# District favors smaller, intimate elementary environment 

-••• The Lowell School Board may give preliminary indication at its April 10 meeting as to which proposed construction option it believes will best meet this request. By Thaddeus J. KrausLowell Ledger Editor

After two-and-a-half years of work from the demographics committee and input from community forums, it appears the Lowell School Board is ready totake the next step - making a final decision as to which building option it will choose to deal with student growth.

The board will take another look at all three options at its April 10th meeting. "It may give an indication then as to which way it's leaning," said Lowell Area Schools Superintendent Bert Bleke. A final decision from the board, however, is not expected until May

Having studied the issue for a number of years now, the Lowell superintendent says it shows that the district has been proactive in its approach.
"Most things don't get studied for two-and-a-half years. We did not want to jump to a decision that the district would regret down the oad," Bleke explains

All the work and input the district has received by citizens indicates support for smaller, strategically placed neighborhood elementary chools.

Bleke noted in the school's newsletter (Directions) that support is based on number of issues

* A smaller, more intimate environment for students at their earliest years in school (K-4).

A reduction of time ounger students need to spend on buses and subsequently reduce transportation costs.

A general agreement that buildings housing $\mathrm{K}-4$ $5-6,7-8$ and $9-12$ would sup port quality education for all ages.

The plan is economically feasible, as elementary schools are the least expen sive to build and manage over the years.

* It is the option that pro vides the best long-term flexibility, in that it can be adapted quite easily to changing growth patterns in the dis trict.

Options three and eigh address two new elementary buildings in phase I of construction.

The board's final decision in May will also include an election date (most likely September).

Between May and the election date, the Lowell superintendent said the district would continue to inform residents about the issues.

Road commission gets Township's approval on gravel pit work
-•• Processing work on McPherson is expected to begin immediately with work at the Tower pit starting in the fall.

Residents on Cumberland Ave. can expect to be affected a little when the Kent County Road Commission processes 40,000 cubic yards of gravel ater this summer.

The road commission atained a special use permit from Vergennes Township to from Vergennes Township to process and store gravel at the
Helmus pit (east side of

Cumberland and north of Foreman Street) and the Tower pit (north side of McPherson Street east of the Flat River). Both pits are owned by the road commission.

The Helmus pit
100 -acre pare pit sits on a
100-acre parcel, however
just three of those acres. The Tower pit is situated on 35 acres with processing being done on five of those acres.

Neither pithashad gravel processed in the 20 years since the ordinance requiring a special use permit was adopted

The permit for both pits is 60 days. It allows for processing to take place from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday. The commission said it would not, however, process on Saturday.

The township's granting of a special use permit was
contingent on the commission not processing from the Helmus site until school starts next fall because of its proximity to the homes. There are homes along the north and west sides of Cumberland and directly south of the Fore man Farms Development

The commission will begin processing gravel on McPherson immediately since there are no homes in close proximity.

The 40.000 cubic yards of gravel. which will be stored at each pit. will be used to repair and build gravel
