Wittenbachs' educational legacy grows with construction of center

••• Donation of \$200,000 provides grand opportunity for environmental and agri-science studies.

"If Dad knew what was happening he would be so proud," said Mary Dewey, the daughter of June Wittenbach and the late Everett Wittenbach.

One could argue that because of Everett Wittenbach's pride of and vision for the Lowell community, he already knew, and the rest are just now catching up.

It was announced Wednesday that construction of the Everett and June Wittenbach Agricultural and Environmental Science Center is scheduled to begin this spring and open in the fall.

"This is representative of the feelings both Everett and I have about this community, its people and how important farming and the environment were to him," said June Wittenbach, his wife of 50 years.

The donation just further enhances the educational imprint the Wittenbachs have had on the community.

"It is a tremendously generous gift which will provide a wonderful educational opportunity for the school, community and outside communities," Lowell Area Schools Superintendent Bert Bleke said. "Ideally, we hope to be able to use the facility next fall. It will have an impact on the K-12 curriculum."

In 1992, they stepped forward and volunteered to sell 180 acres of their land for the development of the new state-of-the-art Lowell High School.

The new center will be located adjacent to a 60-acre parcel of property that is owned by the Land Conservancy Organization and has been designated forever by that group as a natural land preserve. The Wittenbach Agricultural and Science Center will serve as the gateway and information center for the Wege natural land preserve.

"My Dad and mother never forgot how the community of Lowell helped their business (Wittenbach Sales and Service) and I know he would be and my mother is very proud to be able to give back to the community," Dewey explained. "Dad was extremely proud of the new high school and being able to contribute to education of kids."

Through his business networking, Wittenbach Sales and Service made an impact not only on the Lowell community but outlying areas as well.

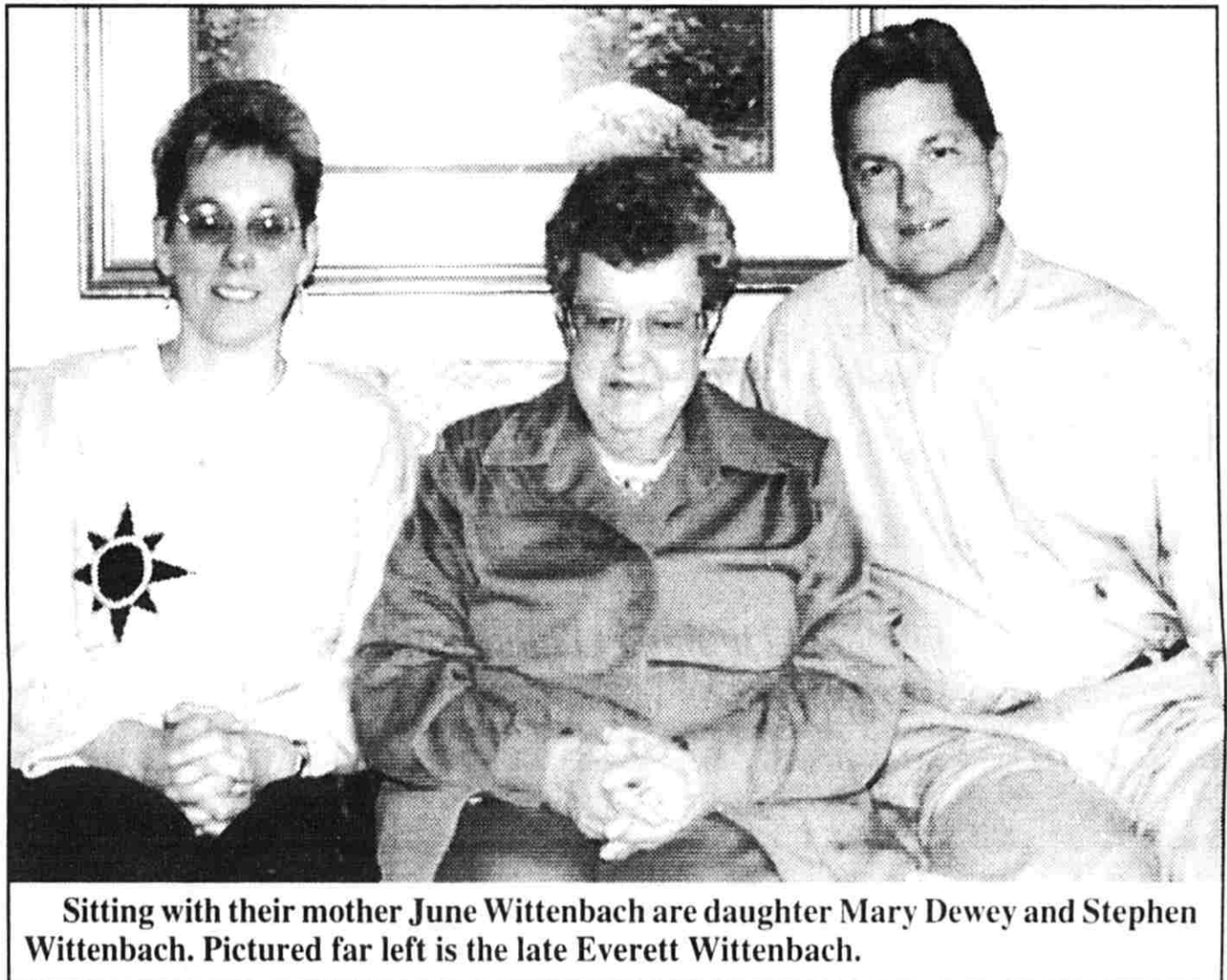
"He helped a lot of franchises in neighboring communities," June Wittenbach said. "There are plans to make the facility available to the schools and community groups

outside the area with agricultural and environmental interests."

The Lowell 4-H and Future Farmers of America organizations also knew and experienced Wittenbach's generosity.

He served for many years on the 4-H Board and was actively involved in the FFA during the 1970's and 80's.

Pete Siler, teacher and sponsor of the Lowell FFA chapter, praised the Wittenbachs' for their long-standing commitment to the school's agri-science program and to the community at large. "Everett and June have served Lowell's agricultural

community in many ways over the years," he said, "and the center will be a fitting tribute to both of them."

Wittenbach's son Stephen said his dad had a special appreciation of Lowell area farmers and understood their value to the community. "To be able to contribute to the school's foundation to construct this new building would have made him very happy. I know my mother is pleased."

"Sticks and Stones" can't distract from show's level of excellence

••• The 14th annual arts competition recognized 71 pieces of art and 56 artists, nine of which were from the local area.

Ron Pederson, juror of the 2000 West Michigan Regional Competition, noted that he is attracted to artwork that is visually clear, visually interesting, dynamically whole.

In part, that is why he awarded Molly Alicki Corriveau's "Sticks and Stones" piece with Best of Show.

"Her interior/exterior treatment of the portrait was innovative," Pederson explained. "It also possesses that spark of life that I thought reflected something of the spirit of the artist."

Corriveau was one of 56 artists represented in the 14th annual competition at the Lowell Area Arts Council. The 71-piece exhibition will run through April 12.

Corriveau explains that "Sticks and Stones" varies from most of her work. "I like to hide symbols and leave messages with my work. I did not do that with this piece."

When finished with her prisma color sculptural drawing, it was clear her work was that of a sad woman who hurt inside, pain not incurred from sticks and stones.

Corriveau's work has been a popular and clear choice of

the West Michigan Regional Competition jurors over the last half dozen years. During that time she has earned Juror's Choice twice and Best 2-Dimensional.

"This is a really good show. It's small and selective and there is always really good work here," Corriveau explains.

Pederson concurred. "I could have made another show with what wasn't selected. The level of excellence was that close."

Other artists earning awards include: Jim Marble's "Foggy Morning," Best 2-Dimensional; Steven Peters, "Warrior/Inner Voice," Best 3-Dimensional; Annie Morgan, "Music and Dreams," Creative Use of Material; and Neil Mullally, "Earning His Supper," Juror's Selection.

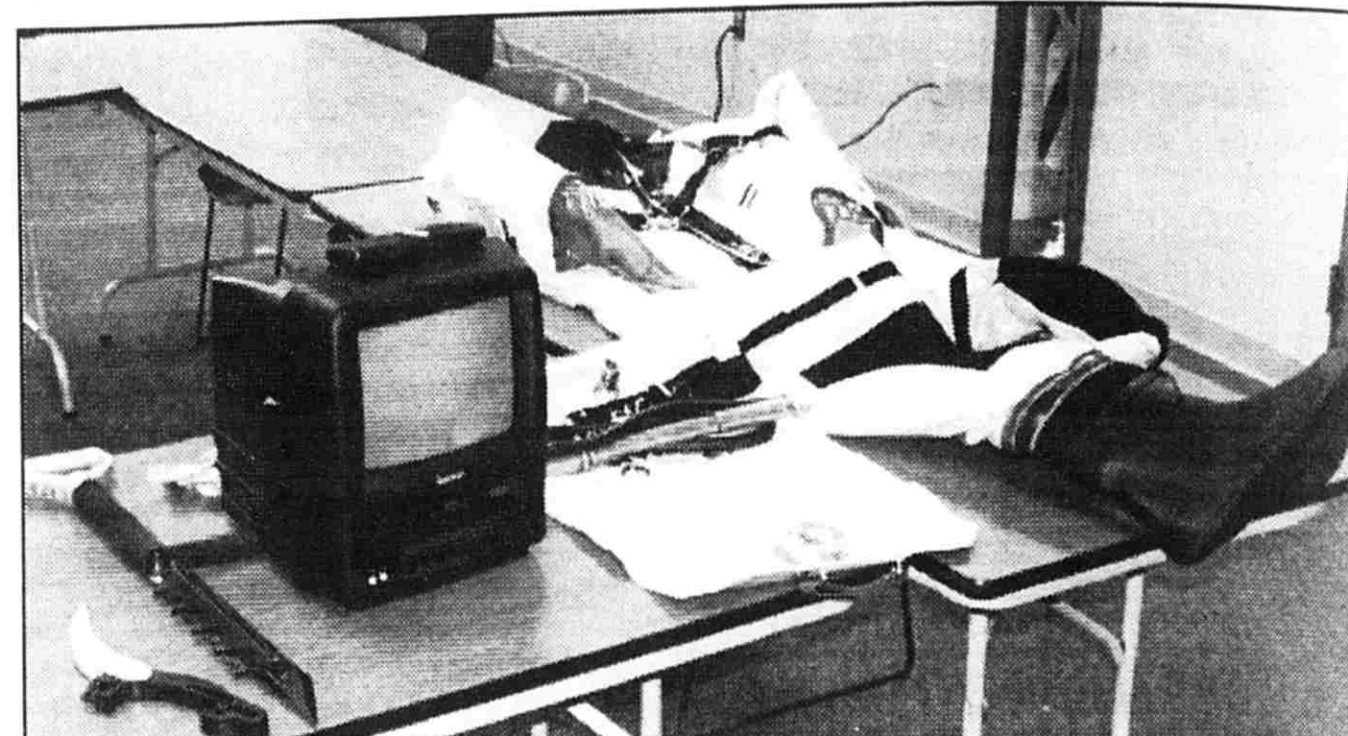

CROP Walk organizers begin drive to recruit walkers in fight against hunger

Participants in the annual Lowell Area CROP Walk will walk for the sixth consecutive year in their fight against hunger.

The local CROP Walk has raised over \$99,000 since its first event in 1995.

"Whether participants are age seven or 70, they can help stop hunger by walking and asking friends and neighbors to be their sponsor," said CROP Walk public relations chairperson Jan Stuart.

Last year, 306 walkers from 11 area churches, schools and organizations raised over \$24,000.

"We cannot assume that because the walk was a success last year, it will automatically be so this year," Stuart explained.

The goal for this year's walk is \$26,000 and 330 walkers.

The CROP Walk is slated for Sunday, May 7 at 1 p.m. The walk will start and finish at the Lowell First United Methodist Church (621 E. Main St.).

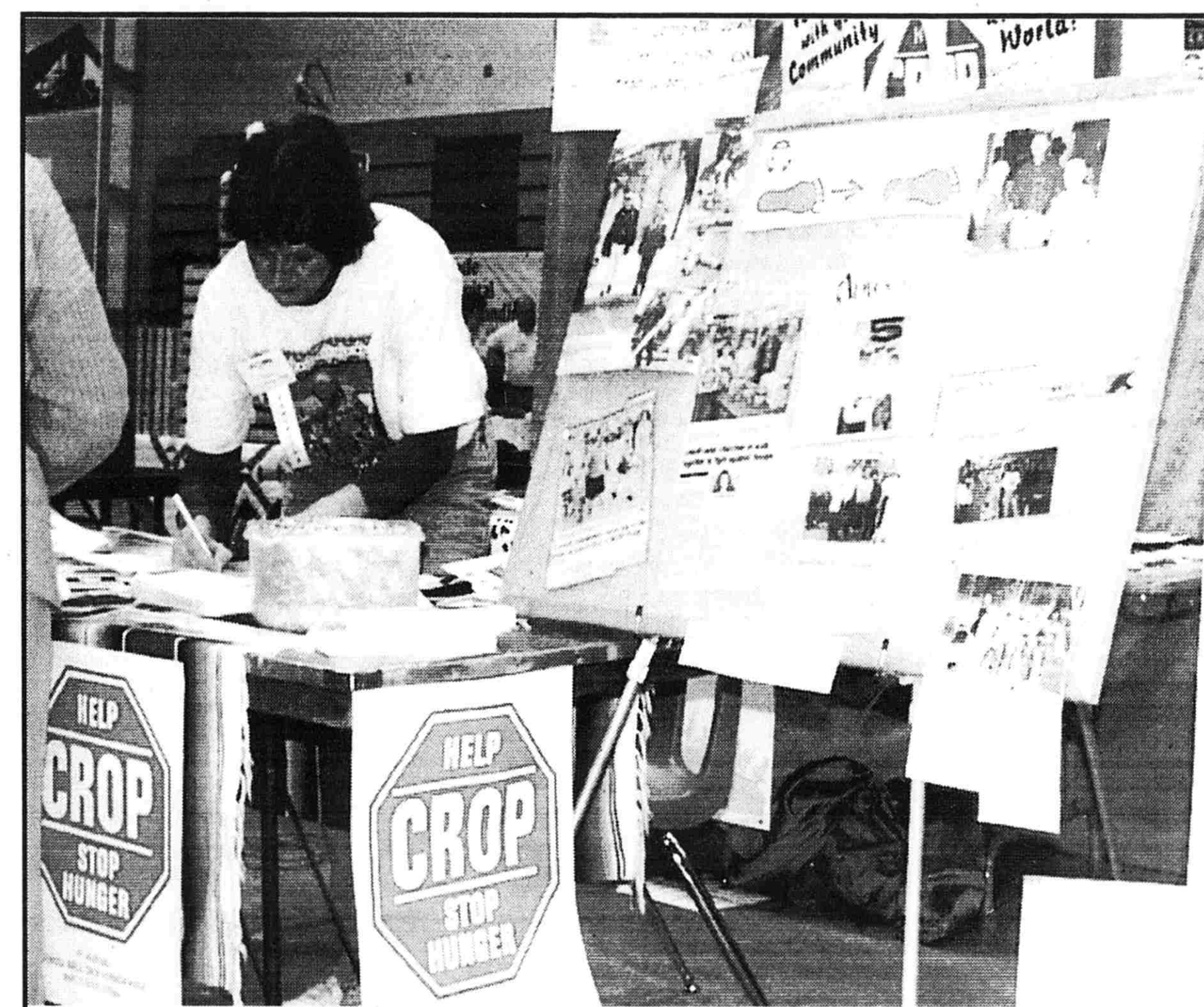
The main route is 6.2 miles and the shorter route is two miles.

The CROP Walk is sponsored by Church World Service, an international relief, development and refugee resettlement agency.

Every year, 25 percent of the funds raised stay in the Lowell area. Agencies that benefited from the money raised in 1999 were the Senior Neighbors (\$1,500), and the Flat River Outreach Ministries Food Bank (\$4,500).

The funds given to the Church World Service provide hunger relief to more than 70 countries as well as supply seeds, tools and training for crop production, safe drinking water, emergency aid for refugees, and basic health care and medical supplies.

Township votes to take part in 2000-01 CDBG program

Lowell Charter Township received \$37,571.11. Of that, \$3,000 will pay the township's share of the Hope Network's North Kent Transit Service.

It voted to take part in the federally funded Kent County Community Development Block Grant program again next year (2000-01). This year, the township

received \$37,571.11. Of that, \$3,000 will pay the township's share of the Hope Network's North Kent Transit Service.

The remaining \$34,571.11 is being used to help pay for a topographical

mapping of the flood plain. It covers all but roughly \$3,000 of the total cost, which will be taken out of the township's general fund.

The topographical map-

ping is needed by the planning commission for development and in looking at site plans to assure that projects are properly engineered.

LAAC to award Kathie Quada scholarship

The Lowell Area Arts Council is pleased to announce that beginning in 2000, it will award two separate scholarships.

Since 1985, students have vied for The Louise Harper Memorial Scholarship, given in memory of Harper, a Charter Member of the LAAC. With the permission of the Quada family, the LAAC Executive Board recently converted The Kathie Quada Memorial Purchase fund, which has been used in the past to purchase art works for the permanent collection of the LAAC, to a scholarship fund as well.

The scholarships will be in the amount of \$500 for Harper and \$200 for Quada, for the first session of tuition at the recipient's academic institution. Funds will be available after June 1 and before December 31 in the year of the award.

In order to be considered, an applicant must be a high school graduate by July 1 of the year of application, and must be enrolled in the academic institution indicated on the application before the end of that calendar year.

An applicant must intend to major in an area of fine arts or crafts (visual or performing), arts management, or arts education. Applications will be reviewed by a committee of Arts

Council members who have been designated by the LAAC Board of Directors. The decision of the committee will be announced at the annual Lowell High School Senior Awards ceremony in May.

Applications may be obtained at the Lowell High School Student Services Center, or by calling the LAAC office. In addition to the materials requested in the high school packet, the LAAC requests several items in order to assist the scholarship committee in their decision. These include a resume of activities since entering high school which show involvement in any way in the arts, a list of all classes, courses, camps, workshops, etc., taken or participated in which show present training in the arts, and a letter to the scholarship committee explaining the goals and vision of the applicant's future involvement in the arts. This information must be returned to the Student Services Center, or the Lowell Area Arts Council office no later than the first Monday in May.

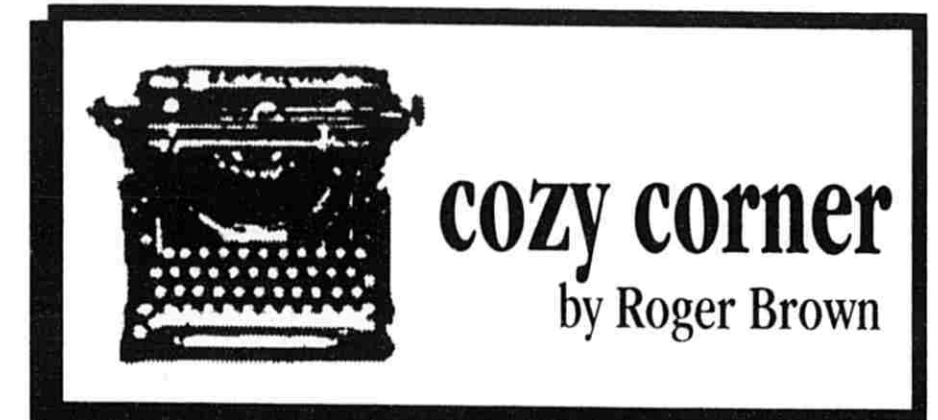
Those residents who did not receive a bag or wish to donate food items may drop them off at the Lowell United Methodist Church.

Viewpoint . . .



It would take a better sociologist than me to give you a proper definition of the "Babyboom" generation. I'm not even sure of the exact date parameters of Babyboomers. I do know we're roughly talking the end of WWII when all those sexually pent-up GI's came back from overseas. It ended twenty-some years later when they had all become Archie Bunker-like couch potatoes.

Don't get me wrong, I'm not knocking them. After all, who could blame them for settling back with a beer and a TV remote. They'd lived through the Great Depression, fought WWII and fostered 80 million kids. Talk about "Miller Time."

Born in 1949, I'm definitely a boomer. Up until recently I thought that was pretty cool. We grew up with lots of great new stuff like television and Formica. Then we did the 60's thing with all the hoopla over the war, the draft, peace, love, etc. Throw in some great music and movies and we had ourselves a pretty good time.

Now we're all couch potatoes and it is pretty obvious we had too much fun and didn't take care of the business of replacing ourselves. I caught part of a program on public radio recently that was addressing this issue. The host was interviewing a guy who had written a book about the dilemma us Boomers have created for ourselves. The raw numbers tell the story. There are approximately 80 million Boomers and roughly 55 million "Generation X"ers. "I don't think we were that lazy about sex, so it must have been "The Pill."

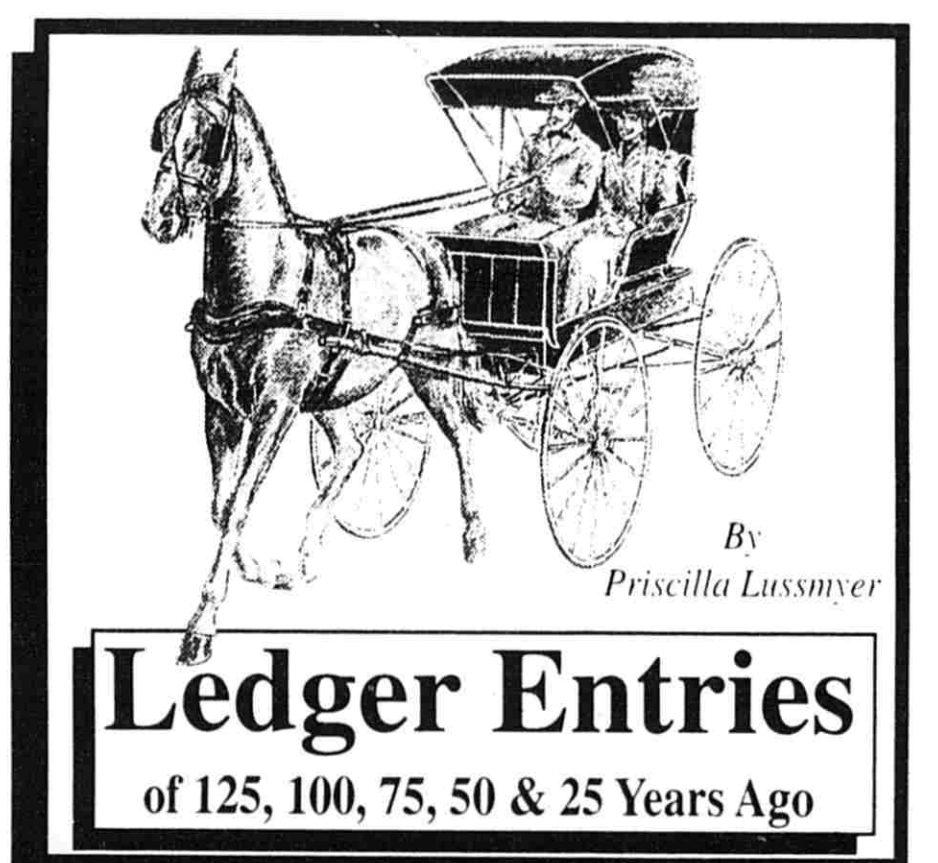

Somehow, I get the feeling this plan isn't going to work. On the other hand, I don't have a solution. It's too late for us Boomers to have more kids to support us. They locked up Doc Kervorkian, so that option is gone. Somehow I don't think 60's style communes are going to work any better now than they did back then. I guess we'd better just resign ourselves to working forever. Speaking of which, it's time to wrap this thing up and go hustle up some business. Work, work, work!



125 YEARS THE WEEKLY JOURNAL MARCH 31, 1875

The building west of Scott's hardware store is being raised and moved a few feet northwest.

Some Bowne young folks have associated as an "anti-vulgar talk society" and propose to quit drinking, swearing, chewing, smoking and using vulgar language.

COMING HOME

For about the 100th time, I flipped the yarn fly into the swift current below the dam on the White River at Hesperia. The sinkers ticked the rocky bottom as the line drifted downstream toward the slack water. This time the line hesitated and then started moving back upstream. I set the hook with a wide sweep of the 9-foot noodle rod.

Suddenly a silver torpedo cartwheelled out of the swift water. The rod arched into a full half circle as the large fish made a run for freedom. This is steelhead fishing in Michigan. This is what keeps normally sensible people standing in cold water for hours in all kinds of weather, casting until their arms ache.

The steelhead is actually a rainbow trout that is returning home from the Great Lakes to spawn. The warm weather this year seems to have moved the timing of their journey up a bit, and if the trend continues, they could complete their task and be gone in a hurry. Locally, fish have entered the Grand River system. Some of the more popular fishing sites are the Grand

in Grand Rapids, the Rouge below Rockford, the Flat at Lowell, and the Prairie at Ionia.

Steelhead can be caught on spawn, spinners, wigglers, crank baits, and artificial flies. You might guess - as with any type of fishing - there is a lot to learn about equipment and technique. Because this fishing often takes place in public areas, you can learn a lot by just watching other folks fish.

Actually, even if you're not interested in fishing, watching others fish is a great spectator sport. Steelhead will average about eight pounds, so when someone hooks up with one in fast water the action can be fast and furious. More often than not the fish will win.

One of the best places around here to observe the fish, as well as the fisherman, is at the 6th Street Dam in Grand Rapids. A fish ladder at the dam allows the trout to continue their upstream journey by providing a series of steps to the upper river.

Joseph E. Kinnebrew, a nationally celebrated artist, designed the fish ladder when he was a resident of the Lowell area. The ladder is a work of art and is a destination in itself. Just observing the raw power and determination of these fish, as they negotiate the ladder or attempt to jump the dam in their struggle for the survival of the species, will renew your appreciation for the wonders of nature.

After they spawn, the fish will return to Lake Michigan for another year, so if you want to experience this spring ritual, don't wait too long or the opportunity will pass. I know I will be spending some time fishing steelhead or just watching the phenomenon while it lasts. See you on the river.

The kiddie tax permits children under 14 to receive \$700 in investment income — from interest, dividends or capital gains — free of tax. (The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 allows for periodic increases in this income cap.) The next \$700 is taxed at the child's rate — typically 15 percent for income and

short-term capital gains, and 10 percent for long-term capital gains.

After your child receives \$1,400 in investment income, the rest of the earnings will be taxed to your child at your rate, which can be as high as 39.6 percent. Consequently, you cannot gain significant tax advantages by shifting a large amount of your investment dollars to your child's name.

Furthermore, after your child turns 18 or 21 — the actual age depends on where you live — you will lose control of the money you gave away, because once an asset is gifted to a minor, it can't be taken back. While you might have intended that money for college, your son or daughter may decide to take a long motorcycle trip around Europe.

In addition, by saving money in your children's names, you could be jeopardizing their ability to receive financial aid.

Planning commission makes recommendation on outdoor display ordinance

A process involving a lengthy look into outdoor merchandise display culminated with the Lowell Planning Commission adopting a recommendation to make changes to the ordinance. Residents and business owners had a chance to voice their opinions on a proposed new ordinance amendment that would restrict outdoor displays at a public hearing Monday night. "There had been concerns by merchants over displaying merchandise in front of their stores," said Planning Commission chair Dan Brubaker. "Some felt different rules applied in different districts and didn't feel it was fair." In response, the Planning Commission put together a committee, lead by commissioner Gordie Barry. The committee studied the issues for several months, listening to local merchants, and finally presented its findings to the Planning Commission. The Commission, in turn, sent the findings to the city attorney, who drafted the proposed amendment change. The new amendment would allow outdoor displays as a right of the property. This means a business owner would not have to seek a permit to have such a display.

A business owner will have to follow certain guidelines, however, to have an outdoor display. In the central business district (C-2), which is mostly downtown, merchant displays cannot be located closer than eight feet to the curb line and shall not obstruct the visibility of vehicles. All merchandise in such displays shall be stored indoors at all times when the business is closed and the area for the outdoor display shall be maintained in a safe, clean, and sanitary manner. The guidelines for the general business district (C-3) are slightly different. Since those businesses are

not located downtown and generally have more room, they have a little bit more leeway. Merchant displays can be no closer than 10 feet from a lot line abutting against a public street. All displays and items shall not obstruct pedestrian right-of-way and vehicle visibility. The display must be stored within 10 feet of the front of the building when the

business is closed and displays must be maintained in a safe, clean and sanitary manner. "We trust that our committee heard the various concerns raised by those who were involved," Brubaker said. "We think this makes the regulations fair in all districts." Monday night was not the last chance residents will have

to share their thoughts on the proposed amendment. It will now go to the Lowell City Council. The council can either vote on it or set a public hearing and then vote on the amendment. Traditionally, the council sets a public hearing before making any decisions on accepting or rejecting a proposed amendment.

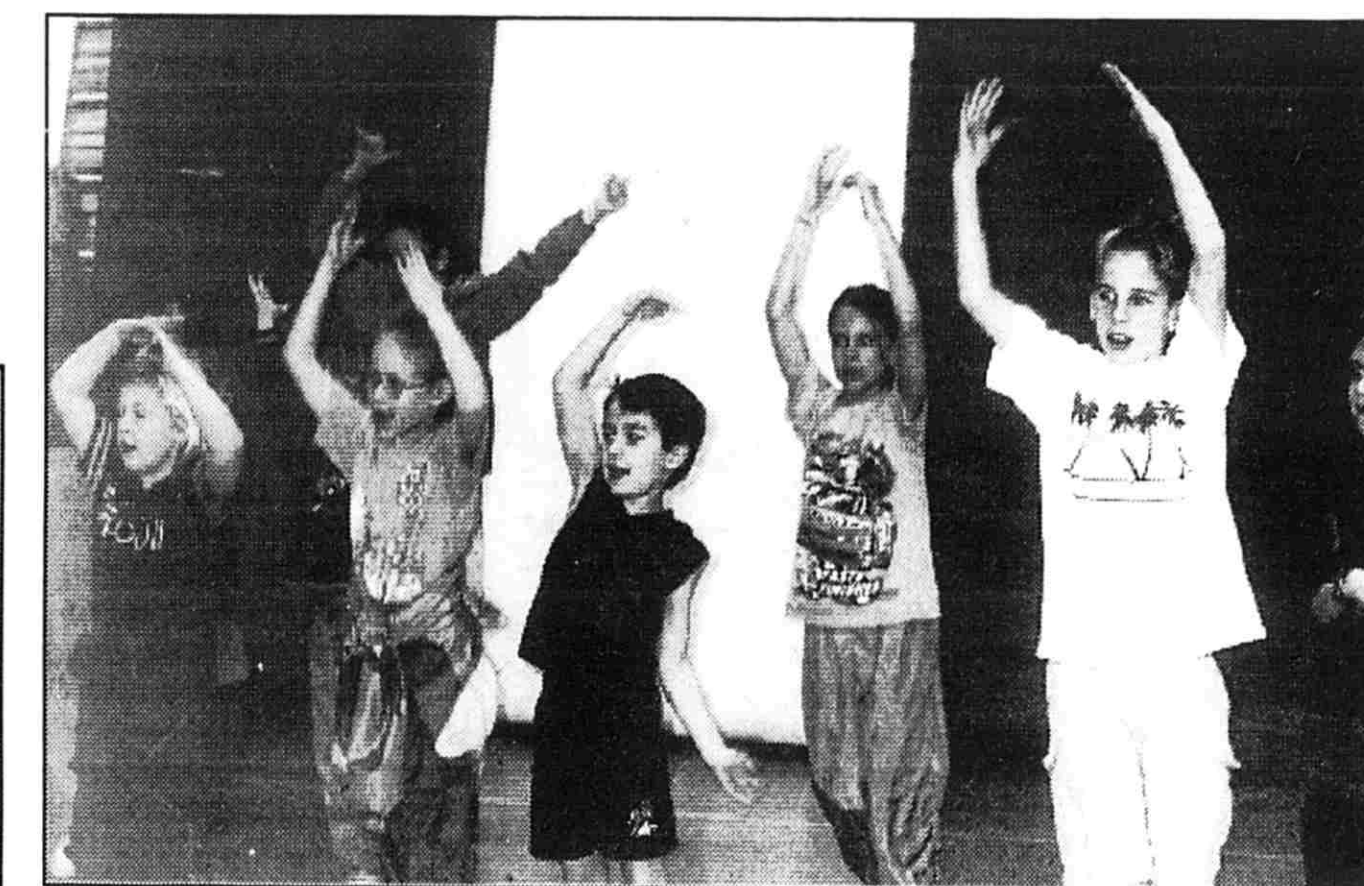

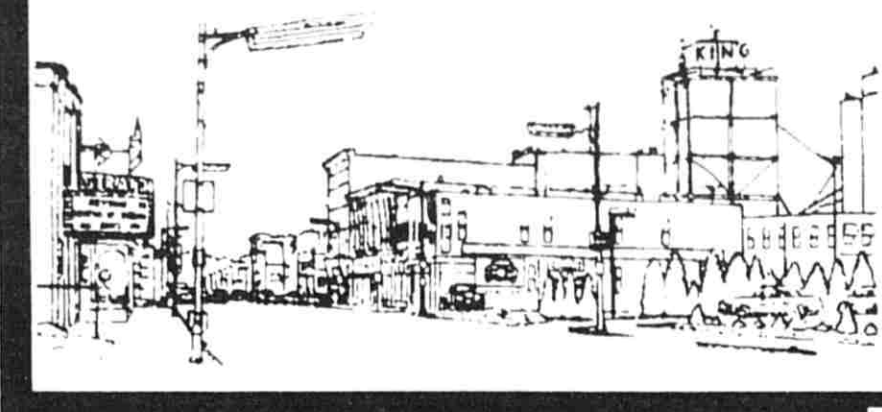

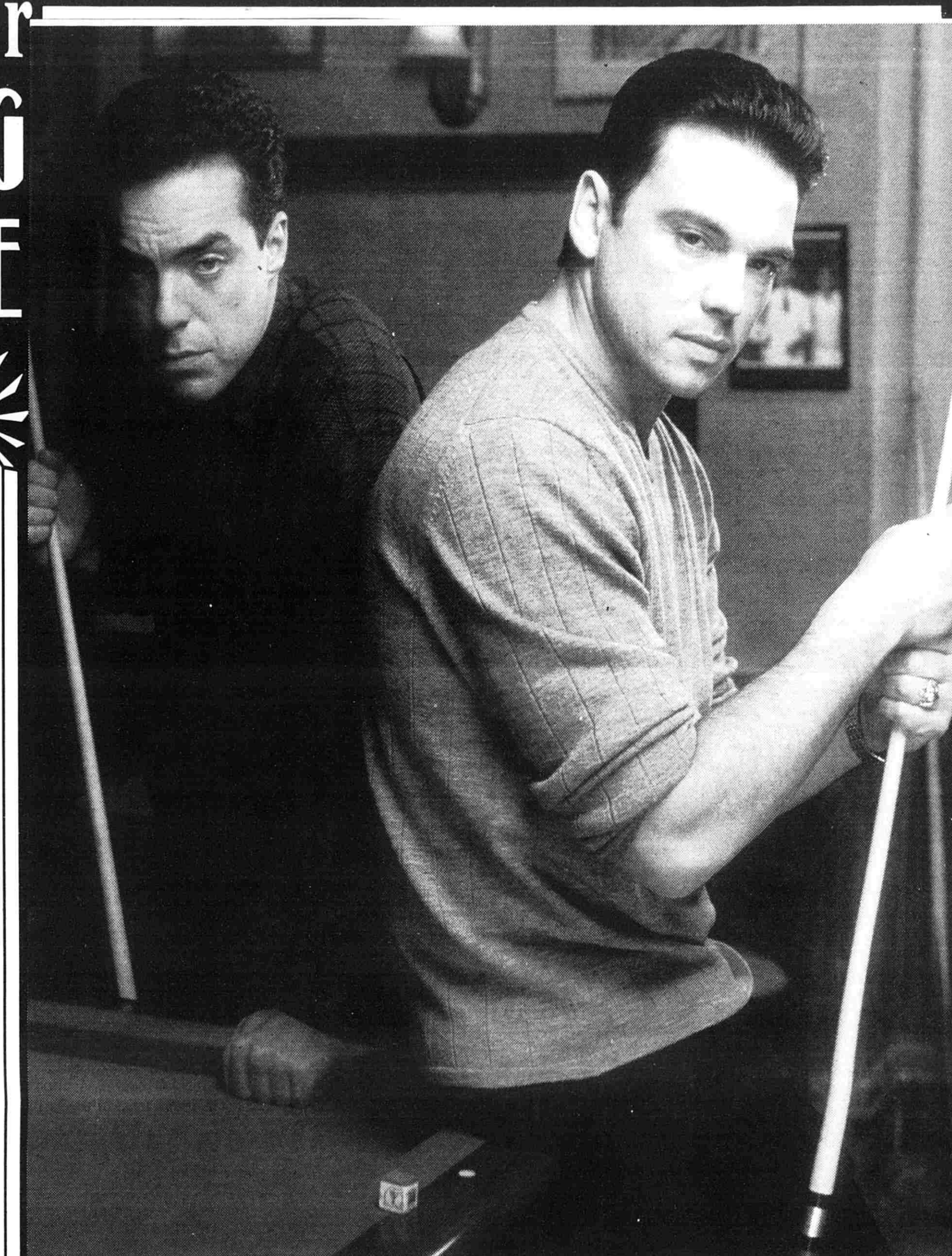

Through GRASA, Legge has built some familiarity with Lowell players. "I've worked with Jim Jastifer and Zach Stauffer," he said.

"Through my work with Lowell players through camps, I

know coming in they are tough, hard-working and athletic."

His vision for the Lowell program includes working closely with LASSO to get young kids out to the varsity games and to involve varsity soccer players with the younger kids.

"I think this helps create a family atmosphere and it also builds tradition in a program," Legge explained. "I want Lowell to be a class

soccer program with classy players representing a class organization."

Lowell athletic director Barry Hobrta said the six-person committee involved in the interview process was impressed by Legge's knowledge, integrity and enthusiasm to build a soccer program at Lowell.

Legge's hiring is contingent on board approval at its April meeting.

Hockey to return as varsity sport in 2001

Following a 12-year absence, hockey will return as a Lowell varsity sport in the 2000-01 school year.

Lowell's administration supported the request to reinstate hockey as a winter sport.

It said, however, the district could not provide the program with any financial backing at this time.

"The administration did not feel it could fund a hockey program when at this time there are other programs of equal or greater value (e.g., elementary foreign language) not being funded," Lowell athletic director Barry Hobrta said.

The hockey program has funded itself for the past two years in a club junior varsity status.

"We will continue to do that," said Jim Blair, general

manager of the Lowell hockey club. "There is no difference in cost to run a varsity hockey program as opposed to a club."

In its first year, Blair and head coach Paul Jacobus had eight Lowell players come out for the team. This year there were 15. In a cooperative team effort, five players from Caledonia also skated.

"We are excited to get hockey back as a varsity sport in the Lowell school district," Jacobus said.

A middle school and elementary study was completed to measure the sport's interest among students.

It showed there are 70 fourth-, fifth- and sixth-graders currently playing hockey. Of those, 18 are in a program such as GRAHA. The study went on to show that 220 expressed an interest in playing hockey.

The varsity hockey program will begin on a one-year probationary basis. Hobrta said he is not sure if Lowell and Caledonia will form a cooperative team (e.g., Forest Hills/Lowell swim team).

"If we have enough players of our own, we probably won't enter into a cooperative team effort with Caledonia," Hobrta explained.

It provided Tammy Sremba's one-month-old Diversified Pressure Cleaning service with a vehicle to increase its exposure.

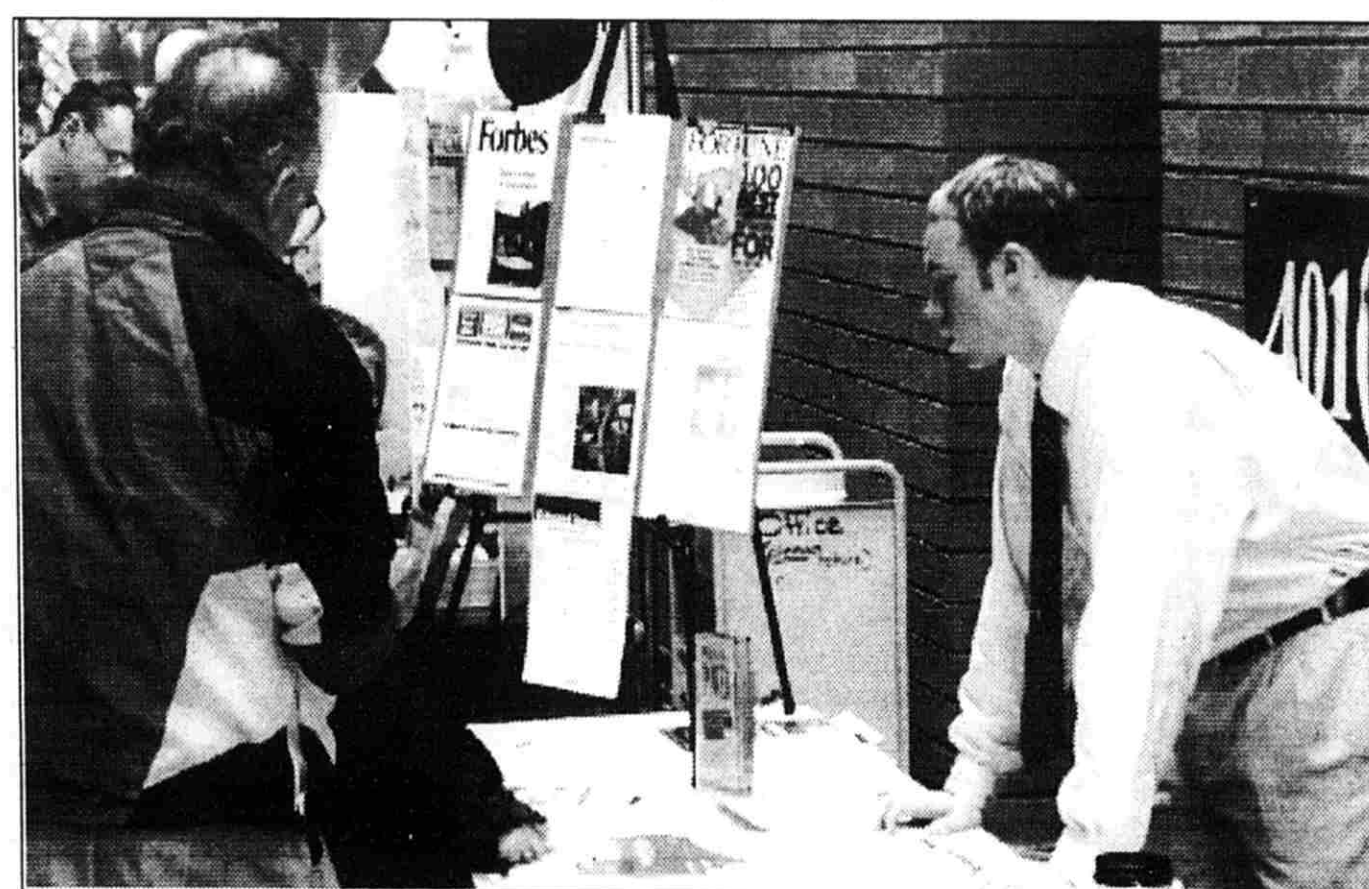
"It served as an educational tool to inform people as to what pressure cleaning is all about," Sremba explained.

Near the end of the presentation, third-grade students quickly learned and then joined Fujita in a lullaby titled "The Babysitter's Song."

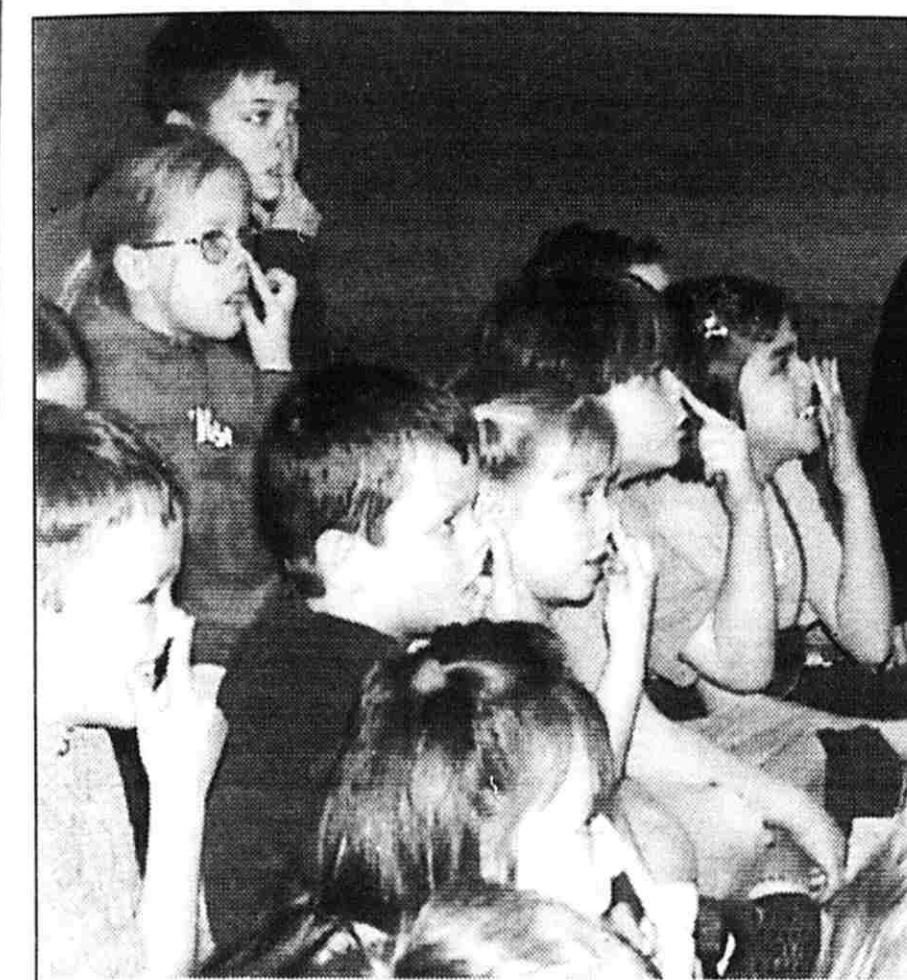
Stallings and Fujita first met in Japan in 1993. Stallings joined Fujita in presentations to Japanese students in 1997 and 1999.

dren are more polite than Japanese children. "Japanese students are so fiercely focused on studies that when they are taken to an assembly, they go wild and don't

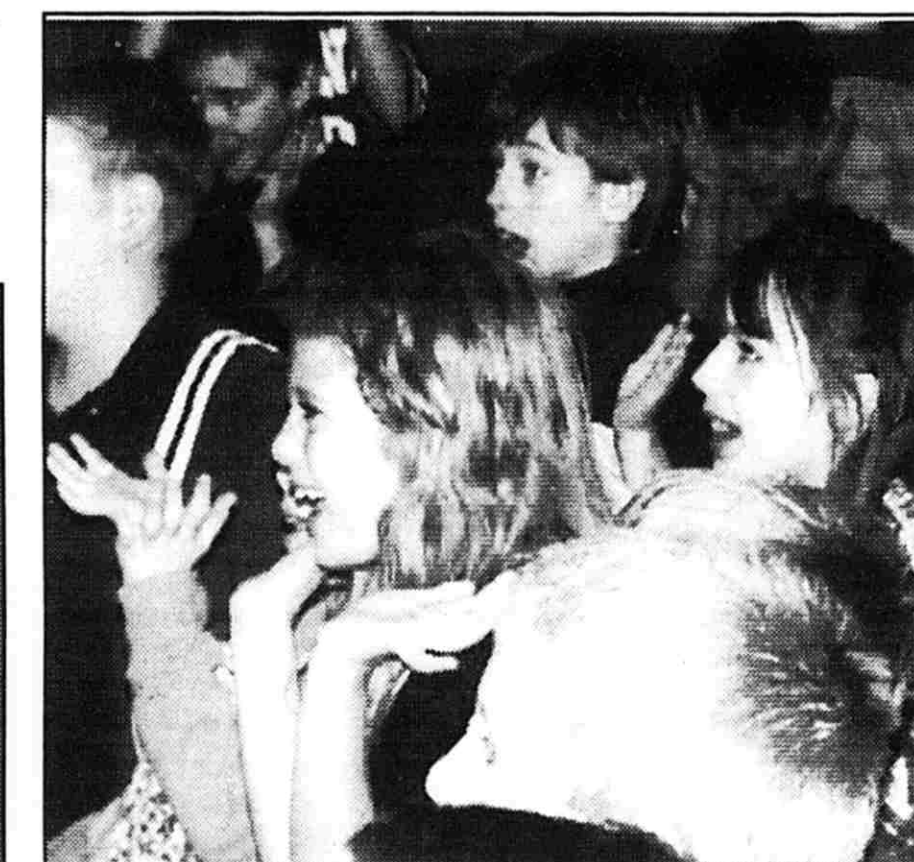
know how to act." Alto students went wild - wild over Fujita and what she had to say and share with them.

Spike strips ensure high speed chase ends before reaching city limits

It was a textbook deployment with the best possible results.

A high-speed car chase which began on U.S. 131 between Grand Rapids and Rockford came to a controlled, non-deadly stop.

The car chase took place on Tuesday, March 21. State police identified the stolen car and began in pursuit on U.S. 131. The chase led them east on M-57, then south on Lincoln Lake.

Once on Lincoln Lake the Lowell Police Department was notified. Officers Trevor Slot and Sandy Lee were alerted and deployed spike strips just north of town near the airport.

The spike strips are intended to bring a controlled deflation of the tires.

"Had the vehicle reached the city limits traveling at a high rate of speed, the results could have been deadly," said Lowell Police Chief James Valentine.

Instead, the stolen vehicle, after riding over the spikes, traveled a quarter of a mile before coming to a stop.

The driver and front seat passenger fled the car. The passenger was found later in a bed of a nearby pickup truck.

The driver, Justin Scott Speet, of Grand Rapids, made his way to Sam Noon's where he was able to start up one of the cars on the lot. His run from law ended a couple of hours later in Grand Rapids where police apprehended him following a second car chase which resulted in an injury to another person.

Two female passengers who were in the back seat crawled into the trunk from the interior during the initial chase. Approximately 30 minutes after the chase ended, police heard noises from the trunk and uncovered the two passengers.

Speet was charged with receiving and concealing stolen property of more than \$1,000 but less than \$20,000. He also was charged with two felony counts of fleeing a police officer.

The other male passenger was charged with obstruction of justice.

There was a pick-up order on one of the juvenile females. The parents of the other female were contacted.

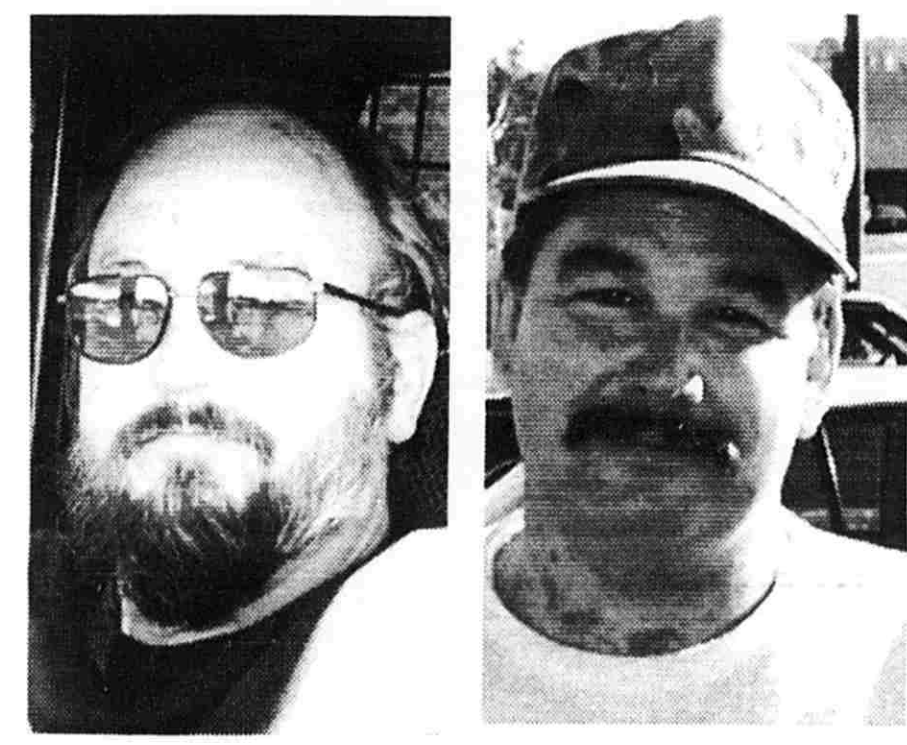

Colleges and universities that receive any federal money are typically required to ask children to contribute 35 percent of their assets for college expenses — compared to less than six percent for parents.

A possible benefit
Are there any potential benefits to shifting financial assets into your children's names? There may be — depending on your individual situation.

For example, if your estate is large enough — \$650,000 in 1999, rising to \$1 million over the next several years — to incur estate taxes, then you may be able to reduce your estate tax liability and help your future heirs by giving away some assets to your children while you are alive. You and your spouse can each make annual tax-free gifts of up to \$10,000 to any number of people you choose. (Starting in 1999, this yearly gift-tax exclusion will be adjusted for inflation.)

If you give an actual security, such as a stock, to your child, then he or she will be responsible for any capital gains taxes. If you sell the security while it's in your name, so that you can give cash, you will most likely want to increase your federal and state tax quarterly estimates so you won't incur underpayment penalties.

VanNoller begins process to open miniature golf course

A miniature golf course often requires golfers to position their golf ball around obstacles in order to get a clear shot at the hole.

Bob VanNoller, owner of Roll Away Family Fun Center, wishes to build such a course on his property at 805 E. Main.

Monday night, he took the initial steps in positioning himself for final approval on such a project.

VanNoller was successful in attaining the Lowell Planning Commission's recommendation for a variance regarding lot size and the minimum number of parking spaces required.

A miniature golf course is considered an open air business and requires a minimum of one acre. VanNoller's property contains 34,980 square feet or .8 acres.

Horatio St., while not part of the property, is a public right of way used for parking by the family fun center owner. The commissioners agreed it should be counted as part of

VanNoller's lot.

The 11,880 square foot right of way enables the owner to meet the one-acre minimum requirement.

VanNoller's property is considered unusual in that all four sides abut against streets, thus there is no property to purchase to allow for expansion.

The city ordinance states that a miniature golf course requires three parking spaces per hole (54 parking spaces for 18 holes). VanNoller's proposal calls for 36.

Because the location sets in a residential area, VanNoller said he suspects many kids will walk or ride their bikes. He added that the miniature golf season would not compete for parking space with bowling leagues which take place during the winter season.

The planning commission, based on the location and the fact that it felt three parking spaces per hole were excessive, granted a variance on the number of parking spaces.

In addressing screening, for the property, VanNoller

proposed three-foot-high hedges which would extend three feet from the six-foot-high security fence, thus preventing debris from collecting at the fence.

The planning commission set a public hearing for April 17.

LAAC receives variances for sign and front yard setback for porch

Pointing to safety and visual impact, the Lowell Area Arts Council sought variance recommendations from the Lowell Planning Commission.

The building, owned by King Milling, is located at 149 S. Hudson in an industrial zone. At best, an odd fit for an arts council. Therefore, the need for variances on the installation of a permanent sign and porch.

The needs of an arts center would be better met with a C-2 (Central Business).

LAAC proposed placing a permanent 48-square-foot canvas sign, hanging perpendicular to the building facing S. Hudson.

Industrial zoning allows for horizontal signs and they can be no bigger than 32 square feet.

The LAAC will utilize the banner as a way to recognize and tie into the aesthetic character of the downtown and also improve its visibility.

In the industrial district, a 50-foot front yard setback is required. The proposed porch would extend six feet into the Ottawa Street right of way as a necessary safety feature and handicap entrance, preventing ice build-up.

The planning commission, while approving the variances, strongly suggested that the arts council work with the Kent County Road Commission to make sure the road work planned for South Hudson will not change what the LAAC is looking to accomplish.

The industrial zoning setback requirements would not allow for such improvements.

King Milling approved the exterior improvements.

The planning commission voted to recommend variances to install the permanent banner and a front yard setback for a porch.

Amendment to the VERGENNES TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE

Notice is hereby given that Ordinance No. 2000-2 of the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance, was adopted by the Vergennes Township Board on March 20, 2000. This adoption affects the Ordinance in numerous Sections. It is summarized as follows:

Amend Section 201.202 V. Lot Area, Definitions Specific Terms - to clarify lot area and road right of way calculations.

Amend Section 201.304 (B) (14) Rural Agricultural District - Permitted Uses - to add non agricultural accessory buildings as a permitted use for clarification.

Amend Section 201.308 (B) (27) Commercial District - Special Exception Uses - to add accessory buildings as a use for clarification.

Amend Section 201.309 (B) (1) (j) Industrial District - Permitted Uses - to add accessory buildings as a permitted use for clarification.

Amend Section 201.305 (B) (7) R-1 District - Permitted Uses - to allow accessory buildings to be used for all permitted uses for clarification.

Amend section 201.3075 (B) R-L Lake Residential District - Permitted Uses - to add accessory buildings as a permitted use for clarification.

Amend section 201.306 R-2 (G) Medium Density Single Family Residential District - G. Floor Area Requirements - to add language to clarify that mobile homes can have a width of 22 feet, other dwellings 24 feet.

Amend section 201.408 (B) Driveways -- to eliminate this section which specifies setback distances from the improved area of a driveway to a side lot line.

Amend section 201.404 (B) Animal and pet restrictions in residential areas -- to amend for clarification that in R-A and R- 1 districts modifying the setbacks for an animal shelter from 150 feet to 75 feet from property lines.

Amend section 201.419 Private Stables -- to amend for clarification in districts where animals are permitted, that the animal shelter setback change from 150 feet to 75 feet from property lines.

Amend section 201.202 Definitions Specific Terms - by adding the following definition: 201.202 (A) (1) Accessory Building, Minor: A minor accessory building shall mean an accessory building as defined herein with a gross floor area of not more than two hundred (200) square feet and a maximum height of twelve (12) feet.

Amend section 201.402 (A) Accessory buildings, construction, timing and location limitations -- to add language that a bond is to be provided in order to construct an accessory building before the principal building and describing a 10 foot setback for accessory buildings from a principal building

Amend further section 201.402 (A) -- to add language that accessory buildings must be stick built or the equivalent building construction. It does not allow accessory buildings to be converted from old mobile homes, semi-trailers, tanks and other objects but excepting temporary tools sheds.

Amend further section 201.402 (C) -- to add language allowing for minor accessory buildings; 2 allowed per lot, a setback for rear and side yards of 5 feet, none allowed in the front yard and a sketch of yard placement to be provided.

Amend further section 201.402 (D) -- to add language that exempts school bus stop structures if they are not located in the road right of way, or a permit from the Road Commission must be obtained.

The complete text of Ordinance 2000-2 is on file and posted at the township office, located at 10381 Bailey Dr., Lowell, and copies are available during regular business hours. The offices are open Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

This ordinance shall become effective eight (8) days after publication unless a notice of intent to file referendum is filed within such time and, if so, then this ordinance shall take effect at such time as is provided by MCLA 125.282 as amended.
