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




years launching his career as a state park ranger for the Traverse City State Park.

But that was offset by the work Mueller loved doing at the center. He saw the advantages of community programming, easy accessibility to the high school and the agriscience component tied to the curriculum.



The Farm Bill also provides investments in nutrition and renewable energy programs, support for traditional crops, like corn, wheat and soybeans, and the inclusion of provisions to close the Enron loophole which are also a major part of Michigan agriculture.

125 YEARS AGO THE LOWELL JOURNAL **JUNE 6, 1883**

Strawberries on sale in Lowell at 18 cents a quart. New screens and furnishings have been placed in C. McGee's saloon.

TYLENOL POISONING

Many people believe that if a medicine does not require a prescription, then it must be very safe. There is not a better example of this than Tylenol (acetaminophen). This medicine is used in many different products available over the counter. The most common uses are for pain, fevers, and headaches. Unfortunately, this drug can have serious side effects if taken chronically and in large doses.

Acetaminophen is metabolized by the liver. In doses larger than 4 grams in a 24-hour period, the liver is unable to process the drug. This results in the death of liver cells. Chronic use is also very hard on the kidneys. Those who already have underlying kidney or liver disease, or consume alcohol on a chronic basis, are very much at risk for damage due to this drug. I typically see at least one persons a week who is taking over 4 grams of Tylenol per day, usually for chronic headaches.

Acute overdosing is especially dangerous. Symptoms do not usually appear until 10-12 hours later and are nonspecific (nausea, vomiting, decreased appetite). The liver continues to die over several days, and results in total liver failure and death.

As you can see, Tylenol is a drug that can have serious side effects. If you are taking other medicines, or have liver or kidney disease, please follow the dosing guidelines, or see your doctor to address any concerns.

The joint 'Layers of Life' exhibit between the Lowell Area Arts Council and the Franciscan Life Process Center aims to show more than just pretty

pictures. "The concept of the show is creating art from the heart with a deeper meaning," said art director Kacey Cornwell.

Although some artists just sit in front of a pretty flower and paint it most don't paint exactly what they see in front of them.

"We're looking for works of passion," said Cornwell, " for art from the soul."

Certainly, Cornwell's own creation, the 'Layers of Life' poster in lavender for the upcoming exhibit, shows love of nature, and passion for color.

Cornwell started with a picture of red maple leaves taken at the center last fall. Working in Creative Suite design program, she isolated the leaves, reversed them and used several layers including the actual green background.
