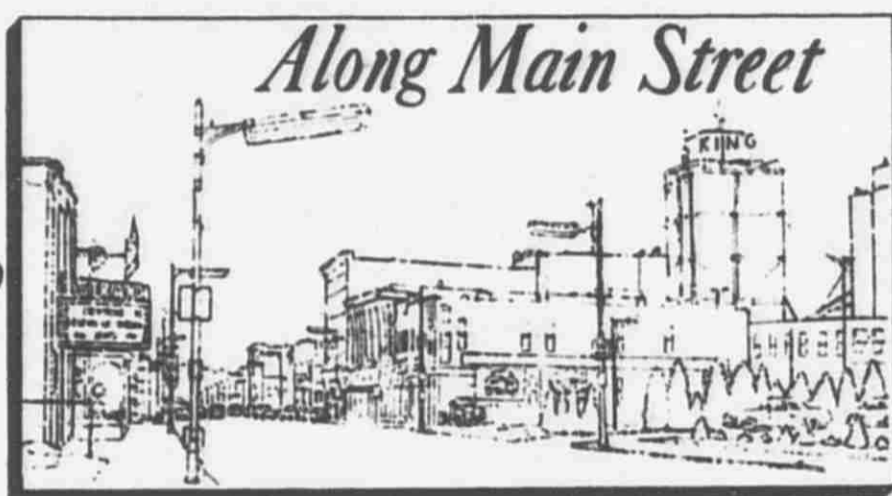

McDonald's granted variance for reader board Second one in 9 years

With the concern of sign proliferation in the business area, the Lowell City Council went ahead and approved a sign variance for McDonald's Restaurant located at 1300 W. Main.

A variance was needed because the current sign has already exceeded its maximum.

McDonald's has proposed to install a 24 square foot reader board on its pole sign. The maximum allowable square footage for the sign is 91 square feet. On June 24, 1984, the City granted McDonald's a variance to approve an additional 10.3 square feet over the maximum for the sign.

The request by McDonald's for a 3-by-8 foot (24 square feet) is to allow more visibility and to have an equal footing with its competitors who possess reader boards.

Bernard's True Value Hardware owner, Charlie Bernard, stated that he was concerned with the sign prolifera-

tion taking place in the Lowell business area.

Kevin Smith, Curtis Cleaners, stated he had no problem with the reader board as long as it was 10 feet above ground.

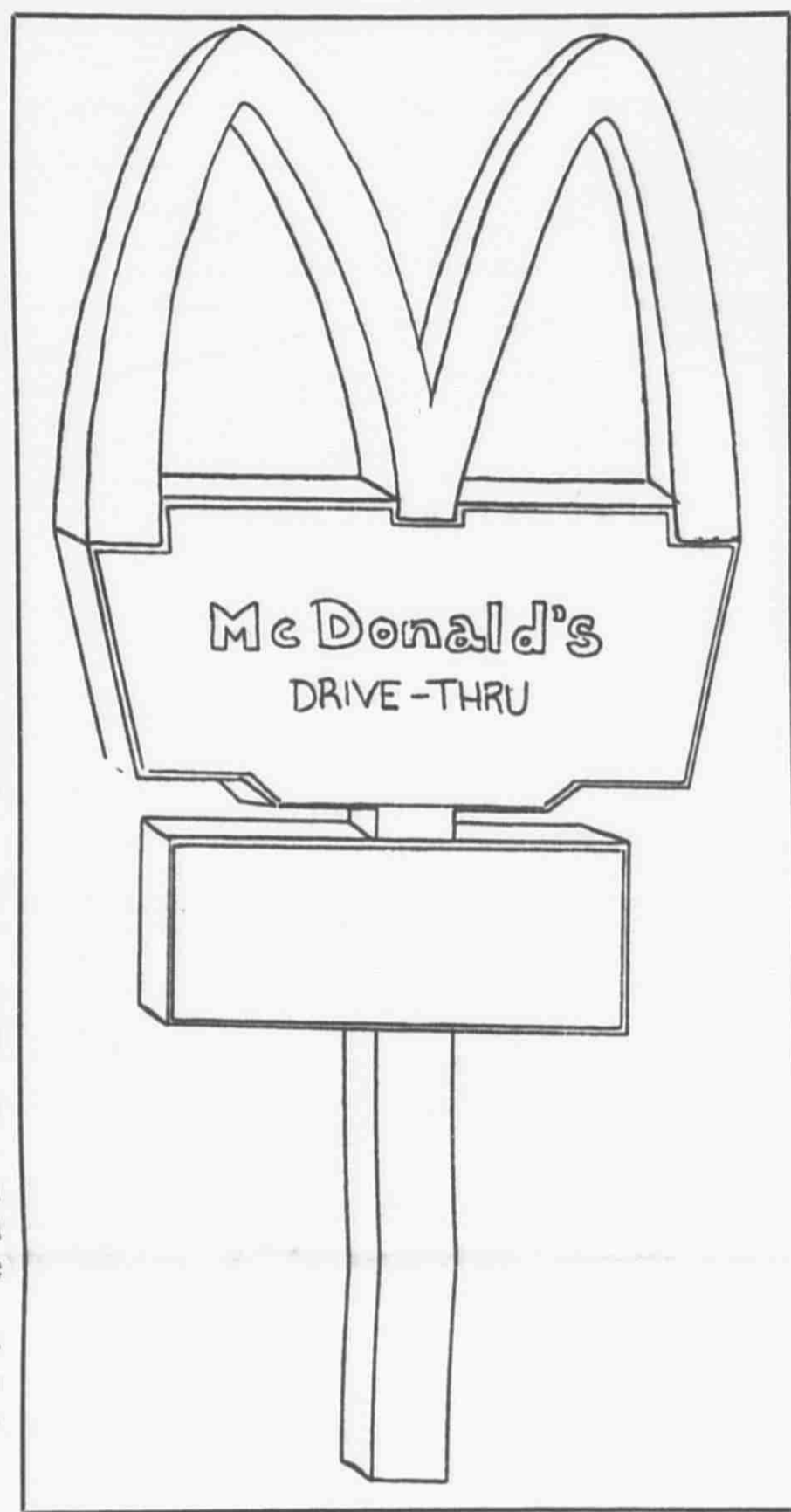
Lowell City Manager Dave Pasquale said the sign square footage is based on the width of the property.

Councilman Don Green said a sign specification has been set, and in giving variances the City runs the risk of the signs becoming bigger and bigger.

Councilman Hodges said that in the spirit of fair competition, he felt the City should do what it can to help and enhance business within the community.

With the help of the 1984 variance the sign footage on the McDonald's property is 101 square feet.

The Council approved the variance by a 4-1 vote. Councilman Bill Thompson was the only one to vote no.

Autumn weather just in time for Festival

On Saturday, Sept. 26 at 10 a.m., the 24th Annual Fallsburg Fall Festival gets underway. The two-day festival, which runs from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, is sponsored by the Lowell Area Arts Council, but many other individuals and organizations also do their part towards the success of the festival.

Entertainment will be provided on the outdoor stage each day. Master of Ceremonies Gordon Gould of WOOD Radio will kick off the program on Saturday at noon by introducing the first act, Choice Ingredients. At 1 p.m. No Refund takes the stage followed at 2 p.m. by Down River Players. Two hours of rousing music from Beats Settin' Home finishes Saturday's program.

Sunday's program begins at 11 a.m. with Quodlibet. Amadaun takes the stage at noon followed at 1 p.m. by Ralston Bowles. The Proulx Family Tradition goes onstage at 2 p.m., and the weekend's entertainment ends with The

Hill People beginning at 3 p.m.

At 4:45 Sunday the drawing begins for the raffle. The grand prize is the "Rose Gazebo" quilt designed by Dolores Dey. In addition, over fifty other works of art are included in the raffle, all donated by the festival artists. Tickets can be purchased at the festival information booth. The information booth will also be the place to pick up the handbill, seek emergency aid, and visit the philatelic display being planned by the Lowell Branch of the U.S. Post Office. A special cancellation has been designed by Tami Eldridge for the two days of the festival, making it a collector's item. Mail can be mailed at this reincarnated Fallsburg Post Office.

Preparing for the festival are 76 artists as well as eleven food booths. A free children's craft area will be located south of the food booths. This is a new location made necessary by work being done on the

Coffee Break for all people at various places in life

It's an inter-community bible study that meets both the spiritual and social needs of its participants.

Coffee Break, which enters into its 18th year in Lowell, does not require its participants to have any previous knowledge of the bible or that a person be a member of a church.

The idea behind Coffee Break originated in South Holland, Ill. The premise was to teach people about the bible or to help those who wanted to enhance their knowledge.

The Coffee Break bible study runs in parallel with the school calendar. It is held every Tuesday morning from 9:30 until 10:45 a.m. in the basement of the Calvary Christian Reform Church.

This year there are 30-40

women who attend. A free nursery is offered for infants and toddlers. The youngsters are offered toys-games, story groups, singing, bible memory, crafts (based on bringing the bible story home) and snacks.

The kids do more than one thing. There is change throughout the 75 minutes. "Without the change it would be too long a setting for the children," said Ada's Sue Wisniewski.

During this time the mothers break into small groups of six or seven for personal time, prayer request, praises and other bonding opportunities. They also study passages from the Bible.

"I attend Coffee Break because it provides a story hour for my children and it gives

me time to talk to other adults," explains Lowell's Linda VanStee. "It has also helped me get to know Christ and has helped me grow in knowledge of Christ."

Wisniewski concurs. "I had twins. Coffee Break took them off my hands for a couple of hours and gave me an opportunity to socialize with other people," she says.

One might think that Coffee Break may attract an older crowd. That's not the case. The age spectrum runs from 20 to 65.

Kristin Bliss, a relatively new member to Coffee Break, moved to the area eight months ago. "My family moved cross-country to this area. Coffee Break has allowed me to meet women here in Lowell," Bliss said. "Women who have provided me with support, love and the realization that we all need one another."

All of the Coffee Break participants are eager to point out that the program serves as an outreach to the community. "It allows us to meet and to be a blessing to each other," Dorothy Reitsma explains.

Jan Bieri adds it brings those together who are curious and have a desire to learn about the Bible in a non-threatening environment.

Lori Huisman said Coffee Break/Bible Study meets every person where they are in

life. "Not everybody is at the same place," she explains. "Some have remained at the same place each and every Tuesday from 9:30 til 10:45 p.m. throughout the school year."

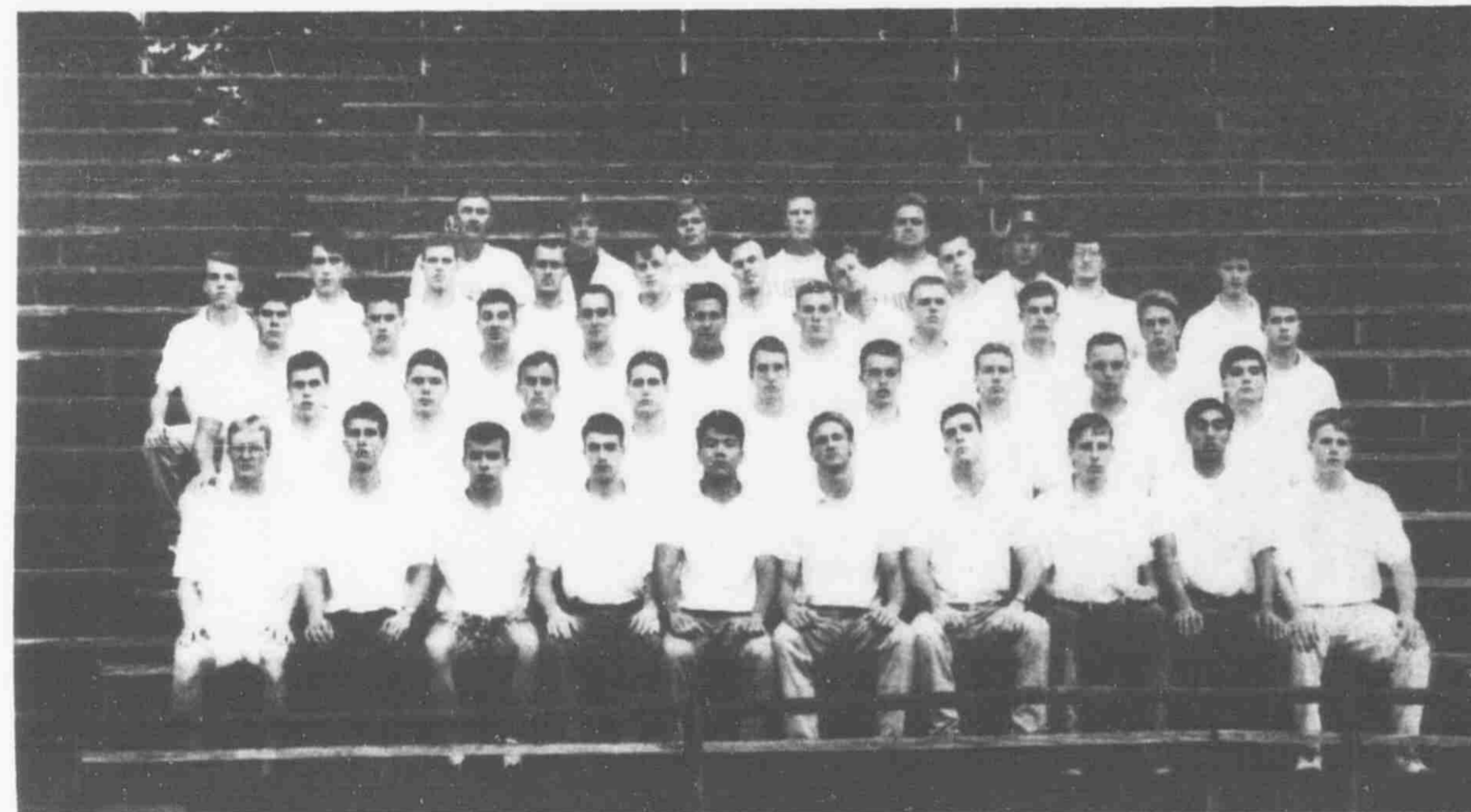

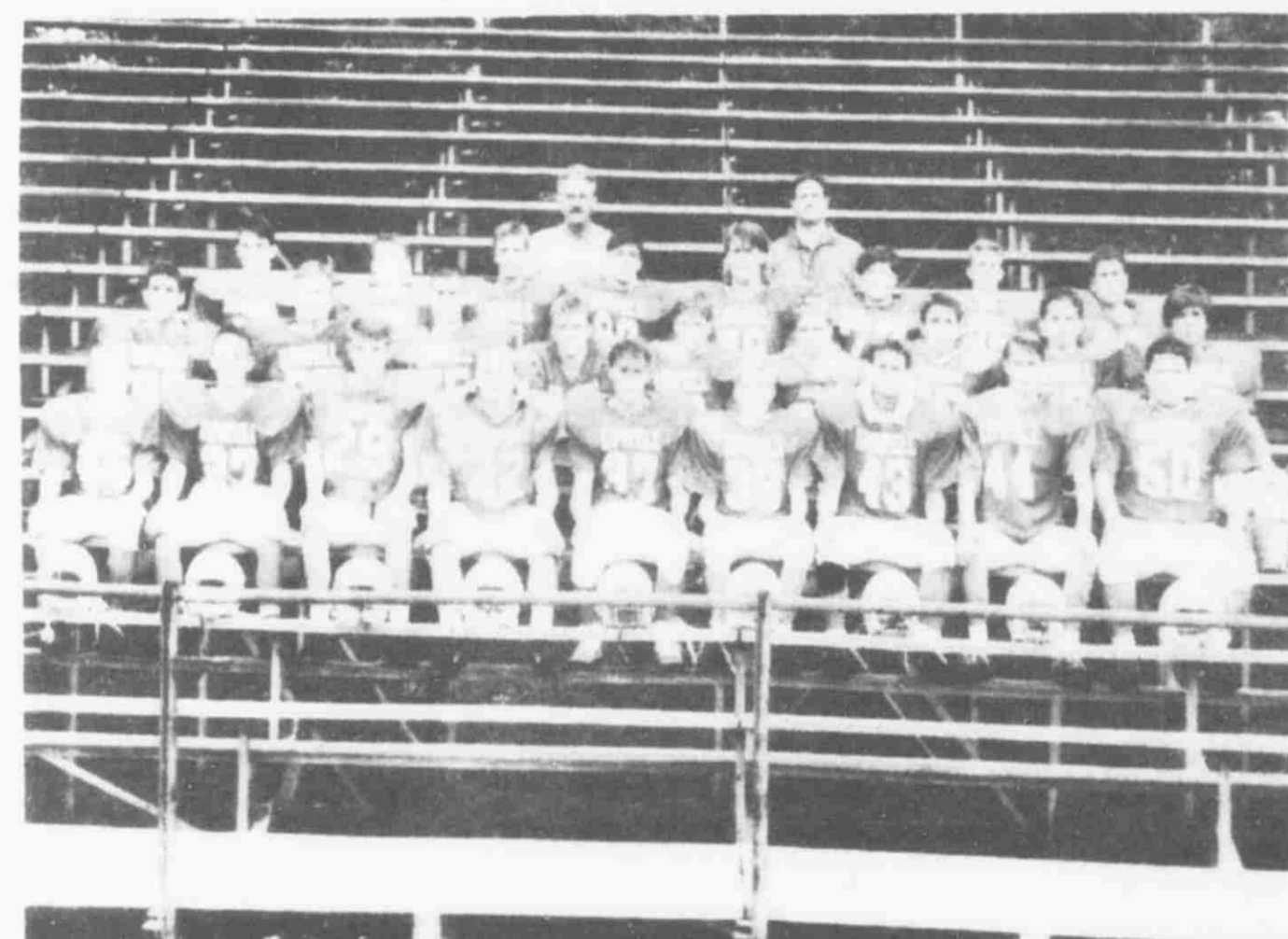

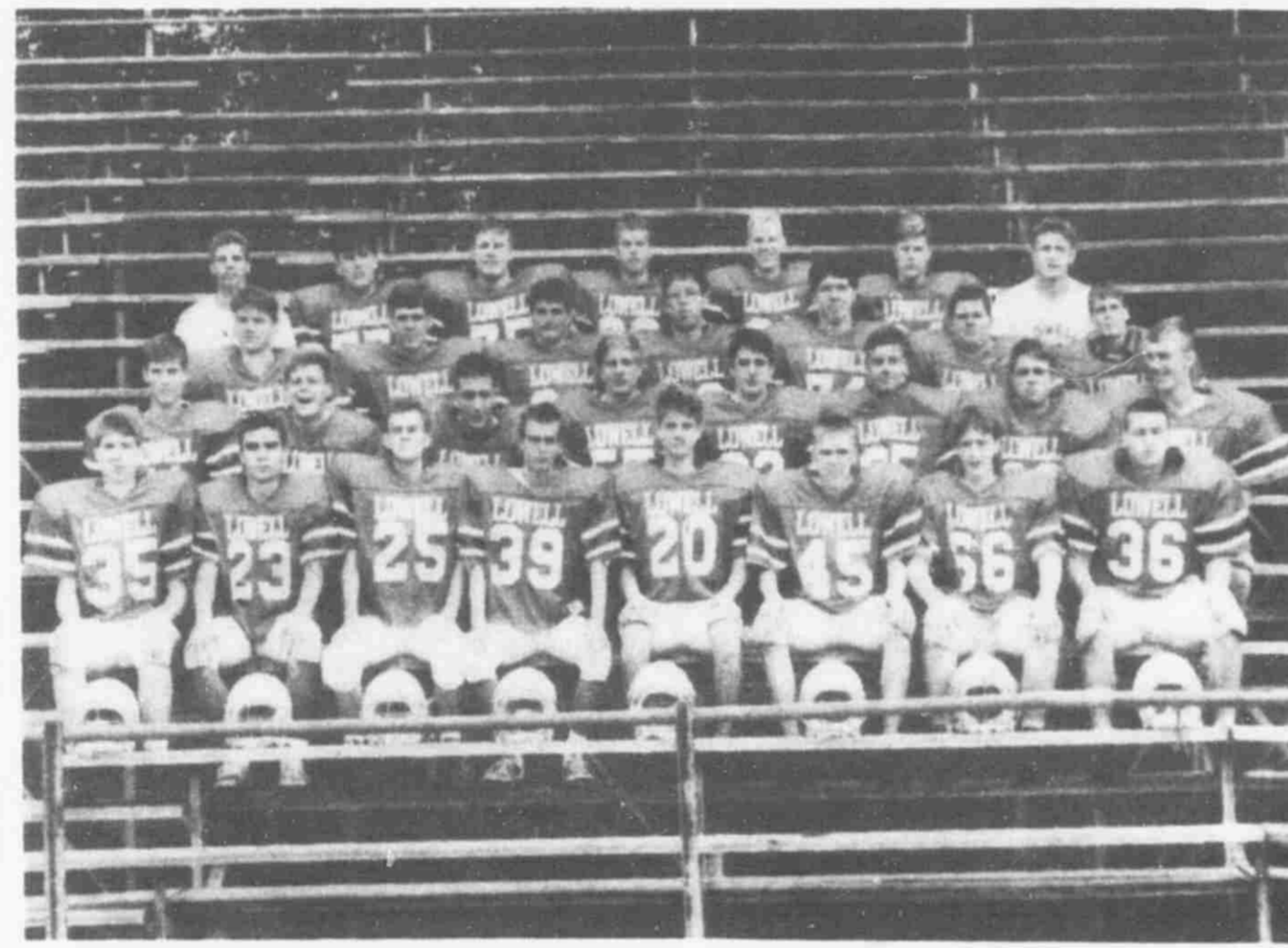
