Changes at Honeycreek will impact Lowell's Chapter 1 program

Exploding needs and shrinking resources have united Wedgwood Christian Youth and Family Services and Honeycreek Christian Homes in order to provide better stewardship of funds.

While it is not yet official, it is a definite possibility that the 10 residents currently at the Honeycreek Christian Home facility will be moved to the Pine Rest Campus in the Kentwood School District, according to Wedgwood Christian Youth and Family Services' executive director Richard Gritter.

"The two facilities have a history of working together," Gritter said. "Last August Wedgwood was asked to take over Honeycreek under an interim management service." In December of last year, Honeycreek's foster care program was transferred to Wedgwood. On Jan. 17 of this year, other programs, including residential, were also transferred.

"The two facilities are compatible in philosophy, professional commitment and as Christian agencies," Gritter said. "This sort of thing is happening all over the state. Agencies are having a tough time keeping things going."

Honeycreek is no longer providing services. It just continues to exist as an entity.

Gritter states that it has been a long time since funding by the state has been increased. Depending on the range of services needed by the child facilities get anywhere from \$13 to \$175 a day per child.

"We depend a lot on financial gifts from the community to operate our \$9 million budget," Gritter says. "We can provide services for these children at about 25 percent of the cost to put them in a state or psychiatric hospital."

Gritter said Wedgwood hopes to raise \$1 million in gift income from the commu-

nity. "Gift income permits us to continue to operate," he said.

Wedgwood provides services for 200 West Michigan kids on any given day. Gritter is proud to point out that there are no children or adolescents from Kent County in a state hospital.

"I think that says a couple of things: one, that we are

doing our job; two, Kent County Community of Mental Health is doing its job; and three, kids and adolescents can better be served in homes closer to their communities," Gritter explained.

The two facilities working as one allows them to operate more efficiently and enables them to stretch the thinning dollars.

Gritter says a decision on what option to use will be made by the end of the summer.

If students are removed from the Honeycreek campus, the facility would then be open to and for church operations and possibly housing for the elderly. "Those are just some of the options being considered," Gritter

said.

A decision to relocate the students to Pine Rest is not a reflection on Lowell Schools, the executive director said. "Just the opposite, Lowell Schools have been outstand-

Concerns raised about rezoning proposal

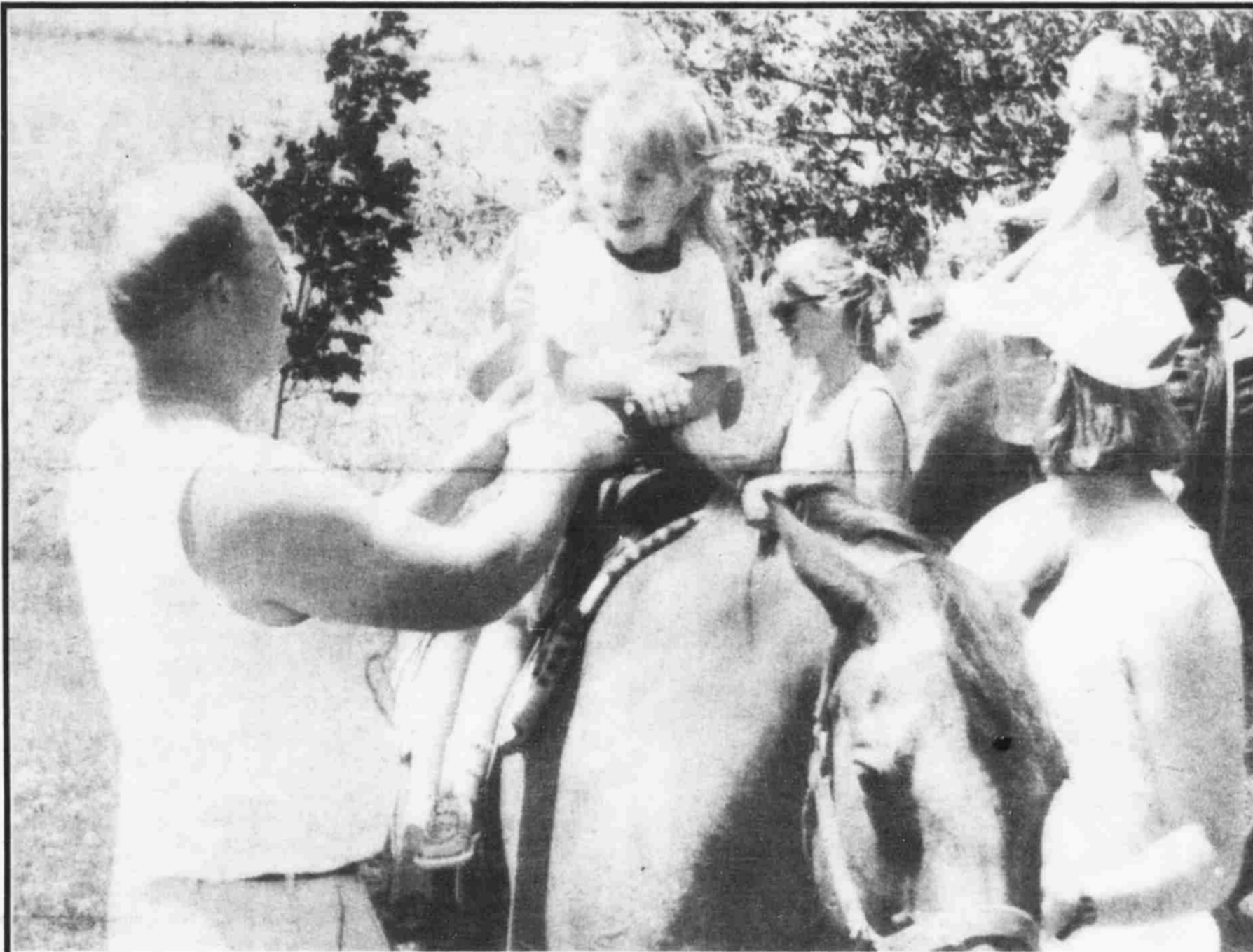

Lowell and Vergennes Township citizens bonded together at a public hearing last week in an effort to defeat a re-zoning proposal by Thomas Karp.

Karp asked Lowell Township's Planning Commission to re-zone approximately 74 acres of land along Cumberland and Foreman from Residential one (R1) to Residential two (R2).

The main difference between R1 and R2 is the acreage needed to build a house. The re-zoning to R2 would reduce the minimum acreage needed to build a house on the site from two acres to 40,000 square feet. The reduction allows Karp to build more units on the site. Currently the plans call for 44 units with public water to be built.

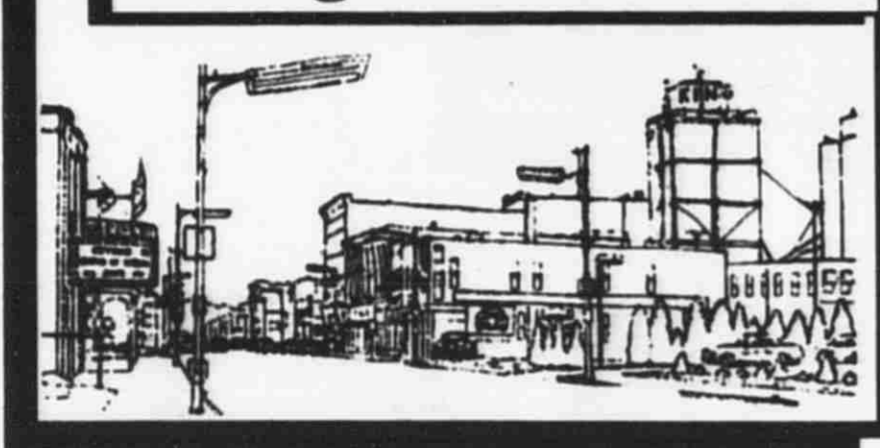

Homespun Devotions

If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God (Colossians 3:1).

My husband has always had a talent for finding money. As he gets out of the car in the parking lot, or as he walks down the street, his eyes seem to be drawn to the pennies, nickles, and dimes laying on the ground. He has been so successful in finding small change that I, too, have begun watching for it while I walk about. One day I mentioned this to him.

PINK EYE
Pink eye is a common infection of the covering of the eye caused by a virus or bacteria. The medical term for pink eye

is conjunctivitis. The conjunctiva is a thin transparent covering over the eye and the inside of the eyelids. Symptoms of conjunctivitis include redness, itching, increased tearing, and discharge. Sometimes the eyelids will feel gritty or the patient may feel as if something is in the eye. Often the eyelids may be stuck together with thick mucus upon awakening. Pink eye is usually self limited, lasting 5-10 days. One or both eyes may become involved.

Your doctor will usually examine the eyes to rule out a more serious condition. Other diseases, which can affect the eye, resulting in similar symptoms, include allergic conjunctivitis, a foreign body imbedded in the conjunctiva, and a more serious infection of the cornea and iris. A subconjunctival hemorrhage is a condition that occurs when a small blood vessel ruptures in the white of the eye leading to a red discoloration that lasts for 1-2 weeks. This condition is caused by blunt trauma to the eye and usually resolves spontaneously.

"MICHIGAN WINS WITH IMPROVED JOB PROVIDER CLIMATE"

Capitol Commentary

In the last two years, Michigan broke with the "business as usual" approach to government. We were the only state in the entire country that cut taxes, increased state aid to education, and wiped out a huge budget deficit by being fiscally responsible. This has sent a message to job providers that Michigan has a hospitable job creation climate.

Your physician will often prescribe antibiotic drops to be instilled in the eyes for several days. You should use the drops until the infection completely clears. In small children it may be helpful to have the child lie supine with the eyes slightly closed while an adult then places one or two drops in the corner of the eye - have the child gradually open the eyes prior to moving, allowing the medication to painlessly reach the infected conjunctiva.

A great example of this is the announcement last week that General Motors is bringing 1,000 jobs back to Michigan from Mexico.

Governor Engler and the Legislature have cut taxes, not only to provide relief to citizens but to stimulate investment, savings and economic growth.

In 1991, the Legislature cut property tax to residents and business by more than \$400 million.

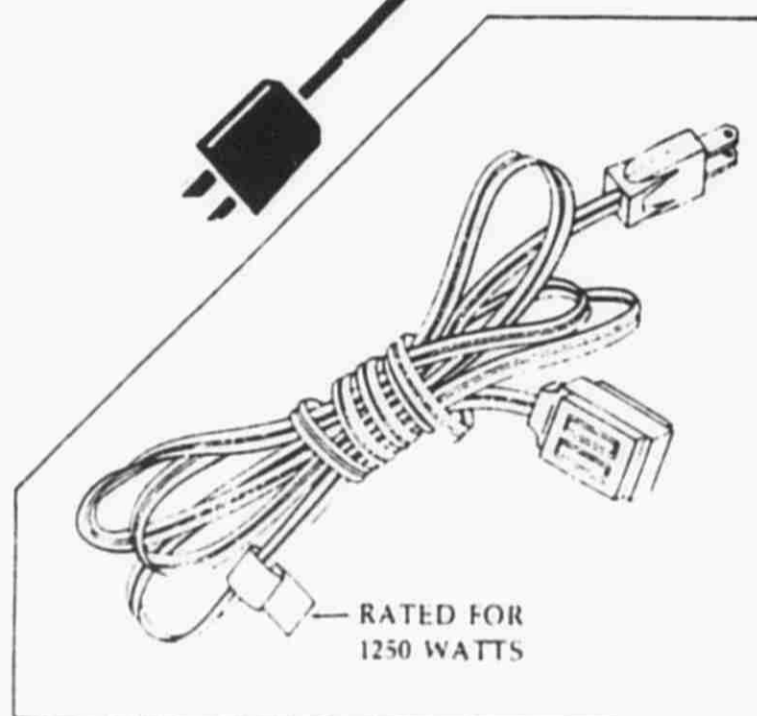

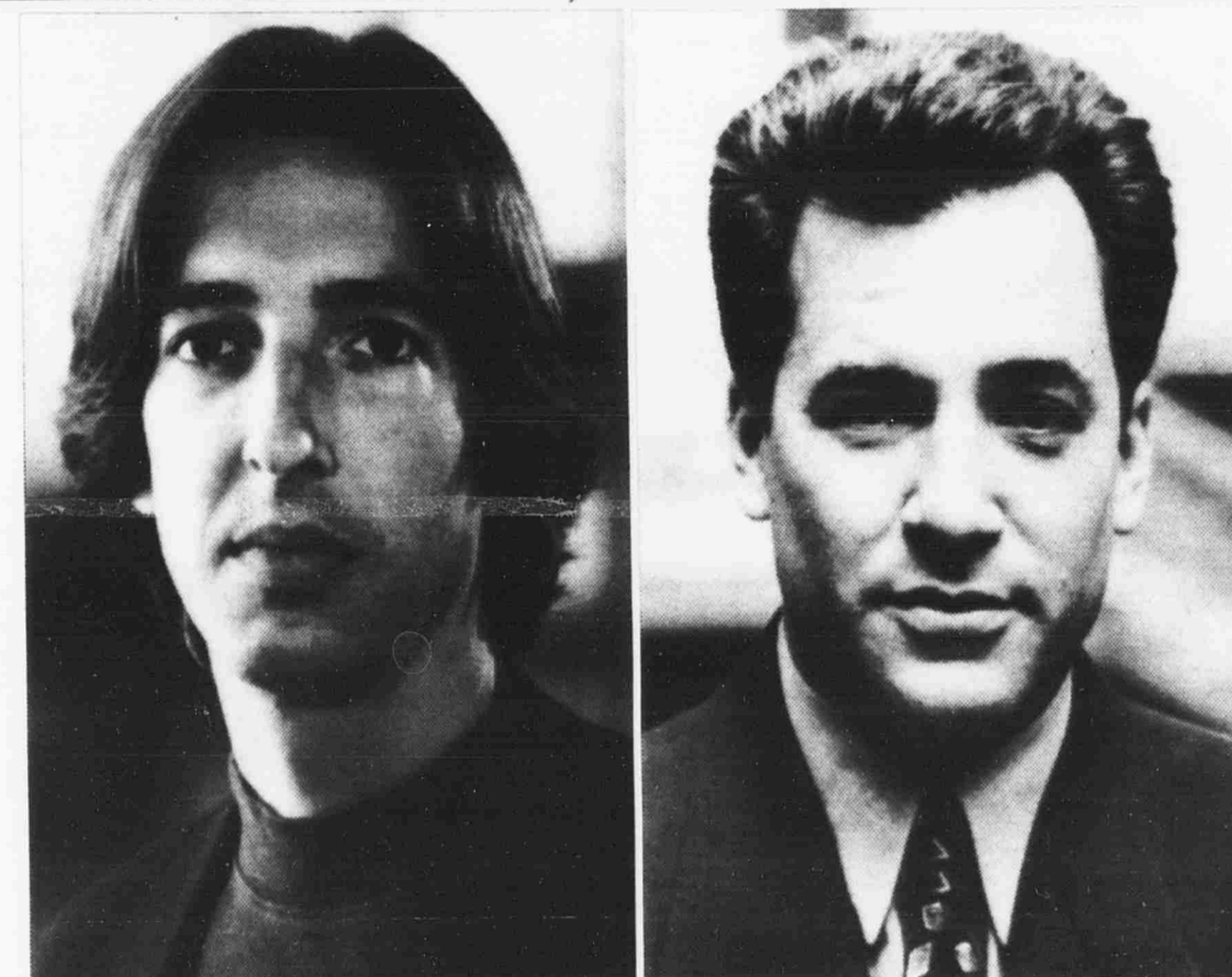

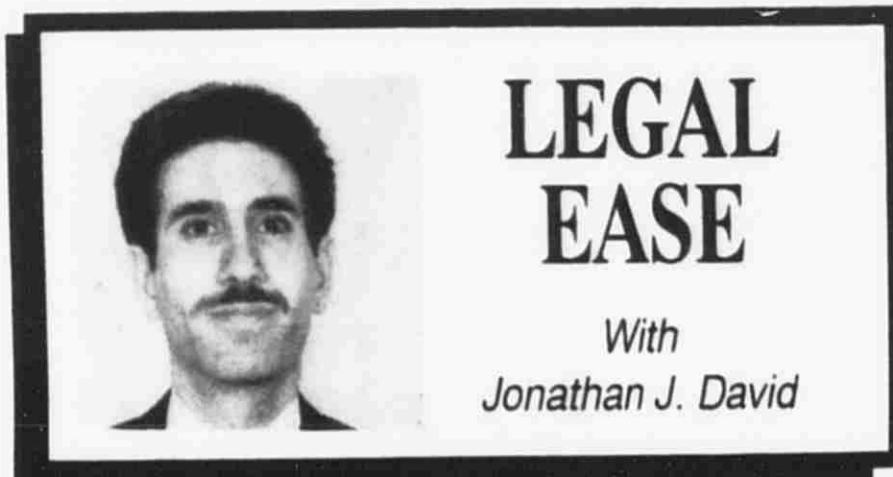
Pfishner re-elected Governor

DEAR JONATHAN: After my mother died, my father made out a new will leaving his estate to me and my sister in equal shares. About a year later, my father remarried. Last month my father died of a heart attack. Although he never made out a new will after he remarried, my sister and I were prepared to concede part of his estate to his wife. However, at a meeting with the estate's attorney, we found out that virtually all of my father's assets were retitled into both his name and his wife's name. As a result, there is no estate to probate and the will will not be given effect. Although his estate was not huge (approximately \$200,000), my sister and I were counting on our inheritance and we believe we are entitled to it. This is especially true since he was only married to his current wife for six months. Is there anything we can do?

JONATHAN SAYS: No. Assets that are jointly titled between husband and wife automatically pass to the surviving spouse and do not have to be probated. As a result, your father's will will have no impact on the disposition of those assets. Even if your father had not placed his wife's name as a joint tenant on all of his assets, she, as a surviving spouse, would have certain rights in his estate regardless of what his will states. First of all, she would probably have the right to claim

that she is an omitted spouse. As an omitted spouse, she would be entitled to receive the same share of your father's estate she would have received if he had died intestate (without making a will), which is approximately one-half of the estate. This would be true unless it appears from the will that the omission was intentional, which would be unlikely since the will was executed prior to your father's marriage to his wife. This would also be true unless your father provided for his wife by transfers outside of the will and he intended those transfers to be in lieu of any disposition under the will. Even if your father's wife did not qualify as an omitted spouse or did not pursue her right to be deemed an omitted spouse, she would have the right to elect between certain property interests in his estate. She would have a right to elect one of the following:

(a) To abide by the terms of your father's will. She obviously would not make this election since she was left out of your father's will.

(b) To take half of the share that would have passed to her had your father died without a will, reduced by half of the value of all property derived from your father by any other means other than testate (died leaving a will) or intestate succession upon his death.

(c) To take her dower right which is her right to use during her lifetime one-third of all land owned by your father and her husband during their marriage.

Further, your father's wife might have other statutory rights such as a homestead allowance of \$10,000, the right to receive certain property with a value of up to \$3,500 and the right to live in your father's home for up to one year.

Therefore, as you can see, even if your father had not jointly titled all of his assets in both his and his wife's name, she would have certain rights against his estate that she could enforce regardless of what his will stated.

DEAR JONATHAN: I am interested in making an offer on a home that is for sale in a favorite neighborhood of mine. However, the listing realtor told me that the current owners of the home are leasing the property and they have given their tenants a first right of refusal to purchase the property. What does this mean and how does it impact any offer I might make on the property?

JONATHAN SAYS: A first right of refusal prohibits the owners of the property from selling the property without first giving the holders of the first right of refusal the right to purchase the property upon the same terms and conditions for which the owners propose to sell the property. In other words, if you were to make an acceptable offer on the property, then the owners of the property would have to give the tenants of the property the right to purchase the property from them under the same terms and conditions as your offer.

If you decide to go forward and make an offer on the property, then you must understand that instead of being the actual purchaser of the property, you might just be acting as the catalyst for the sale of the property from the owner to the current tenants.

LEGAL TIP: Living trusts (sometimes known as loving trusts) are being heavily promoted today in both books and seminars. Unfortunately, some of these seminars are nothing more than marketing tools to sell living trusts at a premium. Although living trusts can be very useful estate planning documents for many people, they are not appropriate for everyone. If you attend any of these seminars, do not purchase or agree to purchase a living trust at that time. Instead, you should have the trust document reviewed by an attorney. Better yet, have an attorney prepare the trust on your behalf only after you have determined with the attorney that a trust is in your best interests given your assets and overall estate planning objectives.

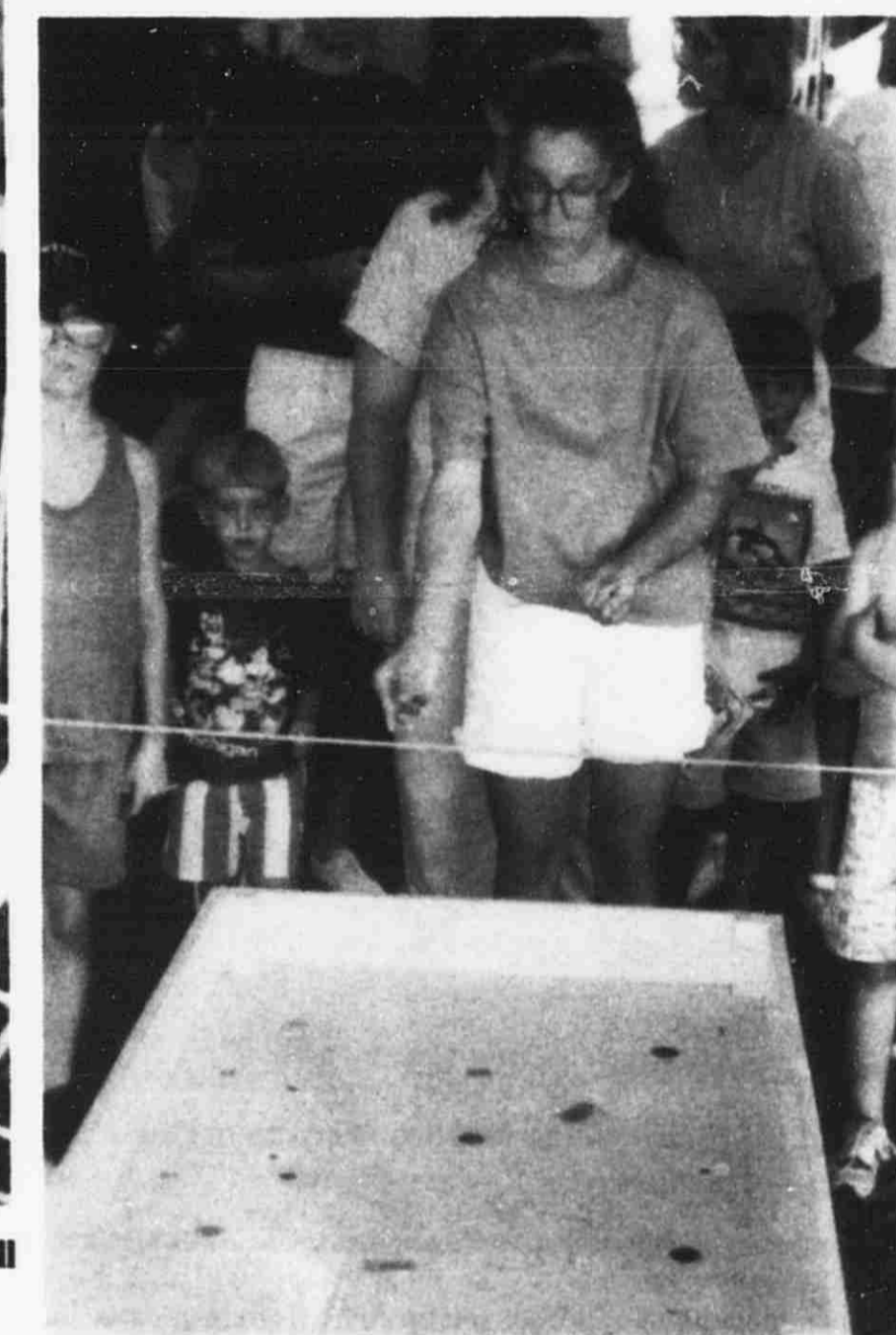

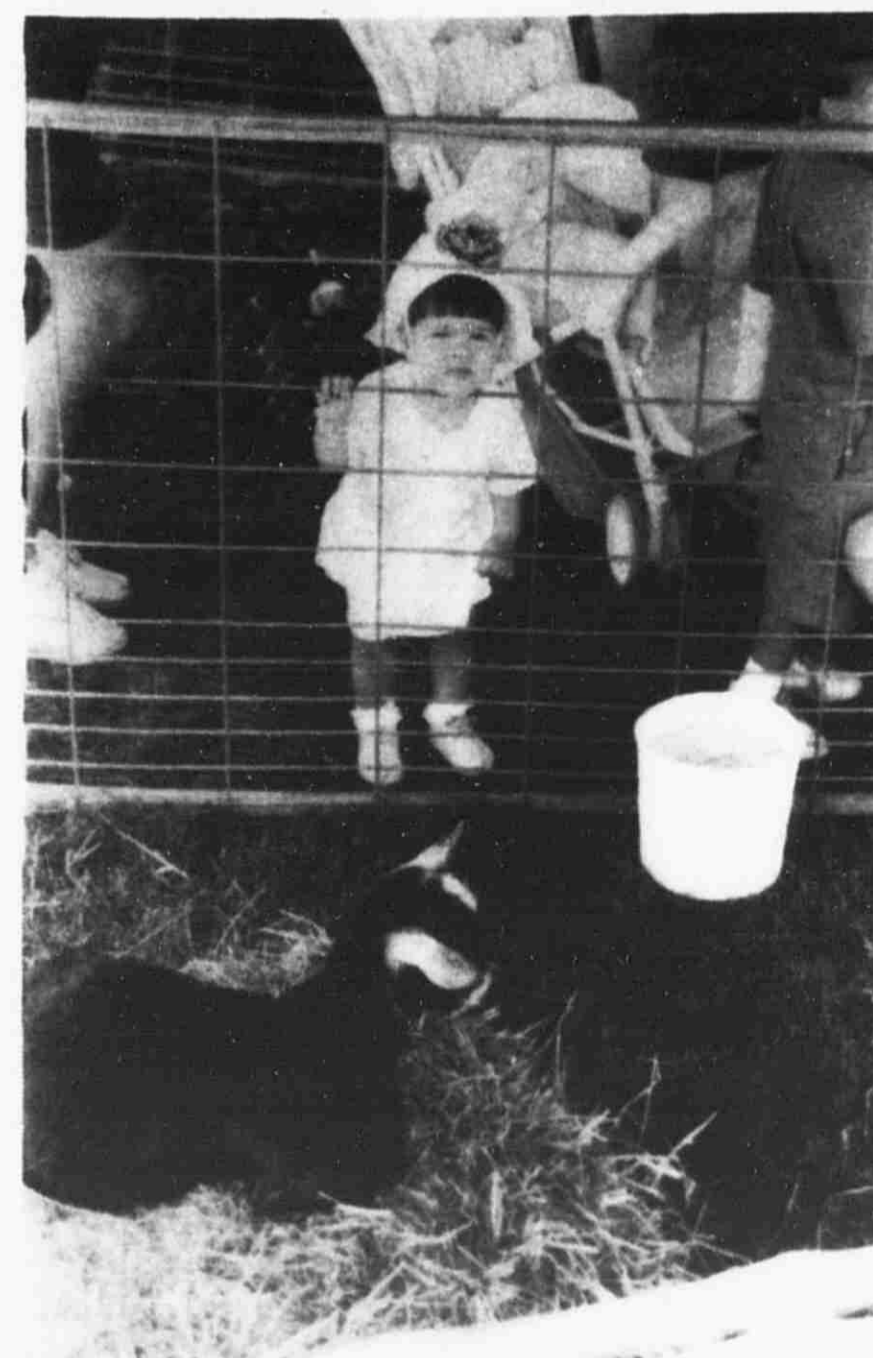

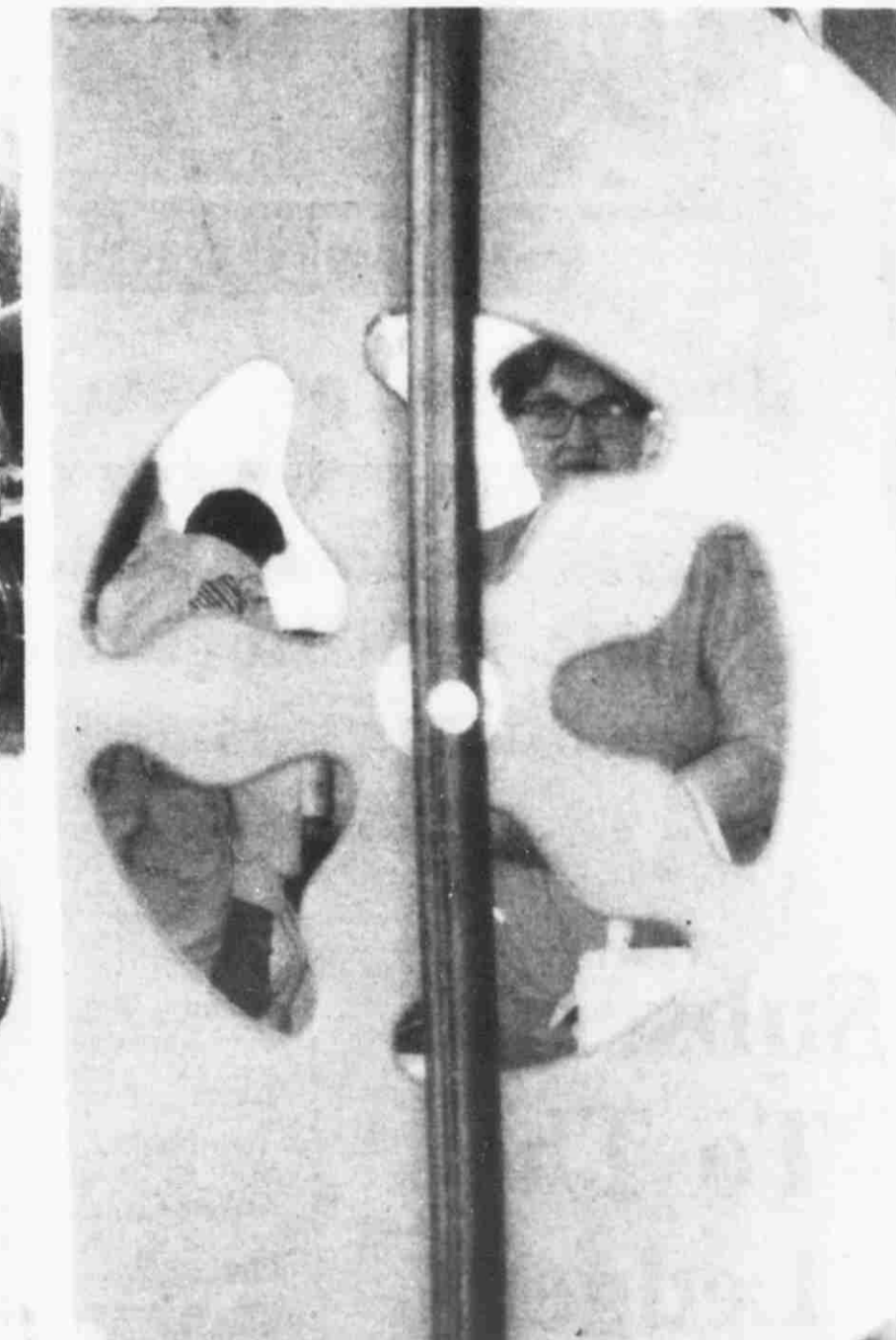

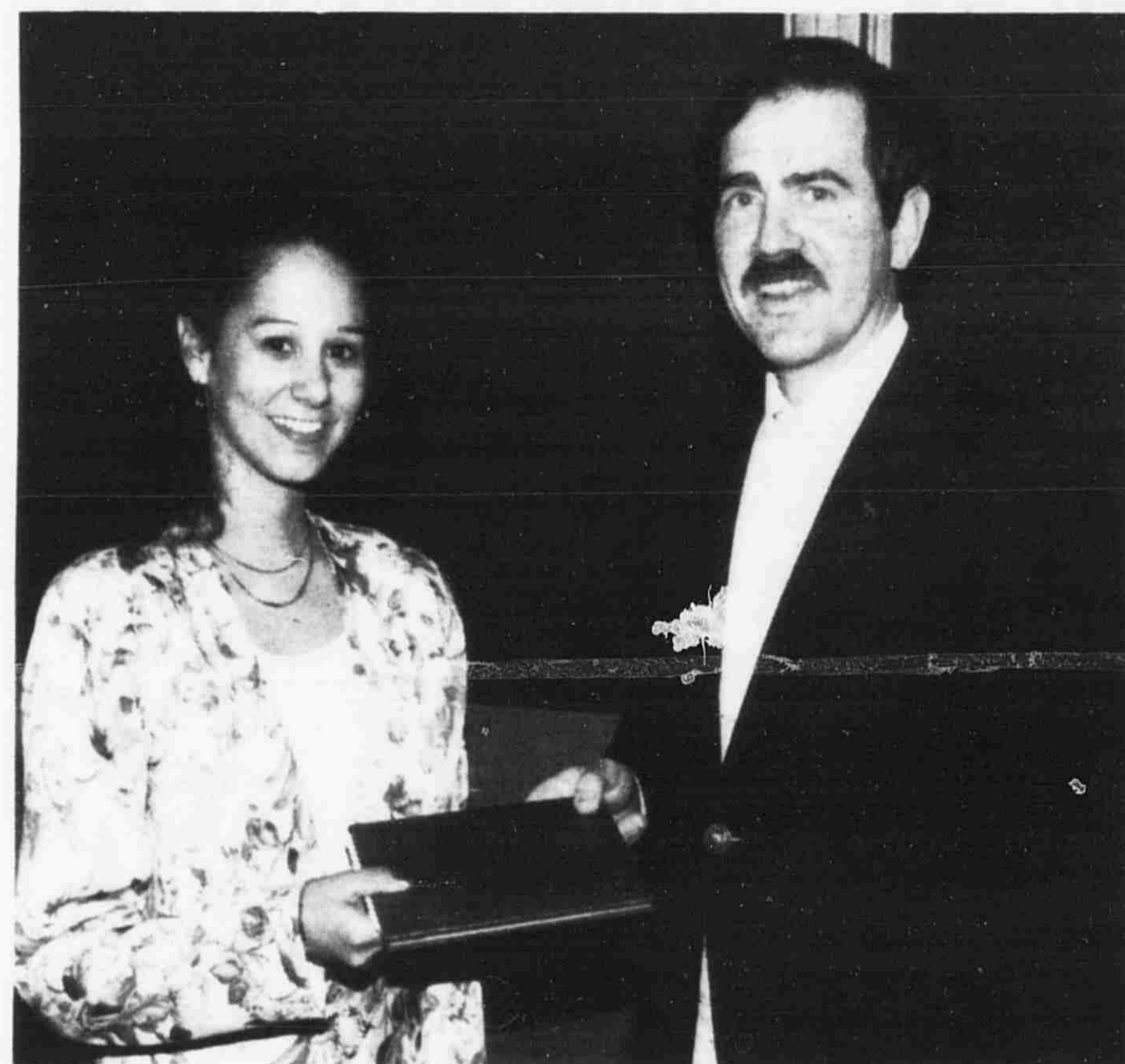
