Showboat negotiating a return trip for Sandi Patti following Saturday's rained out show

Rain and severe weather stopped Sandi Patti from completing her entire show Saturday night at the Lowell Showboat.

However, the Showboat Board announced Monday night, that negotiations are underway with William Morris Inc., out of Nashville, and Sandi Patti management to reschedule a Patti visit to the Lowell area later this summer. The result of negotiations would be available within the next day or two.

"The Lowell Showboat Board is working hard to see that the approximately 2,000 ticket purchasers get a second chance to attend a Patti concert," Lowell Showboat President Thad Kraus said.

Showboat vice president Tony Stencil added that if negotiations are unsuccessful, the Showboat is prepared, as an alternative, to offer all patrons of the shortened Saturday show a voucher which would enable them to get a 10 percent discount toward any of next year's shows.

The voucher would have to be claimed by July 1. "Because of the Tuesday Ledger deadline, it will be important that people look at other local papers for further information," Stencil said.

In an effort to get the show in, the Showboat shortened the preliminary acts which enabled it to get Patti on stage by approximately 8:25.

Patti completed her open-

ing two numbers (Unto Us and Make His Praise Glorious) and had just begun her third song when the show had to be stopped because of incoming severe weather.

The majority of the show patrons were given enough time to find shelter either in the form of the Runciman Elementary gym or their cars.

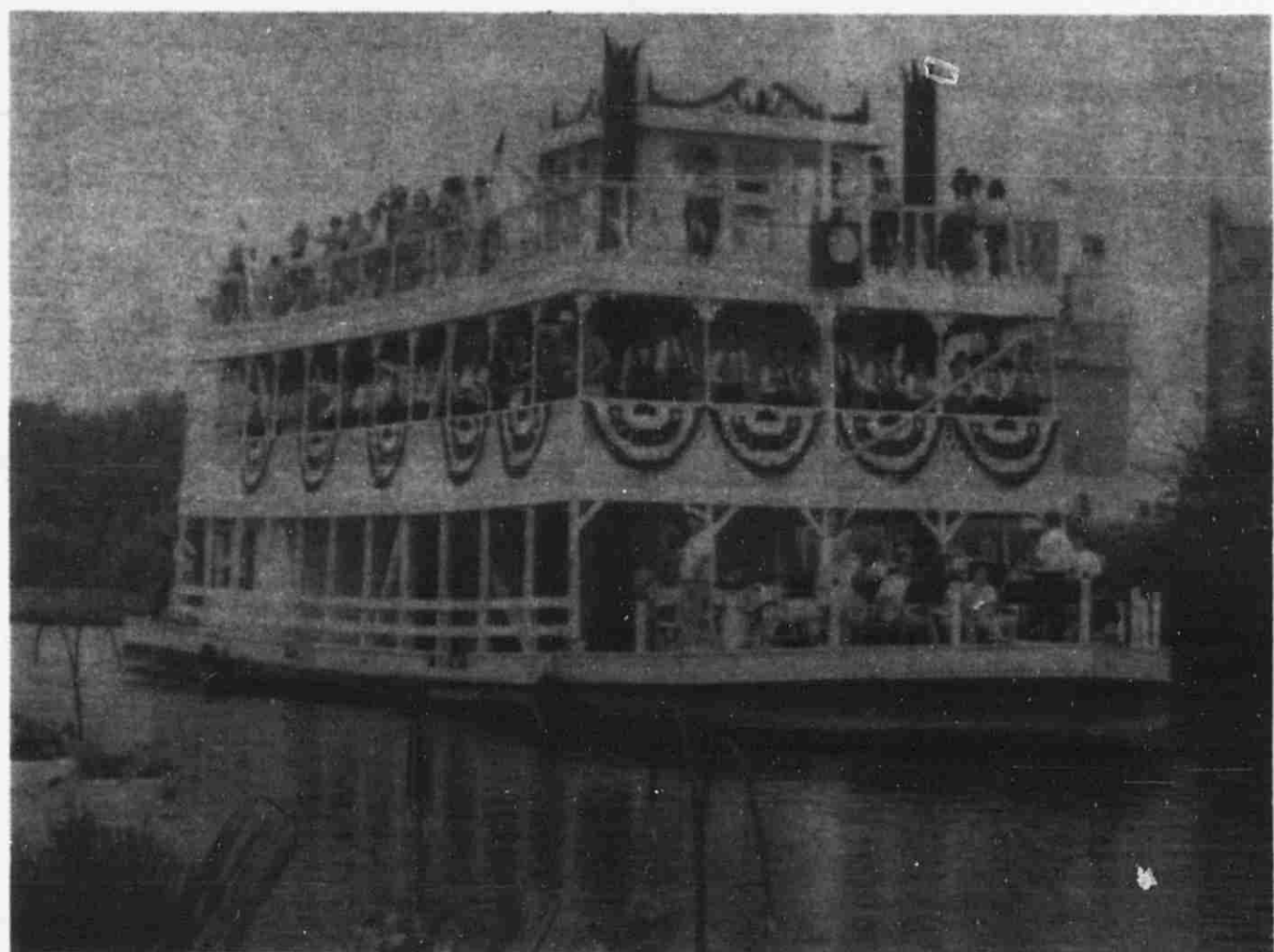
The heavy rains from the initial storm calmed, and word came from the National Weather Service that the severe weather had passed and that occasional showers would follow periodically throughout the evening.

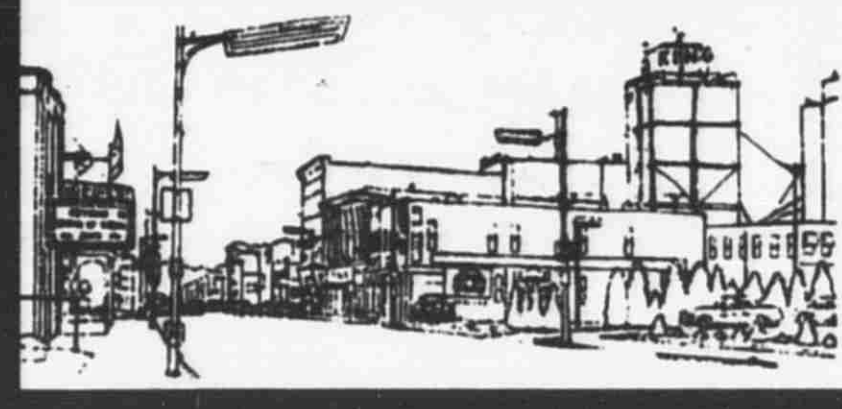


Lowell's dancing machine, Jerry Patton, with the coaxing of Florence LaRue, strutted his stuff for Showboat patrons.

State's milling kingpins gather to celebrate the advent of "Lowell"

At the turn of the century there were 534 mills in the State of Michigan.

In 1958 there were 28 mills.

Today, there are six mills. Four of those six mills were represented at a luncheon on Wednesday to celebrate the wheat variety, *Lowell*.

The Michigan State Millers Association and its member companies, of which King Milling is one, have contributed annually to the development of better wheats to be grown in Michigan.

To honor the mills contributions to the wheat industry, Michigan State has named all of their recent releases after cities in Michigan where mills are or have been in operation.

"Each year the Michigan State Millers Association releases a new variety of wheat that it test for good yields and to make sure it produces good flour," said King Milling's King Doyle. "The wheat is produced through a mixture of six or seven varieties. It last only 10-12 years."

The wheat breeding started in the 1950's and it was 15-20 years before there was a release.

The breeding of the wheat is done at Michigan State University.

Wheat growing in Michigan is a billion dollar industry. Eldor Paul, chairman of the crop and soil science department, said that there is \$80 million of wheat produced each year.

"The *Lowell* variety release has a 10 percent yield increase potential," Paul said. "It has the potential to produce an extra \$8 million if grown across the state."

Paul further explained that there are ways to increase the yield and stay competitive. "First you must control the quality and then the grain must be kept close to home."

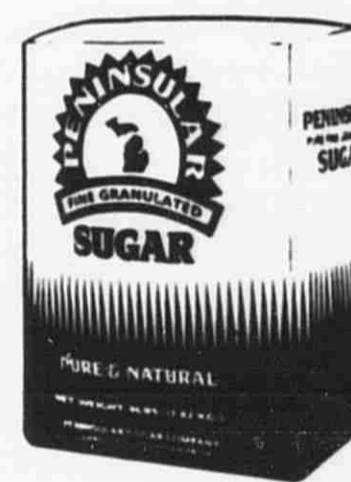

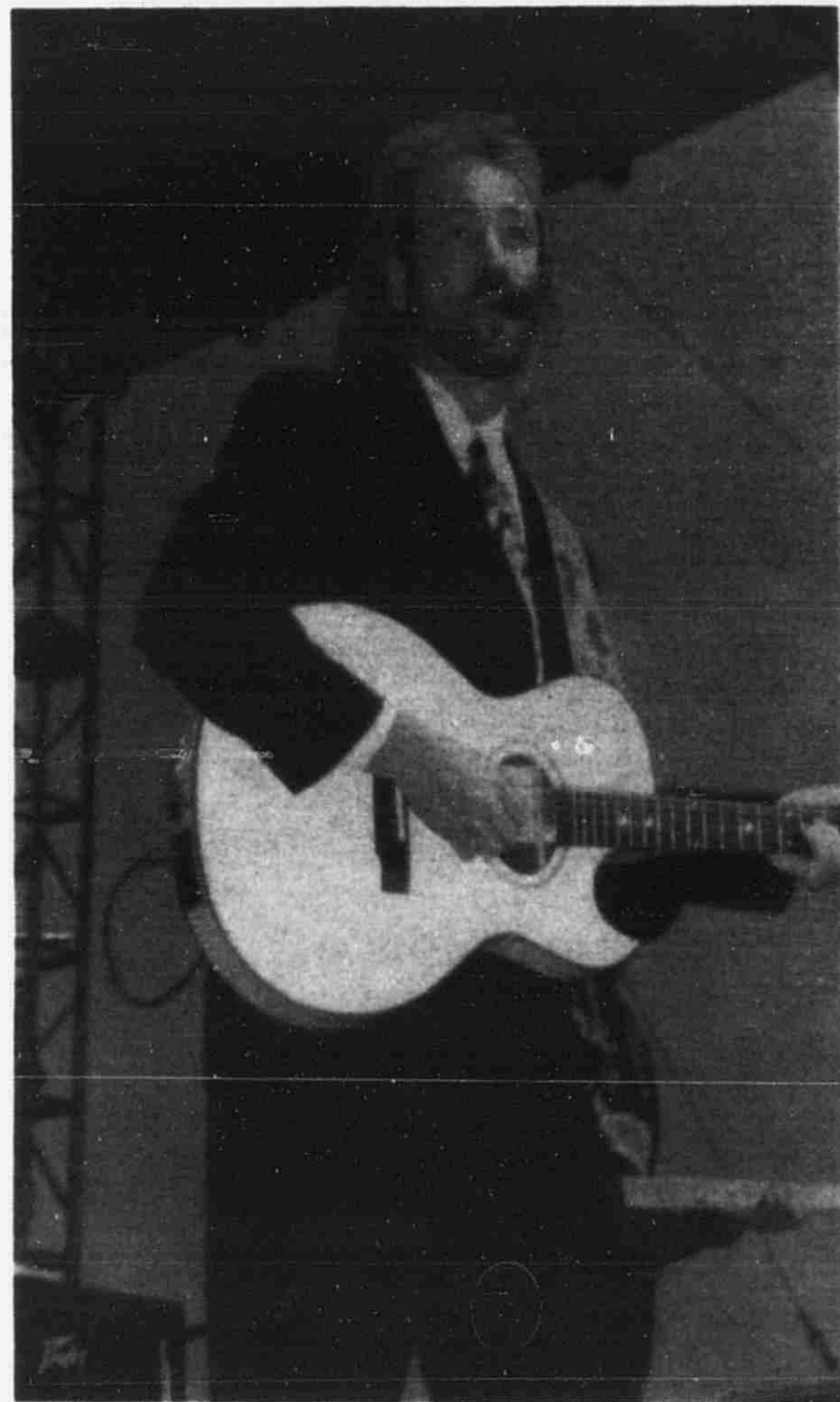

Ellis' fans "got that feeling" about budding country star

Thom Ellis had a homecoming party Thursday night at the Showboat.

His first visit to the Showboat as an observer was as a 15-year old decked out in his best Hank Williams outfit.

Thom Ellis had another first visit to the Showboat Thursday night, this time as the headliner.

Now residing in Bassett, VA, Ellis said his southern neighbors always ask him how a northern boy got to singing country music. "I tell them that they just don't know us very well up here."

The 1,000 plus fans in attendance Thursday, know him quite well, and it's safe to say that the emotions they harness for Ellis were spoken in his opening number, "I Got a Feeling."

The president of his fan club has had a feeling about Ellis' talent for a dozen years.

"I've known him for 12 years. I knew the first time I heard him that he was going to be a success. Thom is a strong dynamic singer," said Diane Bennett, president of the Thom Ellis Fan Club. "Every time I hear him it is like hearing Thom for the first time. I'm

very proud of Thom and very proud of the welcome he received here in Lowell."

So was Ellis. A couple of times during the show he mentioned how grateful he was to the audience.

Ellis told his audience that coming back to Lowell was like deja vu, "It doesn't seem that long ago I was in Lowell schools and living in Alto," he explained.

The Lowell native's talents shined through the darkness of the early evening as he did a ballad of songs that he performed in supper clubs and steak houses when he first started performing locally. The ballad included "Your In Love and Out of Danger," "Sweet Music Man," "Danny's Song," and "Wind Beneath My Wings."

A bonus that audience members may not have expected came from Ellis' partner, Steve Maycroft.

While Ellis changed from suit and tie to jeans and cowboy boots, Maycroft sang three-four songs. The highlight was a ballad he wrote for his mother.

Ellis concluded his two hour set with "In America," scheduled to be released as a single within the next month.

For his encore, Ellis performed Bob Seger's classic "Turn The Page."

Thursday night's show may not only have helped Ellis "Turn the Page," but also turn the corner on a blossoming career.

Friday night's crowd stirred by Fifth Dimension's performance

Florence LaRue and the rest of the Fifth Dimension ensemble cast stirred the memories of yesteryear at the Lowell Showboat Friday night.

"Tonight's show had a feeling of the Showboat's from years ago," said a member of the Lowell Showboat choir who wished to remain anonymous. "It's how the Showboat was meant to be."

LaRue, leading the Fifth Dimension group, defined what is meant by performers.

The group opened the show with its popular hit "Up, Up and Away," entering the Showboat stage from various points in the amphitheatre.

On an evening where there was a threat of rain, The Fifth Dimension did a timely and creative medley of rain songs that highlighted the vocal talents of each member of the group. The rain songs included, "Singin in the Rain," "Raindrops Keep Falling on My Head," "Rainy Days and Mondays," "I Wish It Would Rain," "Fire and Rain," and "Stormy Weather."

As for laughter, the audience got a belly full when LaRue went into the audience and recruited Jerry Patton to show her how Michigan people dance. She had Patton use the song "Jump" to demonstrate.

Later in the show Patton returned to the stage as LaRue grabbed a handful of people for an on-stage dance.

The Fifth Dimension's audience participation show included three young Lowell

girls to show her how to perform the Achy Breaky line dance.

"I'm a performer, I enjoy communicating with the audience," LaRue said after the show. "LaRue and members of the group spent 30-60 minutes signing programs for the approximately 1,200 in attendance following the show. The lead singer also made an appearance afterwards at Larkins' "Other Place" where appetizers were served.

Patti then went out to the front of the stage and told the audience "You guys are unbelievable. As soon as we get the all-clear on the equipment, and that it is not hazardous,

King Milling built its first mill in 1844 on the east bank. The second mill was constructed in 1864 on the west bank.

King Doyle started working at King Milling in 1945. The yield per acre in '45 was 20-25 bushels. The average number of bushels per acre in Kent County in 1993 is 55.

"That has occurred through the efforts of Michigan State

University. MSU has provided the money to keep a wheat breeder there," said Brian Doyle. "The 'Lowell' variety is expected to yield 80 bushels per acre in 1995.

"It is long overdue that the Association name a wheat variety after Lowell," said Everett Everson, Michigan State University Professor Emeritus. "Lowell has been a distinguished center of mill-

ing for a long time."

The making of a wheat variety is completed through recombining traits of different varieties into one, explained MSU wheat breeder, Rick Ward. "The wheat is then screened for what might hurt it and what may enhance it," he says.

The first commercial product goes to the millers in the fall of 1995.

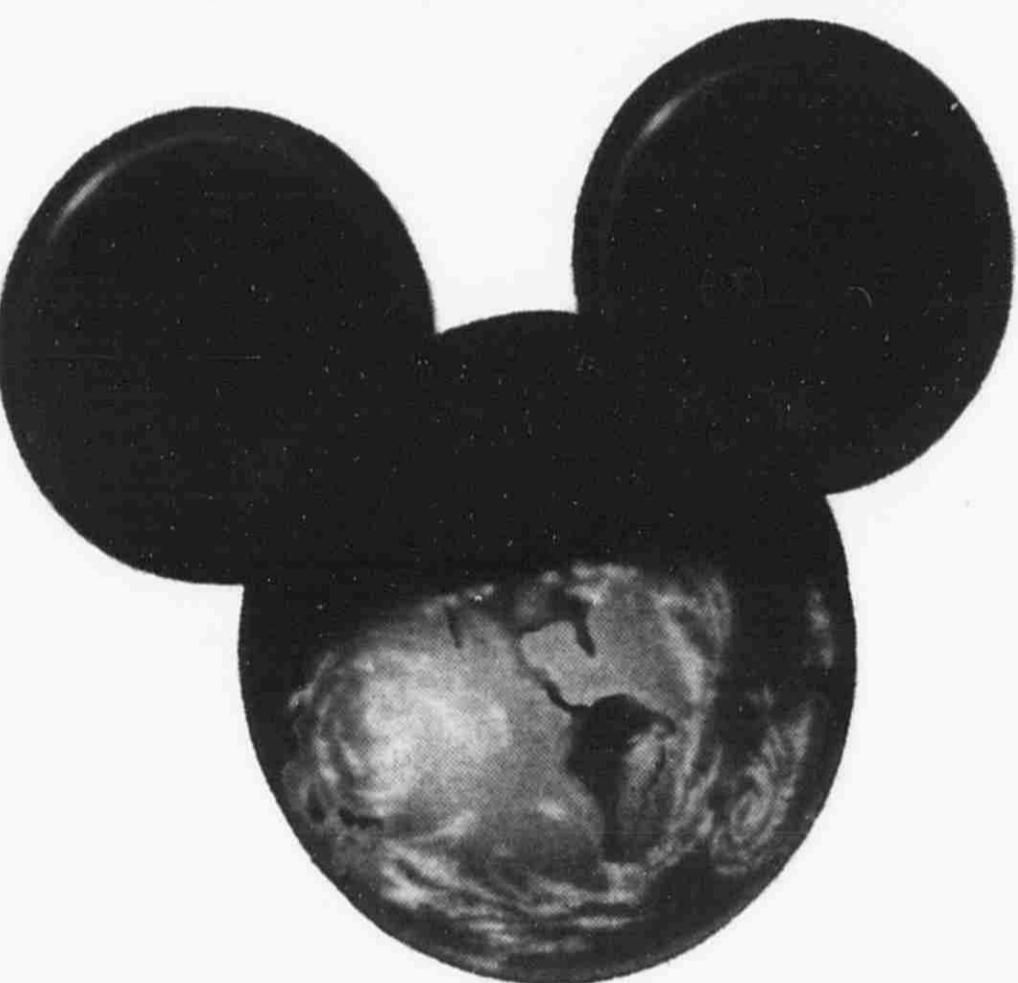

Council approves pay hike for Pasquale

Following a closed session meeting Monday night, the Lowell City Council went back into its regular session to approve an approximate four percent pay raise for City Manager Dave Pasquale.

"Following an informal discussion, the Council believes Dave is doing an excellent job. We are happy with the way things are going and with his excellent written communications," Maatman said. "Last year we set personal and

city-wide goals for Dave to meet. He either has met them or will meet them shortly."

Pasquale was offered a six percent increase last year, but only accepted a three percent raise since it was more in line with what others were receiving.

This year's raise will increase his salary to \$50,500, up from \$48,500.

Every second meeting in June the Council evaluates the City Manager and decides what percent of a raise will be offered.

Public opinion stalls transient merchant amendment

Public comment pushed an ordinance amendment on transient merchants right off the City Council table so that it could be studied more closely.

City Hall was filled mostly with disgruntled local businessmen on what was packed into the ordinance amendment.

The major fuss was in regards to what most council visitors felt was unfair treatment of Two Seasons Plant Stand owner Carla Luscombe.

Curtis Cleaner's owner, John (Bucky) Curtis stated the proposed amendment to the ordinance was not fair and that it was pointed directly at Two Seasons. "I want the Council to take a harder look at this before acting on it," he said.

Curtis also asked if the Council was prepared to enforce the ordinance fairly if the amendment was approved? "Is it going to be enforced on everybody or is the Council going to hand-pick. Will the council go after all people with booths inside the Antique Mall, they are surely transient merchants. How about the people that had

booths at the Lowell Showboat/ Chamber of Commerce Art and Crafts show on Saturday? Those people who participated are surely transient merchants? Was anything done to make sure they are following the current ordinance? Curtis was not proposing that the City do that."

"The City has an ordinance that it currently does not enforce, how is it going to enforce a stricter one?" Curtis said.

Lowell Mayor James Maatman said the amendment was not pointed at any one transient merchant, but instead the Council realized the current ordinance was weak.

Councilman Bill Thompson said the City wants to maintain and control the growth of transient merchants.

"No one to my knowledge has abused the current transient merchant ordinance," Curtis said. "One person complains and that person isn't even here and you're going to make changes."

Kay Thorne told councilman that Luscombe does a nice, credible job, that she is professional, brings business to Lowell and now because of her success, the Council is

going to punish her.

Rick Seese of Greenridge Realty questioned why the council did not contact cities more comparable in size and nature to Lowell than Kentwood and Grand Rapids.

It was pointed out that in Newaygo a transient merchant can be in a town for three months for just \$20. In Greenville there is a \$100 charge for the year.

Back in May, Bernard's True Value Hardware owner, Charlie Bernard levied transient merchants escape the scrutiny of codes and costs incurred by those merchants

doing a permanent business in Lowell.

"A transient merchant comes into town, sets up a tent or structure, pays \$50 and can be here six months. That is not a level table," he claimed.

Curtis points out that the amendment would have charged a wagon loaded with asparagus and corn \$10 for a permit and \$5 a day up to 10 days for the stand. "That's \$50-\$60 a week. That means they'll have to sell a lot of asparagus to make any money."

Kevin Smith, Curtis Cleaners pointed out that the new seasonal batting cage that was

put in near Hudson and Main was to be removed if it didn't succeed. That's not getting done. A new amended ordinance won't change things not being enforced."

The proposed new amended transient merchant ordinance proposed to reduce total allowable time from six months to three months a year; by resolution, provide a \$10 application fee plus a \$5 a day charge for the first 10 days. Then, a \$10 a day charge would be extended covering the remaining 80 days in a calendar year. Currently, a charge of \$10 per week is given.

The changes were to assist in limiting transient merchants and increasing costs involved in such an operation.

The motion for the ordinance amendment was tabled so that the City could better define a transient merchant and look into how communities of similar size compare to Lowell.

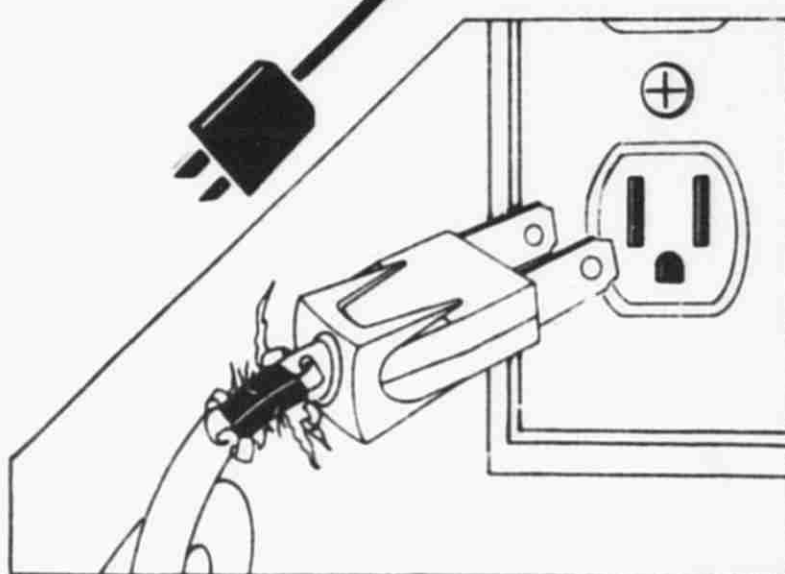
