Council honors longtime volunteer, explains inspection services, approves 2016-17 budget, and continues to review resumes for new city manager

Lowell city council had their latest regular meeting at city hall on Monday, June 6. The meeting lasted just under 40 minutes and council chambers were about half full of spectators.

At the very beginning of the meeting an award was presented to Marv Rosenberger in honor of his 20 years of work with the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program. Rosenberger is a charter member of the program, which was started by former police chief Jim Valentine in 1996.

"After 20 years he is going to be retiring from his retirement volunteer job," Bukala said. "Your hard work and dedication have gone above and beyond the call of duty. We appreciate the countless hours of dedicated service you have provided for our safe routes to school, traffic points and special events. You will be truly missed."

"I couldn't have served, worked and volunteered with a greater bunch of people than what your department has," Rosenberger said. "This city should be very proud of the people that they send out on the street."

The council listened to an "update" about Cascade Inspection Services from city attorney Dick Wendt. Brian Wilson, the building official of Cascade Township, was on hand in case there were questions. **Cascade Inspection Services** has a contract with the city of Lowell that says they will do all building inspections in the city. Because of that contract, Wilson is the building official for the city of Lowell as well.

"Cascade Township, through the contract, is solely responsible for inspections and review of plans," Wendt said. "The state statute where this requirement is says that the building official must be an employee of a governmental unit. It doesn't require that that person be an employee of the city of Lowell."

Wendt said that Lowell residents must buy a permit if they intend to do any reroofing or siding work on their homes. This is because Cascade Township residents are required to get permits for those projects

and Lowell residents must follow Cascade Township's rules.

"Section 105 of the state building code requires that you obtain a building permit if you're going to do a siding or roofing project," Wendt said. "You have a contract currently with Cascade Charter Township. You are required under that contract to adopt regulations and requirements at least as strict as those that are in effect in Cascade Township. Cascade Township does require a building permit for roofing and siding."

Wilson said that at \$65 each, the permits have generated \$1,820 for Cascade Township since 2013.

"We require a worksheet, which is on our website, for them to fill out so we can do a proper plan review and make sure that we have a licensed contractor that's registered with us," Wilson said. "I looked at our records and we've issued 28 of those in the city of Lowell since 2013."

The council unanimously approved the 2016-17 city budget, as well as one minor amendment the 2015-16 to city budget. They unanimously approved the purchase of a \$73,371 plow truck dump body and a \$95,564 Peterbilt 348 plow truck. Both will be paid for over five years at 1.55 percent interest through Mercantile Bank. The council also chose Mercantile Bank for their new business credit card. The card will be in city treasurer Suzanne Olin's name. The council received applications for a spot on the board of Lowell Light & Power from Bruce Munroe, James Salzwedel, Donald Green and Andrew Schrauben, but decided not to make any appointments until their next meeting. Finally, interim city manager Dave Pasquale updated the council on the search for a new permanent city manager.

"The council is scheduled to have a closed session with Kathy Grinzinger of the Michigan Municipal League in two weeks [on Monday, June 20] to review these résumés," Pasquale said. "The meeting is going to start at 5 [pm] and end at 7 o'clock." Pasquale went on to say that the public will have a chance to meet the finalists at a public open house on July 11. The council will conduct interviews with the finalists on July 12.

The council's next regular meeting will take place at city hall at 7 pm on Monday, June 20.

are accepted at a state of Michigan college.






full wait staff will highlight the dinner which features three courses and two main course options.

The LHS choir, led by Nathan Masterson, opened the proceedings with the singing of the "National Anthem" before principal Amy Pallo shared some opening remarks with the students both applauding their successes and encouraging their futures. "The class of 2016 has exceeded the bars that the classes before them set. You have excelled at everything you have attempted," said Pallo before listing some of the accolades of the class,

which include in part three consecutive wrestling state championships, successful service learning projects, well received theater productions, the highest recognition in honors in choir, orchestra and band, Model UN honors, football

The class's top achievement was also highlighted. A record breaking 52 students graduated summa cum laude, with a GPA of 3.95 or above, the most in the school's long history. Topping that list were students Zeth Dean who was the class' salutatorian and 2016 valedictorian Marilla Marks.

The LHS band performed next, under director Tim Haan, joined by their cap and gown seniors. The song of choice was "Sunburst" by Erik Morales. Student Hayden Sutton then spoke to the class briefly before relinquishing the podium to Dean and Marks for their remarks. "We are all hopelessly scared yet bursting with excitement for what the future holds. Embrace this feeling. This may be the only time in your life that you have it," said the summa cum laude grad

A packed stadium congratulated the class of 2016 at Red Arrow Stadium. closing with a quote from the movie UP, "Adventure is out there. Find yours."

Dean spoke next basing his remarks around the life and words of tech mogul Steve Jobs and encouraging his fellow graduates to be careful to not be confined by what is expected or gained with ease. "Don't do something purely because somebody told you it was best. Do not give up on your true passion because you Googled average salaries. Don't chase after comfort. If I have one thing to leave my fellow classmates with, it's that chasing your passion will reward you whether that be in happiness, money, stability or all of the above; it will pay off. Chase your passions, not a way to find stability and comfort," said the Harvard bound grad.

Valedictorian Marilla Marks took to the podium next with encouraging words for her fellow graduates. "Right now walking away from this ceremony we all have our lives in our hands. Concluding the ceremony Massey, who served alongside fellow officers Derek Massey (vice president), Kelsey Emmanuel (secretary) and Sutton (treasurer), completed the traditional Passing of the Spade. After tying the class' ribbon to the spade, Massey passed it along to junior class president Aiden Lane.

Pallo then closed ceremonies congratulating and presenting the class of 2016 to the packed stadium who watched the newly graduated Arrows fling their caps toward the sky ready to take aim at their future.



There were many unforgettable moments on the fields, courts and track at Lowell High School this past school year. Nine fall, eight winter and twelve spring varsity sports competed as Red Arrows during the 2015-2016 school year, racking up an impressive list of both triumphant and heartbreaking moments that define the athletic programs. Here are some of my favorite moments from this year.

Lucas Hall seals the deal - They call it a mixer. That is the move that won the Red Arrow varsity wrestling team's third consecutive Division II State Championship over familiar rival St. Johns this past winter. Though Lowell ultimately lost the match up 57-35, Arrow sharp shooter Matt Beachler and highly recruited Grand Rapids Christian opponent Xavier Tillman had a moment on the court. The pair, who have a history of playing as teammates in other leagues, showed down like they were the only ones on the court, exchanging challenging glances, pointed aggressive defense and a true enjoyment of both their team and personal rivalry. Lowell AD, Perry, retires after 40 years Perry: "I've never experienced burnout." In 1951, Bud Howe, then the basketball coach at Lowell High School, informed a friend that Lowell was looking for a teacher and someone to coach football and cross country. The young man, fresh out of Alma College, was interviewed for the job by W.W. Gumser and C.H. Runciman. He was signed to a \$2,800 contract to teach and to coach three sports. That same young man, Bob J. Perry, completed his 40th and final year at Lowell High School on Friday. "You don't teach or coach for the money. You do it because you like working with kids," Perry said. "I've always been sincere and honest with students and I believe that has left me in positive standing with them. In the classroom and in the athletic arena, Perry has always set certain expectations for students and has encouraged them to attain their personal best. The 1950 Alma High School graduate attended Alma College with his sites set on medical school. His plans changed when his father died shortly after his enrollment into the college. "Medical school cost a lot of money and I had a sister and mother I felt I needed to help take care of." His second choice was to follow in his mother's footsteps - He chose to become a teacher. He later would earn his Masters Degree at the University of Michigan. And the rest, as they say, is history. "I've gained a lot of satisfaction as a teacher over the years, watching students reach their potential," he says, "I must admit. I find it disappointing that today some students don't feel a need for education." Perry served as athletic director and assistant principal from 1969 to 1972. He gave up the assistant principalship in 1972. He coached Lowell track for 22 years, Red Arrow football for seven years, cross country and tennis for 15 years. Said Perry, "Some may disagree with me, but I really believe athletics is an important part of the educational process. I really believe it helps students respect rules and regulations and it helps them do the right things in life." A staff party was held for the 40year athletic director on Tuesday, June 4. There will be a community appreciation gathering at the Lowell Middle School on June 23 for Perry, Mary Richards, copy center operator; and Alice Mitchell, Lowell bus driver for 31 years (accident free). Perry says fishing, hunting, traveling, his cottage, and wood-craft projects should keep him plenty busy in retirement. "You know, in 40 years of teaching I've never reached burnout. I still haven't. I guess I'm getting out while things are still good," Perry concludes.


SOFTBALL


