

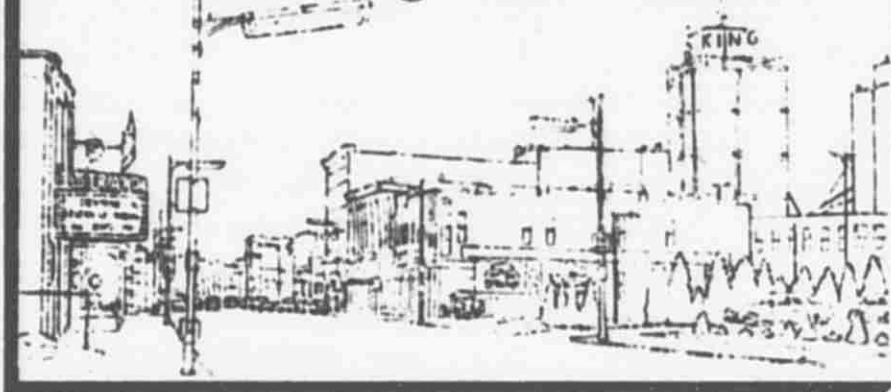

## MS patient finds therapeutic aid in his time spent on Murray Lake

There are times when Marthajane Long must just walk away and take a deep breath.

She learned 21 years ago that her son, Roger A. Long, had multiple sclerosis.

Marthajane watched with anguish for seven years as this disease slowly deteriorated Roger's nerve endings, leaving him in a wheelchair and dependent on others to help him perform many of life's essential basics that he once took for granted.

"It's been rough," Marthajane says. "Roger was always so active."

Her son, who used to walk 18 holes of golf, now is unable to stand on his own.

However, this is not a story about what Roger A. Long can no longer do, instead it's about the man's inner strength that helps him keep his self esteem.

Roger continues to enjoy life and continues to reach for and enjoys some of the desserts that life can still offer him.

Those desserts include fishing, and boating. Oh, and

yes, his mother's rolled oat and raisin cookies.

"Whatever goals Roger wants he can reach as long as the will and want is there," says his personalized nurse, Fernando Capestany as he

steers Rogers' newly crafted pontoon boat around Murray Lake. Capestany is a specialized nurse for Caring Hands Home - Home Care.

Roger purchased the pontoon boat from Murray Lake Marina owner Richard Cromwell who had the boat specially made by the Ameri-

can Boat Company in Alma. "It makes me feel good to be able to help Roger. He really enjoys boating," Cromwell said.

The boat is specially made with a ramp that pulls out from under the front end, which enables it to dock at

## MS a complex disease

Currently 250,000 Americans diagnosed

Multiple Sclerosis (MS) is a chronic, slowly progressive disease of the central nervous system. Unfortunately, its cause is unknown and although it is treatable, there is no known cure.

About 250,000 Americans currently suffer from MS. Most victims are young adults, with most cases diagnosed in people between the ages of 15 and 40. Women tend to be affected twice as often as men. MS is not a contagious disease and it is rarely fatal. Many MS patients are building constructive lives, provided they are receiving proper medical care.

MS usually develops with symptoms relative to the nervous system. They may include weakness, clumsiness, tingling sensations or numbness in the limbs. Patients may also experience visual disturbances; double vision, eyeball pain, or even blindness. Some people may have only loss of bladder control as an initial symptom.

The diagnosis of MS is sometimes difficult, because of the wide range of nonspecific symptoms it may cause. Sophisticated neurological testing, including a spinal tap or perhaps an MRI (magnetic resonance image) are performed to aid in the diagnosis.

While there is currently no cure for MS, there are several medical therapies available to help lessen the symptoms of initial attack or subsequent relapse. These therapies include an adrenal hormone, (ACTH) and muscle relaxants if muscle spasm develops. Several investigational treatment modalities are also being considered for general use.

MS is a disease which is complex and unpredictable. Its lack of predictability makes its diagnosis and treatment difficult. A great deal of research is currently being done on MS, and we can only hope that the future holds more promise for the victims of this neurological disease.

## Summer reading provides kids with "Earth Smarts"

"Earth-Smart" is the theme of this year's summer reading clubs and programs at branches of the Kent County Library System, where readers of all ages will learn to appreciate our earth and its environment. In addition to the traditional reading clubs for children, Kent County Libraries will offer a club for young people and adults age 16 and older.

Sign-up for all clubs begins June 8 at Kent County Library branches including the Lowell and Alto Branch. The reading clubs run through July 18, with special programs scheduled through August.

The library invites parents and children ages three to six to join "Earth Keepers", a read-aloud book club for families. Independent readers ages 6 to 10 can become "Planet Captains," selecting books and earning reading awards. A more challenging

book club for students ages 11 through 15 is "Global Guardians."

Participants receive prizes for achieving their reading goals and can become "library heroes" by volunteering at the library. Young adults and adults can join the "World Wise" book club.

Last year, almost 13,000 children participated in Kent County Library's summer reading clubs.

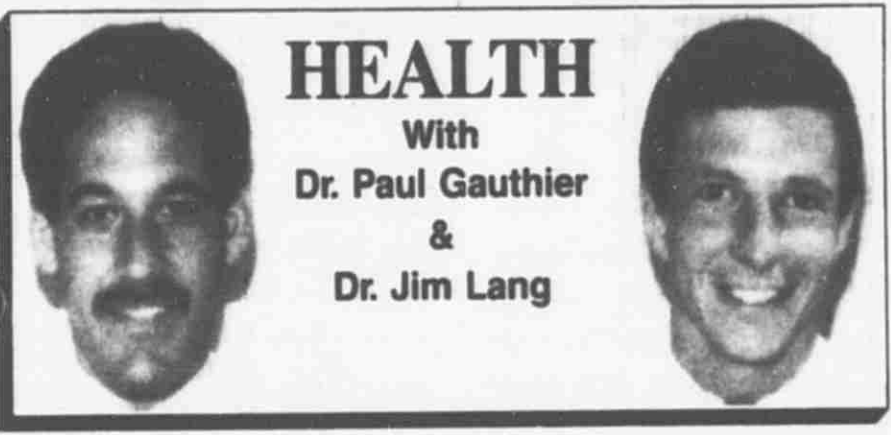
# Viewpoint . . .

## Thad's Thoughts

High School graduation has always been looked at as a time of celebration. A time for parents to reflect back on child's growth from that little tot waving from the bus window as he or she rides off to kindergarten, to receiving that high school diploma. It's a time for students to celebrate a lifetime achievement milestone. After 13 years of hard work in the classroom, they anxiously await what life has to offer after school. Some will continue their education at the college level, and some will find a job. While graduation is a time to celebrate individual achievement, today more than ever before, how high school students celebrate is a front page concern. With anti drug and alcohol programs such as DARE, "Just Say No," and the message of don't drink and drive, celebrate may conjure up an image that these programs are trying to suppress.

In a recent "Parents Back to School" gathering, the discussion arose whether senior boys should be given steins and whether the senior girls should be given wine goblets at their senior class party. Lowell High School principal Jim DeWeerd and assistant principal Scott Vashaw agreed that these party favor gifts are sending a double message. "For over a century nearly every school has given its seniors party favors as gifts at their senior party, but giving students steins and goblets is definitely sending a double message," DeWeerd said. The high school principal said next year's senior class will be asked to change their gifts. "It has been done so long, there was never any thought given to it," DeWeerd said. The steins and goblets usually have the prom dance theme etched on them. Since the steins and goblets are purchased in August-September, no change could be made for this year. I don't think not giving out steins and goblets is going to stop those who want to drink from drinking. At the same time, it can't hurt. How about the graduation cards that start out by saying "Here's to your graduation," is there a double message there. In a society where people tend to abuse things that they like, we can only hope those graduates who see the need to drink while celebrating, do it in a responsible manner. Drinking isn't evil when it is done responsibly, but that is done less and less.

As an example of that, I was driving to my sister's place Sunday night. My mother and sisters were in the car. The automobile in front of us was swerving from one side to another, crossing the yellow line about every other swerve. As the driver, apparently having celebrated the Memorial Day Day weekend a little too heavily, came to a stop at the corner, it then pulled out onto U.S-12 (comparable to M-21), the driver came within a half-a-car length of being hit by on-coming traffic. We followed the driver all the way into Edwardsburg (the village) that's when we decided to stop at the police station and to let the police know someone was driving who shouldn't have been. Tell you this to reinforce the fact that irresponsible drivers come in all ages.

**USE OF ACYCLOVIR FOR CHICKEN POX**

Chicken Pox is an acute illness caused by the varicella zoster virus. Recently we've seen a fairly widespread outbreak of chicken pox in the Lowell area. The course of the illness is usually benign and self limited. The illness is characterized by the typical rash consisting of small blisters or vesicles on a red base which progress to crusted or scabbed lesions over a few days. The rash usually begins on the trunk or scalp. Early spring is the peak season for chicken pox outbreaks. The rash is often preceded by fever which may last for several days. Other symptoms associated with chicken pox are loss of appetite, lethargy and general malaise. Once a child has been exposed to the virus the

incubation period is 11 to 21 days for the rash to appear in the exposed child. The infected child is contagious until all the vesicles have crusted. Complications of chicken pox are rare and include secondary strep infections of the skin and encephalitis. Recently the antiviral drug, acyclovir, was approved for treatment of chicken pox in healthy children. A recent study reported that children who were treated with this medication beginning within 24 hours of the onset of the rash had a less severe course and a generally shorter duration of new lesion formations. The drug is usually given for five days. There was no difference in treated versus untreated children in the frequency of complications. The most common side effect of the medication was diarrhea. The cost of five days of treatment depends on the dosage given but is probably around \$40 for most children. Some doctors are recommending the medication for all children with chicken pox. Others argue that treatment of a benign self limited illness with a costly medication that may shorten the illness by a day or two is not really necessary. We have not been prescribing acyclovir on a routine basis but have recommended it occasionally. We feel every case requires individual consideration regarding the expected benefits versus possible risks.



### Ledger Entries of 100, 75, 50 and 25 Years Ago

**100 YEARS AGO IN THE JOURNAL - MAY 25, 1892**  
A tarantula arrived in Bay City in a bunch of bananas last week and hatched out 200 more. It has rained here every day in May to the 24th. Mrs. Blakeslee of Morse Lake has over 300 baby chicks, with thirteen setting hens to hear from yet. Bay County has a rash of bogus deputy sheriffs who make arrests, then let prisoners go for a price. Severe flooding on the Mississippi has drowned the potato and cabbage crops around St. Louis.

**75 YEARS AGO IN THE LEDGER - MAY 24, 1917**  
The Red Cross appeals for knitters (sweaters, caps etc. for servicemen) and sewers (hospital supplies). June 5 will be Registration Day for the draft. Major General John Pershing is directed to proceed to France with a division of 25,000 regulars. The Teddy Roosevelt volunteers are not asked. The army is looking for a camp site in Michigan of at east 2,000 acres. Admiral Peary claims that six foreign powers have the materials and expertise to wipe out any major city as far west as Denver by bombing, and that the U. S. is virtually undefended. Japanese warships are coming to the aid of France and the Allies.

**50 YEARS AGO IN THE LEDGER - MAY 28, 1942**  
The Showboat will not run this year if gas rationing goes into effect. Agnes Perry retires as chief operator here for Michigan Bell Telephone Company after 42 years. Retirement is mandatory at 65. There was talk of keeping her on for some extra weeks to qualify for the new retirement benefits. 200 Michigan editors view the huge new bomber plant at Willow Run, along with the dormitories, apartments and homes built to house workers. New army inductees will now be given two weeks to settle personal affairs before leaving for training.

**25 YEARS AGO IN THE LEDGER - MAY 25, 1967**  
Twenty Grand Rapids and Lowell youths start fighting east of town and are finally brought under control by a total of 18 officers, (also county and state police), west of town. High winds last week blew down 40 feet of wall on the Eberhard's construction site. 24 Main Street businesses join the Chamber of Commerce Paint Up Main Street campaign. The last two country school districts in Kent County, Ashley and Grattan Center, join Belding schools. A second Teen Center will open, on East Main, to handle the overflow crowds from the recently opened center under the showboat stands.

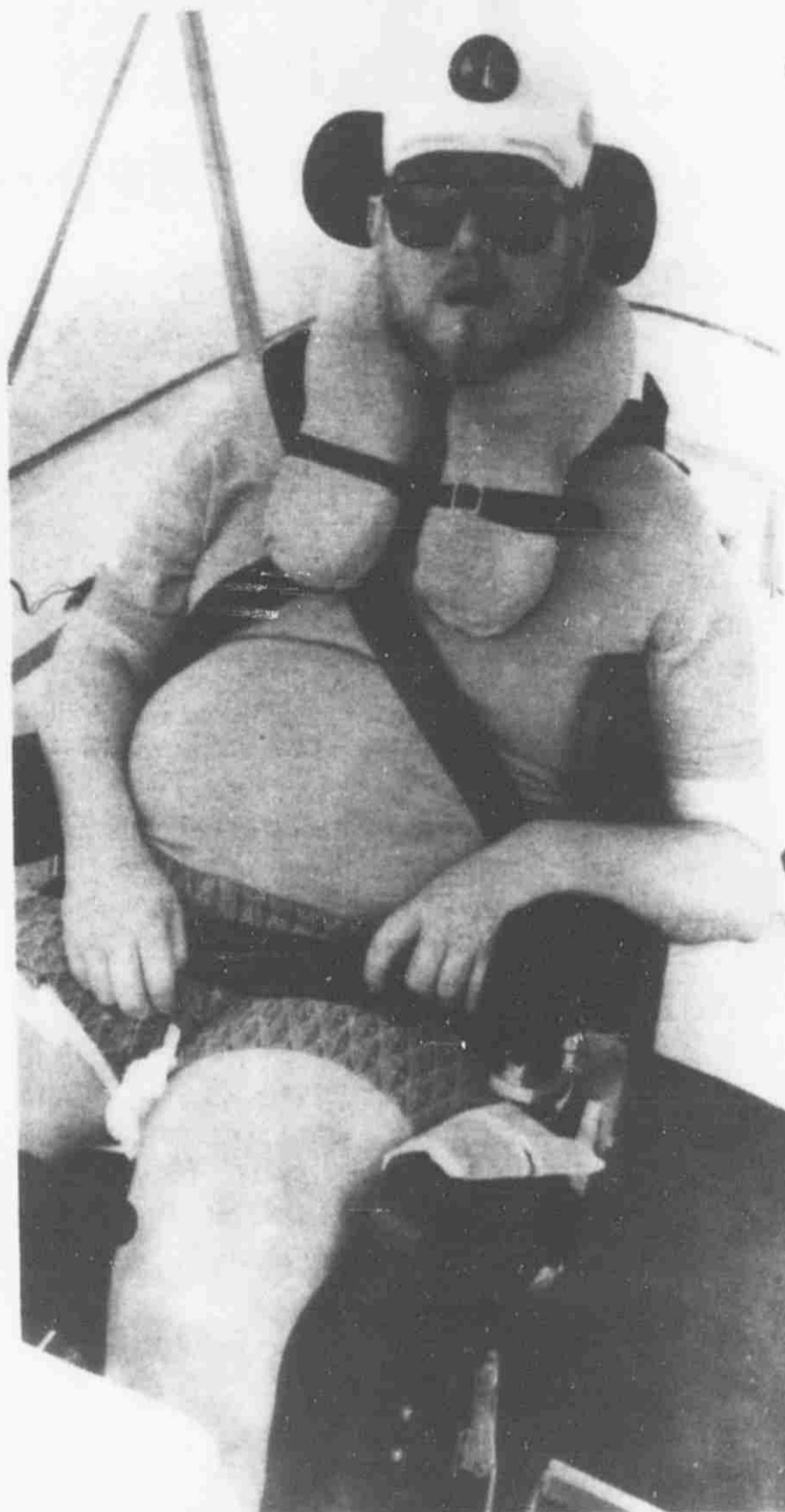

## Anderson finds fulfillment in helping people less fortunate than himself

### Lowell man's work heightens lives of people in Lesotho, Africa

As a Lowell High School vouth, Craig Anderson got to see and experience life from an international standpoint.

"I believe his participation in the Youth for Understanding international exchange program just whet his appetite," Craig's mother, Bev Anderson explains.

Since graduating from Aquinas College in 1981, Craig Anderson spent four years with the Peace Corps in the developing, southern country of Lesotho, Africa.

After the 1975 Lowell graduate completed his four years in the Peace Corps., he decided his work was not done. So, he has remained in Lesotho the past nine years, with the exception of this past year, when he left for Brattleboro, Vermont to earn his Master's Degree at the School for International Relations.

There are many development agencies, large and small, working in Lesotho addressing the issues of societal transformation. Some are governmental, like the U.S. Agency for International Development, some are private voluntary organizations, and some are non-governmental organizations.

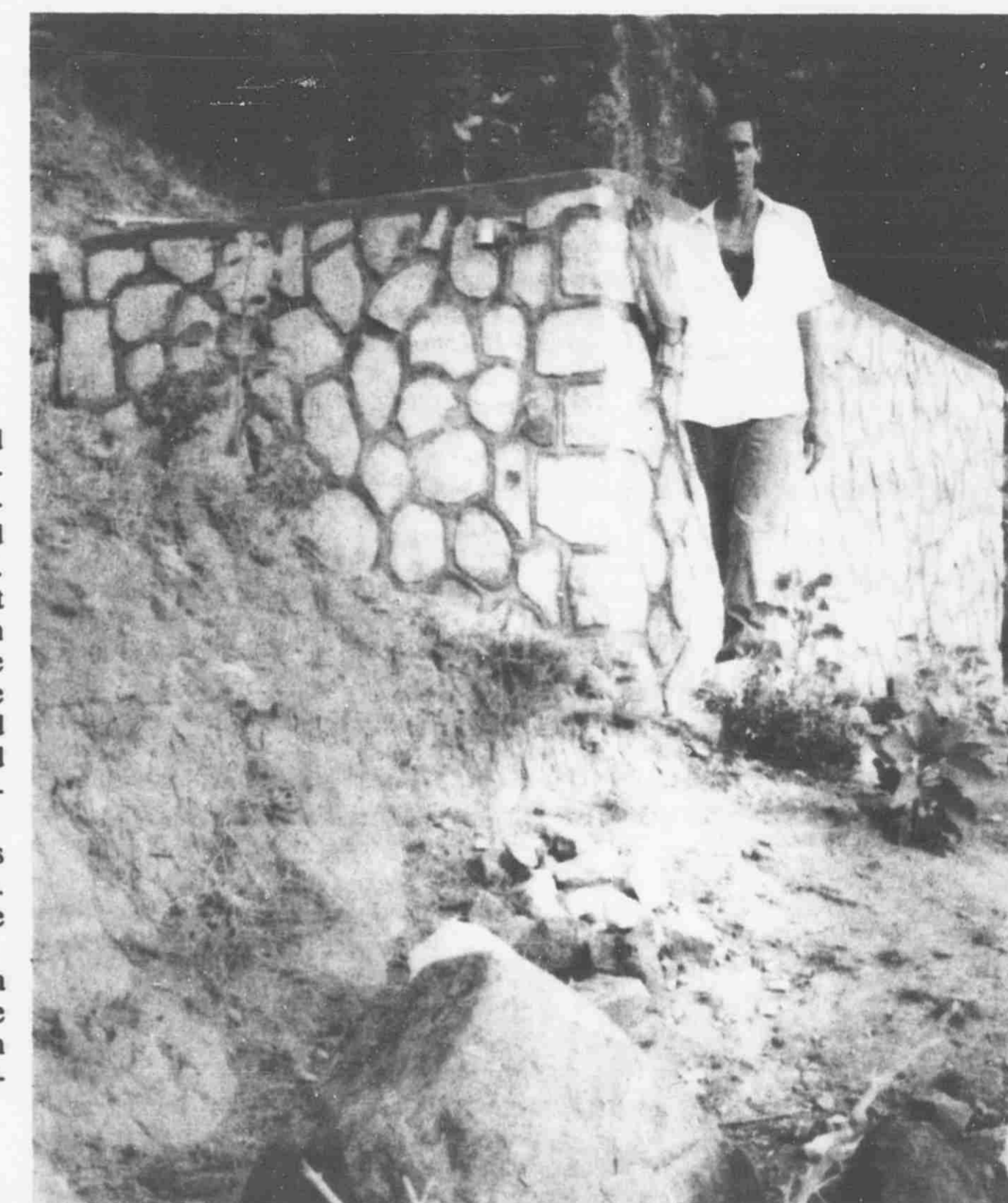
One that is very small is called Action Speaks Community Development Program. Anderson has served as its coordinator of activities since its inception at the end of 1988.

Action Speaks is based in a small rural village called ha Souru, approximately 25 miles north of Lesotho's capital city, Maseru.

Action Speaks is funded by Charles Englehard Foundation of New York with assistance from the First United Methodist Church of Lowell. In turn, it is working to assist the village-at-large based on the community needs. The components include, tree planting, soil conservation and fuel, health and nutrition, and small-scale income generating activities.

Craig's sister, Karen has visited her brother in Lesotho. Mom hasn't, but thinks she would like too.

"Karen believes I'd have a tough time adjusting to the compost pile for a bathroom and no showers," Bev Anderson said.



Craig Anderson stands next to the water tank he helped the village create.

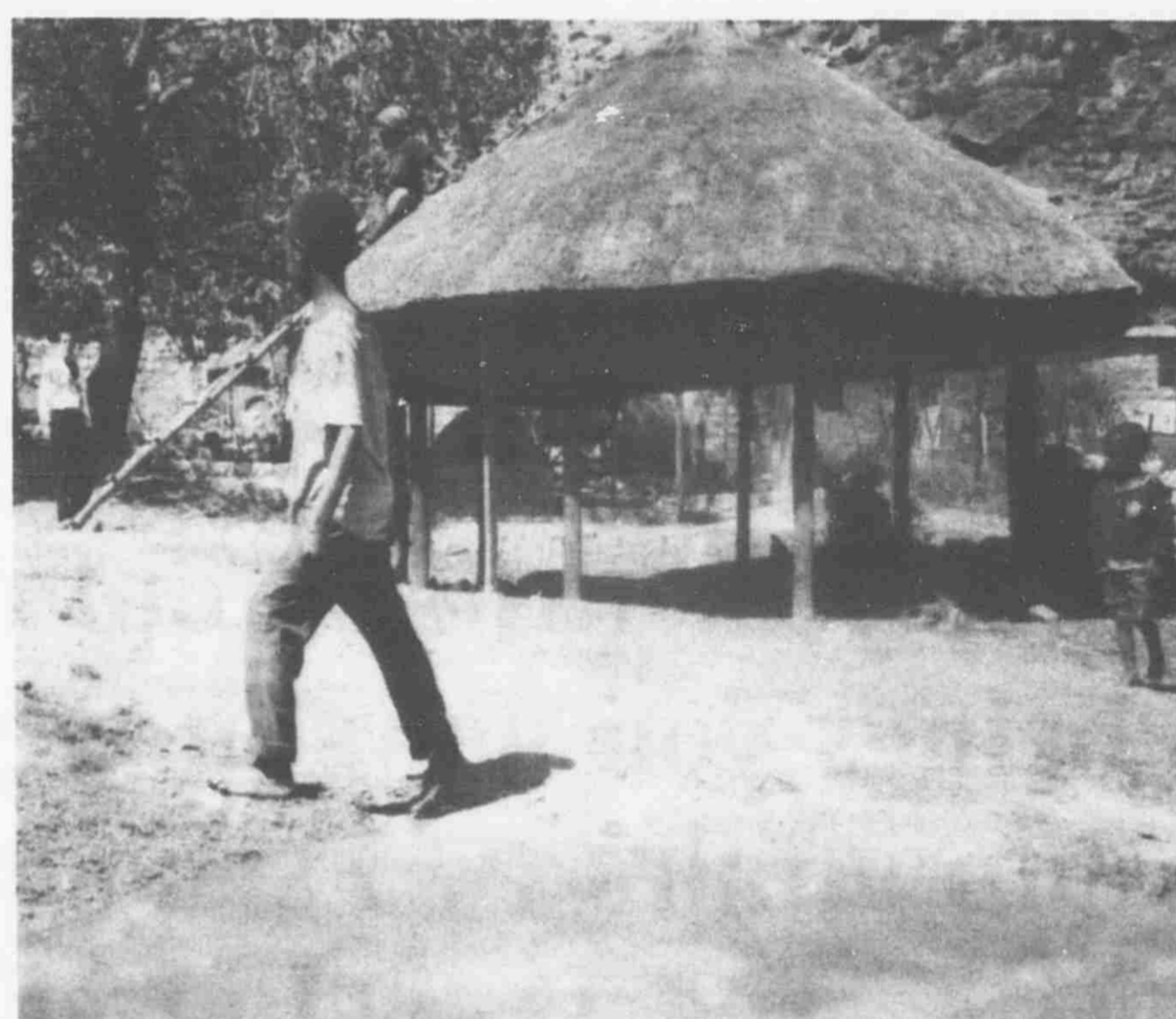
"I think the nine years implies Craig's enjoying what he's doing," Bev Anderson said. "He's interested in doing something for people. Helping those less fortunate than himself."

He has helped the people of Lesotho create a market of handi-crafts, he's educated them in the use of land for food and he has helped them find water sources.

Recently, a water tank was created for village supply. Also a bakery retail outlet.

"I don't reckon Craig will ever come back to live in Michigan," Bev said. "I wonder if he'll ever come to the United States. I don't think he will stay in Lesotho forever."

Lesotho is a small country the size of Maryland. Anderson says it is referred to as the "Swiss Alps" of Africa.

# PET TAGS

## FLEA PREVENTION

Flea season is just around the corner, and now is the time to start thinking about flea prevention. To effectively prevent fleas you need to do more than put on a flea collar

from the grocery store. To effectively prevent fleas it helps to understand their life cycle.

The life cycle of fleas includes: eggs, pupa, cocoon and adult. Eggs and cocoon are refractory to most insecticides, and can represent the vast majority of the stages present. Adult fleas live almost entirely on the pet. They lay their eggs on the pet, which then drop off into the environment, hatch and eventually become adults, which hop back on to the animal to start the cycle again. The adult female flea must take a blood meal; prior to laying her eggs.

Since the adult lives entirely on the pet, and since it must take a blood meal prior to contaminating the environment with eggs, the key to prevention is killing any fleas as soon as they hop on the pet to start the life cycle. This can be accomplished several ways. Topical sprays or powders applied to the pet, at every two to three day intervals, can

be effective. It is important that an effective insecticide is in these products. The best sprays include a product called an Insect Growth Regulator, which kills flea eggs on the pet before they can contaminate the environment. Flea dips last only for two to three days, and flea shampoos have no residual insecticide. The vast majority of flea collars do not protect the whole pet, but just around the neck.

Newer technology has developed products called systemic insecticides. These products are either applied to the skin or given in a pill form. This will allow the insecticide to be present in the blood, so when a flea takes a blood meal prior to laying eggs, she will die. The most recently developed product, is applied to the back of the dog, once monthly. This product will kill any flea that jumps on the

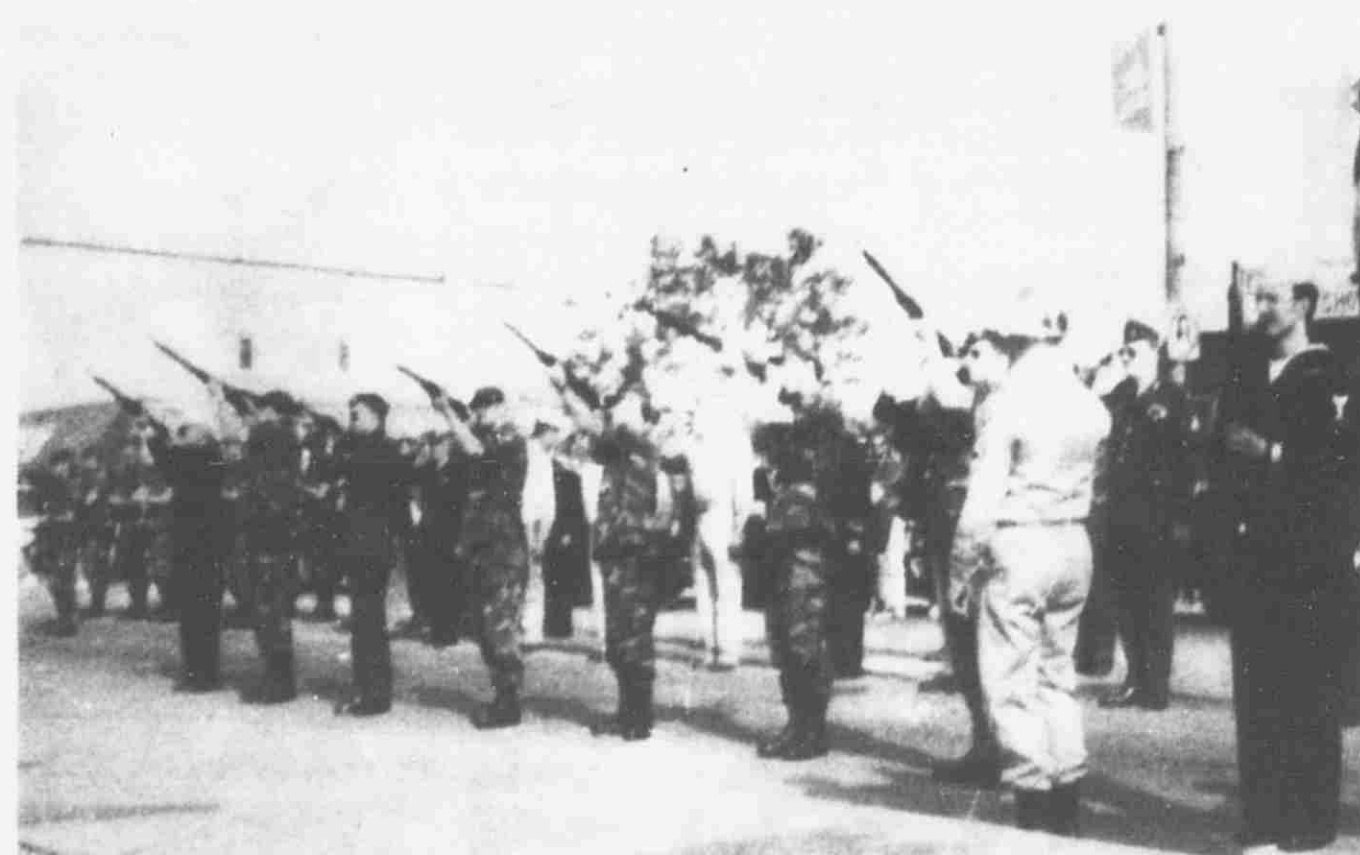
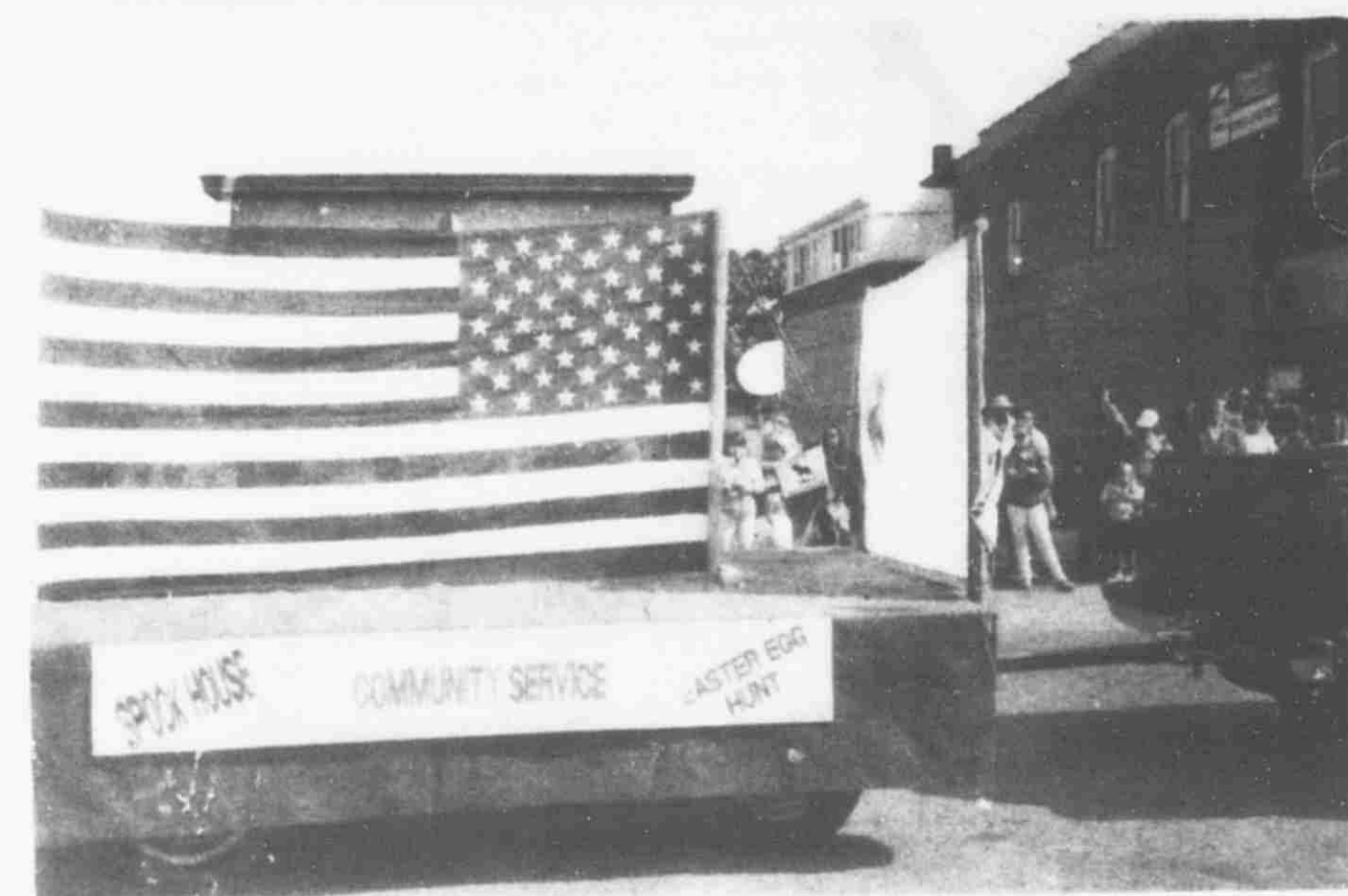

There are also ultrasonic denture cleaning devices which clean by ultra high frequency sound waves, about 20,000 cycles per second, but even here, all the stain and debris cannot be removed without some brushing.

colors, characteristics, growing season and likely locations of the different species. Along with the guide, pack bug spray and drinking water before beginning a search. Wear old clothes and comfortable boots or sneakers. And remember not to pick wildflowers. Many species are threatened or endangered

and protected by state law. A good place to start looking for wildflowers is at a state park or natural area. These areas often combine diverse settings with a variety of wildflower species. Before hitting the trails, check with park rangers or naturalists for tips on where to find blooms.

Generally, May is a good month to view wildflowers growing in wetlands and woods. A good choice is beech and maple tree forests. Look for blue hepaticas, white trilliums, yellow trout lilies, gold marsh marigolds and yellow lady's slippers.

Viewing is best in June and later for shoreline and meadow/prairie wildflowers. Seek out the dwarf lake iris along the northern shores of Lakes Michigan and Huron, pitcher's thistle and butterwort. Meadow/prairie varieties include the black-eyed susan, Indian paintbrush, evening primrose and golden-rod.

If exploring the woods or shoreline sounds too much like work, travelers can view wildflowers from inside a car. The Michigan Department of Transportation, in cooperation with other groups, has been restoring colorful wildflowers along the roadway since 1975 as part of "Operation Wildflower."

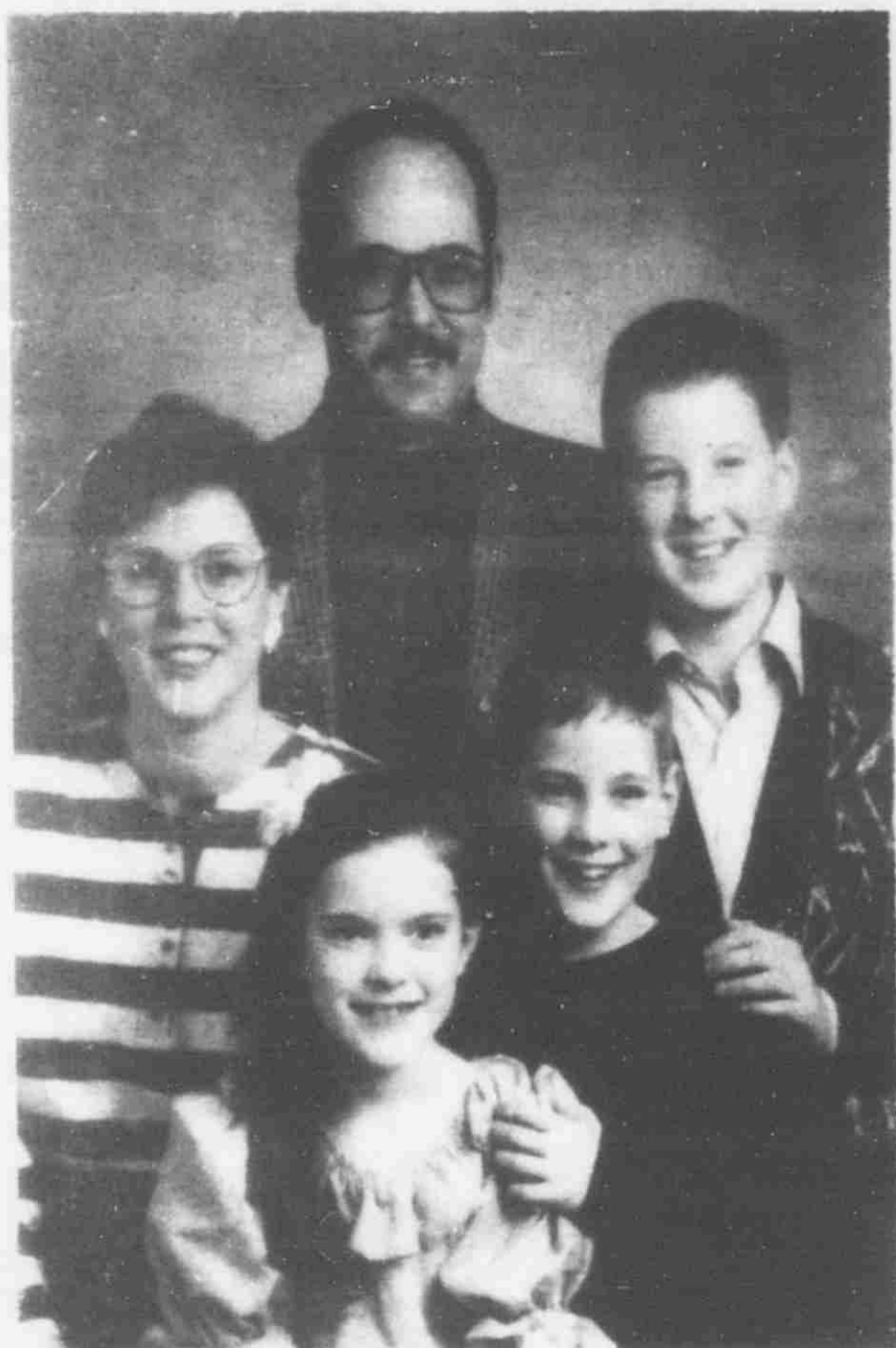

# Mission takes Gerry Rose to Northern Manitoba



Thompson sits 1,500 miles north of Lowell, the city Gerry Rose calls home.

The big Northern Manitoba Canadian City is where Rose and his family will call home on June 9.

Rose served in Bolivia 20 years ago in a mission field and it left an impact on him he still carries with him today.

The impact, in part, is what drives him today to gain eternal value.

"We all get caught up with our jobs and possessions, the missionary work I'll be doing in Thompson goes beyond the realm of jobs and possessions," Rose says.

In May of 1989 Rose interviewed and was accepted for the missionary work in Thompson. The past 2-1/2 years he has worked to get clearance from the Canadian Government for his work.

Thompson is a City with a number of small communities without any church. Rose will serve as a ministry the small communities that surround it.

"People use Saturday night to prepare for Church on Sunday, but there is no church to attend. There's no one there to minister to them," Rose explains.

Since serving in the mission field in Bolivia 20 years ago, Rose took mission courses at the Grand Rapids School of Bible and Music from 1978 through 1981.

Rose and his wife, Cindy will be dealing with the Cree

Indians. In particular, with the children in summer bible camps. Rose says he will be preaching, teaching and counseling while there.

"The mission doesn't require for me to stay any number of years, but I'm entering into the mission with the idea it will be permanent," Rose said.

Thompson is 150 miles north of Lake Winnipeg. Cindy will use the opportunity to work and deal with the people. "Working with people last forever. I hope to be there for them when there's trouble," she says. "I want to lend a caring ear. I believe the more a person gives the more they get back."

Both agree at first, the thought of the move scared them a little. "As the time gets closer, we're more certain that it is the right move," Rose said.
