents who would like to request a change in school buildings must submit their requests in writing, using our district form, to the Superintendent's office by May 15 of each year. A transfer student

E. Where there is documentation of disruptive behavior or pending disciplinary action, such a student may be transferred on a temporary basis. If such behavior persists, the

F. Due to the timing of this legislation, information on the School of Choice program will be disseminated to the public by April 22, 1992. In subsequent years public information will be available through the district newsletter, DIRECTIONS, by the end of February.




cozy corner by Roger Brown

In a small study just recently done, 20 healthy volunteers who said they regularly used salt were told to keep meticulous records of the sodium content of every thing they ate for one week. At the end of the week, careful tallies revealed that the group consumed 3,938 milligrams of sodium per day, about the same amount as most other Americans consume.

However, although research in the past has speculated that most people get about 30 percent of their sodium intake from table salt, the volunteers only got about six percent of their sodium that way. Another 12 percent occurred naturally in the foods they ate. But a huge 77 percent of the group's sodium came from processed food, lunch meats commercially canned or packaged soups, packaged cakes, potato chips and

What Are Those Teachers Doing?

It's time to stop predicting rain and start building the ark of educational success! But how? Without adequate local support and adequate State and local funding, our schools will become informational backwaters and students non-functional literates. Our public school system (not just Lowell) is being asked to accomplish wonders without the support it deserves.

It amazes me that the education bashers that I talked about in a previous column often run large corporations that lose billions of profit dollars while they beg for protection from foreign competition. These same people tell us that our educational system is antiquated and needs an immediate recall for an attitudinal and functional adjustment.

As always, the basis for that opinion is a constant reference to the poor test performance of our students against those of other countries. Elected officials so often fall into the same trap by over responding to criticism of education from business by attaching too many "strings" to state aid support for public schools.

The facts are that schools, and particularly Lowell Area Schools, are doing a tremendous job. When comparing reading, science, or math scores internationally, the doomsayers don't bother telling us that "all" our students are being compared to "only" the best and brightest of most other nations.

In this country, all 13 year olds are in school and that's just not the case in much of the rest of the world. Beneath all the hand wringing and misinformation, there lies an issue of concern to all. Today's students must be prepared to live and function in the future, BUT has anyone seen a single document out of Washington or Lansing that describes what it means to be educated for the 21st Century?

What are our teachers doing about it? I can tell you this much. They totally recognize that the educational need of today's students are much different from their own generations. Long before the term "school improvement" ever appeared in the State Aid Formula, teachers in Lowell were planning and implementing changes in the way they teach kids and upgrading the internal school organizations.

Whenever any of our teachers return from a workshop, there is always a comment about how far ahead we are of other districts in meeting and implementing the instructional change. While many other districts all around us are talking about change, we're doing it! While other districts are beginning to talk about how to adapt instructional technology as a useful tool for teaching, our staff and administration has planned and designed a new high school to accommodate an upgraded approach to student instruction. The bottom line message here is that we all should become better label readers. Sodium-like fat and cholesterol, is well hidden in many foods which may lead you to believe it is healthy. If you have been advised to follow a low sodium diet, generally two grams or less per day, then educate yourself on the ingredients of the foods you regularly consume. While it is important to minimize your table salt intake, this may actually be the least of your dietary sodium concerns.

Item #1. PUBLIC INFORMATION SESSION - JAMES STREET IMPROVEMENTS. Cost estimates were presented for paving James Street relating to the planned water main upgrading. The following two estimates were provided: (a) a 12' wide asphalt repair covering the water main installation area for \$8,000, (b) a 20' wide asphalt mat covering the width of the roadway for \$15,500. The cost of asphalting has been split on a 50-50 basis between the City and property owner. Based on front footage cost, proposed special assessments were provided to each affected property owner (\$1.66 per l.f. for 12' width asphalting, \$3.20 per l. f. for 20' width asphalting). Several affected property owners stated their concerns about the actual construction and patching of their road. Councilmember Green stated that he was having a struggle with not doing the entire project now (sanitary sewer, and curb and gutter). In ten to fifteen years, the City will have to do all the improvements. By then, the whole project could have been paid.

IT WAS MOVED BY GREEN and seconded by THOMP-SON to recommend that the City accept the 20' wide asphalt cap on James Street to be split on a 50-50 basis between the City and Property owner by special assessment.



Pets are surrendered or abandoned by their owners for a variety of reasons, but roughly 10 percent of female dogs surrendered are pregnant. Many owners are unprepared to deal with an unwanted litter of puppies or kittens, and in desperation, some owners resort to inhuman actions when they are unable to find homes for unwanted offspring. Volunteers at a humane society in Orange County, California search disposal bins daily to look for living puppies and kittens placed among dead animals by desperate owners. Right here in Lowell we have had several instances of kittens left to die in trash dumpsters.

Pets should not be bred or allowed to become pregnant. Even if you did finds homes for all your puppies or kittens, how many of these offspring will become pregnant, and how many of the offspring of those offspring will become preg-

I strongly recommend that all pets be spayed or neutered before six months of age, allowing no opportunity for an unwanted pregnancy.

Gary Voogt of Moore and Bruggink (township engineer) and Tim McNamara of Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr and Huber were also present

The following tables provided by Gary Voogt demonstrates what customers will have to pay if water is extended into the Township and High School as well as providing improvements to the City's water system.

Voogt noted that the proposed rates were based or financing \$1,240,000 of in city improvements less \$140,000 of work on M-21 (special assessed) plus the township tank (\$500,000). The \$1,600,000 of these improvements would be financed through a 20 year bond at 6% interest. The in city rate has been proposed for a 30 cent per thousand gallon increase. The township

would be billed at \$1.61 per thousand gallons based on 54 million gallons of flow per year. School Board Member Ray Quada said that the Lowell Area Schools are required by Vergennes Township to have sewer and water at the new high school site. Quada noted that the Schools will have to do what it takes to accommodate \$18,822 this. He felt it was in everyone's interest for the City and the Township to discuss this and see what can and cannot be done.

City Manager Pasquale stated that the City has a preswhen the system expands to accommodate the school and townships. The present water system without improvement makes expanding impossible. George Regan, Water Plant Superintendent, added that when the plant is down, a negative pressure is created when a fire takes place and the hydrants are open.

Councilmember Hodges said there is strength in numbers. He further mentioned that in this case, it is a win, win, win situation. It upgrades our system and everyone benefits. George Regan, Water Plant Superintendent, said it increases the City's customer base which is needed. In addition, residents in Eastgate on community water are probably running softeners which won't be needed with city water. They will save money.

Furthermore, it was mentioned by Lowell Township Trustee Herb VanderBilt, that Eastgate residents do not currently have fire protection. The hydrants are designed only to flush out the system. From a safety standpoint, the Eastgate residents would gain in fire protection. They could look at this as a positive to reduce their fire insurance rates.

By consensus, the Council decided to meet in a work session on April 13, to discuss expanding the water system. Their findings will be further examined at the April 20, 1992 Council Meeting.

James Street residents get water service improved

James Street residents got their wish Monday night as the Lowell City Council ap- back proved a motion to put in an eight-inch water main, replacing the existing two-inch main thus providing James Street residents with an improved water service.

Lowell City Manager provided the Council with cost estimates for paving James Street relating to the planned water main upgrading.

The two road improvement estimates that were provided were for a 12-foot wide asphalt repair, covering the water main installation area for \$8,000 or a 20-foot wide asphalt mat covering the width of the roadway.

The cost of asphalting will be split 50-50 between the City and property owners. Based on front footage cost, property owners would be charged \$3.20 per lineal foot for 20-foot asphalting.

The Council agreed that 12-feet would just serve as a patch covering the side of the road where the new eight inch water main will be put in. Department of Public Work

The project is far less substantial than sanitary sewer and curb and gutter.

"I think the proper way is to do it all. In 10-15 years a sewer is going to have to be put in. The state will probably mandate it. I don't want people asking then why it wasn't done right the first time," Councilman Don Green asked. He added he understand the plight of the homeowners and thus motioned his sup- Grand Rapids hand surgeon port for the 20-foot cap with water main.

Pasquale said the City will proceed on bidding. "If the numbers are out of line, it will be reviewed again," he said. "A special assessment district will also be established."

The Lowell City Manager added that while the eight-inch mains will not provide the optimum water service, it will be much improved over what they currently have.




