## Opinions varied among local officials on Proposal "C"

To hear Lowell Township Supervisor John Timpson and Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch comment on what Proposal "C" (Cut and Cap) is and isn't, a person might think they are on the same side of the ledger.

"Cut and Cap is not an answer to school financing," Timpson said. "It is an effort to reduce property taxes. It will put a tight squeeze on our legislatures to address the school financing issue which has been skirted for years."

Esch agreed that Proposal "C" does not address the issue of school re-financing.

But don't be fooled that's where the similarities between the two officials end.

Esch, as do most other school officials in the State of Michigan, does not believe the State can afford to reimburse schools for the revenues they will lose as a result of reduced property taxes. "It's not just school officials. The Senate Fiscal Agency says the state can't afford to do it," Esch explains.

Senate Majority Leader Dick Posthumus says that simply isn't true. "That is just being used as a 'red herring.'"

Timpson said he believes the State will, and should be commended for its effort in reducing property taxes. "Ask our township treasurer about the abuse she takes when people come in to pay their taxes," Timpson said.

The Lowell Township Supervisor says if the Proposal is passed it will spread the school financing burden out to include more than just property owners.

Posthumus agrees with Timpson. "Not only that, but Proposal C will also help create jobs and economic development."

So what exactly will proposal "C" do if passed on the Nov. 3 election?

Proposal "C" will reduce school operating taxes by 30 percent, phased in over five years (10 percent in 1993; 15 percent in '94; 20 percent in '95; 25 percent in '96; and 30 percent in '97). The plan will not reduce school operating millage rates.

Proposal "C" will cap, or limit, annual property assessment increases to three percent a year or the rate of inflation, whichever is less, until the property is sold. The value

of the new improvements will be added to the capped assessment.

The Constitution will require the State to reimburse school districts for all dollars lost through the cut portion of the proposal.

Douglas B. Roberts, State Treasurer writes that while providing relief, this plan also provides the means to maintain our school funding levels. Phased in over five years, Cut and Cap reimbursement to school districts will require that one-half of the historic growth in state revenues be used to offset the property tax reduction.

"Even if there were reimbursements made by the State, there is no guarantee that the State wouldn't change its state aid formula as it has done," Esch said. "Schools are having to educate more students this year, using the same dollars generated last year with fewer students."

Schools are not the only units concerned with the affect Proposal "C" will have. So are the city governmental units.

"I'm concerned about the increased cost to run local governments. The State says it's going to make up for reducing operating taxes, but how?," Lowell City Manager Dave Pasquale said. "Through the Headlee the State is required to give back a share to the localities, which makes up a significant portion of our budget. That share is made up

from sales, income and single business tax."

Pasquale's concern is that the monies to reimburse the school will be taken from state shared revenues which cities depend on.

If that happens Lowell's City Manager says additional mills will have to be asked for and/or cuts will have to be made in City services.

"There are no freebies. The money has to come from somewhere. Proposal "C" is not the solution," Pasquale said. He says there needs to be a more balanced, equitable approach in property and sales tax.

So where will the money come from? Posthumus explains that there are three ways in which the state can fund the reimbursement to the schools.

1. Cut other areas of state government. "I still believe we haven't cut all the fat out of state government," Posthumus said.

2. Use half of the growth in government each year. On an average there is a five percent increase in growth. Posthumus says half of that would fund the reimbursement.

3. Raise other revenue sources. "I believe that a combination of raising other revenue sources and the annual growth will fund the reimbursement to the schools."

Lowell Assistant Superintendent, Gary Kemp says, currently Michigan is one of the states with the highest prop-

erty tax and one of the lowest when it comes to sales tax. "We all agree something needs to be done to lower property taxes. I don't believe this is the solution."

Kemp does believe that the passing of Proposal "C" removes more of the State's school financing burden and places more of the burden on the local schools and city governments.

"The State wants better employees with better thinking skills, but they want the schools to do this with less money," Esch said.

Lowell Schools stands to lose about \$10.3 million dollars over five years. Grand Rapids stands to lose \$95 million if the proposal is passed. Kemp said schools will still lose money even if the cuts are replaced.

The State is convinced that "Cut and Cap" is the appropriate policy to address taxpayers' concerns about the property tax system.

Schools and city governments are not convinced it won't heighten their concerns about financing.

If school and city officials are correct, the financial burden will remain with the taxpayer, maybe not in the form of property taxes, but taxes nonetheless.

Posthumus calls Proposal "C" the single most important policy that will be addressed in the State.

School officials agree, but not for the same reasons.

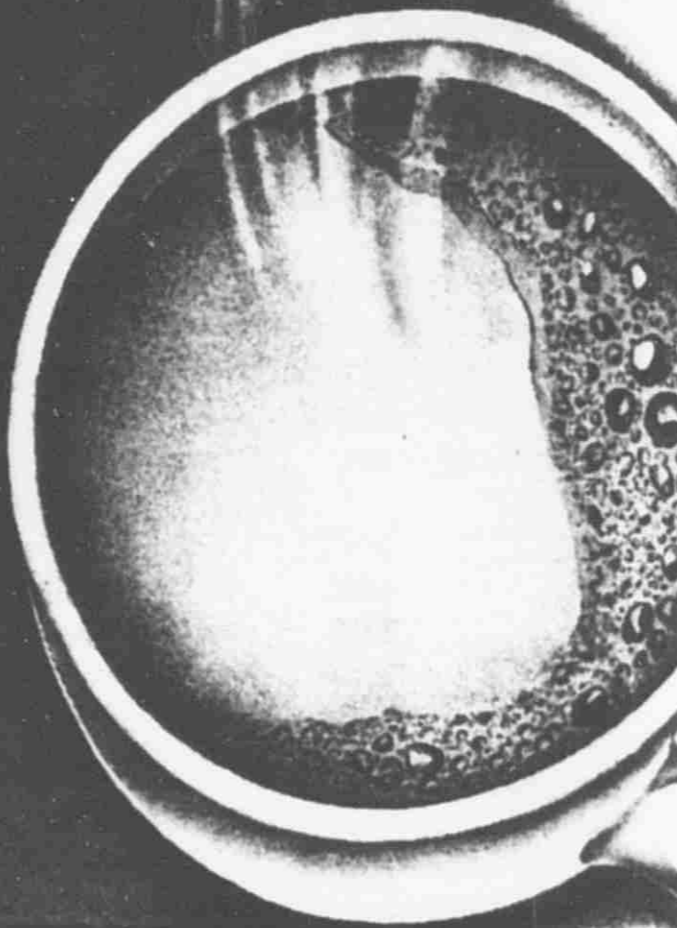

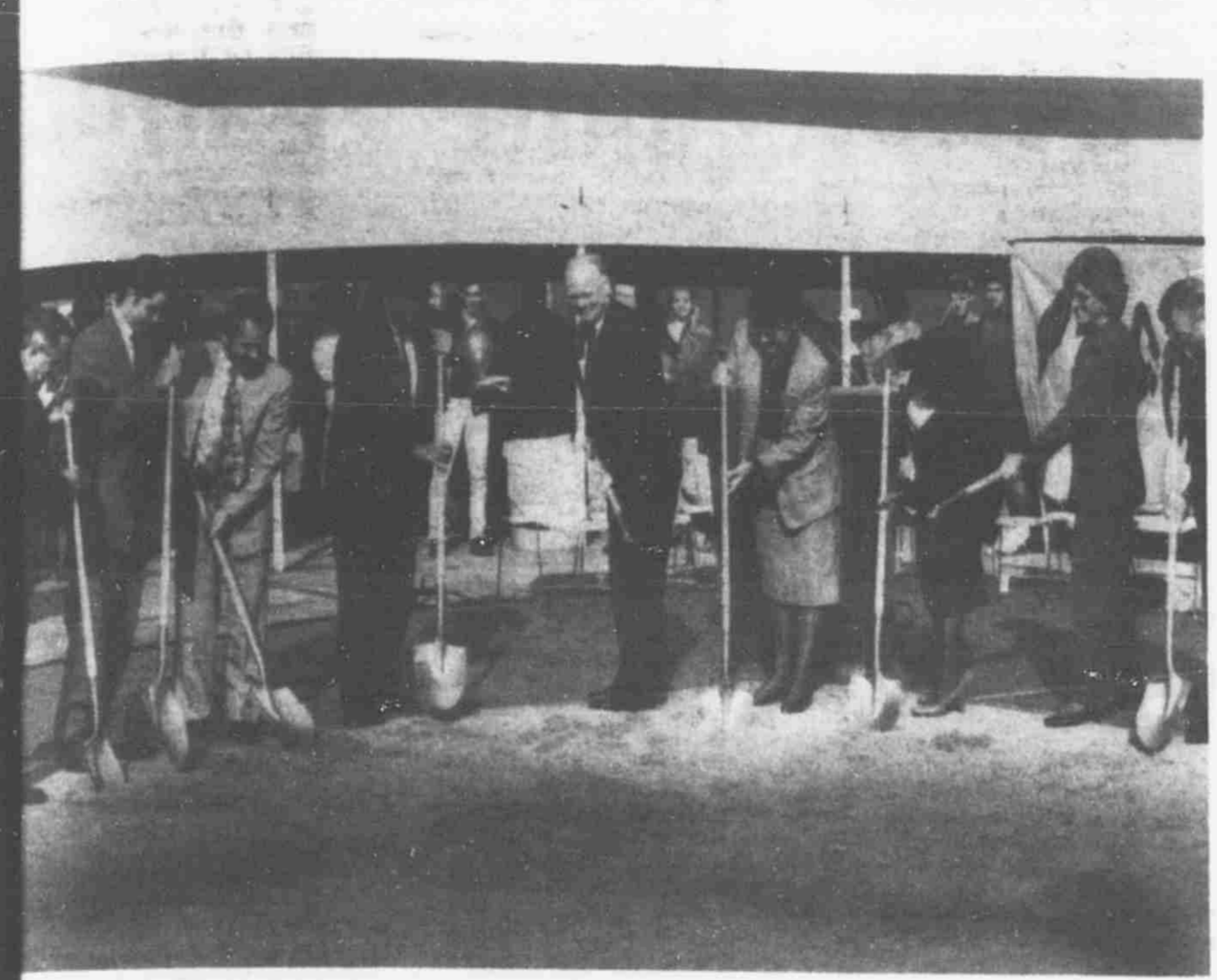

**Question:** Why is it necessary to wear a retainer after the tooth straightening procedure is completed?

**Answer:** While teeth are being moved, they are slightly loose. When they finally arrive in their corrected positions, they are still loose. To quit here could mean that the teeth could very likely move right back into their original positions. We certainly wouldn't want that. It is, therefore, necessary to use a retainer to hold the teeth in place while the underlying connecting tissue and bone reconstitute and lock the teeth into position. Most retainers are removable and are designed to be worn during less active hours at home and during sleep.

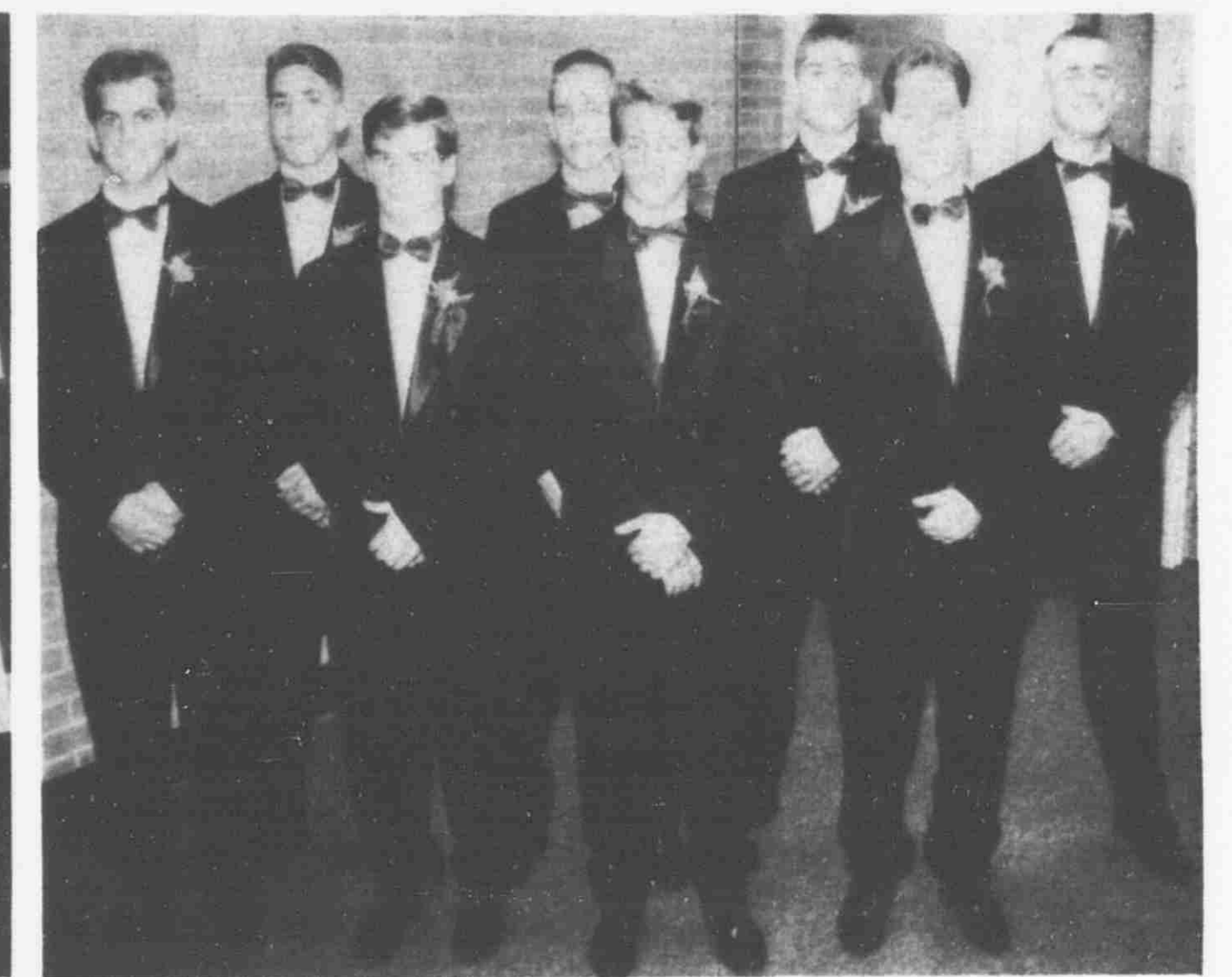

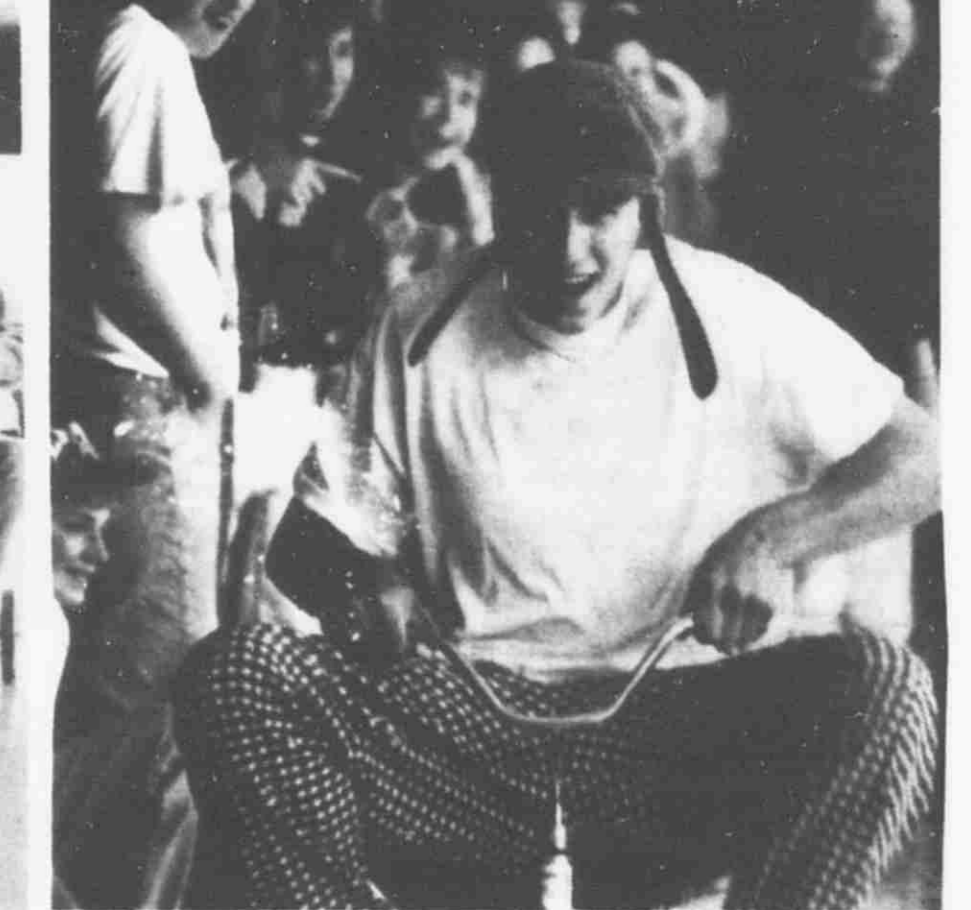
