Of the 13 counties that voted down the proposal, there were a total of 724,984 "no" votes. Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb accounted for 627,816 of those "no" votes or 87 percent.
There were 330,393 "yes" votes in the 13 counties, the TriCounty area accounted for 248,227 of those or 75 percent.
Of the $1,163,528$ "no" votes statewide, the TriCounty regioncast 54 percent of them. Macomb, Oakland and Wayne Counties made up 40 percent of the total voting populous.
The Tri County area defeated the proposal 72 percent to 28 percent.

The rest of the State passed Preposal A 59 percent to 41 percent.
"Voters learned that the "Us vs Them" mentality goes much deeper than the legislature," said Representative Jack Horton of the 73rd Hous

The right thing Timpson refers to is the rezoning of approximately 206 acres of land located in Section 28 at the northwest corner of I-96 and M-50 from Ag-1 and Ag2 to light industrial.

The developer of the approximately $\$ 30$ million light industrial site is Bob Grooters. One of the three or four companies interested in the site includes Lowell's ITM. The company's future plans include building a 100,000 square foot corporate machining facility.

## Timpson family finds the wait for a resolution in loved ones death frustrating

A tip comes in through Silent Observer on the murder of their daughter/sister, and the John Timpson family looks and hopes for immediate gratification.

Then, when hours, which seem like days and days, which seem like weeks, pass without a word, their hearts and minds are stirred once again.

It seems unfair that a family which has endured the tragic death of one of their loved ones, must also endure the roller coaster of emotions through the process of seeing that the murderer is brought to justice.

When the judicial process
doesn't seem to be working fast enough, the family has walked the streets of the inner Eastown, stapling, tacking and taping 700 wanted posters of a composite sketch of the suspected murderer.

Teresa Beachum, sister to Suzanne Timpson-Wittenbach, also spends time talking to the tots of the inner city pleading with them not to carry and/or use guns. Their answer is "no, no we won't." Yet, it was not that long ago that the murderer of Suzanne was the age of those kids.
"We are not spending the money to provide child care for the mothers of these kids, so they can hold a job, and so their kids ean get a bete
education. As they grow older, the young teenagers of the in ner city need to be trained so that they can hold a job with local industry and not have to resort to violence, crime and robbery," Beachum explains. "We need to put the money up front instead of waiting until the end result."

As Beachum has learned, often what jail has to offer three dinners a day, clean clothes and a roof overhead is better than what many had while out of jail.
"Walking the streets of the inner city, I've talked to people who are under fire all the time. It's like a small Bosnia, but people are using handguns instead," John Timpson said. "People should
e able to walk the streets without fear. Why should they have to hide from thugs." Timpson said his family has found sympathy and un derstanding during their walks through Eastown and the inner city. "They want the perpetrator caught, they don't want to continue to live under the conditions (a war zone) their living in," he explains. Not only has the Timpson family received sympathy and understanding from the Eastown and inner city area but also throughout Lowell and surrounding communities.
