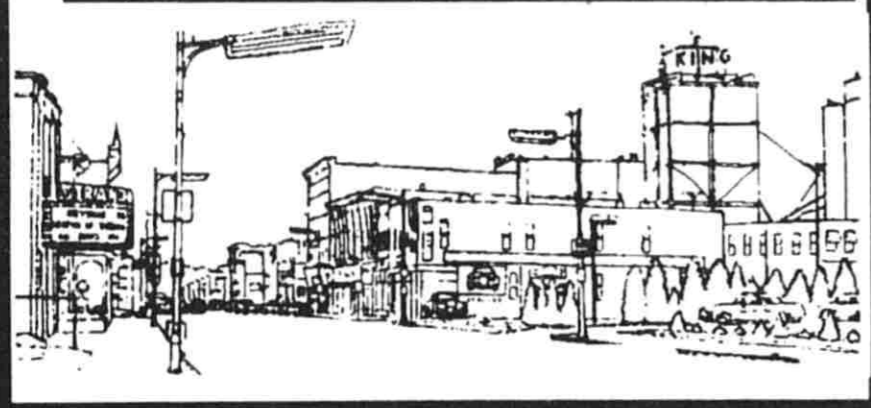

Chicago style math curriculum adopted for K-12

The most comprehensive math program available will now be the tool used at all levels to deliver the math curriculum in the Lowell Area School District.

The Lowell School Board adopted a K-12 University of Chicago School Math Project (UCSMP) curriculum to go into effect for the 1999-2000 school year.

While grades' seven

through 12 have been using UCSMP for the past four years, kindergarten through sixth grade have not.

"Although they've pretty much been there, those levels just haven't had the materials... K-6 teachers have had to pull materials together themselves," said Sue Beute, Lowell's elementary at-risk math teacher.

That will change next fall, as the district will purchase materials for implementation.

Monies will be used from the district's curriculum development account.

For those students ready to move on, UCSMP exposes students to more math than the curriculum requires. It also has a built-in study component for review, and re-teaching for students who need extra time.

"University of Chicago School Math is in alignment with the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics,"

Beute explained. "Most K-6 teachers will be able to pick up and carry on."

Students will notice the biggest change in language and the built-in enrichment.

"We didn't have the enrichment. That's where students are exposed to math beyond the requirements of the curriculum, without expecting mastery," Beute said. "It will also link the home with mathematics, keeping the parents involved."

Aquarius lawn matter sprinkled with questions on property value and growth

Lowell Charter Township Planning Commission has delayed a decision about Aquarius Lawn Sprinkling Inc. being issued a permit to undertake renovations. Randy Smith, of 3210 Kissing Rock Ave., had requested permission to raise a pole barn on his property.

At a public hearing at the Lowell Township Hall, concerned neighbors presented their opinions on this matter to the planning commission. Smith, a resident on the 17-acre lot for the past eight years, presented a petition to the commission signed by 37 residents of Kissing Rock who are in favor of his business and new building. These included Arthur and Casimir Lacic of 3493 Kissing Rock Ave.

But other residents were

vocal in their disagreement. They were concerned about any more than the current half dozen vehicles and people, the machinery noise and the possible deterioration of property values.

Paula Blumm, of 3152 Kissing Rock, a local resident for eight years, believes that the Smith business has grown too large.

"It is not allowed under AGII zoning ordinances in a residential area and is not covered under special uses as it is not just a home occupation. AGII is not designed for light industrial operations, and we're also tired of the dogs barking and truck noise at 5 a.m.," Blumm state.

Gerald Kershaw, of 1246 Grand River Drive, expressed that lawn sprinklers are not an agricultural enterprise. Retired attorney John Forrester explained that such a busi-

ness in that residential area cannot be given a special use permit by the planning commission.

Erik Teasley, of 3199 Kissing Rock, was concerned about further expansion by Smith.

"Can he have 2,000 employees and a hundred trucks?" Teasley asked.

But Smith also had his supporters at the meeting. They explained that many

others have businesses operating out of their own homes. Bruce Meyer, of 3234 Kissing Rock, pointed out that the other residents in the area have the same problems and situations to contend with, but that these are not as serious as elsewhere.

"Each neighbor has some kind of fault. We all have animals and trucks making noise with UPS, postal and other

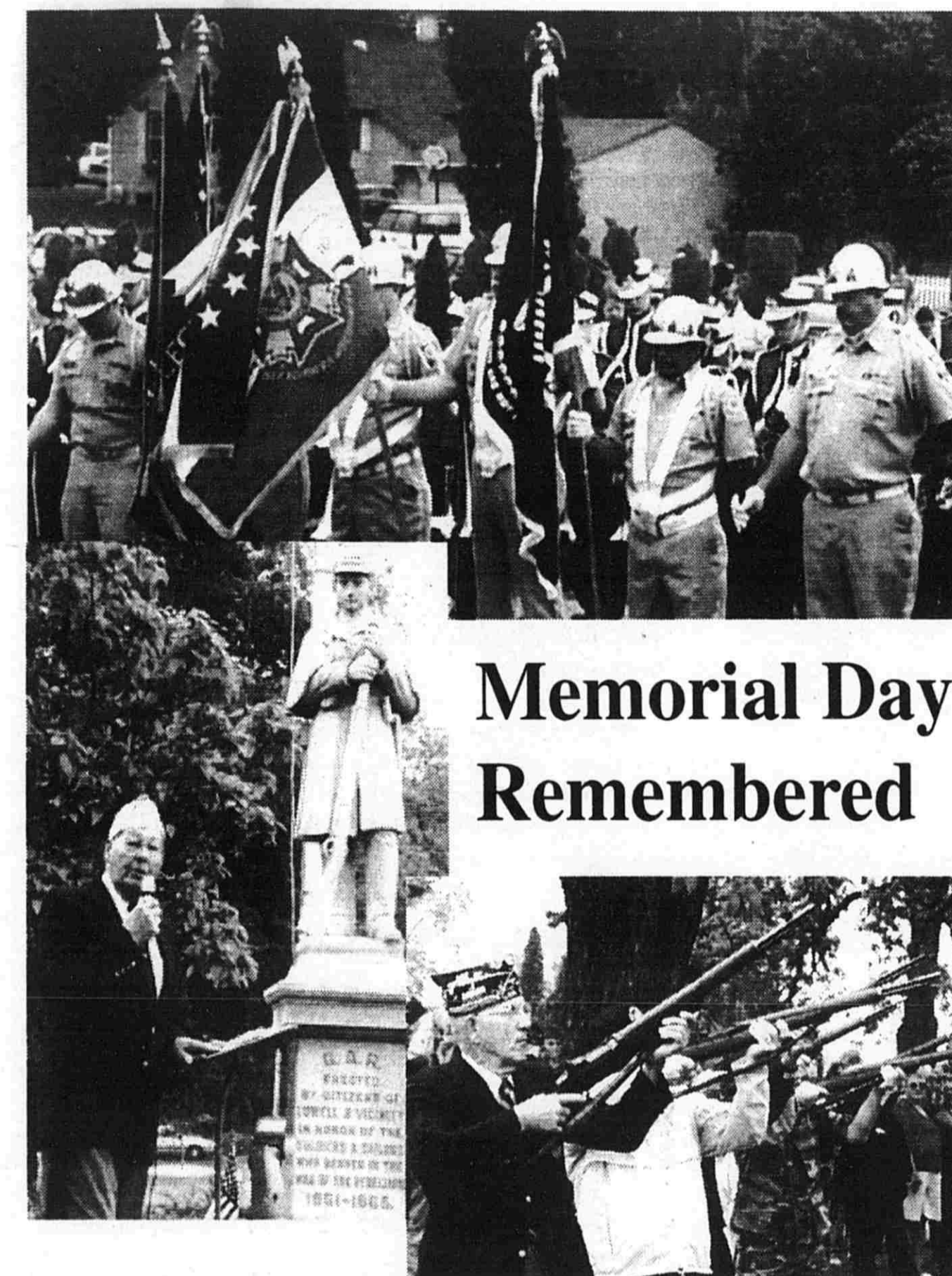

deliveries. This is a mere drop in the bucket compared to what is going on overseas,"

Meyer said. Evelyn Moran, of the James Veen Observatory at 3308 Kissing Rock, praised Smith as being a positive neighbor.

"He's cut down a few trees on his property blocking our view, and he's also snowplowed our driveway in the winters for free," Moran said.

John Cornish, of 3100 Kissing Rock, says he's had no problems with Aquarius at all.

"Randy keeps all our roads and ditches clean," he said.

Trustee Richard Huver explained that a pole barn raised for storage and equipment is in itself allowed under the AGII zoning ordinances. But chairman Rich-

entitled *Cover the Bases*. The work by 15 area artists, including Lowell artist Bill Ingraham, was submitted to the Grand Rapids Art Museum for consideration as program covers for the White Caps games.

ard Bryan explained that businesses which are home based, while also employing non-family members, cannot be considered as family-only businesses. He also reminded everyone of the need for the public hearing.

"We're in a stymie under the ordinances, and we probably cannot issue the permit. We also have to take everyone's feelings into account," Bryan said.

Smith was finally given the chance to explain his intentions. He pointed out that while his lawn sprinkling business is not actually an agricultural activity, the pole barn would both protect his equipment and keep the vehicles out of sight.

"It's better than blue tarps

with cords, and is for ascetic reasons. I could have more employees, but I deliberately stay small," Smith said.

Melissa Bilski, of 3210 Kissing Rock, explained that Aquarius is a summer seasonal business which operates only in good weather, and not on weekends. The majority of the work is done elsewhere in the community and not here on Kissing Rock Ave.

"We use the same trash service as everyone else. It's just that it comes to our place at 5 a.m. But why did Mrs. Blumm wait eight years to bring all of this up?" Bilski asked.

Kissing Rock is a horse riding trail and natural beauty road. Residents along it adopt it for its continued preservation as such.

Schoolyard Habitat heaven on earth for wildlife

The National Wildlife Federation recently announced that Cherry Creek Elementary School has put out the welcome mat for all kinds of birds, squirrels and other wildlife while offering its students an alternative outdoor classroom. A designated portion of the Cherry Creek campus is now recognized as a National Wildlife Federation (NWF) Schoolyard Habitat.

Launched with financial support from The Dannon Company, Inc. in 1995, Schoolyard Habitats provides materials and expertise to encourage the creation of wildlife habitat areas as learning centers in schoolyards nationwide. Schoolyard Habitats is a project of the NWF's successful Backyard Wildlife Habitat program, now in its 25th year.

The portion of the Cherry



Creek campus that has been certified a schoolyard habitat is a model of ecological stewardship and common sense conservation for the community. Even more importantly, it functions as a living classroom that offers students and

teachers enhanced learning experiences across the curriculum. For students, the learning is creative, practical and hands-on, whether they're tracing how the land has been used over time for history class, using nature as the subject of an art project, keeping a journal of the habitat's development for English, or collecting and observing organisms for science class. The habitat is a "classroom" students will remember.

The Schoolyard Habitats program has developed an information kit that will aid you through the process of creating a schoolyard habitat. Rittenger's accessory building variance request denied by planning commission

Admitting that the detached accessory building ordinance may need to be reviewed, the Lowell Planning Commission denied a recommendation for a proposed variance request by Robert Rittenger.

Rittenger proposed to construct a 16 foot, four inch high motor home port at his residence on 745 Foreman.

Under the zoning ordinance, no detached accessory building in a residential district shall exceed 14 feet in height.

Rittenger's proposal is 28 inches higher than the maximum allowed for the accommodation of the motor home.

The planning commission's decision was based on Rittenger not meeting all of the criteria set forth in determining whether or not to permit a variance.

Rittenger proposed to meet three of the six criteria. The planning commission determined that there were no exceptional or extraordinary circumstances or conditions, that such a variance is necessary

for the preservation and enjoyment of a substantial property right similar to that possessed by other properties in the same zoning district, and that there was no unusual land configuration.

Rittenger pointed out that the proposed motor home port would sit lower than both his home and barn.

Rittenger will ask the Zoning Board of Appeals to overturn the planning commission's recommendation on June 7.

Students asked to make the smart choice when confronted with drugs and alcohol

For the 202 Cherry Creek Elementary D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) graduates who spent part of a day in Judge Sara Smolenski's 63rd District Court, they saw people who did not mean to hurt anybody, but made bad decisions, facing the repercussions from a bad decision.

"I would rather see you now (at a D.A.R.E. graduation) than at 17 in my courtroom," Smolenski told the fifth-graders Thursday during her address to them at the

show that I will see some of you in my courtroom."

Smolenski begged the students to make a vow to prove those statistics wrong.

"You know the difference between right and wrong. Remember that five years from now, when it's more difficult to keep that commitment to remain alcohol and drug free and saying yes to your own self-worth."

D.A.R.E. is designed, implemented and validated after the successful Los Angeles Unified School District program.

It shows students the danger, caution and warning signs of peer pressure to use drugs and alcohol, and how not to be afraid to say "no" and remain forever free of drugs.

Lowell Area Schools D.A.R.E. program was started eight years ago. Police chief Jim Valentine (then officer Valentine) taught the classes.

"Today I have been asked to chaperone the senior class on its all-night senior trip.

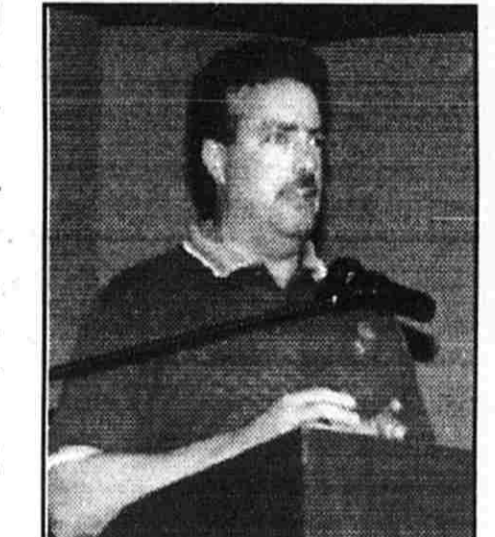
These are the same kids that were in my first D.A.R.E. class eight years ago," Valentine said. "I am close with many of the senior class members. That bond began with the D.A.R.E. program."

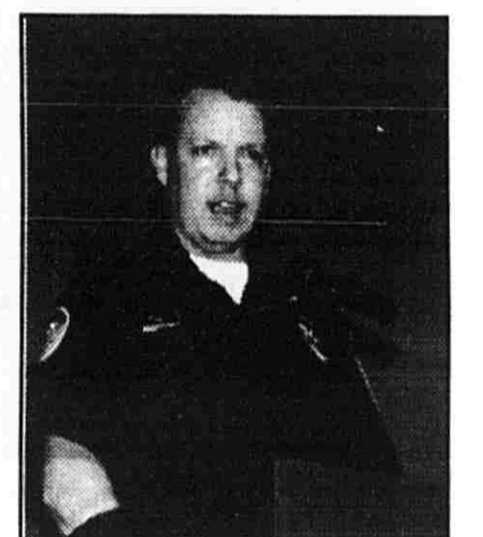
