

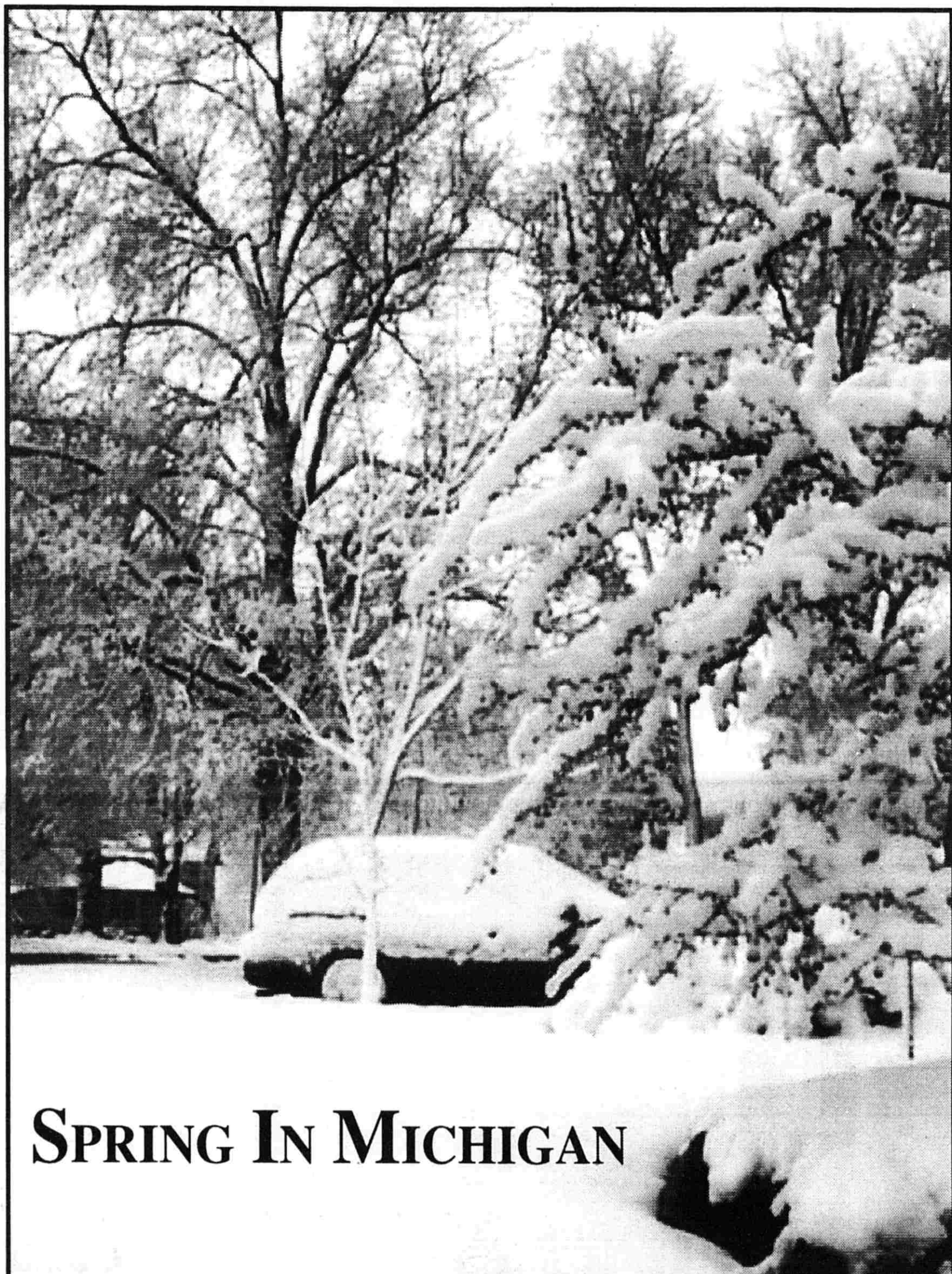

Morlock's new title matches responsibilities of past 12 years

When Betty Morlock came into work Tuesday morning, she had one more task to add to her list of things to do: order herself a new nameplate.

That's because at Monday night's Lowell City Council meeting, Morlock was named Lowell's new city clerk.

"I would just like to say a few words about this," said City Manager David Pasquale. "Betty has been with the city for more than 12 years. She has been excellent and is very worthy of such a title."

Lowell was one of the few remaining cities in Kent County whose city manager also served as its city clerk. Morlock said when she came to the city 12 years ago, it was one of her personal goals to one day serve as the city clerk.

"I can understand why a city would not want to appoint someone directly into the position," Morlock said, adding that qualified candidates are not always ready to tackle the way a city does its business.

Morlock admits she didn't have much experience when it came to dealing with city affairs. Since becoming the deputy city clerk in February of 1988, however, she has demonstrated her ability to perform as city clerk.

"Betty does take good care of us during all those mayor exchange days and other things," said Councilmember Jeanne Shores.

Both Mayor Mike Blough and former mayor Bill Thomas can attest to Morlock's efficiency in making sure that every document needing a signature gets it.

Morlock also has been carrying out many of the responsibilities as city clerk including taking minutes for the City Council, Planning Commission, and various boards as needed. She has overseen elections and kept records.

She has attended numerous training sessions and has earned the title of Certified Municipal Clerk from the International Institutes of Municipal Clerks in 1997. In addition, Morlock has been an active volunteer serving as president of

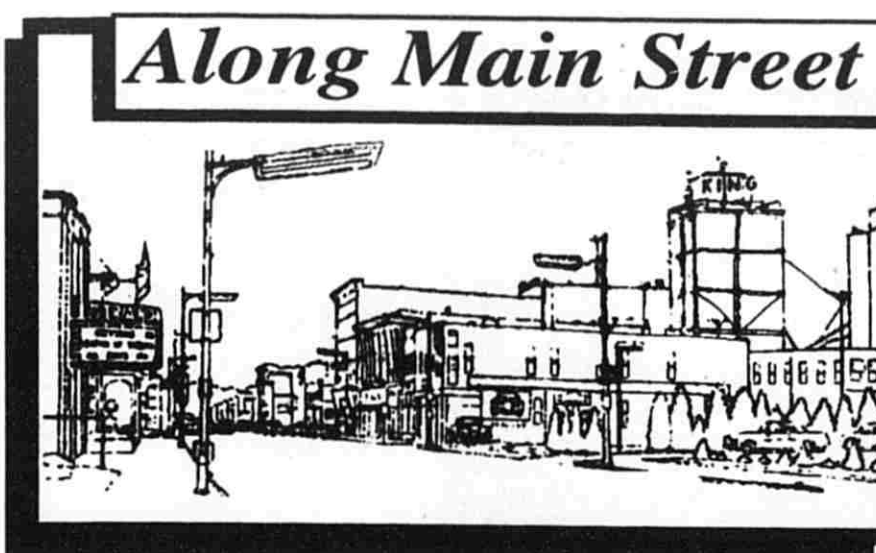
Class reunion planned for Class of '90

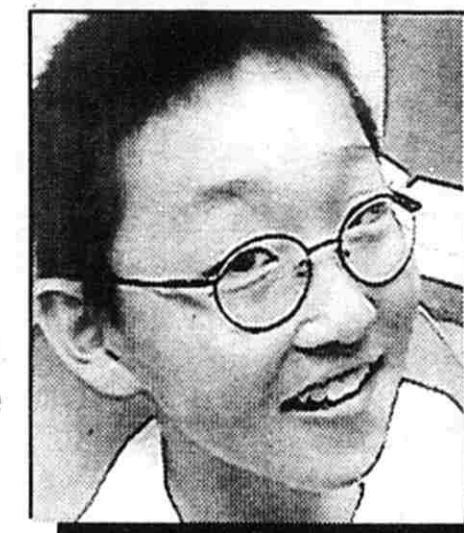

Reflections

Of Faith

I love being a spectator. I was in front of the screen when the Spartans won the Division 1 men's national title. I was there when the Calvin Knights won their Division 3 national title. Michigan was a great state to be in for men's college basketball this year. I was even in the stands for a couple of the Calvin games.

Being a spectator is great. I get to watch while someone does the work. I get to share in the fun, even though I don't even break a sweat. When a player misses a shot, I get to say, "What's with him, anyway?" When the referees blow a call, I think, "They must be blind." When the team isn't running any good plays, I blame the coach.

What if suddenly someone had tapped me on the shoulder and said, "You're going in for Cleaves." Or, "The referee obviously left his glasses home so it's your job now." Or, "Izzy isn't doing so hot; you take over." Well, the Spartans would have lost for sure; the refereeing would have really smelled; and the coaching would have disappeared entirely. There's a good reason why I'm only a spectator.

It's like Simon in Mark 15:21. "A certain man from Cyrene, Simon, the father of Alexander and Rufus, was passing by on his way in from the country, and they forced him to carry the cross." Cyrene is probably the place known as Tripoli today. Simon was in Jerusalem at the time of the Passover. As he was passing by, the soldiers picked him to carry the cross. They relieved Jesus of the burden and placed it on a spectator.

is often something like, "Poor guy. Imagine having to bear that much weight. Imagine having to go through what He went through. So I sort of watch Him go by, as if I were an innocent bystander, as if the weight He bore were not the weight of my own sin. I applaud Him and think, "I'm glad it's not me."

And then, like Simon, it's as if there were a soldier tapping me on the shoulder, and before I know it, I am no longer a spectator. I find myself thrust into doing things that I would have never chosen for myself. It happens when, through faith, I find that Jesus is no longer a story, but a real Savior and Lord. He confronts me with my habit of being only a spectator.

Moving from the sidelines into the action comes out in different ways for different people. You see them moving from the stands onto the court by re-prioritizing their use of time and money. You might even see them in church, in the choir, teaching a Bible Study, bringing meals to people who are unable to cook for themselves, volunteering at Flat River Outreach. You see them changing, because a very real Jesus is making a difference in their lives.

For this type of person it's no longer about him or her. It's about Jesus. It's no longer about his time, her energy, his money, her body. It's about the time, energy, money, and bodies that Jesus has given them to serve Him. It's about breaking a sweat ourselves, rather than watching while others do it.

I feel like that sometimes. I read the Bible stories, but only as a spectator. In my mind's eye I see Jesus carrying the cross, but it's easy for me to only cheer. I boo Pilate, the Jewish leaders, and soldiers, but all from the sidelines. Then suddenly I feel like God has thrust me into action.

Jesus clearly expects me to get involved, to move from the stands onto the court floor. He says, in Mark 8:34, "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." I think that means getting involved in some practical ways. We want the bigger house or newer car, but then we see Jesus carrying that awful load, so we deny ourselves what we want but do not need so that we can make a donation to Flat River Outreach Ministries, or our church, or some other organization that helps hungry people. We want to spend more time and energy on ourselves, but the sight of Jesus and His load inspires us to deny ourselves so that we can be better parents or spouses.

The story of Jesus on His way to the cross makes me do a lot of reflecting. Jesus walks by, bearing the weight of the cross, and even worse, the weight of my sin and guilt. He's probably sweating, stooped over, and dragging His feet. My initial reaction

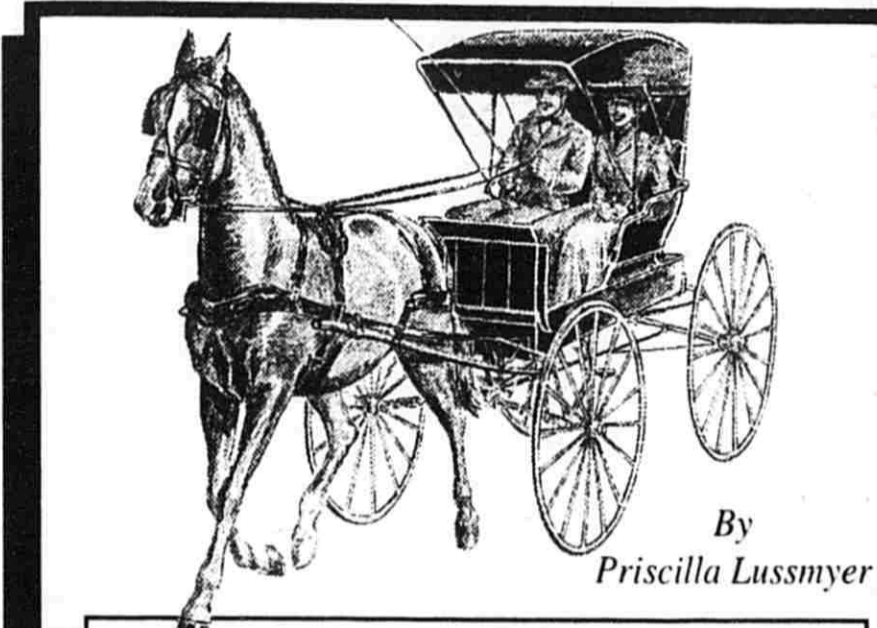

Ledger Entries of 125, 100, 75, 50 & 25 Years Ago

125 YEARS THE WEEKLY JOURNAL APRIL 14, 1875

The Knots of Unity appears to be the social group of favor. They will have a dancing party for members only on the 16th, says the "Commander of Double Double Knots."

The new marshal says Ionia's streets and yards are cleaner than Lowell's.

Charges of cruelty to prisoners at Jackson are investigated by the legislature.

The long legislative session has some of the farmers among them wondering if they'll be home in time for spring planting.

W.W. Hatch was elected vice president of the State Millers Association in Detroit last Thursday, so will attend the national meeting in St. Louis.

100 YEARS THE LOWELL LEDGER APRIL 12, 1900

The Island Park race track ground is rented by the base ball team, which proposes Saturday games there this summer. New uniforms may be bought if enough money is raised.

The new rail line is having trouble with slow and missed deliveries, especially serious with perishable foods.

Sheep-killing dogs are on the loose again at Cannonsburg—10 from one flock Saturday night.

Kent County is paying for bridge-building now and Lowell, after building three of its own, is more than peevish. Pratt Lake's annual sheep-shearing festival will be held at the Grange Hall April 28.

75 YEARS THE LOWELL LEDGER AND THE ALTO SOLO APRIL 16, 1925

The Prince of Wales is engaged to Martha, niece of the King of Sweden.

The state Department of Conservation closes many Kent County creeks to fishing for five years, including Honey, Hilton, Kenyon, Spring and Whitney creeks in townships near Lowell.

The Charles W. Clark Post of the American Legion bought the Speaker property on Main Street last July for \$1,000 and sold it to the Mutual Oil Company for a "modern oil station" this month at a profit of \$1,775.

50 YEARS THE LOWELL LEDGER APRIL 13, 1950

Census taker Dorothy Lind sends a boy in hip boots to a flooded home to call the resident to the door, then shouts the questions across the water.

The spring breakup prompts township annual meetings to get serious about improving roads.

Rep. Gerald R. Ford reports the Hoover Commission's fact-finding on inefficiencies in government offices. One short request for a specific piece of equipment from the army went across nine desks and took three weeks to "process."

A rubbish fire that burns 25 acres before being put out by three fire departments is another case in point for the new Michigan fire permit law.

25 YEARS LOWELL LEDGER AND SUBURBAN LIFE APRIL 10, 1975

Alto's new Recreation Center has the grand opening. It will cater to all ages.

The new generic drug law, first in the nation, goes into effect and estimates say it will save consumers millions of dollars.

The state's proposal to eliminate parking on one side of Main Street is countered by the City Council with a request to widen M-21 to four lanes from Alden Nash east.

The township annual meetings are "calm, quiet, short, agreeable" and apparently attended by few. About a foot of snow fell April 2.

PERIPHERAL ARTERIAL DISEASE

Peripheral arterial disease refers to a problem with blood flow in the arterial system. Arteries carry blood to the muscles and organs of the body, while veins return the blood to the heart. When arteries become diseased, they become narrowed or even blocked completely. Atherosclerosis is the term used to describe how arteries become blocked by the accumulation of fatty deposits.

When atherosclerosis affects the arteries in the legs, the problem is called peripheral arterial disease (PAD). Factors which can lead to PAD include smoking, high blood pressure, elevated cholesterol and diabetes.

PAD reduces blood flow to the muscles and tissues in the legs, resulting in pain in the calves, legs or buttocks with walking. The pain tends to intensify with walking a greater distance. This pain is called claudication.

PAD is usually diagnosed with a doppler (ultrasound) test. If PAD is confirmed, conservative therapy involves diet, exercise, and sometimes medication. Patients with PAD must stop smoking or the disease will continue to progress. If conservative therapy fails, surgery may be necessary to improve the blood flow to the legs.



BOOK REVIEW

The prologue of a book is my first encounter with many adult books. Children's books, picture books especially, grab my attention by their introduction on the inside front piece and with its art.

Richard Paul Evans' novels get my attention by having on the cover a small picture of something the book is about. The symbol may only be mentioned a couple of times but it makes its appearance intuitively throughout the book. One small meaningful object!

Evans newest novel, *The Looking Glass*, has a picture of a silver, ornate handmirror on the front. It's always enough to get me wondering where he's going to go with the object. The prologue next is another hint - an introduction to the adventure ahead of me, plus there is sometimes some intriguing philosophy woven into the author's sketch of the story. I am always eager to mull over that part.

In this prologue Evans richly writes: "Through the course of my own life I have come to believe that life is not gifted by the sweep of a clock's hand or the change of a season, but rather, experientially, each experience laid upon the previous, delivering us to a loftier plane. Perhaps, this best describes my concept of God - the architect of that ascent and the divine, unseen wind that propels us through the uncharted waters of our own destiny."

But salvation, spiritual or otherwise, is not a solitary matter and along such journeys there are companions placed along our travels and travails, fellow sojourners who forever alter our paths and sometimes carry us when we are too weary to carry ourselves. This is the story of such providence.

And from these wise words come the main characters, Quay McGandley, a woman from Ireland, and Hunter Bell, a Presbyterian minister turned prospector and gambler. The travels, travails and the sojourners are woven into a strong, adventurous and romantic story. This is not the fluff of love, but the perseverance and dedication of two very separate people coming together. We meet them in a looking glass of sorts.

I sensed a different maturity in Evans in this writing. But I expect that of him. He leaves his heart on anything he writes - to me that is his symbol: A strong, tender heart that matures in some manner as he gains experience. May it always be so with him.

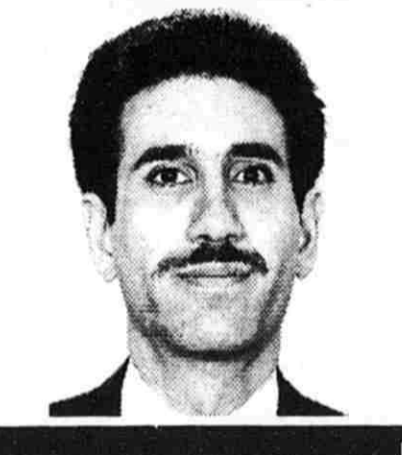
to the 80 kids who participated, dedicating their time and efforts to raise funds for MDA's local patient service programs.

LEGAL EASE

DEAR JONATHAN: Is it unfair of me to require that upon my death my assets are to be divided equally among only my surviving children. In other words, if a child were to predecease me, then his or her share would revert to my surviving children and my deceased child's children would end up getting nothing. I have been struggling with this issue for some time now and although I do not want to cut out my grandchildren, I really do not want a deceased child's spouse to have access to my money. Am I being too harsh?

JONATHAN SAYS: I can't answer whether you are being too harsh, because I do not know your family or your family dynamics. However, it would seem to me that you are being a bit extreme if you are willing to cut out your grandchildren just to avoid the spouse of a deceased child from having any involvement with your assets.

If you want to provide for your grandchildren but want to minimize a deceased child's spouse's access to those assets, you can set up a living trust naming your children as the

primary beneficiaries, with a deceased child's children as the alternate beneficiaries of that child's share. You can further provide that if those deceased child's children (your grandchildren) are minors, that their respective shares of the trust be held on their behalf in trust until they reach a certain age or ages. For instance, you could provide that a grandchild is not to receive mandatory distributions of his or her share of the trust until he or she reaches the age of 22 or at whatever other age or ages you deem appropriate. You can also spread the distributions out over several years. For instance, you can provide that so much is to be distributed to a grandchild at age 25, so much at age 30 and the balance at age 35. In the meantime, you could provide that discretionary distributions can be made on behalf of your grandchildren for "growing up" expenses, i.e., health, support and educational needs. By setting up a trust and including these types of provisions, you circumvent a deceased child's spouse's access to your trust assets except in those cases where money is distributed to a grandchild who is a minor, i.e., under the age of 18. Even in those situations, however, you could require that the trustee pay the grandchild's expenses directly, if you are concerned that a grandchild's parent would somehow mismanage those funds if he or she came in contact with that money.

You should consult with an estate planning attorney to more fully examine how a living trust can be provided to satisfy your concerns. Good luck.

Item #1. ORDINANCE RATIFYING THE STATE CONSTRUCTION CODE AND ITS ENFORCEMENT - PUBLIC HEARING AND RESOLUTION TO APPROVE THE MICHIGAN ELECTRICAL CODE. As noted in City Attorney Richard Wendt's letter, Public Act 245 of 1999 has required the publishing of new building, electric, plumbing and mechanical codes. The Act necessitates the City to elect to enforce each individual code or defer to State or County enforcement. The proposed ordinance designates the City assuming responsibility for administering and enforcing the State Construction Code as well as all accompanying trades. Resolutions identifying each individual code will be provided for adoption.

Mayor Blough questioned the reason and action for the code. City Manager Pasquale responded in order to carry out building inspection, a building code must be adopted. He noted the City has used the State Construction Code for over ten years. The new public act requires the City ratify this and subsequent codes. Pasquale stated this is the same code as in previous years and will not have an immediate effect on builders who have utilized the State Construction Code.

Blough referred to Wendt's letter, which advocates the Council to consider an adoption of the ordinance amendment before considering the resolution. Wendt refers to the adoption of the ordinance, which is required by act. This will eliminate potential conflicts and inconsistencies within the City Code.

IT WAS MOVED BY QUADA and seconded by GREEN to close the public hearing and adopt the ordinance ratifying the State Construction Code and its enforcement.

Blough noted the amended section would read as follows:

Section 7-26 State Construction Code adopted:

Pursuant to the State Construction Code Act of 1972, Act No. 230 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1972 (MCL 125.1501, et seq.; MSA 5.2949(1), et seq.), as amended specifically by Act 245 of Michigan of 1999, the City hereby adopts and assumes responsibility for administering and enforcing the state construction code including the state building code, the Michigan Electrical Code, the state mechanical code, and the state plumbing code, and the city is hereby designated the enforcing agency to enforce the provisions of such codes within its political boundaries.

Item #2. ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS

A. 149 S. Hudson - Lowell Area Arts Council - variances to install permanent banner and front yard setback for porch - set public hearing date (4/10). Zoning Board of Appeals Chairman Myers noted the Planning Commission would review this matter and provide an opinion after the meeting held on March 27, 2000.

Myers stated the Lowell Area Arts Council wishes to extend the porch six feet from the building, over the entrance facing Ottawa Street. The Arts Council also wishes to install a banner as a permanent sign.

IT WAS MOVED BY QUADA and seconded by GREEN to set a public hearing for April 10, 2000 to consider variances submitted by the Lowell Area Arts Council for the installation of a permanent banner and front yard setback for a porch at 149 S. Hudson.

Item #3. PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF FILTER MEDIA AT THE WATER TREATMENT PLANT. As part of the overall refurbishing of the Water Treatment Plant Filter Room, bids were received to purchase and install the filter media (sand, gravel and anthracite). The following bids were submitted:

After reviewing the bids, WTP Superintendent George Regan recommended Anthrafilter, Inc. to carry out the purchase and installation of the filter media for \$14,538.71, as allocated from the Water Fund.

Councilmember Myers questioned if Regan had any experiences with Anthrafilter, Inc. Regan responded no. However, he contacted the Michigan Health Department who was familiar with the company and responded positively.

Regan believed Service Contracting Corporation was also qualified to do the job. However, the bid submitted was \$300 more.

Myers asked if the bid from All Service Contracting Corporation included the installation. Regan responded yes. He noted City employees could do the installation. However, it would be extremely difficult and time consuming and tie up the Department of Public Works for approximately one week.

Blough questioned how long ago the original filter media had been installed. Regan responded approximately 23 years. He noted the normal life expectancy for a filter is ten to fifteen years.

IT WAS MOVED BY QUADA and seconded by GREEN to accept the low bid of \$14,538.71 from Anthrafilter Inc. for the purchase and installation of filter media at the Water Treatment Plant.

Item #4. ENGINEERING SERVICES FOR SOUTH HUDSON STREET WATER MAIN. In coordination with upcoming road reconstruction, the installation of an 8 inch water main extending from the railroad tracks to Grand Street (approximately 1100 feet) on South Hudson is planned. The City staff recommends engineering services with Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr and Huber (FTC&H) at a cost not to exceed \$5,865 as allocated from the Water Fund. The reasons to select Fishbeck included: (a) presently engineering for the Flat River water main crossing project (b) has assisted the City in securing a railroad permit for the main installation and (c) familiar with the project, can expedite since there is a short time frame to coordinate with the Road Commission for the road construction.

Councilmember Myers asked if the City had reviewed other bids or proposals. City Manager Pasquale had interviewed a number of firms for the water main river crossing project and FTC&H was selected. The City is concerned because there is a short time frame available to carry out the project.

Blough asked DPW Director DesJarden if this bid, for the scope of work, was equivalent to bids received for similar projects. DesJarden responded the price was average. He noted FTC&H helped the City receive a permit from Mid Michigan Railroad. Also there was already an existing project between M21 and the track. DesJarden noted the City staff is very comfortable with the firm.

Blough questioned the total cost of the project. Pasquale responded approximately \$60,000.

IT WAS MOVED BY QUADA and seconded by MYERS to waive the standard bid procedure in order to select Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr and Huber to perform engineering services for the South Hudson Street water main.

Item #5. SOUTH HUDSON STREET RIGHT OF WAY AGREEMENT WITH KENT COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION. As part of the South Hudson Street reconstruction project, seven feet of right of way is necessary to be secured from the Public Works Garage and Fire Station properties to the Road Commission to better align the road. A proposal submitted by the Road Commission would have:

- The City donate this right of way to the KCRC (value estimated at \$10,062 based on \$1.50 per square foot).
- In turn, the Road Commission will remove old sidewalk on the west side of South Hudson and replace it with a new five foot wide concrete walk. As noted, approximately 70% of the sidewalk would not have to be replaced because of the construction. The cost to the Road Commission is \$11,200.
- The Road Commission will replace the shrubbery in front of the Fire Station as well as the parking lot light. The City will relocate the sprinkling system.

DPW Director Dan DesJarden and Pasquale recommended the Council approve this agreement. The project is planned to start in late August (after the wheat harvest, 4-H Fair and Rodeo).

Councilmember Myers questioned if traffic would be detoured. Pasquale responded yes. The traffic would be re-routed to Division Street. The road would be reconstructed from the railroad tracks to the bridge. There will be a turn lane, along with curb and gutter, primarily new sidewalks and a water main installation. The south side of the bridge will also be upgraded. Pasquale noted the railroad tracks would be improved with a rubberized surface.

Councilmember Quada said there is intent to bore and jack with the water main under the tracks. He questioned if this was necessary if the crossing was torn out. DesJarden responded yes.

Quada questioned the number of lanes proposed. Pasquale responded three.

Myers asked how long the construction would last. Pasquale responded approximately twelve weeks.

Pasquale noted approximately 80% of the job would be paid through federal funds and completed no later than October.

Quada inquired what plans were in place for the fire service during the construction period. DesJarden responded a plan is still being considered. He was unsure if the street would be completely shut down or just one block at a time.

Myers noted a traffic light may need to be installed at Division St.

IT WAS MOVED BY MYERS and seconded by QUADA to approve the right of way agreement with Kent County Road Commission for the South Hudson Street reconstruction project as proposed.

Item #6. PURCHASE OF NEW POWER UNIT FOR THE HURST TOOL. As noted in Fire Chief Frank Martin's memo dated March 15, 2000, the power unit in the Hurst Tool (Jaws of Life) had been in need of replacement. He had noted the only distributor of Hurst equipment in Michigan is Apollo Fire Equipment. Their price for the new power unit is \$4,400. Because the existing unit is old, it has no trade-in value. The Department will tune up the old unit and use it as a spare.

Chief Martin recommended the Council approve the purchase of a new power unit for the Hurst Tool from Apollo Equipment at a cost of \$4,400.

Councilmember Myers questioned if any new features were added to the updated model. Martin responded two tools could be hooked up at the same time, whereas the old unit only allowed one.

Martin noted the City purchased the old unit approximately 25 years ago for \$8,500. To replace the entire unit today, with all the tools, would cost \$25,000. Martin said the tools are in good condition.

Mayor Blough asked if the entire Fire Department knows how to operate the machine. Martin responded yes.

Blough questioned how often the unit is used. Martin responded a few times a month. He explained the unit is used to open car doors and allows the steering wheel to be rolled out of the way if people are trapped. It can also be used to cut a roof off a car, if needed.

IT WAS MOVED BY GREEN and seconded by QUADA to purchase a new power unit for the Hurst Tool from Apollo Fire Equipment for \$4,400.

Item #7. PROPERTY TAX ADMINISTRATION SYSTEM (PTAS) UPGRADE PROJECT-CONSIDERATION OF AGREEMENT WITH KENT COUNTY. City Manager Pasquale requested this item be deferred until Assistant County Administrator Alan Vanderberg was present.

Pasquale noted each governmental unit within Kent County is reviewing the same upgrade in the Property Tax Administration system. He felt it was important the Council listen to Vanderberg.

By general consensus, the Council agreed to defer this item until the end of the meeting.

Item #8. DISCUSSION REGARDING SENIOR CITIZEN PARK. Councilmember Quada requested discussion on the appropriateness of maintaining the Senior Citizen Park (north side of East Main between Tummino law office and Lowell Auto Body). He suggested the possibility of moving the fixtures to another site. Quada believed the area had outgrown its usefulness as park property. He wanted the Council to consider relocating the plaque to a more appropriate spot. The parcel could then be placed for a better land use.

Pasquale stated the Planning Commission would have to review the proposal and remove the park from the master plan. He noted if this happened, the City would have the opportunity to do what they wish, including selling the parcel.

IT WAS MOVED BY QUADA and seconded by GREEN to request the Planning Commission review the possibility of removing the Senior Citizen Park from the master plan.

Mayor Blough agreed with Quada. He said the City is considering improvements to the block and the park does not receive recognition. Pasquale stated there may be potential consequences with the Historic District Commission.

Quada noted the property has not been used for a period of time and did not remember when the area received significant use.

Green noted the park was developed when the Senior Neighbors Center was located in the downtown area. The drugstore had also been near the park.

The Parks and Recreation Commission as well as the Downtown Historic District Commission will be asked to comment.

MOTION CARRIED.

Item #9. MONTHLY REPORTS. Councilmember Quada said he resigned from the Downtown Development Authority Board last November. He questioned why his name continues to appear in the minutes from the meetings. Pasquale responded a letter of resignation needs to be received.

Councilmember Myers commented on the building permits. He noted it is the slow season for building and there is still \$120,000 worth of permits in residential areas and approximately \$900,000 for commercial.

Item #10. CITIZEN COMMENTS. Leo Pfaller, 810 Bowes Rd., stated much work was done to connect Ridgeview and Gee Drives, while he served on the Council. He noted the only item accomplished was the water main installation. He asked if this could be reviewed again. Pfaller believed this would elevate much traffic from town. He said the City has already purchased the property and has all of the rights of way.

Blough said there have been a few proposed developments in the area. Over the last couple of years, the concept of a connector to Gee Drive has been utilized. Pasquale stated another developer is interested in building who recognizes a significant portion of the property behind Family Fare is not buildable due to wetlands. Pasquale thought plans would be submitted soon. He added a new road is expensive and the City would have to wait and determine if the developer would participate in the cost.

Quada suggested the expenses of such a project be placed on the agenda for the May 1, 2000 City Council meeting. Green stated the original amounts may still be available and inflation rates could simply be added for an estimate.

James Hall, 724 N. Monroe, questioned if placing the overhead electrical underground on S. Hudson had been discussed. He also inquired if the City had considered the installation of streetlights in the area. Hall believed this would be an appropriate time for such work to be completed. Pasquale responded the City would desire to have conduit installed regardless. There also has been a brief discussion with Light and Power concerning the streetlights.

Item #11. COUNCIL COMMENTS. Councilmember Green received appreciation from residents for televising the City Council meetings once again. Green thanked Lowell Cable TV for providing this service. He explained this service was originally provided through volunteers, Linda Taber and Jeff Cady. Green thanked these individuals for their time spent and suggested a letter of appreciation be sent. By general consensus, the Council agreed.

Councilmember Quada found the discussions about the filters at the Water Treatment Plant and the "Jaws of Life" for the Fire Department interesting. He believed the discussion spoke highly of these departments and others throughout the City. Quada said the maintenance effort on the equipment and buildings has always been incredible. The City has had top-notch maintenance workers who care about their jobs.

Quada also noted he has had experiences with other cities before coming to the City of Lowell.

He said unless a water filter system is properly backwashed and cared for on a regular basis, the filters do not last. He said this was a real credit to those associated with the system.

Item #12. MANAGERS REPORT. City Manager Pasquale reported on the following:

1. The following meetings minutes were enclosed:

- Chamber of Commerce meeting of February 9

2. As requested, Tom Richards has provided a list of individuals who have been nominated to serve on the Cable TV Advisory Board.

3. With the resignation of Carol Wieland, Councilmember Myers has expressed interest in a position on the Kent District Library Board. Council consideration to endorse and propose the appointment to the District was requested.

Myers said Wieland's position covered the City of Lowell, Lowell, Vergennes and Bowne Townships. He has been in contact with Lowell and Vergennes Townships and received an endorsement from Lowell Township and believed he would receive one from Bowne.

Councilmember Green thought Myers would do an excellent job.

IT WAS MOVED BY GREEN and seconded by BLOUGH to endorse Councilmember Myers to a position on Kent District Library Board.

4. Pasquale reminded the Council a meeting with the townships and Lowell Area Schools regarding the Community Cooperation Model was scheduled for Tuesday, March 21st, 7 p.m. at the high school.

Mayor Blough stated last year it was a very worthwhile trip when they attended Ionia. He extended the invitation to any residents or businesses.

Pasquale recommended deferring the discussion of Property Tax Administration Upgrade project until the next meeting since Alan Vanderberg had not yet arrived. The Council agreed.

Council gives LAAC okay on new sign and porch

The Lowell Area Arts Council got its wish and a little bit more from Monday night's city council meeting.

The nonprofit organization was seeking variances for a sign and for a new handicap ramp and porch from the Zoning Board of Appeals, which the Lowell City Council serves as.

Moved by Councilmember Ray Quada, the City-Council agreed to allow for the two variances, waived the fee (because it is nonprofit) and granted authorization for the group to construct in the right of way area.

"Recently, in the last few years, the arts council has tried to become more a part of the downtown area," said Gary Eldridge, a member of the LAAC. "We have tried to relate more to the downtown area and be a part of the community."

With that goal in mind, the arts council decided it wanted

to create a new sign for its building located at 149 S. Hudson. The sign would be a permanent banner made out of canvas, hanging perpendicular to the building facing S. Hudson St. The sign would be about four feet out.

The Lowell Planning Commission, at its March 27 meeting, stated the banner could be considered a sign and that a variance would be needed on the sign's square footage. The arts council building is limited to a 32-square-foot sign. The proposed sign would be 48 square feet.

"When I designed the sign, I wanted to really coordinate the look with the rest of the city," Eldridge said. "It also will look much nicer on the building than what was there before."

Previously its name was painted on the side of the facility. The group also sought a variance to construct a porch extending six feet from the building along with a new handi-

cap ramp that would extend almost 12 feet from the building. "The main reason for this is that if you have ever seen the building during the winter, you have noticed the icicles hanging off our roof," Eldridge said. "We need some way to keep the entrance clear for our patrons."

The arts council building sits rather close to its property line, approximately less than a foot away. The required front yard set back in the Industrial district is 50 feet. The porch would extend six feet into the Ottawa Street right of way. (Ottawa Street is the main entrance for the arts council.)

For the group to construct in the right of way, the council would need to give its approval along with granting the variance, said City Manager David Pasquale. After minimal discussion, the council did just that along with returning the group's fee for application on the variances.

the Kent County Clerks Association, chair of the Michigan Municipal League Region III, and served on the Lowell Rotary Club.

She is still thrilled, however, to have accomplished her

goal of being able to serve the city as its clerk, she said.

The council, since this is a promotion for Morlock, raised the question of an increase in pay. Pasquale said that would be discussed during the annual staff reviews, which take place in June.

Morlock has lived in the Lowell area for 12 years with her husband Sam, who is a set up mechanic at Amway. She is originally from the Wyoming area.

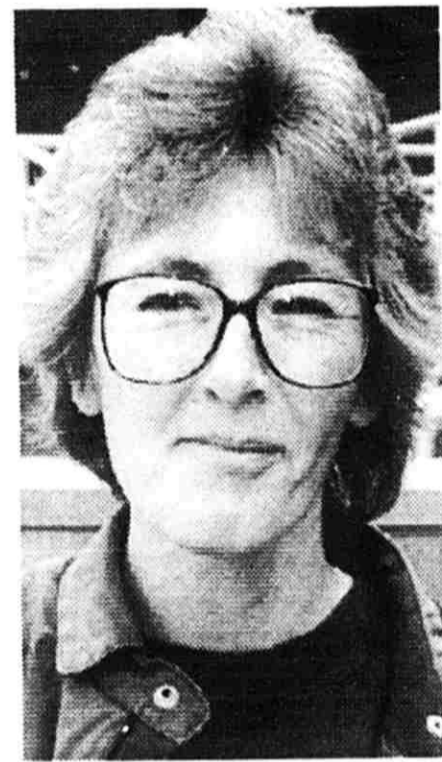

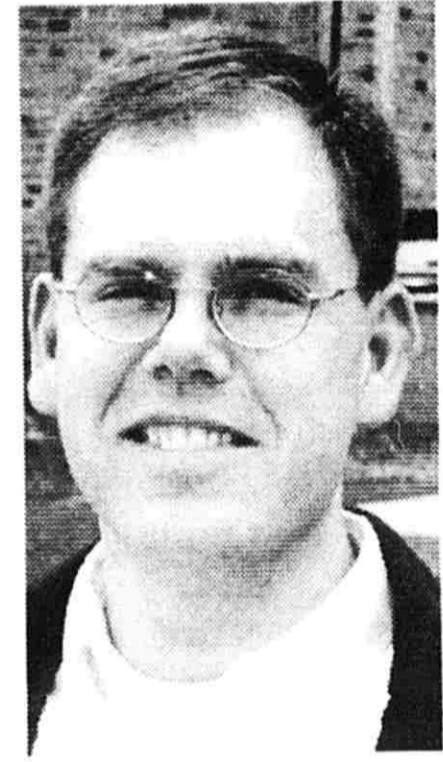

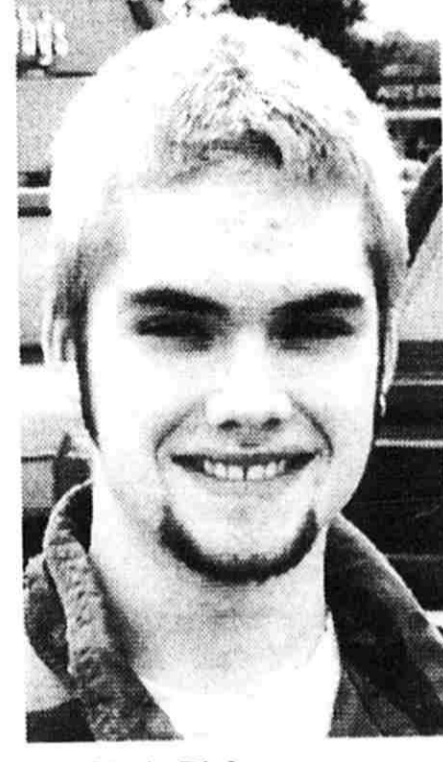

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AT&T and CenturyTel looking to build towers in city

The request of two communication towers to be placed in the city of Lowell has the city council wanting to establish a policy about such items.

At its Monday night meeting, AT&T and CenturyTel approached the city council about the possibility of being allowed to construct new communication towers within the city limits.

AT&T would like to construct a 180-foot four-carrier tower (meaning other com-

munication providers would be able to rent off of that tower) behind the city's water storage tank north of Gee Drive.

"I wish your water tower was tall enough because otherwise we would ask to lease the top of that," said Al Marriott of AT&T.

CenturyTel would like to either replace or build next to the tower on Shepard Drive. CenturyTel representative Dave Newton said this would give CenturyTel the best coverage for the area.

Council members were concerned, however, about the aesthetics of the area and won-

dered if there were any way for the two proposals along with the city's current tower for cable television to be combined into one tower.

"I would just like to see if we can't have these three towers come together," said Councilmember Ray Quada.

"That way we do not have a tower on Gee Drive, we do not have a tower downtown, and we do not have a tower on Shepard Drive. If it can't be done, then it can't be done."

The council wanted the Lowell Cable company, AT&T and CenturyTel to

come together and produce a report regarding the coexistence of the three on a single tower.

AT&T has already begun the process of getting a special use permit to construct the tower on Gee Drive, located on city property. The council gave City Manager David Pasquale direction to have the city planning commission review the request and make comments about what the city's plan should be for such towers.

Even if AT&T gets a special permit to construct the tower, it would have to nego-

tiate a lease with the city. Currently, AT&T is proposing \$1,000 per month with a 15-percent increase option every period to offset inflation. Marriott said this is a standard contract AT&T offers. He also said his company would cover all the costs of developing the site and cover the site with a one million dollar insurance policy. (City Council pointed out that the city has a policy of a two million dollar insurance policy.) The city also would be able to negotiate for a portion of any of the other carriers who decide to rent off of the AT&T tower. Marriott explained.

CenturyTel would like to lease space off the current pinnacle tower that is on the Shepard property, but if that does not work out, Newton said his company would bear the costs of replacing the tower. CenturyTel is proposing a lease of \$700 per month with an annual increase of 2 percent of the previous year's monthly rental amount. The company also is proposing a one million dollar insurance policy. Newton said the tower would be constructed according to what the FAA and airport officials would allow.

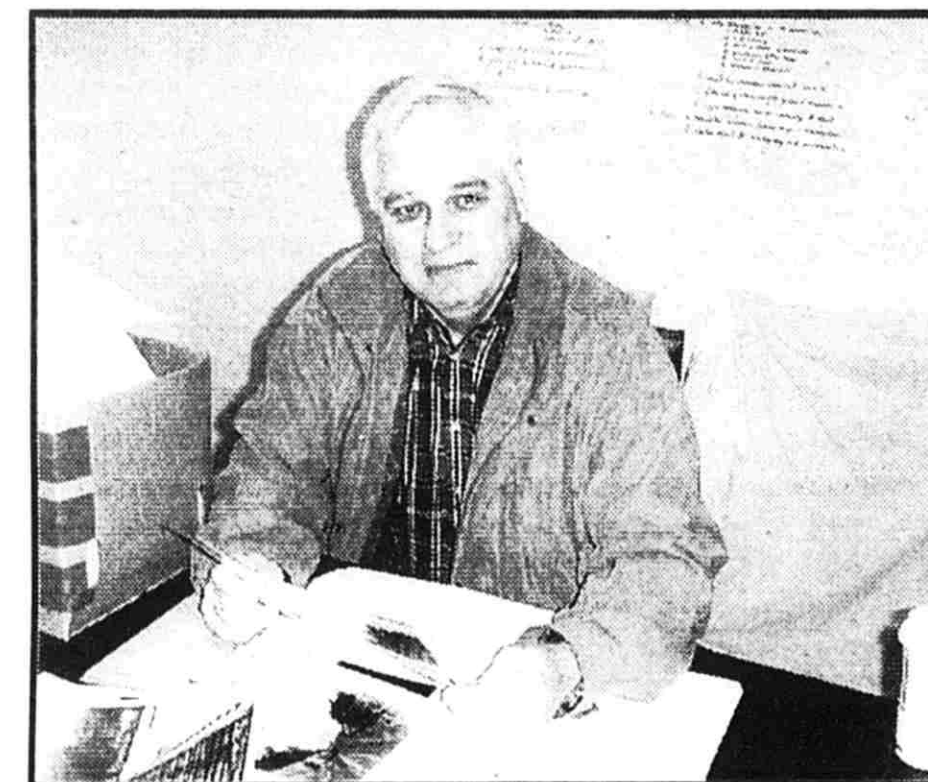
Currently, a 90-foot tower is located on the property.

"The reason I bring this up before the council is that the council is not interested in pursuing leases for these towers, then we are all just spinning our wheels," Pasquale said.

The council gave its general consensus in support of pursuing leasing agreement with the two companies with the understanding that the companies and Lowell Cable would investigate the possibility of whether a single tower would better serve the city.

The respective companies have each had engineers conduct studies on possible sites. Newton said CenturyTel has been zeroing in on the Shepard tower as location so it could just add on to an existing facility. The hill would allow CenturyTel to reach the entire city, Newton said.

Marriott said his company (AT&T) has been studying the area for the last four months and believes the best location for them is the Gee Drive property. Both were willing, though, to work together to see if another possibility exists.

Other non-league opponents that dot the schedule are East Kentwood, Ionia and Lakewood.



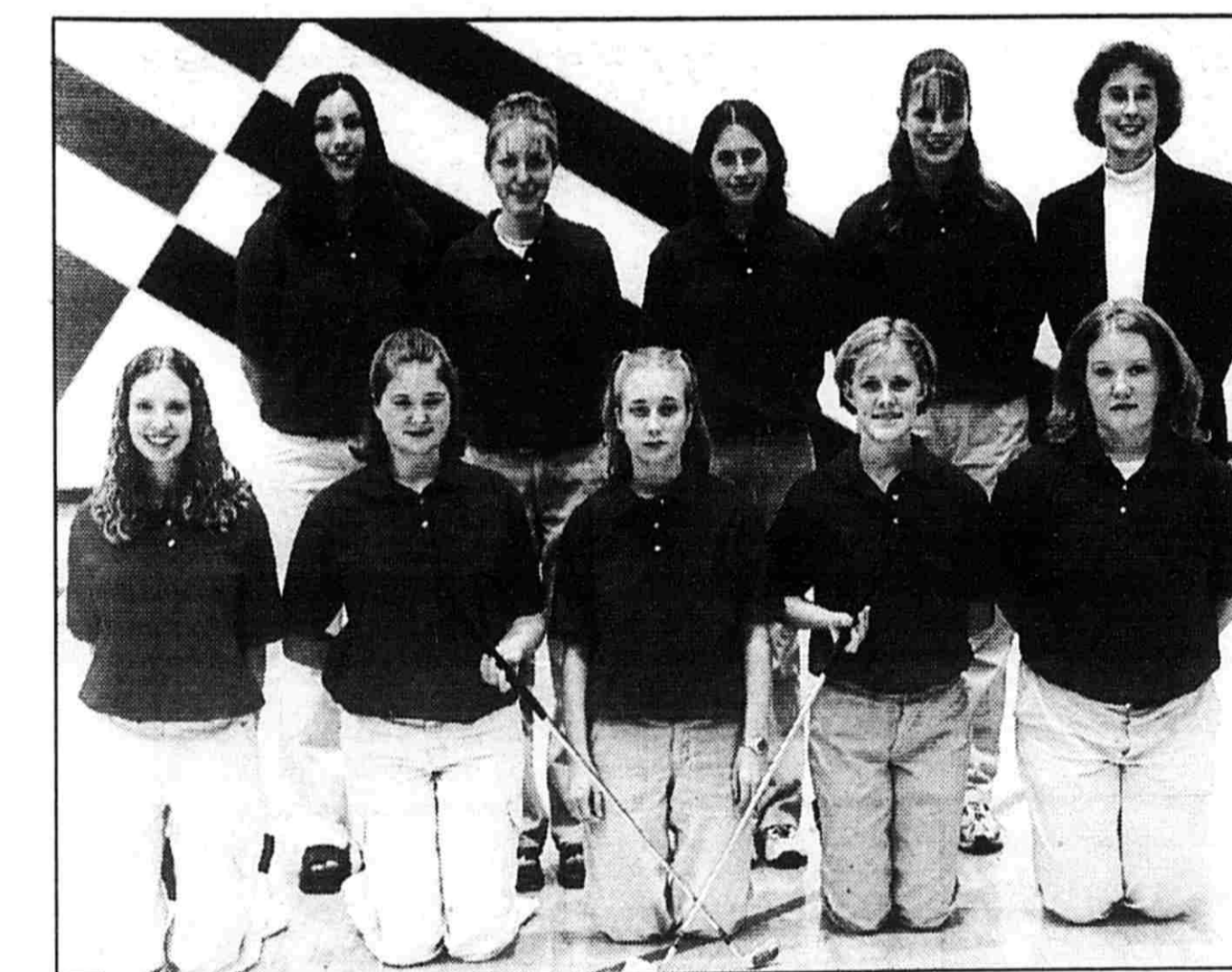

Backyard gardening without the back pain

Some Tips for Gardeners from Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan

You can follow some easy steps to reduce the chances of injuring your back while gardening, says Thomas Simmer, M.D., Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan vice president and corporate medical director.

"Back injuries are frequently preventable," says Simmer. "Too often, gardeners jump right into yard work in the spring without taking precautions."

To help you take care of your back, Simmer advises that you treat gardening like any other exercise. Warm up before and after to keep your muscles loose. A few lower-back stretches will prepare your muscles for the lifts, bends and lurches that are to follow.

Back injuries frequently occur when people try to lift things without being in the proper position, or when people stay in the same position for an extended time period. Once you begin gardening, make a point of changing positions every 10 to 15 minutes. Stand up, and walk around for a minute or two. This will help keep the back muscles loose. If you are going to be on your knees for long stretches of time, use a cushion, keep your back straight, and don't sit on your heels.

When you need to lift anything, make sure to follow proper technique:

- Stand close to the object you are going to lift.
- Keep your feet about one foot apart.
- Squat down, and grab the object you will be lifting.
- Rise up, using your leg muscles, keeping your back straight.
- Pivot with your feet to turn.
- Do not twist your back.
- To put the object down, squat and keep your back straight.

If you catch yourself improperly twisting or bending your back, try a few standing back bends, arching your back backwards. If you don't feel any pain, correct your positioning or posture, and continue your activity.

In addition to maintaining a healthy posture, buying the right gardening equipment can make a difference. Choose lightweight, long-handled gardening tools. That will keep you from bending over and straining your back. While you are working, make sure to keep your back straight while lifting soil, digging small amounts at a time.

If your back is sore, there are some things you can do about it. Stay off your feet, and apply heat to the area where you are feeling pain. If your back muscles are stiff and sore, apply a hot pack, or head for the nearest hot tub. Liniments rubbed over the area of pain can often provide some relief. See a doctor if pain spreads away from your back, to your sides or legs; comes on suddenly and is coupled with weakness or numbness; or increases in its severity over time. Your doctor may prescribe medication if the pain is chronic.

If you do suffer from chronic back problems, but still love to garden, you can reduce the pain by decreasing the amount of time you spend gardening. For example, you can spend less time pulling weeds by applying a weed control product in the spring, putting mulch in your flowerbeds and choosing ground cover plants where possible. You also can plant low-maintenance shrubs and perennials to cut down on the time you spend on your knees.

Raised garden beds are an excellent idea for those with chronic back problems. The recommended height for a raised garden bed is 2-3 feet tall, so you can sit in a chair or bench while gardening.

Also look for an article about gardening in the Spring 2000 issue of Living Healthy, a magazine published by the Blues that goes to more than two million households and is filled with tips on how to stay healthy and fit.

Homeschool students take part in electrical safety demonstration

Students and parents from Alton Bible Homeschool witnessed the popular Great Lakes Energy electrical safety demonstration.

The outdoor demonstrations were held from 11:45 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the school's facilities in Lowell.

The GLE Electric Safety Trailer, which reached more than 11,200 children and adults in 1999, is an outdoor, open-air trailer designed as a "miniature" electric distribution system, complete with poles, wire, transformers, fuses, insulators, meters and other equipment necessary to distribute electricity. We demonstrate the power of electricity at 7,200 volts.

During the demo, GLE representatives show that most household items - such as kite string, a work glove, a golf club, a baseball bat, tree branches and more - can conduct electricity and a hot dog is "grilled" on the power lines to demonstrate the potential dangers of electricity.

Parents and students also learned about the dangers of fallen power lines as well as about the lineman's job and the basic properties of electricity. They particularly enjoy the visual appeal of the demonstration: It grabs their attention, and that helps drive home the safety message.

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For good yields, plant peas early

Peas produce best in cool weather, so if you plant them in the spring, plant as soon as the soil is dry enough to work. Another option is to plant in the summer for fall harvest, but spring crops usually give better yields. Peas aren't fussy about soil type, almost any well-drained soil will be suitable for peas as long as it's not extremely acidic. The other site requirements are full sun and plenty of water during dry weather, especially when pea pods are forming.

To check soil to determine whether it's dry enough to work, squeeze a handful of it. If it crumbles when you open your hand, it's dry enough to spade or till. If it clumps together in a muddy ball, it's too wet.

Plant pea seeds 1 inch deep and 2 to 3 inches apart in rows 2 feet apart. Peas, like other legumes, get the nitrogen they need from the atmosphere, but they will benefit from application of phosphorus and potassium. Use a low-nitrogen fertilizer such as 5-20-20 at the rate of 4 cups per 100 feet. Mix half in the soil a couple weeks before planting and sprinkle the rest alongside the rows -- not on the seeds -- after planting.

Seed catalogs offer a variety of peas -- from vining to bush types, and English peas, grown for their immature seeds, to edible-podded types. The vining varieties definitely need some sort of support to grow on, though even the more compact varieties will be easier to harvest if they have some

support. Be sure pea fencing is sturdy ... a flimsy fence may collapse under the weight of the vines or blow down in a spring storm.

Edible-podded peas come in two basic types. Snow peas are harvested for their crunchy pods when the peas are just beginning to form. Snap peas are picked when the pods are

thick and filled with peas. Harvest garden peas when pods are firm and well filled but before they start to shrivel and change color. Old peas lose their sweetness and become starchy and tough. Quality and flavor are best when peas are eaten or frozen as soon as possible after harvest.

Township resident not pleased with tower or proposed new building

Sid Haywood still worries about the health risk that neighbors his property to the west.

That health risk comes in the form of a 169-foot tower constructed by Consumers Power approximately 20 years ago for its high power electrical lines.

"I worry for my kids about the health risk that comes from the electronic magnetic field created by the tower," Haywood said, despite no reports that indicate risk.

Along with being a health risk, and an eyesore, Haywood

said the tower has also hindered television reception. Since the township is not responsible for allowing the Consumer's Power tower to be constructed, Haywood does not have any recourse through the township ordinance.

Haywood has lived at 10010 E. Fulton his entire life. He bought the home from his parents seven years ago.

Haywood was at the Lowell Charter Township Planning Commission meeting Monday night to object to the construction of a 12 by 26 by 40 foot building. "I didn't want to look at the tower then and I don't want to have to look at a new building along side it," Haywood said.

Planning commission chairman Dick Bryan said Con-

sumers Power will landscape the building. "It's going to be landscaped well. Trees will provide screening," he said.

The discussion on the building was borne from a request by AT&T to install an antennae on top of the tower. Bryan indicated that the antenna would be affixed to the top of the tower and would look like a part of the lattice. "Unless someone watches it be installed, they won't even be able to tell it's on the tower," he said

AT&T's original tower location plan was not accepted by Consumers Power.

An agreed-upon plan will be presented to the planning commission for approval on April 24.

DenHouter given okay for mining, but contingencies must be met

Leonard DenHouter had to do some mining of the minds Monday night in order to secure approval for his proposed mining off of Alden Nash Avenue.

DenHouter's proposal nearly got lost in a discussion about dust control.

The Lowell Charter Township Planning Commission, sensitive to the issue of dust created by such projects, spent a good measure of time discussing the best method to insure that the dust is controlled.

When discussion ended,

it agreed to what DenHouter proposed - using an organic material made from tree sap.

DenHouter said he anticipated having to apply two coats in the first year.

"I've done a lot of checking and feel confident that this will keep the dust down," he said.

High berms on the outer edge of the property should also help limit the spread of any dust beyond the property's perimeter.

The township agreed to extend the use of the mining pit to 10 years with annual inspections. "This reserves us the right to pull the permit if

conditions which the planning commission sets forth are not met," Bryan explained.

Other conditions included DenHouter providing an additional \$4,000 in trust; the

mining area (five acres) have a fence and signage; that there be an acceleration lane south from the entrance on Alden Nash and a de-acceleration lane going north on the west

side of the road; and that a condemned home and truck body facing Grand River Avenue be removed from the property.

DenHouter was given 90 days to complete all of the conditions except for the lanes, which were given a six-month timetable.

Public hearing held for Edison company

"Basically it was to find out if I've been a good neighbor," said Dick Edison, owner of Contract Assemblies, on the purpose of a public hearing before the Lowell Charter Township Planning Commission.

Edison proposed construction of an 11,000 square

foot building on the west side of his property at 13565 Grand River.

The building will enable Contract Assemblies to meet future business opportunities. "Those opportunities could bring about a 20 percent increase in the number of employees," Edison explained. It presently employs approximately 10-12 people.

The industrial business is currently contracted to do light assembly work for West Michigan companies, including Attwood, Howard Miller and Steelcase.

Edison's company has been at the Grand River/Oberley location for the past three-and-a-half years.

Stedfast Construction will erect the new building.

Completion of the project is expected in July.

At a public hearing Monday night, Tim McCaul who neighbors the facility asked that the new building be set back on the lot closer to the Grand Trunk Railroad.

"I currently see vegetation and bush when I look out my window; with this proposal I would see building," McCaul said.

Doran Loftus, of 13558 Grand River Dr., asked that the refrigeration units which run overnight be eliminated. Edison assured him that they could go.

"Dick (Edison) has done an excellent job of maintaining that property, better than the previous owners," Loftus added.
