Dean honored on the national scene for community service

The power of influence – in the context of high school football coaches, the phrase is synonymous with Noel Dean. The Lowell community would be quick to say that with pride and now it's been acknowledged at the national level.

Dean traveled to Texas this week, where he is being honored by the American Football Coaches Foundation as the 2011 "Power of Influence" award recipient. Only one high school coach in the nation is selected each year.

Athletic director Barry Hobrla said, "It's a much deserved award. When he was nominated by his peers, they saw a worthy candidate and made a good decision."

Dean said he found out he'd received the award in mid-August, right before playing Rockford. "I was extremely blown away by it," he said. "It's humbling [to be selected out of] all the coaches and all the programs. It's amazing."

The foundation's website states what makes one eligible for this award: "That positive influence should be reflected in his community service, his mentoring and role modeling, and finally, measured by the lives he has touched and changed."

Teresa Beachum, who's worked closely with Dean on the Pink Arrow Project, said the coach was astounded by the news of winning the award.

She remembered him saying, "This is such a wonderful time in my life."

Dean had told her that coaches who get this award typically have years more experience than he has.

With his brain child, the Pink Arrow Project, there is no shortage of lives touched by his efforts in the community.

Dean said of Pink Arrow, "It's become the fabric of the community."

Hobrla said that one of the greatest things Pink Arrow Pride has accomplished is inspiring other communities to try the same.

"The concept of the Pink Arrow game and how it's grown has spawned so many similar type of events," Hobrla said. "Obviously he was one of the pioneers of that."

Dean was quick to share the credit.

"I have so many great people that I've been lucky to work with. Lowell is second to none when it comes to the type of people and the way they go about their business. I've been very lucky to be associated with them," he said. "I'm just the one fortunate enough to get the plane ticket."

Beachum said, "He picked a few people who he thought could help and look how the community has embraced it."

Much of the inspiration for these efforts leading to his selection come from Dean's father, who died when he was young.

"I was very fortunate to be raised by a man who was a very community-minded person and instilled a lot of values I try to embody today," Dean said.

The Lowell community and a Pink Arrow community that extends so far beyond the township lines have benefited from these values. Dean, however, said those same values take priority with his own children.

He said, "It's been great to have those same relationships with my own children now. I try to have those same experiences with them."

Of course, Dean could not have won this award without his role as a football coach. When he talked about the success of the Red Arrow football program, he spoke not of the number of state titles won, but how this team's success on the

The idea of a letter writing campaign came from a postal carrier in East Lansing, Dave Randall.



Michigan Corn offering collegiate scholarships

Corn growers plant seeds in the spring with the hopes of harvesting a bountiful corn crop in the fall. This year, growers are also planting seeds for the future through the sixth annual Michigan Corn Growers Association (MCGA) scholarship program. The MCGA board of directors will award a minimum of two scholarships in the amount of \$1,000 each.

"With an aging population, a priority must be put on young peoples' education. I certainly appreciate the opportunity for the children of our state's corn growers to be able to compete for this scholarship," said Jeff Sandborn, MCGA president and a corn farmer from Portland. "The MCGA board of directors looks at this scholarship program as a way to give back to our

members, while promoting higher education to young adults."

All members of the MCGA, including students, growers and associates, as well as children of members, between the ages of 17 and 25 are qualified. Applicants must be enrolled as a full-time student at a postsecondary educational institution during the fall 2012 semester in order to be eligible. All applications must be received in the Michigan Corn Growers Association office no later than 5:00 pm on Monday, February 13, 2012. cation number. The MCGA policy states that one membership equals one person. Only one application per membership number will be accepted.

When should you start taking Social Security?

If you're of a certain age, the new year means you're that much closer to a day you may have anticipated with a combination of humor and resignation specifically, the day you're eligible for Social Security. But just because you can take Social Security, it doesn't mean you must take it. So, should you?

Before we get to that question, let's review the basic rules governing Social Security payments. You can typically start collecting benefits at age 62, but you'll get only about 75 percent of what you'd receive if you waited until your "full" retirement age, which varies according to your birth year but is most likely 66. You'll get even bigger monthly checks if you delay collecting them until you're past 66, and you'll "max out" on your payments once you reach 70.

So, the question boils down to this: Should you start collecting Social Security early — thereby receiving smaller, but more numerous, checks — or later, when your checks will be bigger but fewer?

If you really need the money once you reach 62, you've already got your answer. But if you could potentially afford to wait, we recommend you view your decision through a LENS:

• L: Your projected lifespan — You can't see into the future, but given vour family history and general health, vou can make an educated guess about your projected longevity. If you're fairly confident that, once you reach 66, you've still got another two or more decades in front of you, you may want to consider delaying taking Social Security past age 62.

• E: Your employment status — If you're under full retirement age between 62 and 66 — then for every two dollars you earn over \$14,640 (in 2012), you'll lose one dollar in Social Security benefits. In the months before you reach your full retirement age, for every three dollars you earn over \$38,880 (again, for 2012), you'll lose one dollar in benefits. But starting in the month you reach your full retirement age, you can earn as much as you want without losing any benefits.

· N: Your need, in-

cluding your other sources of retirement income -If you have a pension, or you've built substantial resources in your IRA, your 401(k) or other employersponsored retirement plan, and you can support your income needs with modest withdrawals from these accounts, you might decide it's worthwhile to delay taking Social Security to maximize your benefits. Remember that regardless of your Social Security decision, you typically would have to pay a 10 percent early withdraw-

HOMER LEE

The house in question was the Mount house on Washington Street, afterward rebuilt by John McCall.

75 Years Ago The Lowell Ledger and Alto Solo January 7, 1937

Perhaps J. C. 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Osteomyelitis

Osteomyelitis is an infection in the bone. It is caused by bacteria that spreads through the blood from a wound or infection somewhere else in the body. In children, it usually occurs in the arms and legs. In adults, it usually affects the feet, spine or hips. People with diabetes or poor circulation are more likely to get osteomyelitis.

Symptoms of osteomyelitis may vary. Children usually have pain, swelling and redness over the area that is infected. They also may have a fever or trouble moving the arm or leg and they may be more tired than usual. In adults, the symptoms may be harder to pinpoint. They may have a fever or feel more tired. There may be pain in the area over the bone and wounds may take longer to heal. Symptoms can take up to six weeks to develop after the infection has started.

In children, osteomyelitis is usually diagnosed by the symptoms and a physical exam. In adults, the diagnosis can be more difficult because the symptoms and examination are not always clear. Blood tests can show infection in the body, but other tests, such as x-rays or MRI must also be done. The best way to tell if a patient has osteomyelitis is to remove a piece of damaged bone and test it for bacteria.

The main treatment for children and adults is antibiotics. Antibiotics are usually given first through an IV to get high doses of the medicine into the blood. Later, antibiotic pills may be used. Children usually need about four weeks of antibiotics. Adults need to take antibiotics for six to eight weeks. Sometimes surgery is needed to clean out the infected bone.

She added that she's proud of the effort her girls displayed while being coached for the night by other coaches.

"Overall, it was a great night," she said.


The girls travel to Kenowa Hills and Northview this week and Brechting said he hopes to bring home some "W"s



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

Boys' basketball loses two heartbreakers, keep on the grind

The Lowell Red Arrows got their first lead against rival East Grand Rapids at the start of the fourth quarter.

This capped off a hardfought comeback spanning two quarters – the Arrows trailed 11-23 against a seemingly unstoppable East team at the end of the first quarter.

The game was on pace to near triple digits.
"We didn't do a great

"We didn't do a great job of getting stops in that game," head coach Kyle Carhart said.

But Lowell came out in the second quarter with a swag they had been missing. In four minutes, the Red Arrows mounted a 10-2 scoring run to come within four points.

Frustrated and off their game, the Pioneers managed to regain some of their momentum, putting them up 23-30 headed into halftime.

In the meantime, both teams put up a lot of free throws, Lowell shooting 1-8.

"Certainly many teams have rolled over in that position," Carhart said in reference to the first quarter. "I thought our seniors did a great job of rallying our guys. They fought back and brought us all the way back in a game when we seemed overwhelmed. We learned a lot about ourselves and what we want to be."

The intensity of the game showed itself in the two technical fouls – one for both teams – and a dog pile more appropriate for the football field near the end of the half

In another exciting runin -7-1 – the Red Arrows came within a point of East. The fourth quarter started with the score 38-39.

To this point, Lowell's offense had stayed consistent, but their defense improved dramatically. After giving up those 23 first-quarter points, they held the Eagles to a stingy 16 points in two more quarters.

After several close en-

counters, Lowell was quick to make good in the fourth, Kyle Rogers kicking it out to Jason Malling, who drained the three.

Lowell now led 41-39.

It didn't take the Pioneers long to tie it back up or to retake the lead on a 2-2 trip to the charity stripe. When Alec Roerig drew the charge with 5:53 left in the game, Lowell called a timeout, the scoreboard reading 43.45

Out of the time-out, Rogers finished the backdoor alley oop to draw the Red Arrows even with the Pioneers yet again.

When East called a time-out with less than two minutes in the game, they held a 51-49 lead.

Blake Lyman's 1-2 trip to the free throw line made the score 50-55 with less than a minute remaining, canceled out by an East free throw a few seconds later.

The Red Arrows struggled to create any offense against the Pioneers' aggressive half-court trap defense. Lowell frantically looked for the three to bring them within two points of a tie.

After three attempts and two offensive rebounds, Lowell finally settled for the lay-up.

However, they gave up a quick bucket and with 16.2 seconds remaining, Lowell found themselves down 52-58

win with just a few more seconds, Rogers nailed the triple at the buzzer. The final score was 55-58.

Despite losing, Carhart said the game demonstrated what his players are capable of.

"It's a night and day difference when our guys are doing the right thing," he said. "To have the other team beat you to the ball when points are at a premium late in the game, those just kill all your hard work."

Now, the key is to make the transition from performance in practice to performance on the court. Though his team made that transition in [through] three quarters, he said they have to maintain that level of play for all 32 minutes.

"So those games are fun to watch and fun to celebrate after," he explained.

With this and another heartbreaking loss earlier in the week, Lowell sits at 0-5.

Carhart said of the loss to Forest Hills Northern, "We played really well, really hard, for about 28 minutes... I personally need to do a better job of preparing the guys to execute down the stretch."

Lowell faced Kenowa Hills yesterday and will see Northview on Friday – both games are on the road. Carhart said these teams, if anything, will be more difficult to get wins against.





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
