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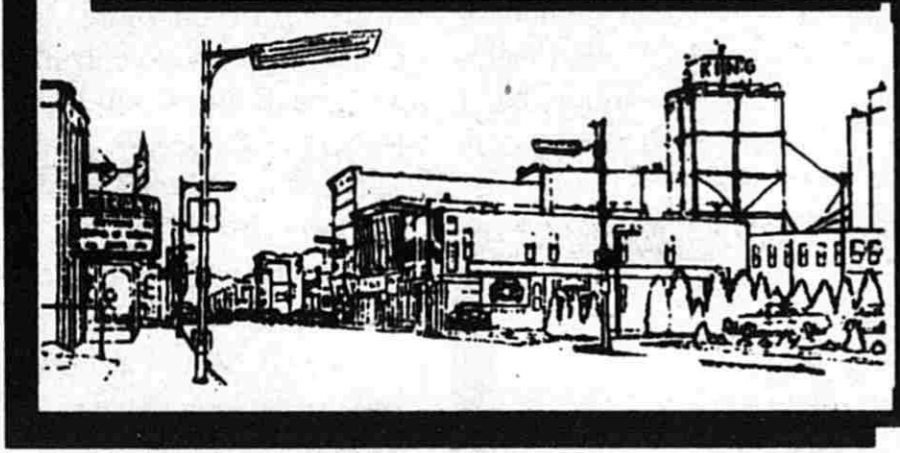

DNR report states rust in Cherry Creek originates from naturally occurring iron oxide

The source of rust in Cherry Creek leads through the city of Lowell.

Lowell Wastewater Treatment plant manager Mark Mundt said the rust starts in a field north of the OE Bieri & Sons buildings on Godfrey Street.

The Department of Natural Resources was contacted and it determined that there was naturally occurring iron oxide in the ground that was leaching out and when it hit air, it turned to rust.

"After taking samples, the DNR said the creek is still safe and that the rust is natural and harmless," Mundt said. "The DNR believes it will go away and may go away as quickly as it came."

The rust in Cherry Creek was first detected two months ago.

Battle over mobile home heats up as owner vows not to sway

While Vergennes Township waits for George Kazemier to come up with a solution regarding a mobile home on his property, Kazemier himself doesn't plan to move anytime soon.

"I'm not doing anything with it," said Kazemier. "If they think they can intimidate me to move, they have another thing coming."

Kazemier and the township board became embattled over the mobile home about a month ago when the township discovered the home was being used outside of its allowed permit.

According to the township, the home was intended to be used by Kazemier's daughter only and not as a rental home, which is currently being done.

As a result, the township ordered that his special use permit, allowing the home, be revoked and the home removed.

In response, Kazemier met with officials at a public meeting and with neighbors who don't have a problem with the home and voiced his desire to keep the home.

"It's not about the home. It's about my business," said Kazemier.

According to Kazemier, the township is trying to shut down his trucking business, which operates out of his property and is using the mobile home as a tool.

"They are trying to close down all the businesses in the township. And many have done it, but I won't," he said. "I won't let them push me around like they did everybody else."

The township board hasn't discussed Kazemier's trucking business and continues to focus on the home.

Township proceedings could free up space for M-21 self-storage lots

Where self-storage businesses will be located in Lowell Charter Township remains a top priority with the township's planning commission.

The commission continues to discuss the dilemma of allowing such businesses on M-21 without violating its own ordinances.

This year alone, the township has turned down three applications for self-storage lots because commercial zoning along M-21 doesn't allow for self-storage facilities; only the township's light industrial ordinance allows such businesses.

However, the planning commission has recognized the problem and has begun proceedings which could allow such units in the future.

Township clerk Carol Wells will contact surrounding municipalities to receive a copy of their ordinances which allow self-storage lots.

The commission will then create their own draft of a self-storage zoning ordinance and definition which will be sent to the township's attorney for review.

Wells and other members of the commission like the idea of self-storage lots for the time being because little else can be developed along M-21 until public utilities become available.

In prior meetings, the commission discussed allowing such businesses and then when utilities became available, the land would be used for other commercial endeavors.

The commission has yet to set a time line on if and when an ordinance will be adopted.

They have given Kazemier a month to find a solution to the problem, before they seek other means of dealing with the home.

"We're willing to sit down and discuss this with him and find a solution," said township clerk Mari Stone.

Chadalee and Litehouse merge to form national distribution company

Litehouse, Inc. of Sandpoint, Idaho, and Chadalee Farms, Inc. have merged to create a new national company (distribution).

Both companies are leading manufacturers of salad dressings and sauces in their field: Chadalee's strength being shelf stable industrial and food service packs along with an established horseradish line; Litehouse has strength primarily in retail/club stores and portion control lines of refrigerated products, including dips.

Litehouse will provide Chadalee Farms manufacturing capacity in the west and Chadalee will provide it in the east for Litehouse.

"We feel that this is an ideal alliance for both companies and will be a great benefit to our customers," said Litehouse president Doug Hawkins. "We now have a much broader product line, a stronger research and development team, better flexibility with two plants, and a national distribution system."

The Christoff family, owner of Chadalee Farms, has been in the salad dressing business for over 50 years. Starting with one recipe for French dressing, a nationwide following of outstanding products has been developed. One of their divisions, Meyer Horseradish Company, was started in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1892.

"By expanding nationally we will reach more customers and be able to provide a lower cost," said Wendell Christoff, Chadalee Farms president said. "It will also mean expanding our facility and adding an additional 10-15 employees."

Christoff said those changes should start to take place in six months.

"Litehouse and Chadalee Farms compliment one another. They're strong in refrigeration and fresh products while our strength is in shelf stable and cooked products," Christoff explained.

The Hawkins' family first served their now famous dressings in the early 1960's at the Litehouse Restaurant on the shores of the scenic Lake Pend Oreille. Litehouse is the fastest growing retail brand of refrigerated salad dressings in the nation.

Together, the new Litehouse offers over 145 years of combined expertise in these areas.

"We are extremely excited for our customers," said Christoff. "Both companies have been very customer focused. This combination will greatly enhance the new

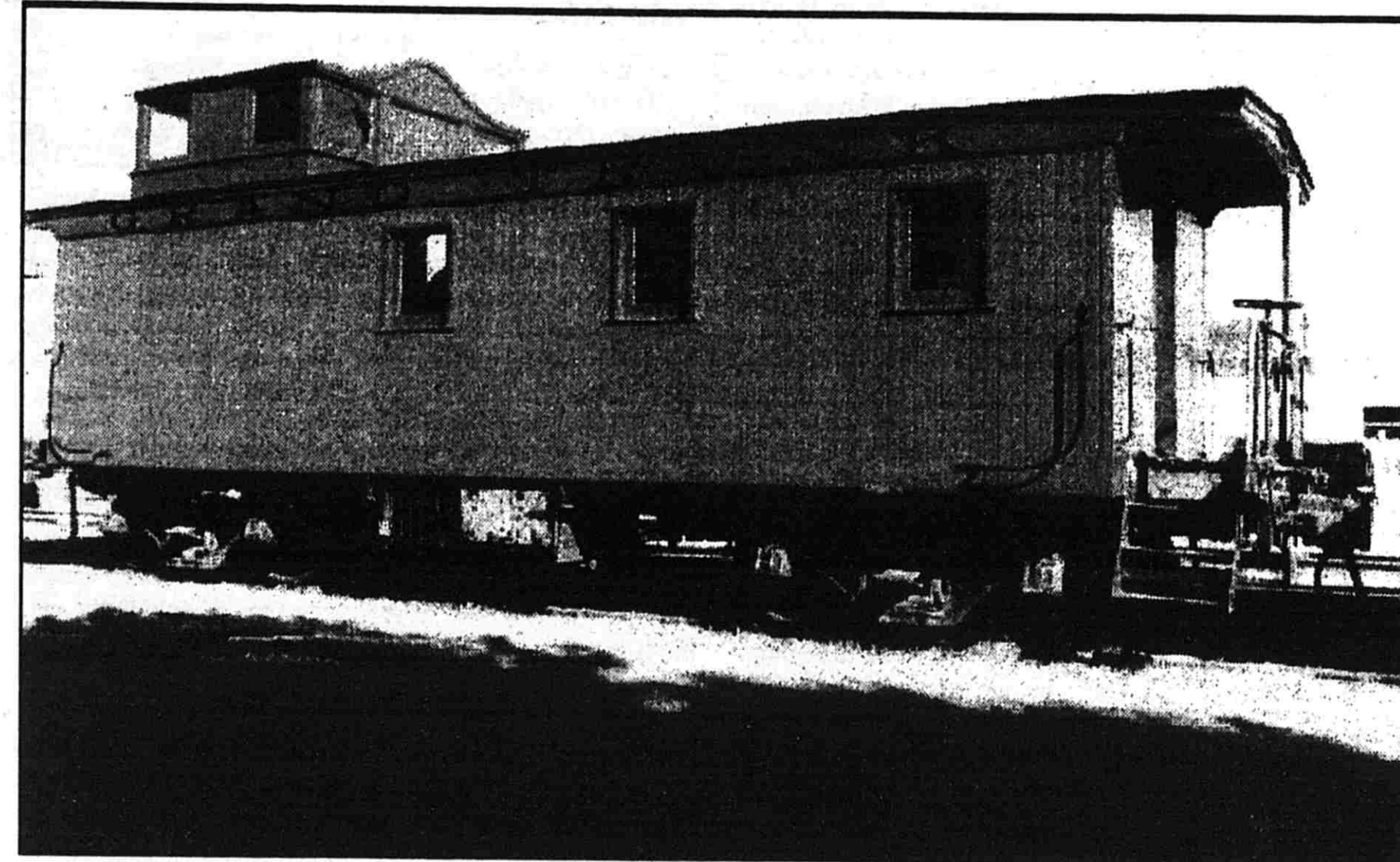

Caboose coming to Saranac Grand Trunk Depot

... Caboose, out of the early 1900's, is scheduled for July 18 delivery.

It's been awhile since the Saranac 1906 Grand Trunk



This Grand Trunk caboose will become a permanent part of the historical display at the site of Saranac's historical depot.

Depot has seen a caboose parked alongside of it.

On Friday, July 18, the two will be reunited when a caboose from the early 1900's is delivered to the Bridge Street site of the historical depot.

"It is going to add so much," said Boston/Saranac Historical Society corresponding secretary Marilyn Cahoon. "The caboose is a beautiful red in color with a dutch cupola on top."

It will be delivered by Jerry Tyler, who purchased the caboose from Coopersville Marne Railroad before restoring it. The historical society purchased it from Tyler for \$12,000. Upon arrival, the caboose will be set permanently on tracks (approximately 50 feet in length) that were donated to the society. The tracks have been placed on the northeast side of the depot.

The removal of the caboose from the flatbed truck is slated for about 5 p.m. on the 18th.

Boston/Saranac Historical Society president Connie Bos said the depot's museum will be open to the public beginning at 3 p.m. The museum is filled with donated historical displays.

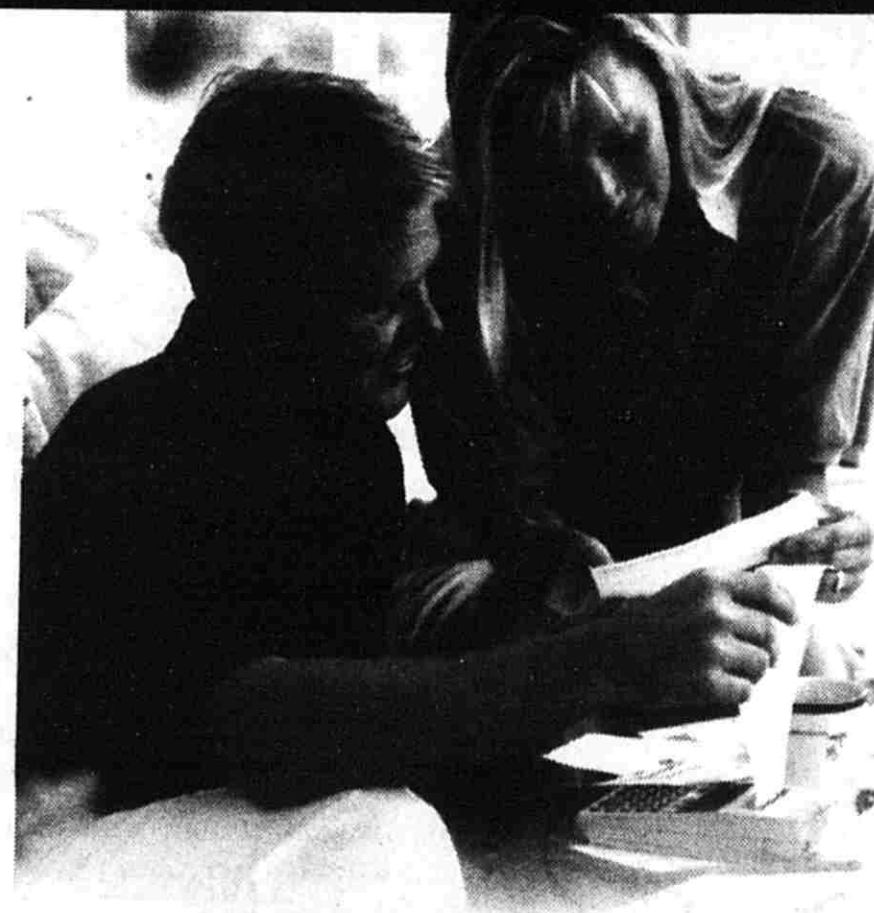
"Tours will be given and we will also be selling sandwiches, pop and coffee," Bos said.

The event is expected to last until about 7 p.m.

The Boston/Saranac Historical Society bought the depot in 1990 for \$10,000. It was moved to its current location in 1994.

Originally, the depot was located two blocks east on Depot Street.

Beechtree Golf Course may still have a future in Lowell Charter Township if Woodruff Palmer can convince the township that work continues on the dream project.

The commission pulled Palmer's special use permit, which allowed for the construction of the 120 acre course on Cascade Road, after it felt there was not enough activity to warrant such a permit.

Palmer, who called the course a lifelong dream of his, received permission to build the course in July 1995 and, according to the township, little has been done since.

However, Palmer is hoping to prove to the township that the course will be built and that the permit should not be pulled.

Before pulling the permit, the township's planning commission said it would work with Palmer to get the project on track because they feel little else can be done with the land.

Discussion arose about possible housing developments on the site, but officials believe the land is too wet to allow such work.

In a letter sent to Palmer, the township stated that "if you have continued work on the development of a golf course, please send the planning commission documentation showing your activities and progress in this project."

Once received, the planning commission will review the documents and determine if the permit should be allowed.

At this time Palmer has yet to submit the documents, but the township remains optimistic.

Earth Tech increase granted

A four percent cost of living adjustment to the operations contract for the wastewater treatment plant was approved by the city Monday night.

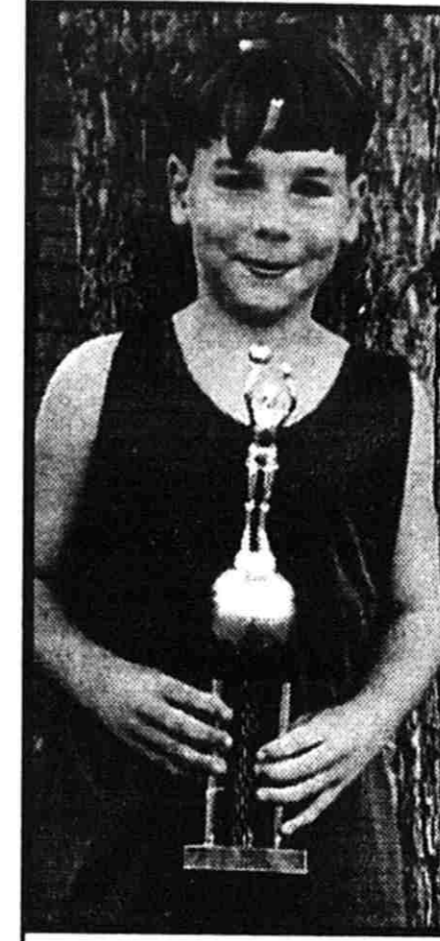
Earth Tech Operation Services, which is contracted by the city for operations and maintenance of the plant, said there are uncontrollable elements which impact expenses.

The four percent increase of the base will amount to \$9,568.48 and will bring the total contract to \$276,780.40 a year or \$23,065.03 per month from \$22,267.66.

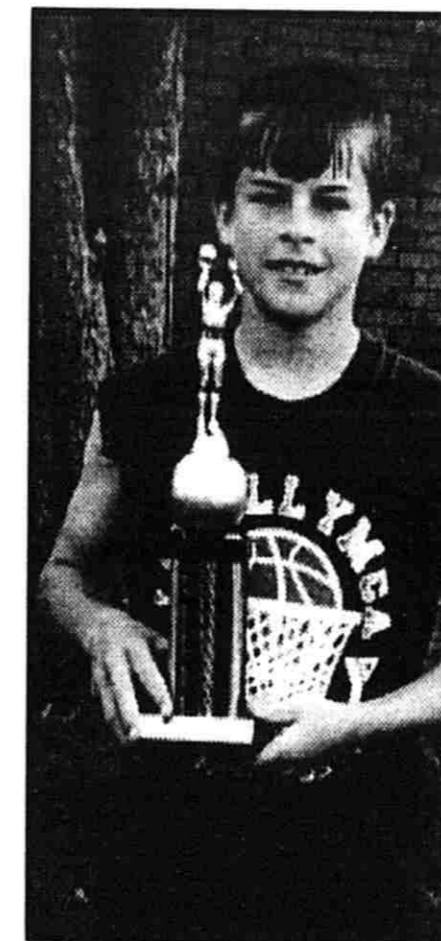
"This increase along with other adjustments to the city's wastewater budget will not cause customer rates to be increased," Mundt said.

The adjustment increase was the first one in two years.

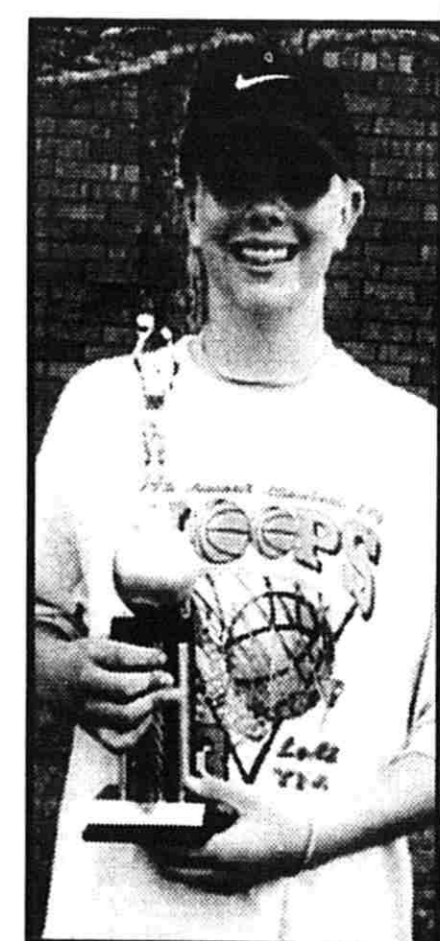
The 8-10 year old winner in the YMCA Hoops three-point shooting contest was Josh Hettinga.

The 14-16 year old winner in the YMCA Hoops three-point shooting contest was David Rozema.

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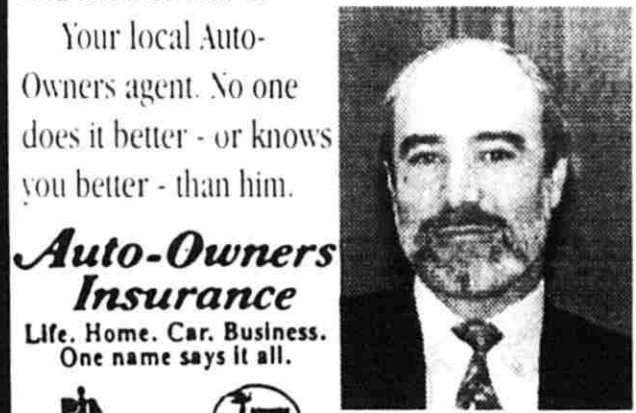

MONKEYING AROUND!

••• Lowell's Marcy Anes spent four weeks in Costa Rica documenting the foraging, feeding and social habits of the white-faced capuchin.

Hot humid 90-100 degree temperatures.

Sharing living quarters with scorpions and crabs.

Traveling up to as much as six miles a day through a private game reserve in Costa Rica so she could watch and document the foraging, feeding and social behavior of the white-faced capuchins.

Through Grand Valley State University's psychology 370 course, biology major and Lowell 1993 High School graduate Marcy Anes spent four weeks earlier this summer in the Costa Rican jungle.

And, she enjoyed every last minute of it. Anes is studying animal wildlife biology at Grand Valley State University.

The junior would eventually like to research or teach at the college level.

"Actually, I would have liked to be able to bring my family and friends there to see what I was doing and then sent them home and stayed there longer," Anes said.

It is not sure whether the other 16 Grand Valley State University students felt the same way.

The new course "Primate Behavior" met from early May through mid-June at a private game reserve on the Nicoya Peninsula on the pacific coast of Costa Rica.

In addition to lectures and article reading, each student was assigned to develop a project, collect data by observing the behavior of a group of monkeys, analyze the data and write a paper. Research paper topics included sex differences in general activity budgets and social behavior in white-faced capuchins; and a comparison of general and social activity of lactating and non-lactating female cebus capuchins.

GVSU psychology professor Michael Costello said the remote region of Latin America is a great natural lab since it is home to three species of primates: "spider" monkeys, capuchins (the organ grinder monkey) and "howler" monkeys.

"I got up about 5-6 a.m. and spent until 5 p.m. collecting data on the behavior of the white-faced capuchins," Anes said.

From about six until eight p.m., Anes worked on her research project. Most of it was done by candlelight since darkness settles in about 6

p.m. in that part of Costa Rica.

For the better part of four weeks, Anes followed and observed a troop of 25-30 capuchin monkeys.

"It took about a week to figure out their patterns and to know where to find the troop at different times of the day," Anes said. "They travel about 80 percent of the time."

Because it is a private reserve, the primates are somewhat comfortable with the presence of humans.

However, when Anes got too close or alarmed, one of the capuchins would beat on branches and show other signs of aggression to warn her to discontinue whatever it was she was doing.

"I also observed them while they were grooming and playing," Anes said. "They are very humanlike in that they are smart enough to use things as tools. They will use a rock to break the shell of a fruit."

Anes said a dominant male controls the activity within a troop.

Monkeys were not the only creatures she observed during her four weeks.

"For three hours I watched a boa constrictor eat a large iguana," Anes said.

That did not bother her as much as waking up in the middle of the night and having a crab within a foot of her face.

"Psychology is the study of behavior, and we are all primates ourselves," says Costello in explaining the importance of the course and the resulting application to human social behavior.

"We learn the social nature of primates and when you measure the proximity of these animals to each other, you see they're almost never alone. The students learned in lecture that if humans are isolated, they develop disproportionately in terms of being mentally retarded, emotionally impaired and sometimes they die," explained Costello.

The students lived in a hut (seven to a hut) with no electricity, about seven miles from the nearest village, for the duration of the course. They spent a few days learning the terrain as a group before splitting into pairs to conduct their separate studies.

This isn't the first summer Anes has taken time to travel and research. Last year she spent four weeks in Australia studying the Great Barrier Reef.

The primate behavior course is new to Grand Valley State University because Costello is new to the psychology faculty. He joined GVSU in 1996 from the University of Redlands, a private, liberal arts school in California. With a good response and successful experience this year, Costello plans to offer the course again next year.

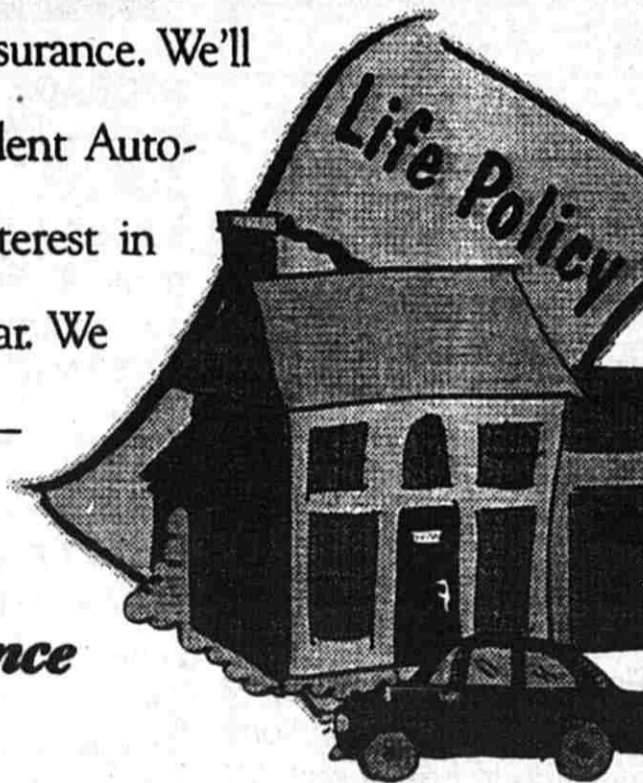
