### CBD products legal but not FDA-approved

Until recently, CBD products were restricted licensed medical marijuana patients and were not sold openly in Michigan. That all changed last year when recreational marijuana was legalized in the state, and now CBD is being openly sold all over Michigan, including in at least two stores on Main St. in downtown Lowell. CBD is short for "cannabidiol," one of the two active ingredients found in cannabis plants. Growers use selective breeding cannabis of plants to produce strains that are high in CBD and low in THC. These specially-bred plants are used to make various types of products. Right here in Lowell, you can buy CBD oil, fruit-flavored CBD spray, CBD gummy bears, CBD topical cream, CBDinfused water, even CBD products for pets.

Depending on their nature, CBD products are ingested or used topically. Proponents claim there are many health benefits of CBD. It is said to be effective to treat physical pain, migraine, epilepsy, anxiety and insomnia. The most common use for CBD is to treat seizures, particularly in children. Side effects of CBD, especially at a high dose, include diarrhea, irritability, changes in appetite and some combination of fatigue and insomnia. Because there is no THC present in these products, abuse potential is low. THC, tetrahydrocannabinol, is the psychoactive in marijuana that causes intoxication. According to a report from the World Health Organization, "CBD exhibits no effects indicative of any abuse or dependence potential. [...] There is no evidence

of public health-related problems associated with the use of pure CBD."

Cannabis is still illegal federally, so there has not been a tremendous amount of research on the medical benefits of CBD. The federal government considers CBD a marijuana derivative, so the products are technically illegal. The feds do not enforce this, instead leaving it up to the states to decide. All 50 states have CBD laws on the books, and all 50 allow the products to be sold in some form. The local legality of CBD products briefly came up at the Lowell planning commission meeting at city hall on Monday, June 10. Members of the planning commission said they observed the many signs in town advertising CBD products and inquired CBD continued, page 4

### **Deep Greens & Blues wrap up June**

The Lowell Showboat Sizzlin' Summer Concert Series is kicking into high gear with great bands coming to the town of Lowell. One of these bands is Deep Greens & Blues, who will be performing in Lowell on Thursday, June 27 at 7 pm.

Since their humble beginnings in 2011, Grand Rapids-based alt-country band Deep Greens & Blues has found inspiration in the singer-songwriters of the 1970s. While the band's name is a nod to a popular James Taylor lyric from his iconic song "Sweet Baby James," it also is an endorsement of the style of music defined by Taylor and his peers: authentic and unabashed, connecting with audiences through intricate storytelling.

As they began to write together, Deep Greens & Blues built their songs the same way their musical ancestors did: acoustic arrangements with engaging melodies and striking harmonies. Their diverse musical experiences served them well, as they were able cross mainstream to boundaries and create a fresh sound.

The band has performed in various local venues, including Frederik Meijer Gardens, Founders and The Intersection. They have also played at venues in Kalamazoo, Bellaire, Ferndale, South Bend and Chicago. Three of their albums, "Roll On," "Chasing Horizons" and "Back to Home," can be found on Spotify and Apple Music.



The band has been very deliberate about how they have grown over the years. Starting out with just Travis Atkinson and Kelsey Gustafson on guitar and vocals, they added Jason Upton on bass before releasing their debut album in 2012 called "Back to Home". With the release of that album, Deep Greens & Blues established their own distinct, harmonydriven vibe. Dabbling in elements of folk, country, blues and pop, they found receptive audiences in communities across Michigan and pushed themselves to grow and share their music with more listeners.

They were joined by Ben McNeil on drums in 2013. Their second album "Chasing Horizons," released in January 2016,

was the product of two years of songwriting and nine months of recording. The band approached their songs with care and respect, and it was wellreceived by fans and critics.

Susan Mora, who plays the fiddle, joined the band after a long run with the Grand Rapids Symphony. She has also worked with Union Guns and the Kari Lynch Band. Matt Young on electric guitar and mandolin also expanded the band. Matt spent the last 10 years performing with the Sweet J Band, formerly known as Sweet Japonic, and he recorded on their first three albums.

Since then, Deep Greens & Blues released their first live album, called "Live at Unruly Brewing," and in 2019 they released their latest

studio album, "Roll On." The album was lauded by local critics for its "powerhouse vocals" and "harmony-driven charm." Released in February. "Roll On" earned the most radio airplay at WYCE-FM in March. As of June 3, "Roll On" was still number one on WYCE's "Local Spins Hot Top 5," going on three months at the top spot.

Deep Greens and Blues will be performing at the Riverwalk Plaza on June 27 at 7 pm. The concert is free for everyone. 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### Lowell city council discusses tax, budget, Showboat

Lowell city council had their latest regular meeting at city hall on Monday, June 17. The council discussed the city income tax and the Showboat, approved some spending and amended the budget at the meeting. It lasted about 35 minutes and was attended by 10 local residents.

The council passed a resolution declaring that all potential income tax revenue

Michigan attorney general Dana Nessel and Michigan governor Gretchen Whitmer. The city now has a page on their website, lowellmi.gov, dedicated to educating city residents on the income tax proposal.

The council voted to spend \$21,799 to purchase a "Monroe dual auger stainless steel salter" for a city plow truck. It would have cost less a couple years ago, but compensation study" of city hall and public works employees. The last such study was done in 2001. The jobs that will be studied are the city clerk, city treasurer, deputy clerk, deputy treasurer, city receptionist, public works maintenance workers, utility supervisor, water plant superintendent and sexton.

"We need to align job descriptions to the tasks they

be spent on street repairs.

"The council wanted to see something to guarantee that we make sure that the money that we collect beyond the millage rate reduction administrative costs is used for the streets," said Lowell city manager Michael Burns.

At their previous meeting on Monday, June 3, the council passed one ordinance and two resolutions that paved the way for the question of a city income tax to be presented to voters in the Nov. 5 election. The ballot language is currently in the process of being approved by the "Trump tariffs" on steel have substantially increased the price of that particular commodity.

"The city has held on as long as they could to keep the previous salter, however, after this winter it's completed its useful life," Burns said. "We did have this budgeted probably \$5,000 lower, but the price of steel has gone up quite a bit to where it came to the price that it was at."

The city will pay the Michigan Municipal League \$12,960 to perform a "classification and are expected to complete," Burns said. "We anticipate the study being conducted in the early fall, with completion sometime in December or January."

"So the purpose of it is to better classify what each person does, not just how much they should be paid," asked councilor Cliff Yankovich.

"Correct, it's both," Burns said. "We would better classify their work and determine whether or not our positions are in the market, above market or below the market." The council passed the final amendments to its 2018-2019 budget.

"This is our annual budget amendments that we do at the end of the year to get in line, to make sure that when the auditors come in February or in September that we're in line," Burns said. See image at left for a breakdown of city finances.

There was a Lowell Showboat update at the meeting. According to a memo written by Burns, the plans for a new Showboat and the adjacent facilities should be ready in July.

"There are really two tasks for the project," Burns wrote in the June 13 city memo. "The first task is, obviously, the Showboat. However, the second task is the old DPW garage where they envision restrooms, meeting rooms and an improvement to the facade. In order to have a budget in place they need a completion of plans. On July 10, 2019 the [Showboat project] committee expects to receive 90 percent [of the] plans for the mechanical, electric and interior of the boat, along with [90 percent of the] plans for the plumbing, mechanical and interior of the DPW garage. [...] By Aug. 1, 2019, we anticipate being able to craft a final budget for both and make a determination if we can only build the restroom at this time or complete the entire DPW garage. Shortly thereafter, we intend to bid out a general contractor for both the interior of the Showboat and the DPW garage."

Lowell city council's next regular meeting will be at 7 pm on Monday, July 1. The council will also meet with the public at a "Coffee with the Council" event at Lowell Chamber of Commerce headquarters on the Riverwalk from 8 until 10 am on Saturday, July 6.

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


### Underground power lines marked at condo site

whether or not these sales were legal.

"CBD was not in the statute that is being enforced, that got approved by the people, so anyone can sell it anywhere," replied Lowell city manager Michael Burns. "It is not THC, so it does not fall under the parameters of [Michigan marijuana law]."

The FDA finally allowed scientists to research CBD in 2015, and CBD products were first sold in the US in 2017. According to a June 5, 2019 report from Harvard Medical School, "CBD can increase the level in your blood of the blood thinner coumadin, and it can raise levels of certain other medications in your blood by the exact same mechanism that grapefruit juice does. A significant safety concern with CBD is that it is primarily marketed and sold as a supplement, not a medication. Currently, the FDA does not regulate the safety and purity of dietary supplements, so you cannot know for sure that the product you buy has active ingredients at the dose listed on the label. In addition, the product may contain other unknown elements. We also don't know the most effective therapeutic dose of CBD for any particular medical condition."

In June 2018, the CBD-based drug Epidolex was the first cannabis-derived medicine ever approved by the FDA. It has proven to be effective in treating two of the rarest and most severe forms of epilepsy, Lennox-Gastaut syndrome and Dravet syndrome.

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company today announced it has a waiting list of more than 75,000 orders for telephone service that it cannot fill because of war for communication facilities.

A tragic accident last Friday morning at the farm of Nicholas Scripsema, four miles east of Cascade on US-16 resulted in the death of Nick VanderMolen, 61, of Grand Rapids, who was working temporarily at his cousin's farm. While depositing hay in a barn, VanderMolen was struck by a hayfork which broke loose from a pulley. A tine of the heavy fork struck him in the neck, severing the jugular vein.

Seeing is believing. We have just witnessed with our own eyes a remarkable days demonstration by the 76th division at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, in which American doughboys from 48 states demonstrated the combat use of such modern weapons as the automatic rifle, machine gun mortars, pistols, grenades, anti-tank guns, flame throwers, and rocket firing bazookas.

A change in music directors has been ordered by the board of directors of the Thornapple Community Theater with less than a week remaining before the presentation of the musical production, "The King and I." James Niebor, music department chairman at Kentwood schools and a member of the Community Circle Theater, replaces Gerrit Lamain.

Lowell city council was scheduled to meet Tuesday night to continue screening of applicants for the vacant position of city manager following an apparent difference of opinion on appointment of an acting assessor. A motion by Councilman Herbert Reynolds to name former City Manager Bernard Olson to serve as interim assessor on a per diem basis died for lack of support at Monday night's meeting.

### 25 years The Lowell Ledger June 22, 1994

Power outages in two of the three precincts, a jammed voting machine, and surprising election returns have resulted in two school board election recount requests. Ann Mulder, who was appointed to serve on the seat vacated by Charlie Kohler over a year ago, was a victim, as was Wendy Southwell, to Warren Jousma's overwhelming support in all three precincts.

The first four Fallasburg bridges built between 1839 and 1860 met their demise by way of logging runs, ice jams and floods. The fifth and present bridge was built in 1871 for a price of \$1,500. In 1922 it was lowered from high wooden peers to low concrete peers.

Lowell's Richard Graham will be raising the curtain on Lowell's new auditorium facility this fall. Lowell High School drama teacher, Laurie Summerfield, is just happy that the LHS drama department will finally have a curtain.

#### lice and scabies

Lice are small parasites that live on hair-covered skin. They are often connected to the bases of the hair on the scalp or in the pubic area. When you have lice, it is called pediculosis. Scabies is caused by tiny bugs called mites. They dig under the skin. Lice and scabies both cause itching.

If you itch on your head or other hairy parts of your body, and the itching happens at all times of the day, it could be lice. Scabies happens on the body but not usually on the head or neck area. Itching with scabies is severe and often worse at night.

If you think you or your child might have lice, look at the scalp closely. Lice are hard to see. It is best to use a bright light and look for the lice eggs (nits). Nits are yellow to white in color and will be attached to the bottom of the hair next to the scalp. Having nits doesn't mean you have active lice. If you find a crawling louse, then you have active lice.

Scabies mites are too small to see, but you can see the rash they cause. The mites

### Lowell dog park back to normal after accident

In April, a car crashed through the fence at the Lowell Dog Park at Stoney Lakeside Park. The park committee had to close the park temporarily and was worried about reopening, as their budget is limited. They were happy to find out that the damage was covered by the city of Lowell's insurance and were able to open the park shortly after.

The full dog park committee consists of five people including James Carey, Eva Carey, Glen Beimers, Charmaine Beimers and Dr. David Sova.

"Our first concern [following the accident] was for the health of the driver," Carey commented. "After confirming that she was okay, our focus turned to getting the fence repaired. We'd like to thank the city of Lowell for promptly contacting the insurance company and Alto Fence for getting the repairs done so quickly."

Less drastic repairs and maintenance are usually taken care of by committee member Glen Beimers, but Carey also wanted to stress that it is important for the people who use the dog park to be ready to help out if they see something amiss.

"Glen is the handyman on our committee, so if there are any repairs or general maintenance, he takes care of it," Carey said. "But we encourage a 'sense of ownership' at the dog park, which means if you see something that needs to be done, just do it."



They have a \$2,000 yearly budget that is spent mainly on the light bill, water bill and other routine maintenance. For other projects, they rely on volunteers from the community. One of these recent projects included putting planters inside the picnic tables throughout the park.

"We have also had organizations and businesses

### Air Force veteran has work on display at LowellArts by Patrick Misner

LowellArts currently has a collection of work featuring artists who reside in Michigan. One of the artists is US Air Force veteran and clinical psychologist Lisa Mull. Her whimsical paintings portray surreal people and scenes using watercolor, ink, spray paint, acrylics and colored pencils.

Although she only began showing her work in 2017, Mull has been making art since a young age.

"I got this big book when I was about eight or so, an encyclopedia of animals that had technical drawings of animals," Mull explained. "I started to draw them. I would look at the pictures and create my



in a technical way. My creations were cartoonish and different."

As she got older, her influences expanded to include a wide variety of artists.

"I have a great love of so many artists," Mull said. "I am particularly drawn to surrealism and German expressionism. I like Dali, Van Gogh and the Blue Riders. I also like folk art."

Through these influences, she continued to hone her craft, despite not selling her artwork or showing it at galleries. The ArtPrize competition in Grand Rapids is what eventually motivated her to show her work to the public.

"ArtPrize of 2017 was the first time I really showed my work," Mull commented. "ArtPrize pushed me to get involved and to share what I had been working on, to show my work. I had been doing art avidly for years and never sharing it. It can take some courage to share your art. It feels like your insides are up on a wall for all to



look at and comment on. But I like to push myself to step out and do something I'm scared of anyway. ArtPrize was that avenue."

Mull grew up in the Grand Rapids area and went to graduate school for psychology in Oregon. Following this, she worked as a clinical psychologist for the US Air Force.

"I commissioned into the Air Force as a clinical psychologist," Mull said. "I basically did what I do now, outpatient mental health, but I was active duty, so I was in uniform. Essentially, I worked in a clinic providing therapy to active duty military and their spouses."

This work brought her to live in Texas and Colorado. Eventually, she moved back to the Grand Rapids area to be closer to family. Her past experience in the Air Force helps her in her current job at the Department of Veterans Affairs.

"Being in the military does mean having a lot more responsibilities and wearing different hats, but what I do now isn't very different because I went right from active duty to working for the VA with veterans," Mull mentioned.

Her clinical psychologist background often comes through in her artwork. People are often shown as a conglomeration of fragmented parts, and abstract surroundings can be seen as expressions of the individuals in her pieces' inner workings. She connects these ideas with the nuanced way she listens to and understands people as a psychologist.

"I spend a lot of my time paying attention to how people feel and their expressions," Mull said. "I spend most of my day talking with people about how they feel and think.

I'm always looking at people's faces and their eyes, attentively listening to what they are saying and also to what they are not saying. I think about my own thoughts and feelings a lot, too. I think that this all comes out in my work."

Outside of work and art, she enjoys being outside as it offers a calm place to clear her own head. She also likes traveling and photography.

Mull's work can be seen during normal gallery hours at LowellArts in downtown Lowell, which are Tuesday through Friday from 10 am until 6 pm and Saturday from 10 am until 5 pm. The next concert will be at 7 pm on Thursday, June 20 when the blues, soul and funk band Blue Soul Express will perform downtown.





### St. Patrick's annual festival taking place June 28 - June 30

The annual St. Patrick's Parish Festival will take place the weekend of June 28 through June 30. The festival will include games, a raffle, live music, an antique car, truck and tractor show and a variety of food and beverages, among other events.

The festival is a fundraiser for the St. Patrick Parish, as well as their parochial school. The church, on the corner of Parnell and Vergennes, has been an integral part of the community for over 100 years. The parish was founded by immigrants who settled in the townships of Grattan, Ada, Vergennes and Cannon in the early 1840s. St. Patrick's school has existed for over 100 years as well, opening its doors for the first time in 1893.

Martha Hefferan-Snyder is the general chairperson for this year's festival and oversees the operation, which will begin setting up on Thursday morning and clean up on Monday after the festival is finished. For many like Hefferan-Snyder, the festival is a way to connect to this long history of the church and its community.


"I am a fourth generation worker to the festival at Saint Patrick's Parnell," commented Hefferan-Snyder. "When my parents were dating over 60 years ago, there had always been a parish festival they would be a part of. I believe there has been a festival from the start of the parish. That's what people did back then; you came together to support your parish and your community."

She said it takes the whole parish to run the festival. She estimated that hundreds of people volunteer to help run the event each year and that many more attend.

"It could be anywhere between 1,000 to 2,000 a day," Hefferan-Snyder said. "We have events for all, young and old."

The festival will begin on Friday with food and beer tents opening at 5:30 pm. There will be a 5k run starting at 7 pm and the popular local band the Adams Family will be performing a variety of hits of the 50s and 60s from 8 pm until 11:30 pm.

The festival continues on Saturday with a silent auction at 5 pm. Auction items are expected to include gift cards to local stores, restaurants and businesses, jewelry and purses, horseback riding tours and even some centennial plates celebrating St. Patrick's Church, among many other objects. The Kari Lynch Band will provide live music for the night from 9 pm until midnight. The band, who describe their sound as, "country meets Americana meets twangy rock," recently released a new album in May entitled "The Other Side." They will be playing shows around





Michigan throughout the summer.

The annual car, truck and tractor show will run Sunday from 9 am until 5 pm. There will be kids games from noon to 4 pm, and the church's famous BBQ chicken dinners from noon to 5 pm. The Stan Mroz Polka band will be performing from noon to 5 pm. A quilt exhibit and bingo are also taking place Sunday. The festival will conclude at 5:30 pm with a cash raffle drawing. Raffle tickets can be purchased at the festival, and they are also currently on sale at the Parnell General Store across the street from the church.



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
