Front loaded bond appears to be library's finance vehicle

With nearly 70 percent of the funding accounted for and the site plan approved, the Lowell Library committee has now set its sights on getting out bids in January.

Dan Durkee, of Fishbeck Thompson Carr & Huber Inc., will undertake that part of the project for the library committee. January has been determined as the best time to get the most competitive and lowest priced bids.

"Dan has been great. He has followed through with everything he has been asked to do," library committee chairman Chuck Myers said. "The cooperation of all the people involved with this project has been great."

Lowell residents may have already noticed that the

Hobby Stop has been razed and removed from the corner of Lafayette and Main St.

"This is conducive to the riverwalk and new library," Myers said. "It provides visibility from Main St."

The large maple tree which sits on the site of the new library at the corner of Monroe and Avery will remain.

A condition report has been done on the tree prior to the start of construction.

"Contractors will protect it more knowing a condition report has been completed," Durkee said.

Myers also noted that the signage on the building will be discrete and tasteful. It will be built into the structure similar to that of the Lowell Post Office. The name will include a private donor who gave

\$380,000 toward the project. The benefactor will provide \$180,000 up front and then \$80, \$100 and \$100,000 over the next three years.

The new library will be accessible from two entrances on Monroe and Avery.

The community room (seats approximately 100) and restrooms will be accessible to the public even when the library is closed.

Shrubs will be put in on Avery and Monroe to hide the headlights and bumpers of parked cars.

The current 900-square foot Lowell Library has served Lowell for 70 years. The new library will be 9,000 square feet.

The Lowell library project has garnered money in excess of \$800,000. The new library will cost an estimated \$1.28

million.

Myers would like to have the library fully funded by the time ground-breaking takes place in April.

Other than the private benefactor, the library has received a \$270,000 grant from the Look Foundation (\$110,000 up front and \$40,000 for each of the four years after that), a \$50,000 grant from Steelcase, a \$15,000 grant from FMB State Savings Bank and a \$3,500 grant from Amway.

The remaining funds (\$18,500) and the work of the Friends of the Library have come from individuals through community donations.

The committee is still waiting word on whether it will receive a grant from the Grand Rapids Foundation. It

expects to learn that by year's end.

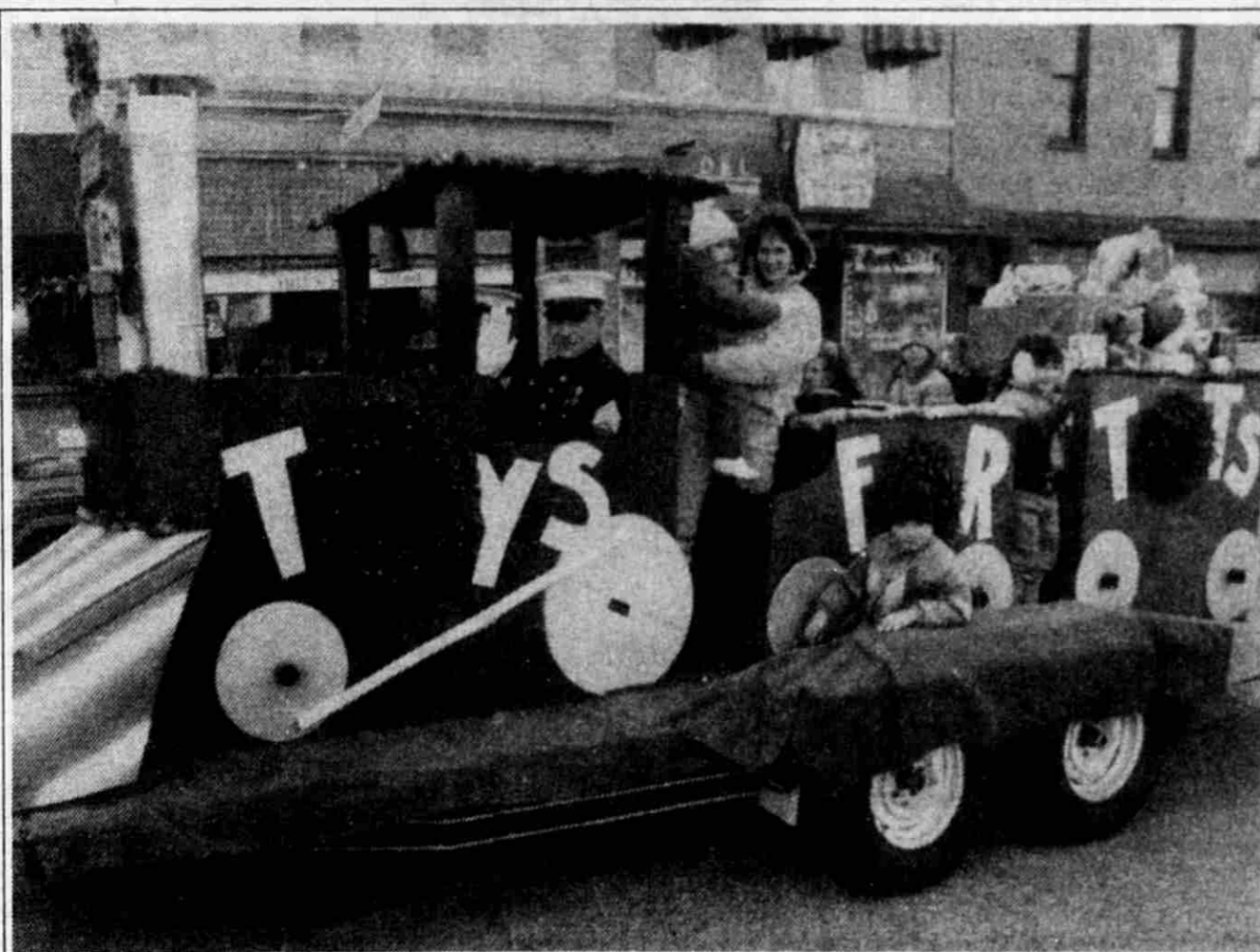
City manager Dave Pasquale said since donations are constantly coming in, a figure of \$895,000 was being used for bond financing. "Also, since the current unencumbered general fund balance is at \$595,000, a \$150,000 up front contribution has been proposed as an option. This would still provide for a sufficient fund balance."

City attorney Dick Wendt reviewed the bonding avenues available to the city. While a decision isn't needed until the end of February, Wendt said a 10-year bond appears to work best, particularly if it's front loaded. "This would take advantage of multi-year contributions and lesser amounts of interests," he said.

Pasquale noted that smaller payments in the later years of the bond provide the city an opportunity to finance future projects, such as City Hall. "A 15-20 year bond would tie the hands of the city for future projects," he said.

The council approved contracting out Riemenschneider Design Associates, Inc. out of Ann Arbor for the interior design services contract at a cost of \$12,775.

The city also approved creating a city of Lowell building authority. This would facilitate the financing of the new public library as well as future construction projects. A three-member board would act as a conduit for receiving funds as well as selling bonds.

Planning commission and DDA encourage sign uniformity throughout central business district

Lowell Planning Commission's recommendation for approval of a sign variance for the Flat River Antique Mall carried with it more than just a square footage variance.

It also carried the hope that sign uniformity could be encouraged throughout the central business district.

Lowell planning commissioner Jim Hall said the central business district needs more of the Victorian-look style signs and less of the lighted canvases.

"I believe it's more in keeping with the work being completed by the Downtown Development Authority," Hall said.

Planning commissioner Gordie Barry told the Downtown Development Authority Board at its monthly meeting that he felt the planning commission's decisions on signs in the downtown area should be compatible and consistent with the DDA and with what might be coming with the proposed historical district.

Planning commissioner Chuck Myers added, "It would be a shame if the neon look negated the effort of the DDA."

The planning commission and the DDA agree that the

preferred sign style they would like to see should be communicated to the central business district.

They are also not sure the aesthetic look is something that can be dictated.

DDA board member Dean Lonick proposed that a draft or verbiage be shared with the commission as to what the DDA would like to see.

Lowell city manager Dave Pasquale said some downtowns have pushed or stressed a theme and then have put some teeth into it to assure that the theme is followed.

Cousin's owner and DDA board member Karin Hale said that all that might be needed is to instill an impression on the business owners. "Maybe all we need to do is to give out a thought or provoke an idea," she said.

The DDA asked Pasquale to talk to legal counsel about what problems could be created if an effort is made to dictate aesthetics.

One motivating factor in encouraging a certain style of aesthetics is the proposed two percent grant the DDA would like to offer central business owners for improvements to the building.

"If we can dictate aesthetics, that may be a vehicle by

which to do it," Lonick said. "But first we must find out if we can."

The Flat River Antique Mall proposed to install a 40 square foot projecting sign (four by 10 feet) from its building. Under the current ordinance, a maximum of 20 square feet for projecting signs is allowed.

Monday night the zoning board of appeals also approved the sign variance.

New volleyball coach enjoys work ethic approach of Red Arrow netters

First-year Lowell volleyball coach Jacki Malokovsky wants her young varsity squad to beat the ball to the spot.

"If the girls are able to read what's going on in front of them, they can be there," Malokovsky said.

One may have already anticipated that the focus of Malokovsky's preseason practices has been on floor coverage.

"Floor coverage, quickness and reading what's going on will be our approach to

defense," Malokovsky said. "Because we are young, the girls won't be able to draw on experience."

Practices have been filled with drills that put players in game situations, making them read what's going on and where the ball is going.

Not only will Lowell try to keep the ball off the floor from a defensive standpoint, but they will try to make a smooth transition from defense to offense. "The girls are showing improvement," Malokovsky said.

A strong setter makes the

transition a little bit easier. Malokovsky says junior Corrine Arnett is an extremely strong setter. "The setter is volleyball's quarterback. Corrine is very smart, has wonderful hands and is very

aggressive. That's the whole package."

Benefiting from Arnett's play will be front row hitters, Tracy Loughlin, Rachel Thomas, Laurie Barton, Liz Rooker, Karen Dykstra, Elena

Richmond and Dawn Burrows.

"Burrows is short but can definitely play the front row," Malokovsky said. "Dawn has a high skill level, is very quick, and coachable."

Loughlin and Thomas, at least early on, have shown the most blocking skill.

From an offensive standpoint, serving is essential. "We're working on it. Right now we're just putting the ball over the net. The girls need to be able to serve hard and serve it to a specific area," Malokovsky said.

Malokovsky coached volleyball at the varsity level in New Hartford, NY - a suburb of Utica.

"It was a wealthy school. It was also hard to get the kids to work," Malokovsky says. "Here, the girls give you 100 percent all the time and they have a good time. It's a lot of fun coaching them."

Team goals the players have set include playing as a team; being there for one another and encouraging each other; beating Forest Hills Central; and winning the conference.

Malokovsky said she would like the girls not to think of volleyball ending after high school. "If a player has good skills, she can play anywhere," she said.

Lowell's coach said Forest Hills Central is the team to beat. "We don't have the core of experienced players that Central has," Malokovsky said.

Of the eight schools in the O-K White, six have new volleyball coaches. Only Forest Hills and Zeeland have retained their coaches from a year ago.

Rivers hopes to transform young and inexperienced wrestling team into strong and balanced squad by season's end

As varsity wrestling experience goes, this may be one of the most inexperienced Red Arrow teams in years.

As wrestling experience goes, the 1995-96 squad may be the most experienced team in many years.

With 28 of the 40 wrestlers either sophomores or freshmen, one understands why varsity experience is not at a premium.

While opponents may not recognize the names, the 18 freshmen have wrestled plenty over the years.

"This is the first batch of freshmen to come through the program that began wrestling at the age of five in our feeder program," Lowell wrestling coach Gary Rivers said. "Yes, we're young and inexperienced at the varsity level, but by the end of the year we will be fairly strong and balanced."

The veteran Lowell coach is not bashful about giving out credit for the success of the youth wrestling program in Lowell.

"We have excellent wrestling coaches in our freestyle program," Rivers said. "In Tom Harper and Jim Fleet, we have two varsity coaches working at the middle school level."

Because of its varsity inexperience, Lowell is not favored to win the O-K white or even finish second.

Rivers says co-champion Wyoming Park is the favorite. "They have everyone back except Ty Lamar."

Forest Hills Central re-

turns everybody from a year ago and should seriously challenge the Vikings.

Rivers also likes Hudsonville to challenge.

"We will be competitive, but I don't think we have the experience to challenge early ons," Rivers said.

Two-time state medalist and defending conference champion Dan Spicer will captain the 1995-96 team. He will probably weigh in at 125

pounds but may wrestle some at 119 pounds.

Another conference champion returning to the fold this year will be junior Casey Harper. He could wrestle at 112 and/or 119 pounds.

Nick West, a returning letter winner, will wrestle at 103 pounds. The sophomore has added some meat; he's up to 102 pounds from 91 a year ago.

Pushing West will be

freshmen Aaron Plattner, Anthony Saganek and Jerrid Uzarski and sophomore Kyle Roth.

Elena Risner will also wrestle at 103 pounds. She is the first female wrestler at Lowell.

Junior Brett Plattner will see mat time at either 125 or 130 pounds.

Junior Scott Hays, a letter winner as a freshman, is expected to fill a void at 152

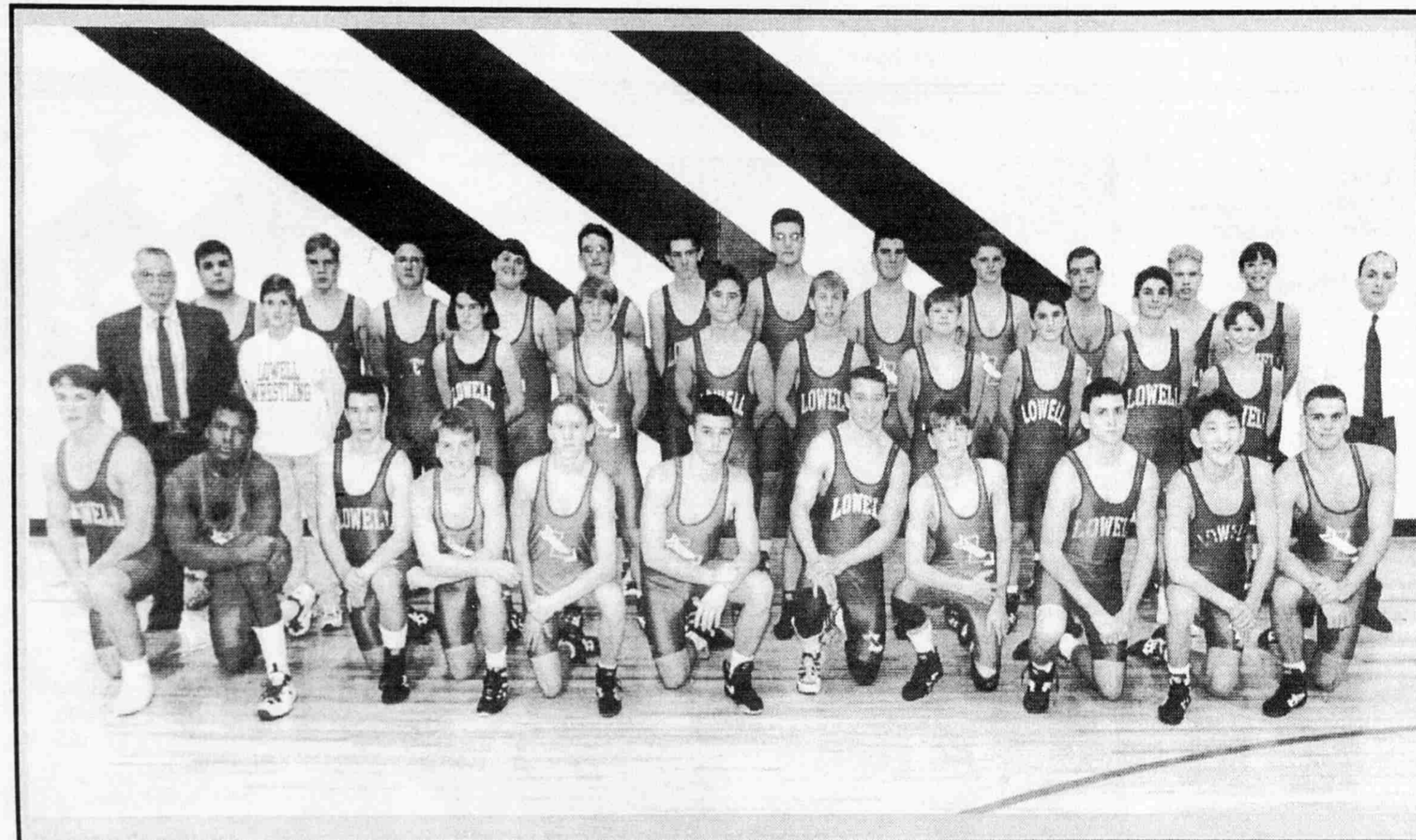
pounds. Challenging Hays will be sophomore Brian Bellechasses.

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New coach and new system bring high level of anticipation to basketball season

First-year Lowell varsity basketball coach Pete Bush has a top-four wish list for the 1995-96 season:

1. That his Red Arrow defense makes other teams uncomfortable.
2. That on offense his club recognizes the difference between a good opportunity and just an opportunity.
3. That win or lose, his Lowell squad is playing its best ball of the season in March.

1. That the size he was used to seeing in Rogers City finds its way into Lowell.

Six players return from last year's 3-18 team. They return to find a new coach and a new system - one that helped Rogers City grow from five wins to 20 wins in three years.

Bush isn't promising the returning lettermen 20 wins, but he is promising a five-man motion offense, a good fundamental man-to-man defense mixed in with some zone variations, and a period of patience while players adjust.

"Defensively we want to make other teams uncomfortable," Bush said. "We want them to shoot over us, not drive around us, and we want to rebound well."

On offense he looks to the motion offense to get his good shooters' shots, and to get defenses to respect Lowell's post play. "You have to get opponents to respect your ability to get the ball inside. If you get the ball in, then you can do well outside."

Bush openly admits there will be times in the early part of the season when Lowell

may not look good. "As the season progresses, the players will become more familiar and comfortable. The system is different than what they've been accustomed to and they will need a period of adjustment," he said.

The first-year coach believes familiarity and a comfort level will help in developing confidence.

Bush said early on he will work to find the right combinations. "I will run an eight-nine-man system."

The guard combinations could include seniors Ryan

Graham, B.J. Barber and Scott Smith.

"Graham has good leadership skills. Barber and Smith are good shooters, but lack the ability to go to the hoop," Bush said.

Other guards will include Mike Bielecki, Joe Hobach, Scott Hamilton and John Moore.

"Bielecki is probably the most talented player on the

team. Hamilton shows a lot of flexibility and Hobach plays with hustle and determination," Bush said.

Moore, a transfer from Ottawa Hills, is not eligible to play until the second semester. "He takes the ball to the hoop as well as anyone. He could become a very good player," Bush said.

The forward/post players will include Steve Bosserd,

Chris Wilcox, Jeff Catlin, Kevin Brown, Brian Willmarth, Joe Seitz and Aaron Brander.

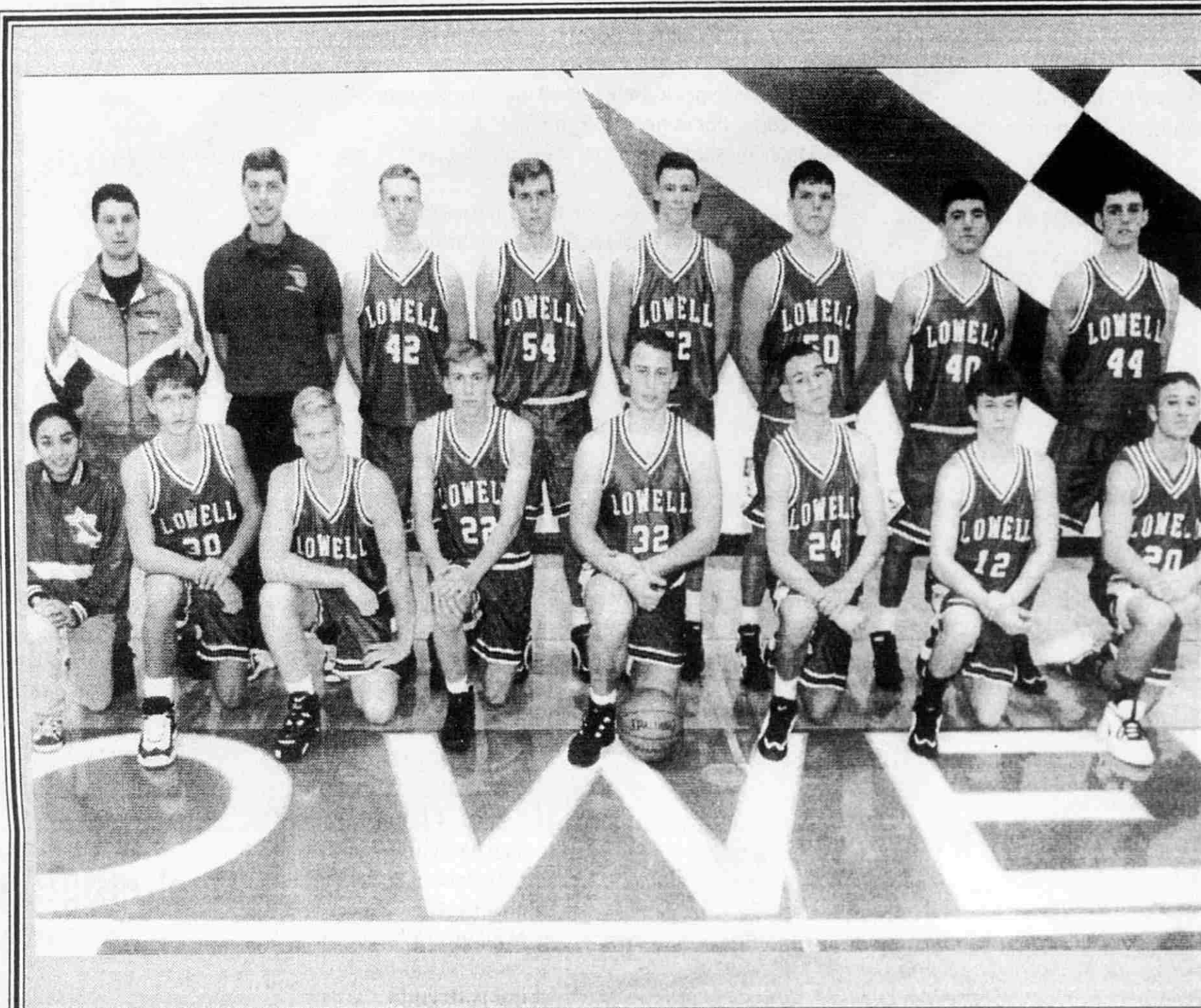
"Bosserd works hard, has long arms and isn't afraid to mix it up inside. He could become a good post player. We've got to work on keeping him from getting frustrated," Bush said. "He also has a pretty good shot and he penetrates well."

Bush calls Catlin an undersized forward, but someone who runs the court well, fills the lanes and works hard.

Wilcox, who didn't play basketball last year, is expected to give Lowell some quality minutes in the post.

Bush said they need Seitz to play good defense and rebound.

Two regional qualifiers return to lead Red Arrow gymnasts

The season hasn't even started, and it's clear Lowell gymnastics coach Michele DeHaan has already done some of her best coaching, marketing and public relations work.

The 1995-96 Red Arrow squad is short on gymnasts. It has just five members on its team.

What about this marketing and public relation just mentioned.

DeHaan coached gymnastics at the YMCA level this past fall and last spring. "The number of gymnasts at the lower levels and at the middle school level are real good," she said.

In an effort to feed the interest at the lower levels, all participants were sent a varsity schedule. In addition, they were told if they bring their YMCA certificate and a parent(s) to a meet, the gymnast would be allowed in for free.

"I would like to get enough people to come to a gymnastics event so that the booster club would open up the concessions," DeHaan said.

The second-year Lowell coach and her Red Arrows have set qualifying for the regionals as a team goal. To do this, the team must score 116 points four times during the regular season.

The five gymnasts returning this year are juniors Shannon Laux, Brenda Lacey and Skye Fisher as well as freshman Asheley Pullen and senior Trisha Schmidt.

Laux will perform all around. The junior's strength will be in the vault and floor exercise.

"The vault is her strength. She has good upper and lower body strength and her experience in tumbling is a big help."

DeHaan said. "Shannon is also helped in the floor exercise by her tumbling experience."

Laux begins where she left off on the balance beam. "She held onto everything learned last year over the summer," DeHaan said.

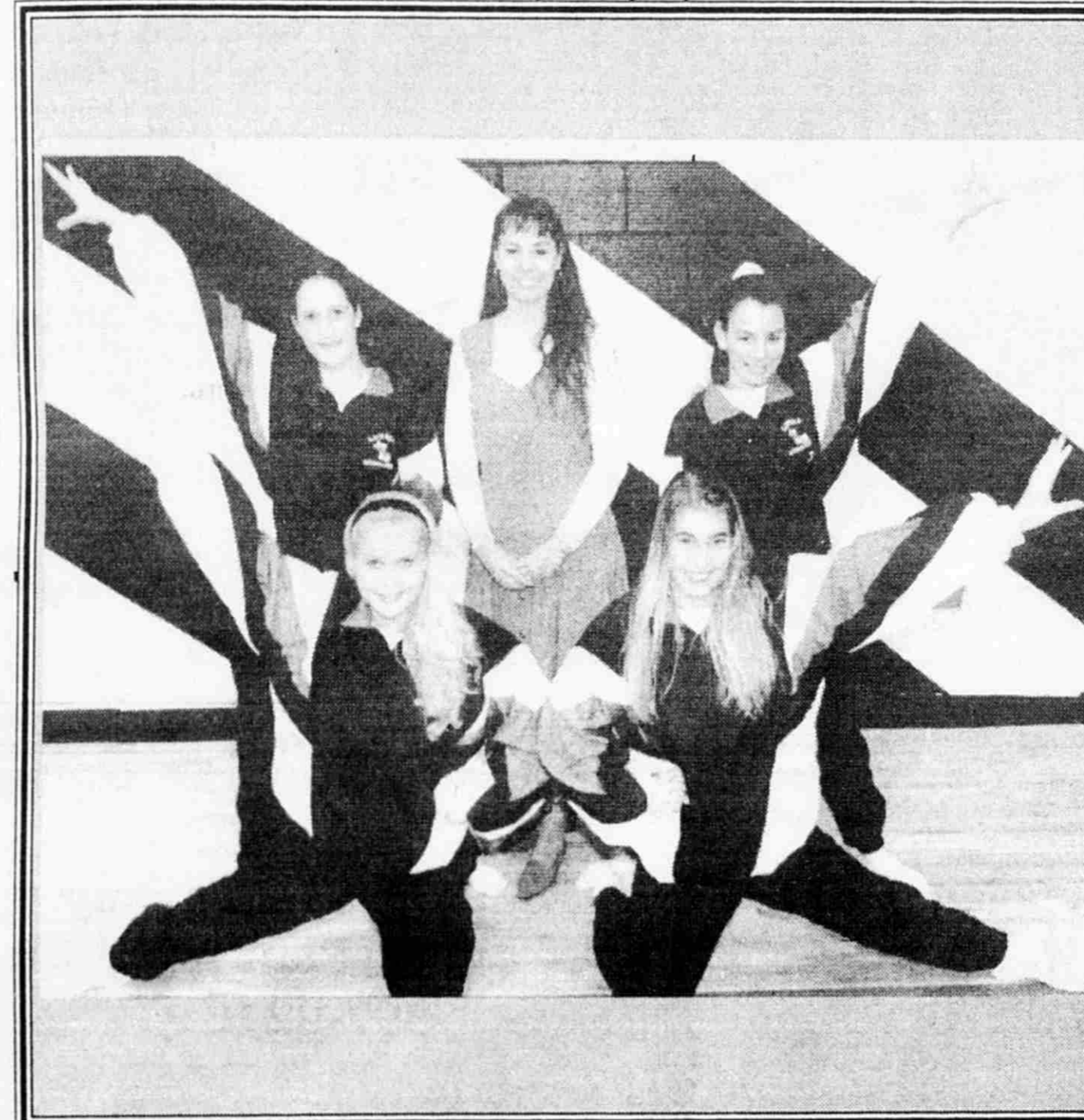
Laux is not fond of the uneven bars but will perform in the event.

Fisher is expected to excel on the balance beam. The junior is helped by her dance background.

DeHaan said Fisher is also looking very good on the uneven bars.

Last year's most consistent gymnast was Lacey. The Red Arrow along with Laux are the only returning gymnasts who qualified for the regional.

"Brenda has picked up where she left off. Her scores are consistent. As the season progresses her scores go up," DeHaan said.

"The uneven bars are one of her best events. The reason for this is when she came on board, she already could do the three kips, which allows her to focus on more difficult tricks," DeHaan said.

Pullen will be strongest in the areas of floor and the balance beam. She comes in capable of doing the back handspring and is able to perform the tricks expected of a gymnast on the beam.

Schmidt is expected to help out in the areas of the balance beam and vault. "The beam is Trisha's best event. She has been with the program all four years," DeHaan said.

Hoping to help the team's chances of qualifying for the regional, DeHaan has added a dual meet with Portland. The Red Arrows will also participate in the Holt Invitational.

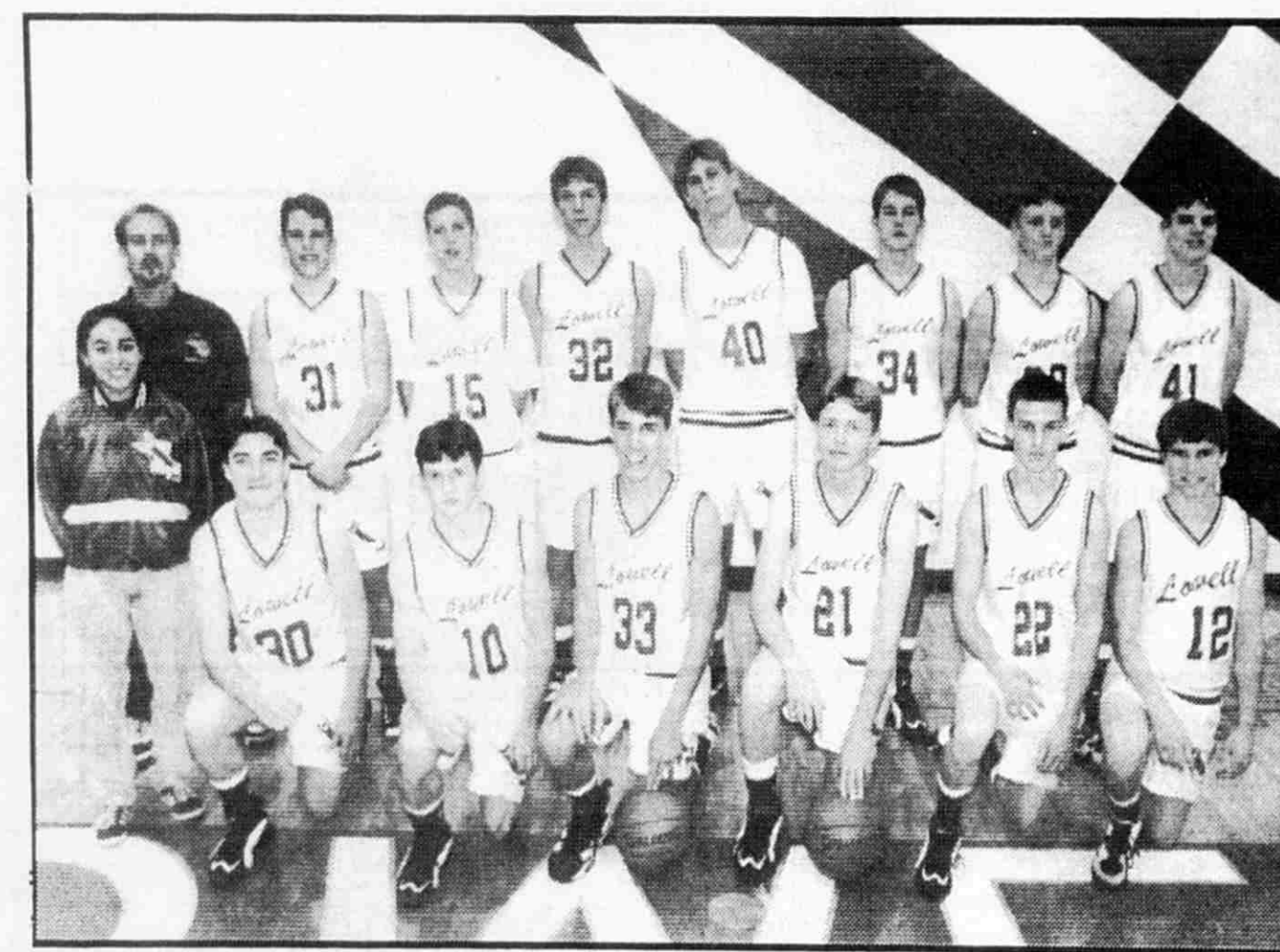

Plans reviewed for rental policy in Lowell's new Township Hall

Once Lowell Charter Township completes its hall expansion project, residents may be able to use the build-

ing for parties and receptions. The township board is reviewing a preliminary rental policy regarding the hall and hopes to adopt it before the hall is completed around Dec. 22.

Interested parties hoping to rent the hall must apply at the township office 30 days in advance of the requested use or rental.

The fee for using the hall, which will include some equipment such as table and chairs, will be set by the township.

The supervisor, however, may be authorized to waive the fee in certain instances. One criteria for waiving the fee requires that an activity shall provide a direct benefit to the township or community.

According to the prelimi-

nary policy, certain groups may be eligible for a waiver of fees, but there may be a charge for cost of personnel and use of the building as deemed appropriate.

The preliminary cost for using the hall includes a \$100 security deposit, \$30 for use of the building, and \$25 for use of the kitchen.

The security deposit is to cover the extra cost for cleaning the facility or repairing any damage to the hall.

If no charge against the security deposit is necessary, the total will be refunded.

If charges are made against the security deposit, the balance will be refunded within 10 days of the facility use.

Board trustee Alyn Fletcher, who provided the preliminary plans to the township, said the plan is just the first step in providing a rental agreement.

"As time goes by and we

get more experience with things, we can make changes," he said. "But for now this gives us a policy to work with."

Township supervisor John Timpson said any policy adopted would be reviewed in six months to handle any situations or problems the township didn't anticipate.

The board will review the policy again at its regular meeting on Dec. 18.

GENITAL WARTS
Genital warts, also known as condyloma, has become one of the most common sexually transmitted diseases. It has been estimated that over one million new cases are diagnosed annually.

Genital warts are small bumps or warts that appear on the skin of the penis, vaginal area, anus or inside the vagina on the cervix. They are caused by infection with the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV). The virus is spread by direct skin to skin contact which occurs during sexual intercourse. After contact, warts may occur within several weeks to several months. In some cases a person may be infected with HPV without any outward signs or warts. People may not notice the warts because they are inside the vagina or they are so small that they can't be seen without a microscope. Warts are often harder to see in women than in men and the virus can cause changes in the cervix which can be found when the pap smear is done.

If you suspect that you have genital warts, see your doctor. Warts are treated by applying medication that gradually removes them. Occasionally your doctor may freeze the wart or use laser treatment to vaporize them. Do not use over the counter drugstore treatment for skin warts in the genital area. Treatment of genital warts may not be completely effective. It will usually remove the wart and help reduce the risk of spreading infection but the virus may remain in the body leading to reinfection and recurrence of warts at a later date.

Women infected with HPV should make sure to get their annual pap smears because we now know that some of the strains of HPV can lead to cancer of the cervix. Early treatment can cure or prevent cervical cancer.

You can avoid getting genital warts by not having sex or by having sex with one person only who is not infected and who has sex only with you. The use of condoms may also help prevent the spread of HPV and other sexually transmitted diseases.

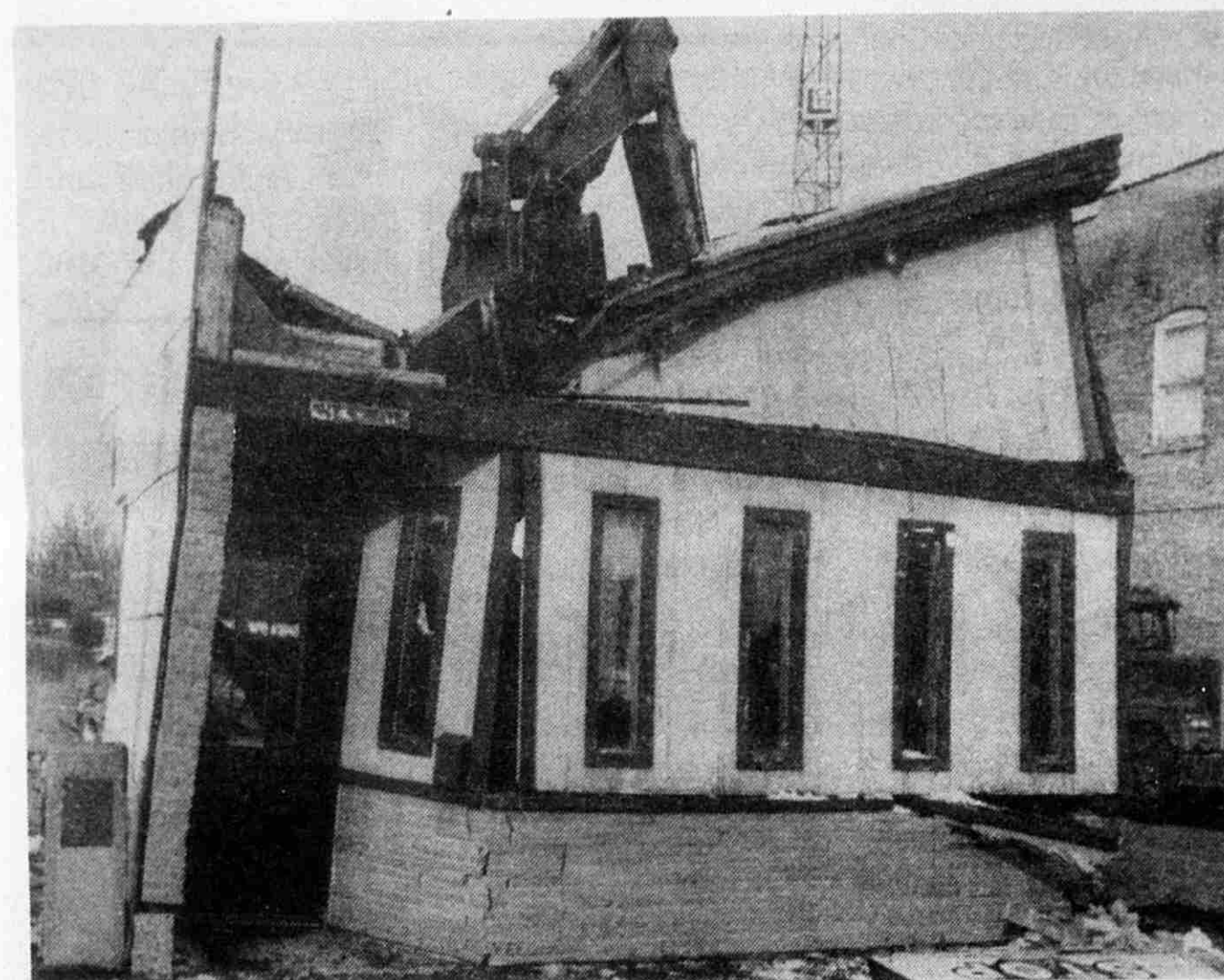
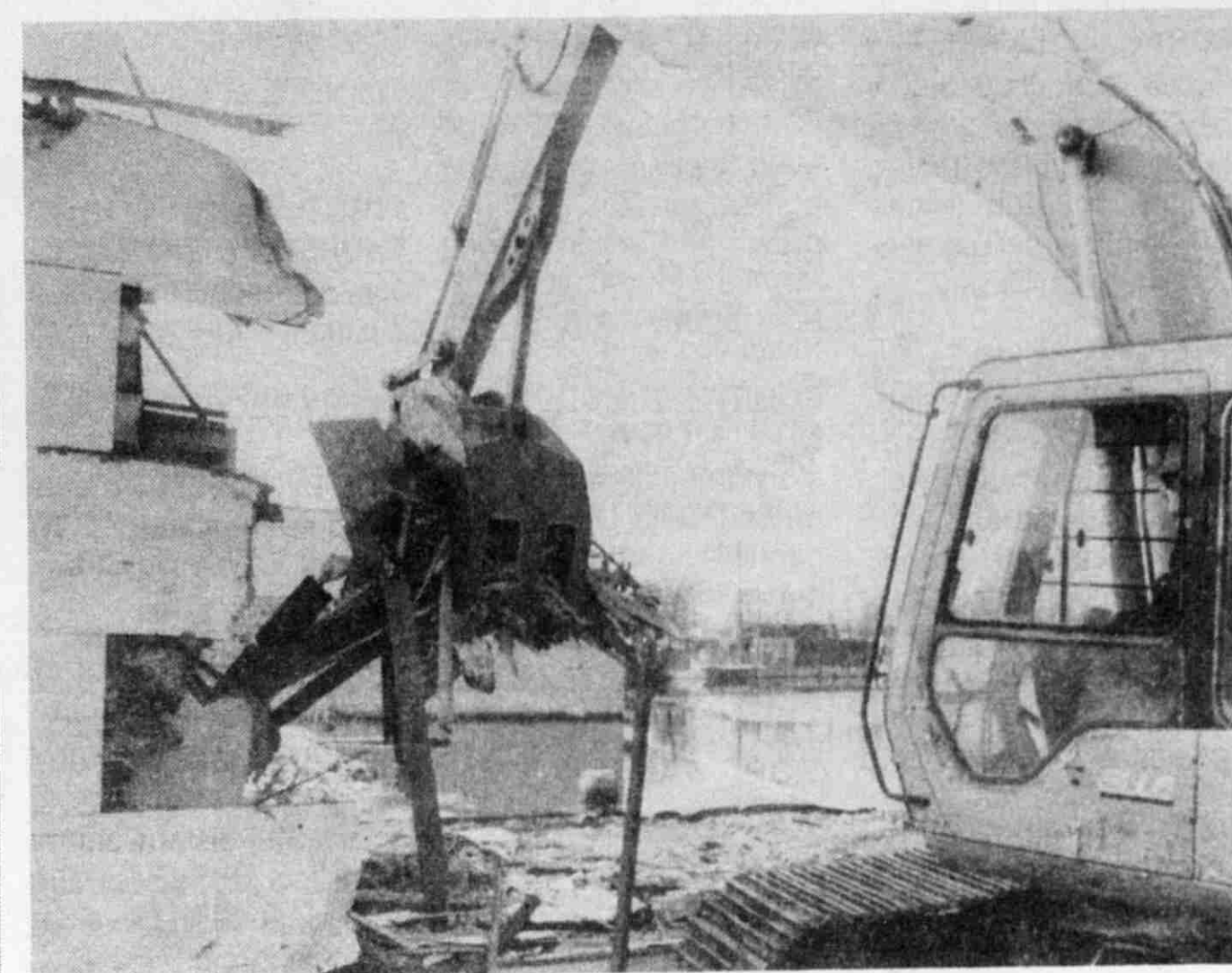
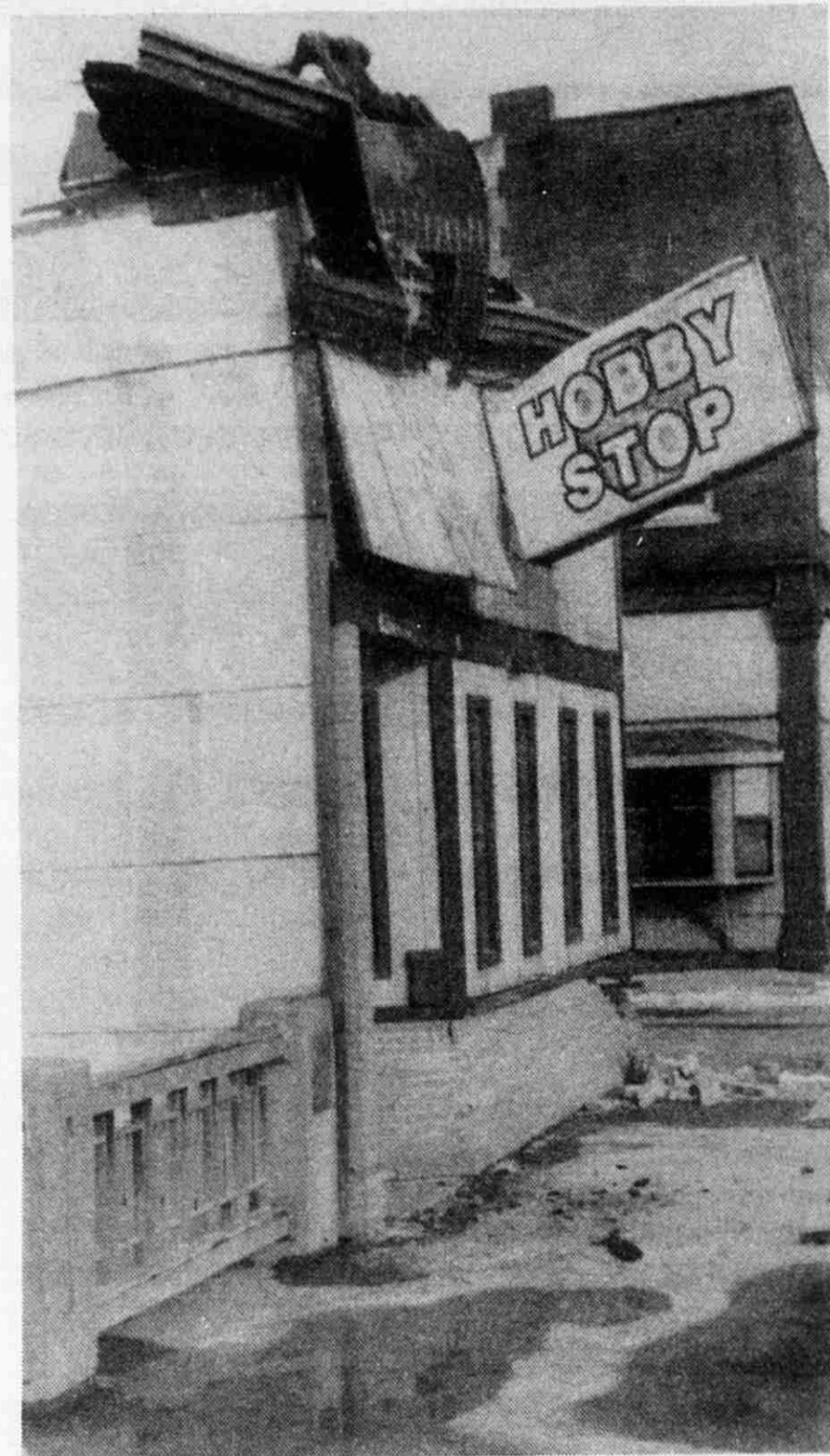

Possibility of wetlands may impede Mill Isle Estate development

The possibility of wetlands could impede the progress of the Mill Isle Estate subdivision development.

Matt MacGregor, district supervisor for the land and water management division, said DNR's Chuck Towns has identified land adjacent to the proposed development as having substantial wetlands.

"Now we must determine where the boundary line is between wetlands and upland," Towns said. "To do that a wetland determination is needed on the proposed development property."

The property adjacent to the Mill Isle Estate property is owned by Donald Gerard. On May 17, 1990 a wetland determination of the property was conducted. It was determined to be shrub-shrub, forested, and emergent wetland.

Towns said Mill Isle Estate developer Fred Kamminga has chosen to have a private consulting firm do the study.

MacGregor said there are three parameters used in determining whether wetlands exist:

- A presence of water.

- A predominance of wetland vegetation (50 percent and over).

- Hydric soils - high water tables within two feet of soil.
- In addition, the property must be five acres or greater and contiguous to a lake, stream or pond - or within 500 feet.

In order to dredge, drain or fill wetland property a permit application (\$25) must be completed.

If the permit is denied, then a prudent feasible alternative must be found. "Either another area of the property would have to be used or the fill would have to be trucked someplace else," MacGregor said.

Kamminga, Mill Isle Estate developer, said he has received approval on design of the plat from the DNR in Lansing and from the drain commissioner.

"I've received approval at every step except one - from a man sitting in the DNR office in Grand Rapids," Kamminga said. "And he says there might be the potential of a wetland. For that, we're going to shut the whole thing down?"

Kamminga questioned whether the property in question is a sanctuary where wildlife and vegetation are predominant or whether it's an open field that is wet.

"To remove the dirt will cost a lot of money," he says.

The developer said he will fight the determination all the way to Governor Engler's office. "I'm not going to put up with this."

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ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE CITY OF LOWELL BUILDING AUTHORITY

Pursuant to the Building Authority Act, Act 31 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1948 (first extra session), as amended (the "Act"), the following Articles of Incorporation of the City of Lowell Building Authority are adopted by the City Council of the City of Lowell, Kent County, Michigan, a Michigan municipal corporation, as the incorporating unit pursuant to the Act:

Article 1. Name of Authority.

The name of the Authority shall be the City of Lowell Building Authority.

Article II. Name of Incorporating Unit.

The incorporating unit creating the Authority is the City of Lowell, a Michigan municipal corporation (the "City").

Article III. Purpose.

The Authority is created for the purpose of acquiring, furnishing, equipping, owning, improving, enlarging, operating and maintaining a building or buildings, automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities, stadiums, and the necessary site or sites therefore, together with appurtenant properties and facilities necessary or convenient for the effective use thereof, for use for any legitimate public purpose of the City.

Article IV. Authority Commission.

The Authority shall be governed by a body known as the "Commission" composed of three (3) persons which shall be appointed by the City Council of the City, but shall not be members of the City Council. Such Commissioners shall serve for a three-year term, except that for the initial appointments one person shall serve a one-year term, provided, any such appointed Commissioner may be removed at any time by the City Council with or without cause. Should it be necessary to replace a Commissioner prior to the expiration of his or her term, the City Council shall appoint a person to serve during the unexpired term. Said Commissioners shall designate one of their members as Chairperson, one as Secretary and one as Treasurer. Said Commission shall adopt bylaws and/or rules of procedure and provide therein for regular meetings.

Article V. Powers and Duties.

The Authority shall have all those powers and duties set forth in the Act including, but not limited to, the power to acquire, furnish, equip, own, improve, enlarge, operate and maintain a building or buildings, automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities, stadiums, and the necessary site or sites therefore, together with appurtenant properties and facilities necessary or convenient for the effective use thereof for the use and benefits of the City for any legitimate public purpose; to enter into, execute and carry out contracts, leases and other agreements pertaining to such property and facilities and the use thereof; and to provide for and issue bonds for the purpose of acquiring, furnishing, equipping, owning, improving and constructing a building or buildings,

automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities, stadiums, and the necessary site or sites thereof, together with appurtenant properties and facilities necessary or convenient for the effective use thereof for the use and benefit of the City for any legitimate public purpose. In addition, the Authority shall have all other powers conferred upon it by law and not otherwise prohibited.

It shall be the duty of the Commissioners and officers of the Authority to implement, carry out and execute the above-described powers and duties.

Article VI. Body Corporate.

The Authority shall be a body corporate with power to sue and be sued in any court of the State of Michigan. It shall possess all the powers necessary to carry out the purpose for which it is incorporated and those incident thereto. The enumeration of any powers in these Articles of Incorporation or in the Act shall not be construed as a limitation upon such general powers.

Article VII. Effective Date.

These Articles of Incorporation and the Authority shall become effective on January 1, 1996.

Article VIII. Publication of Articles of Incorporation.

The City Clerk, who shall act as recording officer for the Authority, shall cause a copy of these Articles of Incorporation to be published once in the Lowell Ledger, a newspaper circulated within the City, accompanied with a statement that the right exists to question the incorporation of the Authority in a court of competent jurisdiction within sixty (60) days after the filing of such Articles with the Michigan Secretary of State and the Kent County Clerk as provided in Section 6 of the Act.

Article IX. Amendments.

Amendments may be made to these Articles of Incorporation as provided in Section 10 of the Act.
