Mayfest opens summer season with bluegrass music

Pickin' on the mandolin and guitar the sounds of 'White Freight Liner', Dave Simmonds and Nate Garrelts can't wait to get the Mayfest show on the road.

After being cooped up for the winter, the 13th annual Mayfest at the fairgrounds opens the summer season with bluegrass, fun, sunshine and camping on the river Grand.

With headline acts such as "Michael Cleveland and Flamekeeper", the Mayfest Bluegrass Festival is the biggest show of the season.

"It's a good festival," said Simmonds, president of West Michigan Bluegrass Music Association. "We draw good crowds and we always have a good time."

Bluegrass is not just sitting and listening to other people play, according to Simmonds and Garrelts. Mainly, it's about participation. So what does a typical bluegrass fest look like?

"It's a lot of interaction," said Simmonds. "There's a lot of pickin'."

For starters, it can be a circle of strangers playing their fiddles, guitars, banjos and mandolins to any tune.

"There will be different levels of skills," said Simmonds. "You can hone down yours to match others. Everybody knows different songs."

Free workshops by lead pickers will be held all Saturday in the King Building.

"Just come to the session, sit around the table and play," said Simmonds.

It's easy to make a friend at any bluegrass festival, said Simmonds, as one can imagine.

Garrelts compared bluegrass jamming to dancing.

"Making music is like a gift," said Garrelts. "Everyone's got it, but it's a matter of getting it out."

Farm markets expected to grow with weakening economy

With rising food prices due to fuel costs, local farm markets are booming.

Fresh, close to earth, natural and organic, home-grown produce meticulously maintained by

the grower without pesticides and chemicals, means lower prices and higher quality.

"We're going to have more produce than ever," said Ron Wenger, Lowell Farm market manager.

Wenger expects this year's Farmers' Market to be bigger and better than the previous ones.

Traditionally located at the fairgrounds, the market starts this Thursday from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m., and it will run through October 11th.

"We will close out with the harvest celebration," said Wenger.

Approximately 30 vendors from the area are expected to be peddling their produce ranging from asparagus, morels, herbs, flowers to classics such as peppers and tomatoes. Wenger will also be selling his maple syrup.

The farm market coincides with the Sizzlin' Summer concert series starting this year on June 12.

"We have improved parking," said Wenger.

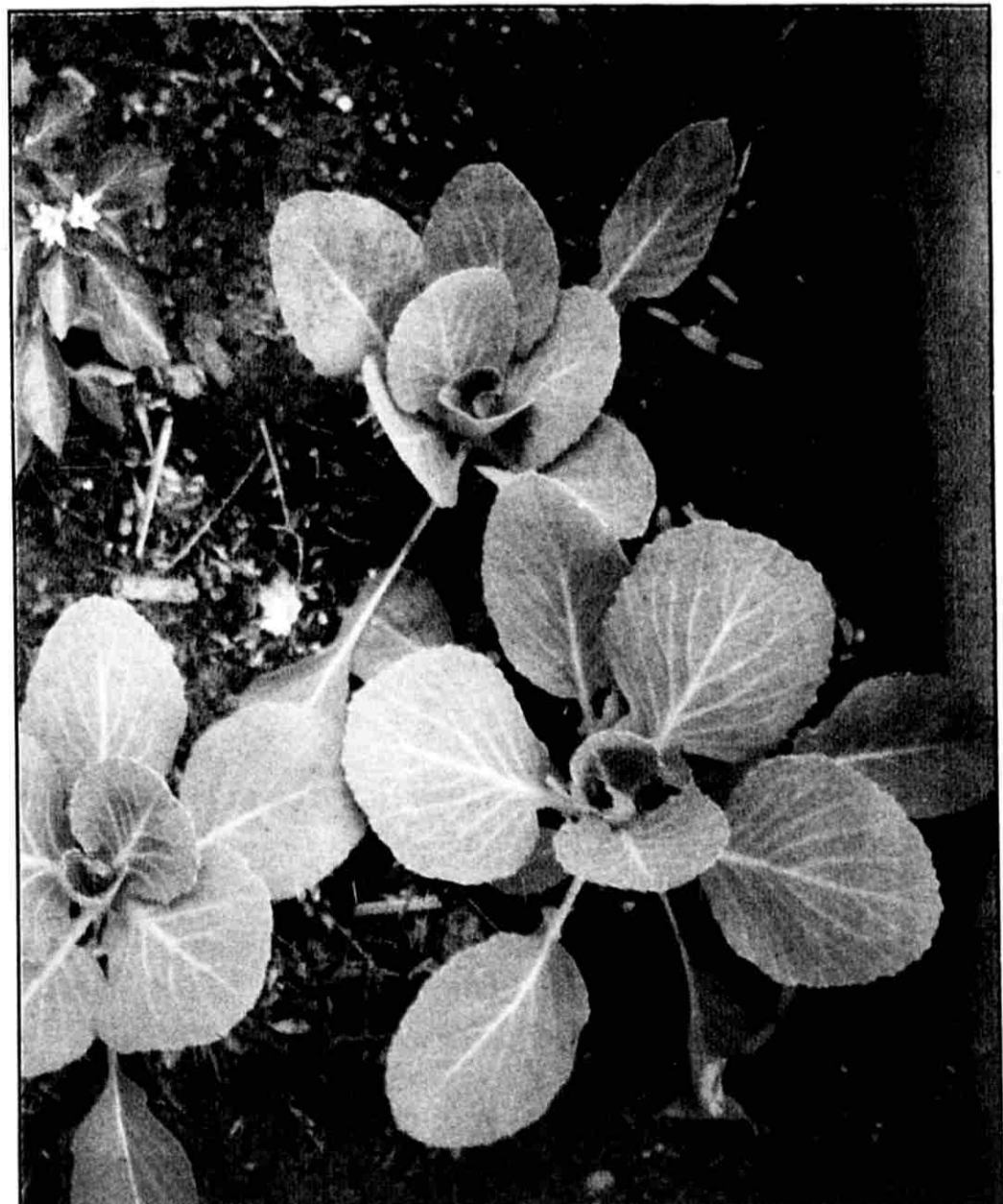
The parking at the fairgrounds is ample, and the walk to downtown Lowell is short and refreshing.

Herbs and cabbage will be among the produce offered at the Lowell Farmers' Market.

Participating vendors pay \$150 per season or \$10 a week.

Other farm markets in the close proximity to Lowell include H&W Farms with their famous cherry juice, and Paulson's Pumpkin Patch, both located on Belding Road, or M44.

Farm stands are also located south of Lowell at the crossroads of Alden Nash and Cascade Road including Kietzman's Asparagus.

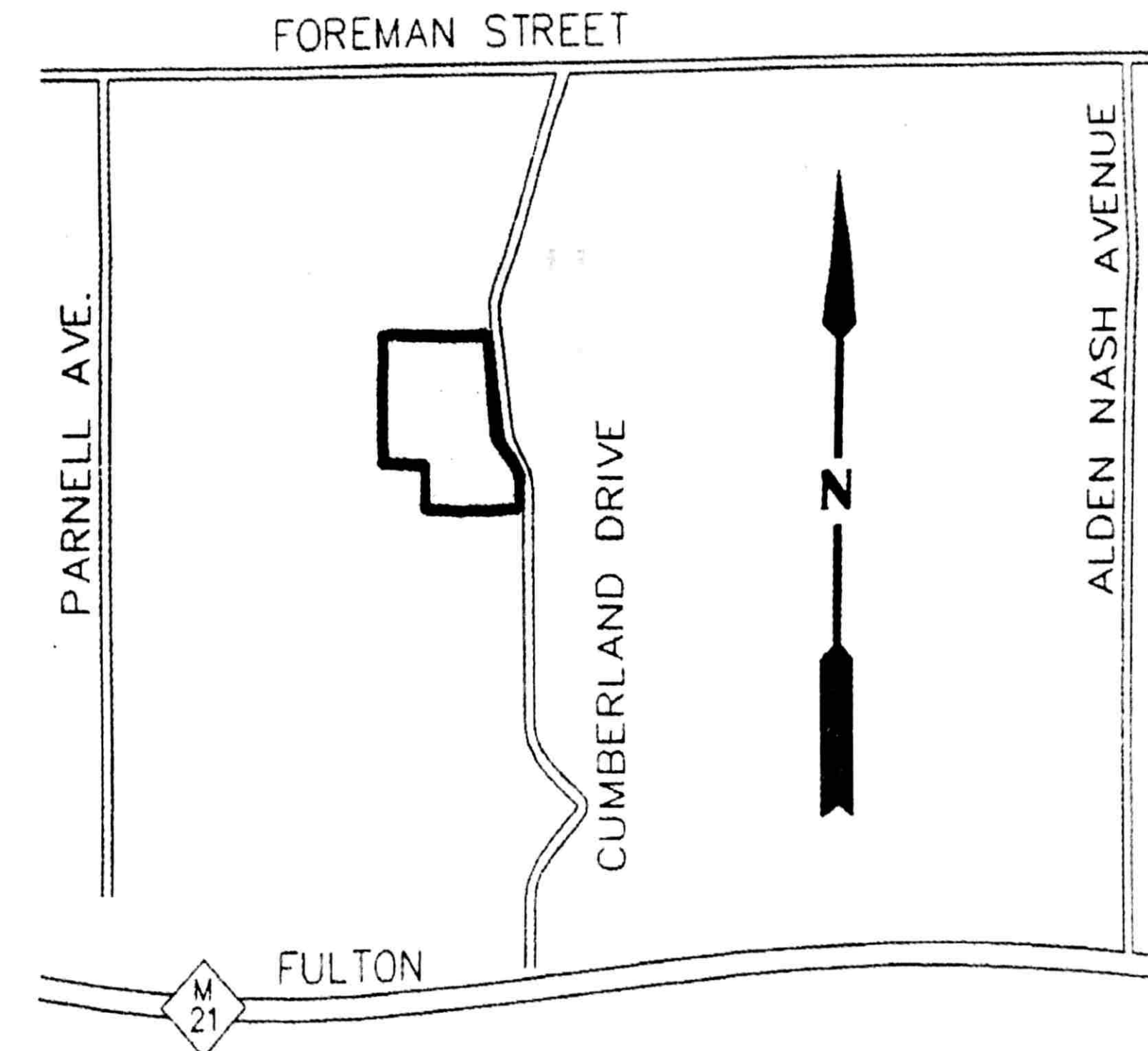

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K-12 exhibit showcases student art

The annual K-12 art exhibit at the Lowell Area Arts Council features a variety of work by the Lowell Area Schools students.

From drawings to ceramics, the artwork is a smorgasbord of the K-12 art curriculum. Many pieces such as 'We are all connected' ceramic by Katy McElroy showed young budding talent.

"This is our annual thing in May," said art council director Loraine Smalligan. "Art teachers select pieces from students' work to showcase the curriculum."

New this year was the raku exhibit created by high school students. The raku workshop, taught by arts instructor Susan Langford, brought the ancient Eastern art to Lowell.

"It's been modernized for decorative purposes," said Langford. "It's not

intended to be functional."

Although originally raku was functional, used to create, for example, tea sets, the students used mainly decorative process to create abstract pieces.

Nate Vaught made an abstract piece resembling a cylinder with a squirrel and a bird.

"I put roots on it so it looks like a tree," said Vaught, a senior at the Lowell High School. "I am used to more symmetrical stuff, this is more abstract."

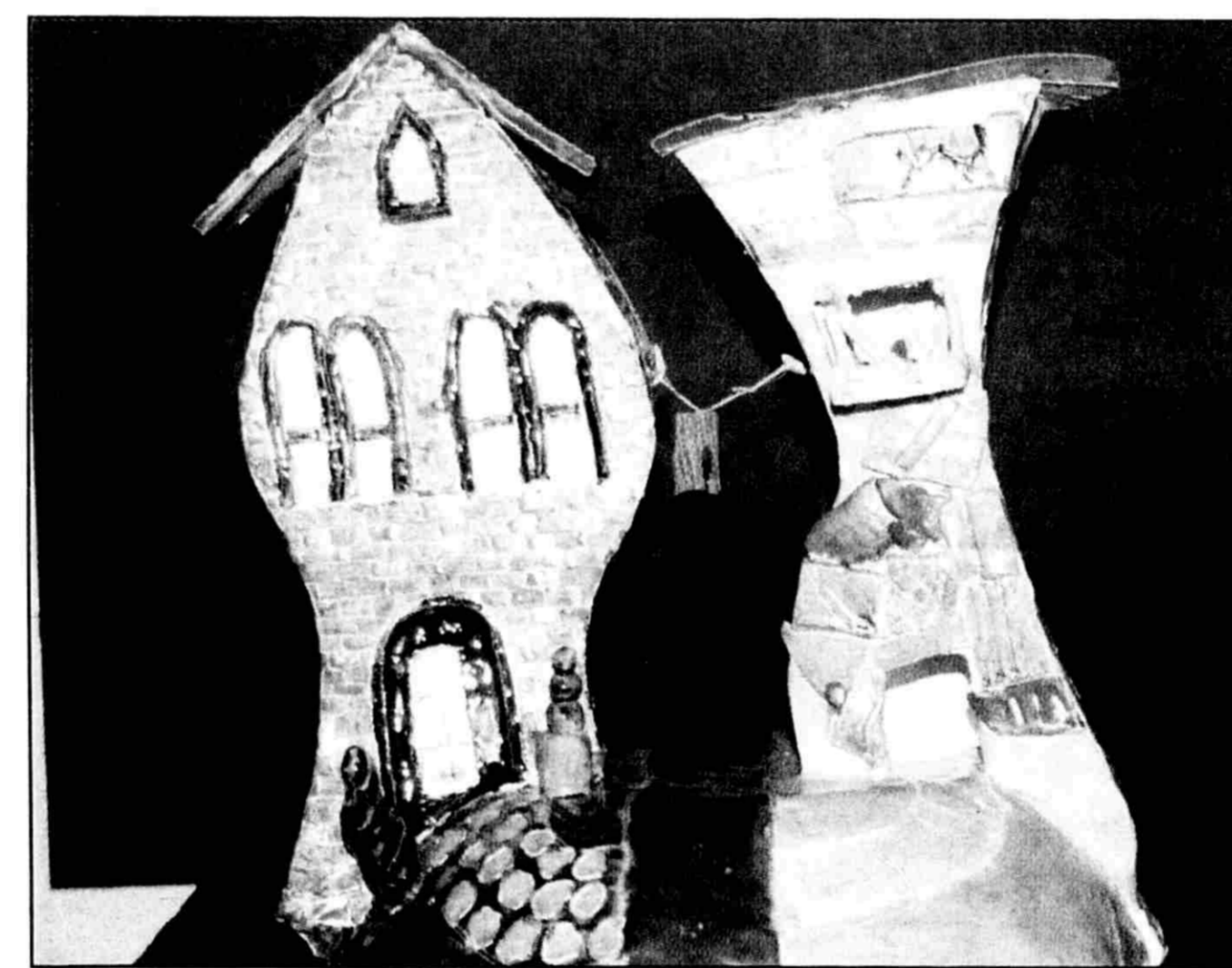
The process of firing up raku pieces twice in kilns at high temperatures and cooling of the red-hot pieces was a lot of fun, according to Kyle Ingebreton.

"It was a lot of work," said Ingebreton.

He made a large bowl on a potter's wheel. The combustion in the bins at 1800 Fahrenheit creates a dark glaze on the raku

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pieces. "We got to actually do it, watch the pieces flame up in trash bins," said Ingebreton.

Both students agreed the creative process was a surprise in the end.

"It's very hands-on," said Ingebreton.

Lowell gets a win, a tie and a loss in week before conference tournament

After a win and a tie last week, the Lowell soccer team was handed its first loss of the season against conference foe East Grand Rapids Monday night, 1-2.

The loss drops them to No. 2 in the conference, behind Forest Hills Central, whom they previously beat in a thriller two weeks ago. The conference tournament begins tonight.

Against East Grand Rapids, Chelsea Harrison

was the only scorer, with a header knocked off an assist by Hannah Oberlin.

The Arrows tied Catholic Central last Friday 1-1 in non-conference play.

Against Kenowa Hills last Wednesday, Lowell easily defeated the Knights 7-0. Goals were scored in the first half by Harrison (assist by Oberlin), Brooke Curtis (assist by Elena Brubaker), and Katie Kruse (assist by Curtis).

In the second half, Logan DeClerc scored

in the first minute with an assist by Oberlin. Sara Nagy also scored, on a one-on-one duel with the goalie, assisted by Katie Krolewicz. Curtis had two more goals (to total three overall), with one assisted by Nagy in the 23rd minute. The last goal came on a cross from Sara Messing to Curtis, who knocked it in cleanly on a header.

Lowell will take on Northview in the first round of conference play tonight at Red Arrow Stadium.

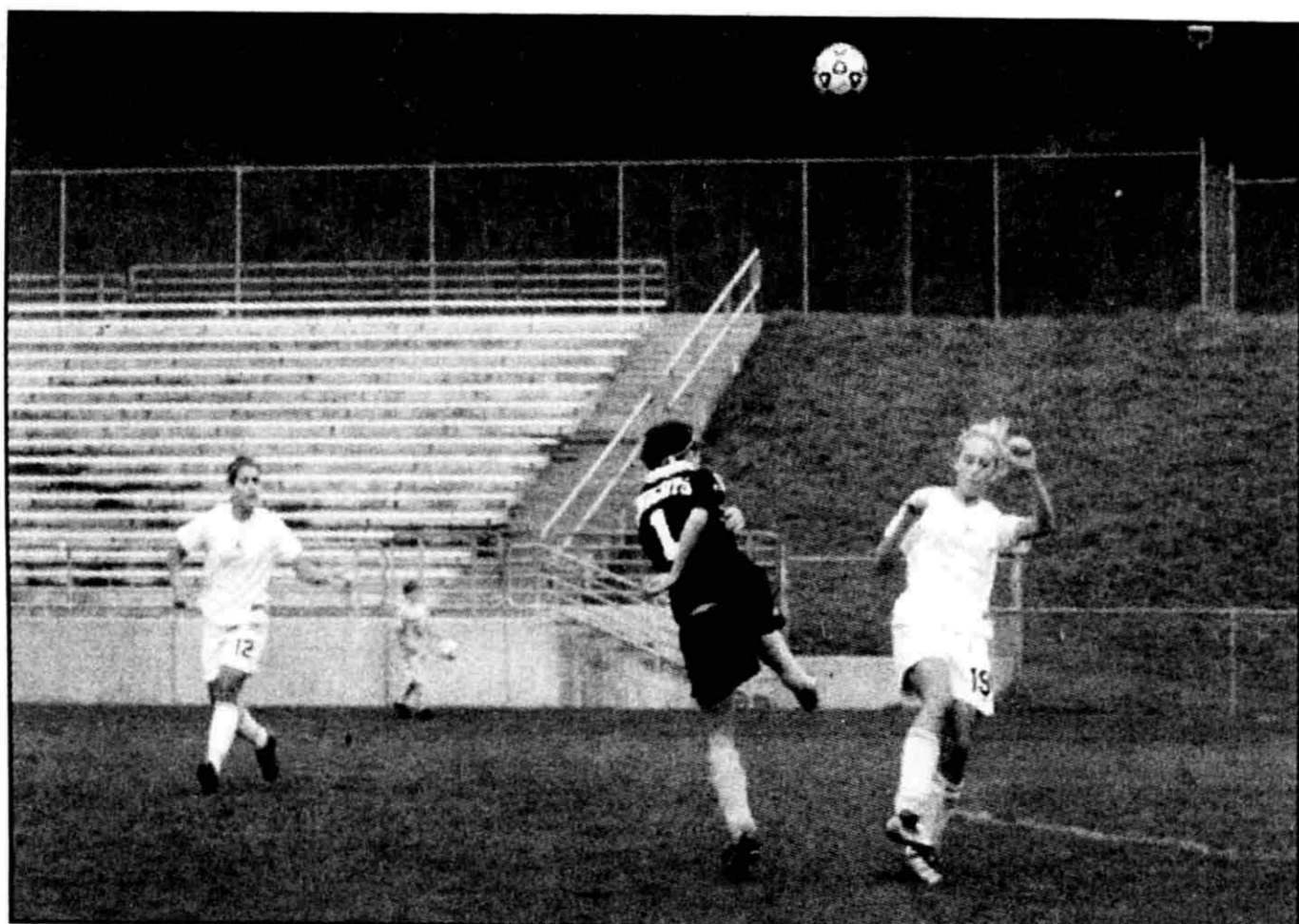

Lowell softball gets four wins against area teams

The Arrows broke even last week with four wins to boost their overall record to 12-9, and 6-2 in the conference. Lowell is currently tied with Northview for second place, behind leaders Caledonia.

Lowell vs. East Grand Rapids
Lowell started its week with a home game against East Grand Rapids, winning 9-1. The Arrows scored all nine runs in the fifth inning.

Beth Wyckoff started the surge. Katie McElroy and Monica Vigil both had base hit bunts, and Samantha Mundt drove in two with a single. Ashley Nawrocki was safe on an error, while Cassie DeCator and Kristin Nagy each had a base hit. Jessica Meyer drove in a two-run double.

McElroy, at bat again, tripled in the same inning, while Vigil had another base hit. Lowell sent 15 hitters to

the plate during that inning. In that inning, the Arrows had nine hits, and only two walks.

Bailey Allen was the winning pitcher, striking out five and walking one.

Lowell vs. Greenville
Against Greenville on Wednesday, the Arrows won 4-1.

Lauren Dood was the winning pitcher, striking out three with no walks.

McElroy had four hits during the game, with a triple, a double and two base hits. Vigil drove in two runs, with a base hit and groundout. The Arrows scored in the first, fifth, sixth and seventh innings. Coach Bob Rodenhouse said the big hit of the day was McElroy's triple to start off the game. Meyer also had a key two-out base hit.

Tricia Thuston had a base hit to lead off the fifth inning (Ellie Timpson pitch-ran), and scored to make it 2-1, taking the lead.

Rodenhouse said there was some "great base running" as they got the lead.

Lowell vs. Forest Hills Central
Against Forest Hills Central, Lowell won both games by a large margin, 8-0, 11-0.

In Game 1, Allen was the winning pitcher, bumping her record to 6-4. She struck out five and walked two.

Rodenhouse said the trio of Mundt, McElroy and Thuston had a good relay in the first inning - "can't do any better than that", while Nawrocki had a key play in getting out the third hitter.

Jourdan Westdorp had a two-run RBI in the second. Mundt hit a triple to lead off the third inning, and the team scored five in the fourth - which was their "big-hit inning".

Mundt had two hits during the game (five for the day), while McElroy also had two.

In Game 2, Dood picked

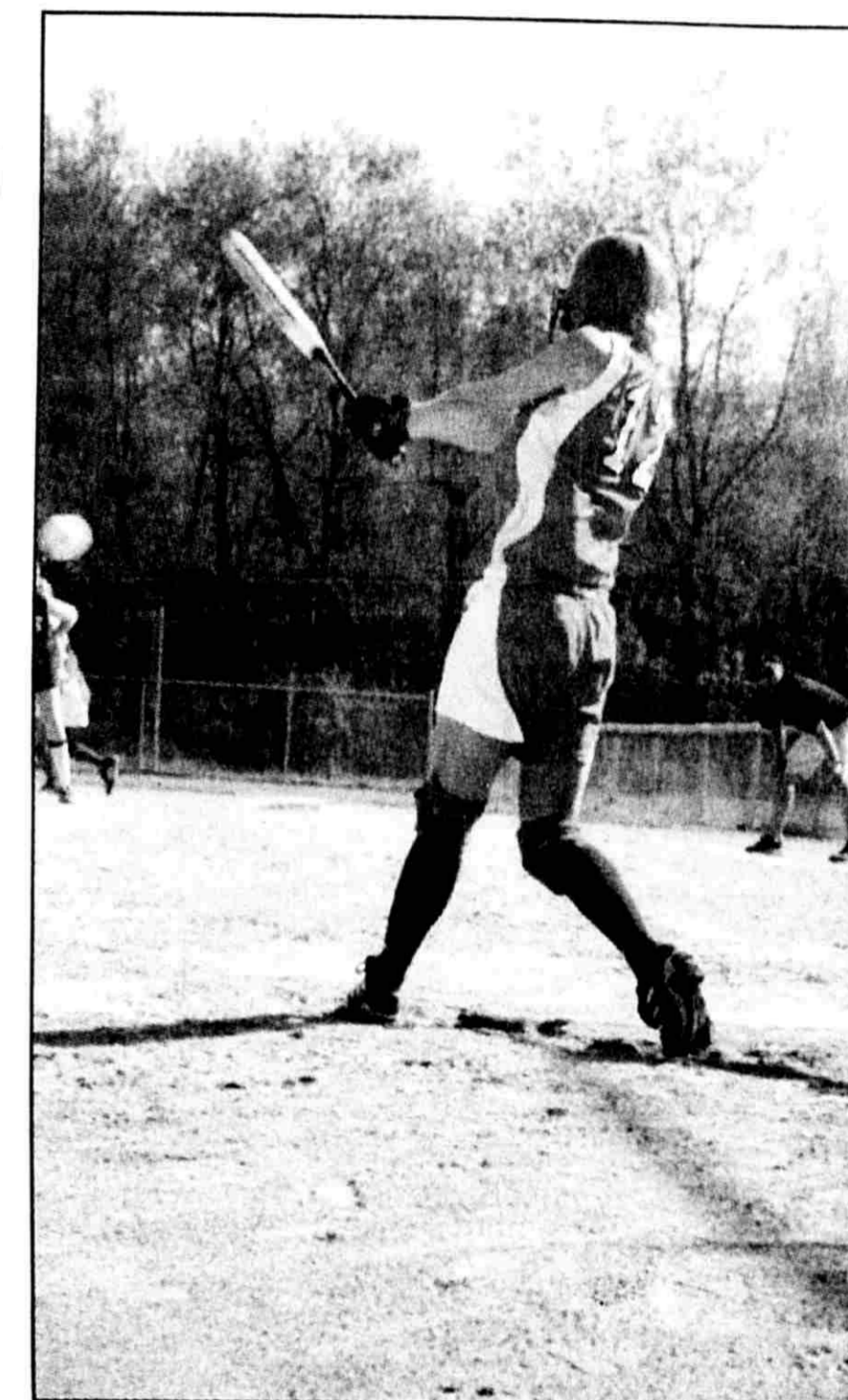
up the win, to go 6-2 overall. Linnea Churches "mopped up in the fifth". Dood allowed one hit, walked two, and struck out two.

The Arrows scored at least one run in each of the five innings played, with four runs coming in the fourth.

Vigil had a double and a single; Mundt had a triple, two singles and two RBI; Nawrocki had one RBI; Nagy had one RBI; Meyer had a double and one RBI; and McElroy had a triple.

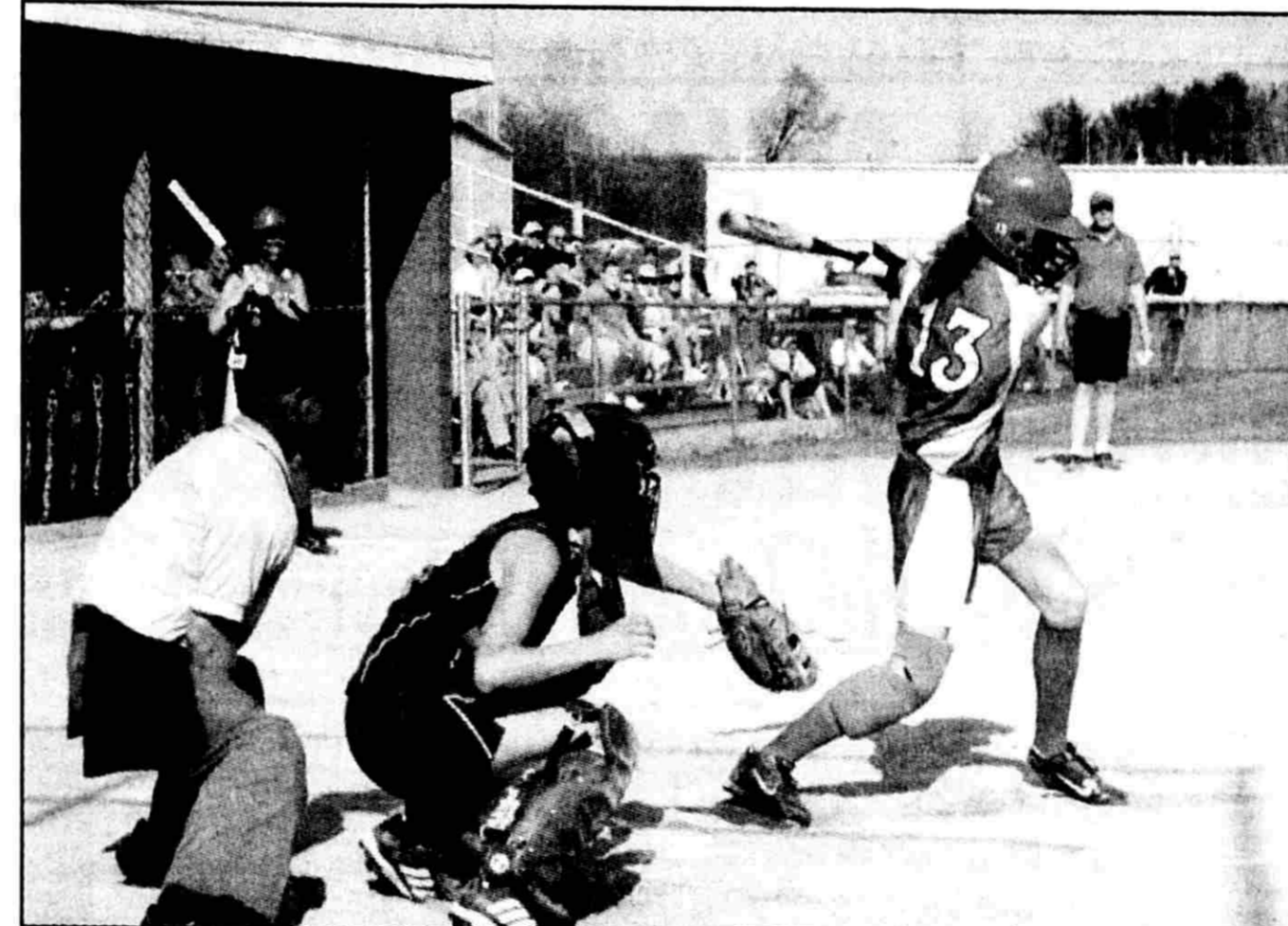
Rodenhouse said "overall, the girls played well, we've had the errors knocked out (knock on wood)."

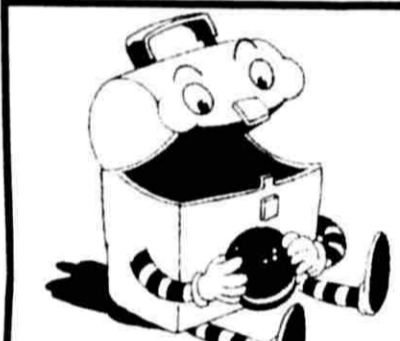

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FINANCIAL STRATEGIES FOR SMALL-BUSINESS OWNERS

If you're a small-business owner, you put your heart — and most of your time — into your business. Unfortunately, hard work doesn't always translate into financial security — so you'll need to take some additional steps.

Here are some to consider:
Protect your business against the loss of a key employee.

If you have an employee with valuable management or sales skills, and this person were to die, your business could suffer. That's why you may want to write a "key person" life insurance plan on this employee. In its simplest form, key person coverage pays cash to your company, which is usually the policy beneficiary, when the designated employee dies or becomes disabled. Key person insurance also can be structured to fund deferred-compensation arrangements or buyout agreements between partners.

Avoid "raiding" business coffers to pay for personal expenses. Try to keep six to 12 months' worth of living expenses in a liquid account. Once you have established this "emergency fund," you'll be less likely to tap into your business's income or assets to pay for unexpected personal expenses, such as a costly car repair or a large medical bill.

Create a retirement plan for yourself. As a business owner, you're responsible for establishing your own retirement account. Fortunately, you have some attractive choices, including the following:

- **SEP IRA** — You can contribute up to 25 percent of your compensation — as much as \$46,000 for 2008 — to a SEP-IRA. Your contributions are tax deductible, and your earnings have the potential to grow tax deferred until withdrawn. This plan offers you significant flexibility in making contributions for yourself and your employees. Plus, as an employer, you can generally deduct as business expenses any contributions you make on behalf of your plan participants.

- **SIMPLE IRA** — You can put up to \$10,500 — or \$13,000 if you're 50 or older — into a SIMPLE IRA in 2008. As is the case with the SEP IRA, your earnings have the potential to grow tax deferred. You can match your employees' contributions dollar for dollar, up to 3 percent of compensation, but no more than \$10,500 (or \$13,000 for employees 50 and over). Alternately, you could contribute 2 percent of each eligible employee's compensation each year, up to a maximum of \$4,600 in 2008, regardless of whether the employee contributes. Contributions to your employees are tax-deductible.

- **"Owner-only" 401(k) plan** — If you have no employees other than your spouse, you can establish an "owner-only" 401(k) plan. Between salary deferral and profit sharing, you can contribute up to \$46,000 in pretax dollars in 2008 to your owner-only 401(k), or \$51,000 if you're 50 or older. Like a SEP IRA and SIMPLE IRA, a 401(k) provides the potential to accumulate tax-deferred earnings. But if you open a Roth 401(k), your earnings have the potential to grow tax free, provided you've had your account at least five years and you don't start taking withdrawals until you're at least 59-1/2. (However, you make Roth IRA contributions with after-tax dollars.)

Your tax or financial advisor can help you choose an appropriate retirement plan. But don't wait too long to choose one, or to make the other moves necessary to help you make progress toward your financial goals.
