Just 20 votes separated the three candidates who were running for two Lowell Board of Education seats. Nancy Hopkins and Mark Lessens garnered the two highest vote counts in winning four-year terms.

A mere 20 votes separated the three candidates vying for the two Lowell School Board seats.

"I think that tells us there were three good candidates to choose from," said Bert Bleke, Lowell Schools superintendent. "Competition like this is good for the community and great for the school district. The unfortunate thing is that only two of the candidates could win."

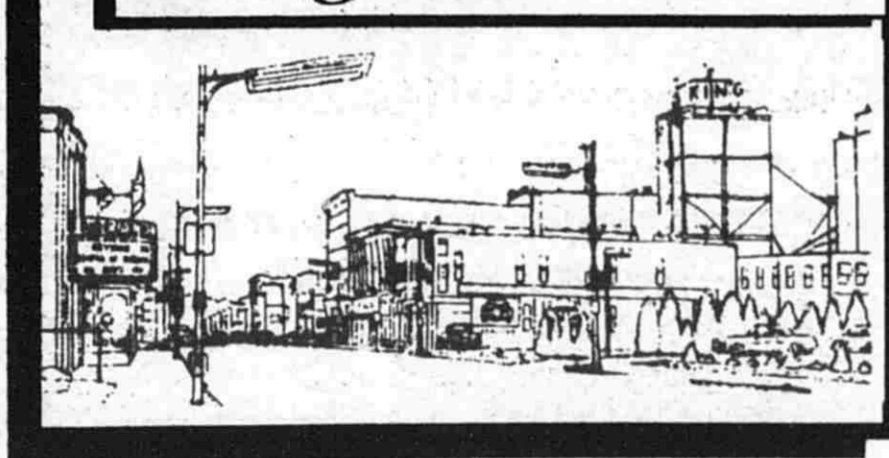
The election brought out 702 registered voters. Nancy Hopkins garnered 424 votes, the highest number of the three candidates.

"Becoming a candidate and going through the election process was a worthwhile experience," Hopkins explained. The election supported what Hopkins already believed were the district's strengths.

"It brought into focus what I thought - that Lowell was a quality school district, that it had strong leadership at the

Grant assures sirens will sound for all; Lowell Area Community Fund awards \$454,522

Youth fair recipient of \$40,000 challenge grant for renovation of the King Memorial Youth Center

Sunday night's storm brought with it a tornado warning.

The city's outdoor weather warning siren system sounded at approximately midnight alerting its residents of the potential life-threatening weather.

In actuality, only 25 percent of the city heard the siren.

"It was probably less than that because of the wind blowing to the east," said Lowell police chief James Valentine.

With the help of Harold and Mildred Englehardt's Lowell Area Community Fund, soon all 4,100-plus residents will hear the outdoor weather warning siren system when severe weather is a

threat to property and lives.

Through the trust fund, created with the help of the Grand Rapids Foundation, the Lowell Police Department received \$9,925.

That was the balance needed to cover the cost of the \$39,700 project. The city of Lowell, through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), received a grant for \$29,775. The total includes up to \$4,000 toward public education.

The current outdoor weather warning system consists of one 5 horsepower siren located in the center of the city, on top of the Lowell Light and Power building. The siren covers a 2,500 foot radius. With the upgrade of this siren, plus new sirens, the radius will increase to 10,000 feet.

"To have a weather warning system for the west side is especially critical. Dense population concentrations are located there (Valley Vista Trailer Park, Valley Vista subdivision and parts of Schneider Manor).

The new sirens will be

placed at the corner of Ridgeview and Sibley on the west side of the city and at the corner of Avery and Division on the east side of town.

Valentine said he expects the new sirens to be in by the end of August. West Shore Services out of Muskegon has been contracted to do the work.

The Kent County Youth Fair was the recipient of a \$40,000 challenge grant for renovation costs (\$50,000) associated with the King Memorial Youth Center, formerly the King Memorial building.

The fair will receive \$20,000 up front and after that, for every dollar it raises, it will receive a matching dollar up to \$20,000.

Lowell Charter Township will receive a \$100,000 grant from the Lowell Area Community Fund toward its Grand River Waterfront Park, a multipurpose community park and recreational area.

These were three of 14 grants totaling \$455,152

awarded on Monday.

As previously announced, the community fund has committed to \$100,000 a year for the next 30 years toward the maintenance and upkeep of a Lowell community pool.

Other grants include:
 • \$105,000 to Lowell Area Schools for technology hardware, software and training;
 • \$30,000 to the city of Lowell for restoring and stabilizing historic buildings in its downtown district;

• \$27,700 to Lowell Area Schools for a new video projector to be installed in the Performing Arts Center for use by the community;

• \$25,000 to Lowell Area Schools for funding in two scholarship areas of its Scholarship Opportunities for Students program;

• \$20,000 to Rockford Ambulance, Inc., to help purchase a new ambulance to serve the Lowell area;

• \$20,000 to Lowell Area Youth Development to support the development of healthy, self-motivated youths;

Lowell Cable budget report conflicts with prior audit reports

Increasing labor and programming costs over the last few years, while revenues were held stagnant has left Lowell Cable Television in poor financial condition, according to a budget report presented to the Lowell City Council by Lowell Light & Power/Lowell Cable Television general manager Ron Holcomb.

The report left councilman and former Lowell Cable board member Chuck Myers startled.

"I am shocked to hear the condition of the cable television company," Myers said.

The shock in part may have transpired based on the past three (1996-98) audit reports which all showed a net income.

Holcomb explained that the true cost of operating Lowell Cable Television is not reflected in prior financial statements due primarily to the extensive labor subsidies provided by Lowell Light & Power.

"Properly applying labor costs to the activity, this budget reflects an end to the subsidization," Holcomb explained.

The general manager projects a loss of \$127,500 this year (1999-2000).

The 1998-99 budget projected a loss of \$27,000, Holcomb believes that will end up being \$35-\$40,000.

Lowell Cable's audit report over the last three years shows the net income ranging from \$69,000 to \$100,000.

Holcomb says there are three primary reasons for the

City M-21 project continues under accelerated schedule

The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) just entered the next stage of its M-21 project last Monday (June 14).

MDOT is rehabilitating 7.8 miles of M-21 from Grand River Drive to Valley Vista Road. Repairs during this next stage include milling and resurfacing, guardrail and culvert replacement. The work will occur on the two-lane section of M-21 between Ada and Lowell.

"This project is progressing very well and we're pleased with the accelerated pace the contractor has been able to maintain," said Karl Koivisto, manager of the Greenville Transportation Service Center. "The contractor will continue working at the accelerated schedule within the Lowell city limits even while working on this new area between Ada and Lowell."

During this stage of the project, M-21 between Ada and Lowell will be detoured. The detour route follows M-50 (Alden Nash Highway), I-96 and M-37 (East Beltline). Access will be maintained to residences and businesses with this stretch of M-21.

This \$4.4 million project will rehabilitate this area of M-21 for approximately 15 years. Scheduled for completion in early August 1999, the project is funded through Gov. John Engler's *Build Michigan II* plan and TEA-21.

Lowell's Clements a celebrated poet

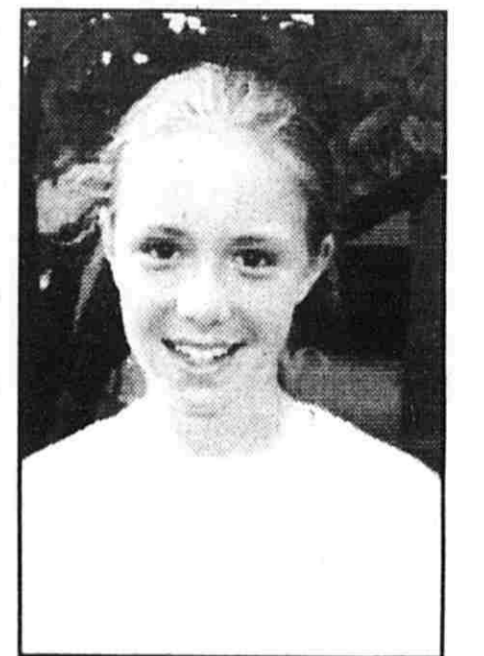

WHEN IT'S ALL SAID AND DONE

I came across the following paraphrase of Paul's definition of love in his first letter to the Corinthians. No one knows who authored it, but it seems to capture the essence of the greatest essay on love ever written.

If I have the language ever so perfectly and speak like a pundit, and have not the love that grips the heart, I am nothing. If I have decorations and diplomas and am proficient in up-to-date methods and have not the touch of understanding love, I am nothing.

If I am able to worst my opponents in argument so as to make fools of them and have not the wooing note, I am nothing. If I have all faith and great ideals and magnificent plans and wonderful visions, and have not the love that sweats and bleeds and weeps and prays and pleads, I am nothing.

If I surrender all prospects, and leaving home and friends and comforts, give myself to the showy sacrifice of a missionary career and turn sour and selfish amid the daily annoyances and personal slights of a missionary life, and though I give my body to be consumed in the heat and sweat and mildew of India and have not the love that yields its rights, its coveted leisure, its pet plans, I am nothing, nothing. Virtue has ceased to go out of me.

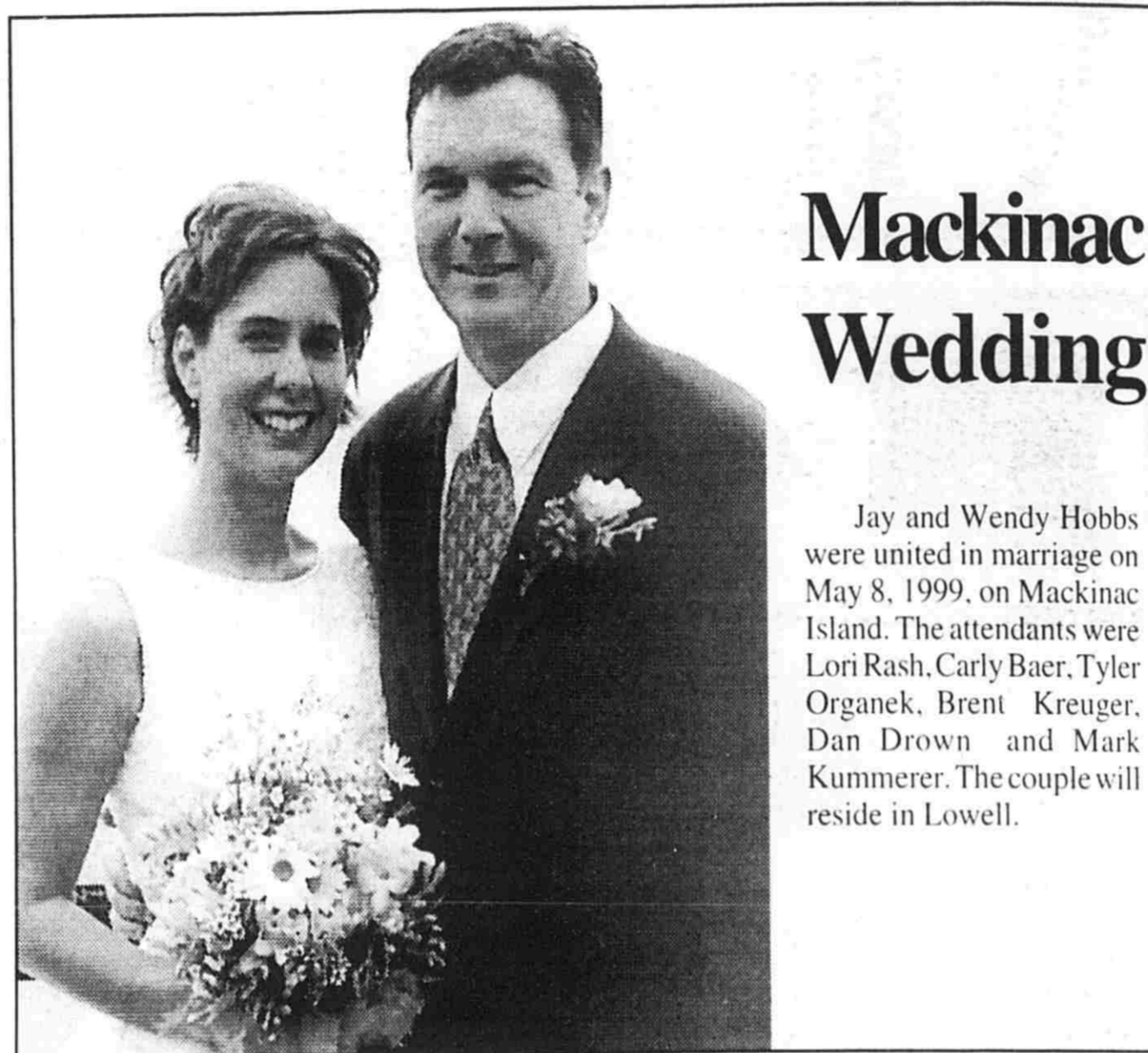
If I can heal all manner of sickness and disease, but wound hearts and hurt feelings for want of love that is kind, I am nothing. If I write books and publish articles that set the world aflame and fail to transcribe the word of the cross into the language of love, I am nothing. Worse, I may be competent, busy, fussy, punctilious and well equipped, but like the church at Laodicea - nauseating to Christ.

I was channel surfing last night and suddenly my curiosity was arrested by the topic being discussed on "Politically Incorrect." What caught my attention was a comment made by the host regarding his perception of Christians in America which basically is that we are judgmental and hypocritical. Other guests in

the "round table discussion" echoed the sentiments of the host.

Unfortunately, that is probably the opinion held by many people who look at Christians and see them failing to walk the walk and talk the talk. As I listened to the discussion, I had to admit that we have been guilty of precipitating that kind of perception by our failing to live out what Paul described for us in 1 Corinthians 13. When it is all said and done, it won't matter a whole lot about the size of our sanctuary or how many letters we have behind our name. What will matter is how we lived out - or as what I heard someone say once - "flesh out" what it truly means to be a Christian?

You and I may be the only Bible that someone will ever read. What are they reading?

"Hulda instigated the start of the club," said Ruby Christiansen, one of the club's three remaining charter members along with Ona Fletcher and Gladys Thorne.

For some time, the club has planted petunias and tulips around the Graham Building and YMCA. When the city put the trees in tubs along Main Street, members planted and maintained flowers provided by the city.

Christiansen joined the club because "I wanted to learn how to put plantings around my house and in the back," she says.

Every year since, petunias and other flowers have decorated her yard at 314 N. Washington.

"I'm still in it because I still enjoy it and I like the gang - it's a nice grouping," Christiansen explains.

The club's most lasting contribution to the community is the Adopt-a-Tree program conceived by Dr. Orval McKay. "Initially the tree program was for anyone who wanted a tree. The club concentrated on individual homes," said long-time club member, Bruce Walter.

The individual lawn trees planted are mainly maple, ash, sunburst locust, flowering crab and linden.

Since then, the club has made a concerted decision to plant trees where they are more visible such as the Main Street corridors, the entrances to the Lowell Area Arts Council, the

fairgrounds, the Fallas house in Fallasburg Park, Lowell High School, Lowell Medical Center and the First United Methodist Church of Lowell.

The Adopt-a-Tree program has received financial support from the Look Memorial Fund with the cooperation of the city.

The charge of the club has remained constant over the years: To promote a greater interest in gardening and increase beauty around homes and in the community.

Each year, the club sells dried materials at the Fallasburg Fall Festival with the proceeds going to the Environmental Council, the Grass Bay project on Lake Huron and the Nature Conservancy.

Casey had to run an errand, didn't see Thor and backed over the old guy. Casey rushed him to the animal emergency clinic in Grand Rapids where X-rays revealed no broken bones and Thor's vitals seemed okay so he was released.

He spent a bad night with labored breathing, and in the morning Casey took him to our regular vet. It was determined that he had some internal damage and was sent back to the clinic for further examination. I was kept apprised by phone as all this transpired. At the clinic Thor was diagnosed with a torn diaphragm and some of his internal organs were in his chest cavity where they weren't supposed to be. The vet told me there was a reasonable chance for a successful surgery and a full recovery. However, the procedure was very involved and costly. Without hesitation, I told her to go ahead with the surgery.

Saturday afternoon and evening Thor underwent a three-hour surgery to put his liver and stomach back where they belonged and repair an eight-inch tear in his diaphragm. That evening after the surgery the doctor told me Thor was in stable but very guarded condition. Periodic calls throughout the day on Sunday offered the same report, stable but guarded.

Around 8:30 Sunday night the doctor called to give me the terrible news that Thor's great heart had finally had enough. My heart was shattered. In turn, I had to break more hearts as I made calls to my daughter in Arizona and my son in Michigan. As scattered as my family is these days, Thor was very much a part of what holds us together. I've never made a call to my daughter in which she didn't ask about Thor.

Everybody felt sorry for Casey. Even though it was a complete accident and there should be no guilt, I know he can't help but feel the whole thing is his fault. On top of that he had to deal with all the emergency care and even had to bury the old boy late Sunday night working by the headlights of his car in a severe thunderstorm.

My daughter and I agreed Thor's death was so typically "Thor." We all knew he wasn't the type of dog that would simply die in his sleep at a ripe old age. No, he had to run up

a few thousand-dollar vet bill on his way out and be buried in thunder, lightning and rain in the middle of the night. Something to remember him by, as if we needed any more memories.

Thor has been gone nearly two days. I still well up with tears every time I think of him, which seems to be every few minutes. I've had a helluva time trying to hunt and peck this out through the tears. However, as painful as this is, I stick to something I wrote in a previous column. "If I could offer you only one piece of advice, dog ownership would be it." Over the past 10 years there have been hundreds of times I wanted to kill Thor, but right now I'd give anything to have him back. Goodbye old buddy.

"We'd like to be able to come up with a significant event for each ring," VanderSloot said. The ring will be displayed at Vergennes Township Hall.

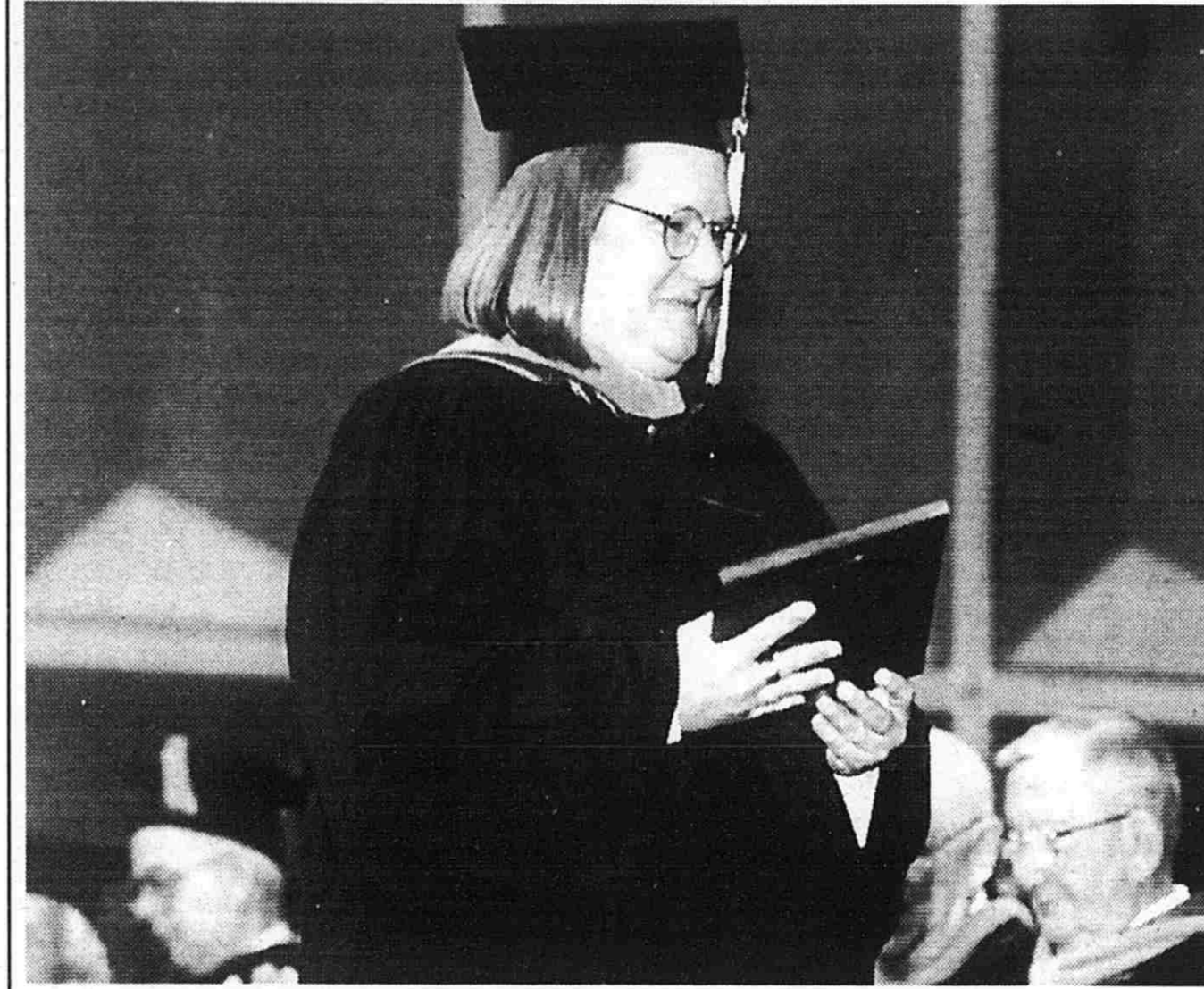

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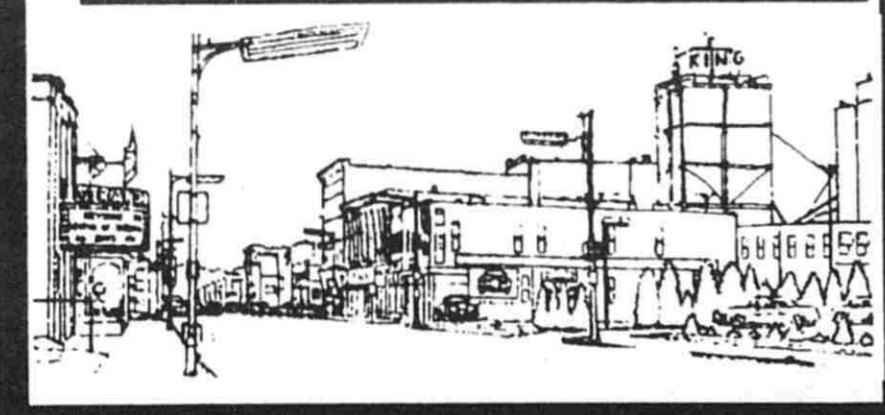

- \$19,000 to the Lowell Area Arts Council for implementation costs associated with its new strategic plan: "Vision 2005";
- \$17,717 to the Lowell YMCA for the development of a school-age child care program at Bushnell Elementary School;
- \$15,000 to the Lowell Area Schools for the development of a community-wide character and diversity initiative;
- \$15,000 to Lowell Area Schools for the purchase of security cameras, monitor and VCR equipment for Lowell High School;
- and \$10,810 to the Lowell Showboat II, Inc., for

the balance of renovation and maintenance costs associated with the historic Lowell Showboat.

Grants were distributed to 14 different programs covering areas of interest in community development, culture/arts, education, health and social/human needs.

"The extent and diversity of these grants really reflect the spirit and vision of the Lowell Area Community Fund," said John Darling, a member of the fund's advisory committee. "We're thrilled to keep advancing the dreams Harold Englehardt had for the Lowell area."

Not all board members believe the private sector can do as good a job in all cases as the public sector.

"The belief is the private sector can do a better job in food service than the public sector. I don't believe that is the case in Lowell Schools," said board trustee James Reagan who along with board secretary Ann Mulder voted against the superintendent's recommendation to contract Chartwells for one year.

"I have reservations about what this will mean to the nutritional value of our food service program, the accountability of the food service manager, and food that's sold; and the anonymity of students in the free and reduced lunch program," Reagan explained.

Mulder added that she thinks a food service program should offer nourishing food at a reasonable price, free and reduced lunches to some, and help promote good eating habits for children.

"I think the choice separates the haves from the have nots. I don't think school is a place where business should reign," Mulder said.

Board president Pete Gustafson said he supported the superintendent's recommendation and that it is to the advantage of the district to follow the path of Chartwells given the experience it has had with other districts.

"It brings the district added buying power and expertise in food service management," Gustafson said. "There is also a 60-day termination provision which provides us with control in regards to policy and procedures."

Sandy Hendrick, the head of the Lowell Food Service Association, was not as optimistic.

"This was absolutely not a good decision. We will be serving junk food," said Hendrick, a 15-year employee with Lowell Schools in food service. "Talk to the food service people in Grand Ledge (also uses Chartwells). It's a junk food line all the way out to the hallway. I just hope the board really does monitor it."

For Bleke, the issues had more to do with change and choice.

"Things will not be any different for food service employees. They've been treated fairly in the past and the district will continue to do so," he said. "There is no evidence that there will be a nutritional problem or an anonymity problem for kids in the free and reduced lunch program."

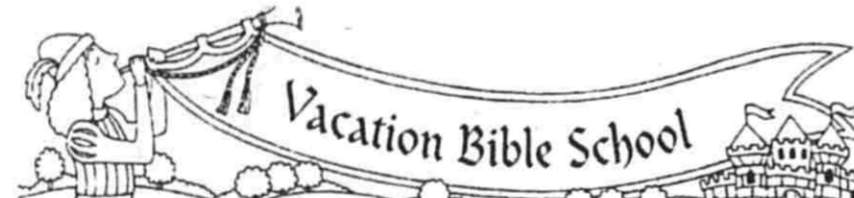
The Lowell superintendent said he favors an aggressive school lunch program that provides high school students with a choice.

"The students are old enough to drive and therefore are old enough to order their own food," Bleke said.

discrepancy: 1. The Lowell Cable Board hired a cable director; 2. Programming expense increases; and 3. Reallocation of labor cost.

"Labor and especially programming costs increased precipitously (e.g. ESPN is up 20 percent) over the last few years, while revenues held stagnant," Holcomb said. "Maintaining a competitive price is admirable but not at the expense of service quality and long-term fiscal health."



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Myers told Holcomb that he would be against increased rates that threaten to abandon the basis from which the cable company was set up.

"I am confident any revenue requirements will yield a basic cable rate below any of its competitors," Holcomb said. "From a competitive position, a competitive rate that supports this valuable community service is achievable."

Myers said he is against comparing Lowell Cable Television with "for profit organizations."

"Lowell Cable was started on the basis of serving the Lowell community with cable services so that the community has ownership and in return receives better service, good selection and lower prices," Myers said.

The councilman also pointed out that one of the benefits the city receives from the cable system is it doesn't pay taxes on it.

Tom Richards, director of cable services, said cost of programming has gone up \$2.50 per customer since the last subscriber increase in 1996.

Holcomb added that a restricted fund of at least \$300,000 is needed in case of a catastrophe.

The former Lowell Cable Board did establish a reserve (capital) fund, that currently stands at \$175,000.

"Meaningful capital improvements are impossible at current revenue levels," he said.

The expansion, however, would be dependent upon basic service becoming self-supporting.

Holcomb has also contracted (\$3,000) with the accounting firm of Virchow Krause to provide a third-party evaluation of the revenue requirements for Lowell Cable Television. "I think an independent assessment is critical and prudent in the event I have miscalculated or misallocated costs," he said.

Gless pitched 4 1/3 innings, allowing seven runs on seven

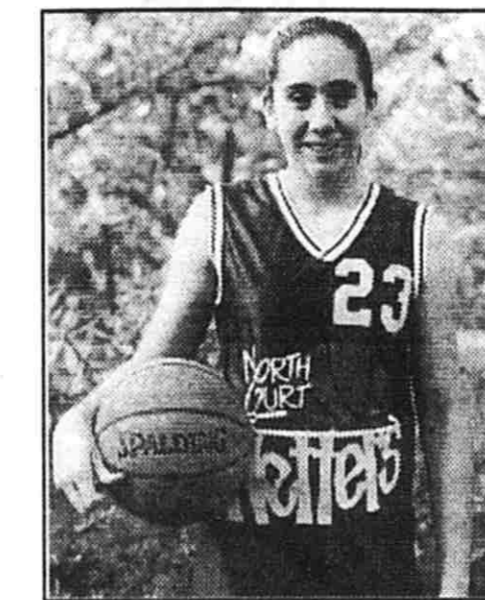
hits. He gave up two solo shots in the fifth inning before being taken out.

Grants making a difference for local restaurant owner

◆◆◆ Brickyards, however, are having a difficult time meeting the demands of the Historic District's brick renovation request.

It is the most extensive restoration project being undertaken in the Lowell Historic District.

Mike Larkin, owner of Larkin's Restaurant and "The Other Place" is repairing the columns on the side of the old theatre (now The Other Place) and the brick in front. He will also be restoring Larkin's windows back to their original look as well as removing the siding and repairing bricks on the upper half of the building.

The project will cost Larkin roughly \$50,000. Through the Downtown Lowell Historic District grant program, the restaurant owner has been the recipient of \$14,600 over a two-year period.

"The program seems to be working. It is helping businesses in the district fix up their buildings," Larkin explained.

Larkin received \$4,000 in district grant money last year for work at The Other Place and another \$2,930 this year to finish/continue that project. He was also the recipient of a grant for \$7,670 to start restoration work on the Larkin's building, which will include bringing back the ornamental work around the windows that was chipped off many years ago.

Larkin said the entire project will probably take three years. "The tough part has been finding the right people to get the job done," Larkin explained.

Architectural Building Restoration, Inc. has been contracted to do the work but, as one can imagine, demands for its service are at a premium right now.

"The work using last year's grant money was to be completed by July 1 I don't think that's going to happen," Larkin said. "I'm probably going to need an extension."

Lowell Historic District commission study committee chairman Jim Doyle concurred that getting the work done has been a difficult task for a number of Lowell Historic District businesses.

Mark Batchelor, general manager of Architectural Building Restoration, Inc., said brickyards are experiencing a shortage of labor and materials.

Batchelor is waiting on the old style brick needed to do the work at Larkin's.

"Some, instead of waiting, put in the modular brick (eight inches in length) which is 1/4-inch smaller and throws off the spacing. It does not look as nice when finished," Batchelor said. "There's going to be a month's wait to get the brick I need for Larkin's. Brickyards are over capacity," Batchelor explains.

There are 54 buildings in the Lowell Historic District. The district committee was able to allocate \$30,000 in grants, thanks to money it received from the Englehardt Lowell Community Fund.

"It is important to recognize the Lowell Area Community Fund in appreciation for the grants we've received from it," said Steve Doyle, chairman of the Lowell Historic District Commission.

This year, all 12 businesses which applied for historic district grants received monies. The total amount requested this year was \$101,000 with 30 percent of that awarded by the district.

Lowell Area Historic Association (LAHA) has been collecting and preserving Lowell's history since 1989.

"Thus far, we've collected well over 2,000 items," Straub says. "We've also gathered a large photo archive."

Some of these historical items will be on display at the Showboat from 10 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. the day of the celebration.

Exhibits on view will include fur trading, milling, lumbering, Showboat, water power and clamming.

D Avenue & Friends will provide music throughout the day, with dancing demonstrations by Callihan Country Dancers, Donahue School of Irish Dance and Thunder Floor Cloggers.

LAHA's 10-year anniversary celebration will help bring awareness to LAHA and its work, according to Straub.

Patrons are encouraged to come dressed in historic costumes. They will all be judged as part of a historic costume contest.

Other attractions at the Lowell Heritage Celebration will include historical bus and walking tours, free ice cream sundaes, pioneer games and crafts, craft demonstrations, Showboat tours, a panel discussion and museum update.

Hot dogs, chips and pop will also be sold. There are currently 140 LAHA members.

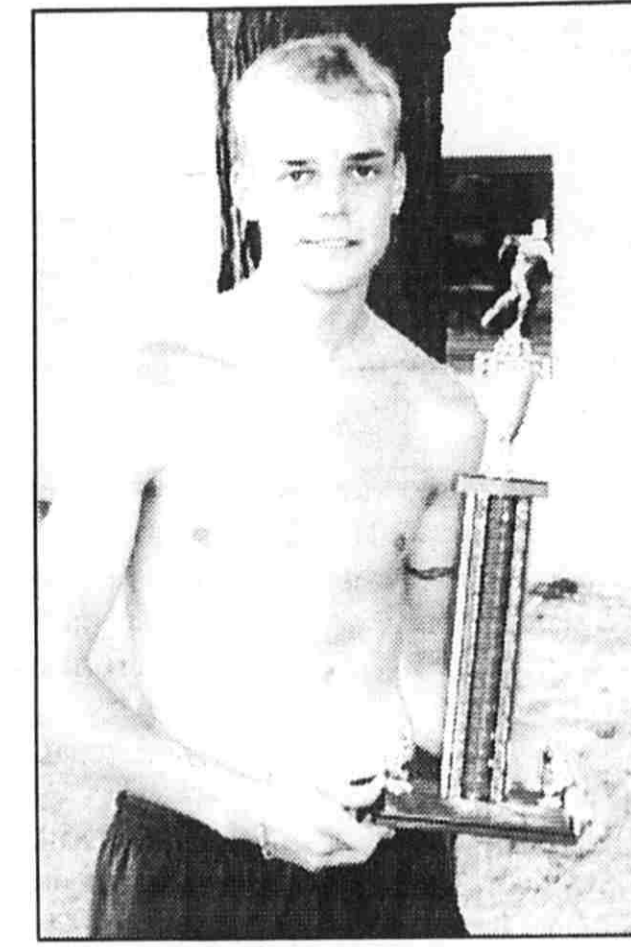

Sundry Development has plans for 28th St.

Another new development is being planned in Lowell Charter Township on 28th Street. The Ada based Sundry Development Corporation has asked the planning commission to rezone the Robert Boyd property from AG II to PUD in order to build 20 new homes between Montcalm and Pratt Lake roads.

The 20 newly created sites will be rezoned out of 98 acres total, and will each be from two to six acres in size. The new homes will be single-family dwellings and average \$200,000 in price. An additional 29 acres of the land will be set aside and permanently rezoned as a wetlands and natural preserve. It will include a recreation area and hiking trail.

Sundry president Kevin Rude answered questions at an open public hearing at the township hall. Neighbors expressed their concerns about the new development project.

Dorothy Teasdale of Pratt Lake Road asked whether or not hunting would be banned in the new development. Rude answered that it would be. Another neighbor, Frank Leisure was concerned about the new residents wandering onto his property. Rude replied that he had no control over that. Jim Smith was concerned with limitations about hunting on his own property due to the "500 feet away from any dwelling" law.

Commission chairman Richard Bryan explained the new Planning Urban Development (PUD) rezoning.

"It will prevent any further development or adding onto the sites," he said.

Clerk Carol Wells further explained the rezoning as a way to conserve as much as possible.

"It will preserve natural beauty of the land and develop it far better than merely carving it up," she said.

Rude explained that an existing wetlands, and ponds and creek system will be preserved with a concrete spillway to keep the water in check.

"We will not be cutting any more trees than we have to. Most of the site is a sand pit, and erosion will be prevented with proper designs and layouts," Rude said.

Trustee Richard Huver said, "It is a good plan, and it will be a nice place to live in."

But neighbor Wanda Elliott was concerned about further increases in property values and taxes. Bryan explained that the tax rate is now limited to the inflation rate or five percent, whichever is lowest. Rude could not predict what increases in surrounding property value would occur from the new development.

AG II zoning rules require four acres for each house site in a subdivided property. PUD requirements permit lots of less than four acres. Chairman Bryan affirmed that this will thus permit the 29-acre natural preserve to be permanently established.

The new development will be called Natures Place, and construction of the new houses is planned for later this year.

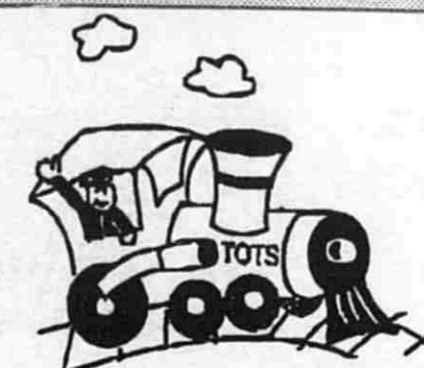

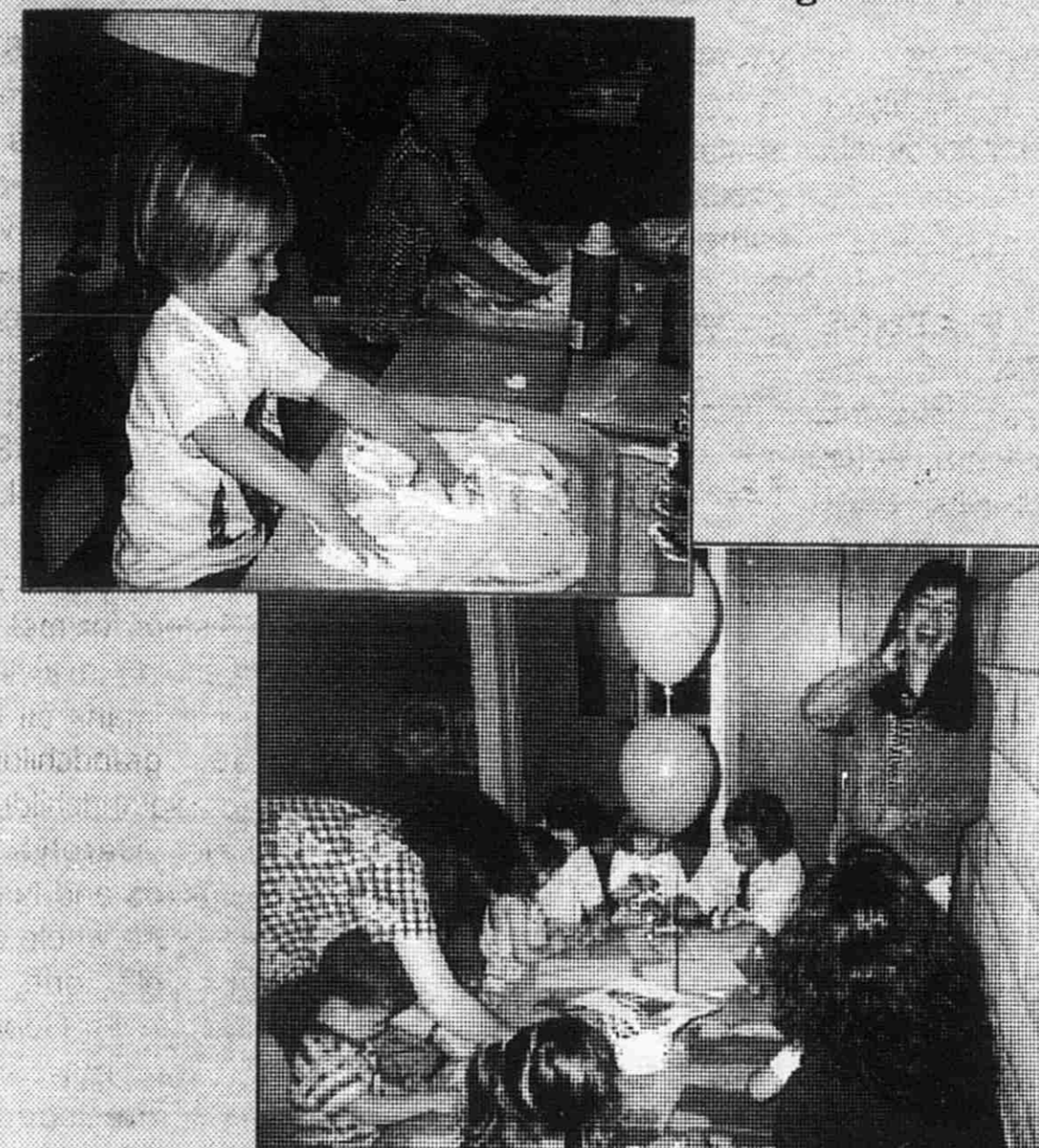

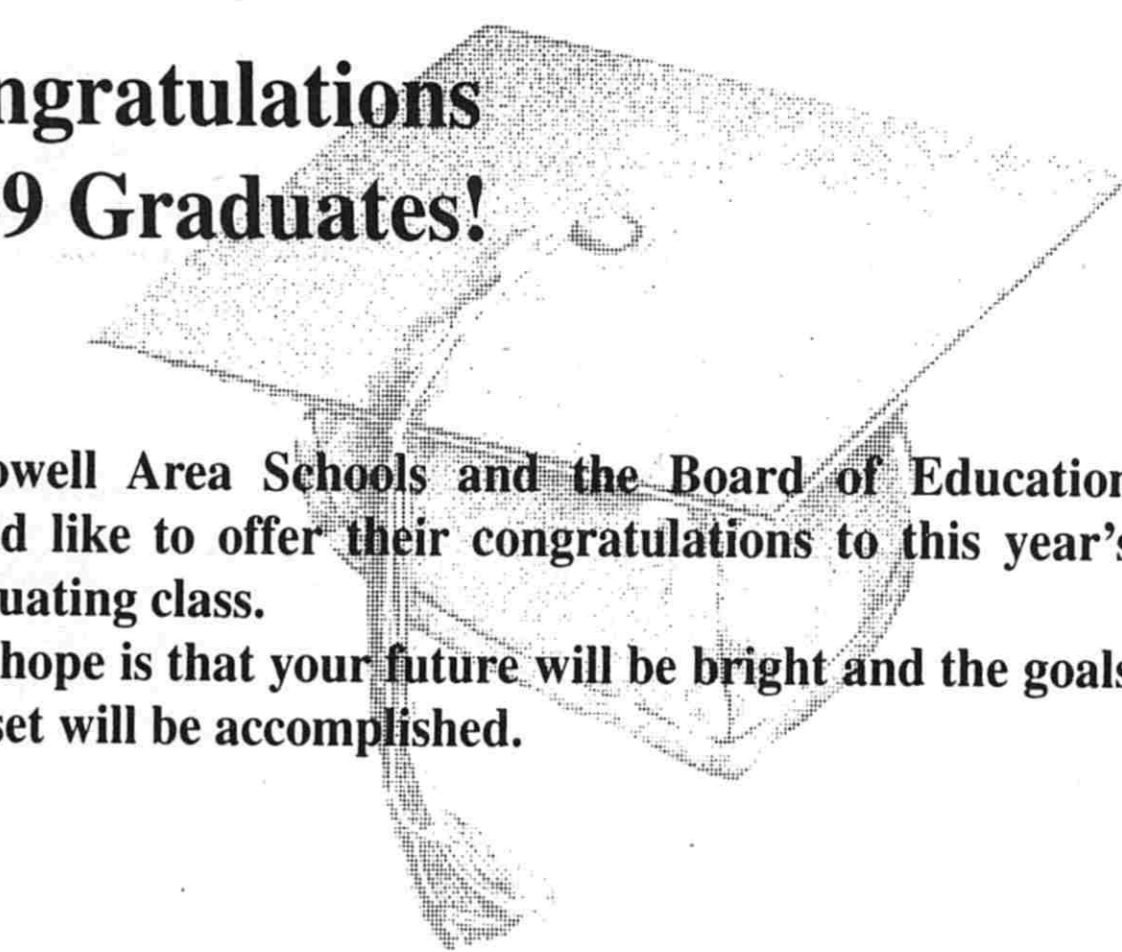

ACADEMIC FOCUS TECHNOLOGY EDUCATION

Technology classes involve solving problems. Our Middle School and High School provide instruction in the varied avenues of technology, as used in today's world. The Middle School emphasizes cooperative learning and problem-solving through their 16 modular learning areas. Each module focuses on a specific area of technology. Examples of these modules include aerospace, robotics, electronics, and engineering.

The students experience hands-on activities with a partner in each area for two weeks. This enables a very efficient use of equipment, as only one module is needed to teach a given subject, eliminating the need to purchase enough materials to teach the whole class at once.

In our high school drafting class, students explore engineering and technology. This year's projects have included building model bridges with roofs that open to expose structural details, house designing and commercial designing. Advanced drafting concepts were reinforced by solving descriptive geometry problems. Surveying was practiced on school grounds and an orienteering course was set up for other class members to develop their compass skills.

Community donations, such as steel tubing from Steelcase and maple plywood from Rudy Smith, have provided additional opportunities to construct projects to meet needs and solve problems in the materials processing classes. A steel gazebo was designed, erected and used as a backdrop for the Sweetheart Swirl and Prom parties.

Lowell Area Schools' Technology Department is very comprehensive and one that offers students wonderful opportunities for learning. The school is very proud to offer courses to our district students in this area.
