Land auction on horizon for Lowell Charter Township

If you're looking for land in Lowell Charter Township to build two homes, the township board may have a deal for you.

The board has discussed auctioning off a 4.8 acre parcel of land on Lowellview Drive to the highest bidder in an effort to pay off some of the cost of obtaining the land.

"I think it's a good idea of putting this back on our tax roll and collecting taxes on it," said trustee Richard Huver.

The township acquired the parcel from the state two years ago after the previous owner couldn't pay back taxes.

Besides paying the taxes, the township removed two trailers and cleaned up debris.

Before auctioning off the land, zoned residential, the township needs to clean up more debris from the site.

"Either we should clean it up before the snow flies or in the spring, so when summer comes around it can be seen for its potential," said clerk Carol Wells.

The board estimates that more than \$6,000 was paid to the state for the land and more costs were accrued as part of the clean-up effort.

If the property is sold, the township would recoup money spent on obtaining the land, but any profits would have to be split among other

municipalities who would benefit from taxes collected.

The board hasn't set a price on the land, which can be broken up into two sites according to the township's zoning and has 300 feet of road frontage, but supervisor John Timpson believes the land could fetch \$8,000 an acre.

"You've got property that can be split in two, with frontage on a paved road," Timpson said. "I've seen land in the area go for much more than that."

The township hasn't discussed if or when the land would officially be auctioned, but does plan to proceed with clean-up efforts.

Proponents rally in favor of historic district; ordinance passed unanimously

A pocket of dissonance was met with a front line of accord at the second public hearing in three weeks to discuss the ordinance process of a historic district in Lowell.

While a pocket of dissonance was heard at an Oct. 21 public hearing, a strong showing of support communicated a need for its establishment Monday night.

The result was the Lowell City Council found it appropriate to unanimously approve establishing a historic district.

Lowell Historic District Study Committee member Jim Doyle was relieved and very gratified with the decision.

"With the district now established, we enter the implementation stage," Doyle said. "I cannot overemphasize the need for good communications within the district between the commission and business people within the district."

Doyle described a historic district as a process of study, review and recommendation.

"This process is a forward looking process for Lowell," he said. "It is a slow process that takes time. Appropriateness will be looked at when change is made. Historic district business people don't have to do a thing. Everything is grandfathered in."

If the commission determines a building is being demolished by neglect, it can step in and tell the owner to carry out appropriate maintenance.

The commission will look at the appropriateness of change to the exterior. Doyle noted that such things as painting over brick, putting in a window where one previously did not exist, and putting in an awning would have to come before the five-member his-

Key Heights trailer lost in Friday morning fire

A Key Heights trailer was destroyed in an early Friday (Nov. 1) morning fire.

Lowell area firefighters were called to the scene of Dennis McClure's at 1829 Fay, Lot 269 at 9:16 a.m.

The fire was first detected by McClure's neighbor Karen Kennedy and Eastgate resident Scott Treglia.

Treglia was driving south on Cumberland when he detected smoke.

"I saw smoke coming from the trailer window and then I saw flames shooting from the roof," Treglia said.

The resident at 1672 Stonewood Dr. stopped to get help.

"The neighbor and I (Kennedy) pounded on the trailer to see if anyone was inside," Treglia said. "The east side of the trailer was already hot to the touch."

Martin said the fire had been burning well before fire fighters got there. "The inside of the trailer got hot enough to melt keys on a piano that sat near the front of the trailer," explained Martin.

Kennedy, after detecting the fire, ran to a neighbor and asked that they call 911.

Martin said the fire started in the back bedroom. "The cause is not known and is still being investigated," the Lowell fire chief said.

Martin estimated that losses would total around \$50,000. McClure owned a couple of cockatoos which were killed in the fire.

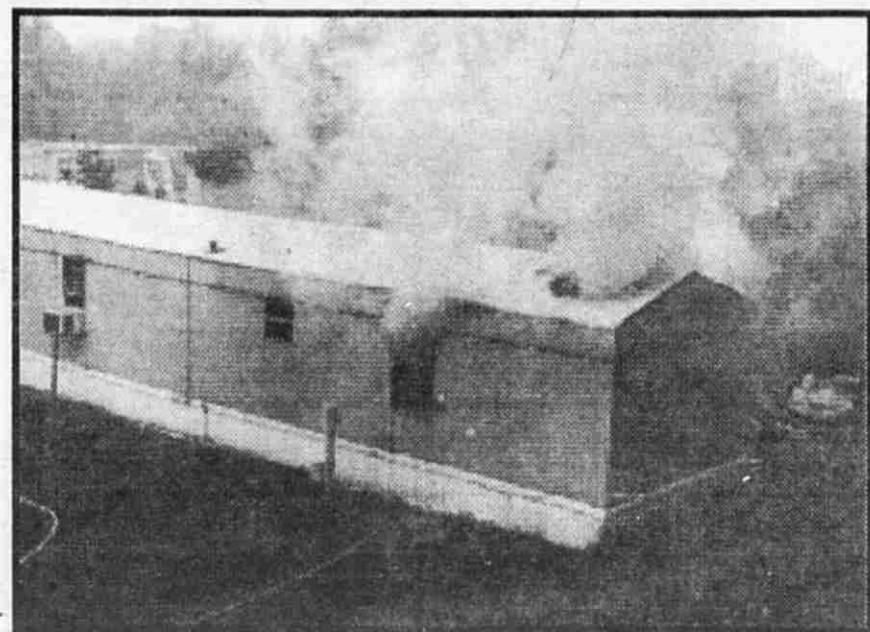
Firefighters were on the scene for approximately two hours, according to Martin.

Lowell Township and Bowne Township Fire Department hash out equitable funding agreement

Officials from the Bowne Township Fire Department and Lowell Charter Township Board will discuss a new funding formula to help offset costs of answering calls within the township.

The board was presented with information from fire officials that shows the township's funding is well below what it costs the department to operate in Lowell Township.

"This is not a bill; it's just information presented to us so we can get a better understanding of what it costs to answer calls in the township," said clerk Carol Wells.

The township currently pays \$3,500 for fire protection, but according to Bowne figures, the cost of responding is more than \$27,000.

"If it costs them this much, then we're obligated to respond and not put a burden on Bowne Township," said trustee Alyn Fletcher in regard to the funding and cost gap.

Township officials agree that changes are in order and plan to up their ante, but first they want to develop a funding formula that is equitable to both parties.

According to fire officials, the department covers 41 sections in Kent County. Of those sections, 12 lie within township limits.

The department estimates that its basic operating expense is more than \$41,000, excluding wages of fire personnel responding to a call.

The department divided the \$41,000 by 41 sections and came up with a cost of \$1,000 per section.

With its 12 sections, the township's share of operating

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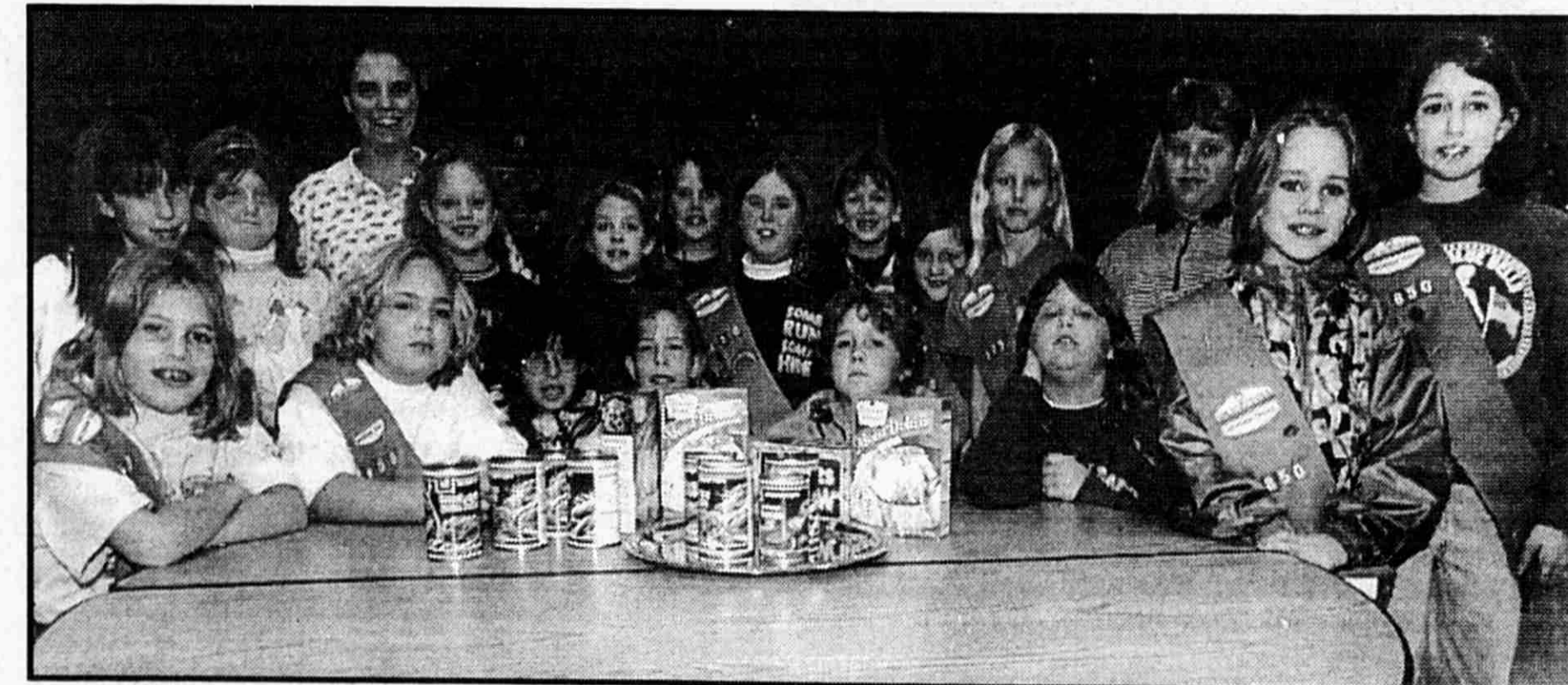
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Local Girl Scouts to collect food items for pantry

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TOWNSHIP OF VERGENNES NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Vergennes Township will hold a public hearing on Monday, November 18, 1996 at 7:00 p.m. at the Vergennes Township Hall, 10381 Bailey Drive to receive public comment on proposed Ordinance 96-5, Water Service Ordinance. If adopted, the ordinance would amend Ordinance 93-6, Water Service Ordinance, and would require connection to the water system in certain instances.

Background
In 1993, pursuant to a Water and Sewer Agreement entered into by and between the Township of Vergennes and the Township of Lowell, Ordinance 93-6, Water Service Ordinance, was adopted by the Township of Vergennes, in order to provide for the use, management and operation of a Water System within a part of the Township of Vergennes. The Water and Sewer Agreement called for the Township of Vergennes to adopt changes in its Water Service Ordinance similar to changes adopted by the Township of Lowell.

In September, 1996, the Township of Lowell amended its Water Service Ordinance to more effectively achieve efficiency and future financial stability of the Water System. As a result, under the joint Water and Sewer Agreement referred to above, the Township of Vergennes has prepared proposed Ordinance No. 96-5, Water Service Ordinance which would, in certain instances, require connection to the Water System.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ORDINANCE 96-5 WATER SERVICE ORDINANCE

Section 1. Purpose: Restates the intent of Ordinance 93-6 and, if adopted, would require that in certain instances some structures and buildings be connected to the Water System.

Section 2. Definitions: Remain the same as in Ordinance 93-6, except for the following changes or additions:

(a) "Person" now includes a "limited liability company."
(g) "Premise" has been expanded to add "condominium unit" and specify that a lot, parcel, condominium unit, or plot means any such property having its own tax identification number or is otherwise identifiable as being treated as a separate and distinct property.
(o) "Available Watermain." An available watermain means a watermain located in a right-of-way, easement, highway, street, private road or public way which crosses, adjoins, or abuts a Premises.
(p) "Site Development Plan, Private Road, Building Permit and Certificate of Occupancy" shall have the same meanings as provided by the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinances.
(q) "Water and Sewer Agreement" Specifies that

any reference to such an agreement is limited to the Water and Sewer Agreement entered into by and between the Township of Vergennes and the Township of Lowell.

Section 3. Scope: Limits the scope of proposed Ordinance No. 96-5 only to the Water System constructed pursuant to the Water and Sewer Agreement between the Township of Vergennes and the Township of Lowell.

Section 4. Rules and Regulations: Unchanged.

Section 5. Service Connection: Divides service connections into Mandatory and Permissive.

(a) Mandatory
(1) New Structures and Developments
(aa) After the effective date of Ordinance No. 96-5, if adopted, the owner of each Premise with an available Watermain would be required, at the time of erection of any structure requiring water for human consumption, to connect to the owner's expense to the Available Watermain.

(bb) After the effective date of Ordinance No. 96-5, if adopted, an owner of a Premise, or a person with a legal or equitable interest in a Premise, with an Available Watermain, who splits, sells, or otherwise develops such premises, would be required, as part of Township review and approval of such split, sale, or development, to install at such person's cost and expense an Available Watermain to the Premises split, sold, or otherwise developed or serviced by a Private Road.

(2) Existing Structures or Buildings: The owner of a Premise with an Available Watermain would not be required to install a connection to the Available Watermain except in the case of failure of any existing well, or the water from such well, to meet Kent County Health Department requirements.

(b) Permissive: Provides that any Person in conformance with this ordinance shall be permitted to receive Water Service, provided there exists adequate capacity and adequate Transmission or Distribution Lines to which such person can connect.

(c) Forms and Applications: Unchanged.

Sections 6. through 14 are unchanged.

Section 15. Penalties: Provides that a violation of Ordinance No. 96-5 is a municipal civil infraction subject to certain fines and further would enable the Township to seek such other relief as may be provided by law.
Sections 16 and 17 are unchanged.

Section 18. Effective Date If adopted, Ordinance No. 96-5 would become effective 30 days after its publication.

The full text of proposal Ordinance No. 96-5 can be reviewed at the Vergennes Township Hall on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Written comments will also be considered if received by the Township Clerk by 7 p.m. on Monday, November 18, 1996.

Jenny Borg led all Red Arrow scorers with 13 points. Lisa Murphy tallied eight points while Shannon Laux and Emily Dunn contributed with seven points each.

"Hastings has a nice team. They played well as a unit," Akers said. "We're not playing with any heart or emotion."

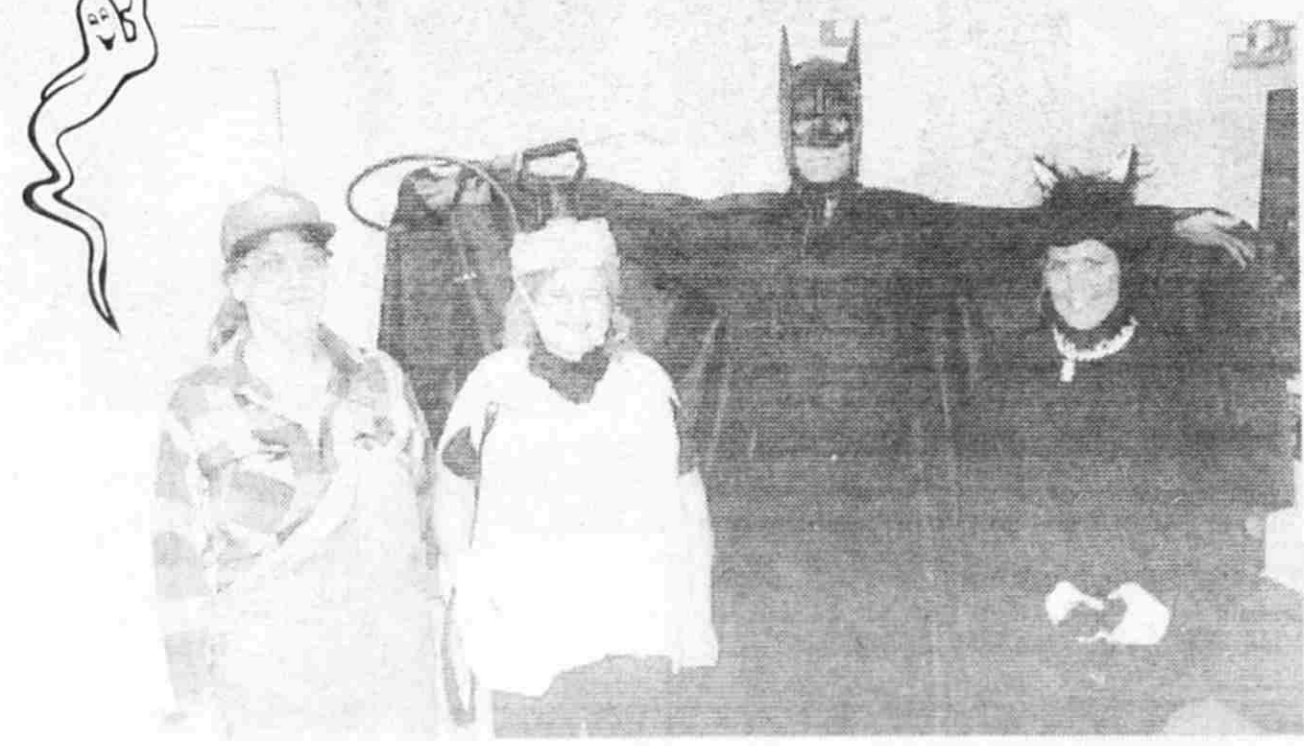

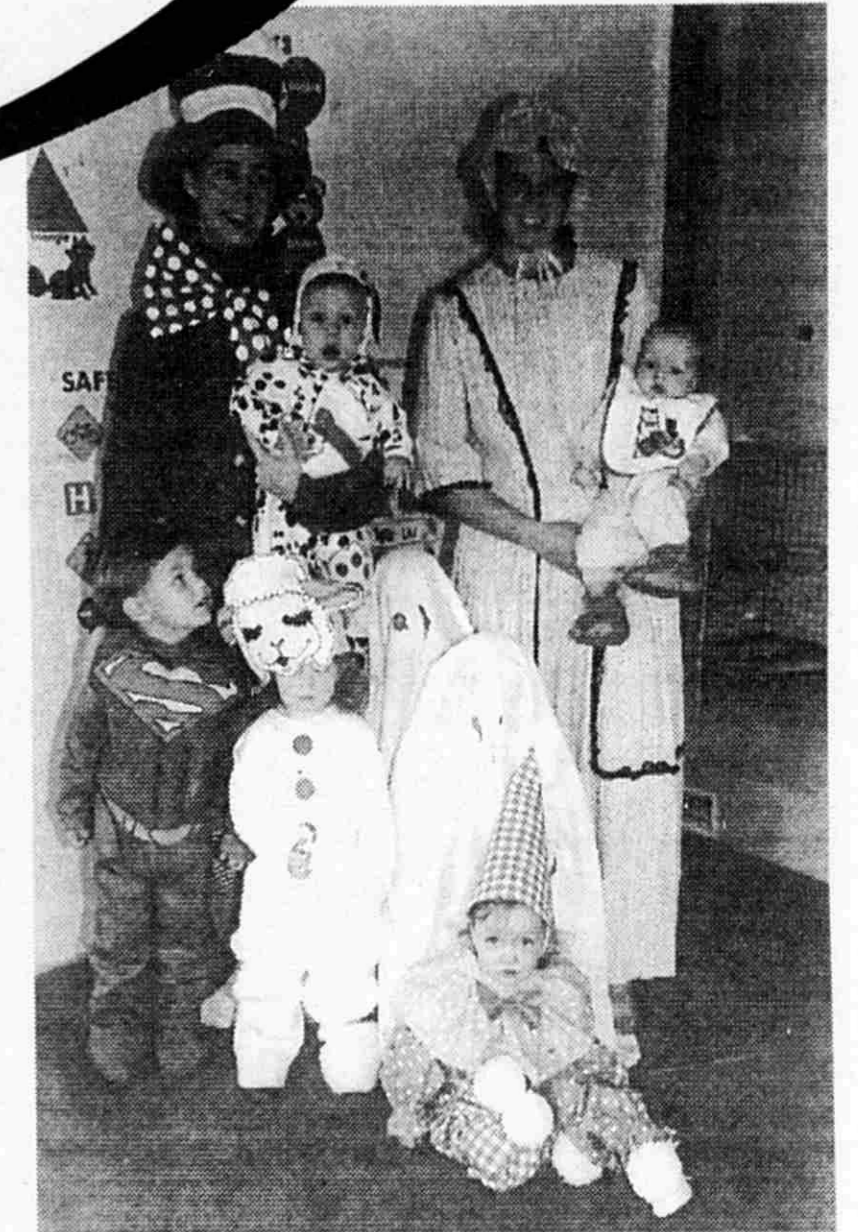

Lowell finishes year at 7-2 with a 33-0 shutout against Greenville

It was seniors' night out in the final game of the year at Red Arrow Stadium Friday night. Lowell put an exclamation mark on its 1996 season and provided the seniors with a 33-0 shutout over the visiting

Yellowjackets from Greenville as a going away gift. The Red Arrow win closes out Lowell's 1996 season with a mark of 7-2. "I am excited and happy with the season we've had, but I am not satisfied," said a wet Lowell coach Noel Dean who was doused with a bucket of ice water in the waning seconds

of Friday's contest. The first-year Red Arrow coach was also happy and impressed with the character his club showed throughout the year. "This team has character," Dean emphasized. "I am a tough coach in practice but they responded with their play and their hustle."

The final game of the year is always a moving one for the seniors, especially when it's at home. "It was an emotional evening; that doesn't always make for inspired football," Dean said.

The Red Arrows were a little slow getting started as they failed to score their first two possessions against Greenville's defense.

Lowell broke through with 1:16 remaining in the first quarter as Jack Livingston became the first of five seniors to score a touchdown in their final game in a Red Arrow uniform. Livingston scored on a 31-yard touchdown rumble.

Lowell made it 12-0 on its opening possession of the second quarter when quarterback Jeff Catlin hit Brett Bittrick on a 17-yard touchdown pass. The two-point conversion failed and Lowell led 12-0.

"Lowell is a nice football team that has a good quarterback and a good coach," Greenville coach Aaron West said. "I am proud of our senior class. They have only won a couple of games, but they went out with class. The Fruitports and Reeth-Puffers of our league have won many of their games in the off season. We haven't won many in the off season. We're going to change that."

Lowell made it 18-0 when Catlin connected with Andy Smith on a 13-yard touchdown pass which capped an 11-play, 76 yard scoring drive.

After recovering an onside kick to start the second half, Lowell marched the ball 53 yards in seven plays with Catlin scoring on a 13-yard run, making the score 24-0.

Lowell's defense stopped Greenville on a third and eight from its own 48. The Red Arrows then blocked a punt, setting up shop at the Greenville 44. The offense took three plays to reach pay-dirt. This time it was Catlin to Aaron Brander from seven yards out, increasing the Red Arrow lead to 30-0.

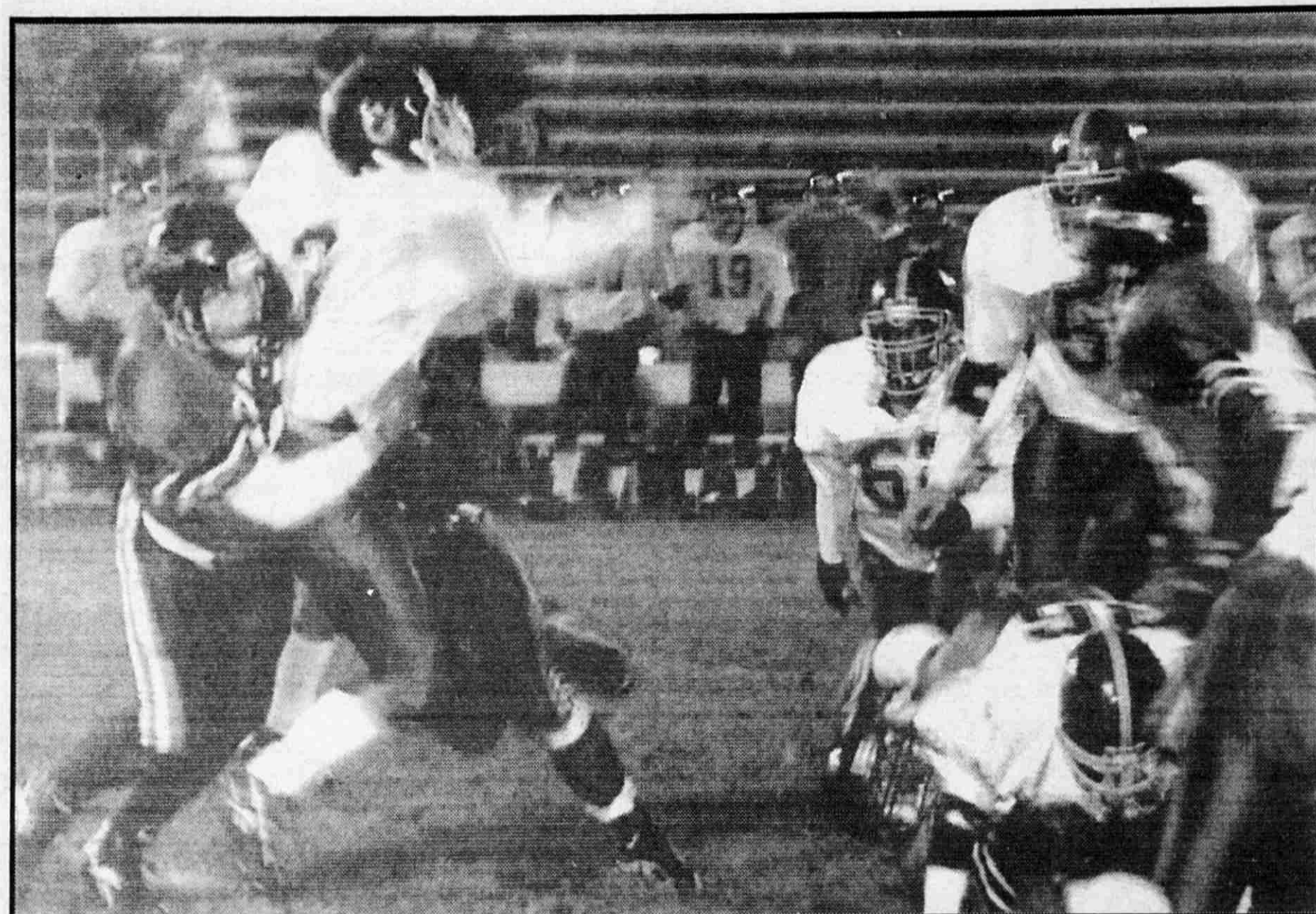
Catlin, in his final game, was eight-of-16 through the air for 96 yards and three touchdowns. He also threw one interception.

Lowell's only score in the fourth quarter came on a Ryan Eisentrager 25-yard field goal with 4:30 remaining in the contest.

The Red Arrows rushed the ball 45 times for 290 yards. Catlin led the way with 177 yards on 28 carries.

Livingston tallied 77 yards in nine rushes. The Red Arrow defense held Greenville to 67 yards rushing in 34 attempts. Yellowjacket quarterbacks were five of eight for 48 yards.

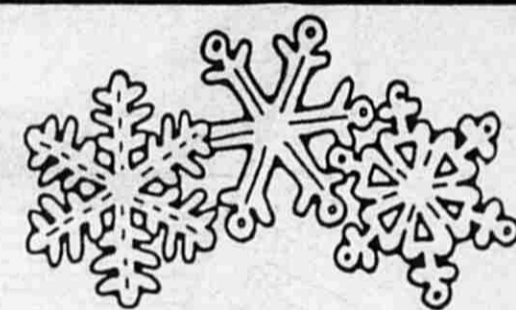
"I inherited some good, quality seniors from Phil Christensen," Dean said. "He's to be commended for the job he did with them."

WHIPLASH FROM A FALL?

Q: I fell on the stairs a couple of weeks ago and since then I've been sort of dizzy off and on. It seems to be getting worse. Could it be a whiplash injury?

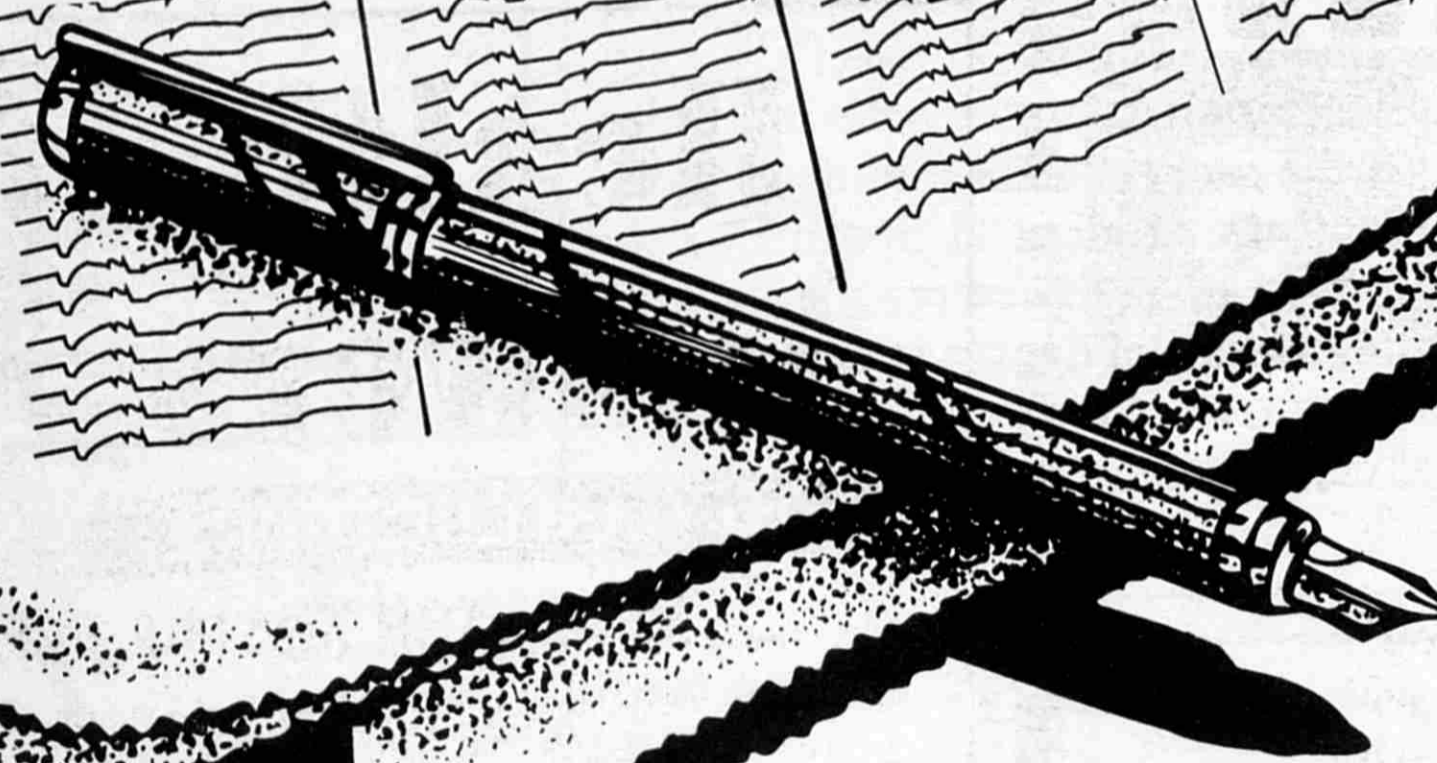
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Scout grounds named after Gould Rivette - a determined scoutmaster

Some people wish for things to happen and then wait for others to make them come true.

Others have a vision and then work relentlessly to make it a reality.

Gould Rivette was one of those "others."

In the early 1950's, Rivette had a vision whereby local scout troop 102 would have a cabin and land to build it on.

Inspired by his charge, Rivette and other volunteers worked tirelessly raising money through contributions from parents, civic groups, churches, and many scout paper drives.

"Rivette's generosity was limitless. His time and hard work paid off as his vision for the scouts is still standing today, 44 years later," said Dirk Ritzema.

At the extreme north end of Washington Street lies the scout grounds and the scout cabin.

On Saturday, former scouts, leaders, family and friends gathered at the cabin to dedicate a memorial to the scoutmaster responsible for building the cabin.

"We dedicated a plaque in honor of Gould. The plaque sits on a rock by the flagpole," Ritzema said. "We also planted a beautiful blue spruce tree and have named the grounds the 'Gould Rivette Scout Grounds.'"

The tree was grown and donated by Rivette's cousin Dick Court. The plaque was provided by Rivette's family in the scoutmaster's honor. The rock was donated by Terry VanderWarf.

Gould, during his tenure as scoutmaster, was determined in his efforts to get the cabin up and the grounds dedicated.

"It was tough going at times - workwise and financially - but Gould's leadership helped them finish the job and many good times have been enjoyed there by scouts who have been associated with the troop since that time," said his wife Barb Rivette. "Gould cared for people, seeing a need and taking action to carry through with a solution. He made a difference in the scouting program and in the lives of many individuals."

Rivette served as Scoutmaster for Troop 102 from 1950-1957. He died in October of 1995.

Sportsman Club faces list of regulations to open for new season

In response to Lowell Charter Township's list of improvements, the Northeastern Sportsman Club will discuss on Thursday what steps they will take to meet those demands, according to town-

ship supervisor John Timpson.

Earlier this month, the township provided the club, located at 9605 Grand River Drive, with a list of requirements to continue operating. Among the items listed was the installation of a commercial driveway, gate that can be locked, and privacy fence. The club was also instructed to clear a sight distance of 500 feet at its entrance, provide the township of club rules and newly elected officers and meet standards set by the Michigan Department of Public Health.

Timpson said meeting the MDPH guidelines will be the club's hardest task.

According to Timpson,

the "rustic" style campground does not have well percolating soil for a septic system and has a drainfield which is saturated.

"The health department's report said the septic field failed and they have to bring it up to standard to operate as an RV park," Timpson said. "Before we can issue them a special use permit to continue their operation, they must meet the health department requirements and our requirements."

The club, which has been located at the site for more than 30 years, has a membership of 100 and costs \$60 to join the club. A small clubhouse and sites for trailers to camp and be stored during

the winter months are part of the club's benefits.

Timpson said the township became involved in the club after neighbors complained that club members had come to their homes to use the phone.

Timpson has met with club president Lloyd Brown and said the club has agreed to work with the township to comply with the codes.

"Mr. Brown seemed more than willing to cooperate and has agreed to discuss the matter with club members," said Timpson. "The problem is that it will be quite costly to comply with the health department, but they must in order to open next year."
