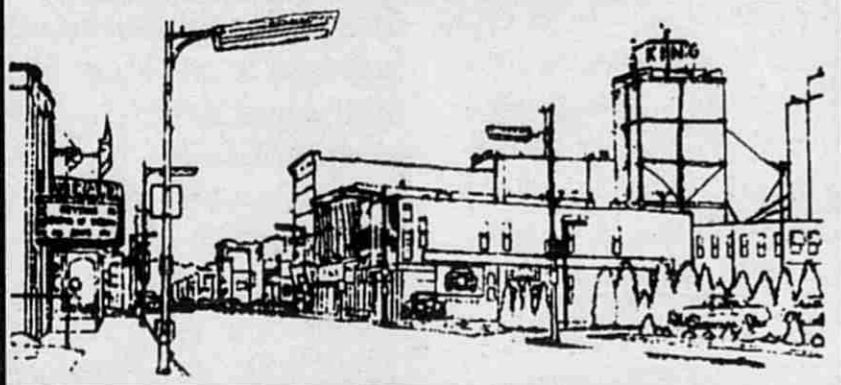

Some cheers, a few jeers, but mostly a good showing for Ehlers at town meeting

A deceiving government, health care, crime, individual responsibilities and morals were just a few topics of discussion for Congressman Vern Ehlers at his town meeting Saturday morning.

Ehlers was in the third district to answer questions and concerns of residents. Although he drew applause on several issues, his discussion was mainly focused on defending governmental procedures, the constitution and generally voicing his opinion on issues.

After a short period where Ehlers described his feeling on the nation's capital, he opened the floor to questions.

The first issue which drew applause from residents was his "no" vote on the crime bill. Ehlers said he was against the bill because it would have Michigan residents paying for things they would never see.

One of those items was the allocation of \$10.5 billion to build prisons. Ehlers pointed out that Michigan has built all the prisons it wants and has no

plans to build anymore, so why should this state foot that portion of the bill.

"The bill had some items on it that in no way would benefit Michigan. The idea that this state needs to build more prisons is wrong," he said.

Ehlers concluded that the

state right now is number 47 in the country for states to receive federal funding and "we shouldn't have to raise more money that will not make its way into the state."

In regards to the Health Care issue, Ehlers said Congress realizes it can't revamp the whole system; rather it has

to isolate key points and try to restructure them. Two of those points are the portability of insurance and getting insurance if you already have an existing condition.

In a related issue Ehlers said he is appalled by the "ar-

Grooters proposes another project - on a smaller scale

He's back! Robert Grooters is back and this time he wants to build a warehouse rather than a light industrial center.

Grooters sent Bill Kozak, a member of Moore and Bruggink, as his representative to the planning commission's monthly meeting.

Kozak explained that Grooters would like to use 110 acres (which he owns) that run along I-96 and is south of the Park and Ride lot on Alden Nash as a site for a new warehouse.

Grooters has a local manufacturing company which would like to use the area; however, the name of the client was not revealed to the commission pending a signed letter of intent. If the letter is received, the client would like

to occupy the facility by November.

The development on this site would require building one structure approximately 300 feet by 500 feet (150,000 square feet). The building would be used for the dual purpose of a warehouse and some associated offices. Kozak said the new business would employ approximately 50 people.

If this project goes through, Kozak said Grooters would like to develop this area further with additional buildings.

In a bit of a twist, Grooters would like to develop this land, not under the Planned Urban Development ordinance, but rather under the township's Light Industrial ordinance. The irony is the commission rezoned the property as light industrial with the knowledge that Grooters' industrial com-

McLarty's 'whinnying' effort to continue Pratt Lake horse show

For the past seven years, a horse show has taken place on 40 acres of land on Pratt Lake Rd.

The McLartys approached the planning commission earlier this month

seeking a permit to hold the horse shows. Although the shows have gone on for seven years, the previous owners did not seek a permit.

McLarty wants to continue the tradition at this location but wants to make sure it falls within the township's ordinance guidelines.

The arena is approximately 600 feet from the road, has two access roads from Pratt Lake, and parking is abundant.

Local Camp Fire Clubs work to "Save the Bluebirds"

This past year the Lowell Area Camp Fire Clubs have been working on "Save the Bluebird." "Save The Bluebird" is a national project developed by Camp Fire to help increase the endangered Bluebird population.

There are five requirements to complete this project: (1) Learn about the Bluebird; (2) Build a nesting box; (3) Discover the natural resources in your area and the organizations that work to protect wildlife; (4) Locate a site to place

the nesting box and keep a record of what happens; and (5) Share your information in April. Approximately 37 Bluebird nesting boxes have been placed.

Senior adults, who want to be more active in the community or have an interest they want to pursue, may find what they are looking for at an open house being sponsored by the Franciscan Life Process Child Development Center.

The center will hold the open house beginning May 8 and ending May 14 are May 8 1 to 4 p.m.; May 9 through 13, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; and May 14, 1 to 3 p.m.

The Respite Day program at the center provides adult day care and gives respite time for family members, while the senior adult is actively involved at the center.

Sister Darlene Wessling, director of the center, says the program is designed to find

interests or hobbies that seniors enjoy and provide a means to fulfill those interests.

"If there is an activity, hobby, or interest that a senior has been wanting to do but just couldn't find a way to do it, this center may be able to supply them with that means," said Sister Darlene.

The center has been offering this program for almost two years. In the past the staff would arrange activities for nearly five people a day. Sis-

ter Darlene says with the added staff and building expansion, the center can handle twice that number.

"We have an experienced staff and a large facility to give the kind of personal attention and care nearly any senior can ask for," said Sister Darlene.

Sister Darlene says one of the most popular programs is the intergenerational activities with children. She says many seniors have the willingness and caring to give children a different perspective.

Another popular program at the center is its Collaborative Care program. This program allows seniors to collaborate with the Franciscan Com-

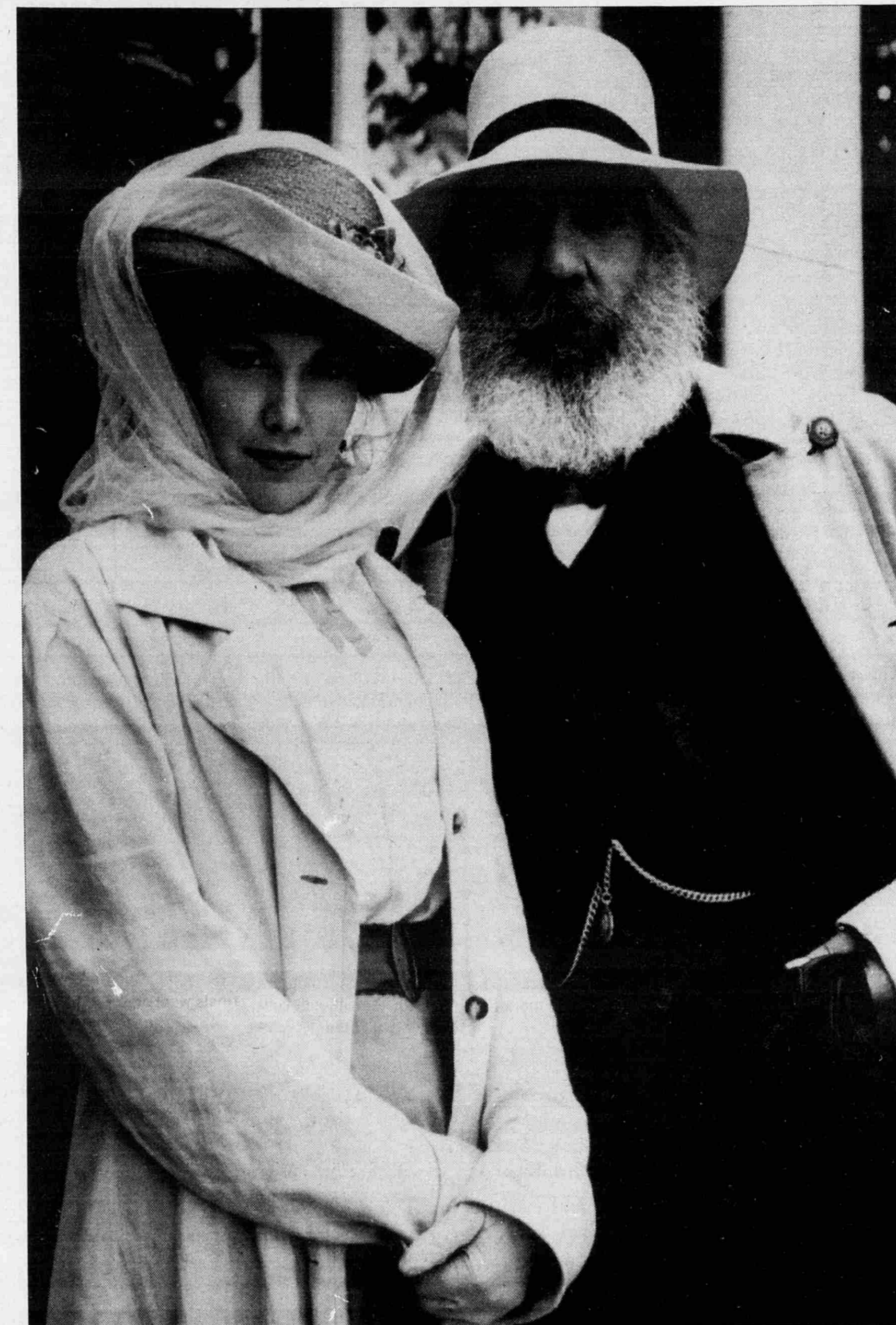

Lowell Charter Township Ordinance No. 6-9405

TOWNSHIP BOARD LOWELL CHARTER TOWNSHIP COUNTY OF KENT, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 6-9405

At a special meeting of the Township Board of Lowell Charter Township, Kent County, Michigan, held in the Township Hall in Lowell Charter Township on Thursday, April 21, 1994, at 4:00 o'clock p.m., local time.

LOWELL CHARTER TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE NO. 6-9405

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS FOR LOWELL CHARTER TOWNSHIP; TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 1994, BY LOWELL CHARTER TOWNSHIP, PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF ACT 94 OF THE PUBLIC ACTS OF MICHIGAN OF 1933, AS AMENDED, FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS; TO PRESCRIBE THE FORM OF BONDS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION OF REVENUES FOR THE PAYMENT AND SECURITY OF SAID BONDS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE RIGHTS OF THE HOLDERS OF SAID BONDS IN ENFORCEMENT THEREOF AND OTHER MATTERS RELATIVE TO SAID BONDS.

THE LOWELL CHARTER TOWNSHIP ORDAINS:

Section 1. Definitions. Whenever used in this Ordinance or in the bonds to be issued hereunder, except when otherwise indicated by context, the following definitions shall apply: 'Act 94' means Act 94 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1933, as amended. 'Authority' means the Michigan Municipal Bond Authority created pursuant to Act 227 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1985, as amended.

through Township access fees and a contribution from the School District.

Section 5. Sale of Bonds; Revenue Sharing Payments as Security for Bonds. The Township Supervisor or Township Treasurer is hereby authorized to sell the Bonds by negotiated sale to the Authority and a Purchase Contract substantially in the form presented with such additions, changes and modifications as shall be approved by Bond Counsel is hereby approved and the Township Supervisor or Township Treasurer are hereby authorized to execute and deliver the Purchase Contract for and on behalf of the Township.

Section 6. Bond Information. The Bonds shall be issued and sold within the parameters described herein. The Bonds shall be issued as a single bond or in denominations of \$5,000 or integral multiples thereof within a single maturity; shall be numbered consecutively in the direct order of maturity from 1 upward; shall be dated the date of issuance, but in no event later than July 1, 1994; shall mature serially on an annual basis or be subject to annual sinking fund redemptions; shall finally mature not later than May 1, 2014; shall bear interest at a net interest rate not exceeding eight percent (8.0%) per annum which shall be payable semi-annually commencing no earlier than November 1, 1994 and no later than ten (10) months after the dated date on the Bonds; and may be sold at a discount not exceeding five percent (5%) of the face amount of the Bonds.

Section 7. Registration and Execution. The Bonds shall be registered as to both principal and interest on the registration books of the Township kept by the Township Treasurer as of the fifteenth (15th) day of the month preceding the interest payment date.

Section 8. Bond Form. The form of the Bonds shall be substantially as follows: UNITED STATES OF AMERICA STATE OF MICHIGAN COUNTY OF KENT LOWELL TOWNSHIP WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 1994

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS that Lowell Charter Township, Kent County, Michigan (the "Township"), acknowledges itself indebted and, for value received, hereby promises to pay in lawful money of the United States of America in accordance with Schedule A attached hereto [on the date specified above], to the Registered Owner, specified above, or registered assigns, the Principal Amount, specified above, together with interest thereon at the Interest Rate(s) specified on Schedule A attached hereto [specified above], from the date hereof, payable on November 1, 1994, and semi-annually thereafter on the first day of May and November of each year.

Section 9. The principal of and interest on any Bonds registered to the Authority shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the principal corporate trust office of First of America Bank - Southeast Michigan, N.A., Birmingham, Michigan, or at such other place as shall be designated to the Township by the Authority (the "Authority's Depository").

Section 10. 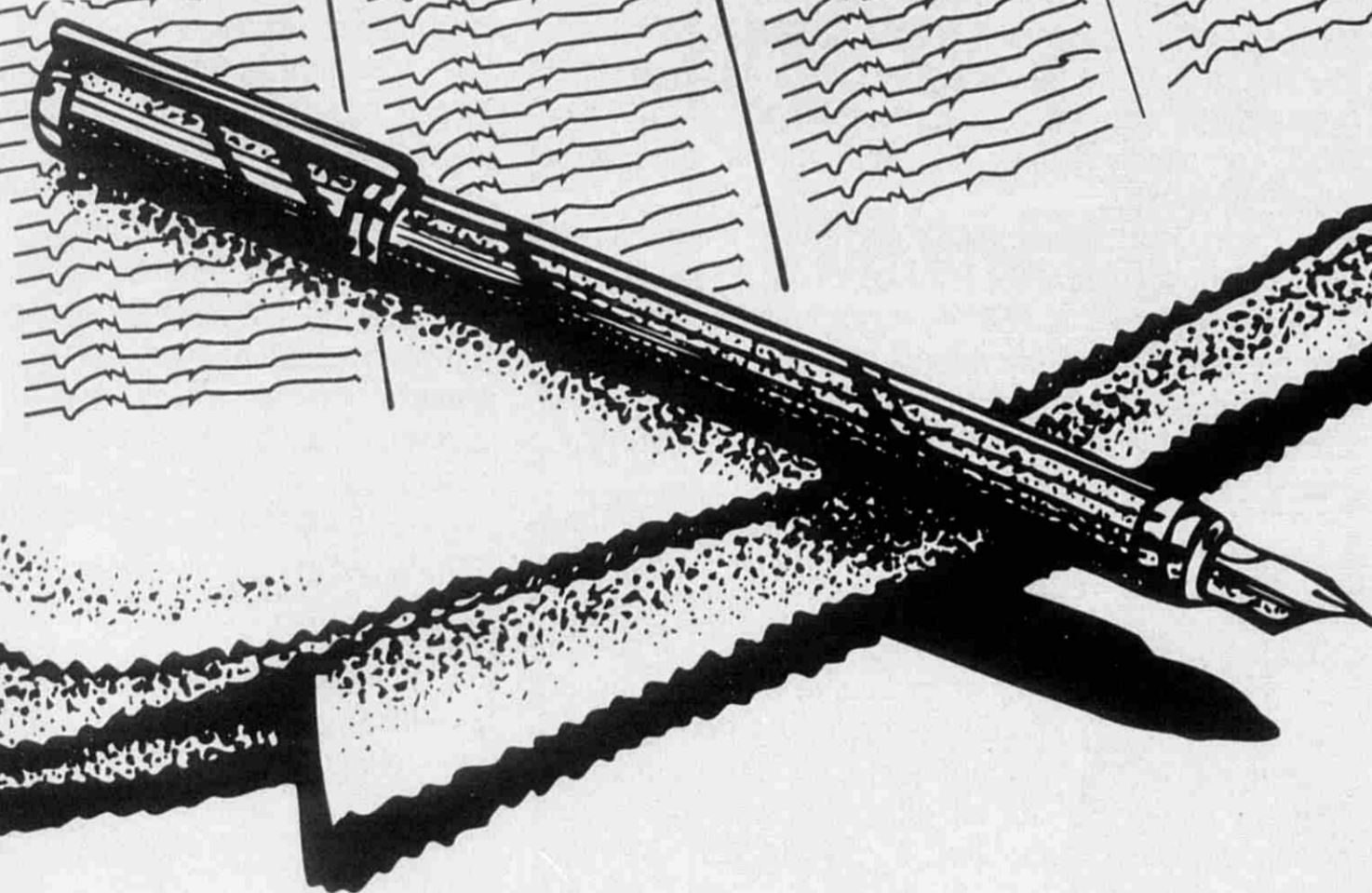

Lowell boys' & girls' track team christen new track with wins

It may not have been the opening ceremonies of the Olympics but for Lowell High School athletic director Tom Stahr, it was a "great day for Lowell's track program."

The day Stahr is referring to is April 21, the day the track team hosted its first meet in 10 years.

And what a day! Not only did Lowell host a track meet, but both the boys' and girls' teams walked away with a victory over Sparta.

The day started with a ceremony where Joe Schwab handed off a baton from 1933 to this year's track team captains.

Schwab was a member of the 1933 boys 880-yard state champion relay team. Schwab, along with Raymond Dunsen, Darrel Burras and Jim Green, ran a scorching 1:31.2 to win the state title and record a four-man team record that still stands today.

Stahr said the meet had significance in more ways than just the holding of a meet. It was a quirk of fate that when Lowell hosted its first meet in 10 years, it hosted with Sparta's track team. Stahr said Sparta is one of the longest rivalries for Lowell, but it will soon end. This will be the last year for Sparta in the OK White League, so "it was kind of special to have them here for the unveiling of our new track."

The turnout wasn't what Stahr had hoped for, but, considering the factors, he was happy. Originally the track meet was scheduled to be held at Sparta's field, but because of a conflict with its facility, Lowell hosted the meet. Stahr said items such as landscaping, the public address system, score board, water, and rest rooms are not completely finished.

"I was hoping for more people to come, but I'm just happy we were able to get

everything organized to get the meet started," said Stahr.

When the meet got started, both the girls' and boys' teams initiated the new facility with victories.

The girls posted a 70-58 score while the boys finished with an 88-49 victory.

The boys' team took first in 13 of the 17 events. First place finishes went to Ryan Teelander in the long jump, 18-6 3/4; 100-meter dash, 11.72; 400-meter dash, 53.81; and the 200-meter dash, 23.87.

George Ponchaud came away with victories in the pole vault, 11'0", and 3200-meter run, 10:58.99.

A throw of 47-6 3/4 gave Ron Acheson the victory in the shot put and his toss of 123' earned him the discus competition.

Dan Huizenga took the 1600 with a time of 4:47.71 and he finished the 800 with a time of 2:10.94.

The high jump was won by Christian Magro with a jump of 6'1", edging out the Sparta competitor by an inch.

The relay team of Ponchaud, Martin Anderson, Huizenga, and Eric Arnett won the 3200-meter relay with a time of 8:35.38.

The 400-meter relay team of Joel Uzarski, Chris Goggins, Tim Stencil and Denny Briggs took their event with a time of 0:48.78.

The girls' team was just as dominant placing first in 10 of their 16 events.

Dawn Burrows took home first place finishes in the 100, 12.63, and 200, 27.18, as well as helping in the 400-meter relay and 800-meter relay.

Kortney Gowen finished first in the 400, 1:05.69, and long jump, 14'10".

Lesley Murphy's jump of 52" was enough to tie with the Sparta competitor in the high jump.

Melissa Beute took the shot put with a toss of 30-8 1/4 while Andrea Richmond won the discus with a throw of 87-9.

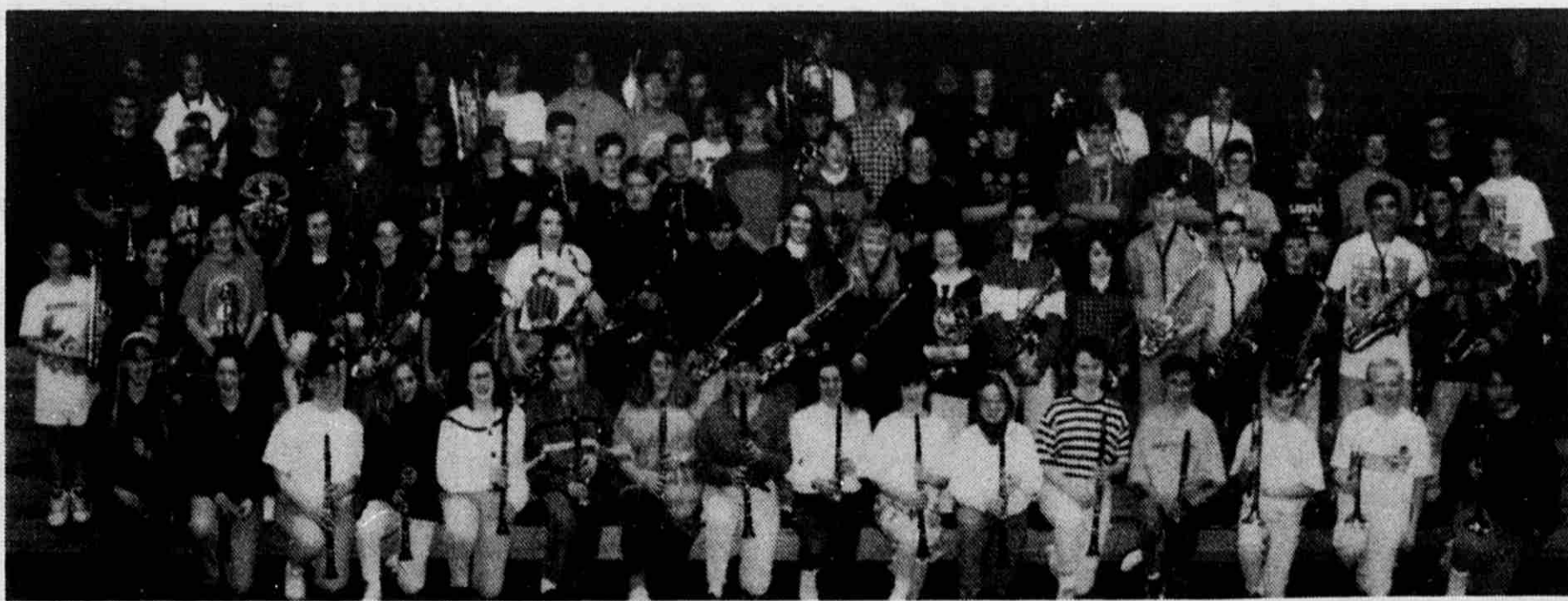
