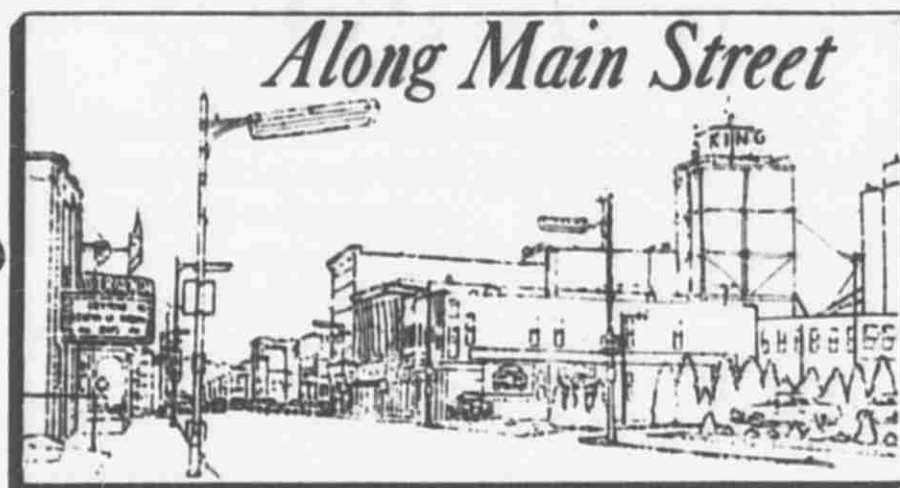

Middle School homework line a hot one

Jim White, Lowell Director of Instruction, said back in April that he'd wait to see how many calls come in through Homework Hotline before critiquing it.

If usage of the hotline is the barometer, than the mercury has blown right through the top.

In terms of number of teachers in the program and the number of calls, Lowell Middle School is on a record-setting pace.

"Based on the number of calls received at the Middle School, it's been extremely successful," White said. "We'd like to hook up two more schools in the fall (high school and Runciman)."

While some believe its use at the elementary level is not practical, White disagrees. "If you're limiting it to homework than yes, maybe it's not practical. But I believe there is much more use beyond homework. It can be used for atten-

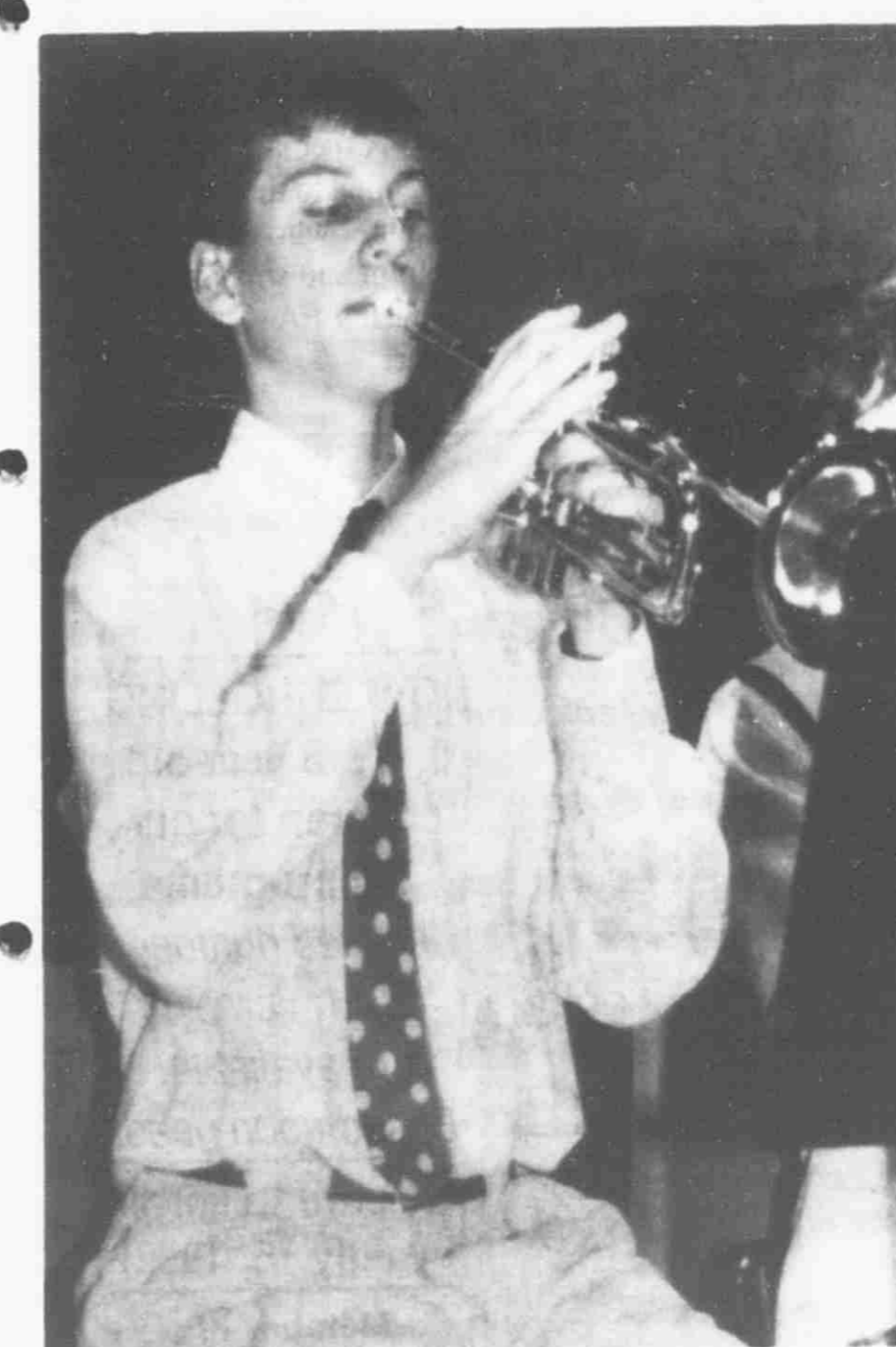

Flights of Fancy

Neuberry shares Wright Brothers flight history with students

The "plane" truth is Nan Neuberry hoped that her visit to Bushnell School would encourage kids to read more. Neuberry, who is seeking a specialization in reading at Grand Valley State University, is seeking an elementary endorsement in reading. That endorsement must include interaction with children.

Fulfilling that obligation, Neuberry spent a day at Bushnell Elementary talking and reading to 1-5 grade students about Wilbur and Orville Wright.

"I shared a book called 'The Wright Brothers' written by Russell Freedman," Neuberry said.

She chose the Wright Brothers story because it is one of picking oneself up after failure.

"The Wright Brothers failed a number of times, but they picked themselves up each time and kept going," Neuberry said. "I believe that's a problem facing today's society, people are confronted with a problem and they just

quit instead of coming to grips with it and keep trying."

Neuberry was enthused with the interest shown by Bushnell students on the Wright Brothers.

The first successful flight in a heavier-than-air mechanically propelled airplane by Orville Wright on Dec. 17, 1903 near Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, 120 feet in 12 seconds. There was a fourth flight

the same day by Wilbur Wright, 852 feet in 59 seconds.

Neuberry brought with her a miniature plane she made from a blue print she received from the Smithsonian Institute.

"I was very pleased with the response I received from the teachers and the interest shown by the children," Neuberry said.

"The course played tough. It was long and the grass was thick and deep," Lowell coach Rick White said.

"The girls will have to turn it up a notch at the regional on Monday," White said. The Red Arrows will have the home course advantage as the regional will be held at Deer Run.

When it's the Jenison girls' golf team.
Jenison's Lauri Berles fired an incredible 71 over 18 holes to lead the host to a five-stroke victory over the Red Arrows at the Jenison Invitational.

Mike Dey, former club president and three-year Athletic Booster member, came up with a plan to reorganize.

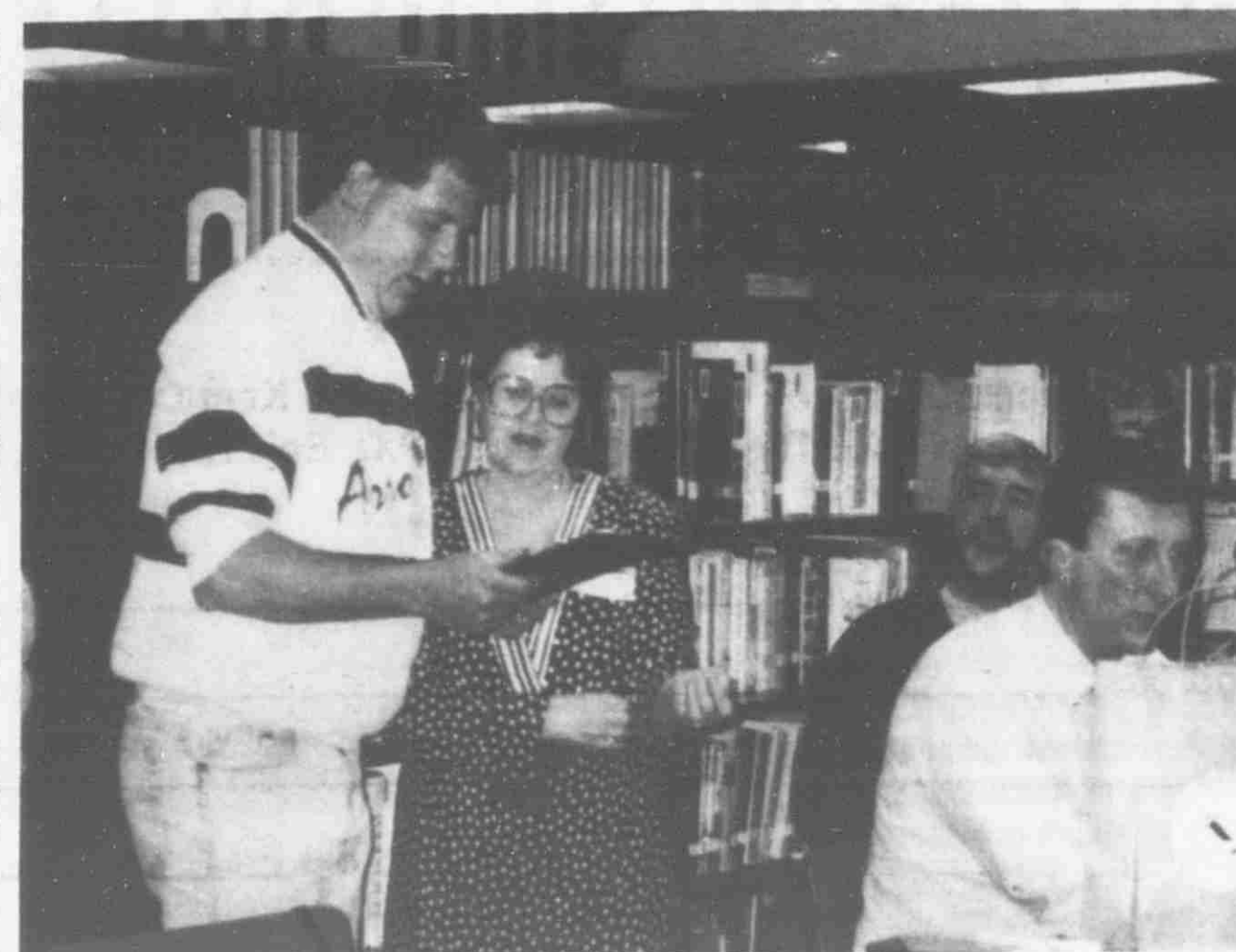
The reorganization calls for a parent from each high school sport to be representative of the sport at each Boosters Club meeting.

Lowell Rotary underwrites workplace skills literacy program

Lowell Director of School and Community Services, Dick Korb identified a need.

The Lowell Rotary Club and its President, Jim Lang, fulfilled that need.

The need Korb and Lowell Community Education were faced with was in the areas of basic skills and training and retraining for area businesses and their employees.

"The technical training and retraining would be fulfilled by Grand Rapids Community College," Korb said. "Lowell Community will work with businesses and its employees on basic skills such as reading, writing, grammar, math, communication and problem solving skills."

Korb emphasizes that a

number of the local businesses in the areas identified the needs they would like addressed.

The cost to Lowell Community Education for books, supplies and materials for a workplace skills literacy program is \$1,050.

Enter the Lowell Rotary Club. Lang informed Korb that the Rotary Club would underwrite the entire amount for such a program.

Following a presentation by Korb, five Lowell businesses identified their company's needs.

Along with fulfilling basic skills needs on site of the local businesses, Korb said, Lowell Community Education is also looking to provide a high school comple-

tion program.

"This is a real example of how school and business partnerships can assist local business. The end product is employees better able to serve their company," Korb said. "The company becomes more competitive and diverse. The more diverse, the more the company has to offer."

The program allows for the resources and teachers for this program at a lower cost than high-tech workshops.

"Most importantly, this program does not cost the local taxpayers one dime," Korb said. "Lowell Community Education provides the service and the funding is provided by the state and private grants such as the one attained through the Lowell Rotary Club."

Nationally, Discover received nearly 5,000 nominations from juniors in public and private schools and in American schools abroad in the first year of the Tribute Award program.

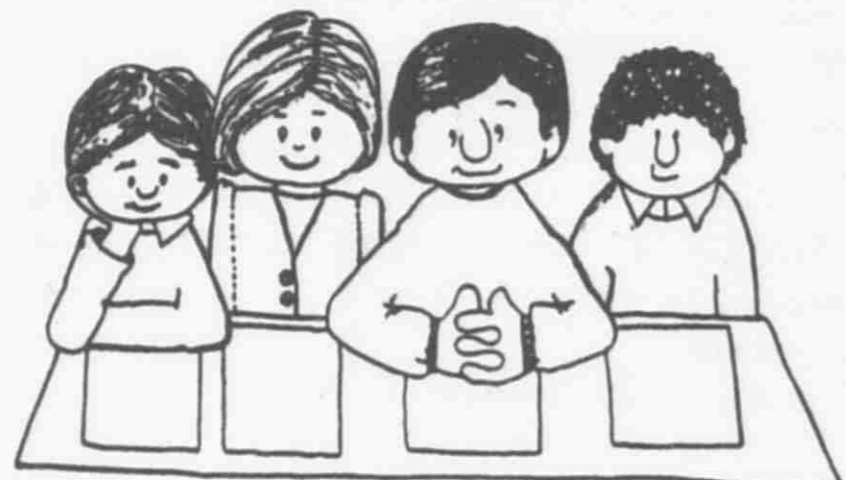
